We think the tape still exists'

Town searches for police chief's alleged racist conversation

In the midst of an investigation into an alleged tape recording of the Bethlehem police chief making racist remarks and allegedly ordering the tape erased, town officials said they believe the tape in question may still be out there.

Bethlehem town attorney James Potter told The Spotlight on Wednesday, June 3, that the audio recording, which was brought to light by police officer Christopher Hughes, is still being sought.

We think the tape still exists," Potter said. "To go back to find a particu-

lar conversation from three years ago is a daunting task."

Currently, incoming calls handled by the department's dispatchers are recorded and erased after 30 days. Potter said that system wasn't in place three years ago when Bethlehem Police Chief Louis Corsi supposedly took a phone call from the Albany County Sheriff's Office and made disparaging comments about one of his administrative officers.

"We have no reason to believe the tape was erased," Potter said. "We're not even aware if it's possible to erase the tapes."

That's a point Hughes has been making, as well.

Pay scales for local town employees online

In an effort to allow readers to "follow the money" more easily during these times of economic woe, The Spotlight is unveiling its online database of all town employee salaries in its coverage area.

A new component has been added to www.spotlightnews.com that will allow users to enter a name, municipality, position, salary range or any combination of queries into the database that will show who's

to bring in the biggest checks. The Town of Bethlehem's top

three salary earners are Supervisor Jack Cunningham, with \$106,890; Director of Management Information Services Jeffrey Dammeyer, with \$103,890; and Bethlehem Chief of Police Louis Corsi, with \$103,761.

"I have absolutely no problem with public disclosure at all when it comes to salaries," Cunningham said. "I do Q and A's in the schools all the time, and the first thing the kids always ask is 'How much do you make? They're always amazed

across the board."

Runion also said Guilderland has the lowest tax rate in Albany County. He noted that union negotiations regularly included data about average salaries for municipal employees, and the average salary of their employees is lower than neighbors Colonie and Bethlehem.

"I think we're doing pretty good," he said.

In the Town of New Scotland, the highest paid employee is Highway Superintendent Darrell Duncan at \$69,884. The town's Supervisor Tom Dolin comes in second at \$56,158, and building inspector Paul Cantlin comes in third at \$55,828. The salary information has been collected from payroll information provided by the town clerks offices of each municipality. The Web site database created for your town salaries will continue to grow as your town grows.



Sexual assault claim leads to heroin arrest incident was taken and police asked in to strip-search Kirker, which

A Delmar woman was arrested for heroin possession after calling Bethlehem police about a possible sexual assault.

Tara Kirker, 28, of 16 Equinox Court, Delmar, was arrested on May 27, at the Delaware Plaza for seventh-degree criminal possession of a controlled substance and possession of a hypodermic needle, both misdemeanors.

Bethlehem police said they received a call about a possible sexual assault at the Delaware Plaza and responded to the scene and found Kirker inside a grocery store at the store's customer service desk.

Kirker was "unaware where the assault occurred and only stated that the vehicle was a red pickup truck," according to the arrest report. She allegedly told police she met a man on the Internet and needed a ride back from South Lake Street in Albany to her home in Delmar.

Police said Kirker displayed no signs of injury or struggle and that she refused an EMS evaluation.

"Kirker claimed she stated 'no' when [the man] asked her for oral sex but otherwise did not resist" when he persisted, the report states. She denied that the man threatened to harm or kill her and did not know any "biographical information" about him beside his phone number, according to the report.

Police said Kirker claimed the man dropped her off at the grocery store and left the scene with her cell phone still inside of his vehicle. Attempts to make contact with the suspect were unsuccessful, police said.

Police interviewed the store's overnight manager who revealed that Kirker was with a white male in his 30s and that Kirker eventually brought a case of beer to the register and said "her friend was going to buy it," the report states.

The male apparently left the store and never showed up at the register, at which time a store employee discovered a pair of shoes and a bag in front of the store.

Police said when Kirker was asked about the possessions, she said the shoes were hers but not the bag. A deposition of the

Kirker if they could check her shoulder bag, which she agreed to, according to the arrest report.

Police discovered "a deck of heroin" inside a small pocket of her bag that weighed 0.34 grams and checked the bag outside of the store and discovered five unopened Guinness beer bottles, the report states.

A check inside the store revealed an opened six-pack with one beer remaining, but because there was no surveillance at the time, a larceny charge could not be substantiated against Kirker, according to police.

Bethlehem police said she was placed into custody and transported to the police station but that "while handcuffed at the squad table, an orange needle cap dropped from Kirkers's pant leg," which she initially denied ownership of.

Kirker "eventually turned over a small coin purse and hypodermic needle from her groin region," but the coin purse contained no contraband, the report states.

A female officer from the Albany Police Department was brought resulted in the discovery of another package of heroin weighing 0.35 grams, according to police, and when Kirker requested to go to the bathroom, the officer observed "a bulge in Kirker's right buttocks region."

Police discovered \$51 concealed on Kirker's person, but a second strip search failed to produce any more contraband or evidence in the case, the report states.

Kirker was processed at the Bethlehem Police Station and was scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on June 2.

Other arrests

 Guilderland Police arrested Karl Anthony Ridenour, 48, of 116 Gaylord St. in Wyalusing, Penn, on multiple charges, including public lewdness and aggravated DWI, on Thursday, May 28, according to

The reports state Ridenour was seen exposing himself by a witness in Tawasentha Park near the baseball fields. The police report alleges he was found behind the seat of his vehicle with the engine on and the chair reclined. There was an open beer can in sight, the report states. According to police. Ridenour was "partially clothed with his penis exposed," and when interviewed had an odor of alcohol on his breath.

The report states he allegedly said he had three beers and was napping while waiting to pick up his wife, who was in a meeting until 3:30 p.m. He was brought to the police station where his BAC was shown to be .18, the report states and he was arraigned and sent to the Albany County Jail in lieu of \$2,500 bail.

 Damian M. Brown, 28, of 17 West Sunnyside Drive, Troy, was arrested on May 27 for DWI; felony first-degree aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle; drinking alcohol in a motor vehicle on a highway; reckless driving; third-degree fleeing an

officer in a motor vehicle; refusal to take a breath test; unsafe passing on the left; unlawful possession of marijuana; driving on the shoulder of the roadway; and failure to keep right.

Bethlehem Police said they were notified of a 1986 Volvo driving south on Route 9W in Glenmont and that the operator of the vehicle was wanted by the Troy Police Department.

