Town loses Normanside bid

Winner not immediately known; town keeps bid amount under wraps

The Town of Bethlehem was not the winner of a sealed bidding process for the Normanside County Club's debt, the acquisition of which would have paved the way for the town to acquire its Elsmere golf course.

The Bank of America informed the town of its decision on Monday afternoon. The identity of the winner was not announced to the town or the public, and bank spokeswoman Shirley Norton would say only there was "a

high level of interest." Since the sale has not been completed, the town will not be disclosing the amount it bid, Bethlehem Supervisor Sam Messina said.

"The Town of Bethlehem is hopeful that the new owner of Normanside will keep this unique property as a golf course and as open space," he said. "The residents of Bethlehem in speaking their mind, our Town Board and

our staff here did an absolutely superb job regarding the entire Normanside matter, and the bank has made its decision."

Some in the community have worried a developer would take advantage of the club's downfall to build on the Normanside property, which has been a golf course for over eight decades. Town officials have said the buyer of the property could approach the

RCS freezes budget

Officials hope a wage freeze will follow

The Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School District is steeling itself for budget season by adopting a budget freeze for the remainder of this school year, and will soon be taking up the issue of a wage freeze.

The freeze, approved in a split vote by the school board at a Tuesday, Feb. 15, meeting, suspends any field trips and equipment or materials purchases that were not already approved before the vote. Other "non-essential" spending like conferences or workshops were also put on hold. Activities funded entirely by grants will continue, and exceptions may be made through an administrative review.

The release of Gov. Andrew Cuomo's executive budget, in which state aid to RCS is slashed by about \$2.4 million, prompted the budget freeze, said Superintendent Daniel Teplesky.

"Last year, RCS froze the budget in October, which returned a savings of approximately \$100,000," he said. "Coming in February of this year, we look for a savings between \$40,000 and \$50,000."

A freeze won't close the district's budget gap, however. The decrease in aid coupled with rising pension costs and contractual salary increases are combining to create a situation that is putting schools across the state in a difficult position for next year.

BC scales back tech plans

New, cheaper proposal is to upgrade high school's digital infrastructure

The Bethlehem Central School District is scaling back its plans to equip students with computers.

Administrators are now focusing on using next year to make the network improvements necessary to bring a personal computing structure to fruition.

A referendum would be put to voters to borrow \$500,000 for the upgrades.

That's a lot less than the original plan floated early this year, which was to invest \$8 million over five years to equip every high schooler with a computing device (be it laptop, smart phone or tablet computer) and provide every middle schooler with access to a personal laptop in the classroom. The work in the new plan would have been part of that initiative.

Community feedback and the release of Gov. Andrew Cuomo's budget (which cuts aid to BC by

Police blotter

Glenmont man suffers minor injuries in trooper crash

Collision occurs at Albany intersection, sending three to hospital

Four people, including a New York State Trooper and a 23-year-old Glenmont man, were injured early Friday morning, Feb. 25, when a state police patrol car collided with a mini-van style taxicab on Washington Avenue in the City of Albany.

Injured in the crash were Trooper Patrick Shufelt, 29, cab driver Michael Zeoli, 61, of Albany, and Peter Milano, 22, also of Albany. All three were transported to Albany Medical Center Hospital by Mohawk Ambulance Service. Shufelt was treated for head lacerations and released. Zeoli and Milano were admitted and listed in "guarded" condition; the extent of their injuries was unknown. A second passenger in the

cab, John Pedlow, 23, of Glenmont, and Trooper Jason McCanney, 33, the passenger in the troop car, were examined and released.

At approximately 2:30 a.m., Troopers Shufelt and McCanney were monitoring traffic near the intersection of Washington Avenue and North Hawk Street when they saw a silver car speeding westbound on Washington Avenue. They activated their emergency lights and siren and attempted to give chase. They quickly lost sight of the car, but turned off their emergency equipment and continued to search along Washington Avenue. As they entered the intersection of Washington and North Allen Street, they collided with the cab driven by Zeoli, who was southbound on North Allen. Early indications are that the state police car had the green light and that the passengers of the

cab were distracted by the exchange of money going on inside. The driver and passenger of the cab that were ejected were not wearing seatbelts. One of the rear seat passengers of the taxi, Pedlow, was wearing a seat belt, and his injuries were minor. Albany police and emergency services responded to the scene.

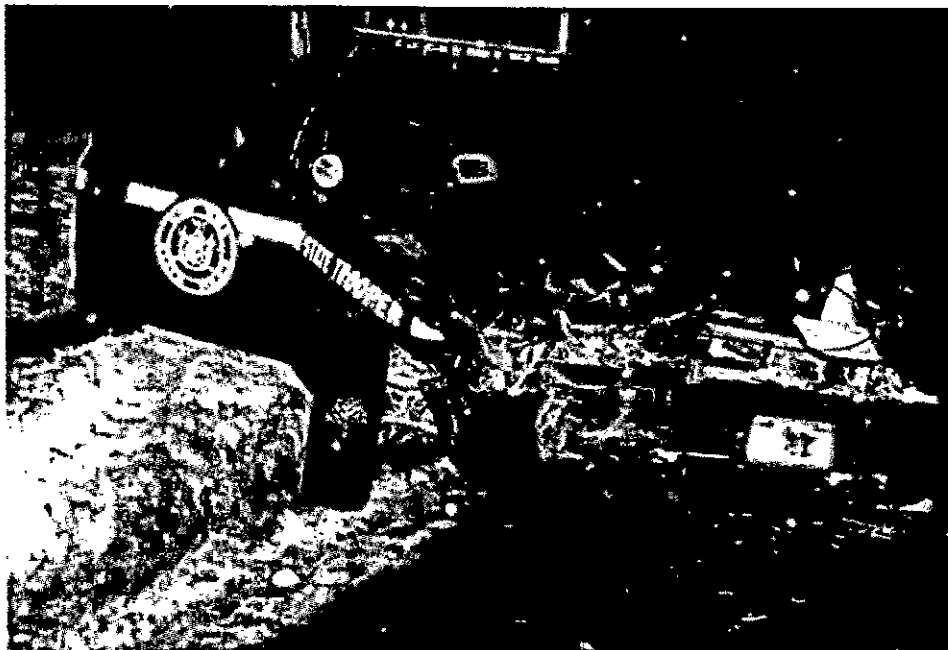
The car troopers originally spotted was involved in a separate accident just minutes later; Albany police are investigating the second accident. The State Police investigation is ongoing.

