Police arrest man after bout with officer

Guilderland Police arrested Dennis P. Rivenburg, 51, of 3728 Carman Rd. in Schenectady, on several charges, including felony assault with intent to cause physical injury to an officer, on Monday, July 13, according to police.

Rivenburg was also charged with trespassing, escape in the third degree and harassment in the second degree, after he allegedly caused a disturbance in the Serafini Building, located at 3724 Carmen Rd.

Upon police arrival, the report states, Rivenburg was yelling at Angelo Serafini and shouting profane language.

Police also said they heard the sound of broken glass, and described the suspect as "irate and intoxicated." When Rivenburg was asked to put his hands on his head, he allegedly raised his arms "like he wanted to fight," police said.

After complying, Rivenburg was said to have dropped to his knees after a handcuff was placed on his right arm and attempted to tackle the arresting officer. The report states that the officer regained control of his left arm, but Rivenburg still did not comply with orders to put his right arm behind his back. A struggle ensued and mace was used, however Rivenburg

continued to resist.

With the help of Serafini, police were able to get hand cuffs on both hands. Officer Joseph Normadin, the arresting officer and victim of the alleged attack, was treated at Albany Medical Center for pain and swelling in his forearm.

The suspect was decontaminated at the Guilderland police station, and complained of chest pains, which were addressed by EMS.

He was placed in a Western Turnpike Ambulance. He then allegedly spit in another officer's right eye and ear.

Rivenburg was transported to the Albany Medical Center for evaluation and arraigned on Thursday, July 23, the report states.

The four youths resided at the Glenmont Job Corps and were charged with third-degree grand larceny, a felony; fifth-degree conspiracy; improper license

plates; unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle; and parking on pavement.

Bethlehem Police said a resident called and reported "two youths" on his property and saw Anderson and Corea "run from the property and meet up with a third youth [Delgado] and all get into a grey Jeep" and drive north on River Road.

The caller then followed the Jeep but just before Corning Hill Road it pulled to the side of the roadway and stopped, according to the arrest reports. Four people then got out of the vehicle and approached the caller's vehicle causing him to back up his vehicle just before they "ran into the woods."

Another police officer arrived on the scene and found the Jeep on River Road, which was not locked but no keys were found, the report states.

Police said they discovered the license plates on the jeep did not match the vehicle, which were later determined to be U.S. government issued plates from another vehicle at the Glenmont Job Corps.

"A check of the nearby railroad, tracks turned up negative for the suspects," the arrest reports' state, and the Jeep was towed.

Kai's Crew coaxes major contributions

Grandmother raises record donations for hospice walk

There are many ways to keep. the memory of a lost loved one alive. Cathy Pettigrew honors her grandson, Kai, by raising record amounts of money for a local hospice program year after year.

Pettigrew, 61, of Guilderland, lost her grandson in 2003 to a grand-mal seizure. Kai, who was 10 and living in California when he died. was otherwise healthy, she said.

Pettigrew, with her son Matthew, Kai's father, and daughter-in-law Katherine, were impressed with the care Kai received from the hospice program out west and wanted to support similar programs.

"It just inspired us. They were just wonderful to him," she said about the hospice program in California.

When Pettigrew came back to the Capital District, she found a Community Hospice walk pamphlet sitting on a table and decided she would become a part of the charitable event.

"I just knew what I had to do," she said. "It's a way to keep Kai's memory alive."

Pettigrew put a team together for her first walk in 2004, the year after Kai died. That year, "Kai's Crew," as they were known, did not come in first place for raising money at the walk.

But that was the last year that happened. Every year since they have come in first place in fundraising, pulling in a record amount of \$10,084 in the teams category at the last walk, held on June 6.

'Every year we raised more and more money," said Pettigrew. "I was happy to do something special for my grandson."

Steve Manny, director of development for the Community Hospice Foundation said the June walk raised nearly \$122,000, making Kai's Crew responsible for a significant portion of the proceeds.

Manny said Pettigrew does a great job each year, and is an asset to the walk, hosted at the University at Albany Campus.

