District officials work toward final numbers as they wait for state budget to pass

The Bethlehem Board of Education has voted to keep modified and freshmen level sports in the district in its final reduction session, but eliminated paying for the ice, greens and lane fees for its hockey, golfing and bowling teams

During its Wednesday, March 25, meeting residents listened to the board make its finalized tentative budget reductions, although the board did not formally adopt a 2009-2010 school budget.

The district had reservations about a tier two proposal in its three-tiered plan to eliminate modified and freshmen level sports after receiving substantial criticism from the community. The board moved the reductions to the tier three level, thereby keeping the programs intact.

No tier three cuts, which included many staff and faculty cuts, were adopted by the board as a part of these weekly reduc-

G'land schools mull major cuts

Proposals include eliminating part-time social worker

<COPY>Guilderland school officials and residents played tugof-war with the district's budget at a Tuesday, March 24, meeting.

Assistant Superintendent for **Business Neil Sanders "informal**ly" presented the budget, slated for vote at the end of May, alongside a slideshow updating the public on the district's progress.

Some residents said they were opposed to a proposal to make the social worker position at Altamont Elementary School a parttime job; an opinion echoed by several board members shared their concerns.

'Children are feeling the stress their parents feel," said former teacher Yvette Terplak said. "We need people specially trained to cope with these problems. There will be so many instances of an unpredictable nature that will arise."

She said the tough economy weighs on parents, and in turn, on children, and having a fulltime social worker can help alleviate some of the pressure on the children. Terplak said she is concerned about what will happen if a student has a "meltdown" while the social worker is not there.

"I believe this position is not a mix-and-match position," she said.

Residents and school board officials also mulled the possibility of funding the tuition for a third student to go to Tech Valley High School, a hands-on technology school that accepts students from all around the region. The district currently pays the \$12,000 tuition for two students to attend.

However, cost-cutting budget proposals include holding off on

Police Bletter Alleged shoplifter arrested for DWI

Bethlehem police arrested a Delmar man on charges of shoplifting and felony DWI after Albany police found him on Central Avenue with a passenger wanted on other arrest warrants.

David C. Venie, 32, of 335 Delaware Ave., Delmar, was arrested on Tuesday, March 24, on charges of felony DWI; first-degree aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle; a misdemeanor charge of petty larceny; and two infractions: driving an uninspected vehicle and no front license plate.

Police said they received a call from the Price Chopper in Glenmont regarding a suspect who allegedly attempted to steal merchandise.

"Upon being confronted by [a] store employee he had returned the property but pushed his way out of the store," according to the arrest report, which also stated an employee believed Venie was intoxicated because he smelled of alcohol and slurred his words.

Police were given a description of an unshaven white man wearing a Carhardt work coat and work boots. Another call to police stated that Venie was spotted driving a red Ford away from the store.

Bethlehem police said they discovered the vehicle was registered to a Delmar woman at Venie's address, and an investigator was familiar with the address and Venie because of a previous arrest that occurred two weeks prior to the incident.

Albany police were contacted because a Miller Avenue address was listed on the vehicle's registered owner's driver's license, according to the arrest report. The vehicle was eventually located by Albany police with Venie and two male passengers on Central Avenue.

Police said officers could smell alcohol on Venie's breath and that he was displaying signs of intoxication when interviewed. The report states Venie made a verbal admission to "drinking earlier."

After failing a prescreening test for alcohol, Venie was taken into custody by police and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department, the report states. It was revealed that his driver's license was revoked in December 2007 because of a DWI in the City of Albany.

Venie submitted to a chemical

and Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan arraigned him and sent him to the Albany County Correctional Facility in lieu of a \$2,500 cash bail.

He is expected to appear in town court on April 21, and one of his passengers was taken into custody by the Albany Police Department as a suspect in unrelated larcenies.

• Iris Singer, 50, of 33 Picotte Drive, Apt. 3, Albany, was arrested on Thursday, March 5, at the Bethlehem Police Department on charges of felony fifth-degree criminal sale of a controlled substance and possession of a substance outside of a prescription, a violation.

According to a statement from the police department, "While in the squad room at the Bethlehem Police Department, [a detective] did observe-Iris Singer sell two Xanax pills."

Singer was arrested and allegedly gave a voluntary statement admitting to the incident. The prescription drugs were taken from her purse to be used as evidence, according to the arrest report.

Singer was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer and sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility in lieu of a \$10,000 bail, the report states.

She is scheduled to return to Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, April 7.

 Guilderland police arrested Jeffrey Thomas Mason, 20, of 24 West Campbell Road in Schenectady, Tuesday, March 24, on charges of grand larceny in the fourth degree and issuing a bad check on according to police reports.

Mason was arrested on charges dating back to Nov. 28 and was arraigned later that day.

 Guilderland police arrested Jane M. Potts, 54, of 16 Morningside Drive, on charges of aggravated DWI on Tuesday, March 17, according to police reports.

Potts was arrested near the corner of Gay Lane and Western Avenue, and is scheduled to reappear in court on Thursday, April 2, according to police reports.

• Craig W. McMillen, 20, of 15 Tower Lane, Clarksville arrested on Friday, March 6, on charges of fifth-degree criminal possession of a controlled

substance and two infractions: insufficient turn signal and an obstructed rear license plate.

Bethlehem police said a stationary patrol on River Road saw McMillen enter a driveway on River Road "for less than two minutes," before pulling back onto the roadway and heading north.

A patrol car followed McMillen's vehicle north, and an officer saw him turn onto Corning Hill Road without using a turn signal and then again turn onto Route 9W without using a signal, according to the arrest report.

Police said they could not read McMillen's rear license plate because of "a large towing device" on the rear of the vehicle, the report states, and police stopped him on Route 9W near Frontage Road.

McMillen and his passenger were identified with New York driver's licenses, and police said the two "provided an inconsistent account of where they had been and whom they had seen.'

