The Bethlehem Central School District Board of Education approved moving forward with plans for a cell tower near the district's Operations and Maintenance building in a 4-3 vote at its Wednesday, Nov. 18, meeting.

The district will now sign a letter of consent with Independent Towers LLC, who responded to the district's request for proposals earlier this year. Independent will move their plans ahead to the Town of Bethlehem Zoning Board of Appeals and Planning Board, both of which must hold

public hearings and give approvals before the tower can be built.

The decision effectively takes the building of the tower out of the district's hands and places it before the town.

The vote came after a lengthy and heated public hearing on the matter, during which board President James Dering had to gavel audience members back to order on several occasions.





Bethlehem police met with a New York State Police trooper who advised of an attempt to locate a four-door white sedan operated by a black male who passed a vehicle on a doubleyellow solid line and then turned off when the trooper attempted to make a traffic stop, according to police.

Bethlehem police encountered the vehicle traveling on Font Grove Road in Slingerlands, and while a police unit was turning to follow the vehicle it was observed turning onto New Scotland Road and failing to yield to a westbound vehicle that had to take evasive action to avoid a collision, police said.

Consent was given to search the residence, and police allegedly found in the recovered 'nylon bag a plastic bag containing 13.65 grams of marijuana, a digital scale, a marijuana grinder and loose marijuana. Gueye allegedly told police he had smoked "a lot of marijuana," and was given standard field sobriety tests.

The female passenger was transported to a bus stop, Gueye was taken into custody and he submitted to a chemical test at the police station, according to police. He was scheduled to appear in Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, Dec. 1.

In addition to DWAI, Gueye was charged with resisting arrest, reckless driving, possession of marijuana, failing to yield at an intersection, failing to comply with a police officer, passing in a no passing zone and not wearing a seat belt.



Developer eyes old CVS site

Town advisory committee says anticipated zoning changes could derail plans

A developer proposing 'a pharmacy and medical office at the corner of Elsmere and Delaware avenues was given plenty to think about after a meeting with the Town of Bethlehem Development Planning Committee Thursday, Nov. 19, where it was said that an ongoing study may change the site's zoning and scuttle the project as presented.

Developer Tom Burke has been working with Community Care Physicians, located at 250 Delaware Ave., to affect an expansion of the medical offices that would also include an independent pharmacy. The two-story building with a roughly 23,000-square-foot footprint would sit at the location of a now-vacant building that housed a CVS before the chain built a new store across the street.

Both of the standing buildings would be demolished, but the Community Care offices would remain open during the construction of the new building then leveled to make way for parking when the

transition is complete.

Burke said that acquiring a new building is of great importance to the doctors practicing at Community Care. The location was basically a temporary location for the doctors, who would like more space and more modern

ongoing Delaware Avenue study will likely suggest rezoning the parcel from commercial hamlet to hamlet, which carries restrictions that would derail the proposal inits current form.

"I think that [the study] is really focusing this towards hamlet design, and this is not hamlet design," said Planning Board Chairman George Leveille.

Ciparticular note is that hamlet zoning prohibits parking directly in front of a store, which Burke said might very well be a deal breaker for the interested pharmacy.

Town Director of Economic Development and Planning Michael Morelli estimated that the Delaware Avenue study would be completed in early 2010. He also said that the proposed building would be too big for a hamlet zone without being broken up architecturally.

"The idea was really to try to avoid a boxy look in a hamlet zone," he said.

UAlbany reconsiders dormitory location

Police union supports downsizing managers to save money

In response to area residents' concerns, the University at Albany is reconsidering its location of a is one that would best serve the 500-bed dormitory.

Concerns about noise and other distractions related to college students have been raised in recent months by neighbors to the University in McKownville and on Tudor and Cambridge roads and the Eagle Hills neighborhood. The university had planned the dorms for a spot located near Perimeter Road on the Western Avenue side.

While the dorms do not represent an necessarily mean thère will be an increase in students, it is possible in the future, officials said.

'We are going to reach out to elected officials and explore other options," said Karl Luntta, a representative of the university's public relations department. 'We've taken a step back."

Luntta said the board of trustees for the state university system approved the transfer of 3.3 acres from the Harriman State Office Building Campus on Tuesday,

Nov. 17, in order to help push the dorms back as far from the perimeter of campus as possible. This would make the current site proposed "more viable," he said.

Some are calling for the new dorms to be built on that Harriman site outright.

Don Reeb, president of the McKownville Improvement Association, said other universities have had success with private hotel chains building dorms and renting them to students at comparable prices to what the school would charge. This would generate tax revenue for the City of Albany, Reeb said, and provides a win-win situation.

He said he is hopeful that The CPC is an advisory entity the final decision, whatever

the best place for them is inside the Harriman park, away from residential areas.

McEneny said that as the university grows, the options to expand are to go off site, which he described as "sprawl" or to build somewhere closer or on campus.

He said the Harriman location university system, rather than the "state bureaucracy."

"It's a very anti-sprawl, pro neighborhood point of view," he said

McEneny also said that he is supportive of a "green" solution and said adding black top is not optimal for the construction project. He said building the dorms over the parking lots on campus would help cut down on blacktop.