"It's so important to get the support from Cathy. It's just a great thing," Manny said.

He said in 2008, walkers raised \$147,000 for the Community Hospice.


Kai's Crew consists of many of Kai's family members, including his parents and extended family. Pettigrew's partner, John Ibes, is part of the crew, and her stepdaughter,

Jolie, normally makes the trek from New York City to walk in the event, but was in London this year.

Pettigrew said her stepdaughter still wanted to be a part of the event, even if she could not make it to walk, and pledged to raise money while overseas. Pettigrew was thankful, and shocked when she heard her stepdaughter pulled in \$5,000 all by herself.


Pettigrew said she has a network of people at her office in the Supreme Court Appellate Division in Albany, and was able to raise \$900 there. She also seeks donations from other family and friends as well.

Pettigrew has no plans to stop anytime soon she said, and



"I'm going to do this until I can't do it anymore," she said. "And I hope my kids carry it on."

Pettigrew said she is confident that Kai walks with them, and watches "with a smile from heaven."



Bethlehem supervisor race continues with the incumbent far out raising his challenger

They say money isn't everything. In a political campaign, however, it certainly helps.

The first major financial filings in the 2009 Bethlehem town races are in and show that incumbent Democratic Supervisor Jack Cunningham has raised over \$20,000 since the beginning of the year.

Independence Party Councilman Sam Messina has yet to raise any money in his bid to unseat Cunningham.

The deadline for filing financial disclosure reports to the state or county board of elections was on July 15. Because Messina has not collected any money his campaign "Friends of Sam Messina," is well below the threshold to report financial activity to the board of

"If it's under \$1,000 he doesn't have to file anything with us and if it's under \$50 he doesn't have to file with the county's board of elections," said John Conklin. a spokesman for the New York State Board of Elections.

Conklin said not even a "no activity" filing is necessary if it is under the state mandated thresholds. Messina told The Spotlight that after a computer software problem his campaign's treasurer John Smolinsky manually filed his financial disclosure reports to the board of election.

The state's board of elections Web site states a total contribution balance of "\$0.00" for Messina.

"I've spend a little over \$1,000 of total expenditures so far,

namely on my Web site and palm cards," Messina said. "From my understanding this should be reported on my next financial disclosure statement.'

Cunningham held a wellattended campaign kickoff and fundraiser at the Normanside Country Club when he announced his intentions to run for re-election in March. His campaign said it anticipates holding several more fundraising events as well.

Messina has not held a fundraiser to date, but said some are in the works.

"I have raised no money but I'm going to have a couple of major fundraisers," he said. "I plain to have one at my home in mid-August and one with the community at a restaurant in mid-October.'

Cunningham's contributions reported by the state since Jan. 1, states a total of \$20,621.25. It also lists his expenditures in the same time period as \$8,326.48.

Cunningham's expenditures appear to be fairly typical with receipts from the post office and printing shops for campaign literature, as well donations to other political organizations such as \$1,300 to the Albany County Democrats, \$150 to the county's Independence and Conservative parties, and \$50 to Sheriff James Campbell's reelection fund.

Messina hasn't yet raised any money

His campaign fund, called the "Committee to Elect Cunningham," also contributed \$100 to the Bethlehem Food Pantry and \$90 to the Bethlehem VFW.

On the income side, Cunningham received his two biggest individual contributions in the form of \$1,000 checks from Thomas Burke of Delmar, a developer and franchisee of several Capital District Dunkin Donuts, and Thomas Connolly of Delmar, an attorney who is also the town's IDA attorney.

Burke and Connolly regularly contribute thousands to political campaigns on both sides of aisle each year, according to federal disclosure reports.

Burke contributed \$2,100 to former Republican Congressman John Sweeney in 2006 and gave \$1,000 to Albany County Legislator Phil Steck, a Democrat, in 2008 for his Congressional run. Connolly contributed to presidential hopefuls Sen. John McCain, R-Arizona, and Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, as well as President Barrack Obama in 2008. He also decided to back **Coeymans attorney Tracey** Brooks last year, giving \$1,000 to her congressional bid.

