

# BC teacher claims bogus firing

**District's Chinese** teacher expected to be replaced by BOE this week

Dr. Terry Waltz admits she may not have been the most conventional teacher — a reason why some students and their parents say they like her — but she says that is no cause to be fired from the Bethlehem School District.

With an international background in lecturing and education, Waltz was hired to head up the district's new Chinese program started last year that focuses on the language and the nation's customs.

After a year in a probationary position she has been handed a termination letter.

Waltz claims she is being let go for reasons other than her perfor-

# Beth Independence Party lawsuit dismissed

**Cunningham and other** candidates keep party petitions, race goes to primaries

A judge has thrown out a lawsuit brought on by an Independence Party member to invalidate petition signatures for Supervisor Jack Cunningham and other Independence Party candidates for the fall elections in Bethlehem.

Acting Supreme Court Justice Kimberly O'Conner ruled in Albany County Court against attorney James Walsh, who was representing the party member, Jeanette Whitbeck, on Thursday, Aug. 6, after a witness verified her petition signature. She subsequently claimed she was bullied by a private investigator into saying she was not read an oath before signing it.

The decision approves the Independence Party ballot petitions for Cunningham, Councilman Kyle Kotary and Bethlehem Independence Party Chairman Mark Jordan for Town Board, as well as Nanci Moquin for town clerk and Gregg Sagendorph for highway superintendent.

"I'm pleased with the outcome but I'm not surprised," said attorney Justin O. Corcoran, who represented the Independence Party candidates. "We asked the judge to formally validate the petitions, which was included in her decision."


Independence Party Councilman Sam Messina is running against Cunningham for town supervisor. His campaign suffered a similar blow last week when the Albany County Board of Elections dismissed a Working Families Party objection against Cunningham's opportunity to ballot. Messina contends the objection was tossed out "on a tech-

Bethlehem police have arrested a Delmar volunteer rescue worker after receiving a call about a Craigslist posting on the Internet soliciting "encounters with young boys."

Daniel P. Heeren, 24, of Carstead Drive, Slingerlands, was arrested on Thursday, Aug. 6, after police responded to an online ad and made arrangements to meet with him for the purpose of having a sexual encounter during an investigation into the matter.

Bethlehem police issued a release stating that "once Heeren arrived at the meeting place, he was immediately taken into custody.'

Police have charged Heeren with second-degree attempted rape, first-degree attempted disseminating indecent materials to minors — both felonies — and endangering the welfare of a child, a misdemeanor.

Lieutenant Thomas Heffernan said the Bethlehem Police Department handled the investigation and a computer seized from Heeren's home was

with him,' Heffernan said. "He wanted to meet with who he thought was a young teenaged boy."

Heffernan said his detectives

have special training to handle these types of crimes and that although it is not something Bethlehem sees a lot of, "We have our fair share of this.'

He was arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court and sent to the Albany County Correctional Facility without bail, according to police, and he is scheduled to be back in town court on Wednesday, Aug. 12, at 5 p.m.

Bethlehem police are asking for anyone with information about Heeren's activities to come forward immediately.

"Due to Heeren's affiliation with the Delmar Fire Department/ Delmar Rescue Squad and being a student at the Albany Medical College, anyone with additional information on Heeren is asked to contact the Bethlehem Police Department at 439-9973," the release states.

"From what we understand he was a very active member of the Delmar Fire Department and rescue squad," Heffernan said. "We just wanted to reach out to see if there was any additional information or other victims out there."

# **Board OKs garage** at Maple Manor

**Neighbors turn out for** hearing on structure at Maple Manor Apartments

Normally a two-car garage doesn't require you to appear before Bethlehem's sevenmember Planning Board and hold a public meeting on the matter unless of course you're "non-. conforming.'

A small group of residents and neighbors of the Maple Manor Apartments in Delmar went to Town Hall for the Tuesday, Aug. 4, Planning Board meeting at which board members unanimously approved Charles Crisafulli's site plan and special-use permit for his garage.

". Having been built in 1968 as one of the town's first modern apartment complexes, the structure is deemed a nonconforming use by the town's code.

The area is residentially zoned and primarily contains single-family homes, according to Bethlehem's Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli.

With my shopping bags and money in hand, I waited in line for a cool iced coffee. Then, I stocked up on vegetables. The most interesting thing I bought was a lemon cucumber. Very similar to your garden variety in texture, this cuke was yellow, shaped like a ball, and had a bright, ever so slight tangy flavor. I also bought berries, flowers, organic chicken and lastly, a big, crumbly muffin. The top was sugar coated and I'm sure it held no nutritional value. The muffin didn't last long; I was starved after my run. I left the market relaxed, full of muffin and ready to be nice to my family again.

