Conservatives give nods

Endorse Messina and Jordan in Bethlehem

With the endorsement of the the Conservative Party, Bethlehem Independence Councilman Sam Messina has received his first ballot line in his race for supervisor against incumbent Democrat Jack Cunningham.

The Conservative Party has also endorsed Bethlehem Independence Party Chairman Mark Jordan for Bethlehem town councilman, Nanci Moquin for town clerk and Gregg Sagendorf for highway superintendent. The party's Albany County chairman, Richard Stack, said he chose Messina because of his track record of independent voting, describing him as "a diamond in the rough."

"We felt his independence and his ability to speak out for the common person far exceeded the incumbent, Jack Cunningham," Stack told *The Spotlight* after the vote on Thursday, May 14.

Cunningham, who has the endorsement of the town's Democratic Party and is a former Albany County legislator, said his tenure speaks for itself. "I'm running on my record,"



Police Use Taser on man after two crashes

Bethlehem Police say they had to use a Taser on a man multiple times inside of a Glenmont Mobil before brining him to compliance after he walked away from two crashes in a vehicle he didn't own.

David J. Hanna, 36, of 195 Schuurman Road, Castleton, was arrested on April 15 for a slew of charges, including third-degree criminal mischief, a felony; thirddegree criminal possession of stolen property, a felony; fourthdegree criminal possession of stolen property, a felony; resisting arrest, a misdemeanor; DWI, a misdemeanor; third-degree aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle, a misdemeanor; disorderly conduct, a violation; and six infractions - leaving the scene of property-damage auto accident, failure to keep right, unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle, failure to reduce speed for grade/curve, no seatbelt and crossing pavement markings.

Bethlehem Police said they received a call about a propertydamage auto accident on Glenmont Road when a suspect crossed the double yellow line while heading west and struck another vehicle before he "took off from the scene."

Hanna was allegedly driving the car in the first accident, according to police reports, and was involved in a second crash near Vagele Lane, where a car was left in front of a home.

Police said Hanna fled on foot from the second crash and headed toward Route 9W.

A man stopped and told officers at the scene of the first car accident that his roommate's dog and vehicle were missing from his River Road address. Police discovered a dog at a Vagele Lane home near the vehicle, but not Hanna, the reports state.

The dog was identified by the witness, who stated Hanna had spent the previous night at his house, and was returned to him.

Bethlehem Police said they then received a call from the Albany County Paramedics about a subject matching Hanna's description at the Glenmont Mobil with "blood on his hands and ...dirt and grass on him."

When police arrived on the scene, witnesses identified Hanna inside of the store, and, upon approaching him, Hanna appeared to be intoxicated and had "bloodshot eyes and a flushed face," according to the arrest reports.

Hanna was unresponsive to initial requests from an investigator when approached, and continued "in his attempt to purchase a package of tobacco," the report states.

Selkirk man killed in rail yard accident

CSX officials and police investigating incident

Police and CSX officials have released the name of a 33-yearold Selkirk man who was fatally injured at CSX rail yards in Bethlehem.

Jared C. Boehlke died after being hit by a train on the evening of Sunday, March 10, at the rail yard where he worked. He was reportedly a member of the

United Transportation Workers Union Local No. 212.

Bethlehem Police said the matter is under joint investigation between its department, CSX police, CSX safety personnel, the Federal Railroad Administration and OSHA.

"We received a call at approximately 6:42 on Sunday night for a man down," said Bethlehem Police Lt. Thomas Heffernan. "He was working on the line at the time."

CSX spokesman Bob Sullivan

confirmed the incident and said a thorough investigation would be conducted before any details are released on the matter.

• "It's currently under investigation," he said. "It's obviously a tragedy. ... I'm not getting into commenting or speculating until a full investigation is completed."

Sullivan did verify that Boehlke's family was notified immediately following the incident.

The different agencies

will be conducting individual to the public once a report is investigations, but will also be working together to piece together the incident.

Heffernan said that Boehlke may have been working on a coupling between two trains when the incident occurred and that he was still alive when emergency crews arrived on the scene. Albany Medical Center pronounced him dead upon his arrival to the hospital, according to police.

Sullivan and Heffernan said more details would be released finalized.

According to W.C. Brady's Sons, Inc. in Coxsackie, services were held for Boehlke on Friday, May 15, and he will be buried in the Stanton Hill Cemetery in Hannacroix. His obituary said he was employed as a conductor for the CSX railroad for the past eight vears and described him as a man who was "extremely devoted to his family and his child."

Boehlke was a lifetime area resident.

As many young women receive acceptance letters to colleges around the state and country, the Guilderland Police Department and school district are teaming up to show them how to be safe when they're on their own and defend themselves against attackers.

A group of 39 Guilderland High School senior girls completed a nationally recognized rapedefense program Wednesday, May 13.

Officer Nick Ingle, one of the administrators of the Rape Aggression Defense program, said college-age women are especially vulnerable.

He said statistics show one out of four women 18 to 22 will be the victim of sexual assault or rape.

He said excessive alcohol and drug use and social and sexual encounters in college contribute to the problem.



Ingle said the possibility of a RAD program for boys dealing with anger issues and appropriate ways to deal with intimacy, as well as some self-defense, is in the infant stages and could be implemented sometime in the future.

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

Don't put your money where your mouth is

This week, *The Spotlight* brings you the news that the Town of Colonie will lose its director of town operations to the Watervliet Arsenal. We wish him luck and are sure that he will be missed around town offices. We have one more thing to say to the town as it makes this transition:

Don't replace him.

When a person has a title like "director of town operations," you may wonder how the streets would possibly be plowed



in the winter or how the parks would be maintained in the summer if Colonie were not to replace him or her. But the reality is, the majority of the director of town operations' responsibilities are in the field of communications — drafting press releases, handling reporters and the like— all for a hefty, \$70,000-plus salary.

We at *The Spotlight* feel the town supervisor — the real director of town operations, as it were — should handle these duties, whether it is in the Town of Colonie or the towns of Clifton Park or Guilderland, which also employ public relations specialists, at salaries of more than \$42,000 and \$35,000, respectively.

