Dems drop incumbent councilman

Bethlehem Democrats endorse one incumbent, newcomer for two council seats

The Bethlehem Democratic Committee made its picks for the 2009 elections as expected with one notable exception — Independence Councilman Sam Messina wasn't on the list.

The town's full committee voted on Tuesday, April 7, to endorse Supervisor Jack Cunningham, who is on the party's executive committee, for re-election, as well as Democratic Councilman Kyle Kotary who is running for a second term. The executive committee interviews potential candidates and then makes a recommendation for the full committee to vote on.

However, the party opted to endorse Bethlehem's new Independence Party Chairman Mark Jordan over Kotary's former run-

ning mate, Messina, whom Democrats cross endorsed for councilman in 2005. Jordan is chief of staff to Bethlehem Assemblyman Tim Gordon of the 108th District, the state's only Independence Party assemblyman and the party's former chairman. Gordon also started his political career as a Bethlehem councilman.

Jordan took over the reins as party chair from Gordon over the winter.

"This is my first time running for anything," Jordan said about his Democratic nomination. "I'm

very grateful to the Democratic town committee for putting their trust in me."

Messina said he is in "assessment mode," and that he has to think it over and then talk it over with family and friends before he makes a decision about running for re-election.

"I was not surprised, I was disappointed," said Messina about losing the endorsement. "For the last four years I did the best I could for the Town of Bethlehem."

G'land budget includes full-day K

Spending plan for '09-'10 over \$85M

After hours of deliberation and three separate votes on the full-day-K issue, the Guilderland School Board drafted a budget proposal that includes full-day Kindergarten.

Superintendent John McGuire brought a budget proposal to the Guilderland School Board of Education meeting on Tuesday, April 7, that did not include a full-day program, a topic that was debated numerous times at school board and citizen's budget advisory committee meetings.

The budget proposal passed 8-0, and represents an \$85,320,425 spending plan, a 1.79 percent increase in spending from this year's budget. If passed, it will result in approximately a 0.58 percent tax increase or \$11 on \$100,000 of assessed value after the STAR reduction (see related story, page 3), which would be the lowest in more than 15 years, according to information from the district.

Richard Weisz, the board's president, was the champion of the full-day-K program, and made his pitch to the board members, who initially seemed to favor holding off on the program until the economy gets better.

"Is there anybody who really believes the state will not mandate full-day Kindergarten for public schools?" Weisz asked. "I can't believe that our state is not going to come back in the next

three years and say you have to have full-day Kindergarten."

Weisz said a decrease in student population over the next few years will help the district save money, and ultimately help pay for full-day Kindergarten after stimulus money runs out.

He said there will be 65 fewer high school students next year and 70 the year after that.

"We want great kids and great families to move to Guilderland," he said. He said he was worried about a decrease in demand for Guilderland property if the district did not offer full-day Kindergarten, which would ultimately drive down property value and tax revenue.

Board member Barbara Fraterriago spoke out against full-day Kindergarten, and voiced concerns about the tax implications of the program after state and federal funding runs out.

"There's no way under the sun we can afford it," Fraterriago said.

"I'm flabbergasted at this sort of turnaround," she said. "The tax-payer is crying out, 'Give us time,'" she said.

She said waiting another year and seeing how the economy is doing then, is a better plan.

She said the program would get more expensive as it goes, since teachers' salaries will go up.

"We're just turning our backs on the people," she said.

Board member Catherine Barber came out against full-day Kindergarten during the debate.

"Overall I think this budget gives us what we need." She did


"We moved it back, we learned our lesson last year," Moshier said. "It was Little League opening day and second week of spring break and there were five other races, plus the weather factor."

G'land police arrest woman on robbery, assault charges

Guilderland Police arrested Ciara June Scudds, 22, of 17 4th St. in Waterford, on felony charges of robbery in the second degree and several other charges, on Thursday, March 26, according to police reports.

Scudds was arrested on charges of assault/ recklessly causing physical injury, petit larceny and conspiracy in the sixth degree, after allegedly planning to steal \$474 worth of clothes from JC Penney's at Crossgates Mall. Loss prevention officers attempted to apprehend her, but she resisted, repeatedly hitting one loss prevention officer in the face causing "laceration, pain, swelling and bruising." The officer said the defendant was able to get away with some property as a result of the altercation. She also allegedly admitted to hitting the loss prevention officer, and the conflict was recorded on tape, the report states.

More charges are expected to be filed after further investigation, and Scudds reappeared in court on Thursday, April 9.

Other arrests

• Guilderland Police arrested Quaneesha M. Andrades, 16, of 575 Myrtle Ave. in Albany on felony charges of criminal possession of stolen property, on Tuesday, April 7, according to police reports.

Andrades allegedly used a credit card at Best Buy in Crossgates Mall for \$707. The report states she said she found the credit card at Macy's. She then allegedly showed police the location of another credit card and cell phone in Best Buy she had from Macy's. All three items belonged to an unnamed shopper, who reported the card missing while at the mall, leading the credit card company to advise her of the location of its last use and the arrest.

She was arraigned later that night, the report states.



Welcome back, Bini

Westmere Elementary School greets a new principal for next year

Westmere Elementary School will be welcoming a new principal next year — Beth Bini, who said her roots have always been in Guilderland.

She was approved for the position at the Guilderland Board of Education's Tuesday, April 7, meeting.

Bini taught in Guilderland for 16 years at Altamont Elementary School before earning an administrative degree and accepting a position as assistant principal at Jefferson Elementary School in the Schalmont Central School District in Rotterdam.

"It's kind of a homecoming," Bini said. "It's very exciting."

Superintendent John McGuire said he is happy to have Bini on board.

"We are extremely pleased to welcome Beth back to the district," said McGuire in a written statement. "Her knowledge, leadership experience and enthusiastic commitment will be great assets to the students,

parents and staff of Westmere Elementary School and the greater school community."

Bini said she has gained valuable experience as a teacher in the district, and that will help her going forward.

Bini is a graduate of Geneseo State College, where she received a bachelor's degree in elementary education, and of the University at Albany, where she completed a master's degree in reading. She received her administrative certification from the Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts, according to information from the district.

She is a member of several professional organizations including the National Association for the Education of Young Children and the Capital District Association of Women Administrators, and serves as the policy council chairperson for Schenectady County Head Start, according to the district.

"I know a lot about the curriculum and know a lot about the program," she said of her experience in Guilderland.

She said the construction projects at the school, in addition to the chance that full-day kindergarten will be instated, will provide hard work on her and

her colleagues' part.

"There are initiatives under way that will make it challenging," Bini said.

She is said it will be a "very interesting summer," if full-day kindergarten passes. She said she will need to work with the other principals and personnel in the district to come up with staffing requirements, room layout and a curriculum plan.

She said it would be a challenge to "make it all happen in such a short time."

Bini said she is looking forward to working collaboratively with the staff at Westmere, and she is anxious to learn from the experienced teachers there as well.

"I want to go in there and listen and learn from the culture that's already there," she said.

She said retiring principal Deborah Drumm left a great legacy behind. Westmere Elementary School has won federal recognition as a Blue Ribbon school.

"There are big shoes to fill," Bini said.

Drumm retires at the end of this school year, and Bini begins administrative duties in July.

BC talks contracts, no board decisions made

The Bethlehem Board of Education held a two-hour executive session about "contractual issues" on Wednesday, April 8, but made no formal decisions.

Assistant Superintendent Jody Monroe told *The Spotlight* that the board of education did not act upon or take any action based on the executive session. Union contracts

have been the talk of the town, and now the state, as of late.

