## Residents decry DWAI proposal

**Councilman's suggestion to ignore low-level DWAI's met with vocal opposition**

Guilderland residents spoke out en masse Tuesday, March 17, against a proposal by Councilman Warren Redlich that would direct police officers to not write tickets for DWAI, or driving while ability impaired,

offenses where defendants register a 0.04 or 0.05 blood-alcohol content. Redlich proposed the measure to increase the efficiency of the court because DWAI tickets are commonly thrown out by judges.

However, at that Tuesday Town Board meeting, a motion to seek permission from the state to hire an additional town justice passed 4-to-1, with Redlich dissenting, adding that it is an expense the town cannot afford.

Town Supervisor Ken Runion

said that although the court system-operated at a profit, hiring an additional justice should not be decided on whether the town will make or lose revenue.

"You can't base everything on dollars and cents," he said. "We have an obligation to the town, and services cost money."

Councilwoman Patricia Slavick echoed that sentiment, stating the board should base decisions on more than a financial cost-benefit analysis.

Redlich said he is concerned that the additional justice will

## Lights out for BC athletics

**Bethlehem BOE approves elimination of night games across the district**

The Bethlehem Central athletics department is on the chopping block in the district's latest round of reductions as the school faces a budget deficit and a cut in state aid.

During the Bethlehem Board of Education's Wednesday, March 18, meeting, a unanimous decision was made to tentatively eliminate all night games and make other reductions totaling \$35,380.

Emotions ran high during the three-hour meeting as parents and community members all spoke on behalf of keeping money in programs that they considered the most important.

Superintendent Michael Tebbano told the large crowd gathered at the meeting that he understands their concerns, and he and the board are doing their best to balance the school budget during a nationwide economic crisis.

"Since the beginning of the year, we've been taking these budget sessions very seriously. ... We need to make education affordable to the community," he

## Beth Planning Board OK's condo plan

**Members debate work hours for project at Verstandig's site on Delaware Avenue**

Timing is everything, especially in the construction business.

This old adage took on a whole new meaning for local developer Steve Bolduc of Keystone Builders after a divided Bethlehem Planning Board held a lengthy and lively debate about one of his projects on Tuesday, March 17. A board member sparked the discussion when he suggested Bolduc's project cut down on work hours during heavy construction and demolition periods for the sake of neighbors.

Bolduc plans to build 40 high-

end condominiums on the current site of long-time florist Verstandig's on 445 Delaware Ave. He told the board it would be "unfair" to target his single project by requiring specific work hours.

Although all of the members voted to approve the proposal, Bolduc's project hasn't been without controversy and hold-ups. Neighbors in the area have been vocal about their concerns of storm-water runoff, lighting

and traffic issues, as well as the length of construction and the noise that will accompany it.

The biggest hurdle to approval has been storm-water management on the site, according to Supervisor Jack Cunningham.

"I've been following this project internally with the planning department," said Cunningham, who attended the meeting because he "wanted to see if there

# Police Blotter

## Glenmont bomb threat leads to felony arrest

An Albany man was arrested on felony charges for allegedly calling in a bomb threat to the Wal-Mart in Glenmont.

Rashawn D. White, 25 of 18-1/2 Dudley Heights, Albany, was arrested by Bethlehem police and charged with second-degree reporting a false incident.

Police said they received a call from the store that a male caller had advised management, "Since you fired me, I've put a bomb in the building, everyone should evacuate and get out of the building."

Management then activated a "code blue," contacted police and began evacuating the store,

according to the arrest report.

Bethlehem police said that when they arrived on the scene, officers secured the building and "a general walk-through was conducted and no obvious devices were located."

Police contacted the telephone company Verizon, which traced the call and was able to provide a phone number and name. Officers checked the name against the store's personnel records and matched it with an employee currently working there.

The employee was interviewed and advised of the incident, to which he said he didn't make the call but that he allowed White to

use his phone during the time period in question, according to police.

White was interviewed by Bethlehem detectives and transported to the police station, where he was charged and processed, the report states.

He was scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on March 17.

### Other arrests

Francis J. Fera Jr., 46, of 2 Park Edge Lane, Delmar was arrested Wednesday, March 4, on a warrant for a felony count of criminal sale

of a controlled substance and fraud and deceit, a misdemeanor.

Fera turned himself in to police custody in the presence of her attorney at the Bethlehem Police Department, according to the arrest report. Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer signed the warrant and she was released on her own recognizance, the report states.

Juan C. Figueros, 26, of 296 Delaware Ave., Apt. 2, Albany, was arrested on Wednesday, March 4, on Delaware Avenue for felony fourth-degree criminal possession of stolen property.

A victim called police to report that she had two credit cards stolen from her wallet on Feb. 28 and that she received a call from Capitol One stating, "Someone was trying to make a purchase from the Wal-Mart store at 311 Route 9W in Glenmont in the amount of \$1,719.18," according to police.

Bethlehem police said the victim told them she gave no one permission to take or use the credit cards, and when she called the store, management stated they had two subjects on video attempting to use the cards to purchase merchandise.

Police reviewed the surveillance videos and identified Figueros, and, after questioning him, he admitted

to "finding the credit cards at the Mobil and taking them to Wal-Mart and attempting to buy items," according to the arrest report.

Figueros told police he returned the cards back to the Mobil gas station and left them there, the report states. Police said he was arrested and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department, where he gave a written statement and was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer.

Dwyer set bail at \$10,000 and Figueros was transported to the Albany County Correctional Facility and is scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, April 7, the report states.

# Gaughan notches the win

Altamont mayor re-elected by a landslide

Altamont Mayor James Gaughan defended his seat against Harvey Vlahos, winning the Wednesday, March 18, mayoral election with 327 votes to Vlahos' 18 votes.

A swearing-in ceremony will be held on Tuesday, April 7.

"I got a message from the community that I'm going in the right direction," Gaughan said.

He said he is excited for the opportunity to continue working toward a better Altamont.

Gaughan said that that in addition to improving the bicycle and pedestrian paths in the village, he intends to make sure Altamont gets its share of the federal stimulus money.

He said he wants to make sure the smaller municipalities do not get left out of conversations.

"I'll be fighting very hard for my village," Gaughan said. "I want to level the playing field. I want to give Altamont a voice at the table."

Vlahos' final piece of campaign literature read "thank you" in bold letters at the top. He said his primary motivation for running in the race was to provide an outlet for debate.

"People shouldn't run unopposed," Vlahos said. "I feel good we got these issues out that people might not know about."

Vlahos and Gaughan debated topics such as the public safety budget, campaign finance and public services.



Vlahos also said he was glad to have the opportunity to provide a DVD copy of a 1990 informational video he shot about the history of Altamont. He said everyone in the village was provided with a copy, in addition to his campaign literature.

"This is a village; we're all neighbors," Vlahos said of the opportunity to provide village residents with the video.

Vlahos was critical of Gaughan's campaign, stating that he has not filed his campaign expenditures as of Thursday, March 19, one day after the election.

"He's playing the game of waiting until after the election," Vlahos said.

Gaughan had accused Vlahos of not filing campaign finance expenditures during the race, but Vlahos said he did so on Friday, March 6.

# BC is alive with 'Sound of Music'

Bethlehem's Stage 700 set to perform the classic musical this weekend

Locals will soon be able to hear the sound of music coming from the auditorium of the Bethlehem Central High School.

The cast and crew of Stage 700 will perform Rodgers and Hammerstein's "The Sound of Music," at the Bethlehem High School Auditorium on March 26, 27 and 28 at 7 p.m., with a final matinee performance on Sunday, March 29, at 2 p.m. The high school is located at 700 Delaware Ave. in Delmar.

A 22-person orchestra will be performing all of the musical's hits songs and will guide the action on the stage. James Yeara is directing the play, Jason Dashew is the music director and Danielle Vincent is the dance choreographer.

Yeara said it's a big effort by all involved to put together such a production, but the community will not be disappointed.