Communication skills are a prerequisite of our elected representation, and personal interaction goes a long way in establishing a good working relationship with a constituency. (And, quite frankly, it pays more dividends around Election Day than any canned press release or slick mailer could hope to.)

The Spotlight understands that the demands on our town supervisors are great, but we refute the idea that any municipalities in our coverage areas are so large that they require going through two secretaries and a PR flack before you can get to an elected official. Governing requires interaction, not distance, and what is a press officer, for all the good that could be argued he or she brings to the town, but another level of bureaucracy that the public must go through?

So, supervisors of Colonie and other towns who employ "communications officers," "public relations specialists" or "directors of public affairs," the next time you're looking to save money, look at the name at the top of the correspondence that goes out of your office. If it isn't yours, consider getting rid of the person it belongs to.

Go Red for Women at luncheon

How could you save a life? You could become a doctor, a nurse or an EMT. You could learn CPR. But if you eat healthy food and exercise every day, you save your own life.

Another way to save lives is to fund the research and program's that lead to healthier, better lives in our community. At SEFCU, we believe in investing where we live, and that's why we are the Capital Region Goes Red Sponsor of the American Heart Association.

I agreed to be the chair woman of the Go Red for Women Luncheon scheduled for Thursday, May 28, when I learned that heart disease is the No. 1 killer of women in America. I'm a woman; the majority of SEFCU's employees are women, and I have a teenage daughter. I want to be around for a good, long while, and I want all the women around me to live healthy, long lives.

I have learned a lot since agreeing to chair the luncheon. Cardiovascular disease kills about 460,000 women a year. Shockingly, 64 percent of women who die suddenly from coronary heart disease have no previous symptoms. Fortunately, cardiovascular disease is largely preventable.

I had heard that women's heart disease symptoms can be different than men's, but it's a wake-up call to meet someone whose heart attack was initially diagnosed as indigestion. I now know the warning signs of a heart attack and I hope you will learn them, too. They are:

• Chest discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back. It can, feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

Point of View

• Discomfort in other areas of the upper body. Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

• Shortness of breath. This feeling may occur with or without chest discomfort.

• Other signs of discomfort. These may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

Women are somewhat more likely than men to experience some of the other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting and back or jaw pain.

- Blood pressure
- · Blood sugar

The site will let you plug your numbers into a risk calculator to determine your chances of having a heart attack. The good news is that if the chances are high, you can make some changes that will help you lead a long and healthy life. If you're not sure where to start making lifestyle changes, GoRedForWomen.org has great information and advice about leading a healthier life.

Women are often the primary caregivers in their families – sometimes caring for aging parents as they raise their children and work. Bethlehem Central Middle School is looking to become a lean, green, organic growing machine.

The school has recently garnered attention in its mission to bring eco-friendly initiatives into the classroom and freshly grown vegetables onto lunch trays. Bethlehem is one of four regional schools competing to become the Northeast's "greenest school" and most environmentally friendly.

The contest is being put on by the Westchester County-

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(RNN), which sent a television crew to the middle school and will be featuring the four schools and their green initiatives on its Web site.

Bethlehem Middle School is being featured for its "kitchen garden," which will include organic vegetables to be served at the cafeteria.

The winner will be decided by the number of votes received in an online poll.

Voting begins Wednesday, May 20, and runs through Memorial Day on Monday, May 25. District officials and staff are urging parents and residents to get online and vote at www. rnntv.com/ion.php.

Bethlehem Middle. School Assistant Principal Mark Warford said he is excited to and is even happier to see the excitement of the students to be involved.

"This year the district has really ramped up its environmental initiatives and its recycling," Warford said. "This contest is great because we have been working hard. We weigh all the paper we recycle and have gone back to metal flatware in the cafeteria, so there's no plastic utensils being thrown out."

The whole thing came about after Warford caught a downstate promotional ad on television.

"I called about it and ... they called us back and announced that we were one of four finalists," he said. "Then they sent down a TV crew to interview us about our garden and recycling programs."

Warford said the gardens are being installed, and the sod has already been removed and aged

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based Regional News Network be a part of such a contest compost has been tilled into the ground. The district will be creating its own compost soon and will also be adding raised beds to the garden.

> "Mr. Kleinke from the Kleinke farm has donated some wellaged compost for the garden," said Warford. The school's Parent Teacher Organization has played a key role in getting the program off the ground, according to Warford, and has helped the district secure 100 percent recycled lumber for the raised beds. The lumber is partly created from recycled car dashboards.

"If we win the contest, we'll get \$5,000, which will go a long way for our programs," said Warford.

The school is hoping to start a garden club to incorporate the garden program into the curriculum and have students help plant, cultivate and harvest the crops, which will be used in their daily lunches.

"We're going to have a composter so we can compost some of the cafeteria's food waste, which will ultimately go back to the cafeteria from what we grow with it," Warford said. "The goal here is to make the kids aware of what goes into growing our food and of the importance

of buying local."

The school is hoping to finish the garden by the end of June or beginning of July and a planting of fall crops such as tomatoes and peas can be started. Warford said the students would have enough room to provide the cafeteria with both spring and fall crops.

Superintendent Michael Tebbano said the contest is a great reflection of the district's commitment to the environment and the steps it is taking.


"We are excited about the many green initiatives taking place across our schools," he said. "This is an area where we will obviously continue to focus, particularly as it relates to saving money through efficiency and conservation and modeling good stewardship for our students as well as learning from them. We clearly benefit in this district and community from people with such a passion for these issues."

Glenmont researcher to discuss the science in 'Angels & Demons'

The particle physics community is taking a walk down the red carpet and invites everyone to join in.

Fine gardening raffle tickets will be sold at the plant sale and near the gardens on the tour. The grand prize is a minimum of

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

He said the commercial zone, and a limit on the size of retail developments inside of it, is an important issue to him. He said a project to close the Youmans Road railroad crossing and construct an alternate route to cross it, and finding funding for development of new water districts, such as Johnson Road, are also priorities.