Police checked Goddard's residence, and she answered the door and allegedly confirmed she'd been involved in an accident. Her vehicle had extensive front-end damage, police said. Goddard was unsteady on her feet, had bloodshot eyes and the odor of alcohol on her breath, and said she

drank two glasses of wine at Chili's, police said.

Goddard initially refused to go outside, and police removed and detained her, according to arrest reports. She was positively identified by the other driver, police said.

At the station, Goddard allegedly became belligerent and combative, and requested to speak to her father and attorney. When provided with a phone book to find her attorney's phone number, she allegedly threw it across the squad room. Spicing things up

Local man's line of southwestern sauces sees greater play in supermarkets across the country

Larry Sombke knows a thing or two about food.

He's written about it, he's eaten it, he's cooked it and now, he's selling it.

In what is bound to be an encouraging success story to farmers market vendors all over, Sombke's line of natural sauces has gradually expanded to store shelves all over the immediate area and New England. He recently announced his southwestern sauces will be carried in area Price Choppers, a great step for the product line.

His recipe for success is simple.

"I'm slowly expanding, because when people taste my sauces they like it, then they buy it," Sombke said.

For Sombke, selling his creations is another step in a long line of careers.

He's worked in newspapers and television news, authored six cookbooks, writes a gardening column and was a producer on shows for CNN and PBS.

He also does substitute teaching and runs a consulting business. Of his varied roles, however, Sombke said he hopes Larry's Southwestern Sauces is destined for the most success.

"It's an exciting time to be a food producer. People are really interested in natural food, they're interested in foods that have great flavor... they're interested in foods that are produced by small companies," he said.

"It's daunting to get bigger, but it's a good thing."

OK, so technically she won't be going to college for another three plus years. Some people wouldn't consider that as "soon." And yet, when I consider how quickly 14 years have slipped by, three years seems like a mere blip. Three years could pass in the time it takes a person to empty the dishwasher, which is no time at all, unless you are waiting for the teenager who leaves her stuff all over the place to do the emptying, in which case three years could take a lifetime to pass.

Kaczynski to speak at Youth Court graduation

The Bethlehem Youth Court program will graduate 22 new members at its annual ceremony Thursday, March 3, when the keynote speaker will be David Kaczynski.

The annual event recognizes area students who have completed Youth Court's training program and can serve as lawyers, judges and other roles in Youth Court, which sees young, nonviolent criminal offenders judged and sentenced by a jury of their peers.

Kaczynski is best known as the brother of Theodore Kaczynski, or the Unabomber. David turned his brother in to

authorities in 1996. He has since become an anti-death penalty figure, speaking across the state about his experiences and heading up the New Yorkers for Alternatives to the Death Penalty in Albany.

Youth Court Director Katrina Charland said she's not sure what Kaczynski's speech will include, but in other engagements he has told his own story, including how prosecutors had wanted to seek the death penalty for his schizophrenic brother.

The graduation ceremony will be open to the public and held in the Bethlehem Town Hall auditorium at 7 p.m. on

Thursday, March 3. Past keynote speakers include Albany County Executive Michael Breslin and District Attorney David Soares.

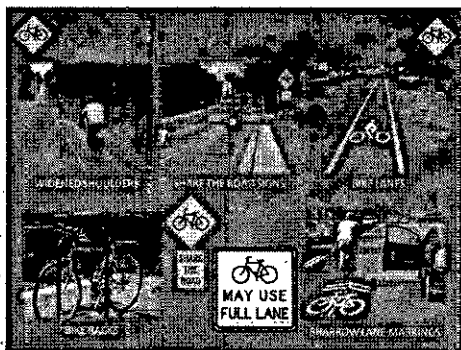
Delmar Progress Club hears update on paths and trails

FiOS TV clears last hurdle

Bethlehem residents are close to receiving Verizon's FiOS television service.

The state Public Service Commission recently approved the cable television franchise negotiated between the town and the carrier early this year. The commission's approval is the final regulatory step to the company rolling out its service.

The agreement closely resembles the one the town holds with Time Warner Cable, until recently the only cable television operator in town. Like that contract, Verizon won't be

required to roll service out to the more rural, less densely populated areas of town.

That had been one hangup expressed during a January public hearing on the issue. Supervisor Sam Messina said the town would be searching for ways to get FiOS service in more areas.

"Competition often fosters technical innovation, an increased range of services, and lower prices to customers and that is all good news for Bethlehem's residents and businesses," he said in a statement.

65 percent of the

town's residences that are included in the covered area have been wired for the fiber optic lines carrying not only television, but voice and Internet service. Verizon is likely to begin offering service in these areas over the next few months, though the company keeps exact locations closely guarded for competitive reasons (interested residents can call the company about their home).

Verizon expects to cover all but the least populated areas of town within the next five years.

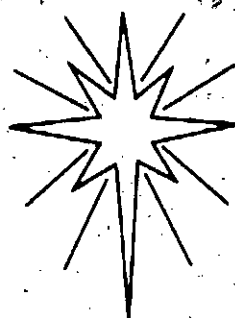

Another round of golf?

The Town of Bethlehem has not submitted the successful bid for Normanside Country Club (first reported on www.spotlightnews.com, thank you very much), but it doesn't mean that those against a Bethlehem-run Normanside are out of the rough just yet.

It is entirely possible that the winning bidder, now knowing that the town is extremely interested in the property, will contact town officials to wheel and deal. And why not? He or she knows the town is interested, can surmise what the town bid based on the winning bid, and could turn a nice profit without a lot of heavy lifting.

We wish it were over, but it's not.

Now, proponents of a government-run Normanside will probably find comfort in the fact that, for the most part, municipally owned golf courses are doing better than their privately owned counterparts.