After receiving consent to search the vehicle, officers discovered a prescription pill bottle labeled "oxycodone" belonging to McMillen under the center console, according to the arrest report.

Police discovered "two separate types of pills" inside of the bottle, which were later identified as oxycodone and 30 Vicodin pills.


McMillen allegedly admitted to police he purchased the pills from the River Road home. He was placed under custody and transported to the Bethlehem Police Department, according to police, and his passenger denied knowing of the incident and was released.


After having his vehicle towed, the report states, McMillen was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Justice Paul Dwyer and released to the custody of his father after posting a \$2,500 bail.

The pills were confiscated as evidence and McMillen is scheduled to appear in town court on Tuesday, April 7.

DEC orders landfill closed

Town officials say they were prepared, weigh future options

As anticipated, the state's **Department of Environmental** Conservation has ordered the Town of Bethlehem to close and cap its construction landfill.

Bethlehem Supervisor Jack Cunningham said the town knew the DEC was going to close the site but had sent an "order on consent" just prior to its Wednesday, March 25, Town Board meeting.

The draft order states that Bethlehem's C & D Landfill on Rupert Road must be closed by November and capped by May of 2010.

The supervisor said that since the town couldn't meet the new DEC permit requirements because of the age of the landfill, it will be closed.

"The landfill has been operating without a permit since 1991, Cunningham said. "It is just for construction debris, and the town has a policy that you can't import debris.'

Spokesman Rick Georgeson said the DEC couldn't comment on the investigation because it is technically still ongoing.

bas Because there is an ongoing investigation, we generally can't release details of the matter until it is resolved," he said.

SPrivate contractors do general garbage removal if residents choose to pay for it because Bethlehem does not have municipal pickup services. Residents can also transport their own trash to the waste transfer station on Rupert Road, where the landfill is located.

The town is part of a multimunicipal consortium that sends garbage to the Rapp Road Landfill in Albany. Guilderland and New Scotland are also a part of the consortium.

Bethlehem currently collects \$60 a ton for construction debris, which Director of Administrative Services Howard Hyer said translated into \$106,000 in 2008 and \$111,000 in 2007.

Getting the lead out of books

Federal act could force libraries to get rid of children's reading materials printed before 1986

A federal statue designed to regulate hazardous toys could cause several thousand books to be removed from the shelves of the Guilderland Public Library.

An amendment, though, could give the library a break from having to comply with the "unintended consequences" of the act.

The Consumer Product Safety Improvement Act was passed August 2008 in response to the discovery of a number of leadtainted toys shipped from China. Provisions of the act, which went into effect Feb. 10, include a requirement to have newly manufactured children's jewelry, cribs, pacifiers and paints tested for lead, an element that has been linked to developmental delays in children.

Some entities, such as libraries, have been given a one-year stay on the provision, but could eventually be responsible for testing and removing thousands of books with potentially lead-laden ink.

"I understand where it [the act] is coming from. It's got the best of intentions," said Guilderland Public Library Director Barbara Nichols Randall. "The American Library Association is trying to clarify what the Consumer Product Safety Commission meant."

She said there could be as many as 10,000 books on library shelves that were produced before 1986, the year lead was banned in ink.

"We're trying to develop a report so we can see what children's books we have on our shelves that were purchased before 1986," Randall said.

Mark Curiale, the library's public information specialist, said to test one book would cost \$300, and it would be more cost-efficient to replace the books than test them.

. He said the library already seeks out and removes hazardous materials regularly, as many as 1,200 items each year.

"It's a health issue for everybody, especially children," Curiale said. "If we do err, we will err on the side of caution.'

Nichols Randall said that although books have rarely been responsible for hazardous conditions, the library will be in position to comply with the

regulation if mandated to do so.

U.S. Sen. Jim DeMint, R-North Carolina, proposed a bill Feb. 5 to amend some of the provisions, namely one that would to prevent retroactive enforcement.

Wesley Denton, communications director for DeMint, said the "retroactive" provision would apply to libraries.

"The way this [original] law was hastily written opens the door to lawsuits against families that hold yard sales with children's toys or charities that provide a vital service to low-income Americans. We simply cannot allow this law to go unreformed. We must take action quickly to protect American families, charities and small businesses from these misdirected regulations," DeMint said in a written statement. 3

Engineer says Clapper Road project financially feasible, residents say it's unnecessary

The results are in on the Clapper Road feasibility study about the possibility of a new Thruway interchange in Selkirk, but many questions are still out.


The Town Board listened to a presentation by Mark Sargent from **Creighton Manning Engineering** about the financial feasibility of creating a new alignment in the Clapper Road area and the state's Thruway.

We were not asked to do an interchange justification study," he told the board and concluded that a new interchange would be "revenue neutral or better" in terms of being financially feasible.

Sargent said the Clapper Road bridge over the Thruway has been deemed usable in a possible new interchange and discussed two possibilities of an E-Zpass-only interchange on the bridge or a "full access" interchange located 1,500 feet north of the bridge.

Concerning the Clapper Road bridge, Sargent said, "We've concluded that it could be used as part of the interchange."

The E-ZPass option would cost around \$21.1 million while the full tollbooth option would be \$37.1 million, he said.



The Clapper Road bridge has become a central part of discussion concerning the possibility of building a new interchange onto the Thruway from Clapper Road. The town recently completed a feasibility study and is now working with the Thruway Authority and the Federal Highway Authority. Local residents are saying "no" to the proposal and that a new interchange would affect quality of life and depreciate home values.

Carol Penk reiterated her Penkasked several questions that husband's comments about ledtosomeback and forth between the Thruway Authority, stating Clapper Road doesn't meet 'desirable standards" for an interchange.

The supervisor described the project as being in "incremental studies," and that problems must be mitigated before moving to the next step. Cunningham stressed that nothing is finalized at this point and all plans are preliminary.