The town's Democratic Committee has not met yet to discuss its endorsement for this year's election, and will be hosting a party caucus to officially choose its candidate on Tuesday, June 23, said town attorney in New Scotland. Conservative Party Chair Richard Stack said the party also endorsed Republican Chuck Voss, who sits on the planning board, and incumbent board member Doug LaGrange, a

Mike Mackey, the party chair and

Republican, for Town Board. Stack cited their stance on "bigbox" development as the No. 1 reason for supporting them, and said Albany County Sheriff James Campbell, who is also seeking reelection this year, suspects that an additional four sheriffs would need to be hired to handle a big-box retail development.

Stack said incumbent Peg Neri, a Democrat, did not receive the Conservative Party's endorsement because of her stance toward bigbox retail development. Neri did not support a 50,000 square footsize cap for retail buildings in New Scotland.

Daniel Mackay, a newcomer planning to run on the Democratic and Independence lines, did not seek the Conservative Party's endorsement and did not interview with them, but noted that LaGrange and Voss are the "sound planners" and deserve the Conservative endorsement.

"They're the two best candidates on that side of the ledger. It's entirely appropriate that Doug and Chuck run on the Conservative line," Mackay said.

Mackay is a founding member of New Scotlanders for Sound Economic Development, an advocacy group that supports a 50,000-squarefoot cap on retail buildings in the town of New Scotland.

He added that the Democratic Caucus will be a "very important event" and he is looking forward to it.

Attempts to contact Neri, LaGrange and Voss before press time were unsuccessful.



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

The camp costs \$99 for a twoweek session. The fee includes busing to and from camp, and the option to sign up for swim lessons taught by certified swim instructors. Hours are from 8 to 11:45 a.m., according to the town.

Moore said parents are attracted to the camp because children are assigned one counselor for the whole program, and they build a relationship with that counselor. Counselors range in age from high school to college to adults. The summer programs offered by the town include sports, recreation, canoeing, rock climbing and other activities, Moore said.

The Parks and Recreation Department is also offering a number of athletic and enrichment camps at other locations, such as DiCaprio Park and school facilities in town.

Enrichment camps often have an educational element to them, such as reading, science or math. Moore said SAT and grammar boot camps are offered, as well as archeology programs. He said one summer program outlines. American history through toy dolls, and a comic book camp allows kids to do something fun while reading.

"That's why a lot of parents are interested," Moore said. "We've added those over the years."

Deb Escobar, a teacher at Farnsworth Middle School, said

it is important to keep children physically and mentally active over the summer.

"It keeps their minds sharp over the summer-keeps them reading and thinking," Escobar said.

She said summer is a good time for kids to explore academic interests through enrichment camps because it gives the students time to investigate and learn.

Stewart's part of No. *Pizza, pizza* Beth condo deal

PDD application integrates a commercial project into residential development

A Planned Development District application for a project on Russell Road is seeking to build 56 condominiums and incorporate a Stewart's shop in North Bethlehem near a residential park.

Developers said the addition of a store, along with some sidewalks, would create a type of "mom and pop store" atmosphere and provide for non-motorized access to basic goods.

Daniel Hershberg of Hershberg and Hershberg, an engineering and land-surveying firm, is representing the applicant and made an initial presentation to the town's Planning Board on Tuesday, May 5.

Plans call for creating a PDD, which was initially reviewed by the Town Board and sent back to the Planning Board for a recommendation, building the condosineightunits and constructing a 2,900-square-foot "non-traditional" Stewart's on the corner of the lot at 572 Russell Road.

"It will not be your standard Stewart's," Hershberg said, adding the project avoids disturbing any of the wetlands. The project is proposed for the corner of Krumkill and Russell roads, but the traffic impact is only expected to delay stops at the intersection by two seconds, according to Hershberg.

"Stewart's would be anxious to start as soon as they can hit the ground," he told board members about developing the 11.5-acre site.

Michael Morelli, the town's director of planning and economic development, said the project has a ways to go before reaching approval for the 1.9 acres of build out. Developers still have to conduct an archeological and historical study of the site and produce a more detailed elevation plan, among other requirements, he said.

Stormwater is another issue being discussed, as there will be two different water runoff systems for the residential and commercial portions of the site. The condos will have above-ground water retention and the Stewart's will have a type of subterranean catch basin.

The unique design of the Stewart's caught the attention of several board members.

"It is the façade that they are

Powers asked Hershberg what the proposed price range of the condo would be, he said it is hard to propose a concrete price.

"So much is depending on the break out of the economy right now," he said. "If I had to guess today, I would say between \$240,000 and \$325,000."

Board member John Smolinsky asked about the land division between the residential site and the commercial site with the same PDD application. Morelli said a PDD does not have to be a single type of development.

"There has been a lot of development in the North Bethlehem area in the last 10 or 15 years, primarily residential," he said. "The applicants are really quite flexible and are willing to work with us here."

Morelli said despite all of the residential development in the area, there is little in the way of local business to serve to people living there.

Guilderland Center hamlet study under way

Town looking to improve sidewalks, traffic conditions

A grant provided by the Capital District Transportation Committee is funding a study of the Guilderland Center hamlet, which is seeking improved sidewalks and transportation, according to officials.

A workshop was held on Thursday, May 7, to discuss the matter.

"It was a very well attended

meeting, which we we're very pleased about," said Mike Welti, of Behan Planning and Design, which was hired to conduct the study.

He said the meeting helped official's gain a full understanding of the concerns of the people in the hamlet area.

Welti said the speed of the traffic, trucks and buses in the hamlet have become an issue, and a committee has been set up to begin the preliminary stages of studying traffic patterns and sidewalks.

Another workshop is scheduled for September, Welti said, and another one will likely follow that.

He said traffic engineers Creighton-Manning are also working on the project, as well as the Capital District Transportation Committee, which used a \$32,000 grant to hire Behan.

"The intersection of School Road and Route 146 is a problematic intersection," Welti said. He said residents have complained that traffic prevents them from moving in and out of their driveways.

Despite the issues, though, he said the residents of the hamlet were positive and optimistic, and they exhibited strong community ties

"It is evident that these people really care about where they live," Welti said.

Chris O'Neill, a senior transportation planner at the CDTC, said better crosswalks in the hamlet are also being studied.

sidewalks and traffic flow were issues that need to be addressed.

The CDTC, Behan and Creighton-Manning will be analyzing traffic patterns to determine ways to make the hamlet more efficient. O'Neill said \$681,000 of federal funding has been allocated for transportation improvement for the sidewalk at the Route 146 and School Road intersection.