It could be that the government has finally found its niche — that the private courses aren't as well managed as the muni courses, that they aren't as well maintained, that they don't offer as good a golfing experience as a municipally run course.

Of course, and you'll have to pardon the pun, but it could be that privately run golf courses in this area aren't doing so well because they pay taxes to municipalities that have decided to compete against them.

Toward the end of Charles Wiff's round up of local muni golf courses on page 12, you'll meet Joe and Gilda Rappazzo, a Glenmont couple who decided to convert their land into an 18-hole par-3 course off of Route 144 a decade ago, after it became evident that farming wasn't economically viable. Two years before they finally opened Hidden Meadows Golf Course in 2009, they saw the Town of Bethlehem assume control of Colonial Acres with the help of the Open Space Institute, for \$1 per year.

The Rappazzos say they paid \$20,000 in property taxes last year. It must comfort them that after their hometown invested a single dollar of that into taking away Hidden Meadows' customers, they still had \$19,999 left to spend on other town necessities.

Now, the Rappazzos are watching as the town tries to buy another course that will compete with them.

And so it goes.

But we're not asking you to feel sorry for the Rappazzos. We're sure they'll make out in the end. After Normanside is bought, restructured and making money hand over fist for the town, we're sure the Rappazzos will still be able to petition the town to rezone their Glenmont property to accommodate the high-density housing or retail space that Delmartians so feared would go into their backyards.

Who knew dirt was so complicated?

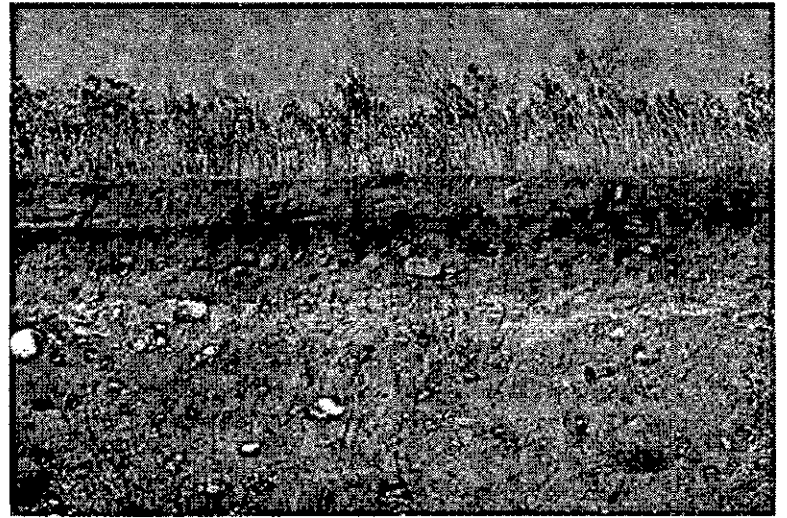

Some call it soil and some call it dirt, but for each of us, our little bit of earth is where it all begins. Many new gardeners are overwhelmed by all the information about what to do to get started in gardening.

First and foremost, a gardener needs to know as much as possible about the soil that they have and the place to start is with a simple soil pH test. Soil pH is a big deal for gardeners as it is the key to the balance that plants require to thrive. Ideally a pH that falls between 6.0 and 7.2 is at a good level to ensure that the plants can take nutrients out of the soil. Some exceptions are azaleas, rhododendron, and blueberries, as they prefer a lower pH of 4.5 to 5.5. The pH scale is a numerical measurement of 1 to 14 with 1 to 6.6 being in the acid range, 6.8 to 7.2 as neutral values, and 7.4 to 14 as alkaline. Plants have a pH comfort zone and it is important for the gardener to know what that is for the plants that they are growing.

Once a pH level is known, the next most important aspect to learn about your soil is its texture. Moisten some soil and take a handful, close your fingers making a fist. Sandy soils have a gritty feel, and they will fall apart as you open your hand. Clay soils will form a ball that keeps its shape as you open your hand. Wet clay has a shiny look and it feels slippery. Loam soil is somewhere in between these two and it will hold its shape and loosely fall apart as you open your hand. Soils can be combinations as well, such as sandy loam or clay loam. Learning about your soil type will also help you to make better decisions about what will grow best in that type of soil. Sandy soils have excellent drainage and in many cases

it is necessary to add organic matter such as compost or aged manures to help the sandy soil retain some water. Clay soils hold water and when dry can

become hard and compacted; they too benefit from organic matter to lighten up the soil and increase its ability to drain. Most soils benefit greatly from the addition of organic matter and so many gardeners regularly add compost and/or dried manures in the spring and chopped leaves in the fall to improve the tilth or structure of the soil. It is possible that the continual addition of organic matter can alter the soil pH and so it is important to check the soil pH every few years to be sure that it remains within the 6 to 7.2 range.

Compost tends to have a pH in the 6.4 to 7.3 range depending on materials used (feedstock) in making the compost. If there are a lot of oak leaves and conifer needles, then the pH will shift lower, and if the materials are more alkaline in nature such as deciduous leaves, the pH will be higher. At present there are no standards for testing commercial compost. Homeowners are

usually concerned about the possibility of unknown chemicals in commercial compost rather than the pH. For the most part, pesticides and herbicides are designed to degrade quickly and the composting process itself is a factor in the breakdown of chemicals. For concerned gardeners, the answer is to make their own compost, then control over pH and chemical additives is easy to achieve. The value of adding compost and organic matter lies in the trace elements, the macronutrients and the micronutrients, and the beneficial fungi that compost fosters but it is also about the balance. So please do add all the organic matter, then you can have your soil pH tested every few years to help maintain the balance in your soil. Soil pH tests, and information on composting and adding organic matter can be obtained from the Cornell Cooperative Extension in your county.

Municipal golf courses thrive despite economy

Local publicly owned links maintaining profits through recession

To some, an afternoon on the links is as about as classically American as a Saturday spent at a baseball game.

There are apparently quite a few of those folks right here in the Capital District. From Spa State Park in Saratoga Springs to the Stadium Golf Club in Schenectady and beyond, the landscape is peppered with options for golfers, enough to make it tough to take an exact count, and many of those courses are run by local governments.