Passing along Passover recipes and rituals

I've hosted Passover seders for nearly a decade, but I have yet to master the art of preparing homemade matzo balls. My daughter and I whipped up a batch last year, but we both felt them to be inferior to the ones from the box mix.

I don't know the source of the problem. I used the same ingredients that my Aunt Selma uses. Her matzo balls, like all the food she prepares, are delicious. Mine, not so much.

Truth be told, I haven't eaten any of my aunt's matzo balls in years. That's because I haven't been to Queens for Passover since my daughter was a toddler. She's 12 now.

Before Rachel was born, Jeff and I would often travel downstate to participate in a seder at the garden apartment where my Aunt Selma and Uncle Marty live. As I did when I was a child, I'd help my aunt make the haroset (pronounced with a throaty h sound), consisting of chopped apples, walnuts, cinnamon and a few splashes of wine. She has this wonderful, well-worn wooden bowl that keeps all the ingredients contained during the chopping.

Other than the haroset, I didn't help my aunt with any of the other cooking. She'd already been cooking for days. She'd made



dozens of matzo balls, roasted a turkey, prepared the meatballs that her grandchildren like, and peeled countless potatoes. By the time we arrived, the soup would be simmering on the stove. Still, it would be a while before the seder, so Aunt Selma would feed us a late lunch, offering perhaps the chicken she used to make the soup broth. Jeff and I would have a bite to eat, then I'd make the haroset and we'd help set the table.

My favorite part of Passover is the seder, a lively hands-on religious ceremony celebrating the exodus from Egypt. During the seder, Jews read from a special book called a haggadah. The word haggadah means "the telling," referring to the obligation who the end of normal words. For to tell the story of Passover to our children each year so the story will be remembered and relayed from generation to generation.

I enjoy gathering with family and friends and going through the seder rituals. The word "seder" means "order" and refers to the order of the parts of the ceremony, which includes a festive meal. I love the tradition there are many haggadah books to choose from, and each family may put a slightly different twist on the proceedings, any seder you go to will have the same core parts.

When I host, I try to make my seder interesting for the children. I use assorted props and music, a homemade felt-board story, and a clue-based search for the afikomen (a special piece of matzo that is hidden, but needed to complete the seder.) I want my daughter to look forward to the holiday and find meaning in the seder. I want to create memories for her that will motivate her to carry on the tradition.

Though when I think about it, I realize that no one ever bothered to make the seder interesting for me. I was the youngest child lost in a sea of older siblings and cousins. Much of the meaning and conversation slipped over my head: We used a haggadah that used "thee" and "thou" and also added "est" or "eth" example, the parting of the Red Sea might be explained as "And the sea fledest." Maybe "fledest" was supposed to sound more miraculous than just regular "fled." Anyhow this type of language made the text both comical to read and difficult to understand.

And vet. "despitest these childhood issues I describeth," my desire to carry on the tradition

and the rituals. Hove that although of the Passover seder has always been strong.

> It's been 20 years since all the Shragers and all the Mendelsohns have celebrated Passover together. My mother was the host of that seder at my childhood home in Voorheesville. My future husband, Jeff, was there. So was my cousin Jenna, just 2 months old. I also recall that the weather was lovely and that my sister announced that she was pregnant with her second child.

And then time passed. My dad retired and my parents were usually in Florida during Passover. And so, a number of times Jeff and I, and later Rachel too, went down to Queens to join my aunt, my uncle, my cousins and my cousins' children.

And then more time passed. And Rachel grew. And though we stopped making the effort to travel to Queens, we started hosting our own seders, inviting not only our siblings, but also our friends. I bought a new familyoriented haggadah. I painted a ceramic seder plate. I also created the felt-board story, and it travels with me on the years my sister hosts.

As a child one doesn't normally think about the possibility that the composition of the people at your holiday dinner will one day change. Adults soon figure out that changes do happen for a variety of reasons, including grown children starting their own families, geographic distance between family members, and death. I take comfort in knowing that even when the faces around the table change, the basic rituals of the Passover seder stay the same.

This year, Passover begins the evening of April 8. My family will be participating in seders on the first two nights of this eight-day holiday. I look forward to the gatherings, the singing, the wine and the food. I'm not hosting this year, so I can experiment with recipes without having to please a large crowd.

I haven't eaten one of Aunt Selma's matzo balls in many years, but I have no reason to expect that they have declined in quality. Maybe I'll call her up and have her guide me through the process. Somehow the sound of her voice enhances my culinary abilities.

I'll ask Rachel to help too. We'll mix and stir, roll and boil. And then we'll taste. And I hope that the delight of biting into a yummy matzo ball will instill in my daughter a love of family traditions that she will pass on to future generations.



Bethlehem police charge G'land man in taxi theft

Suspect allegedly drove Capitaland-owned van home from bar

Bethlehem police have charged Thomas J. Frankovic, 24, of 125 Beacon Road in Glenmont, with misdemeanor DWI and three infractions: failure to keep right, failure to comply with officers and driving on the shoulder of a roadway. Police said they may also charge him with felony fourth-degree criminal possession of stolen property.

The charges stem from a Saturday, March 21, incident in which Frankovic allegedly drove a Capitaland Taxi home from a Guilderland bar. Bethlehem police had received a call from the Guilderland Police Department to be on the lookout for Frankovic and a Capitaland van after they both turned up missing at a bar on Western Avenue in Guilderland, across from the University at Albany campus.

The cab driver was inside the bar when Frankovic allegedly climbed behind the driver's seat and drove through Albany toward Bethlehem, according to the arrest report, which stated, "Frankovic took the vehicle and drove off intending to drive it home to Beacon Road."

Cpt. Curtis Cox of the Guilderland Police Department said the cab's original driver found the cab missing when he returned to where it was parked.