"We see a lot of waste inherent in the unusual structure of a highly decentralized university police department that employs 65 managers at a cost of \$6.2 million for 400 officers. He said that the group has examined other locations in town on Route 9 and in the Vista Technology Park. If the project at the corner of Delaware and Elsmere does not work out, the doctors will likely leave town in search of other accommodations, Burke said.

Burke declined to say what pharmacy is interested in the location. The developer will take the comments made at the meeting back to the drawing board and may very well appear before the DPC at its December meeting with revisions. Burke is working with Infinigy Engineering and Surveying on the project.

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"There is widespread agreement that the Tudor Road spot is not a good spot," Reeb said referring to the proposed location on the Western Avenue side. "They have to find someplace else."

Reeb also noted that he is glad that the university is taking time to have public meetings and said 20 years ago a decision might have been made without public input.

Attempts to contact Albany Mayor Gerald Jennings for comment were unsuccessful.

Bob Van Amburgh, a representative of the mayor's office, said the mayor is apprised of the situation, but Van Amburgh said he could not comment on the mayor's behalf on privately owned dorms. Assemblyman Jack McEneny, D-Albany, said he is "indifferent

to who owns" the dorms, but said

four managers at a cost of \$3.8 million.".

Luntta said the dormconstruction does not necessarily mean that the student population is rising, in fact he said the university is going to be more selective in its upcoming class selection, lowering the number of students admitted.

He said the expansion allows students to move from off campus to the university's location, something that has been expressed by a number of students in recent years and allows the university to make repairs and maintenance on older dorms by moving students to the new ones.

Luntta said that the university always faces the possibility of expanding, but was unable to comment on the downsizing of the police force.

The 'other' evergreens bring a tropical look to northern climate

For many homeowners, the stars of their landscape are the rhododendrons and azaleas. Low maintenance is certainly one reason why these "other" evergreens are chosen, but the main reason is the incredible spring display that they produce. Flowers engulf the bush so completely that green is barely visible. It is the closest that we northerners get to a tropical look.

The Capital District spans hardiness zones 4 and 5 (for the most part) allowing many choices for using both azaleas and "rhodies." The number of different varieties of these two plants is enormous so for our purpose, we will look at the four main types that grow well in our area: large-leafed rhododendron, small-leafed rhododendron, and deciduous and evergreen azaleas and rhododendrons.

When choosing a plant, read the labels carefully to determine ultimate height and width lest you fill a 10-foot area with a plant that can grow to 30 feet. In the wild, these ericaceous (members of the heath family that prefer a low soil pH) plants grow in the understory of the forest – a good point for the homeowner to remember when selecting a location to plant.

So often the homeowner will want to showcase a rhodie or azalea and will plant it front and center to give it a prominent spot. This works well only if the area is

filtered light or semi-shade. Only a few members of this group, such as the PJM types, can tolerate a full sun location.

A boon to the commercial landscapers, this PJM group is the result of hybridizing begun in the late 1930s by Ed Mezitt, son of Peter J. Mezitt who founded Weston Nurseries in the Boston suburb of Hopkinton.

In tribute to his father, Ed chose to use the initials PJM to identify his new hybrid strain, which embodied the qualities that the elder Mezitt had established for his company's hybridizing work: 1.) plants that are hardy enough to withstand the climatic extremes of New England weather, 2.) have compact habits and superior foliage characteristics, 3.) offer improved resistance to insects and disease, and 4.) extend the blooming season.

> These hybrids are a good choice for Capital District gardens as well. Be mindful of the wind. especially in winter a s the broad-leaf types may windburn. If your

desired location is on the windy side, then consider the small-leaf types of rhodie or the deciduous (shed leaves in the fall) types.

Soil is the next consideration, as azaleas and rhodies require a soil pH in the range of 5.0-5.5 that is high in organic matter and drains well. These are shallowrooted plants so they benefit from a 2-3-inch layer of mulch.

Too little or too much water is frequently a cause of death so use the 1 inch per week rule — if Mother Nature does not supply an inch of rain then supplement by using a soaker hose. May and June are crucial months to watch the rainfall amounts as plant growth is occurring. Late fall is also important as the plants are storing up moisture for the winter.

Be very cautious about fertilizing azaleas and rhododendron, as excessive amounts are harmful. If your soil is naturally acidic then use an all-purpose fertilizer in the early spring before growth occurs. If the soil pH tends towards alkaline, then an acid type fertilizer is the best choice.

Questions about soil and pH can be answered by your local Cooperative Extension Horticulture office (in Albany County, 765-3500), and having a soil pH test done by extension would be the place to start before you plant.

Lastly, while azaleas and rhododendron mainly bloom throughout the spring, there are a few that extend the season into early summer so consider the bloom times as you make your choices.