This situation has been of great interest to residents of the Town of Bethlehem in recent weeks. The town entered a sealed bidding process with the Bank of America in hopes of acquiring the property and running it as a golf course, but was informed this week it was not the successful bidder. This does not preclude, however, the successful bidder from turning around and selling the course to the town.

Some have questioned whether the town would be able to run the course profitably. Bethlehem already runs Colonial Acres, but it's a small, 9-hole par-3 course that the town pays only \$1 per year to lease. Neighboring communities have long had their own operations, though, and even in these tough times,

leaders in these municipalities generally say their courses support themselves and are a great asset.

Neighboring towns turn profits

Much has been made of whether the Town of Bethlehem would be able to recover the cost of buying Normanside. In the Town of Guilderland, the recent acquisition of Western Turnpike Golf Course has not only been a break-even investment, but once the loan is paid off, it will return a tidy profit for the town, said Supervisor Kenneth Runion.

"The revenues that the course generate have paid the expense of the course and the personnel, as well as the cost of the principal and the interest on the bonds that we had when we purchased the course," he said.

The course turns out only \$10,000 or \$20,000 a year, said Runion, but that's with loan payments of about \$500,000 being paid out of revenues. Once the purchase is paid off, that will become profit.

He added that Western Turnpike was operated as a public club before the town stepped in 2002, a key difference from Normanside.

"We took over a fairly strong revenue stream when we purchased it," he said. "In this

situation, you've got a course that was a private club, so you have to set up some sort of a business model for that course."

Western Turnpike offers memberships, but those golfers make up a relatively small percentage of the 27-hole course's use.

Among the grandest municipal

good alternative to a country club," Mahan said.

Capital Hills welcomes change

Interestingly enough, there's a municipal course not a mile away from Normanside. Located just across the river is Capital Hills, a full 18-hole golf course operated by the City of Albany. Sitting on a 291-acre footprint, like Normanside, the course's land is also open to other recreational uses like hiking, cross-country skiing and sledding. It's about a 15-minute drive from pro shop to pro shop.

The proximity would make one wonder if the course could be threatened by another full course minutes away, but the city's Office of General Services Commissioner Nicholas D'Antonio said in the world of golf, competition is not necessarily a bad thing.

"I think we'll both benefit from them being there, as well as us being there," he said. "They're two different courses, and they're both very good courses."

He said the course has been performing strongly even through the recession, perhaps drawing on that pool of golfers unable to foot a country club membership.

Capital Hills will likely increase rates in 2011 to account for increased labor and supply costs. Daytime rates this past season were \$28 per round for nonresidents, \$17 for residents. The city runs the course at just over the break-even mark, D'Antonio said.

Private owners fret competition

But even if Normanside were a profitable enterprise for the town, would there be a ripple

effect? The owners of the only private operation in Bethlehem say they're concerned another public course could undercut their business.

Joe and Gilda Rappazzo opened up Hidden Meadows, an 18-hole par-3 course off of Route 144 in Glenmont, in July of 2009. It took them 10 years to convert their farmland into a commercial business when farming became economically unfeasible, during which time they received praise from the town for undertaking a project that would preserve green space.

Since making the conversion, though, they've seen the town itself buy up Colonial Acres in 2007 and, now, a fierce debate over whether it should purchase a second.

"That's going to be two golf courses that are against us," Joe Rappazzo said. "The play that we would have had, that gets chopped in thirds now instead of half."

Adding to those worries is the fact costs are increasing, Gilda Rappazzo said. Fertilizer has tripled in price since the course opened, and Hidden Meadows pays over \$20,000 in property taxes, a burden municipally owned courses don't have to bear (some, like Guilderland, negotiate agreements with fire departments to pay for services).

"We have an awful lot invested in it. We have a lot of monthly payments we're making out of our own pockets," Gilda Rappazzo said. "It's kind of tough."

Hidden Meadows does not employ many — it's a family run business, said Joe Rappazzo, with his son helping with groundskeeper duties and his daughter and wife minding the pro shop.

"We started this for our family, so they got something when we're gone," he said.

courses, at least in terms of scale, is the Colonie Golf Course, with 36 holes. Supervisor Paula Mahan said it's this size that gives the operation the flexibility to draw a lot of different kinds of play.

"That helps to give us an advantage of being able to host the major tournaments on 18 holes, then our golfers can golf on the other 18 holes," she said. "It is self-sustaining, and it does make a profit."

Even after putting some money back into repairs of the clubhouse, Colonie turned a \$190,000 profit last year. It's also seeing high use, even in a recession, with 2009 being the second busiest year on record.

"The course that we run, it's a good place to play. It's a beautiful course, it's affordable and it's a

Prevention Council offers 'Too Good for Drugs'

When the DARE program was eliminated in April 2010 because of budget constraints, Saratoga Springs residents and school district administrators were left wondering what to do about drug, alcohol and tobacco education.

The Prevention Council may have a replacement of sorts—or at least an alternative—with its program “Too Good For Drugs” that it already implements in other school districts around Saratoga County.

“It’s utilized in eighth and sixth grade, the programs ‘Too Good For Drugs’ and ‘Too Good For Violence.’ The district asked us what we thought would work so we set up in Saratoga this year as a first try,” said Pat Marin, Prevention Council’s director of school-based prevention.

The intensive, science-based curriculum was tested out on fifth graders at Division Street and Geyser Road elementary schools in the Saratoga Springs City School District in early February and the remaining four schools are set to start the curriculum later in the year.

“I’m hoping we do more of this because DARE has been eased out of the schools,” said Marin. “This was an opportunity because DARE was 16 or 17 lessons and the district



really didn’t want to see the kids lose out on a prevention service.”

What makes “Too Good For Drugs” different from DARE is that it’s science-based, said Marin.

“It’s very interactive, great activities and talks about goal setting and decision making. We’ve always had our focus on presenting a program that children would make a decision ... they learn the risks of using a drug from a personal point of view and that you can change your perception of yourself growing up,” said Marin. “Focus on what you want to do with your life and drugs can diminish that. This program is figuring this out and not so much about bad and the negatives.”