"When you applaud the cast at the end of the performance, you're also applauding the efforts and talents of the dedicated crew who built the sets, painted them, hung and gelled the lights, worked the sound levels, managed the

stage, and kept the props and costumes going to the right actors, all with the same passion and focus on the performance as the actors," Yeara said. "It's all one production, so please clap extra loud so those backstage can hear you, too."

The last time the musical was performed at BC was in 1988.

"Twenty years ago today was the last time I directed 'The Sound of Music' at BCHS. Students then were much as they are now, and Bethlehem has always had some great students," said Yeara.

As one of the most popular stage musicals of all-time and a box-office champion, the musical also garnered a "Best Picture" Oscar for its film adaptation.

The family motto of the Von Trapps, whom the story is based on, is "Nec Aspera Terrent," which is Latin for "be not terrified by adversity." For a core group of BC seniors the play marks a bittersweet achievement, as it will be their last performance together as Bethlehem students.

The leads include Aislinne Lutz as Elsa Schraeder; Mike Rice as Max Detweiler; Marcela Desemone as Maria Rainer; and Ari Rodriguez as Captain von Trapp, all of whom are seniors. Layla Wolfgang, also a senior, was a central part of set cast.

"Whether I never perform again, which I hope doesn't

happen, this will also be an important part of my life," said Rice of his acting experience at Bethlehem.

Lutz said, "I absolutely love my role."

The rest of the leads agreed about their respective roles.

"I've been told by a lot of people that I suit my part very well," Rice said of his Max Detweiler character, jesting, "which is kind of interesting because he's a little on the creepy side."

There is a big difference between acting in a drama as opposed to a musical, however.

"We just finished 'Macbeth' in December, and it's really interesting the difference in audience reaction to a Shakespearean tragedy and to a musical," Rice said.

The actors were divided on which type of play they preferred to act in.

"When I was first starting with theater here I was only planning on doing the musicals—I've been singing for a while," Desemone said. "I did Shakespeare for the first time and now... I can't choose which one I like more because they're so different and so rewarding."

The difference, according to Rodriguez, is the focus of the acting roles.

"I would say there are different challenges," he said. "In Shakespeare it relies so much

more on you personally as an actor, while here it's such a big production... you have to be aware of so much technical stuff while acting."

All of the seniors agreed that musicals need everyone on hand to be successful.

"It's really a group effort here," Wolfgang said.

The group said that having Yeara directing the play ensures another excellent production.

"He's someone who really cares about the performance of the actors, and he pushes us on stage," Rodriguez said.

Yeara gave a special thank you for this year's production.

"Year after year Debi Karpowitz would leap into the breach when work on a show had yet to be done or students were loitering off-stage instead of working on the show. Debi functioned as a de facto executive producer/art director/costumer/ 'what needs doing-I've done it' whirlwind," Yeara said. "Thank you Debi. 'The Sound of Music' is dedicated to you. You will always be one of our 'Favorite Things.'"

Tickets can be purchased online at [www.stage700.org](http://www.stage700.org), and cost \$10 for adults and \$6 for students and seniors. They can also be bought on the day of the show at the high school.

"Come on out, it's way less than Nisky or Shen," Lutz said, "and it will be a way better show."

# Bethlehem names new business administrator

Phyllis Albano, who most recently has managed internal audits for 20 school districts in the region, has been named the district's school business administrator.

District officials said she brings broad experience in municipal and school district accounting to the job through her work as internal auditor/supervisor with Capital Region BOCES for the past three years and with the Office of the New York State Comptroller for 12

years prior to that.

The Board of Education appointed Albano to the position at its Feb. 25 meeting. The position was made vacant when Judith Kehoe was named the district's chief business and financial officer in January.

"In a time of budget crisis and extensive fiscal accountability and reporting requirements, Phyllis' knowledge of school district accounting and fiscal policies, procedures and financial controls will be a real asset to the

district," Kehoe said. "We are very pleased that she is joining our team."

At BOCES, Albano managed internal audits in 20 school districts, including Bethlehem Central. Her primary responsibility was to work with boards of education and their audit committees to ensure that financial risks are identified and appropriate internal controls are in place to address the risks.

"I'm excited about this opportunity and believe I can make a significant contribution to the district and the strength of its business office," Albano said. "Through my work

at BOCES, I have come to appreciate the role that a school business administrator plays in minimizing financial risk and maximizing fiscal transparency and accountability."

The district received 33 applications for the position. Seven candidates were selected for initial interviews and two advanced to the final round. Candidates were screened and interviewed by Kehoe, Superintendent Michael Tebbano, and representatives of the business office.

The position carries an annual salary of \$75,000 and Albano began her duties with the district on March 12.

# You can go home again, but leave the car running

Despite what they say, you can go home again. If you have parents like mine, however, you may not survive the experience.

In the course of purchasing what will be our first home, my family had to move in with my parents for a couple months. It really hasn't been that bad, all things considered, and we really appreciate their taking us in while we're homeless, but it has made me think of the vast difference between being a parent and being a grandparent.

First of all, my 5-year-old, Kevin, and his 18-month-old brother, Nathan — two of the most low-down, crooked and ill-tempered rascallions that have ever lived — can do no wrong in their grandparents' eyes. Things that used to land my brother and me in the brig (our room) for weeks at a time when we were growing up are now shrugged off without a thought.

Nathan breaks a plate? He's just being a kid. Kevin gets a stain in the rug? He's just being a kid. Kevin and Nathan manage to start the snow-blower and mow down the neighbor's hydrangeas? Well, they're just being kids.

When I was growing up,

if I so much as looked at my father's expansive collection of tools without first asking his permission, I was immediately sent to my room. The other day, my father and I went down to the basement to find Kevin beating on a 30-year-old Milwaukee power drill with a ball-peen hammer. I saw color coming to my father's face.

Now he's done it, I thought, and I have to admit I was pervishly pleased at the thought of my son receiving some sort of punishment for something that surely would have landed me in military school if I'd done it as a kid.

But then my father turned to me ... and he was smiling!

"He's going to be a little Bob Vila," he beamed. "He's a smart one."

"He sure is," I said. What else could I?

I am also learning that things that are considered parenting taboos today weren't considered so when my mother and father were bringing up their children.

The other day, Nathan was walking around the house, screaming his face off. He does this from time to time, just to check the acoustics, I think, or to see if he can shatter a wine glass. I'm not sure.

He staggers into the kitchen, where he knows he will get sympathy from his mother and grandmother. They're suckers.

"I think his teeth are bothering him," I say to them.

"You could rub some anisette on his gums," my mother says to me, talking about the licorice-flavored liqueur. "That used to calm you and your brother down."

"You want me to get my 18-month-old son so drunk he won't be able to feel his own teeth? And you used to do that to me and Dan? No one ever called Social Services on you when I was growing up?"

"Well, let's see if something sweet will cheer him up," my mother says, and she heads for the refrigerator.

"His teeth are bothering him and you offer him liquor and candy? How did I make it out of this house alive?"

My mother appears with a plate of brownies that she probably baked for the kids at 3 o'clock in the morning so my wife and I wouldn't know about it.

"He really can't have those brownies," my wife, Jess, says. "We don't know if he's allergic to nuts or not."

"He's not allergic to nuts," my father pipes up from his recliner in the family room.

"How are you so sure?" I ask.

"I've been feeding him peanuts for the past three weeks and he hasn't complained yet."

Food is key in the DeVoe household — always has been, always will be. My mother came straight off the boat from Italy and takes great pride in her cooking ability. When I was younger, all the neighborhood kids used to gather on the porch of the house I find myself in now if they knew she was making lasagna. If it weren't for pasta, I wouldn't have had any friends growing up.

No one really knows where my father came from. One of his friends, when I was very young, told me my father crawled out of the primordial soup eons ago, just as grumpy and ornery as he is now, and waited around for my mother to come along in order to have someone to grow old with. Other people have told me he's from Crescent.

In any case, my father was born — I believe, anyway — with no proclivity toward cooking other than that he would enjoy experimenting on his children. When I was about 6 years old and my brother was 12, my mother went to Florida for a week to visit family. We had in our kitchen an ugly, burnt orange, plastic Rolodex-like container with recipe cards inside of it. I believe it came with the set of encyclopedias we owned and was never opened until my mother left on her trip. My father randomly selected seven cards from the case and decided that he would fix these dishes for dinner every day my mother was gone.