Below is an example of a few of the many cultivars grouped according to type:

Broad leaf and evergreen

• Rhododendron maximum (Rosebay) is the species or woodland rhododendron native to the Carolinas. Best used in a naturalized setting, it is fast growing and large. • Catawbiense cultivars such as the white Album and the roselilac Boursault

• Roseum Elegans - pink shaded to lilac

Nova Zembla - dark red

Yaku Prince - compact pink

Small leaf and evergreen

• PJM types - many cultivar choices

• Olga Mezitt - clear pink

Molly Fordham - white

• Little Olga - clear pink, slow growth habit

• Weston's Aglo and Pink Diamond - pink

Evergreen azaleas and rhododendron

• Herbert - dark crimsonpurple

Groundhog - bright pink
Cunningham's White - compact plant, white bloom

• Hilda Niblett - compact plant, soft pink bloom

Deciduous azaleas and rhododendron

• Canadense species lavender-pink flowers in April

• Mucronulatum Cornell Pink

• Jane Abbott Pink- pink and very fragrant

• Framingham - dark pink buds open to peach-pink blooms in July

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

BC superintendent sees difficult decisions ahead

Last year's school budget cuts were effective, but leave little room for more

Bethlehem Central School District Superintendent Michael Tebbano took an opportunity at the Wednesday, Nov. 18, meeting of the Board of Education to issue a warning and call to action on the 2010-11 budget process, which is getting under way at the district offices.

"I think we're in a situation that needs to be looked at very carefully," Tebbano said.

That situation is troubling for the district, which is facing lagging or reduced state aid for the coming year. In fact, Gov. David Paterson has again proposed midyear, budget cuts that would deal a \$1.6 million blow to BC's aid.

Judging from the results of recent special legislative sessions — or lack thereof — the likelihood of these cuts being made is up for discussion. But the district needs to have deliberations of its own to prepare for the possibility, said Tebbano.

"Even if the midyear cut does not go into effect, there's a cash "Even if the midyear cut does not go into effect, there's a cash flow problem and the state is not going to be quick getting the money to the districts."

flow problem and the state is not going to be quick getting the money to the districts," he said.

But according to district officials, the cuts made last year constitute the majority of what can be done to save costs without making decisions that would impact programming or levy a large tax hike on property owners.

Last year, the district formulated a three-tier system of cuts and eventually implemented the first two tiers to reduce costs. This enabled the school board to propose a low tax hike for the 2009-10 school year, said Tebbano, but dealt a serious blow to many extracurricular programs, including some staffing cuts and a controversial decision to forgo playing night football games at an approximate savings of \$15,000.

"We received a lot of criticism

for that," Tebbano said. "If we didn't cut the night games we would be cutting a lot of subvarsity activities."

The community has stepped up, he added, with dropped rental fees for the hockey, golf and bowling teams being covered by booster clubs and large discounts by the venues themselves.

The tiered reductions have saved the district more than \$2 million, though, with a minimum of staffing reductions. The problem now is that only tier 3 cuts remain from the original plan, and while they include an estimated \$2.3 million in savings, they involve deep cuts to staffing, programming and extracurricular activities.

"Those tier 3 cuts could decimate parts of this program," Tebbano said.

Included in the tier 3 reductions would be one teaching position

at all six elementary schools, the elimination of enrichment activities like field trips and guest speakers, secretarial employees at the district offices and middle school, an administrator and further cuts to the funding of clubs and athletics.


Board of Education member Laura Bierman suggested the district scrap the previous plans and build new tiers from the ground up.

"I think we should start from the base and reexamine everything," she said.

Tebbano said another possibility would be breaking the tier 3 cuts into sections to make the most harmful reductions a last resort. He said that it's unlikely the district will find other, less painful cuts outside of tier 3. "This is it. There's nowhere else to cut," he said.

Cutting into the district's reserve funds would not be desirable for the district, officials said. The undesignated fund balance stands at about \$3 million, but if it is spent down the school will have no recourse in the event of unanticipated events and the district's bond rating could suffer.

Upcoming budget workshops, during which public comment opportunities will be made available, will be on the following dates at the high school library media center: Jan. 12, Jan. 26 and Feb. 9. Tebbano said that the district's long range data projections will be presented at the Wednesday, Dec. 2, meeting of the Board of Education.

Clearing the air about cell towers

Last Wednesday, the Bethlehem Central School District Board of Education approved moving forward with plans for a cell tower near the district's Operations and Maintenance building. This was met with much public outcry.

Concerned parents said the district was using the community

as "guineapigs," not knowing the long-term effects of RF radiation emitted from the towers.

Butweknowalittlebit, anyhow. A report issued in 2006

from the World Health Organization found no scientific evidence that RF signals from cell towers cause adverse health effects.

What they did find was that a person will absorb five times more radiation from RF signals from FM radio and television than from cell towers, and those towers have been in operation for at least 50 years with no documented health risks.

What they also found was that so-called "cancer clusters" surrounding cell phone towers are "a collection of different types of cancer with no common characteristics" and are therefore "unlikely to have a common cause."

They also noted that, with the ubiquity of cell phone towers, some sort of "cancer cluster" is likely to happen merely by chance. We encourage you to read the report. It can be found at http://www. who.int/mediacentre/factsheets/fs304/en/index.html.

Or, check out a report on the American Cancer Society's Web site, http://www.cancer.org/docroot/PED/content/PED_1_3X_ Cellular_Phone_Towers.asp: "[P]ublic exposure near cell phone towers is not significantly different than background levels of RF radiation in urban areas from other sources, such as radio and television broadcast stations. For these reasons, cell phone antennas or towers are unlikely to cause cancer."

No one can deny the right of a parent to protect the wellbeing of their children, but you'd have to be pretty naive not to see that there is some egregious hypocrisy and NIMBY-ism going on here.