Marin said the program covers tobacco, talks about resistance skills, ways to reduce pressure, role playing, communicating effectively and how to stand up to look someone in the eye

and tell them how you feel. It promotes assertiveness and a digression from being passive and going along with someone else’s decisions; taking responsibility for actions. It also features a lesson on alcohol and children of alcoholics.

“We tell them it’s not your fault and demonstrate what alcohol does to family life. It’s an interesting program and kids enjoy it,” said Marin.

To keep the younger kids’ attention and help the information really sink in, the curriculum is heavy on games.

“We do spinner games and it’s excellent,” said Marin.

Because the Prevention Council is a non-profit, the “Too Good For Drugs” program gets help from council educators and the teachers.

“We have teachers doing four lessons and us doing four lessons because we can’t do all of them,” said Marin.

“Too Good For Drugs” is supposed to show “measurable changes in students’ attitudes and behaviors” before and after the lessons are taught. To gauge this progress, teachers administer pre- and post-tests.

“So far the response from students and teachers has been really good,” said Marin. “The principals have mentioned that they’ve received positive feedback from parents about the interactive parent/child worksheets, too.”

Saratoga Springs might be the latest area school district to implement “Too Good For Drugs” but the curriculum is already a part of schools in Galway, Mechanicville, South Glens Falls, Corinth, Stillwater and Buñt Hills-Ballston Lake, targeting third, fourth, sixth and seventh grades, said Marin.

“Wherever school districts have requested or done different programs, we convert them to this program because we have science-based criteria,” said Marin.

This is the first year “Too Good For Drugs” has been offered to fifth graders and Marin said she thinks it’s a great age to start.

“It’s a perfect place to put it in fifth grade because they’re heading to middle school,” said Marin.

'Vet for a Day' lets kids learn about animals

Animal Protective Foundation hosts event

Children lined up with a stethoscope in hand as they early waited to get their chance to exam one patient dog named Betsy.

The Animal Protective Foundation in Scotia hosted the program 'Vet for a Day' on Saturday, Feb. 19, for children from third to eighth grades to get a better understanding of what a future career as a veterinarian would entail

and how to properly care for an animal companions they might currently have in their family. Over 20 kids waited to learn about and meet some of the animals at the shelter after their parents dropped them off for the veterinarian boot camp. There were over 75 children that had shown interest in attending the program that day.

"[Vet for a Day] is probably our most popular program and we are looking to expand it, but vets are very busy so it is kind of tough," said Kim Jess, organizer of the program at the APF. "Anything with kids I enjoy, because they are so

enthusiastic. They have that natural affinity for animals and to know that these are the kids that care and will influence their peers and just help make the world a better place for the animals of the future."

Dr. April Davis lead the program and said when she was growing up all she wanted to do was be a veterinarian and work in a clinic. Now she works in a laboratory through her PHD in microbiology and deals with viruses, with one of her studied areas including bats.

"When you are age I wanted to be a vet. That was all I wanted to be," said Davis. "One option is to work in a clinic, but there are so many other options."

Davis prepared the children for the long road of schooling ahead of them by explaining they would need 8 years worth of college education to reach their PHD to become a veterinarian. Getting a master's degree in a particular field they are interested within animal care she said is also a good idea.

Even with the extensive studying required, she did ease the children by

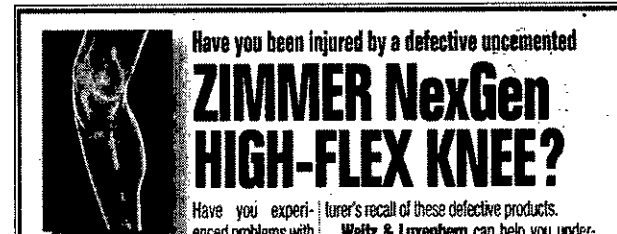

because if a rabbit grows up relying on people for food and nourishment then it won't be able to fend for itself when it goes back into the wild.

"People will keep them a while and not know how to fend for themselves ... so they are not learning how to go out on their own," said Davis. "When they are old enough to be released there is an excellent chance they are not going to make it because they are dependent on you. That is why it is important if you find a wild baby animal you find a rehabilitator that is able to rehabilitate them properly."

Before getting to exam a dog, Davis went over some of the different elements in taking care of a dog and their anatomy.

One example she shared was the difference between a healthy dog nail and an injured nail. The most common instance of a dog getting their nail damaged is when the owner cuts it too short, which can occur if the dog flinches.

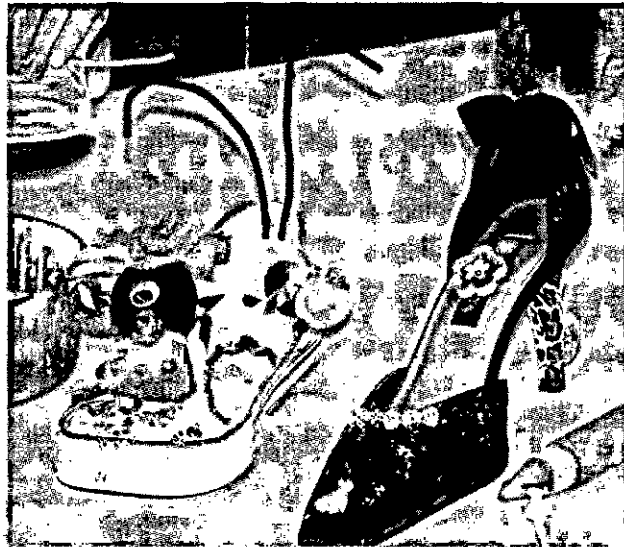
"It bleeds a lot for a surprising little area," said Davis about a nail getting trimmed too short. "To get bleeding to stop, pressure is really important."

An easy way she said to deal with it is to count slowly for a minute and just apply pressure. If that doesn't work she said just repeat it expect for two minutes the second time.

After learning about healthy teeth, kidney, heart, inflammation from ticks, fleas and mites and other body parts, 'Betsy' was brought in for the children to test out some veterinarian skills.