Brown was seen driving on 9W but his "vehicle then accelerated in speed and began to pass vehicles in an erratic manner," according to the arrest report, but when police activated their emergency lights and siren, he did not stop.

He was then seen "passing vehicles between southbound and northbound lands of travel," the report states, and while attempting to pass another vehicle, Brown "drove off the roadway down an embankment, crashing the vehicle on 9W."

Police said they apprehended Brown and his 27-year-old passenger, Tony G. Sterling from Queens. Brown told police "he had been drinking," and also "he had a pistol on his person, an AK-47 in his vehicle and a kilo of cocaine," according to the arrest report.

Officers on the scene said they could smell alcohol on Brown's breath and that he had slurred speech, the report states.

Bethlehem Police said a check of the vehicle did not reveal any weapons, but "a half-filled bottle of Gray Goose Vodka" was found open inside of the vehicle. A K9 Unit was brought onto the scene to search for weapons around the area, but none were found.

Brown was transported to the Bethlehem Police Department without incident and he started taking a field-sobriety test but "Mr. Brown stated that he would not perform any tests," the report states.

He allegedly refused to take a breath test, and search revealed a small amount of marijuana inside of Brown's sock, which he claimed possession of, according to police.

An EMS evaluation found no injuries to Brown and Bethlehem Town Justice Ryan Donovan sent him to the Albany County Correctional Facility in lieu of a \$25,000 bail, the report states, where he was transported without incident. Sterling was transported to the Greyhound Station in Albany without incident. Police said the Troy Police Department was notified of Brown's status and the vehicle was towed after its owner was notified. "Due to Mr. Brown's inability to cooperate, an incomplete arrest record form was completed," the report states.

Voters pass library budget, pick trustee

Residents approve zero tax levy increase and write in town worker for board

With a proposed zero percent tax levy increase, the Bethlehem Public Library easily and overwhelmingly passed its proposed budget and also saw quite a few write-ins for board of trustee.

The library's budget ultimately passed 2,341 votes to 1,154 votes.

With no one running for the board of trustees seat of library board secretary Rachel Baum, residents were allowed to write in their own candidates, which resulted in the Town of Bethlehem assistant senior services director getting the nod.

Joyce Becker is the town's newest Bethlehém Public Library trustee with 42 write-in votes. She said she is interested in the goings on of the town's library and decided to mount a write-in campaign when she looked at an absentee ballot.

"I saw a write-in spot on my husband's absentee ballot and said, 'Gee, that's something I would like to do," said Becker.

Her husband wrote in her name and that was the beginning of her "campaign," said Becker.

"It was a civics lesson on writing

in," said Becker. "I had no idea on how to do any of this. Actually, Matt Clyne was kind enough to come down and give us a little civics course and show us how to properly write in a candidate, which was very nice of him."

Clyne is the Albany County Democratic commissioner of the board of elections and the town's Democratic chairman.

Local businesswoman _ and Bethlehem Republican Chairwoman Melody Burns garnered the second most writeins for the one open trustee seat at 27 votes. Burns said she wasn't seeking a trustee seat, but must have had " a few fans out there."

Library Director Nancy Pieri thanked the community for the support.

"This was a great show of support with a 2-to-1 margin for our budget," Pieri said. "We look for ward to working with our new trustee."

There was no change proposed to the library's tax levy, so the tax rate will be similar to the 2008 rate. In Bethlehem, resident will pay \$1.22 per \$1,000 of assessed value and New Scotland residents will pay \$1.20.

"I've been on enough boards to know that I don't know everything about the library, but I am willing to learn," Becker said of her new role. "I know they do a lot of good and hope I can be a part of that."

In a surprise announcement, a longtime community staple is saying goodbye to the Four Corners in Delmar while a new owner is being welcomed to the community.

Beff's Restaurant owner Mickey Blanchfield said the decision to close the Delmar eatery was a tough one. The doors shut Sunday, June 7, for the last time. A new pub called Swifty's Restaurant and Pub and is expected to open at the location in about two weeks.

Not-so-green thumb achieves garden greatness

We must have had a really long, cold spring, because my family is especially excited to see this season turn into warm, sunny summer days. We celebrate this passage in many ways. First, we stay outside longer. Day by day, minute by minute, the time everyone comes inside gets later and later.

During the cold spring months, it's dinner, then maybe a short walk or soccer game in the backyard. Then a bath, a book or two, and the evening is over at 8:30. It feels good to tuck everyone into warm beds when it's cold and dark outside.

But now the evenings are long and warm. Dinner is rarely on the table before 7. My children race, hungry, to the table, eat heartily and run back to the yard.

There are many things pulling me outside right now, too. Elliot showing off his new two-wheeled bike. Zoe and Lucy doing a jump rope show. When I have a quiet moment, I like to walk among the flowers as they come up in our garden, watching their progress. Homework, dinner, showers, all the things that have to be done, take a back seat to looking for toads, swinging and watering flowers. It just takes a little longer to get to all the things we have to do. We're all too busy with the fun stuff.

The change of season always makes me reconsider what we



eat. As the farmers market season begins, the food on our table goes from warm stews to quick, light dishes – something like a simple piece of grilled meat, an easy salad and sliced fruit. The dishes are thrown in the sink, and there we are, back to the jump ropes and swings.

A ritual in our family as we step into summer is a trip to our favorite nursery. We choose flowers and herbs for our planters and window boxes. The kids get into it too, choosing a few flowers and declaring a small place in the garden their own. Each takes pride in this garden, for a few weeks, anyway. And when that small bunch of flowers is forgotten, Paul will take over, pulling the weeds and watering.

My husband really is the plant and garden person in our house. In my care, plants tend to die. Not so with Paul. He takes into account how much sunlight a certain place gets. And then he carefully chooses the right plant, considering the other plants around it. The result is a healthy plant, in a thoughtfully designed garden. My thought process goes something like this: Ooooh. Pretty flowers. Plant near the other pretty flowers. It's no A Really Nice Late Spring Salad A few handfuls of baby lettuce leaves (1 handful per person) 2 cups sugar snap peas 2 ounces crumbled goat cheese 1/2 cup toasted almonds 1/2 cup olive oil 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar A few tablespoons chopped chives Cracked black pepper and sea salt Wash and dry salad leaves. If they are small leaves, leave

them whole. If not, chop into bite-sized pieces. Place salad in a bowl. Slice the snap peas diagonally, so that the peas are cut in half. Leave the peas in their pods and arrange around the top of the salad. Place goat cheese and almonds over the greens. Mix the olive oil, vinegar and chives together with a crack of pepper and a sprinkle of salt, and dress the salad with just enough dressing right before serving. Any unused dressing will keep for a few days in the refrigerator.

surprise that plants will die in my care.