The district had re-opened contract negotiations last month with the Bethlehem Central Teachers Association while trying to make reductions in the school's spending plan.

Talks with the union did not result in any contractual changes or budget reductions. With "step increases," the BCTA gets a more than 5 percent raise as well as sabbaticals as a part of their contract with Bethlehem. The district's other two unions, an administrators union and a staff union, did not re-open their contracts.

A new contract with the BCTA will expire and be renegotiated next year.

With cuts in state aid and a declining economy, school districts

across the state are grappling with the financial crisis and reducing their spending. On the state level, Gov. David Paterson has announced significant reductions in the state's workforce because of what he has deemed a breakdown in negotiations with the public employee unions. The governor said layoffs were the only option left because union would not make concessions in their current contracts.

Bethlehem Board of Education President James Lytle said during a March meeting that the district could have made fewer reductions had the BCTA made concessions in its current contract.

Calls to the Bethlehem Central District regarding the executive session concerning contracts were not returned before publication.

State axes part of STAR program

Local officials: Cut has created confusion among homeowners

New York's new budget will not include a portion of the school tax relief or STAR rebate, an item that provides some relief on property taxes for homeowners, according to officials. Its elimination has led to some confusion.

Town officials have indicated the removal of one of the three portions of the program has caused some confusion among area residents.

The STAR program allows homeowners to receive a decreased assessment for their homes and an additional decrease for seniors, ultimately leading to less property tax. The previous three years of the program also included a rebate check, with the last two years of the program determining the rebate based on income.

That portion, the income-based rebate check, is what the state Legislature and Gov. David Paterson have eliminated.

"I think what it's done more than anything else is create some confusion," Guilderland Town Supervisor Ken Runion said.

Town of Bethlehem Supervisor Jack Cunningham echoed that sentiment.

"Our concern here was that residents were not aware what was happening ... and one of our main concerns was that some of our senior STAR recipients would not apply again this year."

Cunningham said Bethlehem called all of the former senior STAR recipients and told them to re-apply before the March 1 deadline so they would not lose out on the program, citing that it's a much-needed resource for local property tax payers on fixed incomes.

Cunningham said that on average, Bethlehem residents would lose a rebate check between \$300 and \$350.

Assemblyman Jack McEneny, D-Albany, said some legislators might consider introducing legislation to mitigate the losses to taxpayers, but that is "unrealistic" with the state of the economy. He added he has also received a number of phone calls voicing confusion over the program.

The portion of STAR still intact, the portion that lowers assessment value, has two parts; the basic program and the senior program for those over 65. The average savings in Albany County from basic STAR is \$560, and \$1,010 for seniors, according to Geoff Gloack, a spokesperson with

the state Office of Real Property Service.

Town of Colonie Assessor Ronald Monfils said there have been some cases of people calling the office to find out the details about the new STAR program, although it has not been overwhelming.

He said the town is doing everything in its power to inform people of the new law, and keep the town's budget as low as possible to help mitigate the loss to taxpayers.

Rebate checks ranged from \$313.13 for seniors to \$141.77 for those making between \$150,000 and \$250,000. Those making more than \$250,000 did not get a rebate.

Tom Bergin, a spokesperson for the state Department of Taxation and Finance, said in 2008, STAR rebate checks totaled \$1.19 billion statewide, and \$21.73 million in Albany County. There were 62,630 checks sent out in the county, according to Bergin — the average check in Albany County was \$346.98.

Runion said the rebate check was typically smaller than the amount saved from the lowered assessment, and its elimination has confused many people, who believe their assessments will no longer be lowered.

"People are still going to get that reduction in their assessment," he said.

He said many residents expressed to him that they did not understand whether or not the check was a tax rebate or related to federal stimulus money, which it is not.

People are also confused, Runion said, about where their property tax goes.

"They were not connecting it to the school district," he said.

Guilderland Town Board Member Warren Redlich said he has not heard many people complain about the removal of the STAR rebate check, but said some people might not have heard about it yet.

Redlich criticized the state, though, citing other items that could have helped to trim the budget.

"They have to figure out how to stop wasting money," Redlich said.

Guilderland Town Board Member Mark Grimm said it is a "shame" when taxpayers lose out on money, and said New York state has already seen its fair share of hits.

"We're overtaxed in New York. We're overtaxed as it is," he said.

I used to be astonished watching my husband read the newspaper. He reads the front page, and then he opens the paper and continues on to page 2. In our local daily paper, page 2 contains the latest dish on celebrities. How dare he find out the Hollywood gossip before learning about what's going on with the state Legislature!

I had a set order on weekdays, which most certainly didn't involve anything as whimsical as reading the pages in their printed order. Here's my old process, which I still follow to some extent: the front page, the state page, the editorial section and then the local and business stories. If there was time, usually

later at night, I might get to the comics.

My husband, on the other hand, would never "run out of time" for reading the comics, especially on Sundays.

It used to annoy me to watch my spouse take apart the Sunday paper. Like a kid, the first thing he went for was the comics section. I couldn't believe he was starting with the comics. Didn't he understand that the most important information is on the front page?

Turns out I was the one who didn't understand how important it is to read the funnies. I don't skip them anymore. I also make time for the Sunday sections on arts and books. And I often indulge in the advice columns. Sometimes I even read the blurbs about Madonna and/or Britney Spears.

Let's face it: the news sucks. In one week alone I read about economic ruin, mass murders, teen suicide, earthquakes and pirates.

I first heard the pirate story on the radio. And I guess I'm naïve, but I thought pirates existed only a long time ago and mainly just in stories like "Peter Pan" and "Pirates of the Caribbean." I pictured Captain Hook and eye patches. I envisioned men in bloomer pants jumping off swinging ropes onto a ship. The term swashbuckling came to

mind.

But this was a serious and sad story about pirates hijacking a vessel and taking the captain hostage.

I told my husband I didn't understand why the sailors were unarmed.

"It's not a military ship," he said.

"But there is a captain," I told him.

"All ships have a captain," he said.

"I'm confused," I said. "There are sailors who aren't in the Navy? There are boats out in the ocean that aren't military?"

He said, "Where do you think fish come from?"

"Fishermen," I said, picturing men with nets. "But it said the people on this vessel are sailors. And I read a news story about one of the guys being trained at Maritime Academy." It sounded military to me.

"An academy is a school," Jeff said.

"There are schools just to learn how to sail?"

"Apparently."

Then he said, "People are hired to ship goods."

"And other people try to steal the goods or take the crew hostage for ransom," I added.

So now I get it. Pirates are criminals who work at sea. If these people were on land, they'd just be called "thieves."

I also understand that people in the Navy might be sailors, but not all sailors are in the Navy.

And the title "captain" doesn't mean you are in the military. It might mean you are a sailor. Or it might mean you are a singer, like the captain from The Captain and Tennille.

Speaking of singers, a few weeks ago I was listening to the radio and heard an interview with singer John Mellencamp. He was talking about how his father, now 79, calls him up and says, "Did you do something for yourself today?" And when Mellencamp responds, "I worked today," his dad would remind him that every day he should do something fun.

At first, my cynical side kicked into gear. He tells his father he "worked today." What exactly was involved in his workday? He's a famous recording artist. He writes songs and plays music. That sounds like fun to me. Yet, I don't really know what John Mellencamp's life is like. I know he used to have a Cougar between his John and his Mellencamp. It's not there anymore. Removing the Cougar may not have been fun. And just because he's famous doesn't mean he's happy.

Regardless, I believe his dad's advice makes sense. I believe that dinner can wait. The front page of the newspaper can wait. The laundry can wait.

Make time to read the comics, eat some chocolate, play a game of cards with your kids, turn on some music and dance, take a walk around the block, and/or phone a friend to say hello.