While going through some procedures of a typical exam with a dog, children were supplied with a stethoscopes and checked the dogs heart rate. They were also

shown to feel for the femoral pulse along the back leg of the dog, which she said is important to make sure a dog is getting good blood circulation to their back legs.

The last animal friend to join the group was Scotty, a cat that had a distinctive feature due to neglect.

The owners that brought Scotty in said they let him roam around outside a lot, said Davis, which made the animal similar to a stray even though he had a home. She said the average lifespan of a stray cat is around two years.

Scotty two ears didn't point up like most cat's ears, because the tips of his ears had to be removed due to frostbite while being out in the cold weather recently.

"When they did the surgery on him to nurture him they had to remove a majority of his ears, so

he can still hear, but his hearing is going to be a little different," said Davis. "It is really important to treat your animals well and is a reflection of who you are."

After the educational program the children got a chance to look behind the scenes at the shelter and see where the animals are housed and taken care of at the shelter.

For the current week up to that Saturday afternoon there were 39

surrenders at the shelter and 7 adoptions. Last year the surrender rates at the shelter increased by 24 percent and currently there are over 100 animals in the facility.

"There are more and more animals coming into the shelter and not enough adoptions," said Jess.

Also, a goodie bag was given out with information on caring for animals and dog treats were given out to anyone that had a dog back at home.

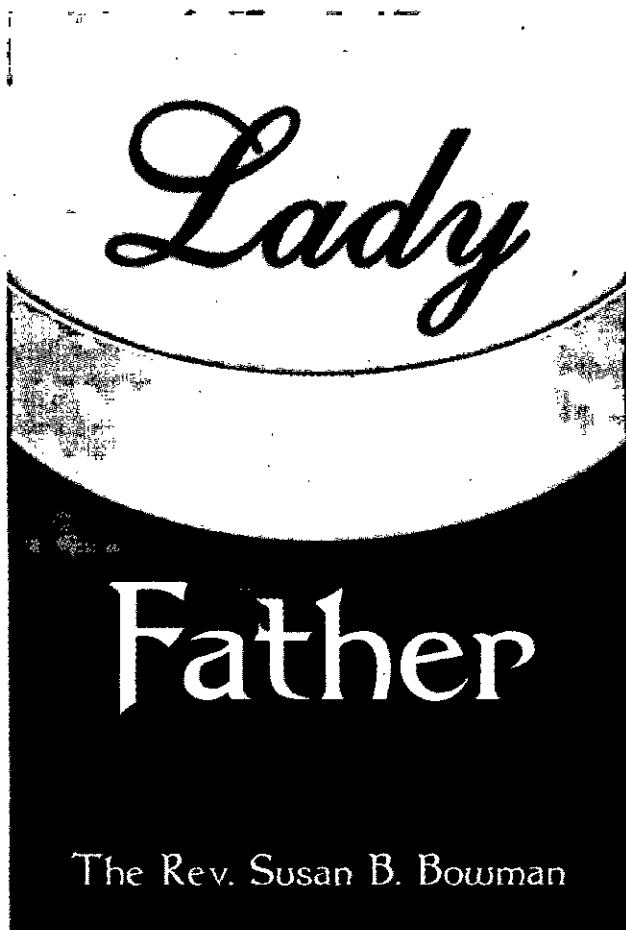

'Lady Father' tells local female priest's tale

The Rev. Susan Bowman discusses how she persevered

A local woman is turning her unique story about breaking ground in the theological world into what she hopes will be a secular hit.

Susan Bowman's "Lady Father" is the tale of the Delmar resident's more than 20 years as a priest in the Episcopal Church and the difficulties she faced being one of that denomination's first ordained female clergy.

Bowman was born and raised in the Diocese of Southern Virginia. When she was a child, women were still barred from the priesthood, but she remembers wanting to be able to walk down the aisle of her church

holding a cross.

That path was opened in 1976, when the ordination of women was approved, but like many women in the following years, Bowman found reality takes time to catch up with policy when she joined the seminary.

"There were a lot of angry people, a lot of surprised people," she said.

Part of that surprise was that her Bishop, the Rev. C. Charles Vaché, a staunch opponent of women in the clergy, signed off on her being the first woman to enter the diocese's ordination process in 1981.

"Most people who were against women ordination didn't have anything against the woman herself," Bowman said. "He just could not picture himself laying his hands on a woman's

head and saying those words."

His approval came from Bowman's involvement in the church community, and her deep dedication to youth programming. On top of working for the City of Petersburg, Bowman knew she wanted to devote herself full time to the church, but despite her faith, character and devotion, many told her not to pursue priesthood.

But others encouraged her and in the end, though it was a difficult decision, she said she was "inexorably pulled" to the seminary. She decided to quit her day job and pursue her passion.

"I felt there was something that God wanted me to do other than work for a city for the rest of my life," she said.

Though "Lady Father" deals with the Episcopal Church and its structure, Bowman said she thinks the book can be applied to secular life as well. Today, a woman is the presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church, but women still have a long road to equality in many walks of life.

"I think her story is interesting, it's compelling and it's well written," said Ross Murphy, of Aberdeen Publishing, who is releasing the book. "I'm very confident and hopeful that Susan's book is going to be successful and her launch is going to be success."

For Bowman, she hopes her story will be inspiring to other women who are facing their own trials. Her advice to them: Don't take naysayers too seriously.

"I don't know where the person in the pew has been. I don't know what their experience as a priest has been. Let people be who they are in this world, and understand that everybody's coming from somewhere," she said. "There were times when it hurt, and times that I wanted to scream and times I wanted to

walk away. But I didn't have the time or the energy to do that."

Even after Bowman graduated from seminary, becoming ordained was a process during which she had to fight the system tooth and nail, with the help of the Rev. Vaché. Her first posting was at a home for girls in Virginia, and since that institution held services Sunday night, she was often called upon to travel to other parishes in the morning to fill in for absent priests. In this role, she found rejection and even hostility from those uncomfortable seeing a woman administer the Eucharist.

"It happened a couple of times that I got there and people stormed off," she said.