Last year, I came home on a warm summer afternoon after spending the day at Indian Ladder Farms. I brought home a big bag of apples and a small apple tree. I was so happy and proud of myself that I had chosen an apple tree for our yard. It would grow next to our deck, near the table. In a few years, it would tower over my children as they sat at the table. They would sit in the shade of this tree, playing a game or drawing. Elliot would pick apples, offering one to his sisters. Sounds nice, right?

And then the cold, hard truth from Paul: this tree will never survive in our yard. It's not sunny enough. And it won't ever produce apples. Who knew that one apple tree needs another to produce apples? Paul did. Too proud to admit defeat. I marched around back with my baby apple tree. We would have a beautiful apple tree. Just one that didn't produce apples, that's all. A minor dent in my plan. Carefully, I dug a hole, planted the tree just as I has learned to do. Not too deep, plenty of water. Paul didn't say a word. A week or so later, the tree looked alright, a little droopy maybe. But then the leaves started to turn brown. There was some serious drooping. Then all of the leaves were brown and on the ground. The baby apple tree was officially dead. When I wasn't home, Paul dug it up and dragged it out to the curb. And he never mentioned anything about how right he was.

As our family stood in the nursery this year, each of us was drawn to something different. Lucy headed down to check out the cactus selection. Zoe and Elliot took off toward the fish pond, wagon in tow. Paul went in the direction of annuals. I floated. The memory of my tree still fresh, I was reluctant to choose something that would die in my care. Paul smartly chose flowers perfect for the planters, window boxes and the shady part of the yard. He helped Zoe and Elliot choose flowers for each of their own gardens. And he explained to Lucy that a cactus wouldn't survive in our garden (hey, even I knew that.)

While all of this was going on, I was making a few decisions of my own. First, I would choose the plants for the big boxes that hang from our back deck. Probably the sunniest spot in our yard, I didn't have to take any chances with a plant that didn't like morning sun, or part shade. It didn't need to be complicated. So I turned around and left the flower department.

I left behind the petunias, begonias and all the rest. When I stopped walking I was in the center of the herb and vegetable greenhouse. There were rows and rows of lettuces: red and green, romaine, Bibb and mesclun. Paul found me there, to find his herbs. I told him the change in our plans: the back yard planters would be filled with lettuces this year, not flowers. He agreed that it was a good decision, the light was right and they could grow well there (yes!). So far, the lettuces are growing beautifully. A friend wisely taught me how to cut the little leaves, from the outside. Then the plant will produce more leaves.

A few weeks after they were planted, our lettuce grows green and bountiful. Not a brown or drooping leaf in site. My kids do sit on the deck, flanked by the lettuce plants. 

Guilderland Performing Arts Center gala to honor two

Park, town band also celebrate milestone anniversaries

The Guilderland Performing Arts Center is honoring two alumni at a multi-anniversary celebration on Friday, June 12.

Mona Golub and Don Webster are being honored at the event, which will be held at Mallozzi's Clubhouse on Western Turnpike, for their hard work and dedication to the performing arts center. At the same time, Tawasentha Park is celebrating its 40^{th} anniversary; GPAC its 30^{th} and the town band its 40^{th} , rounding out what is being called the 40/30/40celebration.

Golub, Price Chopper's vice president for public relations and consumer services, has booked shows for the GPAC's Thursday night concert series. Town band founder Webster is a retired Guilderland teacher.

Webster founded the town band in 1969 with a mix of students and adults, he said. In 1978, after the band had done performances at the Empire State Plaza, members considered forming something new.

Webster said he and the Guilderland League of Arts, which no longer exists, formed a committee and formally organized into the Guilderland Performing Arts Center in 1979. On July 4, 1980, the first show at the Guilderland Performing Arts Center at Tawasentha Park was held.

"It grew over the years," he said.

GPAC sponsors a Thursday night concert series that features free music and theater.

He said volunteers work hard to make the concert series possible.

"I felt very proud to work with all of the volunteers, contributors and supporters," he said.

He said Dennis Moore, director of parks and recreation, plays an important role in keeping the facilities up to par.

"He kept the whole thing going," he said. "He's an intricate part of the whole scene."

Webster sat on the board of directors and retired in 2001. He was also a music teacher, retiring in 1991, teaching at Guilderland High School and Farnsworth Middle School.

"I feel very fortunate to have the opportunity to teach instrumental music at Guilderland High School," Webster said.

Webster said he attends at least one show during the summer concert series. He has a home in Florida, near the Kennedy Space Center, and lives in Rotterdam with his wife, Mary Lynne, who also sat on the GPAC board of directors. Golub said the park is the perfect place to host the Thursday night concert series.

"It's a unique and beautiful setting," Golub said.

She also said she is proud to have been able to help bring the concert series to the community.

She said she served on the Guilderland Performing Arts. Center Board for a number of years, booking concerts for them as well.

"They're a wonderful organization, made up almost entirely of volunteers," Golub said.

She said she booked concerts in Central Park in Schenectady in 1990, then Washington Park in 1993, and GPAC reached out to her shortly after to help book

its concerts.

Moore said he is excited for this year's concert series.

"It's sort of a big year for us." They are planning a variety of different styles of music.

"We try to appeal to all different people in the community," he said.

There will be a theatrical performance of "The Titanic" this year, he said.

"We're glad to present these events. They're open to anybody," he said. "We have a lot of community support."

People are encouraged to bring picnic blankets and lawn chairs to the outdoor amphitheater.

"It's sort of like a mini-Saratoga," Moore said. "It's just a relaxing evening."

First, cut the fear mongering

Rudy Giuliani, during his 2008 presidential bid, came under fire for his persistent use of 9/11 as a plank in his campaign platform.

It seems as though Saratoga Springs Commissioner of Public Safety Ron Kim has taken a page out of Giuliani's book. Kim, reacting to Finance Commissioner Ken

Ivins' recommendation that the Public Safety Department trim \$1.3 million out of its budget, immediately proposed that the cuts be taken in the form of 14 fewer



firefighters and 19 fewer police officers. The chaos that would ensue would be biblical in its proportions, Kim assured.

This is a favorite tactic in the public safety circles—playing on the fears of what is mostly a well-to-do populace. Police Chief Edward Moore did the same thing last fall when he was justifying his department's rampant over time expenses. For that presentation, Moore trotted out Officer Adam Baker, who was injured on duty the year before, while trying to subdue a suspect. Moore played for the audience the frantic 911 call that went out to report Baker's near-fatal injury. It almost makes you wonder if on Sept: 5, 2007, when Seth Dawson used a razor blade to slice Baker's throat, he realized he was creating a spokesperson for countless inflated public safety budgets.