Police called Capitaland Taxi and were told by a dispatcher the vehicle's GPS unit in the van showed it was being driven to Southern Boulevard, and it was spotted by Bethlehem police on Route 9W in Glenmont.

Police activated their emergency lights and attempted to stop Frankovic, but "he failed to comply" and continued to Feura Bush Road, where he stopped the vehicle near Patterson Drive, according to the report.

Frankovic was taken into custody by police and identified with a information found inside of his wallet, and he was transported to the Bethlehem Police Department.

While at the station, Frankovic allegedly refused to take a chemical test. Guilderland police were contacted about the arrest, and they transported the cab driver to the Glenmont location, where he took possession of the van.


Frankovic was eventually released to the custody of his father.

When the levy breaks ...

Around this time of the year, the media — we at *The Spotlight* included — is busy trying to make the tedious stories about village, town, city, school and state budgets somehow sound new, fresh, and as interesting as they are important.

No doubt, an array of headlines —some in *The Spotlight*, we're ashamed to admit — has referenced the rising or falling of a certain taxing entity's tax rate.

That's unfortunate, because taxpayers and taxing entities need to understand that the tax rate is insignificant. It's the tax levy that's important.



A tax rate is a very emotionally charged and easily manipulated figure, and it is because of this that it is often the figure most touted at the local level. A tax rate that increases more than 4 percent is ghastly, a tax rate that drops (it has been known to happen) is lauded. Unfortunately, neither one of those numbers, by themselves, tell you anything about how much you will pay in taxes, let alone if the amount will be higher or lower than what was paid the year before.

A tax rate depends on two other elements: a property's value, relative to the rest of the property in the community; and the total tax levy required by the taxing entity (your town, city, state or school district).

Property values can, and will, change, particularly in a housing market as volatile as the one we are in now. Because property values change, applying a tax rate to those values without knowing what the overall tax levy is, isn't really a good gauge of whether or not an entity is increasing or decreasing spending. A 4 percent tax rate applied to a home worth \$200,000 this year, for example, would yield twice the amount of actual dollars as the same 4 percent rate applied to that same home assessed at \$100,000 last year. The opposite would hold true if the assessed value of a property were to decrease.

The tax levy, on the other hand, is not as easily manipulated. If a taxing entity says it needs to raise \$1 million through taxes, the tax levy is \$1 million. There isn't much of a way to manipulate that number, and its increase or decrease over last year's levy will give you the best indication as to whether you're comfortable with the level of spending by that particular taxing entity.

Over the next few weeks, there will be talk of decreasing tax rates through the application of federal stimulus money to an entity's tax levy. Don't be fooled. That money will have to be paid back, and even though it made your town/city/ school/state tax rate a little easier to swallow, all it did was to shift your tax burden to a different rate for another time.

Let's close with the words of journalism and political pundit Kevin Fischer, a veteran of print, broadcast and online media:

"If there's nothing else you remember about your property taxes, remember this: It's the tax levy, friend, the tax levy."



Law changes guard against fraud

Drastic changes in the law and forms regarding the New York State Power of Attorney were signed into law by Gov. David Paterson on Jan. 30. The prior statutory form was a simple, two-page document. Anyone could confidently copy or download a form, sign on the bottom line, having their signature acknowledged before a notary public and be done. That simple two page document was all that was required for the principal (person signing the power of attorney) to appoint an agent (the person who could now act on their behalf), and designate tremendous powers that the agent could use to act on the principal's behalf.

As a practicing local attorney I have prepared countless power of attorneys for clients. Yes, these documents were simple, but they did not provide safeguards against fraud and abuse.

Change was necessary. On any given day you could open the newspaper to find the sad stories of bank accounts that had been liquidated or the family house that was sold out from underneath unsuspecting, aging parents, or assets that had been mysteriously retitled. The ever-growing aging population is susceptible to people taking advantage of them. The old form of power of attorney was too easily used to treat someone else's assets like it was a personal piggy bank.

"What can we do?" is a question that is often asked once the abuse is discovered. There are few easy answers to that question. There was little in the way of procedure to set aside or unwind these transactions. When someone acted under a valid power of attorney, it was difficult and expensive to undo the transaction and even harder to re-coup the "stolen" assets. It only *****

became harder when an elderly person no longer had the capacity to dispute the actions taken.

I have taken quite a bit of time to familiarize myself with the new law, its requirements and the two new forms that replace the standard simple form. I share with you my insight and opinion on the new forms, what powers and protections they provide and what some key focal points members of our community should focus on.

A major focus of the new form is awareness for all. The forms provide clear instructions to the principal about what they are signing and clear instructions to the agent about the responsibility they are accepting, including the legal consequences of their actions. A second focus is on the tremendous powers and consequences that these documents hold. So much so that the old form is now split into two forms. The first form addresses the powers you give to someone to act on your behalf and the second form provides powers you give to someone to gift or transfer your assets, (this is the statutory major gifts rider, or SMGR).

My favorite addition is the requirement that the agent has to sign the power of attorney form. The old form only required parents did not let their children executed these documents. Now, however, the agent must sign the form, agreeing to act in the best interest of the principal and agreeing to accept responsibility and accountability. The new document, which carries weight, and lawmakers have provided comprehensive forms to address the fraud and abuses suffered via power of attorneys.

Another positive security measure meant to protect the principal has been added. The principal can choose to appoint a monitor, someone who has no authority to act on behalf of the principal, but who can review the actions and records of the agent. The drafters went one step further and included a procedure to review the actions and records of the agent, including the ability to bring on a special proceeding to question the actions and records of the agent. The SMGR form is a separate, optional document that addresses the wishes of the principal for gifting and transfer purposes. The SMGR provides what ability the agent has to gift the property or money of the principal. Without the SMGR form, the agent cannot gift the real or personal property of the principal. The principal

uses this SMGR form to limit who gifts can be made to, in what dollar amounts gifts can be made and what other limits you want to include for your gifts and transfers. The SMGR form must be signed at the same time as the power of attorney and be witnessed by two disinterested persons. The agent does not sign the SMGR form, but that person should carefully review and abide by its instructions.