Do something fun every day and encourage people you care about to do the same.

New zoning draft in New Scotland

Board member proposes an 85,000-square-foot size cap on retail buildings

Councilman Rich Reilly introduced a draft zoning law that would include an 85,000-square-foot size cap on buildings and favors commercial, rather than residential, buildings in the commercial zone. His law also includes a 250,000-square-foot cap on shopping centers.

Reilly introduced the draft at a Monday, April 6, special workshop meeting.

Reilly said his law is closer in composition to the New Scotland Planning Board's draft, which eliminated a 50,000-square-foot size cap on commercial buildings.

"I prefer some of the community impact analysis of their law," he said.

Planning Board Chair Robert Stapf said at a Thursday, Feb. 19, Planning Board workshop that "community sized" developments should be permitted, and those could be as large as 300,000 square feet of building area.

Reilly said traditional residential buildings are not included as a special use possibility in his draft, although mixed-use projects with a residential component would be permitted.

New Scotland Supervisor Tom Dolin said he continues to favor a draft zoning law with a 50,000 square-foot size cap, as proposed by Liz Kormos and Mike Naughton, members of the Commercial Zone Advisory Committee.

"It's a big-box law. It doesn't comply with the provisions of the Comprehensive Plan," Dolin said about Reilly's proposal.

Dolin said he doesn't think an 85,000-square-foot retail building could sustain itself at that location without a "regional draw."

He said the New Scotland Town Board is meeting on Wednesday, April 15, and has included Reilly's draft on its agenda.

Reilly said he is interested in the impact of a particular project, such as Sphere Development LLC's plan to bring a 137,000-square-foot retail anchor to the corner of Routes 85 and 85A, rather than broad facts and figures about hypothetical projects.

"We should base our decisions with real data about a real project," he said.

He said the costs; tax implications and feasibility of the project surviving are important to him.

Reilly said the 85,000-square-foot retail building cap, and 250,000-square-foot shopping center cap, come in under what is generally considered "regionally" drawing entities.

He said a typical Wal-Mart is about 90,000 square feet, and a regionally drawing shopping center is about 300,000 — although "regionally drawing"

is a debated definition.

Regionally drawing retail buildings are prohibited by the town's comprehensive plan.

Reilly said Peg Neri, another board member, has made some suggestions about his draft, and those could be included before the April 15 meeting. If that is that case, Reilly said he is hopeful that "something should get referred out of that meeting."

A draft of the law must go before the New Scotland Town Planning Board and the Albany County Planning Board, and a public hearing must be scheduled to discuss the law before it can be adopted.

Reilly said if the law goes out to the Planning Board and county quickly, a public hearing could be scheduled for June.

Dolin said he would vote in favor of sending Reilly's draft to the county and town planning boards and holding a public hearing on the law, even though he does not agree with its provisions.

"Ultimately, we're just trying to come up with a good balance," Reilly said.

Let's be independent together

Local Independents appear to be anything but.

In Bethlehem, the town's Democratic Committee endorsed two incumbent Democrats for the positions of supervisor and councilperson. It should — it's a show of party loyalty, and the two incumbents have, for the most part, served the party well. The party then chose, however, not to support incumbent Independence Party councilmember Sam Messina, who garnered its nomination the last time around.

That particular candidate was deemed too much of a rabble-rouser for the Democrat majority, so it decided to go with another candidate. That's their prerogative, and we at *The Spotlight* see nothing wrong with it.

The problem lies with the Independence Party's willingness to lie down and offer up another candidate: newly minted Independence Party Chair Mark Jordan, who, we're willing to bet, will have his own backing in the race for a town council seat. Instead of going for a majority on the board by backing Messina, Jordan is content to slate only two candidates and let the Dems retain their majority.

It all hardly seems very...well, independent.

The Independence Party is designed to draw independent voters by nominating independent candidates. It is the only party in New York that allows non-affiliated voters to vote in its primary elections. In 2006, the Independence Party had its first member elected to the Legislature with the election to the state Assembly of Timothy Gordon, who also ran with the Democratic endorsement.

In too many instances, the Independence Party — the party for people too unhappy to subscribe to the major parties — is too closely linked to the two big political parties.

And it's not just in Albany County. Last November, in Saratoga County, hours after her husband lost a bid for a seat on the state Democratic committee, Ballston Supervisor Patti Southworth left the Dems to become an Independent. While Southworth had the support of the Independence Party throughout her political career, making her move somewhat logical, the Independence Party would do well to elevate itself above its status as a place where local big-party committees can draw talent, or a place where disgruntled candidates go to spite their Republican or Democratic committee members.

The Spotlight's view is this: The use of the local Independence Party as a farm team from which the two-party system draws candidates it agrees with makes the party about as autonomous as a remora — it could do well enough on its own, but it chooses to latch on to whatever large political shark the current sends its way.

Now is time to show you care

Last week, there were several news stories — local and national — about the increasing need for caregivers. The reports described the rapidly increasing need for formal caregiving — aides, assistants and para-professional helpers for our aging population. The need is growing quickly because of the confluence of several factors: more people and more older people.

As a state and as a community, we are in the middle of a huge demographic boom and we are seeing what will, in the next few years, be a doubling and then tripling of people over age 60. The increased number of folks in the "senior" or "elder" category will also be living longer. Information from the U.S. Bureau of the Census and the National Center for Health Statistics tells us that those who live to age 65 can expect another 18.7 years. So there are more of us who can expect to live longer and who will want to remain in our homes and outside of institutional care. On top of this, we will survive illnesses that people died of five, 10 and 20 years ago. Diseases that were once certain killers have now become — thanks to the interventions of science and better health care — chronic illnesses and long-term, treatable conditions.

The complicating factor in all of this is that there are fewer formal caregivers (nurses, licensed home health care workers), so the demand is increasing as the supply drops. Why does this matter to you and to us at Community Caregivers? First, we saw it coming. Because we have been helping people to remain independent for more than 15 years, we have seen

and have been able to anticipate these changes: folks being cared for at home who once would certainly have been in hospitals or institutional care; the harder role for family caregivers — two aging spouses caring for each other, often with each of them struggling with multiple chronic conditions; adult children pressed to the limit by caring for both older and younger family members at the same time; and now, this year, the added burden of changes to the economy.

Two years ago at Community Caregivers, we began to change the way we do business by developing workshops and training programs to educate and support family caregivers. Knowing that direct services are limited and that for most families the needs are so great, we decided to add caregiver support to our menu of services. We have workshops on caring for the caregiver and writing workshops that teach stress relief and provide strategies to reduce and manage pain. We also teach caregivers how to use writing to support the people they are caring for, and we offer health and disease-specific education and presentations that offer guidance on legal and financial matters, all of which affect caregivers and families. This year, we began services to families who have a loved one with dementia: support group, education programs and respite for caregivers.

These changes in aging and healthcare intersect with caregiving most dramatically in the workplace. The current economy is impacting tolerance for family caregivers at work. The adult son or daughter who could come in late or leave early to care for an aging parent or accompany him to a doctor's

appointment can't risk that now. The employer who once was able to allow shorter hours or flexible schedules can't do that. The burden falls to families, and when they try to meet their needs with paid caregivers, it's a shock. We anticipated these changes as well and began, more than a year ago, to offer workshops for employers and human resource departments to help them plan for the caregiver needs of their employees.

As a not-for-profit organization, supported primarily by donations and grants, we are acutely aware of these changes and their impact. While many of our services are delivered by volunteers, all of our programs are developed and managed by paid staff. We have a stunningly small budget of \$300,000 and a very low administrative ratio, but those financial realities are what allow us to help so many people so capably. Rates for home health aide services range from \$15 to \$25 per hour for the most basic services like a ride or a companion. That was tough even when the economy was good. Now, for all of us, the cost per service is a critical issue.