O'Neill added that although there was not much discussion at the Thursday, May 7, workshop dealing with improving the hamlet, a potential residential development still in the works, Dutchman Acres, is being accounted for.

"As developments may occur in Guilderland, we look for what kind of vision residents have," O'Neill said.

He said traffic studies would take into account additional cars and trucks that

He agreed with Welti that could be generated by the development.

He said that the industrial park and school district are stakeholders and are being included in discussions. Guilderland High School and a bus garage are located in the hamlet.

Town Supervisor Ken Runion said it is important to have planning in place so when money becomes available for the projects in Guilderland Center, the work is ready to be done.

"It makes your grant proposal much stronger if you have a plan," he said.

Runion said it could be years before the funding becomes available for many projects, but stimulus money could help speed that process up.

He said the town has contributed \$6,000 to the effort.

"We want the residents to plan their community," Runion said.



Cross-state bike tour planned for July

Cycling the Erie Canal is an eight-day, 400-mile, recreational bicycle tour from Buffalo to Albany along the legendary Erie Canal.

The bicycle tour passes through historic canal villages and rural countryside. About three-quarters of the ride is off-road, on the traffic-free Canalway Trail; the rest is on rural roads with good shoulders.

Last year's Cycling the Erie Canal drew riders from 38 states. Over one-third of the riders were from New York.

Included in the \$525 fee for Cycling the Erie Canal are camping accommodations every evening with showers and toilet facilities; eight breakfasts and six dinners: two refreshment stops daily stocked with fruit, snacks and beverages; entertainment and historical presentations each evening; guided tours of the Canal, historic sites, museums, and other attractions; T-shirt and water bottle; sag wagon and mobile mechanical support; baggage transport; daily maps and cue sheets; and marked routes.

Two weekend ride options are available, from Buffalo to Pittsford on July 11 to July 13 and from Canajoharie to Albany on July 17 to July 19. A shuttle will be available at the beginning of the ride to transport riders and their bicycles to Buffalo. Non-cycling friends and family of riders with their own transportation are welcome. Youths under 18 pay a half-price rate. Funds raised will help support Parks and Trails New York's trail programs, including its work on the Canalway Trail. When complete, the 524-mile Canalway Trail will be the longest intra-state multi-use trail system in the nation. 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

Finance Spotlig **The "Sweet" Life:** Nadja Piatka finds success through adversity

adja Piatka's life changed forever the moment she and her daughter hid under a table in their house to avoid being seen by a bill collector knocking at the door. For the single mother of two, it was a humiliating moment that gave her the resolve to take a \$100 investment and grow it into a multimillion dollar food company supplying some of the world's biggest companies-Subway, McDonald's, Sodexho and many others.

Since then, Piatka has not looked back, and she has not backed down. She competed against corporate giants, and she won. She battled cancer, and she survived. And the story she has told to America's most popular entertainment shows, including the Oprah Winfrey Show, Today and The Big Idea with Donny Deutsch, she will tell to women of the Capital Region as this year's keynote speaker at the Eighth Annual Key4Women Forum, "Now Is Not the Time to Retreat," which is being held on June 5 at the Glen Sanders Mansion in Scotia.

Here Piatka shares some of her thoughts about staying positive in a down economy, overcoming adversity and growing a successful business from a \$100 investment.

Karen ZW: The title of your presentation is "Now Is Not the Time to Retreat." Can you talk about what that means for you and for the women you will be speaking to at this year's Key4Women Forum?

Nadja Piatka: A lot of people are scared right now. There is so much uncertainty and in the search for answers it's easy to be influenced by the beating of the drums telling us how bad it all is. It's become impossible to read a newspaper or turn on the television without hearing how terrible things are. It can be demoralizing, and I believe it affects the way people think and feel. So the message is to keep a positive attitude, because if you're going to sell your product, services or business, you need to be positive.

'I also think it's important not to roll over and give up when things get hard because adversity is an opportunity to discover your strengths. Things are going to get better, and

positions you for success when they do. Thomas Edison said it so well: "If we all did the things in life that we are truly capable of, we would literally astound ourselves." But if we don't dig, if we don't challenge ourselves in difficult

times, we will never

KZW: You went through your own adversity to get to where you are. In fact, there was a turning-point moment for you, when things go so bad that you knew you needed to take charge of your life. What happened?

get there.

NP: I was a divorced mother of two with no income, no money and no training. In life, we have embarrassing moments. They're sometimes funny. We talk about them. Then there are humiliating moments. We don't talk about them. They are not

funny. And when you have a humiliating moment in front of your child, there is nothing worse, because they are part of it. My moment was when a bill collector came. I had a drill. When they would come I would hide under the table, which was under the window, so that they would peer around, not see anything and eventually leave.

One day a bill collector came and my daughter was home for lunch. So I said to her, "Veronica, let's get under the table. There's a bill collector." And I remember. we were on the floor, nose to nose, hands to hands, and I made her sit with me for 15 minutes. I'll never forget the way I felt, the way she looked at me, and I decided no one was going to make me feel this way ever, ever again.

KZW: So you resolved to make a change. But finding a job wasn't easy?

NP: I was out of work for a long time. I sent out 30 resumes and only got one interview. It was a dreadful interview. Really. I decided that the only person who was going to hire me was me. I had a passion for baking, and I love sweets. I thought there was room for guilt-free options.

KZW: Yet you had no business experience? How did you build such a successful company?

NP: I just started working. I was down so far that I had nowhere to go but up. And I think that's the lesson. You don't need a lot. I had \$100. Too many people wait for things to be perfect, to have all the assets they think they'll need. Also, there's not as much to fear as people may think. The terrible outcomes we imagine happening if we fail aren't really so terrible. I never could have imagined losing my beautiful house, but I did, and it wasn't as bad as I thought it would be. The fear was worse than the reality. It goes back to adversity. Going through it takes away a lot of fear. You realize you can dig in or give in.

Passion is what gets you , through it, because if you love what you do you can still be enthusiastic about it even when things are bad. Enthusiasm is contagious. It will make you stand apart from the competition.