There has to be some middle ground between giving the public safety department whatever they want and letting all hell break loose on the streets of one of Upstate New York's premier destination cities. And, quite frankly, that middle ground has to be recognized by the city's leaders.

Suggesting that the Public Safety Department look at ways to save money does not mean a person is anti-safety, pro-crime or that they want — god forbid — another officer to have his throat slashed on the streets downtown. Posturing as though that's exactly what will happen if the public safety budget is affected in any way is petulant and unproductive.

There are responsible and productive ways to make cuts in the city's budget. Commissioners should take a hard look at their administrative payroll, for example. In a city where departments have commissioners, deputy commissioners and other underbosses, eliminating layers of management would be a good way to save money, but to do so would mean looking at charter reform in a serious and responsible way — much like the way looking at public safety cuts should be handled.



Birth of CD is a labor of love

The writer is the sports editor for Spotlight Newspapers, but for this column, consider him to be speaking strictly as a musician.

After many, many months of recording sessions, mixing sessions and waiting for the finished product, I am proud to say I finally have my first "professional" CD.

To celebrate the completion of "Take Me Anywhere," I'm throwing a CD release party Saturday night on the downstairs stage at Valentine's Music Hall (17 New Scotland Ave., Albany). Along for the ride are roots rockers Sumac and Jo Henley.

(Side note: I put professional in quotation marks because I still don't consider myself to be a professional musician. But after listening to the finished product, I can say that this sounds professional, which was the overall intent. I wanted to make a professional-sounding album, even if I'm not a professional musician.)

It took quite a while to get to this point. I started recording the album in November 2007, and the final, fully mastered version wasn't complete until late April. Add in the pressing and packaging, and that takes me almost right up to Saturday's release party.

I didn't intend to take nearly two years to make this album, but when you record at a busy studio like Collar City Sound in Troy, you don't have the same convenient access as you would if you recorded at home. I was lucky if I got into the studio twice in one month.

Fortunately, when I did get in the studio, things went pretty quickly. Most of that has to do with my friend, Frank Moscowitz. Not only did he admirably handle most of the engineering duties, but he also made many valuable

musical contributions to the songs whether it was playing an instrument, adding backing vocals or adding something as simple as a whistling solo (you'll find that on "Grasping at Straws").

When Frank couldn't make it into the studio to engineer the recording sessions, Seamus McNulty filled in admirably. But when it came to the mixing sessions, Frank was there from beginning to end taking the various tracks and cleaning them up. I think Frank considered this album to be as much his baby as it was mine, which is why it turned out as well as it did. You want someone behind the dials who is as passionate about the project as you are. Otherwise, it's not going to come out the way you wanted it.

A number of friends helped me with the recording, as well. Steve Candlen handled most of the drumming duties and did yeoman's work on some backing vocals (he layered his voice at the end of "Livin' the Dream" to the point where he made himself sound like the Eagles). He also let me record one of his songs, "Calm before the Storm," which I think turned out great.

Albert Von Schaaf – better known to the area music scene as Albie – laid down some seriously rocking guitar solos. We're talking face-searing, gutbusting guitar solos. Seriously, when you hear "40 Miles out of Memphis" or "Freight Train," do not turn the volume past 10, no matter how tempted you might be. You will not have a face or any guts left.

When Albie didn't handle the lead guitar duties, Troy Pohl (of Kamikaze Hearts fame) and JV Abbey took over with some tasty, melodic licks. Troy also got into the layering spirit with a threelevel guitar solo on "Gotta Get Goin'" that once again invoked the Eagles. JV did his part with some bluesy interjections on "Welcome to the Crew," which is one of my favorite songs on the CD. (Actually, all the songs are good, but some can't help but stand out. "Welcome to the Crew" is one that stands out.) I lucked out when Katie Haverly agreed to come in one night and add some vocals. Her work on "The Old Town" turned a good song into a great song. She even made me sound good on the harmonies, which is no small feat since I'm not a classically trained singer.

is a terrific singer-songwriter, not to mention very good at improvised comedy with the Mop and Bucket Company.)

Women figure prominently in the creation of the album. Besides Katie, I had help from violinist Megan Prokorym (knotworking/ Swamp Baby) on "Grasping at Straws," and Amanda Fry and her friend Noel came in to lend their vocals to "Giants." Their contributions were great, even if it was for a song.

Once the recording and mixing sessions were finished, there was still the matter of making the album sound bright and lively. For that, I sent the album to Chicago, where Carl Saff put the tracks through his machines to master the product. The result is an album that sounds as professional as any mass-produced CD you'd find in a record store.

Now, I could have taken that final product, put it onto a computer and mass produced CDs on my own, but it wouldn't look as professional as what the gang at Sire Press in Philadelphia did with it. I sent them the album and the artwork (photograph's courtesy of Alicia Solsman), and they sent me back 120 slick-looking CDs. Definitely a lot better than trying to do it on my own. I didn't want to hand-write 120 copies of track listings if I could avoid it.

So now that I have the finished product, it's time to take it to the masses. The first opportunity will be Saturday night, and the best news is that I will have a full band backing me up at the show including Albie on lead guitar and Frank Moscowitz on bass and backing vocals. Drummer Pete Sheehan will be joining us to provide the backbeat.

The crazy part for me is that I will be pulling double duty that night. Besides my own set, I'm playing keyboard in Sumac, which will be opening the show with 30 minutes of country rock (in the best sense of the phrase). So, I'm sort of opening for myself. Weird, huh?

If you want to get an idea as to what the album is like, I posted three songs on my reverbnation page (reverbnation. com/robjonas). There are also a couple of songs from an EP I recorded back in 2006 on the player,, so you can hear the difference between the EP and the full-length CD.

Mixed-age classes create **'Lost Children of Bethlehem'**

Due to miscalculations in the enrollment estimates at Clarksville Elementary, Bethlehem Superintendent Dr. Michael Tebbano and the School Board have recently suggested that the current kindergarten class be merged next year with the class above or below.

So called mixed-age classes are surprisingly common in the Bethlehem Central School District and are fueled by budgetary concerns. What is unprecedented this time around is the highly probable plan that this group of students will be mixed-age for all of their elementary years and always will be educated at the lowest age. Both ideas are unique for BCSD and are unacceptable to any parent or child in the district.