Cunningham has also received \$250 from the BBL PAC, one of

the biggest construction firms in the area and a manager of the Vista Technology Campus project in Slingerlands, as well as donations from a number of area politicians such as state Sen. Neil Breslin, D-Delmar; Albany County Executive Michael Breslin; Assemblyman Tim Gordon, I-Bethlehem; and several others.


"Our strong fundraising success, along with the large number of petition signers and our dozens of dedicated volunteers, demonstrates the broad and deep support for my candidacy," said Cunningham. "I am anxious to meet with the voters and discuss my record and vision for the future of Bethlehem."

Messina said a momentary lack of money would not derail his bid for office.

"I will raise enough money to have a viable and successful campaign," Messina said. "I think local elections should focus on meeting and talking with the residents of the community.'

in 1995 for the first time since the Great Depression, meaning that we spent not only all our after-tax income but also dipped into savings or borrowed to spend more. The housing boom encouraged people to feel wealthy and spend freely. That spending naturally bolstered the consumer economy, so employment growth was strong then, too. But as the housing bubble burst, employment fell, so of course spending did, too. Meanwhile, increasingly cautious Americans have gradually increased their saving.

While the current fall in consumer spending and rise in savings are not great for the overall economy in the short term, both are very good for individual families because savings create financial freedom and widen the range of all available future financial choices. When the U.S. Commerce Department reported recently that the national savings rate had soared to 6.9 percent its highest rate in years - the Dow and the S&P dropped on fears of cuts in consumer spending. But those families who increased their savings are clearly in a better financial condition than those key market indicators.

Think about saving, then save without thinking.

Automate savings through direct deposit. By directly depositing a specified amount of your paycheck into a savings account – essentially paying yourself first - you can save automatically, without having to think about it.

Plan for the future. It will be here soon.

Conventional wisdom is full of cautionary axioms about this: Fail to plan and you plan to fail; it wasn't raining when Noah built the ark. And they're all true. It's never too early to start saving for such major life changes as retirement or college. Maximize contributions to 401(k) accounts to benefit from employer match programs and invest regularly in your own IRA and/or Roth IRA plans to build vour nest egg. Making

Consolidate debt.

Combining existing debts into one lower-interest-rate loan is a popular way to reduce the amount of interest owed, while also paying down debt faster. For some, this may be a "cash-out re-fi" – refinancing a home mortgage at a lower interest rate than before, while borrowing additional money to pay down credit card balances or other high-interest loans. Check with your banker to see if this makes sense for you. Reducing your interest payments can be as positive and productive a step as increasing your savings. Using these five tips can help make your family more financially independent by managing your money more efficiently, preserving your assets and enjoying greater security.

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Residents push for Selkirk sewers

Families say they've tried to get access for years

Some of us dream of winning the lottery or taking a vacation in a tropical location, but Cindy Radliff of Selkirk says she dreams of getting a sewer line brought to her properties.

She owns properties on Cottage Lane near Beaverdam Road and Maple Avenue, neither of which have sewer connections. A high water table and small lot sizes make septic systems unsavory choices, she said.

Radliff spoke at a public hearing at Town Hall during the Tuesday, July 21, planning board meeting for a four-lot subdivision on Maple Avenue. She along with a handful of other residents said they have been trying to get sewer access for years, but to no avail.

"I've been trying to get sewer for the past 32 years and was always told to wait until homes are in back of you. Well, there are homes behind me and nothing has happened," she told the board. "I am getting a petition to try to bring sewer in."

Another nearby resident, Russell Sawyer, told developers "that natural drain has to be protected," referring to a natural slope where surface water can flow away from the properties. Sawyer said water currently sits

on the lots, "even after just a little .bit of rain."

Radliff also said she took notice that the nearby Stewart's Shop on Route 9W had sewer, but the houses nearby did not.

The town's assistant engineer and land surveyor Terrence Ritz told The Spotlight that without more development in the area, little could be done because the cost would be so prohibitive for the few users that could take advantage of it.

