Poll returns mixed results

Most residents want more coverage, but are split on which tower

A poll conducted by the Siena Research Institute in conjunction with The Spotlight shows that Bethlehem residents are largely in favor of a cell phone tower being built in western Delmar, but they are less certain which of two tower applications before the town they prefer.

Talk about it!

Don Levy of the Siena Research Institute will give a presentation on the poll's findings. The public is invited and questions are encouraged.

In short, 14 percent of respondents said a tower proposed by Independent Towers Holdings LLC should be built on school district prop-

erty, 18 percent favored an application by ESCO Towers to build on private land off Van Dyke Road, 30 percent said either would be fine and 30 percent said no tower should be built.

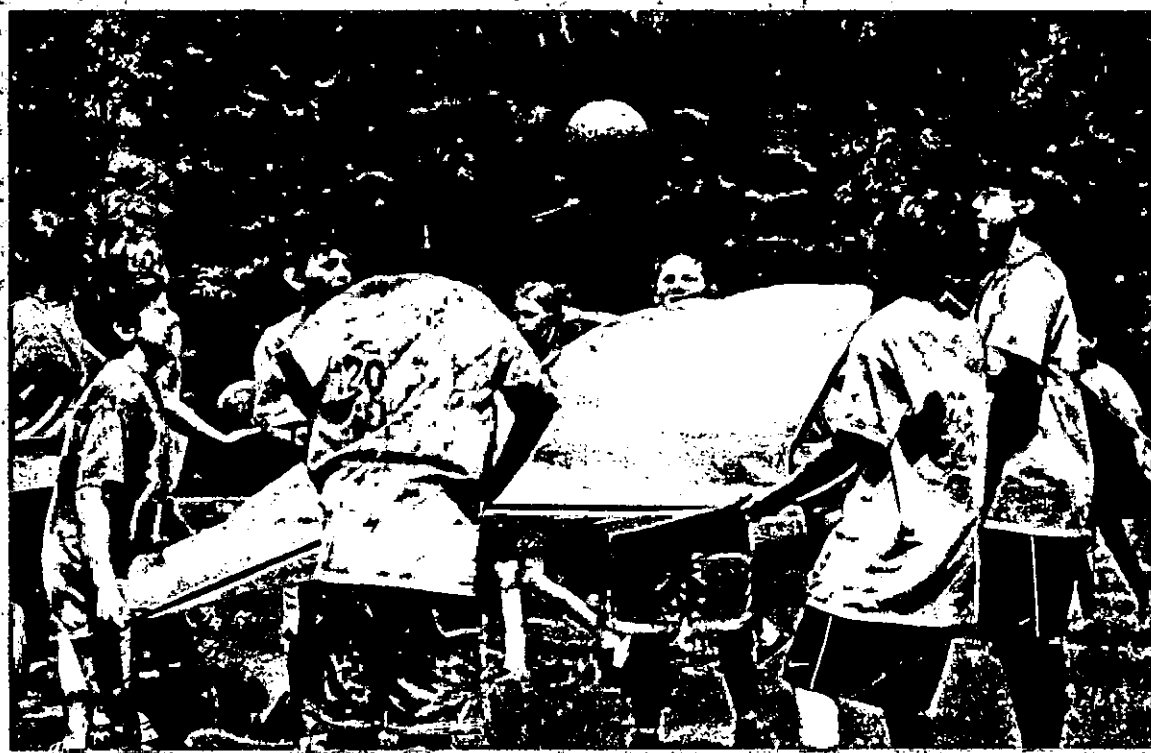
The survey canvassed 501 voters in the Town of Bethlehem between June 9 and 16.

"For an issue like this in a location like this, this is a very good representative sample," said Don Levy, director of the Siena Research Institute.

In addition to gathering opinions on the two applications, the poll gauged attitudes toward the quality of cell phone service in the town.

Krumkill Road to close

Eroding base could mean lengthy detours for drivers

Motorists be advised: come June 25, traveling between North Bethlehem and New Scotland may get a little difficult.

That's the day a short stretch of Krumkill Road will be closed, with no definite date in place for its reopening. The road base is eroding toward the Normanskill in a section of road that passes near the river, and officials are concerned it could either cause swift damage to the road or cave in entirely.

"We hope it's temporary," said Town of New Scotland Supervisor Tom Dolin. "The town highway superintendent and town engineers are investigating the cost of various alternatives."

The town has been monitoring the situation for several years and found the bed to be eroding at a more or

Westmere project set to start

Town Board approves motion for pipe relocation

Plans to uproot water and sewer infrastructure near the Westmere firehouse are under way after the Town Board approved a construction project last week.

As part of a plan to make improvements to and construct a new firehouse on Western Avenue, William Young, of the law firm Young, Fenton, Kelsey and Brown, sent Town Supervisor Ken Runion a letter asking him to put water pipe relo-

cation on the agenda.

The Western Turnpike Rescue Squad also gets water from one of the six-inch pipes being relocated.

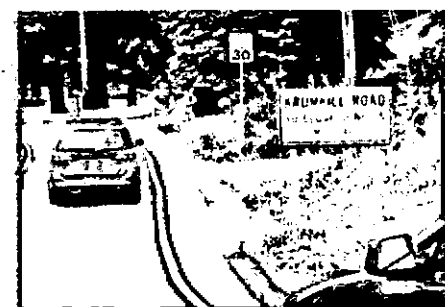
Runion said the plan to make improvements to the infrastructure is due to the growing demand of the fire department's resources.

"They needed more space, particularly because of some of the equipment they're handling," Runion said.

Runion said the board needed to give permission to relocate the pipes even though the overall construction project was already given voter approval.