We all pay our fair share of taxes. so why should any child's education be watered-down, especially given the current budget allocated for enough teachers to keep this group together? When faced with such logic, Tebbano made it clear that his focus is on the system (read: budget) and not any one child or group. That notion was echoed further when one special-needs parent asked how a single teacher could address her child fully along with both a kindergarten and firstgrade group. Tebbano replied that the district "would do their best."

embarrassing to hear from the head of the Bethlehem School District, whose current school ranking is near, or at the top of, its class.

Temporary reshuffling of class sizes due to enrollment are palatable, especially given budget constraints, but the recurring loop plan offered is not. This group of Lost Children is being discriminated against in terms of educational quality based on redistricting mishaps. Tebbano and the board have lost their way and should be replaced. None of the members have children enrolled at Clarksville and none have encountered more than one year of mixed-age classes.

I am curious what the plan would be if Tebbano or the School Board did have a child facing this lesser, if not outright inferior, form of elementary education. What is clear, however, is the signal that Tebbano is sending across Delmar, New Scotland, Glenmont and Clarksville: the once stable brand identity and overall quality of education at Bethlehem are both in play.

Flash forward a few years from now: if Clarksville's enrollment is presently lower than expected, where will it be given the choices of potential homebuyers and future

G'land Industrial Park at risk of losing tax break

Change in legislation places nearly 650 businesses on cusp of **Iosing Empire Zone status**

The Northeastern Industrial Park off Route 146 in Guilderland is among a number of business entities that could lose its Empire Zone certification, according to state officials.

Empire State Development is reviewing Empire Zone certified businesses in order to determine which have the best cost-benefit analysis.

"To participate in the Empire Zones Program, a business must first be located in an empire zone, or qualify as a regionally significant project, and become zone certified. To qualify for certification, a business must be able to demonstrate that it will create new jobs and/or make investments in the empire zone and be consistent with the local zone's development plan, including a cost-benefit analysis,' according to the ESD Web site.

Members of the Empire Zone program received tax exemptions from the state and local level.

According to information from Empire State Development, changes include a Real Property Tax Credit reduction of 25 percent for businesses certified on or after April 1.

"The entity Northeastern Industrial Park is one of 647 identified for potential decertification under this year's Empire Zone reforms. Whether its certification is revoked or not, there is also a June 30, 2010 sunset date for the program which means that unless the program is reauthorized, then no additional businesses can be certified at that location," said Katie Krawczyk, Upstate director of public affairs for Empire State Development.

There are also three new grounds for decertification. according to Krawczyk's office.

"Shirt-changers," or businesses reincorporating prior to Aug. 1, 2002 in order to maximize tax benefits, will be decertified. Businesses in the Empire Zone program for a minimum of three years having a benefit-cost ratio of less than 1:1 will be eliminated from the program, as well as those with a change in ownership or those that leave the Empire Zone

Multiple phone calls to representatives from the Northeastern Industrial Park were unreturned.

WFP endorses Messina, Jordan

Working Families Party gives Messina and Jordan additional ballot lines

Pulling in his second official ballot line, Councilman Sam Messina continues to build up support for Bethlehem town supervisor.

The Working Families Party of the Capital District has lent its support to both Messina and Bethlehem Independence Party Chairman Mark Jordan. The third-party line is Messina's second and Jordan's third.

"I am proud to accept the endorsement of the Working Families Party," Messina said. "I believe in the values of the party in how it speaks to the problems of everyday people. ... It means a lot to me to receive this endorsement."

Jordan, a leader in the world of third party politics himself, said he is thankful for the support.

"I'm very happy. If all goes well, I'm looking forward to appearing on four ballot lines," said Jordan. "I'm looking forward to an energetic campaign this summer and am grateful for the opportunity and the support I've received."

Karen Scharff, co-chair of the Working Families Party Capital District chapter, said even though Messina and Jordan may have some differences, they are both a good fit.

"They applied for the endorsement and we thought they both really epitomized the party," Scharff said. "Even though we realize in Bethlehem politics they may not be allies, we felt both of them displayed our core values."

Messina is an Independence Party member and was running for the same seat as his political boss, Jordan, before announcing his run for supervisor. Messina described his original interview with Jordan for Town Board as "uncomfortable." (See related story, page 10.)

Messina and Jordan received the Conservative Party endorsement, which is typically on the opposite side of political spectrum, but the supervisor hopeful said he is building a broad-based collation of supporters in his 2009 election bid.

"I believe in many of the party's principals, such as campaign finance reform," Messina said. "I've been reaching out to people of all political backgrounds and have a history of doing so." Jordan said politics are a little different locally.

"There aren't too many races that a candidate receives three minor party endorsements," said Jordan. "There's a natural tension between the parties because of ideology, but the tension are lessened on the local level. ... Local politics are different than on the state level."

Jordan is chief of staff for Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem, the state's only Independence Party member in the Assembly.

Scharff said the Working Family Party focuses on middle class struggle.

"We look at the records of all the candidates from both parties, and endorse the ones that will put working families first, ahead of big-money interests or their own political gain." Scharff said in a release. "When you vote on the Working Families line, you send a powerful message about good jobs and rebuilding an economy that works for the middle class."

The party reports that it drew over 210,000 votes statewide for its Congressional candidates and just under 160,000 votes for President Barack Obama last November on its "Row E" ballot line.

"I think lines are important, but not just in the practical nature," Messina concluded. "You are not only accepting the support of the party, but you are accepting the responsibility to represent the people who are a part of those parties."

The Albany County Independence Party has unanimously endorsed Democrat Jack Cunningham based on his record over its own member for Bethlehem town supervisor.

The party also cross endorsed Democratic Councilman Kyle Kotary for re-election, Democrat Nanci Moquin for an open. town clerk seat, Bethlehem Independence Party Chairman Mark Jordan for his first Town Board bid, and Republican Gregg Sagendorf in his bid for another term as highway superintendent.

All of the picks were unanimous.

Left out of the equation is Councilman Sam Messina, a member of the party, in his bid to unseat Cunningham as supervisor. Councilwoman Joann Dawson is also an **Independence Party member**

Messina said he is unsure why his party did not lend its support but that he will now be appealing directly to the people.

"I am in the Independence Party, and I have acted during my full Town Board involvement in the best interest of the Independence Party,' Messina said when The Spotlight informed him of his nomination loss. "Bethlehem voters will make up their own minds about who they want."

Messina said Cunningham can expect to primary for the ballot line.