I suspect that as Sept. 1 approaches, there will be a flurry of activity and seminars geared toward informing the public about the new law and forms. It is not mandatory that you sign a new power of attorney. Your old one will still be valid. I do caution that there are many more protections that the new form offers that the old form did not. At the very least, I suggest you dig up your planning documents and review what they contain. You might be surprised that you do want someone or something different. Your situation may have changed.

The new law is not simple and it does create several new requirements. I advise that you seek the guidance and counsel of an attorney before executing them. I cannot stress enough that you re-visit your plans and your long-range goals and consider who best to handle your affairs when you can no longer handle them yourself.

It was only recently that the New York headlines plastered the severe allegations Brooke Astor's grandson brought against his own father, Anthony Astor. Anthony Astor was quick to point out that he was the appointed agent under Brooke's power of attorney. Her grandson' was only able to capture the attention of the public and protect his grandmother by pleading her case to the court and publicizing it to the general public on the front pages of the newspaper. I am tremendously optimistic that under the new law, the general public will not have to go to this length to seek reasonable and timely resolutions to their issues with abuses under a power of attorney.

I caution the public to be patient with lawyers as we review the new law and the protections these new forms provide and the new execution procedures. The purpose of the amended law and separate forms is noble and a true attempt to protect the public. I know there will be a transition period as new forms start to surface and the older. more recognizable forms start to fade away in the distance. People like what they know and we are a very visual society. There are always wrinkles to smooth when something new is introduced. However, this adjustment period will come and pass, and the public will be better served for it.

Albany County ammo law needless legislation

The proposed Albany County Local Law "A" would require identification and recording of gun information and identification of the purchaser for all ammunition purchased within the County.

This law is yet another attempt by County Legislators to reduce the gun violence. As well intentioned as Local Law "A" might be, the law indirectly expands gun registration beyond the current laws by requiring recording information on all firearms, not just handguns, that will use the ammunition purchased. This includes firearms which are not covered by current gun registration laws. In addition, it will increase the administrative red tape that Albany County businesses are already required to maintain.

And unfortunately, Local Law "A" will do nothing to reduce gun violence since ammunition would be available, without registration, in nearby counties. We already have a law on the books covering handguns. New York State Penal Law 270.00(5) states that "it shall be unlawful for any dealer in firearms to sell any

ammunition designed exclusively for use in a pistol or revolver to any person, not authorized to possess a pistol or revolver.'

If the law is not being enforced, then we should stress enforcement. Adding yet another law does not guarantee compliance or enforcement. Enactment of laws which restrict personal freedoms are sometimes the price we are willing to pay to solve societal issues. However, if

Officers seek second suspect in East Greenbush bank robbery

Altamont resident in custody in connection with crime

Altamont resident Johnathan P. Lawrence, 32, turned himself in to East Greenbush police Friday, March 20, in connection with the robbery of an East Greenbush Key Bank, according to police reports.

Lawrence is charged with assaulting a teller in the course of a robbery Wednesday, March 18.

He was scheduled to appear in court Monday, March 30, and was being held in Rensselaer County jail.

East Greenbush Chief of Police Christopher Lavin said the investigation has led police to believe Lawrence did not act alone.

"We're in search of suspect

No. 2 — the driver of the getaway pick-up truck," Lavin said Friday, March 27. "That person is still at large."

Lavin said police have reason to believe that Lawrence was allegedly dropped off in the truck before riding a bicycle to the bank, at which point he allegedly robbed the bank and rode the bike back to the truck.

East Greenbush police said they have the license plate number of the alleged getaway vehicle. Assisting the investigation are the Rensselaer County District Attorney's Office, New York State Police, Cohoes police, the Albany County Sheriff's Department and Rensselaer County law enforcement agencies.

Lawrence, who lives at 63 White Road in Altamont, allegedly admitted to his participation while in the custody of the Cohoes Police Department in an unrelated matter.

During the robbery, a 30-

year-old teller suffered several injuries, including a broken femur.

"When the teller said that he could not open the bank vault, the robber went into a rage by pushing him down and stomping his leg broken in three places," according to a written statement with the East Greenbush Police Department.

Lawrence is accused of entering the bank fully disguised with a mask, assaulting the tellers and robbing the cash.

He faces charges of robbery in the first degree, assault in the first degree and grand larceny in the third degree.

Altamont Police Commissioner Anthony Salerno said that although Lawrence does not have a criminal record in Altamont, he is familiar with him and has seen him driving through the town.


Local churches fare well at CROP walk

Bethlehem to upgrade its Internet security

Town board decides to increase credit card security; one councilman * asks for better coverage

A discussion about upgrading the town's Web site security led to a 4-to-1 vote by the Bethlehem Town Board to purchase network security and privacy insurance.

The board listened to a presentation by Jeffrey Bryant of Slingerlands based Bryant Assest Protection on a \$15,398 contract to purchase a "rider," or addition to the town's insurance policy. Bryant said the additional insurance would defer liability from the town in the case of credit card theft or tampering on the Town of Bethlehem Web site.

Only the Department of Parks and Recreation accepts credit card purchases on behalf of the town in order to process park passes and other fee-based services.

Supervisor Jack Cunningham said the town is increasing its security as it attempts to provide more credit card payment options through its Web site. He added because current premiums this year were lower than what had been budgeted for, that no additional town funds are being used to purchase the new insurance.

"We weren't sufficiently covered, in our opinion," he said of the additional insurance. "We revisit our insurance policies every year ... and hopefully people will be able to pay for more things with credit cards on the Web site."

Councilman Mark Hennessey voted against the proposal, saying that he felt the town should have even better coverage to protect itself from credit card liabilities. He questioned why this insurance coverage was chosen over another bidder.

