No surprise, but it still hurts

state aid reduction

Schools locally and across the state are digesting figures in Gov. Andrew Cuomo's executive budget, released Tuesday, Feb. 1, and employees in the coming year.

Schools once again face sizable Cuomo's proposal calls for a \$1.5 billion, or 7.3 percent, reduction in state aid to school districts (bringing such aid to a \$19.4 billion item, or 29 percent of the state budget). If his figures are adopted by the Legislature — and there is at least tacit support for his proposal from many lawmakers — it will the the third vear running schools have seen aid fall.

Since the culling would be weighted by most are reluctantly drafting plans to dismiss need, suburban schools here in the Capital District would all see more than a 7.3 percent

reduction. In the Bethlehem Central School District, aid would decrease by about \$2.7 million, or around 10 percent. That's close to what administrators expected.

"It was probably wise for us to prepare a worst case scenario," said Superintendent Michael Tebbano of the district's ongoing budget discussions. 'We're going to be losing more personnel."

At a budget forum in late January, Tebbano said the district could stand to cut 20 teachers




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Painting the town red

RealtyUSA, Breathing Room partner to raise awareness of heart disease

Despite a growing campaign for a healthier society, many often forget that heart disease remains the No. 1 killer of Americans, and stroke the No. 3 cause. Every year the American Heart Association tries to bring this fact to the forefront with a Go Red for Women campaign, which this year fell on Friday, Feb. 4.

Two local businesses are going beyond changing their garb, though, and are partnering to hopefully effect a greater change on the community. RealtyUSA on Delaware Avenue and The Breathing Room at the Four Corners have been working to increase awareness about the American Heart Association's goals and to raise money for that organization. Both businesses are lighting up their Delmar locations red between Go Red Day and Valentine's Day.

At the Breathing Room, which offers Yoga, meditation and energy healing classes, a week of classes focusing on heart health has been scheduled. Donations for the AHA will be collected, or a portion of the proceeds from the sessions will be contributed. The Breathing Room has gone red in the past and participated in an AHA walk.

"We're always trying to participate the best that we can. A lot of it is raising awareness," said owner Mikko Cook. "Every year we kind of build upon what it is."

The classes have been advertised by RealtyUSA's Virginia O'Brien, who has distributed door hang tags around the community that not only include the class times, but seven heart healthy tips promoted by the AHA.

O'Brien is a recent addition to the RealtyUSA team, and as a longtime Bethlehem resident she wanted to support a local cause.

"I really wanted to start becoming more involved in my community," she said. "It's also about supporting your local businesses and doing things that involve yourself in your community in really positive ways."

Other members of the RealtyUSA team (Kathy Cooley, Cynthia Sobiecki and Sandra Tutshen) also helped with the campaign.

Breathing Room classes focused on the seven heart healthy tips, including a new workshop aimed at calming anxieties to quit smoking. The Breathing Room's schedule can be found at theroomtobreathe.com.

Cook and O'Brien are hoping their desire to Go Red will rub off on others, who will support the AHA or take a greater interest in their own health.

"It's just very relevant to everybody's life," said O'Brien. "Home is where the healthy heart is, and we want people to be sustainable in different ways."

Other area buildings lighting up red include the SEFCU, CDPHP and First Niagara buildings in the Patroon Creek Corporate Park in Albany.



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Vista gains first site plan approval

Vista Blvd. and one office building to be first round of construction

The first of many site plan applications for the Vista Technology Campus has been inked by the Bethlehem Planning Board.

The approval, unanimously issued on Tuesday, Feb. 1, clears the way for developers to start building Vista Boulevard and erect a 40,000-squarefoot office building at the end of that road, about 34 of a mile from Route 85.

The Planning Board will be taking another look at plans for that first structure before a building permit is issued, though. There were some concerns about the design for Vista's inaugural structure being too plain.

"Even though this building is 34 of a mile off the road, it is the first building," Planning Board member John Smolinsky said. "It's the first building tenants are going to see when they come to the park...this is what they're going to see when you; show them the site, so it's important that it's not. typical."

wouldn't sign on to a more expensive structure. Plus, he argued, the mere existence of Vista' first building will be proof enough to tenants that the campus is the place to be.