With new development, the developer actually builds the sewer hookups and sewer district extensions have to be voted on by the Town Board," Ritz said. "Five or six years ago there was proposal to build a cul-de-sac with a dozen homes on it and to bring in sewer."

Ritz said the plans fell through, but noted during the planning board meeting that new homes in the area are built higher than older ones because of the water table problem. He said the Albany County Department of Health permits and inspects problems with septic systems.

Ritz said there had been "some problems" with septic in the area.

He questioned whether even sharing the costs with neighbors would justify the high cost of sewer as it correlated to their property's value.

"It just expensive, no matter what," said Ritz.

Radliff met with planning.

division members to discuss the sewer situation on Thursday, July 23. Although the meeting went well and she discussed several options with the town, Radliff said she is going forward with her petition to the Town Board.

"I spoke with many nice and concerned property owners when I did this petition. I found out like me, money was a very important factor, so I advised the town that the cost was a very important factor. No one can afford this with out help," Radliff said. "I honestly feel that this project can be done because of the ARI (America Recovery and Investment Act) and of course with the Town of Bethlehem's help and determination.'

She gave a final public pitch to her neighbors.

"I urge those property owners who signed the petition to get involved and ask for ARI funds," she said. "I am also very concerned about the wetlands and possible more run-off water from nearby subdivisions. I want to make sure that these wetlands are not destroyed or damaged."

The developer of the fourlot subdivision said bringing sewer in for the four lots was not something that was economically feasible at this time and that the federal wetlands in the area keep the density very low, therefore preventing the amount of homes necessary to constitute the costs of sewer.

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





Therapy dogs offer a helping paw to young and old

Specially trained animals keep seniors company and help kids read

With her soft brown eyes looking on with encouragement, Solange patiently listens to a third-grader read his book. The next day she will listen to an elderly woman with Alzheimer's disease reminiscing about a school dance in 1942.

She never judges and always listens.

Solange is a 3-year-old German ahepard, but more importantly she's a therapy dog who helps children become better readers and gives the sick and elderly a reliable companion.

If you ask her owner, Renée Lampila, a retired nursing home administrator of 27 years, Solange isn't just a therapy dog, she's a member of her family and a valued member of the medical and academic communities. Solange works at the Blue Creek Elementary School and Gilda's Club in Latham and The Springs Nursing and Rehabilitation Centre in Troy.

She usually leaves the driving to Lampila, though.

Solange and Lampila sat down with The Spotlight at their Delmar home to walk through a typical day of their volunteer work.

"We really have the greatest job in the world," Lampila said. We make reading fun."

Lampila still does some parttime work as a nursing-home consultant but now dedicates much of her time as a volunteer-- and Solange's chauffeur — to area organizations in order to do what they do best: listen.

"I've always noticed the relationship the residents had with dogs, and that it was completely non-judgmental to their disability," Lampila said of Solange's calming effect. "What does a therapy dog do? The bottom line is they make a house a home."

background is in working with the elderly, she said, "We realized Solange was more aligned with working with children. Therapy dogs are born, they're not made."

Solange does have her working papers, however. She was certified by Therapy Dogs International in October of 2008 as part of its children reading to dogs program called "Trail Waggin' Tutors." She listens to third- and forth-graders read books at the Blue Creek school in an effort to make the children more comfortable reading and to simply make leisurely reading fun and exciting for the kids.

Third-grade teacher Kathy Berger and former reading tutor Peg Murphy had talked about the possibility of bringing in a therapy dog to help some of their struggling students, and Berger piloted a program after getting the green light from the board of education.

"My only real goal is to have kids find some joy in reading. If reading is hard for you and it's something you don't like to do, then you'll do less of it," Berger said. "I really believe it enhances their ability to read and will hopefully help make. them life long readers. ... It's been a huge success."

Berger said the program is not an instructional reading class, but that it "goes above and beyond" the students' regular reading and tutor classes. Kids have to get permission slips signed by their parents to participate.