"One difference between the two policies - one includes regulatory civil fines and penalties in ... defense, the other of which does not," Hennessey said, and asked, "The one that we selected does not, why is that?" Bryant said the coverage from the other bidder "wasn't as complete in other areas" as the CNA Insurance coverage that Bethlehem was purchasing. He added that if a breach of confidential information occurred, CNA would be notified by the state and would modify the individual's credit for a full year if their information was found to be breached.

But if the town were found to be at fault for the breach, Hennessey questioned, the liability would still fall on the town.

"I still don't think I got an answer to the question," Hennessey said. "The requirement to make that notification is ours if were the ones have misplaced, had the information stolen, whatever ... so we would be liable not CNA."

Bryant responded that, "Well, you would be liable, yes, if you didn't make that notification to your carrier, that is correct. I guess, ultimately yes, from a legal standpoint you are liable, but once that notification is made to your carrier you carrier is liable on your behalf of that ... it passes from you to the carrier."

Bryant said if there was a breach and the town tried to take care of it "in house" or became embarrassed and didn't notify the insurance carrier, then Bethlehem would be liable for any damages resulting in a credit breach.


Director of Management of Information Services Jeffrey Dammeyer told the board that credit card information is not stored by the town, but is merely processed by the town to process residents Parks and Recreation needs.

Dolin said he is in support of closing the crossing, the site of a near fatal collision for resident Peter Salerno and his two children on Nov. 22, and is hoping to get a speedy decision to move on it.

The town is hoping to put in a 1,700-foot road connecting Youmans Road to Great View

In late November Salerno's Range Rover was struck by two trains heading in opposite directions. He eventually spun off ooth tracks after pulling his two daughters to the front of the car and likely saving their lives.

Closing the crossing could cost as much as \$600,000, according to COT estimates. The railroad company has pledged \$132,000, New Scotlar.d has pledged \$12,000, and the rest of the money would come from the Federal Highway Administration.



Benefit being held for local children and the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society

Stories of leukemia and. lymphoma diagnoses don't always have a storybook ending, but two area children that were affected by cancer have gotten just that.

Eight-year-old Meredith Charleson of Saratoga Springs and 7-year-old Jake Franchi of Averill Park are this year's Leukemia and Lymphoma Society's boy and girl of 2009. Key Bank is teaming up with other area businesses to raise money for one of the area's most important not-for-profit organizations.

Heather Ford, a KeyBank vice president of business banking, said this year's fundraising event is a very important one and that donations can be made to any area KeyBank.

"It's a fundraiser ... first and foremost," Ford said. "Leukemia and Lymphoma has a current campaign called Man and Woman of the year and I am a candidate for that campaign, so as a candidate you put together a team and raise money.'

Although both Charleson and Franchi are being honored, all proceeds will go the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society of the Capital District of Upstate New York.

"They are both surviving leukemia at this point," Ford said. "It's just about raising funds

and the opportunity to educate children on ways to become involved in their communities ... and educate children about other children living with blood-related cancers."

In October of 2001, Meredith Charleson, the youngest of Dan and Sarah Charleson's three children, was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia (ALL).

She was only 1 at the time.

Doctors gave Meredith a 75 percent survival rate. Doctors said that because of the advances in research, the survival rates had come a long way, and 28 months later, Meredith took her last dose of chemotherapy.

Even though getting to this wonderful day of celebration had its ups and downs, they were so grateful that The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society concentrates on finding a cure.

Charleson became cancer and chemotherapy free on Jan. 24, 2009.

Franchi is this year's boy of the year and he, too, was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia on Sept. 11, 2004. He is the youngest child of Paula and Christopher Franchi's two children and was 3 years old at the time.

The news came as a complete shock to his family and his parents quickly learned that the

road ahead of them would not be an easy one. Enduring three plus years of daily chemotherapy, Franchi officially completed treatment on Nov. 30, 2007.

Although this relieved his parents, the fear of relapse still lingers as Franchi is in remission but will not be considered cured until Nov. 30, 2012.

His cure date will be exactly 5 years from the day of his last treatment.

"My grandfather died of leukemia in 1966, so it has directly affected my family," Ford said. "But [donating] also provides an opportunity to get children to get involved in the community at a young age."

Kim Ryan, a Bethlehem town employee, is partnering with Ford to help raise awareness for the cause.

"Heather's a friend of mine ... and I've done a lot of fundraising in the past," Ryan said. "This particular organization is important to me on two levels. obviously the children's level because I have four kids myself."

The other reason, Ryan said, was a personal loss.

"I've had a very close friend die from leukemia," she said. "When something like that happens you don't forget, and it's just a way to give back."





Wilestones Teen's TV trip a wish come true

visit made rigorous cancer treatments seem a distant memory

Less than three years ago, she was diagnosed with an aggressive form of cancer. This year, she shined brightly on televisions across the country during an episode of "Law and Order: Special Victims Unit.'

But Jayna Schenk, 17, of Delmar, is not a national celebrity. She is a local teen who is battling cancer, which is now in remission, and got to see one of her dreams come true.

According to her mother, Diane Schenk, she and Jayna's father, Doug, first learned of Jayna's Acute Myeloid Leukemia when she was visiting The future groom is a graduate her uncle in Florida.

Jayna came down with a painful migraine, her mother said, and was brought to the hospital, where her blood was tested and the disease was discovered. She was officially diagnosed in August 2007.

Schenk said the symptoms of Javna's disease were present, although the disease itself was not immediately The future groom is recognizable.

"She had been sick for a few months, but we couldn't pinpoint it," she said.

According to Schenk, Jayna's disease was attacking her white blood cells rapidly, with the cells mutating and causing many complications, including severe headaches.

Once doctors discovered Jayna had AML, her mother said, they knew she would have to endure rigorous treatment in

hope's to cure the aggressive disease.