"I think I represent the people in Bethlehem who have registered in the Independence Party to be able to think and act independently," said 'Messina. "The bottom line is I am the only person in the Independence Party running for supervisor, and I am the only one in this



race acting with independent values."

Cunningham said he. is no stranger to primaries, particularly an Independence Party primary, after winning his first in 2001 for Bethlehem Town Board.

"I've won more Independence primaries than anyone else in Albany County," Cunningham said.

The endorsement comes as a big win for him after Messina announced his candidacy with accusations of political insider governance. Cunningham says the solid vote of confidence validates his tenure, while Messina says the endorsement only validates his point about political cronyism.

"Jack Cunningham has been entirely about control and expedience," Messina said of his opponent's record on open government. "The Independence Party has a chance to be great by being independent."

The announcement comes on the heels of Messina and Jordan's endorsement by the state's Working Families Party, adding an extra line for each of the Independence Party members (See related story, page 9).

As it stands now, Cunningham has the Democrat and Independence lines for supervisor and Messina has the Conservative and Working Families Party lines, but is expected to also receive the town's Republican Party. nomination.

The Independence line could give Cunningham two lines, with a major party and a minor party line, or it could give Messina four lines, with a possible major party .: and three minor party lines.

Jordan said he was happy to get the Independence Party nomination.

"In Bethlehem, the Democratic and Independence parties have' worked very well together in past years and we look forward to continuing to work with each other in the future," said Jordan who is the party's town chair and chief of staff for Assemblyman Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem.

Jordan's cross-party "running mate," Kotary, said he was happy to get the unanimous support of the Independence Party for the second time in his re-election bid for Town Board. "I'm very pleased and honored to receive this nomination again," Kotary said. "I'm very thankful to our town chair Mark Jordan and county chair Paul Caputo as well as Assemblyman Tim Gordon for all of their support.

Crossgates customers take part in free CPR class

Instructors say anyone can be a first responder

Everyone is a potential first responder when someone has a heart attack. This is the reason the National Heart Group, along with Pyramid Security, sponsored a free class for Crossgates Mall patrons to learn the basics of first response and emergency CPR Tuesday, June 2.

"These are regular, run-of-themill people. They come from all walks of life," said Bill Gardner, one of the instructors at the class and co-owner of The National Heart Group, based in Latham. The National Heart Group is a privately owned, emergency medical training provider, according to its Web site. "We're showing them how to save-their family or friend's lives."

Gardner said an e-mail and flier campaign, along with information distributed through area fire departments, encouraged participants to come to the event to learn CPR and use an automatic external difibrillator, or AED.

"This is the first line of defense for someone in cardiac arrest," Gardner said.

"The statistics are compelling," said Ed O'Brien, Gardner's counterpart at the National Heart Group in a written statement. "Knowing CPR doubles or triples the chances of survival for someone suffering cardiac arrest. The more people we can train, the more lives we can save."

O'Brien also added that knowing CPR is important since a majority of accidents occur in the home, where no AED is available.

Ed Rose, head of security at the Aviation Mall in Queensbury, security director of Pyramid Companies, certified CPR instructor and a regional representative of the American Heart Association, said the Aviation Mall has had 11 cardiac arrests dating back to 2003, and

each victim was successfully resuscitated by mall personnel trained in CPR.

Pyramid holds 30 to 40 classes each year, training 200 to 250 employees, according to the AHA.

Rose said offering the classes at a mall, to mall patrons, makes sense since such a high volume of shoppers are elderly and seeking to get exercise from walking around. Many of them are at high risk for heart attack, and the more people who are qualified to step in and perform emergency procedures, the better chance they will save a person's life, Rose said.

Rose explained the emergency response steps to the participants. First, a responder must lift the victim's head and chin and determine if he or she is breathing. Then, the victim s nose is pinched to prevent the air blown into the mouth from coming back out. The responder then gives the victim two, onesecond breaths. After that, responders begin a series of "30 good, high-quality compressions" on the chest.

"That is the most vital part of



CPR," Rose said.

Rose also discussed using the AED, and explained how the equipment instructions will describe to the responder what to do and whether shocks are required. Rose said it is basically mistake proof.

"It makes the decisions for you," he said. "It tells you everything you need to know."

Rose went over several unique situations, such as metal necklaces that might need to be removed, or a thick layer of chest hair. He said for the latter, a second set of pads is included in the AED kits, so that the first pair could be used to rip the hair off.

Gardner quipped that if the victim was able to feel the pain from ripping the hair off, as one participant was concerned about, you might have stung him back to consciousness.

Rose said the AED should be used in all possible cases. CPR should be performed until an ambulance arrives or the person performing it is physically exhausted.


One participant, Heather Rider, said she decided to come to the class because she wanted to be prepared in case anything ever happened to someone in her family.

"It's something you need to know," Rider said.

The event takes place during National CRP and AED Awareness Week, according to information from the American Heart Association. By the end of the week, it hopes to have 1 million newly trained CRP responders.




that ultimately made the Albany County endorsements.

"To be honest with you, we're a little different than other political parties," Caputo said about it. "We look at the individual records, we typically don't look at the party like that."

Messina disagreed with those sentiments, saying a political majority in town could help further the party's core values of open independent government outside of the rule of political bosses.

"The Independence Party should stand for something and stand on its own feet," Messina said. "That should be more important than developing political relationships with other parties that do not have independent values."

South Bethlehem is embedded in state history

Small hamlet is part of just about every major structure in the Capital District

Editor's note: This is the third article of a nine-part series of historical features on the hamlets of Bethlehem in commemoration of this year's Quadricentennial. The next feature article, in the second week of July, will focus on the hamlet of Selkirk.

SOUTH BETHLEHEM — If you're digging up a little history on South Bethlehem, you won't have to dig far. In fact, just about every major structure and arterial roadway in the Capital District has roots in the little hamlet near the Coeymans town line.

The hamlet has many historical offerings for the area, but far and away, it was Callanan Industries that put South Bethlehem on the map. As one of the area's biggest employers in the 19th and 20th centuries, the name Callanan has been stamped on a number of projects, from The Egg in Albany to the New York State Thruway that cuts across the state.

However, not all of the news from Callanan Industries was good. As we celebrate this year's Quadricentennial of Henry Hudson and Samuel De Champlain's explorations, coincidentally, exactly 100 years ago an explosion rocked South Bethlehem.

On May 12, 1909, about 20 people were killed, including two of the Callanan brothers, when more than 1,000 pounds of dynamite prematurely exploded.

The headline in the New York Times the next day read, "Blast in Quarry Kills 20 Men."