Saturday mornings are usually spent with my family, hanging around the house. We usually end up at our own Saturday market, the Delmar Farmers Market. Everyone loves the egg sandwiches, and friends can always be seen. It's a cool addition to our community. But I started to think about all of the farmers markets around our region and what they have to offer. Each is different. So I decided to spend a few Saturdays in the month of July wandering the markets.

The Schenectady Greenmarket is nice because it's on a Sunday. I also love that the city closes down

Chicken and Peach Salad

4 cooked chicken breasts (a good way to use up leftover chicken)

2 ripe peaches

3 ounces soft crumbled goat cheese

3/4 cup sliced and toasted almonds

1 large head romaine lettuce, washed

For the dressing: .1 cup olive oil, 1/3 cup balsamic vinegar, 1 small shallot, peeled and chopped fine, 1 teaspoon honey, salt and pepper to taste

Slice or shred the chicken into bite-sized pieces. Wash and cut the peaches into thin slices. Rip the romaine into small pieces, and place in a big serving bowl. Arrange the chicken, peaches, goat cheese and almonds over. Whisk the dressing and serve alongside the salad. Leftover salad makes a good lunch. The dressing can also be made a day or so in advance.

Serve with a crusty loaf of bread and a glass of crisp white wine.

That was only my opinion, as my kids loved seeing the goats brought by a local farmer. Each week this market offers different educational programs for children. Add to that live music, the bookmobile and the barbeque, and you've got a pretty cool little market.

The last trip I made was to my old favorite Saturday morning place, the Troy Farmers Market. Truly a complete shopping experience. At this one, it's possible to buy your fruit and veggies, meat, bread, cheese, milk and butter. Add to this list wine, pesto, chocolate and lovely soap. It's also the place to find Mrs. London's baked goods. If you don't know it, they are a legendary bakery in Saratoga

Springs, making an appearance at this market with incredible pastries that are flaky, buttery and like no other. There is always live music, mean curry from Thunder Mountain Curry and a peaceful place to sit and watch the river go by. A good outing for adults and kids.

Looking back, one of my favorite meals prepared from our bounty this summer was made from an unexpected dinner ingredient: peaches. For so long I associated the state of Georgia with this fruit, I didn't even realize that it's grown right here. And is it ever. This is the time to pick up local peaches, around for a few more weeks and then they're gone until next year.

This salad was made for our dinner, and we all ate it because we can't get enough of the juicy, sweet peaches that are being sold right now. Topping a salad with a thin slice of peach adds iust enough sweetness to balance out a creamy cheese and a good balsamic vinegar dressing.

Even Elliot ate this salad, although he picked out the chicken, peaches and almonds, pushing every bit of greens to the side of his plate. He's just not ready to eat green salad yet. I keep telling him, over and over, 'When you are a bigger boy, you'll love to eat salad. You'll eat salad every day."

I don't know if he believes me. For now, he's happy enough to help me choose a head of lettuce at whatever farmers market we happen to be at. And to eat his peaches.

# Counties to plan for elderly, disabled

\$25,000 grant to Albany, Schenectady counties will make communities more supportive of elderly

Albany and Schenectady County have been awarded more than \$25,000 to plan community improvements that caters to the aging and disabled, according to officials.

"We're anticipating to begin the planning process in September," said Mary Duryea, spokeswoman for Albany County Executive Mike Breslin.

Community Empowerment Grant from the New York State Office for the Aging is "designed to assist in their efforts to promote and plan more aging and disabled friendly communities, which support older adults and disabled individuals to remain in their community for as long as they wish," according to information form the Albany County.

The announcement was made on Wednesday, Aug. 5, but the money will likely not be awarded until sometime within the next few weeks.

The county will work collaboratively with the . municipalities and the Long Term Care Council, businesses , and "consumer representatives. to plan for long and short-term strategies and to plan how to best allocate the resources. It will focus on housing, out-door

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spaces, transportation, building, employment and more, according to Albany County.

"The Community Empowerment Project is consistent with our current efforts to develop a comprehensive long term care plan for the county that expands affordable and reliable home and community-based long term care services in our community," Albany County Executive Mike Breslin said in a written statement. "We must ensure our communities have the supports and services in place to enable residents to remain where they want to be for as long as possible."

Duryea said the planning will primarily include determining which aspects of a community make it more palatable to the elderly and disabled.