Police investigate Glenmont counterfeit case

The Bethlehem Police Department is asking the public for help and advising merchants to be vigilant after a number of counterfeit \$100 bills have turned up, apparently from a woman who has

pulled the scheme in other areas.

Several of the bills turned up in the Glenmont area in late April, all being passed by a white female 25 to 35 years old, police said. In all cases, she made small purchases in order to obtain in change the maximum amount of genuine currency.

The bills all had the

same serial number and in each case the woman was observed having multiple \$100 bills.

Other incidents involving the same woman and counterfeit bill have occurred in Albany County, Ulster County, Liberty, Deposit and Purchase, according to police. The Ulster Police Department, Liberty

U.S. Secret Service are all assisting with the investigation.

Security camera footage shows the woman driving either a gray or silver 2007 to 2009 Suzuki SX4 Crossover or a 2010 Suzuki SX4 Crossover Touring with New York plates.

Businesses cited in underage sale sweep

State police have announced that three area businesses sold alcohol to a minor as part of an underage drinking initiative in Albany County, in which an underage volunteer was sent to 23 bars, convenience and liquor stores to attempt to purchase alcohol.

Delmar Mobil & Delish Deli, 317 Delaware Avenue, Delmar; Casa Mia, Route 9W in Bethlehem; and Durato's Restaurant, Route 155 and 20, Gunderland, were all cited by police as violation state alcohol beverage controls.

The clerk or bartender at these locations were arrested and charged with one count of unlawfully dealing with a child, a misdemeanor.

Cell use crackdown yields arrests

The Albany County Stop-DWI program launched a three-day initiative to cut down on illegal cell-phone use from area drivers, yielding hundreds of summons and a number of arrests, according to information from the police.

The Taking Action Against Driver Distraction enforcement effort lasted from Monday, June 14, to Wednesday, June 16.

There were 301 cell-phone related summons issued along with four seatbelt violations, one aggravated DWI arrest, four counts of unlicensed operation of a vehicle, one count of unlicensed operators and 85 other vehicle and traffic violations.

Police also arrested one suspect with an open warrant, one suspect on a charge of criminal impersonation, one person for criminal possession of a weapon and one person for operating a motor vehicle with a suspended registration.

"This county-wide initiative was in response to numerous complaints from the public and a clearly noticeable disregard of the law by motorists," according to information from the Sheriff's office.

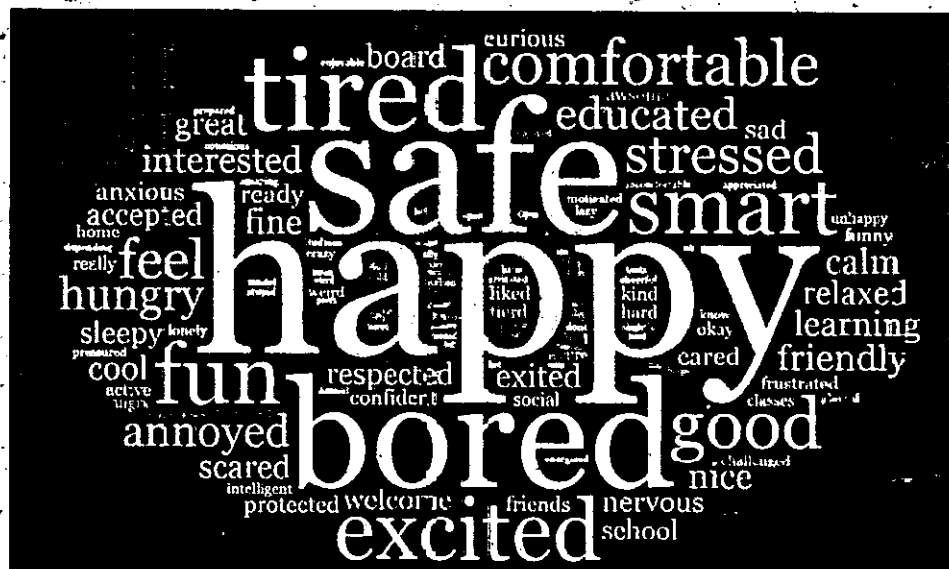

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BP and me — a story about friendship

As of this writing, British Petroleum has more than 1,800 friends on Facebook.

I have 22.

And while I could lament the fact that the company responsible for one of the biggest ecological disasters in my lifetime has nearly 100 times the "friends" that I have, I have to focus on the positive — something that inspires me to go on in spite of the fact that I am less popular than the company that blew millions of gallons of oil into the Gulf of Mexico over the course of 50 days.

You see, BP and I have something in common: We're both in trouble with The Man.

Last week, my father-in-law pulled into my driveway at around 3:30 in the afternoon, as he does every day, to get my son, Kevin, off the bus from school. This time, however, he arrived to find a state Department of Environmental Conservation truck in the driveway.

(He told me later that he didn't recognize what type of law enforcement vehicle it was and immediately thought I was dead. I asked why he thought only I was dead and he told me that he is an optimist at heart.)

In my backyard were two

EnCon officers. One of them raised his arms and asked my father-in-law, "OK, where's the oil?"

Now, My father-in-law is a good man, but he's no seasoned British Petroleum executive.

He gave those two DEC officers in less than a minute what even Congress couldn't get out of BP after almost two months: Culpability.

"It's in the garage," he said. I like to imagine that he punctuated this with the phrase "G-man," like in an old "Our Gang" serial.

My father raised the door on our dilapidated garage and produced for them a one-gallon container not entirely full of used motor oil.

"I changed my oil the other day," he told them. "Haven't gotten around to recycling it yet."