The notable deaths reportedly found at the blast site included John Hoyt Callanan of Albany, vice president and general manager; Charles D. Callanan of Albany, the manager's brother; Leroy McMillan of Voorheesville, assistant superintendent; John Hendrickson of South Bethlehem, steam driller foreman; Fred Snyder of South Bethlehem, master mechanic; James Maloney of South Bethlehem, a blacksmith; William Baumes of South Bethlehem, a fireman;



and Fred Zappert of New York, an agent of the National Powder Company.

The *Times* reported that an additional "12 Italian workmen" died in the blast.

"One thousand pounds of dynamite exploded, scattering the bodies of the victims for hundreds of feet around, and it was with difficulty that the blackened, dismembered remains, mutilated almost beyond recognition, were identified," according to the article. "It was first believed that the death roll would reach thirty, but tonight several Italian workmen who had been reported as missing were accounted for."

There were also descriptions of a wagons being loaded up with the bodies as grief-stricken relatives gathered to identify their loved ones. The dynamite blast was scheduled for 5 p.m., but around 2 p.m., an explosion was heard that hurled tons of rock on the workers below.

Homes were rattled and windows were reported broken from substantial distances all around the South Bethlehem quarry.

To add to the mayhem, the explosion set off a fire in the nearby woods that spread in the direction of the company's dynamite storehouse. Fortunately, the fire was extinguished before it reached the storehouse.

However, the five unexploded charges of dynamite remained at the blast site, which hampered recovered efforts, as those searching for bodies feared there could be another series of explosions at anytime.

The only fatal explosion at the quarry prior to that was 20 years earlier when three men were killed.

There was another explosion mishap on June 16 in 1891, and although nobody was killed, company founder Peter Callanan nearly died from embarrassment.

More than 2,000 people gathered in South Bethlehem from all across the area to see more than 50,000 cubic yards of limestone displaced from the quarry walls. Preparation for the event had been weeks in the making, with even New York Gov. David Bennet Hill in attendance, according to state records.



set off the charges and put on a show for the spectators, which was a first for the Callanan Company at the time.

However, when 16-year-old Helen Callanan pulled the lever at 4:30 p.m. that afternoon, nothing happened.

Callanan Industries continues today. Its projects include the 1939 World's Fair – New York City; Empire State Plaza, The Egg; Albany International Airport; Schenectady County Airport; New York State

The company was founded by Peter Callanan in 1883 in South Bethlehem, as an aggregate mining company. A farmer and entrepreneur, Callanan helped pioneer the concept of a state highway system, and in 1895 won the first road-building contract given by New York State.

Callanan Industries was purchased in 1985 by Oldcastle, Inc., .a multi-national Dublin, Ireland-based firm.

"I don't think they could have erased that tape even if they wanted to," Hughes told *The Spotlight* in an exclusive interview about Corsi allegedly asking his dispatchers to erase his recorded conversation.

Hughes said he has been the target of a town and police investigation since coming out with the allegations against Corsi as well as raising questions about other internal problems dealing with the union, complaints against a detective on the force and medical absence procedures.

They're trying to force me out, but I'm doing this for the right reasons," Hughes said. "I've been in law enforcement for 17 years, I have. nothing to hide."

The 13-year Bethlehem police veteran was been handed back-toback 30-day suspensions in April and May, which he attributes to speaking out. Town officials say Hughes was suspended for abusing his sick time privileges and filing false documents for extra overtime pay and time off of work.

The town is insinuating Hughes cried foul against Corsi after being served his suspensions. The Bethlehem Police Benevolent Association has filed grievances against the suspensions.

Hughes said he was bringing up internal problems through the chain of command long before he spokeout about the alleged audiotape of Corsi stating, "We have a [racial epithet] in the wood pile.

Potter said the county may hold the audio recordings off site and be the only entity able to erase the recordings, but he could say little else because the matter is under investigation. An official complaint was filed with the Albany County District Attorney's Office Public Integrity Uniton Thursday, May 28.

Hughes said the recording of Corsi was three years old but suggests it sparked a town cover-up once he started raising issues about it. He said he spoke with Supervisor Jack Cunningham at his home about the alleged tape and was issued a "notice of intent to conduct interrogation" two days later about his conversation with the supervisor.

Although he didn't attend the interrogation on advice of his lawyer Steve Coffey, Hughes also sent out a letter to the town board in April that was never handed out by Cunningham. The supervisor said he did not give Hughes' letter to his board members on advice from Potter, who advised against it because of the ongoing nature of the internal investigation.

Potter said everyone with access to the tape was interviewed "to the best of our knowledge," but it is unconfirmed at this time if all the dispatchers and dispatcher supervisors have been interviewed in the ongoing investigation.

Hughes' allegation of an internal racism cover-up raises some questions about the nearly completely Caucasian male police force of 43 officers that serves the suburbantown of around 35,000 residents.

There is only one female officer on the force, and she made discrimination allegations against Corsi and Lt. Thomas Heffernan in 2007. The Spotlight ran a story about the matter on July 18, 2007, when police officer Regina Cocchiara, a nine-year veteran at the time, claimed she was passed up for sergeant four times after applying for the job. She said she was passed over for male applicants even though she placed in the top three on the Civil Service exam.

Cocchiara was eventually promoted to patrol sergeant on Aug. 18, 2008. She is the town's first female police sergeant and is now an 11-year veteran of the Bethlehem Police Department.

"It has become apparent through some very deep reflection and discussions with my peers that I have been unfairly discriminated against in this process," Cocchiara wrote to the Town Board in 2007 after not being promoted. "I am concerned that my actions and courage to achieve justice may result in future disciplinary or punitive measures against me.'

Hughes said the Cocchiara situation last year only highlights a pattern of discrimination and "punishing those who speak out."

Cunningham said that diversify-

ing the town's police force has been a longtime goal of the town.

"Both my predecessor and I have encouraged diversity on the force, but we have to hire off of the Civil Service list, and an opportunity has not presented itself," Cunningham said. "It is something we are very cognizant of."

Hughes is currently out on "stress leave" until June 12, but he could be out longer. Although he was served the unpaid suspensions, he is in the middle of a union grievance process and therefore is still currently on the force pending the outcome of the grievance and permission from his doctor.

The Spotlight has obtained copies of both of the "notice of discipline," which effectively calls for Hughes' suspension, and both of the disciplinary grievances in response.

Hughes said on Sunday, June 7, that he received an official response from Cunningham's office that stated, "I agree with Deputy Chief [Timothy] Beebe," and that the "grievance was denied." The next step is arbitration, which Hughes said he was confident would go in his favor.