"What kinds of thinks make a community more aging and disabled friendly?" she said will be the target question.

The county's Long Term Care Council's, NY Connects program, which is the "point of entry" for long-term care and aging agency, will join forces with the University at Albany to educate the public about the benefits available to the aging and disabled.

Duryea said the university will likely provide technical assistance, a community forum and an intern to assist.

Duryea said the grant fits with the county executive's plan for long-term care for the elderly and will hopefully relieve the reliance on the county's nursing home.

"Plans for making sure we will have the support and services they need so they don't have to get a nursing home and can stay in the community," Duryea said.

Renee Benson, the executive director of the Catholic Charities Caregiver's Support Service's

said her organization and the United Way provide long-term care for the elderly and disabled, and have many services for "kinship" care, designed to help family members care for other family members.

'My personal hope is that while they're doing the grant, they include some money for kinship care," she said.

Catholic Charities services 21 families in Schenectady, and more than 70 in Albany, while also servicing 12 other counties. Benson said.

"Hopefully this grant will help us meet our goal of keeping more of our seniors at home,' said Albany County Legislator Lucille McKnight, chair of the Legislature's Social Services Committee.

Schenectady County spokesman Joe McQueen said the grant application runs from Sept. 1 through Aug. 31 of 2010 and the county is hoping to begin

work as soon as possible.

He said a steering committee will be formed but it is unknown who will serve on that committee at this time.

Schenectady County officials are planning to set up community forums and look at its assessment tools, McQueen said, in order to best determine how the funding should be allocated.

"Schenectady County has long supported efforts that promote the health and well being of our older residents. This grant will help us design programs and services that will allow our seniors to remain in our community," said Susan Savage, chairwoman of the Schenectady County Legislature in a written statement.

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

### The high cost of living

The life of a Selkirk resident is not worth \$16 million.

It isn't worth \$13 million, and we may never know if the value of one measly Selkirk life is worth more than \$1 million.

Albany County has recommended tearing down the Old School Road bridge in Selkirk, citing the 86-year-old bridge's dilapidated condition.

The problem: The bridge is the most direct route for emergency services to get to residents of the South Albany Road area in Selkirk.

### Editorial

As it stands now, only smaller vehicles can use the bridge — fire trucks have to go at least a mile and a half out of the way to use routes 32 and 396. Sans bridge, everything, including ambulances and smaller fire control vehicles, would have to go the longer route.

Albany County Commissioner of Public Works Michael Franchini said it would cost \$16 million to replace the county Route 53 bridge now known as "Ben's Bridge," about \$13 million to repair it and just over \$1 million to tear it down. So, unless the state Department of Transportation says otherwise, down it will go, and some Selkirk residents will have to wait that much longer for life-saving equipment to arrive.

Residents and officials are asking the county to look at some more options in the hopes of persuading county legislators that a human life is worth more than a bridge.

We at *The Spotlight* hope they're successful, but we feel the Ben's Bridge situation is symptomatic of Albany County's inability to get its priorities straight.

their way because a bridge is too expensive in Selkirk, and sex offenders are being dumped into Colonie just because it's convenient, Albany County legislators are focusing their resources on educating their constituents about the nutritional value of Happy Meals. A vote on a law that would force chain restaurants to list caloric content on menus was discussed and voted on Monday, Aug. 10, after this editorial was written.

We're all for healthy choices, but here's the thing: Intelligent people don't stuff Whoppers and fries down their throats with any consistency and expect to be in peak physical condition, but most intelligent people buy homes with the expectation that, if it should catch fire, the right vehicles will be able to get there directly and hastily.



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



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# DEC increases fees for sporting licenses

New York doubles fishing and hunting charges for seniors and enacts other big increases

Whether or not Bambi will sleep any sounder tonight remains to be seen, but area hunters say they not too happy with state increases for hunting and fishing licenses; especially the latest round that doubles some fees.

The state's Department of Conservation is scheduled to start issuing its new sporting licenses for the 2009 and 2010 hunting and fishing season—but there's a catch. Beginning Aug. 17, a fishing and sportsman license will cost \$10 more and a super sportsman license will

cost \$20 more

For those 65 and older, the Senior Lifetime Sportsman License will remain \$50 until Sept. 30, after which the age requirement for the same license becomes 70 and the cost will go up to \$65.

The last time the state legislature raised the DEC sporting licensing fees was in 2002.

Area hunter John Glassbrenner of Selkirk, who turns 65 on Sept. 29— one day before the cutoff, said he's fed up with the state fees associated with sporting licenses. He said he has hunted "ever since I've been about 12 when I hunted the little rabbits."