They laughed and told him that some well-intentioned neighbor had called in a complaint recently about us storing a barrel of used motor oil on our property. The officers gave my father-in-law a business card, told him to have

me call them and said he could recycle that gallon of oil at any Walmart.

On their way to the truck, I guess just to be sure, one of the DEC officers asked my father-in-law if we were running an illegal repair shop on the property.

"I told them you don't even know enough to keep your tires filled," he told me later.

This was all amazing stuff to my 7-year-old, who was sure that my wife and I were going to jail because we had vast stores of used motor oil on our property. This was appealing to him because he had just gotten a new Wii game and our incarceration would provide for him the opportunity to play it into the wee hours of the morning. When I asked him who would make him dinner, he walked over to our utensil drawer and produced a can opener.

We have made him too independent.

"In any case," I said, "we're not going to jail today, so why don't we go out and water your hibiscus."

Kevin is an avid and deadly gardener — this hibiscus being the latest victim of his interest in botany. He had a pine sapling given to him by his first-grade teacher, but that was forgotten soon after it was planted. There was also at one point a row of

nice petunias in our backyard, but Kevin trampled them in the pursuit of an errant shuttlecock shortly after they were planted.

He has planted and killed every type of flower, fruit and vegetable, and just as I was preparing him for a life of rock gardening, I relented and let him take a stab at a hibiscus.

It has lasted for about a month, but has grown no larger than we bought it.

Kevin noticed this when he was watering it and asked if we should add more wood ash to the soil around it. I'm no farmer, but my dad told me mixing a little ash into your soil can temper its pH and add some nutrients. So I keep a wheelbarrow of it on hand to —

"Wait a minute," I said into the air. I turned to look at the wheelbarrow of ashes and realized what might've landed me in the same category as British Petroleum.

The wheelbarrow, once half full of wood ash, was now, because of a few days of rain, filled to the brim with a pitch-black slurry of ash and water.

Those DEC guys weren't looking for a "barrel" of oil, they were looking for a "barrow" of oil.

I felt at once relieved to have figured this whole thing out and angry as hell that state officials were on my property because one of my neighbors has an overactive imagination and way too much time on their hands.

I had to tell my friend, BP.

I sat down at the computer and began composing a note to my brothers in environmental wrongdoing.

After a few feverish minutes of typing, my wife, Jess, asked what I was doing.

"I'm writing British Petroleum," I said. "Maybe their predicament is one big misunderstanding, just like ours is. Maybe they have a concerned neighbor just like us."

Jess put on the news: "No, Bill, I don't think so."

The following day British Petroleum CEO Tony Hayward and I made our peace with our respective government agencies. After watching Mr. Hayward testify to Congress, I called the DEC officer that left his card with my father-in-law. When I told him who I was, he laughed and said, "Oh yeah, the guy with the gallon of oil in his garage."

I replied with something I learned that morning: "When the investigation is complete we will draw all the right conclusions," I said.

"There's no investigation," the officer said. "The complaint is closed."

I said that I was "focused like a laser beam" on something or another without really addressing what he said.

He hung up.

After work, I checked my Facebook page and noticed that my own oil catastrophe had not affected the number of friends I had. I was still nowhere near BP's 1,800. I thought of one thing I could do on my page that BP could not.

I logged in and changed my status:

"Has just been cleared of oil-related offense."

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Students stage concert to raise money for Ugandans

Proceeds will finance micro-loans

Sara Weinman first learned about Uganda not from a textbook or documentary, but from a young African burn victim named Susan who was receiving treatment in the United States.

After her family housed the girl on behalf of doctors providing medical care in that poverty-struck country, Weinman became enthralled with Uganda and the efforts being made to help its people.

Now, the Bethlehem High School sophomore is organizing a fundraiser to do her own part. As a co-founder of Engeye Teen Connection—an offshoot of a group dedicated to providing medical care and educational opportunities to the residents of one Ugandan village—she and classmate Adriana King are organizing their first fundraiser to get ETC into the business of helping others.

“I wanted to get more involved with it,” Weinman said of ETC. “We were trying to do little things here and there, so we figured, why not form our own thing?”

The group will be hosting a “Cafe Night” at the Journey Journey United Church of Christ Saturday, June 26, with proceeds going to help provide craftmaking supplies for women in the village of Ddegeya. By making baskets or jewelry, the women can earn money while still being at home with their children, said King.

“Right now, we are focusing mainly on the women in Uganda and

“Our congregation from its very beginning a couple years ago has really made a commitment to a mission-oriented church,” she said.

Weinman and King are both members of the Journey congregation, but the teens who will be singing and playing instruments like guitar, piano and ukulele largely come from the circle of friends at BC High School.

Weinman will be making her first trip to Uganda over February break. She hopes to catch up with children the program has sponsored, including her sponsored child, Wilbur, and also help create new opportunities for the women of Ddegeya.

“They don’t really have much over there, because all they do is work,” she said. “At night all the men

helping them make a living for their families,” she said.

The crafts they make will be picked up by Engeye teams traveling to the area and brought back to the States, where ETC will sell them. It’s a micro-loan system, where the investment will get paid back after the benefit is established.

“They’re going to fully pay us back, and when we get paid back we’ll lend the money to someone else, and it will just keep going around,” Weinman said.

Sara Weinman’s mother, Theresa, is also involved in relief efforts in Uganda and has traveled

there several times. After learning of the Engeye effort through Theresa, a number of the Journey United’s families have become involved in the Engeye Scholars part of the program by sponsoring the education of Ugandan children, said the Rev. Sandy Damhof.