He also noted there are several dozen other buildings on the park's plans, and many of those closer to the road will see more interesting architecture.

"As we come back down, we know there's going to be a lot more articulation of the buildings," Nicolla

Nicolla also emphasized to the Planning Board. as he has to other town entities, that speed is of the essence when it comes to Vista development.

"We have to get this first phase done," he said. going to fall right in." Planning Board members did have questions about the project's buildout schedule and what sort of benefits the town might see in tax revenue, and when. Nicolla said if things go well, as much as 500,000 square feet of space could be built

in three year's time.

Columbia and its partners are seeking a unique funding structure to fuel construction of the nearly \$7 million Vista-Boulevard, which will also serve as the project's artery for water, sewer and electricity. The Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency has been asked to help by issuing tax exempt bonds to the builders, a plan that could see more development this month. The bonds would be paid

Schools draw down on snow days

2011 has thus far been one to remember when it comes to snowfall. January's snowfall totals approached record levels and storms continue to rake the northeast, snarling traffic, delaying travel and, of course, keeping kids home from school.

Including last Wednesday. when a storm packed an early-morning wallop but petered out by noon, most Capital District schools have canceled class three times this school year, which covers all the budgeted cancellations for some.

"We have officially used three snow days, which is a record for Bethlehem." said Michael Tebbano. superintendent of the Bethlehem Central School District. "Right now we're OK. If we need one more snow day kids will have to come to school on March 11."

That's scheduled as a superintendent's planning. day, when staff would show up to work but pupils would stay home.

But failing other options, schools will have to cut in to spring break should more cancellations be necessary.

That's less of a concern at Guilderland Central


School District, where administrators built four snow days into the schedule.


Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk schools are in the same basket as BC, said Superintendent Daniel Teplesky. The district had figured for three snow days, which it had used as of Wednesday, but also has a planning day in March.

An optimistic Teplesky is far from concerned. though.

"Idon't believe that we're going to use another snow day," he said. "There's no snow in my forecast."

If Global Foundries lives up to its promises, it will fundamentally change the landscape of the Capital District forever.

That statement may seem like a no-brainer, but we at *The Spotlight* don't think the area planners, politicians and residents have earnestly and honestly acknowledged what impact GloFo's success could have on the area.

On page 11, you'll see Alyssa Jung's story on Mike Relyea, president of Luther Forest Technology Campus, giving an update on the tech park's expansion and construction progress, specifically related to the GlobalFoundries semiconductor chip plant, at the Capital Area Technology Association's monthly meeting last month.

Relyea, as you would expect, quelled concerns that construction in the park is halted or hindered. Infrastructure piece, which is LFTC's role, is complete, he says, but there are still redundant systems that need to be built, like water and gas.

Overall, GlobalFoundries' progress is on schedule, he said, if not a bit ahead of schedule for the tentative date to go online: the fourth

quarter of 2012.

What's more interesting is what Relyea briefly said

about another, not-so-technical industry in the area: daycare.

"Because [GlobalFoundries] is a 24/7 facility, the need for daycare in the town of Malta or within a 15 minute drive of the fab at 4 a.m., that doesn't exist today but it will probably exist a year from now," he said. "What's the traffic flow? Foot counts? All this stuff is going on quite regularly and we're trying constantly to analyze it and [identify] the needs."

Relyea isn't the only person that needs to analyze this possibility. GloFo is less than two years from operating. How many daycare providers have sat down with their families and discussed having to go to work a few hours earlier than they do now? How many sandwich shop owners and employees throughout the area have thought about it?

How many Malta residents have taken a look at Route 9 during the evening drive home and thought to themselves: "After GloFo arrives, this road may be just as busy at three o'clock in the morning as it is at eight o'clock at night?" And how many Capital District residents have made that same consideration of the Northway or 787?

We often hear our elected officials trumpet the ancillary effects that GloFo will have on business: more people filling gas tanks and stomachs, a shot in the arm for projects like the Vista Tech park in Bethlehem. But we in the Capital District have failed, as a large community, to consider that this development will alter the way we live our lives.

That is not a statement made to condemn or promote GlobalFoundries, it is merely a statement of fact. The Capital District — certainly Saratoga County — you knew, and know today, will not be the same one you will know after fourth quarter of 2012.