KZW: You've been able to build a life by embracing your passion. You have shared your worst and best moments with your daughter. In a way, you've come full circle together. What does this mean to you?

We really have come full circle. She is graduating with her MBA and will be working with me full time. It is the most rewarding thing for me. The bill collector experience was something we didn't really talk about, but years later I was being honored as a Woman of Vis sion : a luncheon, and my daughter was there, and I looked at her and said, "Veronica, today we're sitting at the table instead of under it."



The current strain of the economy is not only affecting people, but businesses as well. And, a wealthy business that has been hit hard by the American economic slowdown is education, especially public and private colleges and universities.

A national trend is showing that college wealth and endowments are steadily dwindling. Not only are big-name, national institutions like Harvard reporting financial losses, but regional colleges are as well.

Few schools are giving exact numbers, but University of Rochester is reporting that their endowments have dropped by 25 percent since June of this year, and locally, colleges are not fairing well either.

Colgate University's Manager of Media Communications Anthony Adornato said that as of late October, Colgate's endowment has dropped nearly 11 percent or \$75 million.

Similar to our peer colleges and universities," Adornato said, "our endowment has lost significant market value throughout 2008. A lower endowment market values will require Colgate to, at the very least, substantially reduce the annual growth rate in endowment spending in 2009-10."

An endowment, which is primarily money donated to a college, will normally fund student scholarships, building projects, creating new academic programs and also help to keep tuition somewhat low. And, when endowments drop, so do these projects and programs.

Recently, President of Colgate Rebecca Chopp outlined her college's line of defense against the economic downturn in two press releases viewable on Colgate's Web site.

In what she calls "immediate measures," Chopp lists four ways she is planning on combating financial issues.

First, Colgate plans to "substantially reduce next fiscal year's operating budget allocation to capital projects." In doing this, they will significantly reduce renovation and maintenance of the college.

Second, the president has asked "all deans and vice presidents to identify five percent savings in their operating budgets from 2009-10." This would give Chopp an idea of what cuts she can make without severely impacting Colgate's "educational mission."

Third and fourth, Chopp will now review and approve "vacant non-faculty positions" before there is permission for a search. And, along with strict hiring approval, the press release states that, "while Colgate remains committed to offering appropriate and competitive compensation, we are now in a time where we must be prudent with our resources even in compensation.'

Cazenovia College, like its Colgate neighbor, has been reducing costs to deal with the economy as well. Although Cazenovia did not mention hiring freezes, Cazenovia College President Mark J. Tierno did mention reduction of travel, cutting significant purchases and holding off on some capital improvement projects as a few of their outlines to stay afloat in the diving economy.

And, again like Colgate, Cazenovia has been dealing with their endowment losing its value, too.

"At the start of the academic year, [our endowment] was \$30 million "Tierno said, "Now, the endowment value has been fluctuating between \$20 million and \$25 million-depending on the performance of the market on a particular day.

"The instability of the market is directly impacting the value of our endowment every day."

Although it is state-assisted and has considerably cheaper tuition than the private colleges, Morrisville State College has been forced to absorb approximately \$2 million or 10 percent in cuts for the 2008-09 budget year according to Director of Public Relations and Government Affairs Jessica Decerce.

Decerce says to deal with these cuts, Morrisville has taken a few actions to save money.

A hiring freeze was put into action that has held 15 positions vacant so far, reductions were made to departmental budgets, limits have been put on travel, they postponed equipment purchases, and, to save on heating costs, all thermostats have been turned down two degrees.

"Our main goal in dealing with these budget cuts is to protect the students by preserving the quality of their Morrisville experiences, both inside and outside of the classroom," Decerce said."

Unlike its competing private colleges, Morrisville endowments are sufficiently diversified to protect against major losses, and according to Decerce, there has been no major affect on their endowment despite the hard economic times.

However, the State University of New York, which is the main resource for the nation's largest comprehensive system of public higher education, has had to take in approximately \$210 million in cuts throughout its 64 dispersed campuses.

And, to deal with these cuts, the SUNY Board of Trustees has voted and passed to increase tuition to \$620 a year, beginning with a \$310 increase for the Spring 2009" semester.

'We realize New York State is facing an unprecedented economic crisis," Decerce said, "and we are willing to make-and have already made-sacrifices for the general good; however, those sacrifices should not come at the expense of New York state students."

Unlike the normally steady tuition costs of state schools like Morrisville, Colgate increases its tuition about five percent from year-to-year, but now with the sliding economy it is uncertain how much more it will rise.

"It's unclear how the current economic downturn-and the subsequent impact on Colgate's endowment—will affect tuition for the next academic year," Adornato said. "The economic news changes daily, and we must have time to factor in the significant efforts we are making to alleviate budget pressures."

The Meaning of Populism in Difficult Times

The rise of populism – when ordinary people rise up against their society's elite – seems to be an explanation and a defense for almost anything these days.

In political circles, the "left" credits a popular uprising for sweeping Barack Obama into the White House, while conservatives on the right see a populist movement rising up against the new administration, big government and crushing taxes.

On Wall Street, populist rage is used to justify the anger over bonuses paid with federal bailout money while that same rage is why thousands tossed copies of the stimulus legislation overboard at Boston-Tea-Party-like events.

Populists on the right want to negate union contracts; populists on the left want to negate the contracts of top executives.

Anger, rage, wrath and fury seem to be the order of the day as Americans try to cope with an economy that has eliminated hundreds of thousands of jobs, evaporated retirement savings and crushed the dreams of so many. Mass enthusiasm for striking out against someone — anyone — seems very appealing.

How much of that came into play last month, when Jiverly Wong walked into the American Civic Association building in Binghamton and took the lives of 13 innocent people before committing suicide?

In a rambling letter to a local television station, Wong spoke of losing his job and struggling to find employment because he struggled with weak English skills. He claimed the police were harassing him and that the governmentfunded unemployment system cheated him.

Was this senseless act symptomatic of the current anger in society? Was it populist rage giving rise to violent behavior? And, what about the gruesome killing of five children by their father in Washington, or the killing of three police officers in a domestic dispute in Pittsburgh? Both of these horrifying acts of violence occurred within days of the Binghamton tragedy.

Do these violent acts reflect how individuals too often respond to far-reaching changes in society that they just can't understand?