“Our goal is to one by one adopt these children, with the hopes that as they start coming back to that village they will have a profound impact on that village,” Damhof said.

It’s a good example of the type of work the church likes to get involved in, she continued, even with a relatively small congregation.

Editorial**Good food and good moves make for a healthy summer**

From a late June vantage point, summer stretches tantalizingly before us. Eating appropriately is the other part of the family health equation. A proliferation of farmers markets and fresh produce make summer dining colorful and appealing. The more varied the colors of the fresh produce, the better it is for your health!

Some tips for healthy eating:

- Enjoy family dinners together. Kids will watch their parents' (good) eating habits and pick them up! This is also a great time to chat

Competitive sports aren't for everyone and some kids seem more like houseplants than wild vines. Look for "solo" sports, or sports a family can do together. Try swimming, horseback riding, dancing, cycling, skateboarding, yoga, walking or jumping rope. Encourage your child to explore multiple activities to find one they really enjoy.

- Go 60 miles in 60 days

However your family enjoys being active, children should shoot for 60 minutes of activity every day, and adults should aim for 150 minutes of exercise each week. The NFL has long encouraged kids to "Play 60" in their outdoor

and enjoy one another's company.

- Let the children smell, touch, taste, ask questions and try fruits, veggies, yogurts and other healthy foods in the kitchen. Ask them what they think of the foods and let them know their opinions count.

- Get them involved in the kitchen. Let them help you with small, kid-safe jobs in the kitchen such as mixing ingredients

- Keep the junk food out of the house, and bring in a lot of healthy food. Even if this is hard for parents, the improved health makes it worth it in the end.

Budgets can be a concern, but bananas and baby carrots are reasonably priced and kid-friendly.

- Bananas

Great for: Snacks and fruit salads, yogurt parfaits, and smoothies. What's a serving? One banana. Nutrition Info per serving: About 121 calories, 3.5 grams fiber, 14 percent Daily Value for potassium (487 mg), 20% Daily Value for vitamin C.

- Baby Carrots (in bags)

Great for: Snacks, casseroles, stews, veggie platters, and side dishes. What's a serving? About 1/2 cup or 2 ounces raw. Nutrition Info per serving: About 21 calories, 2 grams of fiber, and 166 percent Daily Value for vitamin A.

Don't forget sleep with all that summer activity going on. Sleep is healthy food for the brain, and most children need at least nine hours of sleep each night.

Don't be discouraged if this seems like an unfair summer assignment. Take it in small chunks, but stick with it. Any parent will tell you that they'll do anything to protect their children — and good physical health is the best way to protect them.

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Albany Conservatives back Domenici for 46th

Cite family values and spending plan as reasons

Republican candidate for the 46th Senate District Bob Domenici received the Albany County Conservative Party's nomination in the wake of former candidate Joseph Vitollo dropping out last week.

Vitollo said he would support Domenici as the Republican candidate even before Domenici got the thumbs up from Albany County Conservatives on Friday, June 18.

"I am pleased to have received the endorsement of the Albany County Conservative Party," Domenici said. "Together, we will bring positive change to state government."

Albany County

Conservative Chairman Richard Stack said Domenici better fits the party's values than incumbent Neil Breslin, D-Delmar, and touted Domenici's qualifications.

Domenici retired from the Army after 22 years of active military service as a

Lieutenant Colonel. He is the recipient of a number of awards during his time in the military and operates a defense-based company in the Watervliet Arsenal called Strategic Response Initiatives, LLC.

Domenici said he plans to cap property taxes and expand the STAR rebate program as part of his platform, which focuses on reducing spending.

"We are seeing our state government slip further and further into debt. Our leaders cannot agree on passing the budget and the men and women of our state workforce have been threatened with layoffs. I ask you, is this leadership?" he said. "The days of three men in a room are numbered. It's time to change the way Albany does business for good."

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Local Grammy nominee comes to SPAC for Jazz Fest

Stefon Harris to play
Freihofer's festival**

Stefon Harris has gone to the jazz festival at SPAC for as long as he can remember. As a child, he would hang out at the two-day musical extravaganza that boasts world-renowned and emerging jazz musicians, and gaze at the stage, imagining what it would be like to be up there himself.

"I have very fond memories of being a child backstage or on the side of the stage, straining to see Herbie Hancock and all the other amazing musicians that were performing," said Harris, who graduated from Albany High School in 1991.

His dream of being the one under the SPAC spotlight has come true several times before, said Harris, but it never gets old.

"It's amazing to be back and is just one of the most special experiences for me," said Harris, now 37 and a four-time Grammy nominated vibraphonist. "I've played in a lot of good concert halls around the world at this point, but for me to be on the [SPAC] stage now is still a dream."

Harris is just one of more than 20 big names that will take to the stage for the 33rd Freihofer's Saratoga Jazz Festival on Saturday and Sunday, June 26 and 27. "Empress of Soul" Gladys Knight and jazz singer Al Jarreau & the George Duke Trio join him in this year's lineup, along with blues icon Taj Mahal, guitarist Al Di Meola leading a Latin jazz fusion band and alto saxophonist Gerald Albright, among others, on SPAC's Amphitheater and Gazebo stages.

For Harris, coming home to play is just another stop on his journey to be the best at what he loves to do, which he said he hasn't accomplished yet.

"It's funny because my passion is for the music itself, so I never dreamed about the Grammys and things of that nature. I just dreamed about being a great musician and to this day I hold on to that dream," said Harris. "I work as hard as I possibly can to improve. My dream is still alive and as far as I'm concerned, I haven't come close to my potential. That keeps me inspired and always moving forward."