"Solange lays on one beanbag" and the kids sit on the other and read to her. Some of the thirdgraders really think Solange is listening," she said. "They pick books with dogs in them because they think Solange will like it better."

Lampila said that's because she does listen.

"Some of the students need confidence building, some need to improve classroom behavior or just struggle with reading and the dogs only job is to Although Lampila's listen in a non-threatening and

non-intimidating way," she said. "The dog just cuddles up to the kid and within in seven or eight minutes she is fast asleep.'

Solange took it upon herself to connect with children.

"Sometimes she'll put her head on child's leg or interact in some way," Lamila said. "We never taught her to'do this so I don't know where it came from.'

Kathy Rogers, a therapy and service dog trainer wjo works at the Shaker Veterinary Hospital in Latham, said service dogs are usually "working dog" breeds, while a therapy dog can be any breed.

"Service dogs are a companion for one person and is very individualized to that person while a therapy dog is a comfort dog that is used to dealing with lots of people," said Rogers. "It can take up to two years to train a therapy dog.'

Rogers said it's a concept that is being put to use more and more.

"Alzheimer's patients are very comfortable with dogs. Sometimes a patient could be staring off into space and will reach out and start automatically petting a dog next them," she said. "I see it growing all the time.'

Lampila said Solange's calming effect could lower a person's heart rate and blood pressure by simply being in their presence.

They seem to be connected with their human pack and they like things to be calm," she said about Solange's ability to pick up on human subtleties and tension well before voices are raised. "It's really an amazing thing and there's benefits to the staff as well."

Solange doesn't just walk into a job, either. She has to be interviewed just like everybody else.

"We went to the elementary school and she was interviewed by the principal and librarian and then the teachers," Lampila said. "One little girl twirls her ear and another boy just pets her the whole time.

"All we do is make reading fun," she said.







More wheels, more heals

Charity group gives off-road rides for ill children

When Dan Quaglieri was asked to "make-a-wish" after being diagnosed with Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma, he could have chosen to meet his favorite athlete, movie star or musician, but all he wanted was to cruise on a snow-mobile or ride on an all terrain vehicle.

Unfortunately, the Make-A-Wish Foundation cannot provide "motorized wishes," according to Dan's dad, Tom, of Guilderland. It is because of Dan's love of off-road vehicles, and Tom's desire to give back to the community. that Tom founded 4Wheeling 4Healing after his son was diagnosed with cancer in the seventh grade. Now, Dan is 18 years old, and giving ATV rides to other kids with cancer, heart-disease and other hospitalizing illnesses as part of the 4W4H program his dad set up.

Dan also acts as an active ear for those who take rides, listening to their stories and sharing experiences battling cancer.

"It made him become a lot more outgoing," he said.

Tom went on to praise the Make-A-Wish Foundation, which provided a trip for his family to Hawaii and spent thousands of dollars trying to give Dan happy memories.

"It really is a phenomenal organization," Tom said. "Don't get me wrong. But we said, 'You know what, we're going to fill in that void in the system there."

Tom said he was never able to gain a totally clear understanding of the legalities behind why Make-A-Wish does not provide "motorized wishes" but said he wanted to do something where he could grant that sort of present for a child who wants it.

He said his organization receives permission from the doctor, making sure the child is healthy enough to ride, and then Tom, or one of his six family members who participate take them to a trail nearby for a day of fun and excitement.


He said there are multiple benefits to providing the rides, especially for kids who are used to playing sports or who were otherwise active before getting sick.


"If you were athletic, you might miss a season or two." he said. "You lose the adrenaline rush."

He said riding on the machine lets you get that rush back.

Monday, July 20, and is a general objection to the designating petitions of Cunningham, Mark Jordan, Kyle Kotary, Nanci Moquin and Gregg Sagendorph.

The Independence objection was general, but the Working Families Party objection lists three specific objections to Cunningham's five-signature petition. It states the witness signatures pre-date the signers' signatures, with signers dated on July 19 and 20 and the witness statements signed on June 21; there is no sheet number on the petition; and that the objectors "believe no oath was administered at time of signatures."