He questioned why the fees are being raised in the first place.

"The sportsmen themselves,

they get nothing out of it," Glassbrenner said. "They don't do anything more with the money. What are they doing with it?"

DEC spokeswoman Laurie Severino said New York is simply trying to maintain the funding it has for current programs.

"All of the fees go to the state conservation used for fish and wildlife across the state," she said. "A small percentage goes to processing fees or retail fees that are like a commission for license issuing vendors."

The reason for increasing the sporting license fees was the state fund's bottom line.

"Primarily they're being raised to generate more money for the conservation fund and to cover the same level of management and law enforcement," said Severino.

Another area hunter, Robert Jasinski of Glenmont, had the opposite opinion of how the new license increases will affect the DEC.

"You're going to have people look at the price to hunt or fish and they won't do it anymore; that, or they're just not going to get a license to do it," he said. "It's going to put extra pressure on the ENCON officers."

Jasinski called the increase "just another tax."

"What it comes down to is doubling the fees is just another form for the state to grab as much money as they can," he said. "This is only going to curtail hunting and cause an oversupply of the species, and the state will have to spend money to control them."

Severino described the number of licenses issued by the DEC each year as "stable" and said now was a good opportunity for seniors to take advantage of a lifetime sportsman license before the Sept. 30 cutoff date.

According to DEC reports, New York collected over \$41.2 million in gross sales from 1.9 million various licenses in the 2007-2008 season. The state sells around the 2 million licenses each year going back to 2002, according to state records, about half of which are hunting with the other half fishing.

Severino said the money gets doled out as equally as possible across New York.

It's pretty balanced around the state," she said of the conservation fund. "Of course there's more activity in areas like the Adirondacks."

Glassbrenner said he personally sees fewer hunters out in the woods when he goes down to his hunting trailer in the Catskills, but admitted with a chuckle that getting a bit older keeps him more grounded.

"I'm not gonna go traipsing up and down these mountains anymore," he said. "Now I've got to just follow the deer around on flat ground."

With \$88 for a super sportsman license and \$47 for a sportsman license, Glassbrenner said some people may simply opt not to hunt any longer — especially those who hunt for food.

"A deer is just a little bit bigger than a full-grown goat. You can go down to a butcher a get a goat undressed for about \$50," he said. "It's crazy what the government's doing to these people."

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

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

His opponent, Supervisor **Ken Runion, posts \$250** reward for information leading to an arrest

Republican candidate for Guilderland town supervisor Peter Golden has filed a police report following what he is calling a politically motivated prank where two dog cutouts were placed on his lawn in the early morning hours of Saturday, Aug. 1.

This is the second incident where cutout dogs have been placed on his lawn, Golden

"My guess is this is being done by political people who wouldn't do it themselves so they get kids to do it," he said.

He said the incident is a distraction from the important

"However many dogs they

put on my lawn doesn't make of the driver and could pick the traffic go away on Western Avenue," Golden said.

Guilderland police Capt. Curtis Cox said the incident is under investigation.

Town Supervisor Ken Runion, Golden's opponent in the upcoming race, has offered a personal reward of \$250 to assist with any leads.

"I feel badly for Mr. Golden," Runion said.

Runion said people brag, and talk about pulling off stunts like the one that occurred on Aug. 1, and if there is information floating around, a reward might help loosen the lips of some of the prankster's friends.

'All of us have been the subject of pranks," Runion said. "I don't feel this is politically motivated

He said Republicans in past elections have made claims that pranks were politically motivated, but there was never any proof to substantiate those

According to Golden, the suspects rang his doorbell, and he was able to catch a glimpse

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him out of a lineup if presented with the opportunity. He said he suspects the incident was not random because he heard one of the people involved say, "You missed his [expletive]

Golden said he took photographs of the car, and police are attempting to get a license plate number from the picture. He said the driver looked to be in his 20s.

Golden said such pranks are simply a distraction from the bigger issues of the campaign - taxes, dangerous driving on Western Avenue, storm water and business. He criticized Runion for not taking action during his tenure to address those matters.


Golden likened the distraction to the automated calls that circulated last month calling for a change in town government, citing stormwater issues as a problem in town. Golden said he was not responsible for the calls and if he were, his name would have been attached to the end of the message.

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# **Lemons bring sweet success**


While there weren't actually sweet lemon trees in ancient Egypt, Evans's story shows young readers that there is value in standing apart from the crowd.

Entertainment was provided by local band the Refrigerators.