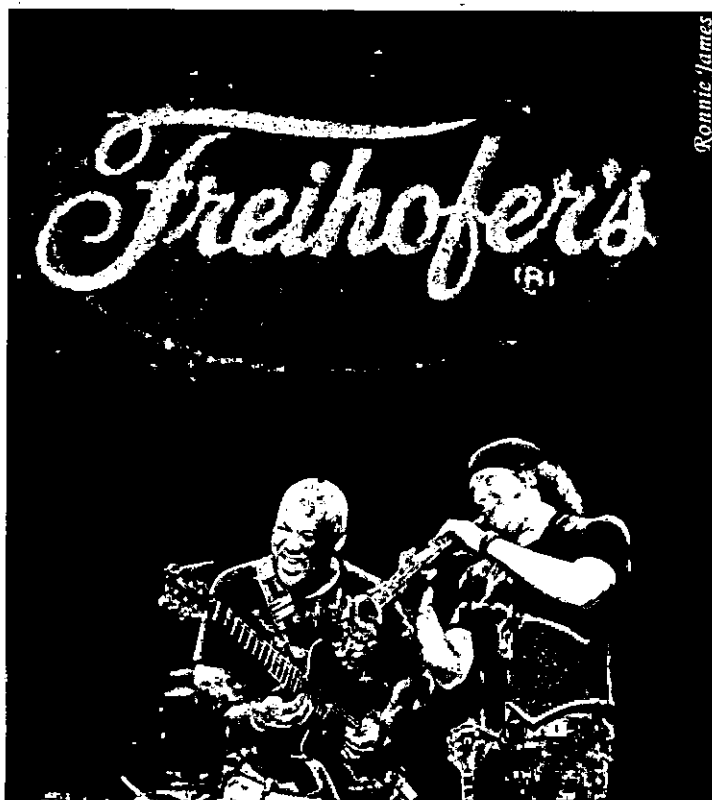
Harris has been hailed as "one of the most important young artists in jazz" by critics, but he got a humble start.

"I had a very broad

experience in public school, which I think was healthy. I participated in a variety of things and that helped me because I had to open my mind," said Harris. "Mr. Richmond and Mr. Lutz [his high school music teachers] always pushed me to be creative and explore. There was a strong sense of community and that made all the difference in the world for me."

Michael Richmond still teaches jazz at Albany High School and said he's stayed in touch with the successful man he knew as just a teenager. He said the diversity of the school "makes it a wonderful place for students to grow," and the pride he has for what Harris has become is all any teacher could ask for.

"When Stefon was a student, he was an excellent musician, just a wonderful young man and I'm so proud of everything he's done," said Richmond.

"He's always been such a humble young man that you knew was capable of incredible, great things."

Harris will showcase just what he's capable of on Sunday, when he and his band are scheduled to perform. He said the band is "super excited" and won't disappoint.

"There's nothing like coming home to play music, no matter where you play in the world, there's so much love and energy here. We're not holding anything back, we're leaving it all on

stage," said Harris.

Wherever he goes, be it a concert hall or educational event, Harris said he likes to leave musicians of all ages with an important message.

"One of the biggest things is you have to own your music spiritually. In jazz, sometimes people get caught up in the past and thinking of tradition; but when you really play music from your heart with passion, love and conviction, people in the audience can feel and relate to it," said

Harris. "That's what we need, something relative today. Young musicians need to break the rules. It's about telling your story. The story of the past has been told already and told well, so I wish everyone inspiration and if you love the music, people will love you for it."

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Sugarland star gives signed guitar to Delmar girl

Seventh-grader receives instrument, kiss at SPAC show

After Sugarland sang its hit "Baby Girl" at Saratoga Performing Arts Center on Friday, June 11, band members Kristian Bush and Jennifer Nettles each signed a guitar. Then Bush shouted to the crowd, "Who wants a guitar?"

Thousands of fans screamed in reply. But Mary Grace Barada, a 12-year-old from Delmar, merely watched wide eyed from her seat close to the stage.

"She just had her hands clasped, watching," Barada's mother, Melissa, said.

As Bush began to make his way into the crowd, Melissa caught his eye. She motioned to her daughter, and Bush stopped alongside the St. Thomas the Apostle seventh-grader. He put his arm around her, kissed her on the cheek and gave her the guitar.

"I couldn't believe it. I was shaking," said Mary Grace, a self-described "huge fan" of Sugarland.

"It was very sweet," Melissa said.

It was also only one memorable moment in a night full of them for the Baradas. When Mary Grace heard Sugarland was coming to SPAC, she mentioned to her parents that she would like to go. They bought her tickets as a surprise, but their seats were far from the stage, in the last row of the amphitheater.

"If we were any farther back, we would have been on the lawn," Melissa said.

So how did they wind up front and center for the guitar giveaway? There were empty seats near the stage, and an usher came

to their aisle and asked how many were in their party. When they told him three, he led them to three vacant seats up front.

"It was a series of inexplicable, fortuitous coincidences," Mary Grace's father, James, said.

"We were just so thrilled" to be closer to the stage, Melissa said.

That was especially true of Mary Grace, who became a fan of Sugarland's country music after listening to their songs at Double V Stables in Delmar, where she rides horses.

"That's all she listens

to," Melissa said.

So when Mary Grace realized Bush was heading right toward her and giving her the guitar, it was hard to believe.

"She said, 'Am I dreaming?'" Melissa said.

The moment was even harder for James to fathom, as he missed it. A physician, he got a page shortly before Mary Grace got the guitar. Because the amphitheater was so noisy, he had to step away to make the phone call. When he came back, his daughter was holding the black guitar with the two names scrawled in silver Sharpie on it.