We at *The Spotlight* are willing to bet that the majority of the people in opposition to these towers are cell phone users themselves, and maybe their kids are, too. According to their group's own expert, "prolonged use of a cell phone held against the head increases the risk of brain cancer."

So the solution is simple: Put down the phones. No phones, no towers needed.

Butthatprobably won'thappen because cell phones themselves don't spoil the view around bucolic Delmar.

In any case, the group has quite the Web site going against the tower proaposal. You can access it via any number of handheld wireless devices — the ones that work off of those terrible towers.



Isn't fishing supposed to be relaxing?

Last week was the manliest week of my life. I went on a backpacking trip, with little food and water, and then I caught a ton of lobsters. Actually, to more precise, I participated in the hauling, preparing and selling of nearly five tons, but who's counting?

For my vacation from reporting on the ins-and-outs of Guilderland, I took a trip to New Brunswick, Canada, with my future fatherin-law to participate in opening week of lobster season. My fiancée's cousin and uncle are both lobstermen on the Island of Grand Manan in the Bay of Fundy, not too far from the northern coast of Maine, and I was called upon to be a deck hand during the lucrative start of the season.

When I was asked last year, after I spent one day on my fiancée's uncle boat to see if I could handle working for the entire week, I eagerly said agreed, knowing the pay for a deck hand is \$200 a day, Canadian money. I was stoked.

Before I embarked on my 10hour ride to the ferry to Grand Manan, me and two of my best friends decided it would be fun to take a trip to Harriman State Park. near Woodbury, to see if we could hike 10 miles of extremely rough terrain before it got dark. After we did, we built ourselves a nice fire and feasted on dehydrated chicken teriyaki (way better than it sounds, although I was feeling the pangs of hunger at that point) and had a little drink to warm us up. We went to bed at close to 8:30 p.m. because due to my departure time, we had to wake up at 4:45 a.m. to hike another 45 minutes to the parking area, so I could drive back to Latham to meet with my traveling mate and head off to Canada. My friends still have not forgiven me for the early morning after the extremely long day.

The hike itself was stunning, with its scenery and views and the fact I kept up with my friends

despite my ever-dwindling physical prowess. My friends, Mike and Vin, both Eagle Scouts made sure I didn't die, and had enough water. I was a little skeptical, although they seemed sure, that putting a tiny white pill (iodine) in water that wasn't totally transparent, make it OK to cook with and drink. It was a great first for me.

As I was driving toward Latham to leave for my trip out-of-country, I was pleading with the sun to come up, as I was tired, and the dark sky made me think only of a nap, something one can ill-afford while driving. I made it home though, with enough time to say goodbye to my fiancée, meet her dad and head out.

Luckily, I did not have to drive at all as we headed for the ferry, and I had ample opportunity to relax for the week ahead. As it turns out, no prior amount of relaxation could have prepared me for what I did on Grand Manan.

When we arrived there Sunday, we almost immediately went to bed. Monday is a half day for the lobstermen, as they prepare their boats with the traps for the next day. Day one I helped load 196 traps, some weighing nearly 60 pounds empty. My job was to bring the traps from the wharf to another deckhand who lowered them down to the boat. It was tiring, but I was sure my success the first day meant I could manage.

The next day was the first that the Canadian Ministry of Fisheries would allow boats to enter the bay and set the traps. We had to wait until 7 a.m. by law, and the fact that everyone goes out together only added to the marvelous site of dozens of boats heading out as a fleet with the sun still barley visible. The excitement on my future cousin's boat felt a lot like the Super Bowl - or Election Day for politicians. Chris, my fiancée's cousin is the captain of his boat. like his father, and he told me he slept for barely an hour-and-a-half that night. Nerves take as much a toll as the physical stress, he said, as each trap that goes down wrong, or not at all, could end up costing thousands of dollars in lost product.

there is not time to stop. It was my responsibility to continue to feed the traps to the two workers baiting them and pushing them into the water. I had to suck it up until we finished, and I did, but it took a great deal of concentration to not hurl over the end of the boat.

We then headed back to shore, loaded up the rest of the traps onto the boat, same as the day before. Luckily I had help moving the traps. The additional worker came on the boat with me, and together we worked to get the traps in the water. I was less sick this time as I took a Bonine, which is a stronger motion sickness medication. It worked. We finished up the first "full" day of work at around 6 p.m. It was the single hardest day of my life.

Until the next day when we pulled traps, which became the new single hardest day of my life.

For 16 hours I worked on the boat, mostly putting small rubber band on the lobsters. We caught what was believed to be more lobster than any other boat that day, totaling 5,165 pounds.

Each lobster weighs about one pound, and although I didn't band every one myself, it was still a lot of rubber bands.

We braved a damaged part of the boat, setting us back two hours, cold, wind and exhaustion.

It was worth it though, as watched the sunrise and set during my work day.

The next day went smoothly, and my hands, not quite fully recovered from "banding" the day before, somehow managed. I suppose I was running primarily on adrenaline. Friday was slated for a half-day, as I was moving over the Chris' father's boat as his crew would be able to handle the lighter 'catch for the third day of hauling. I was going to split the workload with my fiance's father.

My brief excitement at the prospect of an easier day was shattered nearly as bad as the first mate's hand on my new boating assignment. His hand caught between the boat and a trap as it was being raised, tearing ligaments and swelling his hand to the point he needed to be taken ashore.