Most of the dishes were nothing special — turkey potpie, chicken and dumplings, things like that. But on Saturday, the day before my mother was to come back, he pulled out a recipe

that he described as "exotic." He rattled off the list of ingredients, like he did for the six nights before, and I remember hearing hot dogs, cummin and beet juice in there somewhere, among other ingredients I have since forgotten or my mind has blocked out to preserve my own sanity.

My brother realized it was going to be awful before I did.

"There's no picture on the recipe," he whispered to me, sounding somewhat scared. "All the other cards had a picture on it, but there's no picture on this one."

As my father worked, the kitchen became a place of terrible smells. It wasn't long before my father realized that this wasn't going to be the most palatable of dishes, either, but he was — and still is — a firm believer in not wasting food, so he pressed on.

Finally, my father spooned a thin, brown gruel into three bowls. He double-checked the recipe and added pieces of the well-seasoned hot dogs to the watery mess.

"OK," he said, "let's eat."

My brother and I sat there, each waiting for the other to try it first. Even my father reluctantly dipped his spoon into his bowl and stirred it around a little. When he brought it back up, I expected it to be a burned nub like in a Bugs Bunny cartoon. He slowly put it to his lips, then into his mouth...

"Holy —" he choked before he could swear in front of my brother and me. What he said next, I will never forget: "This crap tastes like rotten onions stuffed into the bowels of a dead man. Don't even try it, boys. Let's get a pizza."

These days it's nice to see him have that same sense of camaraderie with my sons. Even if he's teaching my 5-year-old minor curse words and my 18-month-old how to make coffee. Even if my mother is medicinal for purposes or feeding them well after they've had enough to eat, it's good for them to have that quality time with their grandparents.

# NS4SED to sponsor forum on development

## Letter from developer calls retail size-cap activists 'bullies'

NewScotland advocates against big-box retail developments are sponsoring a public forum on Wednesday, April 1, while owners of a key piece of property in the commercial zone are calling group members "bullies."

The group, New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development, is hosting the forum at the American Legion Hall in Voorheesville. It is scheduled to start at 7 p.m.

According to information from NS4SED, the event will be an "educational public forum examining the effects big-box retail development would have on New Scotland and surrounding communities."

Local professionals, including an expert on tax law, traffic, land use and planning, will discuss the ways they believe big-box stores can raise taxes in the towns they are located.

Panelists include former Supervisor Ed Clark, attorney Jeffery Baker, Kurt Anderson, Marion Mudar and John Egan.

The owners of the former Bender Melon Farm property on routes 85 and 85A, which they hope to develop commercially, have taken issue with NS4SED and its tactics.

A letter, dated Tuesday, March 10, written on behalf of the property owners by their legal counsel Maura C. Mottolose, cites the "bullying tactics" of NS4SED. The letter continued that those who oppose the group were met with a "sneering, screaming and insulting crowd" at Commercial Zone Advisory Committee meetings last year.

The letter discusses a January meeting where a public hearing for Local Law I, which would set a size cap on commercial

developments, was going to be scheduled. Initially the board voted down the motion, but according to the letter, "members of NS4SED did not like the results of the initial board vote on the proposed Local Law I and proceeded to verbally abuse the Town Board members, screaming, yelling and threatening them until one Town Board member became emotional and, ultimately, changed her vote when an improper second vote was called by the supervisor."

The letter states that the Roberts Rules of Order indicate the first vote must be overturned with a two-thirds majority before a second is permitted.

In addition, the letter discusses members of Sphere, a potential developer of the property, who sought orders of protection and filed police reports under the anti-stalking law when "they arrived at work one day to find NS4SED size cap buttons on their Cazenovia doorstep," and "their spouses reported slow-moving vehicles casing their residences."

Sphere is hoping to build a 137,000-square-foot anchor store at the former Bender Melon Farm location.

Attached to the letter by Mottolose are correspondences from Liz Kormos, a member of NS4SED, the commercial zone advisory committee, CZAC, and a supporter of a 50,000-square-foot size cap. Kormos, who is also speaking at the NS4SED forum, at one time was a consultant for a potential developer of the property, although that company was ultimately outbid by Sphere. Sphere has said Kormos should have disclosed that relationship before making a recommendation on behalf of CZAC.

Her correspondences as consultant show developing the property could incur multi-million dollar costs, possibly as much as \$5 million, to develop road, sewer, water and other

infrastructure.

Mottolose said a size cap, then, is unrealistic.

"It is absurd, therefore, for the town to expect any developer to invest over \$5 million and then to cap the size of the development at the level Local Law I is proposing," she wrote.

Local Law I, in its latest incarnation, no longer includes a 50,000-square-foot size cap. The New Scotland planning board redrafted the law to include provisions for developers to prove financial and environmental viability, rather than putting a 50,000-square-foot cap on retail developments.

Kormos said the land can be developed with significantly less retail than 50,000 square feet and still be viable, if office space, non-retail professional and mixed-use residential is included.

"We were going to do it with 25,000 square feet of retail," Kormos said of work as a consultant on an earlier proposal for the property. "That area can only support so much retail."

The 2006 proposal she worked on included 150,000 square feet of office space.

"I think you would be foolish to do retail because they are

closing places left and right," said Kormos.

Kormos also spoke on behalf of NS4SED, stating members have been vocal, but respectful during the proceedings.

"Everyone who has been intimately involved with NS4[SED] has been extremely civil," she said.

She admits there have been some residents who have acted inappropriate at meetings, but she and NS4SED are not responsible for their actions.

She also said the proponents of a large retail development have also been inappropriate at times, and one letter written on behalf of the development was "extremely vulgar."

"We are vocal, yes, but I believe we have always been courteous and polite," said Kormos.

Daniel Mackay, founder of NS4SED, said he is preparing to distribute signs supporting a 50,000-square-foot size cap on retail buildings and 100,000-square-foot limit on retail developments.

"Police, fire and road maintenance costs are likely to increase due to big-box development - more than any other kind of retail," he said.

"Police costs alone have increased by as much as 30 percent when big-box stores are built in small towns. Our neighbor, Bethlehem, learned the hard way with Walmart."

He also said big-box stores could reduce the value of residential property and "existing local businesses could be forced to close or scale back."

"Yes, there is communitywide support for tax base growth and new retail development in the Town of New Scotland. Many people are concerned, however, that inviting big-box development won't effectively meet either of these needs, and instead, will only generate a number of additional, costly challenges for our community," Mackay said in a written statement.

## Four legs good, two legs bad

We have become acutely tolerant of a world that has misplaced its priorities.

The world over, more film is dedicated to the trivialities of celebrities' lives, more column-inches wasted on extraordinary births and deaths, more radio signals sent bearing petty arguments than are spent capturing the news and information that matters most to us as citizens and, more importantly, as human beings.

### Editorial

Many of us live with this tolerance because we can fool ourselves into thinking that the land of Octo-Moms and chimp attacks is one that is far removed from our own. We tend to think that there is some great divide between us and the people who are either party to, or care immensely about, those stories.

There isn't.

On March 11, two dead dogs were found in plastic bags by the side of the road in the Albany County hamlet of Selkirk. By all accounts, the dogs — beagle pups — were beaten to death shortly before they were abandoned. Within a day, several individuals and a not-for-profit group put up \$7,500 in reward money to find those responsible for the dogs' deaths.

This is certainly a noble gesture, right? It would seem so until we realize that all over the Capital District, sick children are literally dying for that kind of cash: a 17-year-old junior firefighter, battling cancer only minutes away from where the dead beagles were found; a little girl in Saratoga County fighting a genetic disorder deemed too rare to commit any substantial resources to curing. These children and their families are holding numerous and elaborate fundraisers to try to scrape together the cash two dead dogs get in a day.

It's been said that a society is judged on the basis of how it treats its weakest members. Somewhere along the line, while we were busy tolerating the misplaced priorities of others, a large group of us chose to place animals higher than human beings in the hierarchy of the weak.