"The first suspension notice is ridiculous; it's not being taken seriously," Hughes said. "It sounds like the second one [the union] may actually sit down with them, but the charges are still nonsense."

According to the first disciplinary action filed against Hughes by the town in April, he is accused of three charges of misconduct absence without leave on April 3, improper use of sick time and filing a false report.

Hughes said the town is trying to violate state HIPPA laws by saying the doctor's note he provided wasn't good enough" and that he was asked to provide personal medical details of his reasons for absence.

A copy of the doctor's note dated April 5 reads, "Chris was seen today for an illness. He missed 4/3- 4/5/09 as a result." A union grievance to the charges was signed by attorney Thomas Jordan on April 22, citing Section 22.2 (D) of the collective bargaining agreement.

The second disciplinary action filed in May accused Hughes of an additional three charges of misconduct: Making a false claim for overtime pay, filing a false instrument and filing false report.

A grievance citing the same section of the collective bargaining agreement as the first was filed on May 28.

Potter expressed some frustration over his legal obligations and said disclosure will be provided upon the conclusion of the investigation over the whole matter.


"I really wish I could say more but unfortunately, legally our hands are tied," he said. "He can say whatever he wants and get his side of the story out, and we can't do anything about it because this is still under investigation."

"It's pretty standard for contracts of those sorts," William West, water superintendent said. West said Guilderland and Watervliet renegotiated their



Town Supervisor Ken Runion said the next billing cycle would see a \$140,000 increase if the new contract had not been approved.

He said the way the language was penned in the contract signed in 1993, the Consumer Product Index was based and compounded from 1993 and would jump 3 percent after 2000 for every year since 1993, making it an 18 percent jump. Every three years. after that, West said, the language was ambiguous, but seemed to indicate that the jump would be based on the CPI from 1993, not 2000, causing increases to compound each time they mse

"In three years we would have been nailed," he said.

West also said that under the 1993

contract, the town paid for a minimum of 4 million gallons of water per day, but if they averaged more than that for one month, even by a little, the new minimum became 5 million gallons per day.

Under the new contract, the town must average more than 4 million gallons for two full months before the minimum is raised, and it would only go up in smaller increments if that happened.

West said an optimal contract would be one where you pay only for what you use, but this is a marked improvement from the 1993 one. It also has an option to opt out if Watervliet begins producing finished water, as it would be selling a different product. Either party has 60 months to do so.

Guilderland and Watervliet have discussed a proposal to build a new water treatment plant together.

"Ultimately I'd like to see if the two sides can sit down and see us at some common ground," West said. "For years and years we've talked about regionalization."

As part of the agreement, more accurate state-of-the-art meters will be purchased for about \$10,000, which the town and Watervliet will split. Town Board Member Warren Redlich said the language of the new contract was a not clear and a change was made because it was approved. It was designed to clarify yearly rate increases.

"From a legal standpoint, you lawyers need to be comfortable with the language," West said.



Store founders celebrate a milestone year

Pearl Grant Richman's marks 50th anniversary as husband and wife team toast 70 years together

In 1939, Albert Einstein wrote a letter to President Franklin D. Roosevelt stating atomic energy might be more than just a fantasy. In 1939, the movie version of "The Wizard of Oz" took viewers on a fantastic Technicolor journey for the first time. In 1939, Rose and Jerry Richman were married in Albany at the Ohav Shalom temple, and they are celebrating their 70th wedding anniversary this year.

The Richmans, who founded Pearl Grant Richman's, in Stuyvesant Plaza, now live in West Palm Beach, Fla. They will celebrate their anniversary on Thursday, June 11.

Jerry Richman, 91, said he met his wife, Rose, 92, one day while sitting out on a porch at a friend's house. He was in the process of moving from Schenectady, where he attended high school, to Albany, he said, and they hit it off.

Richman said that was the year he graduated high school, 1935, and he married Rose a few years later.

Jerry worked at a men's shop before buying up the store that later became Richman's Cards and Gifts. He said after three days of receiving merchandise, they needed to expand, and they did, purchasing a lot right next door. At the time, rent was \$575 a month for both stores.

. Eventually, the owner of Pearl Grant, a store nearby in Stuyvesant Plaza, became ill, and her brother offered the store Jerry. It then became Pearl Grant Richman's. That was 50 years



ago, in 1959.

• "My wife worked by my side all these years," he said.

Jerry was also the original president of the merchants association, a guild of local businesses in Stuyvesant Plaza. That job was later passed to his son, Barry.

Jerry said he is enjoying his retirement, but he often wishes he had a little more youth and energy to get out to the golf course.

Rose added that being married for 70 years is quite an accomplishment. "It feels pretty good," she said.

Barry Richman operates the store now and has been working there for as long as it has been around.

"It has a lot of history and a lot of consistency," he said. "It's great to be a 50-year store."

The family has expanded into other businesses, opening a Crabtree and Evelyn store in Stuyvesant Plaza and Ta-Da, a novelty toy and gift shop, in Clifton Park, as well as selling a line of Vera Bradley merchandise.

The "young, hip crowd" loves Ta-Da, Barry said. His son, Michael Richman, runs the store.

take over Pearl Grant Richman's, Barry pointed out, as he still works there as well as running Ta-Da.

"I can't do it without him," Barry said. "It's all going to be his some day anyway."

uring her years in the theater, Nellie Beavers has learned that bigger shows need as many as

six or eight tractor-trailers to transport everything.

So when she tells colleagues how many trucks "Walking with Dinosaurs" requires, they're often stunned.

"We have 25 semi-trucks that carry this show," Beavers said.

That's "Walking with Dinosaurs" in a nutshell: a show that's enormous in every way. Capital District residents can catch the show that bills itself as "the arena spectacular" Wednesday to Sunday, June 17 to 21, at the Times Union Center

in Albany.

The show is more than just giant dinosaurs stomping around an arena. An actor plays a paleontologist named Huxley who "takes the audience on a journey 200 million years ago." Beavers said.

But make no mistake – the spectacle is what will leave the impression. Some fun "Walking with **Dinosaurs**" facts:

• There are 10 large dinosaurs in the show. Each one weighs 1.6 tons, or roughly the same as a standard family car.

The adult Brachiosaurus

measures 36 feet tall and 56 feet long. The young Brachiosaurus is "only" 29.5 feet tall and 48 feet long.

Orinthocherius has a 38-foot wing span. The touring company includes 15 cast members and 45 crew members.

> - are called suit dinosaurs. There's just one person inside of those. manipulating the entire creature.