By the time we finished Friday I was just about spent, but the paycheck and lobster dinners made the entire experience more than worthwhile.

It was during that first group of traps, though, I had my first setback. With only one Dramainine in my system, I was not able to combat the combination of the rocky seas, constant motion on the deck and my first full day on the boat I was sea sick. As the job description required, however, For lobsterman on Grand Manan this is a day at the office. I was stunned by the endurance, strength and relative cheer that they exhibited while working.

I was invited back next year, and I will return with a newfound appreciation for the outdoors, hard work and lobster. I'll also remember to pick up a double supply of Bonine.


The Make-A-Wish foundation helps give children with lifethreatening illnesses a chance to . live out a dream or fantasy.

Guilderland music program humming a happy tune

Two honors bestowed on the district in recent weeks

The announcement of two honors last week was music to the Guilderland School District's ears.

The Guilderland Music Department announced that Guilderland High School has been designated a 2009 Grammy Signature School finalist, according to information from the district. In addition, it will send a contingent of students to the Area All State Music Festival in Saratoga.

The first distinction will allow the school to vie for funding for the district, officials said.

"It's a recognition of the great work we do," Lori Hershenhart district music supervisor said. "This designation and honor is based upon the quality and caliber of the music education

program in the school,"

according to the district. "The top 100 high schools from all across the nation are invited to submit recorded performances to vie for these prestigious awards.

Hershenhart said she had submitted recordings that the school made in the previous year to get them entered as a "top 100" school. Five-minute clips from various styles of music are submitted with the hopes they will then be selected into the top five.

"Hopefully, if it comes out in the top five, there's a monetary award," she said.

She said with the tight economy, some additional funds for the music department would help it grow and become even stronger than it is now.

Rae Jean Teeter, a vocal music teacher at the high school, said Guilderland is often recognized for its achievements in music because the students are prepared at an early age with a consistent and unique teaching strategy. "Part of it is that we have a curriculum that is really global."

"Part of it is that we have a curriculum that is really global," she said.

Students from K-12 are all taught with the same technique that teaches music the same way young children learn to read.

Pattern recognition and an awareness of what is going on with other music groups helps the students develop a better ear for playing, Teeter said, ultimately leading to stronger musicians.

"They're hearing what's on the page before playing what's on the page," she said.

The technique has been slow to catch on she said, and

school districts like Niskayuna and East Greenbush use it to a degree. She said, though, that Guilderland is one of the only ones in the area that does it for kindergarten on up, and now with full-day K, the strategy will be even easier to teach.

In addition to the Grammy recognition, the school will also be sending 20 students to the Area All-State Music Festival in Saratoga Springs, Hershenhart said.

The New York State School Music Association is the sponsoring agency for festival and she said that she is proud of the students in the district.

The festival was hosted by Saratoga Springs High School on Friday, Nov. 20 and Saturday, Nov. 21.

These ensembles consisted of student musicians from nine counties including Albany, Fulton, Hamilton, Montgomery, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady, Warren and Washington counties, according to information from the district.



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Adopt-A-Family program calls for sponsors

County says there's a shortage of donors, increased need this year

It's long been established that the recession is having an effect on charitable giving, but the direct result between a spike in need and downswing in giving may be most evident in initiatives like Albany County's Adopt-A-Family program.

Run through the Department of Children, Youth and Families, the program links sponsors with families in need who might not have a holiday without a little help. This year, however, organizers are concerned that for the first time in recent memory there may not be enough donors stepping up to meet the demand.

"We're running a little lower on families than we would like to be at this point," said the department's Community Liaison Terilee Dodge. "Usually by this point in time we'd have like to have most of our donors."

The department likes to have families matched with donors by early December. But as the formal start of the holiday season approaches there are still many families not covered. The program has been running for 30 years.

Last year, 249 donors ended up helping 320 families through the program, and this year only 128 donors had been signed up as of press time. There are at least 70 families without sponsorship, many of them larger families, said Dodge.

Sponsors, who are individuals, business and other community organizations, work with the department to find out the needs of their sponsored family, buy gifts for them, wrap the gifts and then deliver the bounty to a case worker or the family itself, if that is agreeable to both sides. The general guideline is that sponsors should expect to spend about \$100 per person in the family, and

they're not required get to everything o n 'family's wish list.

Family Program will bring special meaning to this time of year for these families."

Some organizations pool resources to participate in the program. At the University at Albany, athletic teams sponsor families of varying sizes, said

Oftentimes, the needed items are basic toiletries, outerwear, shoes, clothing and food. Dodge said that those who aren't able to sponsor an entire family can donate items, money or gift cards to help out.

"We really realize that, especially this year, that people and businesses might not be able to adopt a whole family...but anything people can do will help," said Dodge.

In past years, the Adopt-A-Family program has been able to provide something to every family requesting assistance. Dodge estimated that about 90 percent of families receive sponsorship, and the rest get gift cards to Price Chopper or Wal-Mart, usually in the amount of \$100, though larger families might receive more if resources allow it.

"We have a wonderfully committed group of donors who return to the program each year, but we desperately need more to meet the need," said Colette Poulin, commissioner of the Department of Children, Youth and Families, in a statement. "As families now work harder than ever to stretch their resources, I Thave no doubt that the Adopt-A-

Assistant Athletic Director for Student Athlete Enrichment Carl Anderson. It's something the department has done annually since 2005 because it offers a unique hands-on service opportunity.