Those people may say that animals possess none of the flaws and failings their fellow human beings, that an animal's love is unconditional where a person's is not. In that sense, those same people would say, animals are more "human" than we are.

They are wrong, and to place the terrible deaths of two unnamed puppies in higher regard than the lives of human beings is the real tragedy.

## Don't let arthritis slow you down

It is often said that life is a series of adjustments and this is especially true for the over-50 gardeners who may now have more time to garden but perhaps have more physical limitations. It is one of the ironies of aging that it often hurts to move but moving also makes you feel better. These are things that Mom didn't tell you!

The physical activity of gardening can be strenuous, but the touch with nature seems to outweigh the negatives. Most of us would say that time spent in the garden is therapeutic.

I was in my early 40s when osteoarthritis became a painful reality that I needed to manage. Years of working in the damp environment of the greenhouse

and walking on concrete floors had taken a toll on my knees. It would be another 10 years before the reality of joint replacement would add yet another dimension to my gardening life. Over the years I have learned how to accomplish what I need to do in the garden without adding more stress on joints, but it has been a process, and I am still learning new tricks. Whether you are a young or older gardener, it is wise to take good care of yourself and to avoid problems so that you can enjoy the pleasures of gardening for many years.

- Be realistic about what you can do. Consider scaling back if your gardens are very large or reconfigure the beds to be less maintenance.

- Let nature nurture you as well as the plants — weed after a rain as moist soil makes the task easier. Choose low-maintenance plants that require less care and add 2-3 inches of mulch to the garden to conserve moisture and keep down weeds.

- Work during the time of day that you feel the best, and check with your doctor for suggestions for stretching and warming up the muscles and joints before beginning to work.

- Vary your position and the task and be sure to take breaks. Learn to pace yourself.

- Wear gloves to protect hands from the cold and use knee pads or kneelers to cushion joints. Sturdy shoes with a non-slip sole are a must.

- Look for ergonomically designed tools or adaptive

lightweight tools when making a new purchase and enlarge the handles of existing tools either with grip tape or foam rubber. This is especially helpful to those with rheumatoid arthritis. Keep tools sharp and try wearing a carpenter's half apron with pockets for carrying small tools.

- Water access should be convenient and garden paths should be easy to navigate.

- Ask for help with tasks that cause stress or strain on the joints. Learn to lift properly and use larger muscles to take the strain off smaller muscles.

- Use a wheelbarrow or cart. A child's plastic sled with a rope pull handle can also be useful especially to haul light weight materials like brush or leaves.

- Consider raised bed and container gardening to minimize bending. Maintaining good posture is important as joints and muscles are in their most stable position.

- Remember to wear a hat and use a high number SPF sun block as some arthritis medications can make you more sensitive to sun.

- Wear long sleeves or long pants to protect against tick exposure and always check for ticks as a precaution.

For many of us, it is the garden that keeps us going. I consider gardening to be a holistic activity that is good both physically and physiologically. The old adage that "gardening is good for the soul" is very true but it is good for everything else as well!

It was sad to see that the Bethlehem Central Teachers Association Union could not participate in the solution of the budget crisis that our good school district faces.

I applaud Superintendent Dr. Michael Tebbano for thanking them for the attempt, however the school staff must become a part of the solution to our budget crisis. Any parent reading this article must know that if the cost of labor doesn't reduce, then some great educational services and programs will be taken away from your children.

To all taxpaying citizens, watch and see what happens to your tax bill this fall. Increased classroom sizes, cancelled special education programs, reduced busing services, laying off teachers, cutting sports and arts programs are all a disservice to our children. The students are the clients of the BCSD, and none of these decisions in front of the BCSD are good for their clients. In this economy, is it ethical for the staff members of the school district to receive 5 percent or better raises at a time when the taxpayers are

not? We all recognize and respect the workmanship of the staff, however pay increases should be commensurate with what taxpayers are experiencing, especially during a fiscal crisis. Should principals, teachers and staff participate in the solution? According to the mathematics I have seen at the BCSD Forum meetings, if the staff accepted 3 percent raises across the board for next year, the BCSD would save about one million dollars. And they would still get a raise!

Please note that the first argument you will hear from the Teachers Union regarding the size of the pay increases will be their givebacks in their healthcare contributions. Take a moment and look at their union contract in the BCSD Web site and you will see that the new employee contributions have just caught up with what the rest of world has been doing for long time. I want to work somewhere where I am guaranteed raises between 5.25 percent and 5.75 percent for the next four years regardless of the fiscal position of the entity that I serve.

In every industry, employees are sharing and dealing with

the economic losses for the organization they work for. Why can't that apply here? Is it above the unions to do the ethical thing in the best interest of the client they serve? I am pointing clearly and directly at the ethics at NYSUT. I see their TV and print ads blaming government and never offering to be a part of the solution.

It is hard for me to accept that our school staff will sit back and watch these bad decisions happen to our children, or have the taxpayers pay an increase to a level they have never paid before, to meet the expenses of the BCSD.

## Systematic Investing Helps Steady Your Emotions

Patience is the key to building wealth over the long term and in a perfect world most investors understand this. Yet it's very easy to let fear overwhelm you during stock market downturns and then to panic, sell, and lock in losses. On the flipside, when it's a Bull market it's easy to get "irrationally exuberant" and jump from bandwagon to bandwagon only to discover afterward that you missed most of the ride. Whether times are bullish or bearish, an emotionally-driven approach can leave you with significant under performance and increased negative feelings. Since you don't live in utopia, there is a solution that can help stabilize your emotions and potentially mitigate risk over the long term when investing. It's called dollar-cost averaging.

### Dollar-Cost Averaging (DCA)

If you contribute methodically through a payroll deduction into your 401(k) or 403(b)(7), you are already implementing this practice. DCA is a long-term investment strategy that involves investing a fixed dollar amount into a particular investment or portfolio at regular intervals. Since you always invest the same amount, you will purchase more shares when the price is low and fewer shares when the price is high.

Instead of investing lump sums, the idea is to average out the highs and lows to help you avoid trying to determine when is a good time to invest. It takes advantage of the cyclical nature of the market and allows you to focus on long-term growth and ignore short-term market conditions. While this technique does not eliminate the possibility of losing money on an investment, losses can be lowered during

periods of declining stock prices and profits may be enhanced when share prices rise over the long term.

DCA is a plan of continuous investment in securities regardless of their inconsistent prices. Of course, you must consider your financial ability to continually purchase shares. Additionally, I only recommend DCA when you are not charged a transaction fee. As with all investment methods there is no performance guarantee, but DCA is a hassle free approach.

### The Cost of Market Timing

Market timing is attempting to catch the market at its highest or lowest point hoping to maximize returns. DCA can help eliminate the stress of trying to time the market because you are always investing. I believe the investment adage, "Time in the market is better than timing the market." And research studies support this credo. The evidence below from a recent Morningstar study is compelling and shows that market timing can be costly.

### Missing the S&P 500 Stock Market's Best Days 1989-2008

- Invested For All Days = 8.4% Return (no market timing)
- 10 Best Days Missed = 4.9% Return
- 20 Best Days Missed = 2.6% Return
- 30 Best Days Missed = 0.6% Return
- 40 Best Days Missed = -1.2% Return
- 50 Best Days Missed = -2.8% Return

Nobel Laureate William Sharpe found that market timers must be right an amazing 82% of the time just to equal the returns that buy-and-hold, long-term investors achieve. While long-term investors are steady, the market timer sweats over when is the best time to get in or out of the market. So being fully invested - even through a downturn - yields better

investment results over the long term than trying to time the decline, removing capital from the stock market, and returning when "things are better."

### Systematic Withdrawal Plans

When you retire, have college bills or other expenses, and need the money from your investments, DCA is also an efficient way to withdraw funds. Investment firms that offer systematic withdrawal plans provide a service whereby you receive a specific payment amount at predetermined intervals - generally monthly, quarterly, semiannually, or annually. The benefits are similar to when you were investing because money is withdrawn automatically regardless of share prices. This rational approach can also be calming because you don't have to concern yourself with the daily fluctuations of the stock market. Ideally, your investment firm won't charge you transaction fees for systematic withdrawal services either.