If so, then it's arguable that populist outrage against changes demanded during the civil rights movement led to the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. 41 years ago. Or, that the populist support for Robert F. Kennedy as he spoke for the growing discontent for the war in his time and the injustices in society, led to his assassination only two short months later.

For some, blaming populist rage might be a plausible explanation. It certainly answers nagging questions about "why" and allows guilt to be spread broadly — and diluted neatly.

But, fortunately, there's another side, including the historic events following the assassinations of Martin Luther King and Robert Kennedy. The social gains realized have not been equaled since. Overwhelmingly, people — populism — responded in ways that affirmed the lives of those great leaders.

In the same way, the good people of Binghamton — and around the state and country — responded with caring, sympathy and understanding to this most recent tragedy. Their generosity and support reaffirm the lives of those lost -- immigrants trying to better their lives to become fully productive players in the American dream and a teacher, a NYSUT member, who was trying to help these hard working individuals become part of that American dream.

In a democracy, populism is a powerful tool. It can have devastating results or it can define us in ways that make us proud..

Budget tak learn all you can about your school's budget

We've said it before.


Civic responsibility does not simply mean voting. It means become educated about your elected officials and local municipalities. It means speaking up when people and boards aren't doing what you elected them to do.

On May 19, all of our area school districts will put their budget up for vote, as per New York State Law. As taxpayers well know, this budget affects not only the education of their children, but their pocketbooks as well. During the next few weeks, districts are holding public information sessions about the budget and the variety of factors that affect it this year, including the economic situation, the state budget and the federal stimulus bill—not to mention local issues unique to each district.

Last week, at least two school districts in the area held public information nights that not one member of the public attended aside from media and school officials. With such a crucial vote just around the corner, it is pertinent that the voting public gets educated before pulling the lever next month.

Call your local district to find out when the next information night will be held. Some districts even have call-in shows on local television and radio stations about the budget.

Don't just look at the tax increase headlines in the local papers. Why is that increase necessary? School officials and board members are prepared to answer questions



from the public (it is their job, after all). So ask them. Find out how much state aid the school is getting this year and how much money is allotted to them from the federal government.

Are programs being cut? Was spending looked at carefully?

There are a lot of questions that need to be asked and without the answers, it is irresponsible to show up at your designated polling place- whether you're voting for or against the budget.

As members of the public, we have a responsibility to hold our leaders accountable and ensure that they are doing the best job possible. In the case of the school board, it's providing the best education possible for our children—not an easy task.

So, show up and educate yourself. Then on May 19, you can make the decision based on facts rather than on what you assume to be true about this year's budget.

CNY School Budget roundup

Baldwinsville Central School District

On April 6, the Baldwinsville Central School District Board of Education adopted the proposed \$93,669,512 budget for the 2009-10 school year.

While this is an increase of 1.03 percent over the 2008-09 budget, there is no increase in the \$46,780,000 tax levy. This means the tax rate in the towns of Lysander and Van Buren is projected to decrease by one percent and the tax rate in the town of Clay is projected to remain the same (depending on the change in the equalization rate for Clay).

"[This budget] maintains the integrity and quality of our educational and extracurricular programs," said District Superintendent Jeanne Dangle. "The proposed budget reflects the continued commitment of district administrators and the Board of Education to be fiscally responsive to our community, particularly during these difficult economic times."

The budget vote and school board elections will be held from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. May 19 in the auditorium of Baker High School.

Cicero-North Syracuse

The estimated tax increase was 1.59 percent as of April 6, and is now down to 1.1 percent.

Melvin reminded the board that Gov. Paterson's Deficit Reduction plan would have resulted in a \$4.4 million cut in state aid for the school district. The cut in state aid could have resulted in the loss of about 54 teachers and four administrators.

However, without those reductions, the tax rate could have jumped by more than 11.4 percent, instead of the 1.1 percent recommended tonight, said Melvin.

The vote on the budget is inching closer as the official date stands for Tuesday, May 19. However, the next board meeting is on Monday, May 11 which will be the last time the board meets to cut the budget any further or discuss revisions from here on. **Liverpool Central School District**

The Liverpool Central School District Board of Education further discussed the proposed 2009-10 budget at Monday night's meeting. The budget totals \$132,936,007 and includes both staff reductions and some program cuts. There is no tax increase planned for the district with a budget-to-budget decrease of 0.03 percent. The estimated tax levy-to tax levy decrease is 1.10 percent.

The budget was discussed and then adopted with a 7-3 vote that will carry the budget over to a public vote on May 19. Further discussion on the budget will be heard during the public hearing scheduled for 6:30 p.m. on May 7 at the district office. **Jamesville-DeWitt School District**

Jamesville-DeWitt's tentative budget proposes spending a total budget of \$47 million, an increase of 2.9 percent over last year's budget. The tax levy will increase by 2.7 percent which equates to a 1.6 percent tax rate increase, said Bill McIntyre, business executive. Also on the ballot is a proposition for three new buses for \$283,430 and funding for the DeWitt Community Library from \$1,034,000 to \$1,126,500. "In an effort to control costs, the district eliminated three instructional and two non-instructional positions," McIntyre said. "Additional reductions in supplies and equipment were made in the maintenance and transportation budgets. These targeted cuts allowed the district to propose a reasonable budget which continues to provide a quality education for all our students."

Fayetteville-Manlius School District

Representatives from the F-M School District did not respond to requests from the Eagle Bulletin by press time.

Cazenovia

Cazenovia's proposed budget totals \$25,681,681, a 2.49 percent increase from last year's budget. The budget calls for no increase in the tax levy, Assistant Superintendent Bill Furlong said. Also on the ballot will be the purchase of four school buses not to exceed \$364,053 - 70 percent of that purchase and interest will be covered by the state. The Cazenovia and New Woodstock libraries' total proposed budgets of \$473,679 will also be on the ballot.

Skaneateles Central School District

The Skaneateles Board of Education adopted its proposed 2009-10 budget during the board meeting on Wednesday April 22.

Assistant Superintendent and business manager Dale Bates said the total spending in set at \$29,231,236 — a 4.74 percent increase over last year's budget, or \$1,321.929.