Jayna was recommended for five cycles of chemotherapy, Schenk said, although her body responded to the treatment and went into remission almost immediately after her first treatment.

"She was advanced, but not as advanced as other children," said Schenk. "[Her body] just took to the chemo."

In addition, Schenk said Jayna became part of an experimental study for chemotherapy medications that she thinks also helped. Jayna stay in remission, along with the four other rounds of treatment that doctors said were necessary to completely fight off Jayna's disease.

Schenk said that while some chemotherapy treatments allow patients to return home after the treatments, Jayna was required to stay in the hospital for several weeks, averaging about 60 days per treatment round.

It was during those days that Jayna developed a true passion for "Law and Order: SVU," a television program that features police detectives solving a new criminal case each episode.

Schenk said the doctors at Jayna's hospital recommended her to the Make-A-Wish Foundation, an organization that helps grant the wishes of children suffering from

Rooney and Oliver served as liaisons between the chapter and the family. said Schaeffer.

Schenk said the two women were very helpful in making sure Jayna got the exact wish she desired and constantly kept in contact with Schenk to check on Jayna's progress.

The women also reminded Schenk to talk to Jayna about what wish she would like to have granted.

"A lot of times, she was even too sick to think about it," said Schenk, "And other times she would write things down that she wanted."

Schenk said that Jayna was advised by the women to come up with a list of four wishes she would like to have granted, in order of importance to her. According to Schenk, fourth. on the list was to go on a cruise to anywhere; third was a shopping spree in New York City; second was to be able to shadow Comedy Central's "The Colbert Report" host Stephen Colbert; and first was to be able to meet the cast of "Law and Order: SVU.".

In mid-December, Jayna's No. 1 wish was granted when she and her mother were picked up at their home by limousine and brought to a hotel across from Giants Stadium to stay for the weekend in which they would meet the characters from the hit television program Jayna admireć most.

On the day her wish was carried out, Jayna and Schenk were picked up at the hotel and brought to the set in Fort Lee, N.J., where Jayna not only got to meet her favorite characters, but got to sit in the director's chair and call the shots for part of the day, share several meals with the characters, and at the end of the day, have her hair and makeup cone so that she could serve as an extra during one of the scenes in the episode "Snatched" that premiered on national television on Tuesday, Feb. 3.







Resident Joan Smith said the board did the right thing by keeping modified and freshmen sports.

"We'd like to thank the board for moving the modified cut to tier three," said Smith, after two middle school students handed in a petition with 500 signatures to keep modified.

Bethlehem is facing a \$2.2 million cut in state aid and had to try to close the budget gap on an almost \$90 million budget by reducing expenditures and increasing revenues.

Superintendent Michael Tebbano said many decisions facing the school are riding on the passage of a state budget that would restore some school funding.

"It all matters if the legislature can pass the budget... They're doing their thing, and we just have to be patient," he said of the state budget passing by Wednesday, April 1.

Tebbano said he received a letter from the governor's office stating that once the budget passes, money will be flowing to area school districts.

To make the budget's passage even more pressing, Tebbano said, the promised federal stimulus money can not come to Bethlehem until New York has passed its own budget.

Tebbano, who requested the board not increase his salary for the next two years, said the restoration of state aid through state budget restoration and federal stimulus money was "probable.'

Many of the suburban council schools, -including * Bethlehem and Guilderland, are not privy signatures are needed. to "title one" funding from the government, because Tebbano said, they considered "affluent districts."

Before the meeting began, the board had cut \$1.4 million from its budget, which had increased nearly \$5 million over last year's through contractual raises, cost-of-living increases, supply increases and other annual expenditure hikes. District officials have described the budget as a "rollover budget" from last year's.

By the meeting's end, the board's tentative budget reductions did not total more than \$1.8 million.

In a rare 5-to-2 split vote, the board voted to eliminate paying the fee associated with hockey, golf and bowling. Board members Diane Glacone Stever and Matt Downey voted against the cuts. District spokesman Matt Leon said the district would still supply everything else, such as uniforms, coaches and referees. However, those clubs will be responsible for raising the money for their respective fees to play. The district pays \$21,000 to rent the ice rink from the Capital District YMCA, which the board said is "the biggest check we write" for any single sports expenditure. Tebbano said the board would be drafting a "district fundraiser policy" to be presented at the next board of education meeting on April 22, which is when the board is expected to officially adopt its 2009-2010 budget proposal for voters to weigh in on in May.

ing to sit in on talks with the YMCA to see if some fundraising changes could be made because they do not allow 50/50 raffles and other types of common fundraising at the facility on Delaware Avenue.

President of the Hockey Boosters, Mike Cooper, said hockey players and their families understood the cuts and that fundraising would continue the program in Bethlehem.

"It's absolutely viable," he said. "We're very committed to this program and would like to see it continue, and we're going to do whatever we can to see that it does.'

Cooper said that when the school budget was voted down a couple of years ago, hockey was completely cut from the school, but the boosters club raised \$35,000 in about six months to save the program.

In another rare split vote, the board voted 4-to-3 against sending a third student to Tech Valley High School. Board President James Lytle, the longest-serving board member, Lynne Lenhardt and Downey were outvoted.

Bethlehem's two current Tech Valley students will remain in the program.

Lytle and Lenhardt's terms expired this school year. Lytle has announced he will not seek re-election in May, while Lenhardt said she would seek another three-year term.

The public will vote on the board seats during the Tuesday. May 19, budget vote at the Bethlehem High School. The two highest vote getters will win the seats. Interested residents can pick up a petition at the school district office, 90 Adams Place, Delmar.



sending additional students to Tech Valley, as well as giving English teachers a fifth course to teach and cutting the purchase of technology hardware.

Sanders said the district is facing "unknowns at a far greater level than we've ever seen before."