We need your help. We are asking members of our community, including the people we serve and their families, to be generous with support this year. We are also asking the greater community — those of you who admire our work and who appreciate that what we do makes life better for everyone — to help us. Truly a neighbor's independence, and someday your own, depends on your generosity now. You can respond to our appeals, send a contribution, ask your groups and teams and faith community to support us and please invite us to come and talk with you about these needs and how you can be part of building a caring community now and for the future.

After all, it is not just Guilderland residents who are inconvenienced by the flooding, as Mr. Runion pointed out when he put forth his request at the March 16 McKownville Improvement Association neighborhood meeting at the Holiday Inn Express.

We hope others will join us in this effort. Thank you.



Town officials moving forward on noise ordinance

Bethlehem board listens to draft of law that could set decibel levels and hours

Town officials are moving forward on a new noise law proposal in Bethlehem.

Councilman Sam Messina gave a final presentation to the Town Board on Wednesday, April 8, stating a final draft of a town-wide noise ordinance was completed.

Commissioned in September of 2007, a Noise Ordinance Task Force was headed by Messina and later expanded to include Councilman Mark Hennessey and other community members.

They recommended to the Town Board that Bethlehem go forward and create a new local noise law last year.

The Noise Ordinance Task Force also included community representatives Jennifer DeFranco and Robert Jasinski; Bethlehem Deputy Police Chief Tim Beebe; and Gil Boucher, the town's code enforcer.

During a well-attended public hearing in 2008, the majority of residents spoke overwhelmingly in favor of the noise ordinance. A vocal minority did speak out, saying a noise law would be overly regulative and could be used to harass neighbors if not drafted properly.

Messina also pointed out that out of 40 e-mails the town

received about a possible noise law, only two were against the ordinance.

"Almost all of those were supportive of the noise ordinance," Messina said at the time. "My feeling is that there is nothing left to do but to recommend this to the Town Board."

The town board and the task force seemed pleased with the drafted ordinance but said there is still much work to be done.

"This is a very detailed statute that's been drafted," Messina said to the board. "First let me express my personal and professional appreciation to all of the task force members that have participated in this, it was a grueling process at times that was certainly long, over 18 months, but I am very pleased with the product the town board has received."

The task force took a three-pronged approach to the proposed noise law.

"The town board has received three documents [including] a memorandum which laid out the whole process, as well as our methodology and what our results and recommendations are regarding the noise ordinance," Messina said. "The second piece was the ordinance itself and the third was different

areas of considerations because there's a couple different routes the board can go with this."

Hennessey said it was a learning process all around.

"It was an interesting process, I was on the task force for about six months," Hennessey said. "What was really great were the perspectives that you got from people that may be different from the one that you experienced ... it helps broaden your perspective."

Jasinski said task force members learned to get along and work together for the benefit of the town.

"I'd like to thank all of the members of the task force, we didn't start out being real 'buddy-buddy' to begin with. We had many arguments over the course of 18 months," Jasinski said. "I want to especially thank Sam, he did so much sending e-mails, drafting the drafts, doing everything. The time he put into it, I just shake my head."

He said Bethlehem now has the tools to move forward to the next step.

"My address to the town board is this," Jasinski said, "we've given you a tool box with tools in it. Now, you can use some of these tools, use them all, or you can just throw them all away. That is up to you."

DeFranco agreed with Jasinski.

"This has been my first experience ever with government," DeFranco said, to which Supervisor Jack Cunningham jokingly interjected, "...and you're still smiling."

After a brief chuckle around the room, DeFranco continued and said her experience has been a good one and that, "I hope we can follow this through to make a really great noise ordinance in the town and I really feel that it would improve the quality of life in town."

She encouraged the town to create public workshops to gather feedback from local residents.

Noise control has become a recent hot button issue in town after it was highlighted during a recent town meeting. Local developer Steve Bolduc of Keystone Builders and the planning board held a lengthy debate about one of his projects on, Tuesday, March 17 after a board member suggested he cut down on his work hours.

Aside from the curtailed demolition hours for the new CVS Pharmacy in Elmsmere, town staff and board members could not recall a recent project having its work hours reduced.

Without a noise law on the books, there is little the town can do in terms of enforcement when it comes to noise complaints by neighbors.

Deputy Chief Beebe and Cunningham also thanked Messina and the rest of the task force for their efforts and said they will continue to work together as the project moves forward.

"The level of expertise that we were able to come up with in this community, I'm truly impressed with the citizens who did step forward and helped with this project and help with other projects," Beebe said.

Cunningham said the draft ordinance would be an important tool to creating a new town law.

"Sometimes government work is a thankless job and you really took on a thankless task," said Cunningham. "It's very valuable to community to have participation like this. ... We're not going to throw the tool box away, I don't know what we're going to end up building, but it's not going to get thrown away, I can promise you that."

Hearing scheduled on tax exemption

Home and business improvements could benefit from graduated assessment increases

A series of public hearings have been set for Tuesday, May 5, to discuss a measure that would provide property tax exemptions for construction improvements.

Under the proposal, property owners who make improvements on their homes, commercial buildings or historic barns would receive a graduated increase in property assessments, rather than doing it in one lump sum, said Town Supervisor Ken Runion.

This would spread out the property tax increases over time.

Runion proposed two exemptions, for historic barns and residential buildings, and Town Board member Warren Redlich added a third motion for commercial buildings.

"As long as we're doing that, let's do it," Redlich said.

The motion to bring the exemptions to a public hearing passed unanimously.

"It encourages people to improve their homes," Runion said.

The measure would graduate assessment increases for residential buildings over eight years, adding 12.5 percent of the cost of the improvement each year.

The second measure would allow improvements on historic barns to graduate improvements over the course of 10 years.

Redlich said commercial improvements would be limited to \$80,000 to receive the exemptions, and commercial buildings would be limited to \$50,000, with half of those improvements qualifying for the benefit.

The hope is that allowing

homeowners to ease into the higher taxes will increase spending on improvements and boost the economy, officials said.

Runion said that the construction industry, one that has been hit particularly hard by the sluggish economy, would benefit from the proposal.

Runion also said that many people are looking to make improvements on their homes, rather than buy new ones, again as a result of the slumping economy. Those people, he said, would benefit from the measure if it passes.

Redlich said it is hard to know if people will make improvements because of the exemption, although the state Legislature has indicated it supports such exemptions.

He pointed out that property values also affect the amount paid in school taxes, and if the district followed the town's lead on phasing in assessment increases, it could be a significant incentive for homeowners to make improvements.

"What we really need is for the school district to follow up," Redlich said.

He said if the town saved a homeowner \$1,000 over eight years, the school district can save him \$10,000.

If the measure passes, it will be up to the town's property assessor, John Macejka, to determine the value added to the property from the improvements. He said the two primary factors in determining home improvement value are the market the house is in and the cost of construction.

He said many exemptions have merit, while some do not, but his place is in assessing the value of the improvements, and not passing judgment.

"I don't have an opinion one way or the other. They're exemptions and they're there," he said.

Sales associate suspected of theft

State troopers arrest press service employee

A sales associate working with the New York Press Service, a wing of the New York Press Association, was arrested on felony charges of grand larceny and falsifying business records on Thursday, April 9, according to information provided by the Albany County District Attorney's Office.

Elizabeth Marzilli, 56, of Waterford, was charged with grand larceny in the second degree and falsifying business records in the first degree, District Attorney David Soares announced.