When she relocated to the Capital District, the same kind of things happened, and she had to build up a reputation all over again. Some might wonder why Bowman continued to fight in the face of rejection, hostility and barriers thrown up by the very institution she adored. That's a

complicated question, she said.

"At the beginning, I think it was stubbornness, that the national church had said we could do this," she said. "As time went on, I think it was knowing, in my heart and in my spirit that I was doing what God wanted me to do."

Today, Bowman resides in Delmar, where her son and grandchildren also live. She's retired from the full-time ministry, but she still serves as a part-time pastor for Jermain United Methodist Church in White Creek, near the Vermont border.

She enjoys the small size of the church, and also being able to focus on preaching and tending to the congregation, instead of dealing with administrative duties.

"It's the finest thing for any pastor to live to become," she said.

"Lady Father" is still being finalized and is on track for a spring release. Bowman plans to hold book signings throughout the area. For more on her work and her blog, visit ladyfather.com.

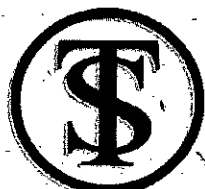

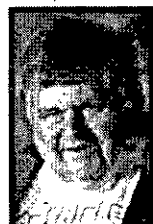

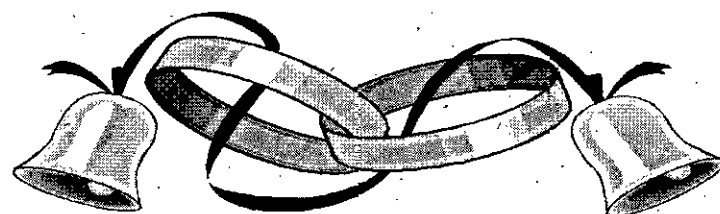

Teplesky on Feb. 15 announced he would take a pay freeze in the coming year, and said he's going to implore Cuomo to change state law to allow districts to institute wage freezes for employees. Under existing laws, unions must voluntarily take a freeze.

Movements are under way in schools across the state to appeal to unions to make concessions, with varying results. Administrators often argue that this year, it's either wage freezes or massive layoffs.

"I agree with Gov. Cuomo, in the very difficult times we're in, employees should move forward and say, yes, we

should take a pay freeze," Teplesky said. "However, we're under contracts with all of our bargaining units."

Teplesky said he would take the matter up at the next meeting of the school board on Tuesday, March 1, and possibly solicit the board's support on a letter to the governor. The superintendent added he would approach unions

before instituting a freeze, should the district have that power.

Last year, the RCS administrators bargaining unit took a wage freeze, but any major budget impact would be felt in decisions from unions with more members, such as the teachers union.

Board of Education President Scott Hughes said he doesn't want to

hurt families, but he'd be compelled to support a wage freeze.

"When we look at where we are economically ... we have to look at things like wage freezes," he said, adding he hopes to see union concessions this year.

"We're hoping that the superintendent leading by example really helps people pull together," he

said.

The district is this year operating on a \$42.2 million contingency budget, adopted after voters turned down the district's original proposal.

The next budget workshop will be held Tuesday, March 15. An April 5 budget adoption is anticipated, with the public vote on the budget set for May 17.

\$2.7 million) prompted the change of plans, said Assistant Superintendent Jody Monroe.

"That's a difficult thing to overcome," she said of the district's \$4 million budget gap. "We're looking at major reductions in our program due to that."

Many parents also argued their children already have laptops or tablets, and wouldn't want a school-issued one.

Under the new plans, the district would focus on improving network infrastructure at the high school. There is not a wireless student network at the school in place, and since the vision of integrated computing would require not only students, but teachers, administrators and staff, to be online, it has to be built up.

"Essentially what it would do is take into

account some of the network pieces we need to put in place for security purposes," Monroe said.

Under the new vision, students might soon be allowed to bring their own computing devices to school (that's currently against the rules). That would allow the district to collect important information about usage and requirements.

Schools may ultimately move toward a cloud computing solution, where information is stored on the district's servers and students and teachers access it through tablet computers or other means. The falling price of these devices is making such a future look more and more plausible. The trick will be to make sure they're used effectively, said Monroe.

"You don't want to have students bring devices in just to bring them in; we want to use them as an instructional tool," she said.