We just feel that for our student athletes, it's kind of an eye opener for them," he said. "I think the delivering aspect of it really opens their eyes...no matter how bad they think they've got it somebody's got it worse.'

Athlete Advisory Committee fully expects to meet the level of sponsorship provided in previous vears.

Albany County received a shipment of 1,100 H1N1 vaccines on Tuesday, Nov. 17.

According to Mary Duryea, spokeswoman for Albany County Executive Mike Breslin, the county had 2,343 vaccines left over from the last clinic, which was held on Sunday, Nov. 15. But two days from when the county announced on Wednesday, Nov. 18, that it would be holding two more clinics, the remaining vaccines, with the addition of the new shipment, were spoken for.

Our registration filled up Anderson said that the Student today," Duryea said Thursday, Nov. 19. "There are no more spots for those [clinics] right now. Those are filled up."

Durvea said the county The Department of Children, shipped some of the 2,343 vaccines left over from the first clinic to pediatricians in the county. The remainder will be distributed at the clinics.

> According to a county press release sent on Wednesday, Nov. 18, there would be enough of the vaccine to distribute to 2,000 individuals at the Sunday clinic and 300 individuals at the Tuesday clinic.

> We just encourage anyone who is in those target groups to get the vaccine as recommended by the Center for Disease Control,'

Duryea said. "Those people have the most complications from the virus.'

The target groups, Duryea said, include people from four to 24 years old; people 25 to 64 years old who have medication conditions that leave them at a higher risk for flu-related complications; people four years old and older who live with or provide care for infants younger than six months old; pregnant women; and health care personnel.

These two clinics will only be servicing the target groups as described above, according to the press release.

"At this time, the Albany County Health Department does not have vaccines for children six months through three years of age," the release said.

On Thursday, Nov. 19, Duryea said the reason the two clinics planned for this week will not be servicing children in those age groups is because those children require a different dosage and the county had run out of that dosage during the first clinic and have not-yet received more.

Durvea said that while it is not known when more clinics will be available for distribution of the vaccine, the county is planning clinics on a weekly basis after it receives shipment of the vaccine.

Duryea said the county never knows how much of the vaccine it will receive and when it will receive it, and that it is at the discretion of the state health department and Centers'for Disease Control as the vaccine has limited availability at this time.

"It makes our planning a little difficult. We don't know how much we're going to get and when we're going to get it."

The county is planning future clinics, though it is not yet known when, she said.

Duryea said that the county decided to have one clinic in Berne so that it could spread out the clinics in the county and be able to provide those county

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Anonymous donors gives almost \$40K after reading Spotlight article

It's amazing what difference one Good Samaritan can make.

Last week, Desiree Kalleigh, the owner of Good Times restaurant in Ballston Lake, was set to go into foreclosure for failure to pay her property taxes. But when a local man-who wishes to remain anonymous-read about her plight in The Spotlight, he walked into her business the next day with a check for \$40,000.

"His motivation was to give me hope," Kalleigh said, who went with her son straightaway to the county offices and paid up her back taxes. "Somehow he knew that I had no more choices."

The benefactor said that he had been struck by divine influence the night after reading the Nov. 12 story, and simply asked Kalleigh that she pay him back when she

was able.

The past few years haven't been the best of times for Kalleigh. She owed taxes from 2007 to present, according to the county, and had fallen behind largely because her husband's secondary progressive multiple sclerosis and Alzheimer's had

that she simply didn't have and couldn't get a loan for. The problem was compounded by state property tax law, which says payments must be made from the most recent year backwards. Without being

> my taxes, she said. "And when they told me I couldn't I got angry.

made contact with legislators like Congressman Scott Murphy and Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand, but has not heard back from them. She said that even though her own tax troubles are over, she won't stop pushing for reform to the tax laws.

"Really, it came down to salary in this contract," said Lin Severance, assistant superintendent for human resources, at the Guilderland Central School District. "We were able to make significant

As this contract winds down, she said, the district will take another look at giving the TA's a raise. The goal is to have a new contract in place before this one expires, she said.

More work remains to be done, as the district and TA's are: strive toward 80 percent of the average TA salary in the Capital District. something Severance said was not achievable in this contract.

The contract is a four year deal, ending on June 30, 2012 with funding for the raises coming from a combination of attrition, with a number of retirees not being replaced, and budgeted funds. Severance said there are 190 TA's working in the district.

"The workforce has actually been reduced by 30 over the last couple of years," she said.

The former contract expired on June 30, 2008, and negotiations began close to January for the one ratified by the board.

"We worked hard with [the] union. I think we're both very pleased with the outcome,' Severance said.

Shelters find pet owners are just one click away

Local organizations adopt out pets using national Web site

With a few clicks, you can get a pet pig, llama, iguana or tarantula. Or maybe you'd prefer just a simple cat or dog.

Whatever animal makes your tail wag, you can find it on PetFinder.com, a pet adoption Web site that allows people to adopt any animal they would like from across the country.

As the number of homeless pets remains at a constant high, several local pet adoption organizations are turning to the popular site for help in finding their furry friends a home.