NYPA is a trade organization for weekly, small daily and culturally specific papers. NYPS is a subdivision dedicated to advertising.

"It's a very sorry end to the employment of a long-time employee here," said NYPA Executive Director Michelle Rea. "She was a good worker. She worked very hard."

Marzilli had been with NYPS for 16 years, Rea said.

She added she was glad that the only victim was NYPS, and none of its advertising clients was compromised.

Marzilli worked as a classified sales associate for NYPA, located at 1681 Western Ave. in Guiderland and "allegedly made false entries into the business records of the association after submitting two invoices to customers, one for the New York Press Association and another for New York National Advertising.

The second organization, a private company owned by Marzilli and her husband, John, is suspected of diverting business from the New York Press Association by accepting the remaining balance of the charged advertising fees, estimated at \$400,000," according to Soares' office.

Rea said the amount probably exceeds \$400,000, and she suspects Marzilli of foul play since 2000. However, the statute of limitations is five years, and the \$400,000 figure is generated based on revenue generated since 2003.

State Police made the arrest, and Rea commended them on their investigation.

Marzilli could face between five to 15 years if convicted.

"This was a painful ordeal," Rea said.

Web company starts grant program

An Albany based technology company is launching a grant program to area non-profit organizations. The company, iZoca, is a community based networking Web site.

"To encourage local and regional non-profits to drive their staff, members and stakeholders to utilize iZoca, CEO Jeff Goronkin has developed a grant program to provide monetary assistance to

help these organizations meet their daily service needs and goals," according to iZoca.

Groups that achieve 100 members receive \$500 and groups that get 200 members receive \$1,000.

The company is planning to fund at least 10 organizations with \$10,000 in grants. They must service the Capital District and have at least 100 volunteers,

according to iZoca.

"Instead of spending our marketing budget on more conventional, and arguably, frivolous items such as T-shirts and pens, we wanted to set up a program that can really make a difference for our Capital Region community," Goronkin said.

Susan Bardack, a representative of iZoca said Big Brothers and Sisters of the Capital Region participated in the grant application process on Friday, April 10, and have gained 78 members as of Monday, April 13.

The Empire State Youth Orchestra have 170 members, and other organizations, such as the Make A Wish Foundation and Blue Star Mothers, a support group for families with loved-ones overseas, also expressed interest in the grant program, Bardack said.

multidisciplinary, educational organization specializing in therapeutic recreation-related services for individuals with disabilities. She said some disabled vets approached her about participating in the event.

"We thought it would be a nice tribute to their service," Moshier said about the disabled vets. "We just started opening the forms yesterday ... and one was just a random local veteran so that's exciting that we can offer this to them."

The event has grown each year and organizers are hoping for another successful run.

The run/walk honors Moshier, who died while serving in Iraq on April 1, 2006, when the Apache helicopter he was flying was shot down. He was a Bethlehem graduate and the father of a newborn daughter. Katie Moshier has been on hand to help to organize the event each year and watches their daughter Natalie run in the Tot-Trot portion of the race.

"She going to be four, she's going to be bumped up into the next category soon," Moshier joked.

The event includes a kid's race for five to 11 year olds and a "Tot Trot" for kids under five to run 26.2 yards, which like the kid's race is a free event. Registration for the run/walk costs \$15 and can be found at www.timothy-moshier.com, at Re/Max Premier in Delaware Plaza in Delmar, or at the Jonesville Store in Jonesville.

Packet pickup will be on Friday, May 1, at Bethlehem Town Hall in Delmar from 5 to 7 p.m. Race day registration and packet pickup will begin at 7 a.m., Saturday, May 2, at the Bethlehem Middle School on Kenwood Avenue where the race will begin. it organization to continue Tim Moshier's commitment to service by supporting the Fisher House and establishing a scholarship in his memory at Bethlehem Central High School. During the past three years, nearly \$40,000 dollars has been donated to the organization.

not support full-day Kindergarten.

"It's not the year for it," she said.

O'Connell also advocated for full-day Kindergarten, and even after an initial 4-4 vote was taken indicating the amendment would not make it in final proposal, she asked for another count.

"I believe we are really missing an opportunity for aid," O'Connell said.

John Dornbush, vice-president of the board, was the swing vote for the full-day Kindergarten issue.

"I can't support full-day Kindergarten...I don't think we can afford it," Dornbush said initially.

Dornbush later changed his mind, indicating he would support full-day Kindergarten after hearing arguments made by Weisz. He then changed his mind again, indicating the program would be too expensive after hearing arguments from Frateriggo. He ultimately voted in favor of including the program, swinging the tally to 5-3 in favor.

One area Dornbush was sure on was his feelings toward technology.

"I support math, science and technology. That's where the jobs are going to be," Dornbush said. Project Lead the Way and sending students to Tech Valley are two initiatives he supports.

Nicole DiGrado, a student at Tech Valley, told the board how much she enjoys her being a student there.

DiGrado, one of the two students attending Tech Valley from the Guilderland School District, said she "loves" the experience, and invited each member of the board to visit the school to see its hands-on approach in action.

"Many politicians have supported the program, such as Sens. [Kirsten] Gillibrand and

[Charles] Schumer."

Thomas Henderson also spoke on its behalf. His daughter has been accepted to Tech Valley, and is excited to attend. "She'll be devastated if she can't attend. For you it's only one student — for her it's her future."

Tuition for Tech Valley High School, a hands-on alternative to traditional high-school, was ultimately included.

Weisz also addressed a number of potential issues the district will need to deal with in the future.

He said eventually the district will have to deal with the number of employees it houses, as student attendance is slated to decline over the next several years.

"We have to change the number of people delivering services," he said.

He said the school district has 212 teacher's assistants, more than twice the next highest district.

"I have no idea why that is," Weisz said. He said he was interested in learning more about how to efficiently use the teaching assistants the district has.

The board debated a series of budget amendments, dealing with teaching assistants, social workers, nurses, professional services and technology. Questions about the district's responsibility to the private schools in the district, St. Madeleine Sophie School and Christ the King School as mandated by state law, were raised.

"It's so critically important to have these people on staff," Frateriggo said of school nurses. "For the health and safety of the kids," she said.

Tom Hosey, a parent in the district, said he supports a full-time nurse, specifically because his son has allergies that could need immediate attention.

"Cutting a number may make sense mathematically to the budget equation, but eliminating the service makes no sense," he said.

The two schools combined will feature one full-time equivalent, which the board said fulfills its responsibility.

"You really have to distinguish between wants and need here," said board member Colleen O'Connell in opposition.

"The focus has to be on what is our legal obligation."

A vote to include an amendment for the nurse failed 2-to-6.

Board member Judy Slack spoke in favor of keeping additional teaching assistants, which at the time of discussion, were slated for second-grade, although, the final proposal allows them to be allocated at the discretion of the principals.

"If we cut the second-grade TA's, we've made a major program change. We need to work through a committee...so people would not be blind-sighted," Slack said. "I'm not sure that's the right thing to have done."

She supported an additional FTE at the middle school, citing the importance of eight-grade academics for students hoping to advance to college.

By the end of the meeting, the only amendments to pass, were the \$32,000 in cuts for professional development, \$32,000 in cuts for the technology budget, and the addition of \$64,000 for one FTE in Farnsworth Middle School for the Atlas program, and full-day Kindergarten.

A total of five full-time positions were restored from 27 proposed teaching assistant cuts discussed before stimulus aid was introduced.

Weisz commended those involved in the budget process. "I wish that every government agency is as open and transparent as we were," Weisz said.

Superintendent John McGuire thanked everyone involved with the budget process for their hard work.