In summary, DCA takes the guesswork out of investing and helps you benefit from price changes because you buy more shares when prices are low and fewer shares when they are high. 109 years of stock market history highlights the fact that rallies occur when investors are least expecting them. Moreover, the beginning and end to a recession cannot be known until they have already occurred. # FMS student has a way with words

**Luxi Peng's spelling prowess lands her a spot in the national spelling bee in May**

Farnsworth Middle School student Luxi Peng realized a dream she has had since the fifth grade — making it to the Scripps National Spelling Bee.

Peng, a seventh-grader, took top prize at the Greater Capital Region Spelling Bee held on Monday, March 16, at Proctors. She is the first Guilderland student ever to win that honor.

With her win, she will advance to the national spelling bee in Washington, D.C., held May 25-29.

Deb Escobar coached the team and praised Peng's and the rest of the team's hard work. Farnsworth had two other students in the top 10 — Hannah Liu and Kristen Bourgeois. Zubin Mukerjee also competed in the regional competition.

"I was proud of all four of them. They did an excellent

job," Escobar said.

Luxi beat close to 100 competitors from nine counties for the top spot.

Escobar touted Peng's dedication and hard work.

"She taught me probably more than I could have taught her," Escobar said.

Escobar said Peng studied more than 1,500 words, and has been studying entomology and technique since she was in fifth grade.

She said learning tricks, such as where a word originated, can help with words a student might be unfamiliar with. She gave the simple example of the word "school." The Dutch origins of the word account for the "sc" beginning rather than the phonetic "sk," and so if a student is provided with the language of origin, they have a better chance at making an educated guess.

Escobar said Peng asked for the entomology of every word,

even ones she knew, just to be sure.

The final four students, and then eventually the final two, were engaged in a time-consuming, high-tension, battle, Escobar said.

"The [regional organizers] said they have never seen the last four finalists go as long as they did," she said.

The match-up between Peng and Preston Law, who finished second, took more than one hour.

"You wanted both of them to win," Escobar said of the hard work both competitors put into the spelling bee.

Eventually Law missed one letter, Escobar said, and then Peng had to spell two words correctly to win. The final word was "geogenous."

Her prizes include a full-paid trip to Washington, D.C., for her and her chaperone, \$300 in U.S. Savings Bonds, a new laptop, a four-pack of tickets to Proctors and an online subscription to Encyclopedie Britannica.

"This is really a first for our district. It's something we're really proud of," Escobar said.

# Local ACS branch named among top workplaces

**Statewide initiative uses employee surveys to rank organizations**

The American Cancer Society Eastern Division, whose main branch is located in Loudonville, has been named one of the best companies to work for in New York in a competition sponsored by several business groups that used employee surveys to rank companies across the state.

The initiative, inspired by Fortune magazine's "100 Best Companies to Work for in America" list, is sponsored by the New York State Society for Human Resource Management, the Business Council of New York and Best Companies Group, a national consulting firm.

The Loudonville branch will be honored at an awards presentation and gala dinner on Thursday, April 23, at the Marriot Hotel in Albany. This is its second nomination, having ranked third in the large company category in 2007.

"People are very proud of this. This has become something that we strive for, something we wait to see if we get," said Maria Guyette, senior vice president of human resources at ACS.

As the leading contributor to cancer research outside of the federal government, ACS is a nonprofit organization well known for its signature programs and community outreach events.

Guyette said that although ACS maintains a vast network of volunteers, many of whom are cancer survivors, it employs only a small staff.

"If people know about us, they know about us as an organization that does research; they don't think about us as an employer," she said.

She said ACS chose to participate in the survey for several reasons.

Foremost, Guyette said, was the survey's value as an evaluation tool to receive staff feedback, which helps the organization address areas that are in need of improvement.

According to the initiative's Web site, bestcompaniesny.com, award recipients are selected based on an assessment of anonymous employee surveys. Employees are randomly selected to complete a

brief online survey that addresses topics such as overall satisfaction and engagement, personal relationship with management, and pay and benefits.

Employers are also asked to complete a questionnaire that examines the company's employee procedures and policies. Questions range from workplace diversity to health-care coverage, to recycling programs, to allotted vacation time and sick days.

"It's really, 'Are the people here thoroughly engaged in our

mission? Are they happy here?'" Guyette said.

Marilyn Baish, director of wellness and benefits at ACS, agreed.

"We don't have the funds [for consulting firms]," said Baish. "What we get for doing this is we get a report back. It gives us some information on where we scored high and low, and what we need to work on."

Baish added that the anonymity of the employee survey is the most useful aspect to help define

ACS' human resources practices because it allows for a more honest evaluation.

Guyette said there's a correlation between having good human resources practices and employee retention. She said that many nonprofits have a steady turnover rate in staff because the work can be very demanding.

"There can be a significant burnout factor, but we don't experience that. People here are united by the mission. They're committed. We just don't have the turnover you'd expect," she said.

Guyette added that receiving the award is useful as a recruiting tool, and it is a selling point to new applicants, as well as being a morale boost to current employees.

"Our reputation is all we have," she said. "We don't sell a product, we have a reputation. This is one way to demonstrate that."

The goal of the "Best Companies" ranking, according

to NYS-SHRM chairperson Barry Manus, is not just to recognize employers that have noble human resources practices, but to gain other companies' interest in improving their own workplace environments.

"We know that happier employees are more productive employees, and it improves the company's bottom line," Manus said.

Manus said that there are many consulting firms that could provide a similar service, but with the only cost involved being the sliding scale entry fee, the "Best Companies" competition is an inexpensive way to obtain a valuable service.

"If an individual company were to employ a consultant, it would cost thousands of dollars," Manus said.

# Author says suicide shouldn't be taboo subject

**Dominick Rizzo shares his experiences and publishes the poetry that got him through his 'darkest times'**

Dominick Rizzo had it all — the quintessential American Dream. But, for some reason, it just wasn't enough.

Growing up in Albany and then Guilderland, where he graduated from high school, Rizzo lives with his wife and two children in the very home where he was born. At age 30, he works at a retirement community in Slingerlands and talks with the confidence and experience of a person nearly twice his age.

Rizzo said it has not always been this way, and his writing is a testament to those struggles. In his first book, "The Spiral Staircase of My Life," published by Author House, Rizzo outlines through poetry his transition from a teenage boy to the man he is today.

"Friends, family — I had everything. I had love, cars, a job, the college I wanted I went to," Rizzo said. "The point I really want to [make] is that depression just comes to some people. There's no reason; you can't help it."

He said a "chemical

imbalance" led to his depression and ultimately his suicide attempt in 2007, which is why Rizzo is donating all of the proceeds of his book to the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

From a young age, Rizzo was a "cutter," a type of self-mutilation that can be associated with depression and other disorders, and had anger issues that led him to seek anger management counseling. But it was the isolation and over-analytical self-

pity that got the better of Rizzo, not the anger, he said.

"I was a quiet and shy person. I had certain friends I would communicate with, but I was always the listener, the silent one. ... I was a very negative person," he said. "There's always that stigma, what's his problem? Why is he behaving like this? Why isn't he laughing? Why isn't he going out to the parties and doing this?"

The first serious incident

occurred when Rizzo was a young man and was getting ready to go out to a nightclub in Albany. He didn't go after a friend made a comment about the clothes he was wearing.

"I cut myself," he said. "I actually cut my face with a razor when I was 21 above my eyebrow. It's embarrassing to talk about, but I did it."

More than half a decade later, Rizzo was in anger management counseling and felt as if some people were treating him as a loose cannon. He said the looks and comments from loved ones made coping with his issues even more troubling for fear of propagating suspicions he would "fly off the handle."

"I was going through anger management, and it was really good. It was working," said Rizzo. "I realized I was changing, but people around me still thought I was that 'rage-aholic.'"