New Over-Expenditure bill would keep New York out of debt

Talk about shop till you drop... Black Friday shoppers have nothing on the taxpayer-funded spending splurges by some rogue state agencies.

Now that Governor Cuomo has unveiled his budget proposal for the state fiscal year beginning April 1, the race is on for some state agencies and political leaders to not only deficit spend, but also quietly spend surplus taxpayer money before a new budget is passed.

They're going shopping with your money, not necessarily because they have been authorized to by the Governor and Legislature or because the purchases are necessary, but at times solely because they may have extra cash in their coffers.

Oftentimes, a state agency will have a small amount of money left over at the end of the year and unilaterally go on a last minute spending binge.

Pretty soon this impulse spending adds up to big dollars. This irresponsible spending is even more concerning given New York's crushing budget deficit which is projected to be up to \$10 billion.

We've all heard the stories of needless, wasteful government expenditures: hammers and toilet seats that cost governments hundreds of dollars, and funding \$400,000 "Ghost Ship" commissions that have outlived their missions, just to name a few.

Nowhere has the wild overspending been more outrageous than in the recent revelations that the former Democratic majority in the Senate spent at least \$10 million over budget on posh office space while larding-up on staffing and political appointees.

Meanwhile, as the State

of New York at Albany faces deep budget cuts, job losses and potential tuition hikes, the university handed out \$1.2 million in so-called

"discretionary" raises at the end of the year.

These two examples could be the tip of the iceberg.

The \$136.5 billion New York State budget is really an amalgamation of hundreds if not thousands of smaller state agency budgets. Consider this: there are more than 70 state agencies, 64 colleges in the State University of New York system and 20 City University of New York campuses.

This is on top of the scores of public authorities that have little oversight by the legislature or executive branch. Each of these entities can be divided into smaller agencies, bureaus and departments each with their own little budget.

That's a lot of hands in the proverbial taxpayer cookie jar.

Oftentimes state agencies fear that if they come in under-budget they'll face steep cuts in funding for the following year. So instead of returning taxpayer dollars these agencies go on a shopping spree.

State agencies that are fiscally responsible and spend only what they have been authorized to spend and not a penny more

should be commended, not penalized. Unfortunately, what's developed in state government is a culture of spend first and ask the question of need later. No wonder New York is as Governor Cuomo put it, "functionally bankrupt."

In response to the wild spending sprees by state Senate Democrats and others, I am introducing the O.U.T. (Over-Expenditure/Under-Expenditure/Transfer-Notification) of Debt Act to prevent future taxpayer malfeasance.

For New York's government it should be O.U.T. with end-of-the-year spending binges. Too many agencies attempt to empty their coffers at the end of the year to justify their budgets. This is when deficits are created and expanded.

My legislation would require that all leftover funds are allocated to the general fund to pay down debt or reduce the tax burden on our citizens. If state agencies fail to comply, the Comptroller would be mandated to cancel any unapproved over-expenditures/under-expenditures or transfers.

A rogue state agency doesn't need to waste taxpayer money on padding the payroll with political patronage or buying tens of thousands of extra paper clips just because there's still cash in their account.

If it's important enough to spend tax dollars at the last minute then it's important enough to get authorization from the elected officials that actually pass the budget.

This is the taxpayers' money and should be returned to help pay off state debt and reduce property taxes.

This bill won't erase New York's deficit on its own, but it will provide the kind of spending transparency the state needs to help get out of debt and save taxpayers from getting fleeced by end-of-year spending sprees.

> 'We're hopeful that that group will operate the premises as a golf course... but it certainly could be someone looking to put houses up there," he said.

The property would housing development was Marie Schilling 'to occur there. The course is situated just south of the Normanskill in Delmar.

The Town of Bethlehem is considering entering its own bid for the property, though Other area municipalities, including Colonie and Guilderland, operate large golf courses. Bethlehem already operates Colonial Acres, a 9-hole, par-3 course, without a banquet facility like Normanside.

Supervisor Sam Messina said he'd hope to see a private buyer emerge for the club, but now there's a discussion ongoing about buying the roughly 270-acre property.

"This was a tax source and also a major recreational source in our town," Messina said. "The fact that it closed down is not good news for our community."