"It couldn't have happened to a nicer person," James said. "She doesn't brag on anything like that. That's just kind of her style."

But there were some people Mary Grace had to share the story with. When she got home, she excitedly woke her siblings to show them the guitar before putting it in the basement to protect it from humidity.

The guitar won't stay in storage long, though. Even before the concert, Mary Grace had asked her parents if she could take guitar lessons. They had

balked, in part because she didn't have a guitar.

That's no longer a concern.

"I'm getting lessons over the summer," she said.

James said the experience has given his daughter some perspective. Not long before the show, one of the horses she leased at Double V had died and she was feeling sad about it.

"This showed her that good things can happen even in bad times," he said. "When things like this happen, it makes me happy to be a father."

Watervliet police get software upgrade

New data units give police information before traffic stops

Don't be surprised if a Watervliet police officer pulls you over for speeding and knows your name even before you can produce your license.

Through Albany County District Attorney David Soares' Making Crime Pay initiative, the Watervliet police department recently received a number of mobile data terminals used to find information about a vehicle, its registered user and possibly the driver before the car is stopped for any reason, according to Soares' office.

Soares, Watervliet Mayor Mike Manning, Police Chief Ronald Boisvert, Patrol Operation Supervisor Jack Kimmey, and members of the Albany County law enforcement community were on hand for a conference announcing the terminals at the Watervliet Police Department on Tuesday, June 8. Boisvert said he is glad Soares has made good on his promise to take care of the "river towns," namely the municipal police departments along the Hudson River from Albany to Cohoes.

"We are very happy and appreciative that he honored his commitment," Boisvert said.

Boisvert said Watervliet had similar technology, but the new units are vast upgrade, allowing officers a chance to more quickly see more information about a vehicle before a traffic stop.

"It gives us the ability

to run license plates at the scene of a traffic incident," Boisvert said.

The terminals allow for Internet connectivity and intermunicipal connectivity to give officers information about

arrest warrants and other contact the registered driver might have had with neighboring police agencies, he said.

"It's more robust software," Boisvert said.

The 26-member

department got five units costing close to \$5,000 each, including costs for the mounting hardware, Boisvert said.

The "Making Crime Pay" program uses seized assets from criminals

to make public and officer safety purchases. Other purchases, such as guns, license plate readers and bulletproof vests are made with Making Crime Pay funds.

Squeeze in fun at Freedom Park

When Greg Speck's son encouraged him to put together an accordion-based band, Speck was game. A long time musician, he figured he and his sons could play a couple of gigs together before he moved on to another project.

Of course, a band needs a name. So Speck and his sons, Alek and Nick, tossed out possibilities.

"It was a complete lark. We were joking," Speck said. "We said, 'Let's go with a superhero name.'"

And that's how Captain Squeeze and the Zydeco Moshers came to be. That was some 15 years ago, so Speck's notion that the band would be around for just a couple of shows was, well, a bit off.

But the band is certainly different from those early days. Alek and Nick, who were 12 and 16, respectively, when the band was first formed, have grown up and moved on to musical pursuits of their own. They've been replaced by a rotating cast of characters who have played with Speck everywhere from Long Island to the St. Lawrence Seaway. Captain Squeeze and the Zydeco Moshers are regulars at festivals and town parks in the Capital District, and they'll take part in the summer concert series at Freedom Park in Scotia on Saturday, June 26, at 7 p.m.

"Get ready to participate," Speck advised people who plan on checking out that or any of the group's other shows. "Get on your cell phone and invite 100 friends, because it's going to be a good time."

Having a good time is what performing is all about for Speck. An English teacher at Berne-Knox-Westerlo High School, he said that when he plays music, the emphasis is on "play."

"I gotta play music," he said. "I don't have to think of anything when I'm on stage."

Born into a musical family, Speck wanted to play an instrument as a kid, but there weren't a lot his parents could afford. Piano was out of the question. Accordion, however, was a good fit.

"My uncle was an accordion player," said Speck, who grew up in Auburn. "Lots of kids played."

When he was 8, Speck became one of them. He also plays keyboard, but takes a special satisfaction in accordion.

"There's something about accordion," he said. "When people hear it, they turn their heads and start smiling."

It's not simply the accordion's sound that makes Captain Squeeze and the Zydeco Moshers shows fun, he said. It's the type of music they play: lots of familiar pop songs mixed with the some original numbers.

"Make sure you put your dancing shoes on," he said, noting that the crowd at his band's shows spends much of the time on its feet.

That's typical at Freedom Park, where bands play in the amphitheater alongside the Mohawk River and audience members watch from blankets and lawn chairs, often eating dinner from nearby Jumpin' Jacks. Nell Burrows, president of the Freedom Park Foundation, said the group puts an emphasis on local musicians when planning the summer schedule, although it also tries to bring in one "bigger artist" each year.

This year, the headliner is singer and guitarist Grant Austin Taylor, who will play on Saturday, July 17. Just 13, Taylor appeared last year at Art Bike festival in Schenectady, where Burrows had a chance to see him play.

"I just thought he was phenomenal," she said. "I think he has great, great potential."

Still to come in June at Freedom Park are the Music Company Orchestra, a classical group playing on Sunday, June 27, and the New York Players, who will perform "party rock" on Wednesday, June 30. Acts are scheduled every Sunday, Wednesday and Friday throughout the summer, and sometimes on other days, too. All shows start at 7 p.m.

Donations help keep the shows free.