EMS and office of Prevention of Domestic Violence was equally as important.


She said representatives were available to answer questions and provide some demonstrations.

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

# **Cedar Hill used Hudson to keep cool**

The once bustling hamlet now stores its history inside of the school that taught its residents

Editor's note: This is the fifth article of a nine-part series of historical features on the hamlets of Bethlehem in commemoration of this year's Quadricentennial. The next article in the series is scheduled for the second week of September and will focus on the hamlet of North Bethlehem.

The history of the Hudson River along Bethlehem's banks is as rich as the men who once harvested its icy waters.

Converted into a museum by the Bethlehem Historical Association, the Little Red School House, which helped shape the once bustling hamlet simply known as Cedar Hill, now houses the very history

single room.

There was no indoor plumbing in the school, and it was heated by wood stove when first built in 1859. The following year, its first schoolmaster was hired for eight grades and 24 students. The building was expanded and redesigned in 1907 with electricity and plumbing in two rooms for 40 students.

The school eventually closed

The vast number of events, notable residents and famous visitors can hardly be contained in a single room, although the town's historical association

that was once taught inside its certainly does a good job trying.

> Cedar Hill's first famous visitor is thought to be the European explorer Henry Hudson, who came upon the area exactly 400 years ago. There is a marker in the town's park that bears his name to commemorate where he is thought to have pulled up on the Half Moon in 1609 on the very river that now bears his name.

Looking upon that marker is a bench that bears the name of a Cedar Hill resident who was a pioneer in his own right and helped build the nation's first nuclear-powered aircraft carrier,

the U.S.S. Enterprise.

The late Parker Mathusa grew up along the Hudson banks and attended the Little Red School House before graduating from the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District.

A commemorative bench with his name on it faces the famous explorer's river, and although not an explorer himself, Mathusa's engineering work on the propulsion system for the first Mars space orbiter puts him on par with a different kind of exploration.

Other historical notes from the hamlet include the former home of Gov. Martin Glynn along Barent Winnie Road on the right heading to the town park. The structure was built in 1907 as a summer home for the former governor and was also the former Bethlehem Elks Club Lodge. It is now a private residence that holds a flea market on Sundays.


Farther down the road, there are two stone lions, which were the main entrance to the J. B. Lyon's estate, which was destroyed by fire.


With its important commercial docks, the Cedar Hill section of town was just as important when the river froze over in the winter – maybe even more so.:

Ice harvesting was big business in the 19th century, and both Bethlehem and Albany prospered from the blocks of ice cut from the Hudson River each year well into the 20th century.

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
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

Leath writes that winter ice quickly turned into summer

"The shores of the Hudson River in Bethlehem were lined with icehouses. Some, like George Best's Cedar Hill Ice House were locally owned, and owners shipped their ice to New York City. Others were owned by large companies like the Knickerbocker Ice Company out of NYC," she wrote in a town article on subject. "In 1855, Hunts Merchant magazine reports that NYC required 285,000 tons of ice, Albany stored up 20,000 tons. These figures were only to grow, before a steady decline in the 1920s.

The ice was used for both consumption and food storage, and harvesting was practiced on a small scale by early settlers and colonists, but blossomed into a multi-million dollar industry in the mid and late 1800s before dying out in the 1920s, according to Leath.

Best's home is still off Berent Winnie Road near the park on the right. He was a lumberman from Saratoga who died in 1918. His widow sold his operation to another ice man named Charles F. Schifferdicker.

Lifelong Cedar Hill resident Dawn Pratt said her hamlet was once the center of Bethlehem, and she recalled her experiences at the one-room schoolhouse as well as the neighborhood itself.

"Cedar Hill was a bustling little town with stores and gas stations, restaurants and the hotel ... there were all summer homes along the river," she said. "It was a nice little village. That's where people would go for quick things instead of Albany."

Pratt is now a member of the Bethlehem Historical Association museum will be open until Oct. 25 in honor of the Hudson River Quadricentennial and its own 150-year anniversary.

Pratt's family moved to Cedar Hill in 1794, she said, and her grandfather worked at the ice houses along the Hudson. As for the school house, she said two school teachers served the school house for about 20 years each, but it was the substitute teacher who was the stickler.

> "Verona Clapper was the substitute teacher and you couldn't get anything past her," Pratt joked. "A lot of the people who went to the school had the same teachers for quite a

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

bad teacher but I loved my job and I loved my classroom," she told The Spotlight in an exclusive interview. "I have a doctorate in curriculum writing.

Waltz said she believes personality conflicts are more at the heart of the issue than her teaching but said she wants to keep her professional reputation in tact.