The Bethlehem Town Board convened a special, closed-doors meeting on Monday, Feb. 7, to discuss real estate prospects. Under the laws governing such executive sessions. the board does not need to disclose details of the meeting, and officials declined to discuss the nature of the session. It was called on Friday afternoon, however, shortly after news broke that Normanside was shutting down.

Town leadership has often said finances are becoming increasingly tight. The 2011 budget process saw the Town Board sparring over employee raises and spending plans, and that body is still deliberating what professional organizations to belong to, a matter amounting to less than \$15,000.

It's unclear what Normanside could cost the town, but given the location and facilities, it would likely be a sevenfigure deal. The difference between budget worries and a Normanside bid, said Councilman Kyle Kotary,

is that such a purchase could be an investment opportunity.

"If we can turn a \$20,000-plus profit at Colonial Acres, there's no reason why we could not potentially — do the same at Normanside," he said. "I'm going to take a look at the numbers...and I'm going to say, especially now, does this make sense to us?"

During the peak season, Normanside usually employed around 60 people, Byrnes said. and contributed hundreds of thousands of dollars in local property and sales taxes. At last count, the club had about 240 members.

The Bank of America will accept bids for the property's mortgage through Feb. 23.

Normanside had for months been trying to boost membership with deep discounts. It also revamped its dining room last year, outsourcing operations to Panza's of Saratoga Springs. The dining room had its last service in late January.

Byrnes said he still has hopes the Normanside property will remain a golf course or club, but country clubs everywhere have been struggling in the economic downturn. The club was unable to find a buyer who was willing to continue operations.

"The club had been working since October with the bank to find a new owner of the property," Byrnes said. "We worked really hard."

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

How cold is too cold for my dog to be outside and do I have to worry about salt melt?

In the winter, dogs should always have access to a warm and enclosed shelter that contains warm bedding and fresh water. They should never be left tied up unattended. Cold tolerance depends a lot on breed, body size, age and past experience with acclimating to the cold. For example, a young adult German Shepherd in good body condition that has been an outdoor dog his whole life will tolerate the cold better than an aged, thin Maltese who has mostly lived indoors. Be especially vigilant when there are deep dips in temperature during an otherwise average temperature winter (ie the swings in to the single digits and below zero). These dips can hurt even the most cold acclimated dog as they are unexpected by the body. Wind chill is also worrisome as the speed of the wind will make a normal winter temperature feel dangerously cold. In general, use caution and common sense when leaving your pet outside for extended periods of time, and do not leave them outside if there is any question about safety. Bring your pet inside if you notice these signs of hypothermia: lethargy, change in attitude, shivering, weakness or change in color of extremities.

Winter weather also brings about salt melt. While most of these are now made magnesium, which is safer than the traditional calcium and sodium based products, they can still be irritating to skin surfaces and cause irritation when ingested. We always advise wiping down your pet's paws with a wet towel after they have been outside. This will prevent prolonged skin contact with and ingestion of the materials. Look for ice melt products labeled safe for animals, available at most stores.

War vets, ex-CIA, FBI and Secret Service agents, all make popular heroes: Robert Crais created two memorable characters in Elvis Cole, ex-Army Ranger and Joe Pike, ex-Marine /LAPD. Jack Reacher, ex-Army MP Special Investigator, is a modern knight errant from Lee Child; Bob Lee Swagger, retired Marine sniper, a creation of Stephen Hunter.

Women also get called upon to perform. Agood one is Charle Fox (ex-Special Forces) who appears as a bodyguard in several voorheesvillelibrary.org.

Zoe Sharp novels. I also like Cody McFadyen's FBI agent Smoky Barrett and Amelia Sachs, who does the legwork for the amazing paraplegic Lincoln Rhyme in the very popular Jeffery Deaver series.

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
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Couple wants Niskayuna to OK fowl play

Proposal would add 'micro-farming. poultry permits to town code



One couple is hoping to persuade Niskayuna official to accept their proposed changes to the town code and allow chickens in areas zoned residential.

"We went to court for the chickens, and they found the town code wasn't clear about it," said Brenda Helm. "I thought it was a good opportunity to make it clear ... and to make sure it is protected.'