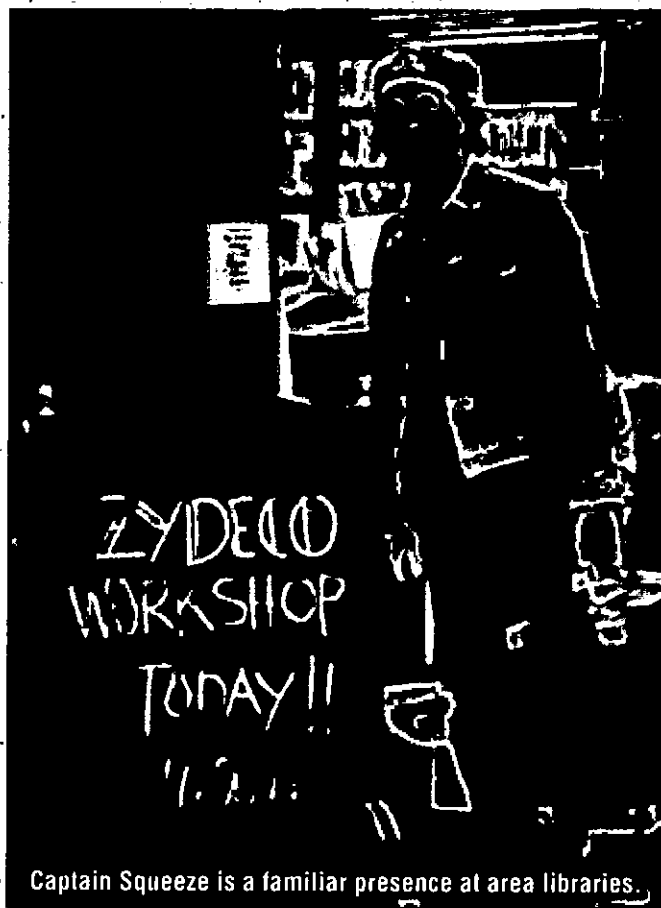
"We couldn't do this without individual support and

concert sponsors," Burrows said.

She noted that this was not an easy year for fundraising – some longtime sponsors bowed out and others had to scale back. But other businesses and people gave for the first time.

"We get lots of feedback," Burrows said. "People send notes with their membership dues saying they enjoy the concerts. Or they'll go up to the announcer at the show and say thank you."

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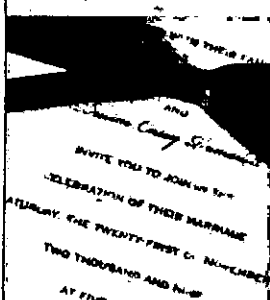


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Circus star lands scholarship

was approved 5-0 at the board's Tuesday, June 15, meeting.

The agenda item officially was to "consider accepting relocated easements for water, sewer and utilities in regard to Westmere Fire District Firehouse project."

Voters approved the overarching project in a March vote of 254 to 123. The bond resolution calls for \$5.27 million with the new firehouse project

possibly costing up to \$6.6 million.

Young said private contractors will be hired to do the labor, and they will be under the supervision of the town.

Young said the first part of the pipe relocation could take up to six months, with the rest of the project spanning 18 months.

He said the Westmere Fire District is planning to replace one building, construct an additional structure and take down two auxiliary structures. The primary goal is to

create more room to store equipment, he said.

Infrastructure improvements to the heating and cooling system and the roof are also in order, according to fire department officials.

"We continue to appreciate the total support of the community," Young said.

Young said the Westmere Fire District includes portions of the town extending from the I-87 Northway to Route 155 and is the largest population covered by a Guilderland department.

less steady pace. In the spring, though, a large crack appeared in the road that necessitated a closure so more investigating — and hopefully a repair — can be done.

"As soon as they close it, they'll have an opportunity to pull it apart and get a closer look at it," Dolin said.

The only solution that's

been presented thus far is to remove the clay road base and replace it with a more sturdy fill. The cost would be \$3 million, however, and the town has not been able to secure any outside assistance for the repair.

The town budgeted \$400,000 for road repairs in this year's budget.

The road closure will affect only a short section of the road near where the road crosses the river.

There are no homes or businesses in the affected area, but for the many motorists who use the road as a thoroughfare and those who live along it, the closure will make a detour to Johnston Road, Route 155 or Route 85 necessary, which can add miles to a trip.

Dolin said town staff is looking into cheaper alternatives for ways to fill in the road base, including a type of Styrofoam block.

"It's inspirational. It makes you feel hopeful and to enjoy life," said Patricia Audi, a 22-year breast cancer survivor.

Audi has been a Colonie resident for nearly 25 years.

Ninety-one percent of all respondents, and 99 percent of younger age groups, said they had a cell phone, and while a plurality said the reception was favorable, 26 percent said it was "excellent" and 30 percent rated it as "fair" or "poor."

Additionally, when asked what they heard from other town residents about reception, the percentage of respondents who said "excellent" fell by more than half.

"The takeaway is that there appears to be a need on the part of a majority of people for better cell phone coverage, and overall that the town supports there being a new tower," Levy said.

The issue of which tower will be built has been brewing for months, ever since the Bethlehem Central school board authorized Independent to pursue a tower next to the BC Operations and Maintenance building off Elm Avenue. ESCO's application for a tower off Van Dyke Road on farmer Chuck Preska's land has been before the town for about two years.

ESCO's tower would be approximately 1,000 feet from Eagle Elementary School, and Independent's approximately 1,400 feet from the high school. Due to the town's policy of collocation of cell antennas, it is highly likely if one tower were to be approved, the other would not.

Cell phone providers rent space on towers to place antennas, and the landowner reaps some of the benefits. Independent has told the school district it stands to realize at least \$24,000 per year from a tower, depending on how many companies locate there.