Waltz is a State Department Chinese interpreter and translator and said she is one of only 14 certified Mandarin Chinese teachers in Upstate New York. Waltz provided The Spotlight with a copy of a letter from the board of education dated June 12, recommending her termination and accusing Waltz of making "inappropriate comments" to students and to other colleagues, and making unprofessional decisions, among other reasons.

"On a number of occasions

during the 2008-2009 school year, both prior to and after you were placed on a Teacher Improvement Plan (TIP) in January 2009, you exercised poor professional judgment in your interactions with students and made inappropriate comments to students," the district's June 12 letter states.

Waltz said she received six positive teaching reviews prior to being put on TIP and called the excuses for not renewing her probationary position "ridiculous." She said the term "inappropriate" is misleading and makes it sound like she had done something worse than using the word "fat" or a commercially published paper doll of President Barack Obama in the classroom.

"I was demonstrating the difference between the two Spanish verbs "ser" and "estar," both of which mean "to be" in English, and used the example in Spanish of, Would I say, 'Am I [soy] fat' or 'Am I [estoy] fat' in Spanish?" she

Waltz also taught sections of

Spanish along with her Chinese curriculum. As for the Obama doll, Waltz said it was being used to demonstrate different kinds of colors and clothes, such as "Obama is wearing a green shirt today.'

"The kids really loved it," said "Sixth graders are so Waltz. smart, they're too young to be cool, they still love everything."

Waltz said no one is disputing the fact that the district has the right to fire her because of her probationary status, but said she thinks "they should just come out and say that instead of trying to make up excuses why they're firing me.'

She also questioned whether the program would continue and if the district would find another candidate as qualified as she is in

Superintendent Michael Tebbano said he could not comment on Waltz's situation, but that Bethlehem Central is keeping the Chinese program.

The district is completely com-

mitted to Chinese instruction," Tebbano said. "In keeping with the vision outlined when the program was initiated, this coming year we will expand the program to include Chinese for seventhgrade students as we continue to plan to grow and strengthen the program in the years to come."

District Spokesman Matt Leon said the Board of Education is expected to appoint a 0.6 — or part time — teaching position to the language program during the Wednesday, Aug. 12, meeting at the district offices in Delmar.

"Ensuring all students have the skills to succeed in a rapidly changing world is fundamental to the district's mission," Tebbano added. "Without a doubt, a top-notch world languages program is an element of meeting this mission. Chinese instruction strengthens our offerings in this area and we are dedicated to it."

Waltz claims she was actually fired twice.

They didn't follow procedure and gave the first recommendation for my termination before the July 1 board meeting," she said. After she was handed a second termination letter Waltz said, "they just bought me a new iMac because I'm on the payroll until Sept. 11 and now the taxpayers are expected to pay for their mistakes.'

Waltz said she wants to continue her career and does not want to be "black listed" for being fired from the Bethlehem district.

Delmar resident Lisa Wilkinson said her son enjoyed the class and spoke very highly of Waltz.

"My son Daniel had her last year for Chinese and it was a good class, he really loved it," she said. "That was his favorite class ... whatever she did or however she did it, he was encouraged and interested about China."

aryanne Meyer recently finished her master's degree, and it was time for the real world, which for Meyer meant finding work as a professional harpist.

She plays with Symphony in C in Camden, N.J., and the Delaware Symphony, and she always keeps her eyes open for side gigs.

"I ta. , whatever comes up," she said.

In many ways, Meyer is living her dream, but there is one drawback: She suddenly has a lot less practice time than she used to. That's why she's so grateful to be spending part of the summer at the Saratoga Harp Colony.

"It's such a beautiful setting to be able to focus so completely on playing," she said. "It's very valuable to me."

Meyer first came to the colony five years ago, when it accepted its first class. The colony was founded by Elizabeth Hainen, the principal harpist with the Philadelphia Orchestra, who also happened ! to be one of Meyer's professors' when she was studying for her/ master's at Temple University.

Hainan decided to open the colony after a similar one in Maine closed its doors.

"I felt there was a void on/the East Coast," Hainan said.

Familiar with Saratoga since the Philadelphia Orchestra/ calls the Saratoga Performing Arts Center its summer home, Hainan thought it was the "perfect place" to set up shop.

The colony's students are generally from high school age to college age. Most have aspirations of being professional the colony immersed in music -

watching the Philadelphia Orchestra and others perform at SPAC, staging mock auditions and putting on performances. The colony will hold concerts Sunday,

Adelphi Hotel in Saratoga. Skidmore is more than just a concert venue for the students. It's where they live while attending the colony, which offers a one-week session or a three-week session.