He said projected budget numbers include decreases in personnel, and contractual salary increases that account for \$311,000.

District Superintendent John McGuire said the "uniqueness" in developing the budget and the "unknowns" coming from state and federal government have made the process difficult.

"It's cruel and inhumane what the state of New York is doing," said board member Denise Eisele.

Fellow board member John P. Dornbush echoed her frustration in the face of government delays that have hindered the budget process.

We're doing the best we can here," said Dornbush. "I just want those out there in the audience to understand what we're up against here. We'll continue to struggle with this and fine tune this.'

Eisele said she supports a full -time social worker at Altamont Elementary.

"It's a good program. It's a necessary program," she said.

Other board members said the proposed budget unevenly favors the high school.

'My overall problem with the budget is equality of the levels,' said board member Colleen O'Connell.

She said the middle school is taking the brunt of the cuts, though not losing very many students, while the high school is taking too few cuts. O'Connell cited the science enrichment program as an example of a middle school initiative that should be kept intact.

'Something's got to give at the middle school," she said.

She added the high school's technology budget is "too rich," and said she wants to see results of Tech Valley before sending

another student.

Joe Laurenzo, chief technology specialist for the district, spoke on behalf of the need to continue to provide top-level hardware for students.

He said opposition has been voiced about increasing spending on technology at the expense of personnel, but he pointed out the importance of keeping the hardware up to date.

"It's not so much equipment [as] it is personnel tools," Laurenzo said.

He said buying new computers will save on repair costs and pay off in the long run.

Dornbush said he supports the technology spending.

"If you're not keeping up, you're falling behind," he said.

He said he also supports sending a third student to Tech Valley. A tuition decrease means sending three students will cost the same as two.

Barbara Fraterrigo warned that building in too many new programs with stimulus money is a bad idea, since that money will dry up in three years, while the programs will still be in place. That would put too much responsibility on the "backs of taxpayers," she said.

She said using money for programs that benefits the entire student body, rather than just the advanced students, is a good idea.

Board President Richard Weisz said it is unfortunate that the debate involves discussing figures that comprise such a small percent of the overall budget.


"It's sad the way the structure is ... so limited," he said. "It's just the nature of the beast."


He commented on the unfortunate state of the economy.





AAA's 'Great Battery Roundup' to be held on Earth Day, April 22.

AAA and its team of battery service professionals want the public's help in hunting down more than 5 million used, lead-acid, car, truck, boat and motorcycle batteries that haven't made their way back to their natural habitat: the recycling plant.

The car battery, a renewable source of vehicle power, contains lead that is 97 percent recyclable. Yet millions of these batteries never get a new chance at life because they've gotten lost in the shuffle. AAA Hudson Valley is on a mission to

educate the public on the potential dangers of keeping old lead acid batteries while also encouraging battery recycling.

Some old batteries are illegally disposed of in dumpsters, or kept in garages, yards or storage sheds. AAA wants to encourage more people to recycle them.

Each year more than 100 million automotive lead-acid batteries are sold in the United States. Currently, the price of lead is on the rise. Recycling can help keep the price of new batteries down since recycled lead costs less than newly-mined lead. The typical new lead acid battery contains 60 to 80 percent recycled lead and plastic, which saves money, energy,

and helps protect natural resources.

Leaking acid from old acid batteries can be harmful to children, pets and the environment. Wear gloves and safety glasses when handling batteries. Keep 1 them upright and place batteries in a sturdy box or plastic container while transporting to make sure they won't shift or tip over. Don't smoke near or expose batteries to an open flame. If the battery case is cracked or leaking, be sure to use a leakproof container.

"While AAA's recycling efforts keep millions of pounds of harmful lead, acid and plastic from landfills and waterways, the AAA Battery Service demonstrates our dedication to providing members the best automotive 1000, ext. 2617.

services available," said Jeff Seay, AAA Emergency Road Services field and program administrator. "Failed batteries account for millions of road service calls each year. Nationwide, AAA has resolved more than two million member vehicle breakdowns through the installation of a new battery with the mobile battery •service."

Doing its part to help save and protect the Earth yearround, AAA's program has collectively recycled more than 2 million batteries since 1997.





immense difficulty of his sport.

"There are like a million different motions in the pole vault that you have to learn. If you screw one of them up, the whole jump will fail," said Platel. "If you don't run down the runway correctly, you're not going to jump high; if you don't plant the pole correctly, you're not going to jump high; if you don't do any one of the small little aspects correctly, everything else is going to fail."

It took Platel some time to learn and perfect all of these parts of his vault.

"Everything you do in steps," he explains. "You don't just go out there and do everything 100 percent every single time. You have got to work on the individual little motions within the jump itself, or else it's not going to work out."

Although Platel's sport is one of the most difficult in the realm of track and field. Smith is certainly not lacking in the difficulty department. Besides being one of the best high jumpers in the state, Smith also does the pentathlon, which is made up of five events: 110-meter high hurdles, long jump, shot put, high jump and a 1,500-meter run.

"That's my bag of tricks, I think," said Smith "I think it's my favorite too, because it's the most fulfilling.'

But Smith's most fulfilling moment was one last year when he and Platel each won their events at states.

"We were walking by the awards table and they had these huge trophies, and they had tons of them. And I asked, 'Coach are those for every event?' He said, 'Yeah, they are.' And I said, 'Wow, it would be cool to get one of those big trophies," he said. "We were both doing one event each. I did the high jump and everything came together. The second place guy got out at 6 feet, and I was just jumping against myself. I kept going and kept going, and I hit my personal record at that time (6-6) and came home with one of those big trophies. And then I went over and watched Jake clear 14-6, and then he came home with one of those trophies. It was just a great day because you see how your hard work is coming along.'

Platel and Smith have one last outdoor track season to go through before they head off to college. Platel will be pole vaulting for Binghamton University, while Smith will compete for the University of Connecticut.