It all came to a head inside of Rizzo's head one day while he was putting up a pool in his backyard with his younger brother. Like many home projects, things didn't go smoothly. He described the isolation he felt when people would treat him like a patient in counseling and saw the simplest of irritations as rage.

"And when they walk away from me, it's like, 'I'm fine; I'm changing and you guys don't see that,' and it made me ... frustrated," said Rizzo.

It was in 2007, just after his first son was born, that the multitude of emotions surfaced and overpowered him. For Rizzo, not being able to complete a normal family project like putting in a backyard pool became the symbolic dynamite to his dysfunction and the impetus to what happened next.

"I became struck by that, and I came in the house and I remember thinking 'I'm just gonna go to bed, I'm just gonna lay down and go to sleep,'" said Rizzo. "And I saw the knives, and I just buried the knife in my wrist four times."

Rizzo's wife and younger brother brought him to the emergency room, after which he was sent for a psychological evaluation, he said.

"Seeing your father cry kind of wakes you up a little bit," said Rizzo. "Then getting in the safety vehicle, when you get in the back of a passenger car and there's a driver and a nurse in the front and a nurse next to me, and I look to my right and the door handle was broken off so you couldn't get out."

"I realized, 'Wow, I'm going to the psych ward now,'" he said.

Rizzo said the experience helped him realize that he was not only hurting himself but those he loved.

He then made the courageous decision to turn his personal crisis into a positive endeavor by piecing together several notebooks of poetry he had written since his early teens. The poems chronicled his life's journey, good times and bad, which Rizzo described as "a culmination of my 30 years here on this Earth."

"I was ashamed and scared and embarrassed," Rizzo said of his suicide attempt. "And then I started the production for the



book — it was already written, but I started to put it into book form."

Rizzo said as he evolved, his poetry evolved, and he began to use more symbolism, or as he said "the meaning behind the dreams," as he matured into an adult.

A co-worker, who is active in the Albany poetry scene encouraged Rizzo to read his poetry at open mics around the area.

Rizzo said that although he was "extremely nervous" during his first public reading, it has become uplifting for him to share his experiences to show others they are not alone.

Rizzo's story is not uncommon; but his story of success and hope is one that should be heard, said Sam Messina, a Bethlehem town councilman and former suicide crisis hotline counselor.

"It's time that the issue of suicide and depression come further in the social eye," he said. "It impacts society and it can impact any individual."

Messina said suicide has been appropriately described as "the perfect storm," when not just one incident, but a chain of events can lead to despair and a feeling of overwhelming emotional pain.

"It gets to the point for some people that the pain of going on with life is greater than the fear of death," said Messina. "The heartache of some of the callers is so great. ... They feel isolated, but being able to talk to someone confidentially can be very powerful."

Messina said Rizzo is living proof that some can be saved, but

warned that is not always the case, which is hardest for families and loved ones left behind who feel they could have done something to prevent it.

"Some suicides cannot be avoided, even when given a second chance and with the best of intentions from a supportive, loving family," he said. "But although suicide is not always avoidable, sometimes it is, and people need to know that there is help and support for them out there."

Messina serves on the board of directors for Family and Children's Service of the Capital District, a not-for-profit that is the area's oldest counseling and family service, but no longer works as a hotline counselor.

Rizzo said he overcame his inner demons by letting them out and not bottling up his feelings.

"Communication is what I've learned. For a guy, it's not always easy," he said. "It's a simple as, 'This is what happened.' And usually once you say, 'You know, I had a bad day at work,' it usually just comes right out."

For others, Rizzo suggested a similar outlet.

"Find something to free yourself, whether it's writing, whether it's drawing or painting — do something. Punch a punching bag," Rizzo said. "Because when you're inside yourself and your self becomes a little prison, it's always worse in your own head. ... Things are never that bad."



Plant proceeded to his residence, where he "ran" for the door. Police stated he did not cooperate with commands and they followed him inside.



# DWI sweep yields 32 arrests

The Albany County Stop-DWI program nabbed 32 alleged drunken drivers during its Saint Patrick's Day weekend sweep conducted from Thursday, March 12, to Sunday, March 15, according to information from the county sheriff's office.

The blanket patrol was the 71st countywide sweep conducted in Albany County, with 11 local municipal police departments participating, including Bethlehem and Guilderland.

"Unfortunately, they weren't less than expected," said Staff Sgt. Lenny Crouch, administrator of the Stop-

DWI program. "They were more than I hoped."

Crouch said he had hoped statistics would drop this year's Saint Patrick's Day weekend, but the average blood-alcohol content on arrests was up from the 0.13 percent last year.

"With Saint Patrick's Day falling on a Tuesday, it's almost like a five-day party," Crouch said. "People tend to, because of the quasi-holiday environment, to drink in excess. That's pretty scary."

According to the report, police stopped 1,099 drivers during the patrol,

yielding 32 arrested, 9 aggravated DWI arrests, 93 designated drivers and saw an average blood-alcohol content on arrests of close to 0.14 percent.

Crouch said going forward, the sheriff's office will be on the lookout for proms and graduations and the "bonfire" parties recent graduates often participate in.

"We're going to continue as we move into the spring ... to be doing some underage drinking checks countywide."

were any other concerns or hang-ups."

The supervisor said Bolduc's plans fit in with the town's comprehensive plan and that he wants to see the project move forward. He said he's only received positive comments, such as when will it be built and how much will it cost.

"I think it's a big plus for the town," said Cunningham. "We've really been looking for ways to diversify housing in the town and this is a first step towards that."

The debate over work hours began with board member John Smolinsky.

"It seems to me there could be some mitigation of noise by changing the work hours," Smolinsky said. "I suggest a later start in the morning hours."

The site plans show a proposed outdoor schedule of 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. After discussing work hours with Chairman George Leveille, the board discussed the possibility of an 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday schedule with Saturday hours of 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Leveille questioned the legality and logistics of curtailing the hours of a particular project.

"How could we possibly monitor that? ... I think you're trying to ask the town to enforce something that's unenforceable," Leveille said of Smolinsky's proposal. "This could have the potential to be a precedent setter."

Aside from the curtailed demolition hours for the new CVS Pharmacy in Elsmere, town staff and board members could not recall a recent project having its work hours reduced.

Currently, there is no noise ordinance in Bethlehem; however, the town's noise ordinance task force is creating a draft noise ordinance to be reviewed by the town board. Without a noise law on the books, there is little the town can do in terms of enforcement when it comes to noise complaints by neighbors.

Smolinsky said it would be the developer's responsibility.

"I don't disagree with you," Smolinsky said to Leveille, "but it would be more permissive to have a later start ... if that's difficult to enforce and to find, then work starts at 8 o'clock in my recommendation."

Board member Katie Powers said she would have preferred to see a reduction in the Saturday hours if it was "agreeable" and wouldn't affect Bolduc's schedule.

Board members Katherine McCarthy and Christine Motta both said Bolduc's originally proposed hours were justifiable.

"I think the hours proposed are fine, and I sympathize with the neighbors because I live by CVS, and it was tough," McCarthy said. "But I think shortening the hours like this would just protract it, and it's like tearing a Band-Aid off — let's get it done."

Agreeing, Motta said, "I think reducing the hours will just prolong it."

Board member Daniel Coffey said work hours are a codes and enforcement issue, not a planning issue.

"I don't it should be up to us to

set any kind of hours. Obviously the builder will be expected to be as courteous as possible, but to set hours, for example, in July and August, it may be feasible to get out earlier before it gets hot out," he said. "I think it may be difficult for us to articulate hours."

Bolduc, who the board said had built his reputation on good relations with local residents in Bethlehem, said the concerns are noted and that he will go out of his way to ensure disruptions are minimal and quick.

His application has been before the planning board for more than a year, and he received unanimous final site plan approval from the board on Tuesday, March 17.

Bolduc said he has been cooperative and patient with the town's requests, and he's ready to move forward.

"Something's going to be built there whether it's me or someone else," Bolduc said. "I think you're over-thinking this project. ... I think you're putting undue stress on the project."

Concluding, Bolduc said, "I feel enough's enough, and I'm asking for your help right here."