Cunningham said he doesn't believe the Independence Party objection was filed on time. Albany County Board of Elections Democratic Commissioner Matthew Clyne, who is also Bethlehem's Democratic chairman, said they received the Independence Party general objection but has not received a specific objection.

Clyne said specific objections would have to be received six days after the general objection or "there would be no objection."

One was not handed as of press time on Monday, July 27, which was the last day it would be due.

As for the Working Families Party objection, Clyne said "the ruling will be made later on this week," by himself and the Republican Commissioner, John Graziano, who is also the Albany County Republican chairman.

Messina said he was "up front" with all political parties in telling them he was seeking the support of a coalition of political parties to represent all people. The Spotlight confirmed with each of the party chairs that endorsed Messina that they knew he was running on the other lines, including the Conservative and Working Families parties.

Cunningham said he is appealing "directly to the people" of the Working Families Party, which he said has a political philosophy more in line with his own than that of Messina who has the backing of Republicans and Conservatives.

"I am seeking the support of the Working Families Party. The party leadership is not where that determination is made," Cunningham said. That authority lies with the party members, first through the petition process and later through a vote on primary day."


Karen Scharff, spokeswoman for the Working Families Party of the Capital District, said Cunningham never interviewed with her party and they believe Messina is the better supervisor candidate because of his calls for more open government, which has become a contentious issue in both campaigns.

"If Jack Cunningham had wanted our endorsement he could have talked with us. Now all of a sudden because Sam has the line he wants our support,' Scharff told The Spotlight. "We' choose candidates to allow voters to have a choice and they're attempting to take away that choice through subterfuge.'

Cunningham said he thinks an opportunity to ballot will only serve to open up the process and . questioned the petition objection from a Working Families Party member.

"Unlike my opponent, I did not file objections to attempt to prevent the party members from having the opportunity to vote," he said.

Bianchine said the applicant is proposing to use a stone facade and composite siding on the buildings, and although the development will cater to seniors and "empty nesters," there would be no age restrictions on living there.

He said the project would be good for Bethlehem's tax base

in a condominium project," Bianchine said. "It will be a positive impact in terms of taxes.'

Planning board member Christine Motta said she liked the plan to build a CDTA bus turnout on the site, referring to the plans and comments of Bianchine that the transportation authority had been contacted, about the plan.



im Sano often thought back on the tight-knit Italian neighborhood

in Albany where he grew up. The area had changed over the years; people had moved away and St. Anthony's, a church that was one of the cornerstones of the neighborhood, had closed. Sano missed the comraderie he had once

enjoyed. "I never felt like I'd be able to recapture that," he said.

Thei. Jano joined the Italian American Community Center, and he immediately felt the same kind of rapport that marked his old surroundings.

Sano and his family became deeply involved in the community center, and when the members decided to hold an Italian festival 19 years ago, Sano was one of the planners. He said the event was an attempt to bring back an "old-time street festival" — similar to what St. Anthony's used to hold:

The event proved a success — so much so that it has grown each year. This year's Festa Italiana, presented by the center's Italian American Heritage Foundation, "is going to be bigger and better than ever," said Santa Pasquini, a member of the festival committee. It's slated for Friday, July 31, and Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 1 and 2, at the center, 257 Washington Ave. Extension in Albany.

That first year, the festival wasn't open to the public, Sano said. It was pretty much just a venue for community centers to come together to celebrate their culture and heritage.

But over the next couple of years, organizers noticed that as word was spreading about the festival, the public was showing up anyway. So, four years into it, the festival opened its doors to everyone.

That's not the only change. The festival was initially held



only on a Sunday afternoon. But organizers decided to add some activities the preceding Saturday, too:

"It was a way to tap into a crowd that prefers to come out at night," Sano said.

Friday activities have been held intermittently over the years, but there's a full slate this year. There will be a wine and cheese tasting, music, dancing, games of chance, vendors and, of course, plenty of Italian food.

Pasquini rattled off a long list of Italian specialties that will be available: pizza, pasta, greens and beans, eggplant Parmesan, sausage and peppers, pasta · put fagioli and fried calamari. There will also be fried dough, "which is a huge seller," she said.