Much of the budget-to-budget increase is because of debt service for Project 2007. The funds from the project have caused an increase in the 2009-10 budget of \$986,472.

Along with the budgetary increase, taxpayers will see a 3.05 percent increase in the tax levy. According to Bates, the increase is less than it has been in the past.

When residents go to the polls on May 19, they will not only be faced with voting on the budget, but also with one proposition, which is the purchase of two school buses at a cost not to exceed \$198,000.

Included in the bus proposition would be approval to install digital camera systems in the existing fleet at a cost not to exceed \$25,000.

The total cost of the proposition is not to exceed \$223,000. The local cost after aid of the bus purchase and camera installation is an estimated \$122,650.

The May 19 vote will also include the election of three Board of Education members. Running unopposed are Michael Card, Evan Dreyfuss and Katherine Cogswell. Each are seeking reelection for three-year terms.

A budget information session will be held at 7 p.m. May 5 at the Waterman School auditorium. Budget vote and school board elections will be held from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. May 19 at the Waterman School auditorium.

West Genesee Central School District

West Genesee Central School District residents will vote on a \$68.8 million budget that would result in a 1.4 percent tax levy increase. The budget represents an estimated 1 percent tax rate increase. Three propositions will also be on the ballot: to purchase six school buses; to levy a \$26,800 tax to support Solvay Public Library; and to levy a \$192,000 tax to support the Maxwell Memorial, Fairmount Community and Onondaga Free libraries, and increase of \$97,000 over the current levy.

Jordan-Elbridge Central School District

The tax levy will remain level at 1.8 percent with no increase this year. Taxpayers last

East Syracuse-Minoa School District

East Syracuse-Minoa's tentative budget proposes spending a total budget of \$69,755,537, an increase of \$1,485,497 or 2.18 percent over last year's budget. The tax levy will increase 1.87 percent. Also on the ballot is a proposition for the purchase of three new school buses not to exceed \$324,000, and funding totaling \$135,000 for the East Syracuse Free Library.

The new buses, to replace the oldest and most expensive buses to maintain/repair, include a 65-passenger conventional bus, a full-size flexible-seating wheelchair bus and an 81-passenger transit style bus. The purchase would come from the 2007 Bus Purchase Reserve Fund; any balance will be raised by the levy of a tax that will be collected in annual installments. The district receives state aid for all bus purchases.

The East Syracuse Free Library is requesting a \$55,000 increase over last year's \$80,000 that voters approved. The increase would result in a \$135,000 annual budget. Under education law, the amount of taxes that voters approve for public library purposes remains the same until changed by further vote. The Minoa Free Library, which is funded \$200,000 annually, did not submit a request for an increase this year.

A budget public hearing will be held at 6 p.m. Monday May 11 in the ES-M High School library. year approved a \$21.9 million capital project and were able to maintain a 91 percent building aid ratio.

Marcellus Central School District

Voters will be faced with a \$29.7 million budget that if passed would raise the tax levy 3.95 percent. A proposition to purchase three school buses for \$314,030 will also be up to voters.

Oneida City School district

Oneida's budget calls for a \$1.5 million increase, which will raise the tax levy by 2.91 percent. The total budget is \$38.9 million.

Superintendant Ron Spadafora said the increase is the lowest in recent years.

Tom Laurin, head of the budget committee said he thought the budget was good for the students and fair for the taxpayers.

Vernon Verona Sherrill


In the Vernon Verona Sherrill School, district there will be a tax levy increase of 1.5 percent and a 2 percent increase in spending, bringing the total budget to \$32 million.

Superintendent Norm Reed said that the budget kept the spending increase down despite increased costs to the district in tough economic times.

The Canastota Central School District budget shows a 3 percent increase for a total budget of \$24.7 million. The tax levy increase will be a 2.68 percent increase:

next decade, what kind of development patterns can be expected and the overall fiscal future of the town.

'One of the overall themes is to address the infrastructure," he said of the committee. "The name refers to having 20/20 [vision] in looking forward at our needs and the competing principles involved."

An update was given at a town board meeting Wednesday, May 13, by former town supervisor and co-chair of the committee Theresa Egan. Board members were told they can expect a final report sometime in the end of June.

The committee's final report will be used to help guide the town's future fiscal decisions.

Part of the committee's report will include a survey that was sent out to 1,500 town residents, out of which 22 percent, or roughly 322 people, responded. Cunningham said the survey asked for opinions on issues such as infrastructure needs and the costs associated, as well as the satisfaction of current town services. It also asked about residents' feelings on the consolidation and sharing of services and asked people to rate the town on various aspects.

The research institute conducting the survey told the board that the numbers could serve as a litmus test for residential opinion and could be sufficiently reliable to include in the 20/20 Committee's final report.

They were very comfortable that the numbers reflected an adequate representation of the town," Cunningham said.

However, at least one resident disagreed and identified himself as a Siena College employee before telling the board that there wasn't a broad enough spectrum used in creating the survey. "He argued that the polling wasn't large enough to effectively represent the town's view," said Cunningham.

Councilman Kyle Kotary, who as public relations specialist has experience with polling himself, said the survey would serve the final report well.

"It wasn't done as a public opinion poll, it was done as a community survey," said Kotary. "It's a snapshot of time."

He said the work being done is important.

"It was great to hear the presentation from a large contingent of the 20/20 committee. I appreciate all of their hard work," Kotary said. "In a nutshell, the community responses indicate that the town is heading in the right direction as a result of its leadership."

Continuing, Kotary said the supervisor is a big part of Bethlehem's positive outlook.

"I have to give Jack [Cunningham] credit on this one," he said. "This was his idea to put together a bi-partisan committee like this.'

Bethlehem planning board Chairman George Levielle said the committee was initiated by Cunningham and the Town Board to get residents more involved in the town and help gauge financial decisions.

The committee was created to bring in some ideas on how does the town face financial challenges in the future," Levielle said. "The survey was to get broader insight into the residents' views ... and try to help the town think about more broad issues as it thinks about its fiscal health."

Cunningham said the survey results would be interpreted by the 20/20 Committee and included in their final report due for June. He thanked the committee and said the work will be an important tool to help lay out Bethlehem's future.