On Jan. 3 the Town Court ruled John Helm, Brenda's husband, to be in violation of sections 220-4 and 220-10D of the town code and ordered the Helms to remove their chickens from the property. The Helms are appealing the decision, and Brenda Helm, with the help of her attorney, Jennifer Storm, drafted changes to chapters 81, **142**, and 220 of the town rcode that would allow ipoultry and fowl, Valong with micro farming, within R3 Residential Districts: 200 CT

The first step is Yestablishing fowl and poultry permits, which "is addressed in the 'draft's addition of Article V to chapter 81, which would require fowl and poultry for micro-farms to be registered. There would be a \$50 permit

application fee and a \$5 registration fee per bird. The permit would need. to be renewed every five

Brenda Helm said she is aware of the noise issues that come with keeping roosters and had previously removed a rooster from her property to the Quarter-Acre Rescue Ranch in Johnsonville, which is also where the chickens are now. To address the rooster issue, she added to the noise portion of the code, chapter 142, that roosters and other crowing birds and poultry are not allowed in R3 Residential Districts.

about the setup.

petition for microfarming as two separate matters.

"People have rights, and they need to be preserved so this doesn't happen again," she said.

In her draft of the town code's definition of a farm, she added the exclusion of micro-farms from the definition. She also added definitions for fowl, poultry and microfarming to the code. The new farm type would only allow for personal gardens and keeping of permitted animals for the production of food for use of residents of a single²dwelling home. Animal housing and structures would need to confirm to the newly added section addressing such regulations.

To the lips with the veducation aspect, Patricia Foreman sent Helm copies of her book "City Chicks," so she could donate them to local schools, libraries and town officials. The book discusses how to keep chickens responsibly in towns and cities to help with gardening, composting and food production.

Helm has also been engaging the community by passing around a petition for residents to. sign in support of the proposed amendments and changes to the town code, which she plans to complete around the end of May. All of the signatures will be attached with the proposed amendments when submitted to the Town Board.

Town Attorney Peter Scagnelli said if the Helms wanted to put for ward an amendment to the town's R3 Resident District to allow for chickens to be held on a property that the change could be a long process.

"They are not filing a paper and in a couple of days and get an answer," said Scagnelli."They would have to make a formal request to the Town Board that such a change be made to the zoning ordinance.'

In the meantime, Helm said she is encouraging residents to continue writing Town Board officials in support of her cause. Also, a Facebook page has been created under the name "Niskayuna Chickens" to offer updates on the process.

Colonial Festival focuses on regional history

People are typically heavily influenced by modern technology in their life, but residents can revisit their roots during the Schenectady Colonial Festival.

"It is a little educational. it is a lot of fun and it gives people an appreciation for what a treasure we have here in Schenectady," said Maureen Gebert, director of the Schenectady Heritage Area.

Through Sunday, Feb. 13, the City of Schenectady will host several events highlighting the early history of the area. One of the main events is artist Len Tantillo, known for his illustrations of historic sites throughout the Hudson and Mohawk Valleys,

giving a presentation at the First Reformed Church in Schenectady.

'[Tantillo] is very detailed and he does a tremendous amount of research so he has every detail correct," said Gebert. "Over the past couple of years he has done a lot more in Schenectady than he had before."

The picture in Schenectady's City Hall is also by him, she noted, and he also has done a picture of what stockade would have looked like before The Schenectady Massacre. Also, the festival is always held around the dates of the massacre in 1690, she said, to celebrate how the community rebuilt themselves.

During another event with Tantillo at the Glen Sanders Mansion on Tuesday, Feb. 8, starting at 4 p.m. there will be a chance to meet him and see a planned showing of his work. Also, findings from the Schenectady County Community College archaeology program will be shown at the dinner.

"They were able to do this, because they got a grant in 2009 to rent some ground penetrating radar to see what is going on down there," said Gebert about the college's program. "Most of the stuff in Schenectady is untouched ... it is just the way it is left. We discover more and more and it is in its original form."

The annual dinner is held on the anniversary of the massacre and there will be a colonial themed dinner start with a social hour at 6 p.m. at the mansion.

Over time, said Gebert. the festival has grown from original celebrations with a small group of individuals dressing up in colonial outfits, but through community outreach the event has grown to a lengthy affair.