Cunningham said he was unsure if the board had the authority to curtail a particular project's work hours.

Smolinsky voted with the board for approval and said he hoped the discussion had been constructive.

"I'm going to vote yes with this project, but I'm a little disappointed," he said. "Hopefully, this will highlight for Steve there's a sensitivity there."

Bolduc said that the soonest construction could start would be in the fall or possibly next spring. He said Keystone Builders would have to sell the first two buildings to tenants before they can begin actual construction.

said. "I think we need to prepare for the worst-case scenario."

Tebbano said reductions are being made across the board, and he asked residents to "look at the bigger picture" and not at any one particular program, department or interest.

"In the meantime," he said, "we have to prepare for the worst."

Eliminating night games would save the district \$10,000 from the budget, and Tebbano said, "The lights would remain off for the rest of the year."

District officials said they have no plans to close the budget gap with taxes alone, so the board has been reviewing three tiers of potential reductions during presentations on each department and budget area.

Thus far, the tentative budget reductions reached on March 4, 11 and 18, have reduced the initial \$89.9 budget figure, which would be the budget carried over from last year without any changes or tax increases, down to nearly \$88.6 million at this point.

Parents asked if they could help pay some costs of their children's sports programs in order to minimize cuts, but Tebbano said after speaking with the district's attorney that the state wouldn't approve of any "pay to play" plans put forth by the school.

A big point of contention was a proposal to cut the schools' modified sports program all together.

One parent and teacher, Mike Ferguson, said the importance of modified sports is even greater than the higher lever sports clubs because of the age bracket it affects.

"Obviously you have to plan for cuts," he said of the proposed tier two reduction. "But, for me, that's clearly a tier three cut."

The proposed reductions are listed in three different tiers, with the

third being the biggest reductions in expenditures. A full list of the proposed reductions can be found on the district's Web site at, [www.bcsd.k12.ny.us](http://www.bcsd.k12.ny.us).

As the discussion went on, the board decided to table a possible modified cut, and said although it had hoped to vote on a preliminary budget by Wednesday, March 25, it appears unlikely at this time.

Board member Lisa Allendorf elicited a large round of applause when she stated, "I think I'd rather keep the modified than hire another mechanic."

Board president James Lytle responded, "We don't have booster clubs for our staff, obviously, and we don't have booster clubs for our mechanics."

The board was asked by a resident if there would there be fewer cuts in the budget if concessions had been made with the Bethlehem Central Teacher Association union before recent talks broke down about its current contract.

Lytle, who has publicly announced he will not seek re-election to the board and therefore will not be in talks during the BCTA contract negotiations next year, said renegotiating the union's more than 5 percent raise would have freed up

some funds in the budget.

"Had there been salary concessions, there would have been less hard decisions," he said.

David Rounds, president of the BCTA, said neither the board nor the teachers are to blame for the current economic downturn.

"The issues facing the school district this year were not caused by decisions made by the board or actions taken by any of the three employee bargaining units," he told *The Spotlight*. "The situation the district is facing is a direct result of a drop in state revenue caused mostly by a drop in the stock market."

Rounds commended the board for "slowing the budget process down" to get a better idea of what state funding will be like.

"Although I appreciate the district effort to prepare for the worst-case scenario, it is likely the worst-case scenario will not happen," Rounds said.

He also personally thanked Lytle for his service on the board.

"I commend the leadership of Mr. Lytle and the board of education for slowing down the process so that they can attempt to get a more precise idea of what state aid will actually look like," he said.

# Project PARC receives state funding

Bethlehem Public Library has become a true community center, with ever-increasing diversity of uses. Safe access, egress and parking are a growing concern. Library trustees have spent the better part of a year working on a solution that will benefit everyone: Project PARC (parking, access, renewal, community).

The project will be partially financed with a state grant in the amount of \$42,796, announced last week by Assemblyman Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem. Additional funds will come from capital project monies and fundraising efforts. The 2009-10 library tax levy will not be impacted; there will be no increase in the levy.

- **Parking** — High-profile events like our author and concert series, as well as opening our meeting rooms to an increasing number of community groups, overstretch available parking. Reconfiguring the existing parking area and developing the Borthwick property will provide a 35 percent increase in parking spaces, including two additional spaces for disabled patrons. Greenspace and several existing trees will be preserved.

- **Access** — Our one all-purpose entry-exit driveway is neither safe nor adequate. The bend in the drive creates a blind spot, delivery trucks often impede traffic, bicyclists and pedestrians are vulnerable. To meet these safety concerns, plans call for separate entry and exit drives, clear sight lines, better pedestrian crossings, additional parking for disabled patrons, a more convenient book drop and shelter for persons waiting for



a ride.

- **Renewal** — As its name implies; Project PARC has both practical and aesthetic components. The library's adjacent property will be upgraded and made functional. In addition, retention of trees and green areas will enhance our beautiful grounds. Project PARC renews the library's commitment to environmentally sound property development in service to our patrons.

- **Community** — We continue to grow as a community center: a place to gather, converse, learn and be inspired. These uncertain economic times accentuate the need for libraries. When the economy is down, library use goes up. Project PARC is another way for us to enhance and improve library service at a time of increased demand.

Project PARC will be part of the library board's annual budget presentation on Monday, May 11, at 6 p.m. More details and a site drawing will be available. 





be too expensive and strain the already stretched budget even further. He estimated the cost of an additional justice, including salary, benefits and possible additional staff, would come to between \$60,000 and \$100,000.

"We just decided to spend \$100,000 at a time when we have a serious fiscal crisis at the national, state and local level," Redlich said, of the motion passed by the board.

He said other towns, such as Bethlehem, Rotterdam and Clifton Park, generate more revenue each year, and only have two justices.

Redlich's suggestion about the DWAI tickets was one of a number he made to make the town court more efficient. He also suggested having more

cases handled by mail and staggering the times people come into court.

He said writing a ticket for DWAI for a BAC under 0.05 percent is a waste of time because those charges are often thrown out anyway, as dictated by state statutes.

His suggestion was met with vocal opposition.

Guilderland residents spoke out against the measure, citing their desire for a third justice.

Anna Russo, deputy town clerk and an Altamont resident, said she was "hurt and surprised" by Redlich's suggestion.

"Laws such as highway safety are there to safeguard ... our communities," Russo said.

Russo said a driver with a BAC of 0.05 killed her daughter, and that it is dangerous to drive under the influence of even the smallest amount of alcohol.

She urged the town board to let the police use their profes-

sional discretion when it comes to writing tickets.

"They know when to stop them. They know when to write tickets. They do it from their heart," she said. "It's not a solution to let a drunk driver walk."

Others spoke out at the meeting as well, stating that DWI enforcement should not be directed by the town board. Letters from the Albany County District Attorney's office; Leonard Crouch, administrator of the Stop-DWI program in Albany County; and town residents were submitted to the board prior to the meeting; all opposed to Redlich's suggestion.

Ed Frank, a former police officer who runs Choices 301, an anti-drunk driving exhibit in Altamont, said strict enforcement of DWI laws will eventually decrease drunken driving.

"We have to, as a team, come up with a better solution," Frank said.

Frank added that a backlog of cases prevents justice from being administered promptly, and guilty drivers are still on the road while the courts are catching up on cases.

Some speakers brought signs and pictures of their loved ones as a reminder to the board of the tragedies drunk driving can bring.

Redlich responded to the public criticism by saying he is only citing the parameters of state law that result in dismissal of many charges.

"I'm not saying we let them walk. They do walk," Redlich said of the cases where a defendant is cited with a 0.05 BAC.

Redlich also discussed Albany County District Attorney David Soares' policy of not permitting those with aggravated DWI charges to plea down if they have a 0.20 BAC or higher. Redlich said he is concerned that a number of cases of aggravated DWI that are fought are found in favor of the defendant, and many could have resulted in a plea where the defendant would at least get some penalty, such as treatment or counseling.

A plea down from an aggravated DWI serves to reduce time in court, saving time for Guilderland, as well as providing a guarantee for some counseling.