Kim Saunders, vice president of public affairs for PetFinder, said the Web site, which was founded in 1996 by Jared and Betsy Saul, is constantly adding more pets to its searchable database.

On Thursday, Nov. 19, Saunders said the site had 321,521 adoptable pets.

"We update the site in real time," she said. "That number is constantly changing.'

When a person logs on to the site, they are able to choose what type of pet they would like, what gender they would like their pet to be, what breed, age and size they prefer to be and finally their location.

The user is not choosing the location they would like their pet to be from, but is inputting their own location so that PetFinder can locate the closest adoption agencies where they might be able to find what they are looking for.

The benefits to adopting a pet that is close in location to where you live, Saunders said, is that the pet has less distance to travel. Some adoption agencies require a fee for the transportation of the pet to get to its new owner and others require the owner to pick up the pet in person.

"It really depends on the

groups. Some of our groups will adopt to long distances, some groups will require the person to come and get the pet or there's a lot of these sort of canine underground railroads where pets get transported to someplace by a series of cars and volunteers," Saunders said.

This means local organizations that sign on to PetFinder, the easier it is to get the new addition to your family to you.

There are about nine organizations in Albany connected with the site, and others in Delmar, Scotia, Rotterdam, Saratoga and Menands.

Judie Jancio, founder of Kitten Angels, in Delmar, said her organization, which fosters kittens out of the L.C. Smith Pet Center on Delaware Avenue, has been able to adopt out kittens to several states through the help of PetFinder.

"I just adopted out to Vermont, Connecticut, Massachusettseverywhere! It's a wonderful way to get the kittens adopted," she said. "PetFinder has helped us tremendously by getting the word out of what we do."

Kitten Angels is very selective about who can adopt kittens, Jancio said, and after a user finds the Kitten Angel kittens on PetFinder, they must also complete an application on Kitten Angels' Web site. The kittens adopted out by Kitten Angels are under the age of three months old, she said.

They have to be able to care for the kitten," she said. "I am not going to let them go somewhere they will need to be rescued [from].'

At The Happy Dog Pet Hotel, in Rotterdam, a boarding facility that also adopts out pets, Owner Kim Kranick said that PetFinder helps the establishment reach more potential pet owners than are in just the immediate area.

"It gets the pets out there and in a whole 'nother area other than just the Schenectady area," she said.

The Happy Dog Pet Hotel takes in many strays from the Rotterdam area, Kranick said.

"We keep them for a couple weeks and if no one claims them, we adopt them out," she said.

Through use of PetFinder, Kranick said the establishment was able to adopt pets Massachusetts and Vermont.

PetFinder also helps bigger organizations that are faced with overpopulation at their facilities after taking in so many strays.

The Mohawk & Hudson River Humane Society, in Menands, uploads photos of all available pets to PetFinder, according to Executive Director Brad Shear.

"My understanding is that it's one of the most often visited sites on the Internet, so we attract people that maybe wouldn't find us ordinarily," he said.

Through the site, Shear said the society has been able to adopt to many places that are far, but within driving distance for owners, such as Lake Placid.

While an Internet adoption site such as PetFinder may not have the same bark as a local adoption agency where you can visit the pet in person, it has the bite local adoption organizations are looking for when it comes to getting their pets adopted.



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
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I Fill Inkjets expands **Price Chopper partnership**

Local business now in 75 stores in six states

Mark Tremont's business just got a little bigger.

The owner of I Fill Inkjets, which is located at the Four Corners in Delmar, recently expanded his partnership with Price Chopper to offer satellites of his service at 75 stores in six states.

That's about 50 more stores than he was previously affiliated with, and it means Tremont is onthe road a lot setting up signs and drop boxes and training Price Chopper staff.

By Tremont's estimates, his store in Delmar has refilled about 30,000 cartridges for a savings of \$300,000 since 2005, when he moved his operation from Colonie Center to the Four Corners. When factoring in his satellite operations, the business has serviced 100,000 cartridges, he said.

"Clearly we're pleased with the offer that I Fill Inkjets presents, not only in that it gives value to consumers, but also in that it offers more sustainable ways to do the things that we all do every day," said Price

Chopper Spokeswoman Mona Golub.

Tremont can't use the exact ink formulas that come in your cartridge from HP or Lexar the recipes are patented but through research and experience, he's developed about 70 formulations of highquality inks that he says work just as well as the original article.

"I've yet to get a return for quality," he said.

Sometimes the cartridge itself will fail, and in that case customers call the "help desk," which many are surprised to learn rings to Tremont's cell phone.

"With my company, no matter where you are in the Price Chopper network or Delmar, you get the president of the company," he said.

Expanding to new locations means that a cartridge refill service will be available to those in rural areas who would have either had to travel long distances or use do-it-vourself refill kits to get more use out of their print cartridges.

"It enables this service to be brought to people in communities that wouldn't have been able to take advantage of it," Tremont said.

The biggest obstacle to

his business, however, is not convincing people that it's a good idea to refill their ink cartridges, but to have them make the decision to do it when the time comes. Tremont believes it's just human nature to run out and buy a new cartridge because running out of ink can be perceived as an emergency, even when it's not.

"You've got to change that behavior and say, 'wait a minute, I've got an option," he said. "It all depends if people find out about it and then embrace it."