"It was a core group

many years ago that wanted to do it and a lot of people dressed in Colonial garb," she said. "It is really a community event ... they get all excited and want to do more next year."

Combination tickets for the conversation with Tantillo and the Colonial Festival Dinner on Feb 8 start at \$60. There are also opportunities for individual and corporate sponsorship for the conversation and dinner tables. Separate tickets are \$20 for the pre-dinner event and \$50 for the dinner. Proceeds will support the annual exchange program of the Schenectady/Nijkerk Council.





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

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Making a difference half a world away

Mother and daughter to travel to Uganda on humanitarian mission

The February break is nearly upon us, and many families will take the week away from school as an opportunity to flee the snowbound northeast for a few days.

That's the plan for Theresa and Sara Weinman, but instead of kicking back on the beach the mother/daughter duo will on Feb. 12 board an airplane bound for Africa with a medical and humanitarian outreach team to spend 15 days without running water or electricity in a small Ugandan village.

For Theresa Weinman, this will be her second trip to the Village of Ddegeya, an agrarian community of about 3,500 in the south of the country. Her 16-year-old daughter Sara will be traveling there for the first time, though, as part of a team from the non-profit group Engeye.

Despite the serious mission and the risks inherent to traveling in Africa, Theresa said she has absolute confidence in her daughter's spot on the team.

"I think she earned her spot on the trip," Theresa said. "She's worked so hard...she did everything we asked of her."

Sara Weinman has demonstrated her commitment to the cause not only by raising



money for her trip (members of the team must pay their own way) but by starting the Engeye Teen Connection group, a small but dedicated contingent of youths that have been working for about two years to raise money to help out the Village of Ddegeya.

Sara became interested in Engeye in much the same way as her mother did, when the family hosted a young burn victim from Uganda in their Bethlehem home. The BC High student and the ETC group have since raised over

\$1,000 for the cause, and Sara will be mapping out a way to spend that on her trip to the country.

She envisions creating a micro financing program for the women of Ddegeya, perhaps teaching them a skill, like craft making, and setting them up with supplies so they can sell their wares locally or in the U.S., bringing some much needed money into their households.

Most of the women in Uganda don't have an opportunity to make an income. By making it a micro-

loan program, ETC would in time receive the money back, enabling them to put that money back to work for other Ugandans, too.

"Not only would they be able to support themselves and their family, but they would be able to send their kids to school," added Sara.

Still, Sara said she realizes her understanding of the situation in Ddegeya may change once she gets on the ground.

"I'm going to ask the villagers

themselves what they in their opinion need the most, and then use the proceeds for that," she said.

Besides helping out in Engeye's clinic in the village — the only opportunity the residents there have to access medical care — the team will visit the 21 young scholars whose education is supported by donors here in the U.S.. Sara will also be working at a program run by Union College fellows for children whose parents cannot afford even the few dollars for a public school uniform, barring them from an education.

She'll bring games, puzzles and educational materials donated locally to the program.

Sara Weinman said she hopes her trip will also help her find more ways to get local youth involved in the cause. ETC has about 10 dedicated volunteers who work to organize fundraisers. For example, last year the group ran a successful "Cafe Night" at the Journey United Church of Christ that featured local youth talent.

She said she's been preparing for the trip by talking with other members of the organization who've made it before.

"One of my main goals is pretty much to survive through it," she said. "I don't really know what to expect. I'm a little nervous but I'm also excited."

Takes part in **Hallmark Hall of Fame** movie 'Lost Valentine'

Thomas Prusinowski served in the U.S. Navy for 28 years, but the recently retired Saratoga Springs man also spent two days pretending to be a sailor this October. He was one of 12 Navy members chosen to be in the Hallmark Hall of Fame movie "Lost Valentine," which debuted on CBS Sunday, Jan. 30, and starred Jennifer Love Hewitt and Betty White.

"Lost Valentine" is about a woman (White) who's husband goes off to war, and is shot down. For the next 65 years, she goes back to the same train station platform she dropped him off at to see if he will come home. After enlisting the help of a local reporter (Hewitt), the remains of her husband are found and the Navy brings them back for a proper military burial.