Another treat is Italian pastries from Schenectady bakery Villa Italia, which will also offer coffee and drinks.

For kids who prefer something other than Italian food, there will be hot dogs, as well as

popcorn, cotton candy and snow cones, Pasquini said. Rides and games will cater to kids, too.

Meanwhile, for adults, food won't just be for sale — it will take center stage for some competitive eating contests. Saturday will feature a pizza-eating contest and a pasta-eating contest, while Sunday offers a cannoli-eating contest.

A different type of contest

takes place Sunday. Winemakers will try to earn the highest marks from a panel of judges.


"The wine tasting is new and different," Pasquini said.

Sano added that the center hopes the wine Games of chance are already an old favorite at the festival. In better economic times, the games were so popular that the center was able to distribute some of the proceeds to a variety of charities: Little, League, the American Cancer Society and The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society.

The center has used its own share of the proceeds for a variety of cultural activities, Sano said, such as community presentations and trips to the opera.

Sano, who worked at the center as a lifeguard after college and is now its pool director, said that the festival has drawn as many as 1,000 people over three days in its most popular years. Organizers are hoping that this year will bring record crowds.

The festival runs from 5 to 10 p.m. on Saturday, from noon to 10 p.m. on Saturday and from



Use of the measure is limited where it does exist

While holding New York's elected officials to the possibility of a recall might be a way to prevent the political jockeying that resulted in a month long stalemate in the state Senate, experts say that it's unlikely such a measure will ever be adopted.

Assemblyman James Tedisco, R-Schenectady, announced on Saturday, July 11, that he would introduce a recall bill that would allow voters to petition for the removal of statewide officers and state legislators.

In a statement, Tedisco singled out Democrat Senator Pedro Espada, who crossed the aisle with Hiram Monserrate in June to give Republicans the majority in the Senate. Monserrate rejoined Democrats days later while Espada remained, causing a stalemate that badly tangled state government before he returned to the Democratic Caucus on July 9.

"What Senator Pedro Espada has done, aided and abetted by many of his colleagues, is nothing less than an outright mugging of our democratic process and those who should and still can be the most powerful voices in our government," said Tedisco.

Calls made to Espada's office were not returned.

The proposed law would require 50,000 signatures for the recall of any statewide office, and 10 percent of the electorate or 5,000 signatures, whichever is lesser, for the recall of a state legislator. A vote would ensue 90 days from when the Board of Elections certified the recall.

Recall legislation is not unusual nationwide, according to SUNY Albany Professor of political science Joe Zimmerman, who is also the author of "The Recall: Tribunal of the People" and does regular research into recall trends.

"At the state level, there are 18 states that have constitutional provisions authorizing the recall," said Zimmerman, who added that numerous local government charters and laws provide for the recall.

Despite being available in many places, he continued, its use is rare. The most famous example is the 2003 gubernatorial recall in California in which Arnold Schwarzenegger replaced Gray Davis.

"If it exists, it will encourage legislators to be more responsible

knowing they can be used at any time," said Zimmerman. "I view them as standby devices, that they would not be used often but they would be available when the people get upset enough."

And how upset are New Yorkers today? A Siena Research Institute poll released on Monday, July 20, indicates that voters are deeply unsettled by the protracted row in Senate, with the body's approval rating plummeting to 20 percent. 62 percent of those polled said they believe voters will remember the incident come Election Day in 2010.

State lawmakers are elected to two-year terms.

Of course, the very people whom the law most directly affects would be required to pass it. Zimmerman said this fact kills almost any chance of seeing a recall make its way into state law.

"The elected officers do not like these devices in general," he said. "If you were in office, you probably would not like to be threatened daily with the possibility of a recall."


Despite not having the Empire State Games to compete against, turnout for the inaugural Empire State Championship was lighter than hoped for,

"I think it's a great start," said Gobel. "I know'Anthony [Mills] did a lot to get this pulled together, and I think it can grow into something else."