Redlich, a defense lawyer, said he has won cases for clients who were charged with aggravated DWI, and the defendant was not penalized at all.

"I win some of these cases," Redlich said. "You may not like the fact that I win these cases."

Soares said changing the policy to accept pleas for aggravated DWI cases above 0.20 is "outrageous." He said stricter enforcement is vital to keeping drunken drivers off the road.

Soares' office wrote a letter to the Guilderland Town Board in response to Redlich's suggestion.

"Quite frankly, we didn't believe this was an actual proposal being put forth," Soares said. "Over the last several years, law enforcement in Albany County has worked very hard to send a message about drunk people getting behind the wheel of a car."

Soares said Redlich should not, as a legislator, dictate police policy.

He also took issue with Redlich's practicing of law in courts where Guilderland police officers might appear, even if they are not Guilderland town courts. He said Redlich is acting in a conflict of interest, since he oversees the police budget as a town board member.

The idea to hire a third justice was the result of a letter from Supreme Court Third Judicial District Administrative Judge George B. Ceresia Jr. sent to the town recommending it consider hiring another judge to help handle the nearly 11,000 cases the town court sees each year. The town has two part-time justices, John Bailey and Denise Randall, and each handles about 5,500 cases per year.

Bailey said the traffic court on Monday and criminal court on Thursday average close to 170 cases each night.

"Our Monday nights are very busy. Our Thursday nights are even busier," Bailey said.

Bailey said some nights can have as many as 250 cases, but he is dedicated to giving every-

one a fair hearing.

The town pulled in \$851,256 last year from the court system. Revenue from the court has been on the rise, and was close to \$117,000 from 2006-2007, Runion said.

Runion said hiring a third justice to shoulder some of the load would allow the court to process backlogged cases and generate revenue faster. He said that an additional justice could also provide an opportunity for cases to be heard in the day, and that could decrease the town's allocation of overtime to officers who appear in court off-duty. Runion said the money saved on overtime and the quicker revenue stream would cover the cost of an additional justice.

Councilman Paul Pastore said that hiring a third justice as the economy worsens could be prudent because crime tends to increase in those times.

Councilman Mark Grimm, a Republican and potential candidate for supervisor, said although he does not support Redlich's DWI enforcement measure, he still made several good suggestions that are being ignored.

"It turned into a get-Warren meeting," he said. We got sidetracked from the third justice issue."

He said Runion framed the lack of a third justice as a public safety matter, when it is more a financial matter.

Grimm said the number of police officers and tickets will not change, and the real issue is the financial feasibility of adding another justice.

"We have to accept the fact that it's going to cost more money out of the town treasury to do this," said Grimm.

He said he would not have voted at this time to hire the judge, but is willing to let the Legislature grant permission, in case the economy takes a turn for the better.

A bill in the state Legislature to give the town permission to hire another judge must pass both houses and be signed by the governor before the town can proceed.

# Entertainment *in the* Spotlight

The men who skate with the Smucker's On Ice tour are Olympic, world and national champions.

**L**ike many elite ice skaters, John Zimmerman started skating when he was young, hitting the ice for the first time when he was just 3.

For the most part, though, Zimmerman's upbringing wasn't typical of a professional skater. There were no private coaches or fancy home rinks. As a kid in Alabama, he honed his skating skills at the local shopping mall, which had an indoor ice rink. Zimmerman participated in all kinds of sports, and he almost gave up skating for baseball when he was a teenager.

A long list of accolades would seem to indicate Zimmerman made the right decision by sticking with skating. He's an Olympian and a three-time national champion. These days, he skates with the Smuckers Stars on Ice tour, which stops in Albany Sunday, March 29, for a show at the Times Union Center.

Sometimes, Zimmerman said, it's hard to believe that this kid who headed out to skate after watching Saturday morning cartoons is now making his living on the ice.



## A life on the ice

"I should not even be in this sport is what it comes down to," he said with a laugh during a recent interview from Cleveland, where Stars on Ice was performing.

Zimmerman's mom is the one who introduced him to the sport. A Michigan native, his mom was a "pond skater" and loved being out on the ice, he said. So, she took young John to the mall on the weekends, letting him spend hours skating.

She was adamant, though, that he play other sports, too. Zimmerman fell in love with baseball, which presented a dilemma when he was about 14 and it was becoming clear he was an above average athlete. He knew he had to decide to focus on just baseball or just skating.

"He liked the idea of being more involved with his school, which baseball offered. Skating, on the other hand, had cute girls. Skating won.

When he was 17, Zimmerman moved to Atlanta to train. Relatively speaking, it wasn't that far, but it was a big adjustment for him.

"I just had a hard time leaving home," Zimmerman, now 36, said.

He found comfort in pairs skating, getting a rush out of sharing the ice with some of those cute girls who had helped sway his decision to remain a skater.

"I liked lifting the girls and throwing them and doing acrobatic things," he said. "To me, it was the macho side of skating."

In 1998, Zimmerman paired with Kyoko Ina. The two won three national titles together before turning pro after the 2002 World Championships. They spent the next six years touring with Stars on Ice.

"It's the tour that I grew up watching," Zimmerman said.

"It's a dream to be able to make a living doing what you love."

It's a dream that Zimmerman wasn't going to let die just because Ina decided not to rejoin the tour this year. Instead, he's hitting the ice this season as a solo skater with Stars on Ice.

gives him and the other skaters time to sightsee and explore during the week.

Beyond Stars on Ice, skating has taken him everywhere from Tokyo to Siberia. He trained in Russia for four months.

"These are places I would never dream of going," he said. "I can't get enough of it."

He's also had the chance to rub elbows with some of his sport's biggest and brightest stars. Zimmerman said he knew he'd arrived when Olympic gold medalist Brian Boitano acknowledged him years ago at a skating competition.

Another Olympic gold medalist, Scott Hamilton, founded the Stars on Ice tour. Now in its 23rd year, it's sponsored by Smucker's and features a constantly changing cast of Olympic, world and national champions.

Sasha Cohen, who won silver at the 2006 Olympics in Turin, is one of the headliners of the current tour.

Smucker's Stars on Ice visits Times Union Center in Albany Sunday, March 29, for a 3 p.m. show. 



## Senior Whole Health to promote healthcare literacy initiative

According to recent government studies, more than 89 million American adults have low or limited health literacy skills, meaning they struggle to read, understand and act on health information.

Over the past decade, this problem, which affects people

of all ages, groups, income and education levels and especially the elderly, has cost the United States tens of billions of dollars, a figure that is likely to climb as patients take an ever-increasing array of medications and are asked to undertake more complicated self-care regimens.

In an effort to improve health outcomes and foster clearer communication between health care providers and elderly patients living in Albany, Rensselaer, Schenectady, Saratoga, Dutchess and Ulster counties, Senior Whole Health of New York (SWH) has teamed

together with the Partnership for Clear Health to offer free, informational presentations to seniors based around the "Ask Me 3" patient education program.

A nationwide initiative, Ask Me 3 encourages patients to ask their providers three simple, yet essential questions in every health care interaction: What is my main problem? What do I need to do? And why is it important for me to do this?

"Patients should ask these questions to their doctors, pharmacists or nurses when preparing for a medical test, a procedure or when they get their prescriptions filled," said SWH Director of Marketing and Branding Gabriel Martinez. "Posing the right questions will help them understand how to get better.

"Many people, even highly literate people, have trouble understanding words used in health care," Martinez added. "In some instances, a word may be totally unfamiliar.

In other cases, a word may be familiar, but the person may not understand it in a health care context."

Health literacy includes the ability to understand instructions on prescription drug bottles, appointment slips and medical education brochures. It also includes understanding doctors' directions, food labels and consent forms, as well as the ability to negotiate complex health care systems.

"Studies show that people who understand health instructions make fewer mistakes when they take their medicine or prepare for a medical procedure," Martinez explained. "They are also at less risk for unnecessary hospitalizations, emergency treatment and medication errors, and may also get well sooner or be able to better manage a chronic condition."

**Q:** I have cataracts and I plan on having surgery. After cataract surgery, will I still need to wear eyeglasses?