Prusinowski said the acting he did in the movie was a role familiar to him, as it truly did mirror true

"We brought in the American and Navy flags, went to the casket andbrought it up to Betty White, who bent down, kissed the casket and flag and hugged it," said Prusinowski. "Earlier in my Navy career I was: on the funeral detail. for veterans when thev passed away, I'd be asked to attend the funeral, carry the casket, fold the flag. '

Even portions of the movie he wasn't involved in were reminiscent of his Navy life.

"I'll always remember after I got married and left on deployment, I remember seeing my wife on the pier by herself waving goodbye and it's a very difficult time for a Navy guy when you have to leave your family and friends for six months at a time," said Prusinowski.

The sailors wore actual Navy uniforms for filming and Prusinowski said at first, everyone just thought

Prusinowski. "I felt a bit of personal pride too."




Prusinowski said driving a ship was also one of his favorite naval tasks.

and a number of other staff and still fall well short of closing a \$5 million gap.

Similarly, Guilderland Central School District Superintendent Marie Wiles expects to be putting a seriously reduced spending plan to the school board in coming weeks. There, the proposed aid cut is \$2.1 million, or about 9 percent, which when coupled with increased expenses (salaries and benefits) makes for a \$4.2 million gap on an \$82 million budget.

"We anticipated something pretty close to this," Wiles said. "There is no way to make up that difference without reducing our employee base...we can't get \$4.2 million out of materials, supplies and field trips."

Voters in the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District rejected the district's budget last May, and the district is now running off a contingency budget. A 14 percent hit to its aid numbers (\$2.4 million) does not portend an easier year.

"It's drastic and it's devastating," said Superintendent Daniel Teplesky.

The district is looking to the community for recommendations on what to cut from the program. A survey will be made available on the district web site in coming days.

"We're going to ask some further, in-depth questions and ask individuals to make some determinations on what they believe is more important," Teplesky said.

Mandate relief a common plea

School districts draw their revenues from two sources: state aid and property taxes. If aid falls off then taxes must increase or expenditures must be drawn down — it's a simple budgeting principle.

But a cry that's increasingly being heard from schools is that it's difficult to cut costs under a blanket of about 220 state mandates that require schools to meet various criteria, sometimes at great expense to benefit a small number of students.

"There are so many areas of out spending plan over which we have no control," said Wiles. "Every year additional rules and requirements are piled on without the resources to pay for them...it's really all quite unpalatable."

Tebbano estimated unfunded mandates account for 20 percent of BC's \$90 million budget.

The tax cap cometh?

Mandates are a hot topic when considering another recent educational development: the passing of tax cap legislation in the state Senate.

The Senate passed a plan by a wide margin on Monday, Jan. 31. It would limit schools' tax levy growth to 2 percent per year, or to the rate of inflation, whichever is lower. Downstate Democrats were the only contingent of lawmakers to oppose the bill.

Under the law, the annual school budget vote would be replaced by a vote on the tax levy. If it is defeated twice, the district would be forced to assume no increase in its levy. Also, a supermajority vote of 60 percent would be required to pass any hike above 2 percent.

Administrators argue the law is an unfair one unless they're given greater control over their budgets, and some said they'd sign on if that happens.

"I fully support the concept," Tebbano said of the tax cap. "If they could reduce those [mandates] just by half, then we'll be in a better position to say

a 2 percent tax cap is a wonderful thing."

Cuomo has formed a council to study state mandates.

Wiles noted a tax cap could be particularly onerous for smaller districts without 8-figure budgets, where even small changes could shift the tax burden significantly.

"It's a very blunt instrument," she said. "2 percent on our levy is different that a school district that is very tiny."

Cuomo introduces competition

Though Cuomo's plan slashes aid, it also includes a proposal to make available \$500 million in competitive grants to school districts, divided equally between Performance Improvement Awards and School District Management Efficiency Awards.

There's still not much clarity on the criteria for these grants, but in the suburban areas of the Capital District superintendents generally said their districts might only qualify for efficiency rewards.

"Our graduation rate is high, we are a school that is not in any danger of failing because our scores are wonderful," Tebbano said.

A merit-based rewards system is one that is gaining footing in the American education system, albeit with some detractors. President Barack Obama has been a notable proponent for such a change, and as such has been pushing the Race to the Top Fund.