It might sound like summer camp, but Hainen shies away from that word, which she thinks conjures up images of macrame.

"It's not a camp," she said. "It's a program. It's a festival. They're here to study."

"It's a chance to be with our own kind," said Diana Elliott, who studies with Hainen at Temple. Like Meyer, Elliott hopes to make a career of playing the harp, and she thinks the experience she's gaining at the harp colony will prove invaluable.

It's a chance that Hainen didn't have as a kid. Her dad was a violinist with the Toledo Symphony Orchestra, so Hainen grew up around music. But when she decided she wanted to play the harp after being captivated by the instrument during a performance of "The Nutcracker," there was no place nearby where she could totally indulge her love of the instrument.

That's one of the reasons she relished the idea of having a colony where young harpists could study.

"I'm kind of living vicariously through them," she said with a

Helen Cerhold, who lives outside of Philadelphia in Lansdale, was just 5 when she was introduced to the harp by her aunt, Yi Liu, a professional harpist who bought Cerhold a tiny Irish version of the instrument. Now 13, Cerhold said she wasn't taken with the harp right away, but she's grown fond enough of it that when she learned about the colony, "I thought it would be good experience."

This is her second year at the colony, and she particularly likes being around other people who take the harp seriously.

Hainen finds those students largely through word of mouth, as well as through ads in harp

As the colony's popularity has grown, so has its ability to give out scholarships. Hainen said. Stewart's has donated money for scholarships, as have some local families.

"We're really, really thankful for the support," she said.

She's called on personal friends to help fill another need at the colony. In its early days, almost every student brought

his or her own harp, Hainen said. But since the colony is drawing an increasing number of international harpists, the colony needs to have several of the massive harps on hand for students to rent. Those ccme from private cellections around the region - Hainen has a colleague in Boston, for example, who made four or five harps available this summer.

As intricate as harps are, Hainer said it's easy for musicians to get caught up in the instrument's technical aspects. She hopes her students leave the colony having learned

"It's not just some wallflower instrument," she said. "The sound is completely embracing.'

She promises a varied repertoire at the colony's shows. The Aug. 16 concert will be in Skidmore's Filene Recital Hall at 3 p.m. The Adelphia Hotel performance is also at 3 p.m. Both are free and open to the

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"It's definitely grown over the years. There's more younger players at the tournaments these. days," said Skinner.

Tournament fields are divided by ability level, not by age. So in any one of the four divisions (open/AA, A, BB and B), there can be matches between younger players and older players.

"I'm very competitive, so I have to play a lot to keep up with the players who are younger than me," said Skinner.

"In this group, everyone thinks of themselves as competitive players," said Jim Bishop of Rotterdam, who has been with the CDGD since it started in 1987. "I'm still trying to play competitively, even though I'm not as fast as I once was — not that I ever was that fast to begin with."

The level of competition ranges from basic to advanced. The most talented players compete in the open division, which can take on the appearance at times of the AVP Tour — the professional beach volleyball organization.

"Relative to the rest of the country, [the competition level] is a little bit lower," said Guilderland Center's Doug Gordon, who regularly competes in the open division. "Relative to me, I often have my hands full.

"This year, it's been very good a lot of good experience out there," said Sally Gillich of Clifton Park, who competes in the A division, the second-highest level in CDGD.

Each tournament runs for two days. The first day is for men's and women's compeition, and the second day is for co-

ed competition. Prize money took a lot of practice. is awarded in the open and A to the top teams in the BB and B divisions.

Players work on their skills at CDGD's free pickup games, which take place Tuesday and Thursday evenings at Avon Crest Park in Niskayuna.

"If the weather is nice, there's usually four or five nets up [for pickup games]," said Skinner. "There's been a lot of rain this summer, so there haven't been that many here. But on a good night, you can have several nets going.

"Sometimes, you plan to be here with a [specific] partner or you arrange to play against another team," said Bishop. "I just come and see who's here.'

Unlike its tournaments, CDGD pickup games give players an opportunity to challenge themselves against higher-caliber

"It's all different kinds of players," said Colonie's Andv Mink, who joined last year. "You have to kind of get used to it. You learn a lot playing at the higher level."

Gordon learned how to jump serve like the professionals he saw on TV as a teen, though it 'Web site at www.cdgd.org.

"I like being aggressive [when divisions, and prizes are given I serve], so I had to probably miss about 7,000 serves before I started getting them in," said Gordon.