Independent bankrolled the poll in hopes of pinpointing public opinion toward their younger application, and to see if it would be worth pursuing a lengthy and expensive review process, said Independent President John Stevens.

He acknowledged ESCO had a "statistical edge" in the results, but said his company would continue.

"I think the information is too close to call at this point," he said. "We both [companies] would have probably wished that...it would have come out definitively one way or another."

Stevens said he believes either site would provide the same quality of service.

"Both applications have proven there's a need in that area," he said. "The main difference is whether it's on a private property or a public property, and who gets that benefit."

ESCO Vice President Tom Butler pointed out his application has already seen much scrutiny from the town and has Verizon and AT&T lined up as carriers.

"We have the No. 1 and the No. 2 carriers," he said. "We feel we've demonstrated... that there's a clear need for these carriers to have coverage at the Van Dyke tower."

"I think it's going to be benefit to the town, and I think it's also going to be a benefit to the farmer," Butler continued. "People in the Town of Bethlehem do want good cell service and I think this project is going to give this to them."

Both towers would be built with enough space for at least three carriers.

The poll also indicates a large swath of the public is unaware of the issue. Half of the respondents knew two applications had been made to the town. When asked early in the survey, 56 percent said they wanted more information.

But being better informed didn't have a great impact on final opinion. When asked how closely they were following the issue of cell tower development in the town, 10 percent said "very closely." Of that group, though, less than half ended up expressing favor for one tower or the other. In fact, their final opinion closely mirrored that of the rest of the responses.

"It appears as though each of these groups of varying levels of paying attention to the issues are only slightly different than the universe as a whole," Levy said. "Usually the people who are paying a lot of attention have a strong view one way or another."

This may speak to the fact 30 percent of respondents ended up saying either site would be fine with them. That group was generally uninterested in detailed questions like the towers' distance to BC schools.

"That 30 percent who say 'either is fine,' by and large this is not a big issue to them," Levy said. "They say, 'go ahead'... none of these things affect them that much."

Likewise, when asked to rate how concerns about the effect of towers — on property values, health and aesthetics — influenced their opinion, only a relatively small portion of all respondents said these elements were "very concerning."

"They're not convinced by what the supporters and opponents are saying," Levy said. "Those arguments wash through them... You're only left with these small groups of people who are arguing with each other."

"I wasn't convinced that the issues had been addressed by either side," said respondent Jim Kelly, who indicated he had been following the issue. "Proponents were pushing the revenues as a benefit... and at the same time I thought opposition to anything has to be based on fact... I'm hopeful this prompts some more serious discussion."

The most dramatic demographic differences were not between young and old, new and longtime residents, but between men and women, who expressed differing opinions almost across the board.

Men were more likely to say the town needs more cell coverage — 45 percent to 28 percent of women — and a greater percentage of men indicated they were aware of

the issue before the survey.

Females were much more likely to say any of the above negative impacts of towers influenced their opinion, especially any health risks.

Ultimately, women ended up supporting the tower on private land over the one on district land; for men, the opposite was true. But 37 percent of women said they'd be opposed to either tower, the highest of any choice for that demographic.

"My concerns are health related," said respondent Amy Conway, whose children attend Eagle Elementary. "Cell phone towers emit radiation, and radiation has adverse effects on health, especially the health of children."

But edging out the importance of health concerns by a nose were impacts to property values and visual aesthetics.

"Whether people are consciously aware of it or not, we got an excellent view of the Helderbergs from there," said Delmar resident Alex Yatskevich, who said he does not own a cell phone. "Any obstruction of that view I think would be very noticeable."

With the concern over towers being near schools, some respondents wondered why the two options were sited there in the first place.

"I didn't like the proximity to the schools, specifically," said Delmar resident Sherman Gates. "I think there are plenty of areas other than those two."

Stevens said he thinks the next step in the process should be to demonstrate the visual impacts of the two towers with balloon flights. Both towers would be 120 feet tall.

"I think it's going to come down to visual," he said. "The final decision of this who process is going to be which site provides the maximum benefit to the community."

Levy will give a presentation on the poll's findings at Town Hall on Wednesday July 7, at 7 p.m. The public is invited and questions are encouraged.

Maki steps up
for DutchmenRighty tosses
five scoreless
innings in win

Dylan Maki cooled off Mohawk Valley's bats, and the Albany Dutchmen rallied to make the right-handed pitcher a winner.

Maki shut down the Diamond Dawgs from the third to the seventh innings — long enough for the Dutchmen to turn an 8-0 deficit into a 14-8 victory in last Friday's New York Collegiate Baseball League game at Bleecker Stadium.

"I knew the guys would hit the ball," said Maki, who entered in the second inning in relief of starting pitcher Doug Dulin. "It just got me excited on the [pitcher's] mound to have the lead."

Albany (3-8) took flight with a five-run rally in the bottom of the fifth inning — highlighted by Kendal

over the left field fence. Then, the Dutchmen took the lead with a six-run sixth inning.

"To come back in the middle third [of the game], I can't say enough about the fight in these guys," said Albany manager Nick Davey. "They have that mentality that they're going to win every inning."

Catcher Jon Leroux and left fielder Will Owens had the big hits for Albany in its six-run sixth inning. Leroux belted a two-run double to center field to tie the game at 8, and Owens added a two-run single to right field to give the Dutchmen a 10-8 lead.

Maki did the rest for Albany. He limited Mohawk Valley to three hits and struck out five in his 5.1 innings of work. Guiderland High School graduate C.J. Sohl added two scoreless innings of relief.

Leroux and Owens each had two hits for Albany, which was coming off an 8-5 victory over Mohawk Valley one night earlier in Little Falls.