Ultimately, schools here that are facing similar challenges will be engaging their communities in similar ways, with public budget workshops and surveys. Local company to show off reclaimed pieces at Home Show

fter years of owning a shop on Lark Street where he sold one of a kind furnishings, Fred Shapiro wanted to expand. In a big He didn't want just another shop. He

wanted something exciting, something dramatic. So Shapiro moved his business into a warehouse in North Albany, and Silver Fox Salvage

In the beginning, Shapiro filled some of the extra space in the building with a weekend flea market Vendors would sell spices, teas, children's books and

These days, though, Silver Fox Salvage commands the whole building, creating and selling its calling card, architectural salvage. Shaprio and his staff use reclaimed stained glass, doors, windows, trim and more to create unique home furnishings for people in the Capital District and beyond. They'll show off their wares at the Northeast Home Show, which will be held on Friday to Sunday, Feb. 11 to 13, at the Empire State Plaza and Times Union Center.

Camille Gibeau, who runs Silver Fox Salvage with Shapiro, came on board when he placed an ad on

craigslist looking for someone to paint some of his reclaimed pieces. Gibeau, who has a background in nonprofits, had hoped to start some kind of business that reused items that were otherwise going to be thrown away. She joked that she and Shapiro share a partnership born out of salvage love."w

Gibeau remembers the days when the Lark Street shop was "bursting at the seams." Shapiro always had a keen eye for "various oddities," she said. They used to take his truck around to area junkyards, looking for items that might make good furnishings.

These days, they're more likely to show up at auctions than dumps. They also score a lot of finds at old buildings. Shapiro spent a recent afternoon working at a church in Gloversville, reclaiming bead boards and "beautiful trim."

Another source for materials is the people who patronize Silver Fox. "Our customers have become our pickers and our friends," Gibeau said.

Once the raw materials are in hand, Silver Fox delights in building items to order. Gibeau said her favorite aspect of the job is walking through the warehouse with someone, taking notes on what they like, and then turning that into a unique piece. One recent customer, for example, had an extra wide garage and wanted some kind of divider for it. She liked mirrors, she liked bead boards. The finished divider featured both of

- those, along with a trunk, a space for shoes and some other stuff.

"We made it all come

said. "It's very gratifying."

Also gratifying is knowing that Silver Fox is helping to keep things out of landfills, Gibeau said, especially given recent reports of just how much garbage has accumulated at the Albany landfill.

That aspect is one of the key reasons people come to Silver Fox, as is the fact they're getting one-of-akind pieces, Gibeau said. Dinosaur Barbecue in Troy was a recent customer, buying two chandeliers from the business, which also helped decorate the eatery's Manhattan location.

Gibeau said there's an additional draw to Silver Fox: It's fun. She and Shaprio share the warehouse not only with about a dozen co-workers, but with a cat and a dog who are customer favorites. People are free to touch items as well as admire them, and Gibeau said all ages are welcome.

"It's a place a 16-year-old boy could bring his 60-yearold aunt," she said.

At the home show booth, people can get an idea of what Silver Fox does and dream up designs for their own custom pieces. Other attractions include nearly 500 exhibits and more than three dozen seminars, encompassing everything from solar energy to kitchen and bath renovations. Frank Fontana, host of HGTV's "Design on a Dime," will host three seminars.

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

It's been over a year since the town was approached with plans to build on the property.

The new plans also move the building closer to Delaware Avenue, eliminating a row of parking between that thoroughfare and the structure. The sidewalk and property would be separated by a fence. There would be no car entry by Delaware Avenue - Elsmere Avenue and Booth Road would have entrances.

Though the developer already has in hand a number of variances from the town's Zoning Board of Appeals, it will have to go back for new ones. There has been a slight change in the number of parking spots, for example, and the project still has fewer than the required amount.

Planning Board members also spoke about the design of the building itself. The site is in a commercial hamlet zone, which carries certain restrictions. Member Nicholas Behuniak said he'd like to see a more interesting design.

"I think that façade is really far too plain for what you have there, both for your building and that area," he said.

The project site includes the former CVS Pharmacy, which built a new building across the street. It's still vacant and is often cited as the case study for empty storefronts on Delaware and among the worst examples of blight in the

The developer would level the old CVS building, as well as the current home of Community Care Physicians

next door. Doctors there would be able to continue practicing through the construction process.