Voorheesville native Joshua O'Brien just started participating in CDGD events this summer, and he said he's already hooked.

"It's a lot more intensive. You have to be good at everything," said O'Brien, who plays clublevel indoor volleyball at college. "[On a team], you only have to be good in one or two things such as hitting, blocking or serving. Here, you have to be good in all areas.

"It's a little bit more fun [than indoor volleyball] because you're getting more contact with the ball," said Mink, a 2005 Colonie Central High School graduate.

The CDGD club has two more tournaments at Collins Park on its schedule, Aug. 15 and 16 and Sept. 19 and 20. The entry fee is \$40 per team if paid the Thursday before the tournament starts and \$60 per team thereafter. The entry fee does not include the AVP Next membership, which is required for all club tournaments and is a one-time \$10 fee.



h. The stadium had an inauspicious beginning in 1984 when the first home game was snowed out. Some people took it as a sign that it was the curse of Ann Lee, the founder of the Shaker religious sect. After all, it was built next to the Shaker cemetery.

That didn't stop baseball teams from succeeding in the ballpark. The A-C Yankees won three Eastern League titles during their 10-year run in Colonie, including back-to-back titles in 1988 and

The A-C Yankees left after 1994 not because fan support had waned, but because the team's owners wanted upgrades to the stadium, and the county and the town couldn't agree on who should pay for it. To fill the void, the independent Northeast League's Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs were born, but their run came to an end in 2002.

Once the Diamond Dogs were done, so was Heritage Park. A new stadium at Hudson Valley Community College opened in 2002 to house a new New York-Penn League team, the Tri-City ValleyCats. It was everything Heritage Park was not a comfortable, modern, minor league ballpark with parking close to the stadium's entrance, a video scoreboard and luxury boxes.

So as Capital District baseball fans flocked to the new ballpark, Heritage Park sat silently beside the Albany County Airport. There was an effort to keep the ballpark open to provide a second home for the Albany Twilight League, but by the time the auction took

place in 2006, the stadium's fate was sealed.

Now, there is not much left that indicates Heritage Park once stood there. The only sign is the stadium's sign at the entrance to the parking lot featuring the two insignias of its final primary tenant, the Diamond Dogs. If not for that sign, you couldn't tell if the big, gravel parking lot was once filled with cars for a midsummer baseball game or an auxiliary lot for the nearby Ann

Something else might be built at the site of Heritage Park. Albany County bought out Colonie's share of the property years ago ostensibly to build a new nursing home, but that doesn't appear to be the county's current plan (most recently, the county had talked about building one where the former Tobin's First Prize meatpacking plant currently stands).

Whatever is built on that land, it will on a site that I used to frequent as a teenager, whether it was for an A-C Yankees game, the annual "Battle of Colonie" or to cover, for one season, the Albany Alleycats professional soccer team (fact: Heritage Park was the Alleycats' first, and most successful, home field).

Do I feel cheated? No less than the thousands of Capital District residents who still fondly remember Hawkins Stadium, the long-time home of the Albany Senators. Do I think more should have been done years ago to keep Heritage Park a viable stadium? Absolutely.

Sadly, that isn't the reality I face now. Heritage Park — the first local professional-grade ballpark I visited — is gone.

RIP, Heritage Park.






One organization, though, brings the beach spirit to the region.


The Capital District Grass Doubles club offers area residents the opportunity to play beachstyle 2-on-2 volleyball throughout

### Wrecking crew takes its swing at ballpark

Heritage Park is no more.

What was once a vibrant minor league baseball stadium was leveled last week, the remnants of brick and aluminum lay strewn about where the first base grandstand once was.

There wasn't a lot left to dismantle when the go-ahead was given to demolish last week. Most of the parts had been sold off at an auction years ago after the Town of Colonie sold the land to Albany County, which co-ran the ballpark with the town.

All that was left was the home team locker room building that supported the first base grandstand, a smaller brick structure that housed the offices of the Albany-Colonie Yankees and later the Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs, the groundskeeper's shed behind the left field wall that also housed the visitor's team locker room and, curiously, the scoreboard minus the electronic

The field — once a pristine, professional-grade baseball diamond — was overgrown with grass, weeds and small brush. It was better suited for wildlife than aspiring major league baseball players such as Doug Drabek, Bernie Williams, Derek Jeter, Andy Pettitte and Mariano Rivera.

For more than 20 years, Heritage Park was where people chose to spend a summer evening watching the national pastime. It was also the place Colonie teens congregated every year for the annual Colonie-Shaker football game, myself included.