As for the supposed digital revolution and a push toward paperless lifestyles, Tremont said that trend hasn't been felt . at his business.

When you take a printer cartridge to a Price Chopper the turnaround time will likely. be longer than at Tremont's Delmar store. Employees that Tremont trains will refill the cartridge in the back of the store for pickup the next day, while Tremont's staff at the Four Corners will have them ready for pickup later the same day.

Price Chopper runs 120 stores, according to Golub.


'Certainly, the possibility remains to work with him even further," she said.





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

Board of Education in October voted to rule out the elementary school locations.

Schweigard was joined by Lou Cornacchia, president of New Rochelle-based Scinetx Corporation, which conducts studies on cell tower radiation levels, among other things.

Cornacchia placed his seal of approval on the cell tower's health implications, saying that even with four providers placing antennas there, in the "worst case scenario" the level of radiation, or RF energy, put out by the tower would only rise to 1.38 percent of the FCC maximum allowable level.

"There is no threat here if the facility was installed and operated with four carriers," he said.

Cornacchia said that while his company has conducted similar tests for other tower companies, this is the first time he's worked with Independent.

Schweigard said that one service provider has lined up to use the proposed tower, with room for three more. The tower would be 110 feet tall, and be located about 400 feet from the nearest home and 1,400 feet from the high school.

A number of residents and parents rose to protest the tower, taking aim at Cornacchia's assessment of the health risks, among other things.

"Do we, as a town, want to make the decision to be the guinea pigs?" asked Janet Sorrell, who, like other speakers likened the government's knowledge of RF radiation to the dangers of lead paint or mercury, which turned out to be serious health risks.

"I didn't feel reassured by that information," she continued.

Cornacchia countered by saying that the level of RF energy coming from a cell tower pales next to what one is exposed to by talking on a cell phone, standing in front of a microwave or even walking by a motion sensor, and that technologies emitting high levels of such radiation have been in use for decades.

"We as a community have been exposed to an ampient RF environment for the last 70 years," he said. "This is not a new environment we're exposed to."

Others noted that the potential revenue from the tower is just a sliver of the district's \$88 million budget. Schweigard said the district stands to realize \$24,000 annually with one carrier, and that figure increase every year by 3 percent. The company would also pay property taxes to the town, with an estimated assessment of \$250,000 on the facility.

While the vote was split, board members were in agreement that \$24,000 is not an insignificant amount of money, especially considering the dire fiscal straits that lie ahead. It was noted the tower could pay for six modified sports coaches or make up the cost of holding night games with change to spare.

"Last year we had to cut \$1.5 million out of this year's budget, and we're looking to do that again," said board Vice President Lisa Allendorph. "\$20,000 would at least add something to that."

"If it's not this, then what is the community willing to give up and sacrifice?" asked board member Charmaine Wijeyesinghe. "Things will have to be given up."

The possibility of a cell tower on district property was raised during last year's budget discussions, when an emphasis was placed on developing alternate revenue streams to offset tough financial times.

District officials also noted that there is another proposal for a cell tower on private land already before the Town of Bethlehem that would be near Eagle Elementary School. If that tower were built, students would be exposed to a tower closer than Independent's proposed location and the district would not realize any rent.

"I think we're going to end up with a cell tower here anyhow, and I would prefer it wasn't next to Eagle Elementary," said board member Lynne Lenhardt.

Cell service is spotty in the area and practically nonexistent inside the high school, but there would be no need for two towers to be located next to each other.

It was not immediately clear when the letter of consent between the district and Independent would be signed, or when the company would take the project to the town. Under federal law, a municipality cannot reject a cell tower application on the grounds of health concerns.



part-time planner, as planned, and cut the workload of the internal controls officer in half.

The town has also postponed the purchasing of a new accounting system as well as a new telephone system Dolin said, to keep costs down for 2010.

Town Board member Rich Reilly said the town is looking good for now, and he supports the budget that has been adopted, but down the road the town must be certain keep a watchful eye on a number of potential costs.

Reilly said the town often uses between \$175,000 and \$200,000 for equipment for the highway department, but this spending habit might need to be addressed in the coming five to six years.

Both Reilly and Dolin addressed the possibility that pension contributions will rise in the coming years, based on information from the state comptroller's office. They each said the matter is something to watch in future years, but noted that the 2010 budget is looking healthy.

According to a statement from the comptroller's office in September, the 2011 rate will jump to 11.9 percent, up from 7.4 percent expected in 2010.

"While the pension fund has handled the market collapse better than most other public funds, there is no question that it's been hit by the crumbling economy," State Comptroller Thomas Di-Napoli said in the statement. "The Retirement System's Actuary has determined that employer contribution rates have to increase. In the past, when the market performed well, the rates decreased. Similarly, when the markets perform poorly, the rates have to increase."

The rates in 2011 will be comparable to 2005-2007, DiNapoli said.

Dolin said the town is prepared for any increases in the rate this year, and will make the appropriate adjustments when the 2011 rates rise.

"All we can do is deal with them if and when they arrive," Dolin said.


He said the town's reserve funds are doing well, with town wide reserves at 50 percent of the main fund, 85 percent of the B fund, and 30 percent of the highway fund.

Dolin noted another item the town will have to monitor closely as the year progressed is cuts related to the town designated engineer, where last years line was halved from \$33,000 to \$15,000.