Conservatives back G'land Dems

GOP candidates say party is out of touch

Albany County Conservative Party Chairman Richard Stack announced the party will support incumbents Ken Runion, Patricia Slavick and Paul Pastore for supervisor and town board, respectively, at a Thursday, May 14, meeting.

Runion now has the backing of the Democratic Party and the Conservative Party.

Runion said he has received the Conservative Party's support each time he has ran ran for supervisor because he holds many of the same values as the party.

"I have strong family values," Runion said. "We look to improve the quality of life of our residents through parks and recreation."

His opponent, Mark Grimm, a Republican and town board member, said he did not receive the Conservative line in his bid for town board and was still able to secure the seat.

'Can I win with one line? Already have," Grimm said.

He said he is not in the pocket of the party bosses, and this has helped him gain rapport with his constituents.

That's one thing voters like about me," he said.

Stack said he did not choose Grimm because he did not interview for the nomination, and the party supported Runion because of his record.

questioned whether Stack Grimm would even stay in the race for supervisor.

"I don't believe Mr. Grimm is going to run," Stack said. "But that's a story for another time.'

Grimm could not be reached to respond to that comment, but earlier he said he suspects the Conservative Party choose Runion simply because he is the incumbent.

Stack said the decision to sup-

on how close he or she kept to the Conservative ideals of the party, and Runion has done so during his tenure.

He said support for an incumbent is not automatic, and the Conservative Party is not endorsing incumbent supervisors in Bethlehem and Knox.

Grimm said his record shows he is more "fiscally conservative" than Runion. He cited tax increases of more than 4 percent and fee increases of more than 20 percent enacted in the Runion administration.

Runion contested those statistics, calling them "misleading." He said Guilderland has the lowest taxes of any town in Albany County, and since 1999, taxes have gone up from 25 cents per \$1,000 to 26 cents per \$1,000. He said legal fees spent on investigations brought about because of complaints by Grimm, and Republican Board member Warren Redlich, have contributed to the tax increase.

Runion said fees have been raised, but they pay for services in the town and lower insurance costs due to fire and building inspections.

"Mr. Grimm doesn't understand local government and hasn't taken the time to learn it," Runion said.

Stack said on Thursday, May 15, the party also interviewed Matt Nelligan but declined to endorse him. Nelligan is a former Guilderland High School teacher, co-chair of the Republican Party and employee of the state Senate, and although, Stack said, the party "found him to be a nice gentleman," the incumbents were endorsed based on their previous experience.

Stack said questions about Nelligan's "temperament" played a role in the party's decision to not endorse him. He cited the "reasonableness" of him leaving his position in the Guilderland Central School District, and worries about a Republican voting block of Nelligan, Grimm and Redlich as other reasons for not supporting him.

Nelligan has cited on numer-

ous occasions his "independent mindedness" as a strength for his campaign.

He said the lack of endorsement "demonstrates how out of touch the Conservative Party is with the average person's needs.'

He said the decision will only further the influence of "Democratic insiders" in town politics.

He said, though, he is disappointed to not receive the bid since he has consistently held strongly conservative views.

"It's something I've embodied my whole life," Nelligan said.

He cited the irony of media reports labeling him as a "conservative teacher" last summer when he was involuntarily transferred to Farnsworth Middle School from Guilderland High School as the result of a "culture climate inquiry."

He said Slavick and Pastore have voted "lock-step" with Runion, and the town knows little about their stance.

They're supposed to be a party of principle," he said.

Pastore, who did not receive the party's endorsement in 2005, was thankful for the bid, and said he is pleased to be the Conservative Party's choice.

"I'm thrilled to hear about the endorsement," Pastore said. "I look forward to being their preferred candidate. We've worked hard to uphold the ideals and principles of the Conservative Party."

Pastore said working toward a balanced budget, prudent spending and smart growth are important. He classified himself as a fiscal conservative.

He said the unique sense of community, along with a mix of residential, conservative, retail, agricultural and light industrial land use makes Guilderland "a very special place," and he looks forward to applying conservative ideals to managing them if re-elected.

Councilwomen Patricia Slavick also said she was thankful for the endorsement and was " privileged and honored to receive it."

"I feel great about it. I've reached out to all the parties and am pleased to get their support," he said. "Some folks have labeled me as someone who can't compromise, but for the past 45 years that simply hasn't been the case.'

Messina said he is seeking 'broad-based support to deliver broad-based leadership."

"I am pleased to have [the Conservative] endorsement and am continuing to seek other endorsements," he said.

Messina has met with the town's Republican Committee, who will be announcing a slate by month's end. He said he doesn't expect support from the Democratic party after the town's party dropped him in his interview for re-election to Town Board.

This constitutes Jordan's second official ballot line for Town Board and it is expected that Independence Party Chairman Paul Caputo will lend the party line to him as well. Taking over the party reins from Assembly Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem, this is Jordan's first run for office.

He works as Gordon's chief of staff.

Hanna remained unresponsive, according to police, and it became "obvious that the impairment was significant," and when he was advised he was under arrest, Hanna refused to comply with instructions to put his hands behind his back.

He "actively resisted a physical attempt to be handcuffed," the report states, and police used a Taser on him, "which made contact with the defendant, but was ineffective in gaining compliance."

Police said Hanna then attempted to leave the store but that a struggle took place and he "was taken down to the floor of the store" and that an investigator and an officer place him under custody.

Hanna damaged a credit card reader on the counter of the store during his struggle with police, according to the arrest reports.

Hanna's "physical and emotional status deteriorated quickly [and] he did not respond to questions and appeared unresponsive," the report states. During an EMS evaluation, He went "back and forth from unresponsive to body twitching to combative," according to police. An emergency worker was struck while attempting to treat Hanna.

He was transported to Albany Medical Center for further evaluation, which revealed that he endured cuts and abrasions as well as a slight fracture in his back as a result of the car crashes, the report states.


Police said Hanna was in possession of a credit card that was not in his name, and was not offered bail during his arraignment because of his previous criminal history.

According to police, Hanna has been arrested 55 times and only had a driver's permit, which was suspended three different times from failing to appear at the Town of Salisbury Court in Herkimer County.

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



Three Bethlehem boys track athletes placed second in their respective events at Saturday's Eddy Meet at Union College.