"I am extremely appreciative and impressed with respect to the efforts of everyone involved in this year's budget process," said McGuire. "Our staff, Citizens' Budget Advisory Committee and Board of Education have worked diligently to meet the goal of maintaining an excellent Guilderland education for our students in a manner that is accountable to our supportive community taxpayers."

"As a whole, this budget was beaten with a lot of sweat and blood," said member Denise Eisele said.

The public will vote on the final budget proposal on May 19.

Back to black: How to work your way back from personal bankruptcy

In 2008, nearly 1.1 million Americans filed for bankruptcy. Given the housing crisis, rising unemployment and instability in the markets, the fact that more and more people are drowning in debt shouldn't surprise anyone. It's a byproduct of the tough economic times in which we live.

So what, really, is bankruptcy, and what does it mean for those who file for it?

Essentially, bankruptcy is the bottom of the financial well—the point at which an individual or business can no longer meet their debt obligations and thereby initiates a legal proceeding to get a fresh financial start.

However, bankruptcy is not truly a fresh financial start. Depending on the type of bankruptcy you file for (see sidebar for the differences between

Chapter 7 and Chapter 13 bankruptcies), you are still going to have financial obligations. Child support and spousal obligations will not be excused, nor will secured loans, such as mortgages, and student loans. Also, due to the more stringent regulations that were put in place through the Bankruptcy Abuse Prevention and Consumer Protection Act of 2005, discharging your full debt may not even be an option. You may be placed on a repayment plan. Not to mention that bankruptcy is the absolute worst mark you can have against you on your credit report—and it can stick for up to 10 years.

The message is this: if you can avoid filing for bankruptcy, it is generally in your best interest to do so. That said, this article is about rebuilding your financial life after filing for bankruptcy. It's hard, but it can be done.

Bankruptcy does not stay with you forever

For many people, bankruptcy is a personally defeating experience. Because of its nature, it is always entered into under financial duress, and it is often accompanied by feelings of failure and disappointment. The result is that it is often an emotionally scarring process.

The good news, though, is that bankruptcy does not stay with you forever. In fact, it may actually be

easier to pick up the pieces and start over again than you think. You just need to be realistic about identifying the obstacles that you face and have a plan for overcoming them.

Obviously, the greatest obstacle you face after filing for bankruptcy is securing a loan or line of credit. It's very difficult, especially in today's economic climate, but it is possible

and essential to achieving long-term financial freedom. Just be prepared for high interest rates, low available balances and annual fees, and do your homework. Don't jump at the first credit offer you get just because you are desperate for credit. Other opportunities will be available to you. So go online and do some research. You might be surprised by the options available to you, from prepaid cards to high deposit, low balance cards. And don't be scared to use it. Because the best way to be more credit worthy is to start small, be responsible and prove that you are credit worthy.

Also, just because you went through a bankruptcy and it can stay on your record for 10 years doesn't mean you won't be able to finance a major purchase. Studies show that many people who have qualified for bankruptcy are able to secure a mortgage for a house within 18 to 24 months. Again, rates will likely be higher and lenders will require a larger down payment, but it is another step toward building a positive credit history. Eventually, if you continue to make timely payments and keep your debt to a minimum, you will be able to refinance your home at much more favorable rates.

The key is to be patient. Understand that your number one goal following a bankruptcy should be to save money—not spend it. And be careful. While you can expect to have to pay higher interest rates for your loans and/or lines of credit, don't let anyone take advantage of you. Remember the golden rule: if it's too good to be true, it probably is.

Bankruptcy is the result of a series of actions... and inaction

It is easy to look at debt as a "thing," a monster that enters our lives then consumes us. The reality is that debt is an action. More specifically, debt is the result of a series of our own actions—how we spend our money. Inaction, the inability to pay for what we spend, is what leads to bankruptcy.

So to truly recover from bankruptcy it is critical to take a long, hard look in the mirror and ask: what are the series of actions that led to me getting into debt? Because regardless of circumstances, it is important that you assume responsibility for your bankruptcy, then correct the financial behavior that led to it. Most likely, that

The Differences between Chapter 7 and Chapter 13*

The two most common types of personal bankruptcy are Chapter 7 and Chapter 13. Both must be filed for in Federal Bankruptcy Court.

Chapter 7 is also known as liquidation bankruptcy. It discharges your debt to any creditors of nonsecured loans. In exchange, the bankruptcy trustee can take any of your property that is not exempt for collection.

Chapter 13 is known as wage-earners bankruptcy. It does not require complete liquidation of your nonexempt assets. Instead, the court determines a repayment schedule for your debt based upon your circumstances. The amount you will have to pay is dependent on your earnings, type of debt, debt amount and the property you own.

*Before filing for bankruptcy, or even if you are considering bankruptcy, you should consult with either a bankruptcy attorney, credit counselor or your banker.

means major changes, including:


1. Spending less.
2. Creating and sticking to a budget.
3. Saving money for "rainy days."
4. Forgoing or selling any remaining any high-cost assets.
5. Setting realistic, long-term goals.

Sure, it sounds easy and obvious. It's near universal for people to say: "I'm not going to get myself into a mess like this again," but changing behaviors, attitudes and values, even when it comes to money, is more difficult than most people imagine.

However, the payoff is worth it. Because the sooner you learn to set and achieve financial goals, the sooner you can gain control of your financial future—even if that financial future has an ugly bankruptcy in its past.

Breast augmentation myths Invest in your breasts for a beautiful return

"Because there are things women need to know about breast implants and breast augmentation"

• **MYTH 1: "Everyone will know that I have breast implants."**

Most implants that are obvious to the casual observer are due to avoidable problems: The implants are placed too high, are inappropriately in front of the chest muscle, or are too large for the chest. A carefully planned and performed breast enhancement can give most patients a very lovely, natural appearing result. Be sure to choose a board certified plastic surgeon experienced in breast enhancement who will consider your desires while taking into account your height, weight and your natural breast size, shape and symmetry. Choosing an appropriate implant shape and size and positioning it correctly are keys to achieving a natural-looking result. Often, lifting

your nipple and areola slightly to better position them on the breast mound can greatly enhance your result.

• **MYTH 2: "Implants must be replaced every five to 10 years."**

Implants do not need to be replaced unless a problem occurs. Many patients have had implants for 20 or more years that continue to be soft and natural looking. With the gel and saline-filled implants currently used to enlarge breasts, the most common problem is leakage. The 20-year leak rate with saline implants should be about 20 percent extrapolating from data provided to us from the implant manufacturers. But my patients have experienced a less than 1 percent leak rate in the past 15 years. I have seen patients who have had blunt trauma to their chest from many causes who, while having temporary breast swelling and bruising, never leaked. While implant deflation is not dangerous, the failed implant must be promptly removed and replaced. Interestingly,

the most common cause for implant removal and exchange is the patient's desire to have larger implants. The most common cause for reoperation in my practice is asymmetric implant positioning, not leakage.

• **MYTH 3: "I will have to change my lifestyle or activities."**

Prior to surgery, we provide detailed guidelines concerning the time needed off from work, and how soon you may expect to resume your particular sports and hobbies. Once healed you may resume all of your usual activities. Ultimately, you can scuba dive, mountain climb, parachute jump, kick box or anything else that you might desire without worrying about your implants. Breast implant placement may slow times in competitive swimming.

• **MYTH 4: "A large enough implant will correct 'droopy' breasts."**

If you have droopy breasts, that is, if your nipples are at or below the bottom of your breasts when you

are standing, implants alone will not correct the problem. Implants will increase the size of your breasts, but the nipples will still be too low. You will need a lift procedure along with your breast augmentation to achieve a well-shaped breast. The type of lift needed will depend on the amount of drooping present. Your plastic surgeon will discuss the various options with you. Patients who are satisfied with the size of their breasts, but have lost shape due to pregnancy or weight loss, will find that a lift alone will solve their problem.

• **MYTH 5: "Implants feel unnaturally firm."**

While augmented breasts will never feel as completely soft as most natural breasts, breast implants are a very good substitute. Gel implants may feel softer than saline-filled styles. The key is to prevent, as much as possible, the building up of scar tissue around the implant. While no one has a magic formula to prevent this entirely, there are

things that can be done to reduce the chances of having significant thick scar tissue. There are some scientific studies showing that textured surface implants are less likely to develop thick scar capsules than smooth wall implants. All implants are prone to "rippling" which will be felt when you examine your breasts. Placing the implants under the chest muscle helps to keep them feeling soft, and minimizes visible rippling. Using implants that are not too large and fit comfortably on the chest wall are other factors affecting firmness.





Lives in Pictures

Children's Book Festival lets kids interact with authors and illustrators

Dan Mahoney was frustrated. He wanted to turn his passion for art into a career, but he couldn't find any takers for the comic strip he'd drawn. He'd sent his portfolio to publishers, but it hadn't landed him any work.

So Mahoney decided to drive from Albany to New York City to hand deliver his portfolio to a publisher. As long as he was there, he thought, he'd leave a copy with a second publisher, too.

When he went back to the second publisher later in the day, Mahoney expected to find the typical "Nice work, here are a few things you could improve" note attached to his portfolio. Instead, he landed his first job.

"They said, 'We really love your work, and there's one picture we thought could be a story,'" Mahoney remembered.

That story turned into Mahoney's first book, "The Saturday Escape." He hasn't looked back since that big break, publishing two more of his own books, il-

lustrating others and creating artwork for clients such as Scholastic and Weekly Reader Magazine.

Mahoney also makes a number of school visits each year, reading to kids and showing them the work that goes into putting a book together. It was during one of those visits, to the Albany Acad-

emies, that he suggested putting together an event where kids could come and meet authors from around the region. Mahoney had been to a similar festival in Rochester and liked the idea of holding one in Albany – a city that "never really does anything like this," he said.

It does now. On Friday, April 17, as the culmination of Na-

tional Library Week, the Albany Academies will host a Children's Book Festival from 3 to 7 p.m. More than 15 children's books authors will be on hand to talk to kids, sign books and do demonstrations. Admission is free – the authors all said they were happy to donate their time.

"For me, it's a fun thing," said Sylvie Kantorovitz, an Albany-based author and illustrator. "You get to meet with the world instead of being stuck in the studio all day."

Mahoney, an Albany native, is particularly excited because he never had the chance to meet any authors himself when he was a kid. Not that that stopped him from aspiring to be published himself – he still has a folder full of comic books he created when he was younger.

"I've just always loved to draw," he said.

The same is true of Kantorovitz, who spent a year teaching in her native France before deciding to try to make it as a children's book illustrator and author. Like Mahoney, she landed a big break after taking her portfolio to Manhattan and showing it around. A publisher wanted her to illustrate "The Wheels on the Bus," a song book by well-known children's musician Raffi.

It's common for a publisher to pair a relatively new and unknown illustrator with a high-profile writer, Kantorovitz explained. That's because they can save a few bucks on the illustrator while paying the star the big money.

Not that Kantorovitz was complaining. She was thrilled for the chance to actually make money through her art.

More illustrating gigs followed, and then Kantorovitz had a daughter, Sosha. As Kantorovitz regaled her daughter with stories, she decided to try to have a book of her own published. In 2004, that dream was realized when Kantorovitz's "I Love You, Mister Bear" was printed.

"It's based on my daughter," she said. "We used to go to yard

festival from her home outside of Boston, said she likes to write about kids resolving issues. The book she just had published, "What Can You Do With an Old Red Shoe?" tackles recycling. It offers about a dozen projects kids can try to recycle everyday items, like turning a ripped shower curtain into an apron.

Creativity has been a hallmark of Alter's life. Both her parents were artists, and they always supported her pursuit of the arts, which took her to the Rhode Island School of Design.

"I was lucky they didn't ask any of those questions about how I was going to make a living," she said.

She hopes that she can offer similar inspiration at events like the Children's Book Festival, knowing not everyone grows up with parents as encouraging as hers.

Organizers said they aren't sure just how many kids the event will draw.

"We could have 200, we could have 1,000," said Ann Wendth, the academies' director of external affairs – but if the turnout is good, they'd like to turn this into an annual event.

Mahoney has high hopes, noting that they thought they'd be lucky to get just a few authors.

"I never thought it would turn out like this," he said.

The Children's Book Festival is Friday, April 17, from 3 to 7 p.m. on the West Campus of the Albany Academies, 135 Academy Road in Albany.

... During Terry's [Eagan] tenure and after, I did everything I could about openness and bringing about transparency."

Concluding, he said, "It has not gone over well."

Without a major political-party backing he would have to force a primary through petition or seek a third-party nomination, such as his own party. Messina will now be vying with his party's chairman, Jordan, and his former running mate and current colleague, Kotary, for his seat on the Bethlehem Town Board and a nod from the Independence Party.

The two top highest vote getters will win the seats. So far, there are three candidates seeking board seats, but town Republican and third-party nominations have yet to be made. Bethlehem Republican Chairwoman Melody Burns said her full committee is expected to vote on a slate of candidates on April 21.

"I'm looking at our interested candidates and making sure they are well aware of the amount work and responsibilities of running for office," she said in an e-mail to *The Spotlight*.

The Bethlehem Democratic Party chairman is Matthew Clyne, who is also Albany County's Democratic commissioner of the board of elections and brother of former Albany County district attorney Paul Clyne.

Clyne, who along with Cunningham voted for Jordan, said he believed Messina had become a distraction on the board and didn't embody the Democrat's best interests and therefore was not suited for the party's nomination.

"I personally got tired of Sam Messina's grandstanding. He wasn't able to harmonize his views with the other board members," Clyne said. "We've had a good relationship with the Independence Party ... but we weren't prepared to give [Messina] a platform."

Messina has drawn the ire of the Democratic Party by confronting Cunningham about town appointments on numerous occasions, especially when they have consisted of Democratic committee members. Messina put forth an appointment proposal in 2008 that would have the town post jobs and committee openings and have non Civil Service appointees go through an interview and have predetermined qualifications.

The board voted it down 4-to-1, citing that it would add an unnecessary layer of bureaucracy and that town boards have the

legal right and duty to make appointments.

The most recent confrontation occurred the day after Messina lost the Democratic nomination, during the Wednesday, April 8, town board meeting, over the appointment of William Burkard to the board of assessment review.

"For two years I have tried to

Messina said he told Democrats in 2005, when they originally endorsed him, that he would "vote his mind" and that he

would put the "good of Bethlehem above all else" if elected to the board.

Kotary said he was grateful for

discuss the notion of a bit more openness in the recruitment process... and also a bit more of an open process among the board before the agenda goes out on Friday with a name on it," Messina said. "I've been unsuccessful ... but I think the issue I've been dealing with is the wrong issue."

"The issue is one of control, the issue is one of tight-fisted governance and the issue is one of how chairman Matt Clyne governs things," he said. "I need to discuss that and I will continue to discuss that because my interest is in improving Bethlehem, both its political processes and its governmental ones."

The board ultimately voted to appoint Burkard 3-to-2.

Clyne cited Messina's stance on appointments as a reason the party dropped him.

"I'm speaking specifically about political appointments," Clyne said. "He's not a member of the party ... the decision to make political appointments was a committee decision."

"People were getting tired of reading about this all the time. The appointments were arrived on by consensus," Clyne continued. "Sam Messina, as a board member, has a right to vote what he wants ... but it's the same process that put him there to begin with. I had to draw a line."

Clyne pointed to Messina's objection to the appointment of Daniel Plummer, a former councilman, to the position of deputy supervisor as "simply ridiculous" and said Plummer was "the logical choice."

"Mark Jordan has the qualifications and temperament to fulfill the duties of the office," said Clyne. "The committee membership felt the same way."

The committee vote for Jordan over Messina was 54-to-5, according to Clyne.

When asked about the situation, Cunningham said the party sees Jordan as the best candidate for the job. Furthermore, he flatly denied the accusation of running a less-than-open

Democratic support for his election bid and that he is also seeking the Independence line and talking with the Conservative Party.

"I'm honored to once again have the unanimous endorsement of the Bethlehem Democratic Committee as I prepare to run for re-election to the Bethlehem Town Board," he said. "I have thoroughly enjoyed this wonderful opportunity to serve our community and I'm so thankful for all the community support."

Messina and Councilwoman Joann Dawson are the board's two Independence Party members, while Cunningham, Kotary and Councilman Mark Hennessey are all Democrats. If Messina stays in the race and he and Jordan were the two highest vote getters, the Independence Party would have a majority vote on the Bethlehem Town Board.

The Bethlehem Democratic Committee has also endorsed Nanci Moquin, the Planning and Zoning boards' current administrative assistant, for town clerk. Longtime Town Clerk Kathleen Newkirk has not publicly announced if she will run, but said she would make her intentions known at the Bethlehem Republican Committee nomination vote.


No Democratic nomination was made for the other open town race — highway superintendent, which is currently held by Republican Gregg Sagen-dorf.

Jordan said he looks forward to the summer campaign and that the Independence Party would make its selections in early May.

"I am proud to be a part of such a strong ticket," he said. "With Jack Cunningham on the top and Kyle Kotary for council and Nanci Moquin for town clerk, I look forward to a vigorous campaign season."



A symphony of style

Fashion fundraiser benefits Schenectady Orchestra

Supporters of music escaped the cold and rain and gathered for an afternoon of high fashion for the League of the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra's Symphony of Fashion fundraiser. The League hosted its 52nd annual spring fashion show and luncheon at the Glen Sanders Mansion in Scotia on Tuesday, April 6, to raise funds for the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra.

"The League of the Symphony started out many years ago as the ladies group when most of the symphony were men," said Linda Coyle, director of marketing for the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra.

"The ladies would have lunch and tea parties and such, and it just evolved from that basis over the years. They've been doing this fashion show forever," said Coyle.

Clothing was provided by the Macy's Department Store at Colonie Center and Debbie DeLuke, a member of the League of the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra, emceed the event as volunteer models strutted down the catwalk in

spring fashions that included eveningwear, outerwear and casual-wear.

"It's a lot of hours [of preparation], but you know what? Because most of us don't work full time — you have to be at that point in your life to be able to do this and that's what you should do when you're not working — you should give back your time," said Ann Phaup-Phillips, co-chair of the Symphony of Fashion committee.

About 200 guests were in attendance. Between the donations of \$30 that each guest made, as well as a silent auction and a benefit raffle with items donated by Proctors in Schenectady to Rumors Salon and Spa in Latham, Phillips said that she is hoping the group can raise about \$10,000.

The Schenectady Symphony Orchestra has been around for 75 years. Consisting of more than 70 musicians working under the leadership of music director Charles Schneider, the symphony provides live performances of classical music. The average cost of putting on a concert is \$45,000, between musician fees, advertising and marketing, paying stagehands and renting a performance space.

"It costs so much to put on a

concert," said Phillips.

The League hasn't yet designated where the funds raised would go, but one possibility is putting it toward the cost of one of a performance.

The symphony itself consists of paid musicians and volunteers.

"We have a somewhat unusual mixture," said Christine Mason, executive director for the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra.

"Our musicians who are not paid tend to be people who play at a level in which they are very competent, but they are not making their living [off of music]. ... This gives them an opportunity to play," said Mason.

Many of their volunteer musicians are researchers and scientists, given the orchestra's proximity to General Electric, according to Mason.

The next performance of the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra will take place on Sunday, April 26, at Proctors. The title of the concert is "Brilliant Virtuosi."

In honor of the symphony's 75th anniversary, there are reduced ticket prices of \$7.50.

Ex-player no longer hiding

Gay NFL veteran Esra Tuaolo says he was down before he was out

If Esra Tuaolo could come out of the closet all over again, he would.

The only thing he would change is that he would come out while he was still playing football for the NFL.

After nine years of keeping what Tuaolo called an "agonizing secret" while playing as a defensive lineman for several NFL teams, including the Atlanta Falcons whom he went to Super Bowl XXXIII with, Tuaolo hung up his jersey and pads up and told the world what he had been hiding for so long.

As he shared his experience with Siena College students on Monday, April 6, Tuaolo told them, "I love being an out, gay man. For me to feel like this while playing in the NFL, it would have been amazing."

Before he came out, Tuaolo said he would have to downplay his true feelings whenever he was in the company of the other players; sometimes even inviting girls back to his apartment to hide his sexuality.

In 2003, Tuaolo, a Pacific American and native Hawaiian, retired from the NFL and came out of the closet after meeting his partner, Mitchell.

As part of the presentation,

Tuaolo showed a video of him being interviewed for an HBO show, in which the interviewer asked Tuaolo why he retired from the NFL.

In the footage, Tuaolo joked that he had incurred too many injuries over the years. The interviewer re-asked the question.

"Umm, because I wanted to be happy," Tuaolo answered.

After the video was over, Tuaolo addressed the crowd.

"Every time I look at this, it always brings back the memories," a teary-eyed Tuaolo said.

Tuaolo said he first knew he was gay when he was between 5 and 6 years old, and a friend of his was playing on the playground and said, about another boy, in Hawaiian tongue, "He likes boys. He plays with my sister's dolls."

Tuaolo remembers thinking to himself that day that he wanted to play with dolls too.

"That is the day I took that child within me, and I threw him in the closet and shut the door," he said. "I, Esra Tuaolo, that was the day I became an actor."

He also said that sports were something he sort of just fell into, because he was "the bigger kid," and that it had nothing to do with a need to be more masculine.

Tuaolo explained to the crowd how coming out changed his life and then he shared a song that, he said, saved his life.

"In the arms of the angel, fly away from here," Tuaolo belted out, putting his spin on the popular

Sara McLachlan song, "Angel."

After the song ended, the crowd booming with applause, Tuaolo explained the damaging effects of hateful anti-gay words, such as "fag," "faggot" and other Hawaiian words for gay.

"Sticks and stones may break my bones, but names will never hurt me — well, I'll tell you what. That's a lie!" Tuaolo said. "You need to get that out because it does hurt."

After the presentation, 20-year-old Marc Mundy, a Siena sophomore, asked Tuaolo, "What do you think it will take in sports to kind of change [the negative feelings towards the gay community] around?"

Tuaolo answered, "In my opinion, it needs to come from the top."

Tuaolo said that if all of the players are educated about the gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered community, more players will feel safe about coming out of the closet.

Mundy asked another question. "What was the reaction of your friends in the NFL?"

Tuaolo said that coming out of the closet was not about pleasing his friends. It was about being comfortable with himself.

"It's about being happy," he said. "I was tired of living a lie."

Tuaolo offered two pieces of advice for those who are ready to come out of the closet: Make sure to have support because you will need it, and be in a safe environment.