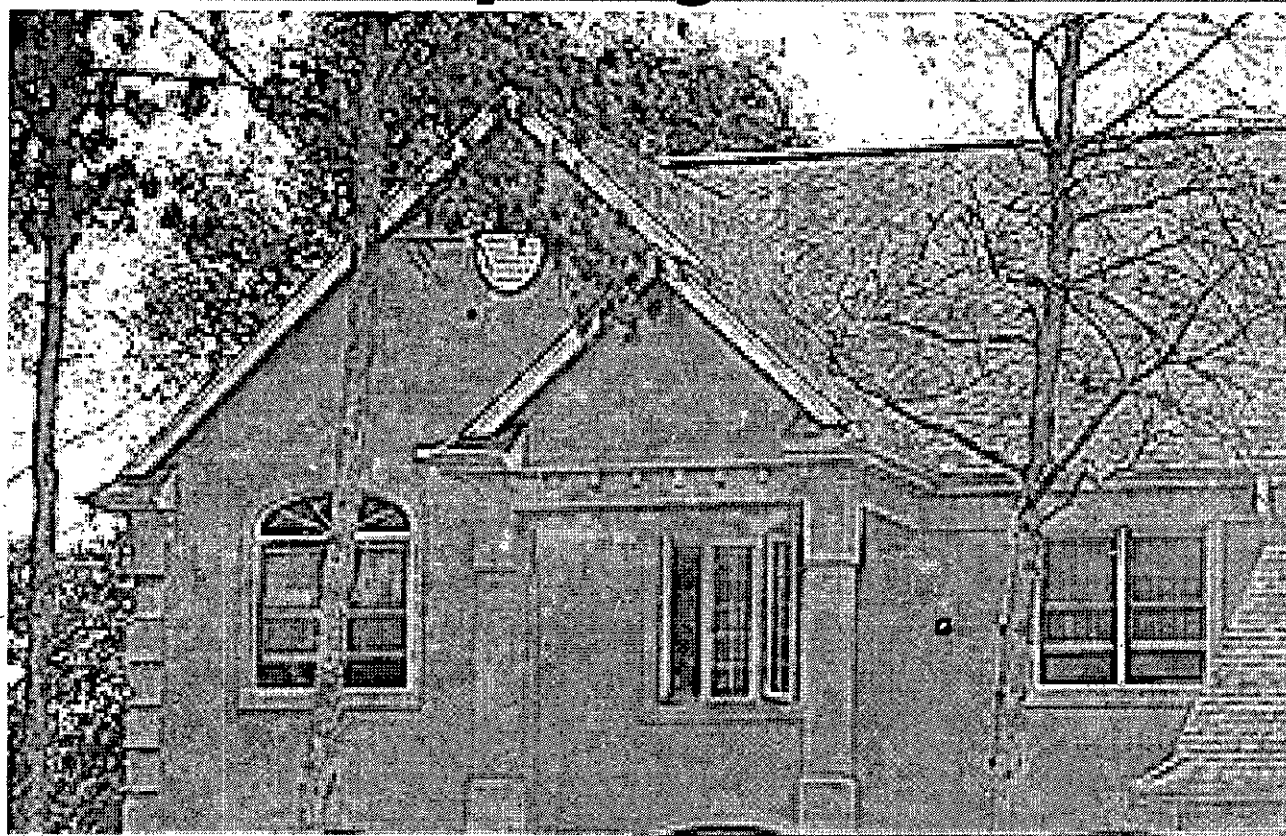

Transmission line plans push forward

National Grid's new line spanning Saratoga and Schenectady counties approved

When air conditioners are buzzing during blistering hot summer days, the last thing anyone wants is a power outage, and state officials are hoping a new transmission line into Rotterdam will prevent that from happening.

The New York State Public Service Commission granted National Grid a certificate of environmental compatibility and public need on Thursday, Feb. 17, for the company's proposed new 115-kilovolt electric transmission line from Spier Falls in Saratoga County to Rotterdam in Schenectady County. The new line will stretch 33 miles along National Grid's existing rights-of-way, but 20- to 25-foot-wide land easements will need to be acquired for vegetation management, which has been a point of concern for some residents who have wondered how the deal would affect their land.

"Our findings indicated that there is a need [for the new transmission line] having to do with outages and reliability for the system," said Anne

Dalton, spokeswoman for the New York State Public Service Commission. "We modified our certificate that National Grid will be required to do some post-construction landscaping along the rights-of-way and the company will have to comply with all local noise ordinances."

The new line will be built in two segments — from the Spier Falls Substation to the Ballston Tap is 22 miles, and the remaining 11 miles goes from the Rotterdam Substation to the Ballston Tap. Also, there is the reconstruction of a 4-mile spur line from the Ballston Tap to the Ballston Spa substation. The new lines will not be as wide as the existing line structures and will rise 4 feet higher.

The project is estimated to cost \$66 million, which is part of \$1.5 billion that has been spent over the past five years on projects in upstate New York, said Patrick Stella, spokesman for National Grid.

Residents have expressed concerns that they would see a spike in their National Grid bills, but Stella said that wouldn't be the case.

"You are not going to see a rise in your electricity bill all of a sudden because we are doing this project," said Stella.

Money for infrastructure upgrades is allocated through the delivery fees charged to

customers, said Stella, so the funding doesn't need to be acquired through dramatically increased charges.

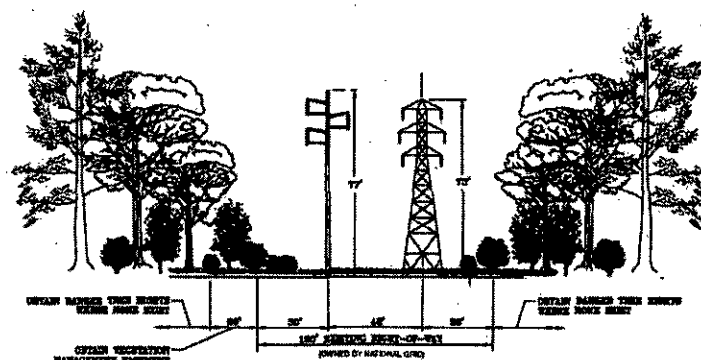
Dalton said the new lines need to be built in order to ensure power during high-demand periods, such as warm summers days.

"During peak periods, you want to have reliability on the system," said Dalton.

The long-range needs of the region will also be addressed by the project. The state Public Service Commission said the upgrades will alleviate the danger of thermal overloads, which could potentially damage facilities and leave thousands of customers without service.

"It is an area we have been looking at for several years," said Stella. "It is the largest growth area in upstate New York in our service territory, so there is a need for the reinforcement of the electrical system there. GlobalFoundries has begun construction of their facility as well, and that certainly heightened the need."

National Grid stated in its application that performance of their transmission system in the Northeast region was marginally acceptable in the summer of 2009. By the summer of 2012 their transmission system was expected to be unacceptable. Part of the increased demand

on the system is due to GlobalFoundries, which is expected to have a minimum peak load of 40 MVA by the summer of 2012, which accounts for more than half of the expected minimum load increase of 71 MVA that summer, according to National Grid.

At public hearings held on the project, customers had voiced concerns that GlobalFoundries should front the bill for the project due to the large demand required in the future. Stella contended National Grid was moving forward with plans for the new lines before GlobalFoundries committed to building its facility, and the upgrade is needed even without the strong pull on the system.

There are around 200 customers with property

adjacent to the project, said Stella, but the exact number of how many will be affected is unclear. Any property owners affected by vegetation management or acquiring additional land for easements will be dealt with on an individual basis through negotiations and some form of compensation. Vegetation management would include replanting of various taller plants species and possibly addressing trees that could pose a danger to the new lines.

"We really believe that this line is needed in this area and we are going to work with those customers in the right of way and those customers we need to obtain easements, and we are going to try to reach an agreement that is beneficial for both us and them," said Stella.

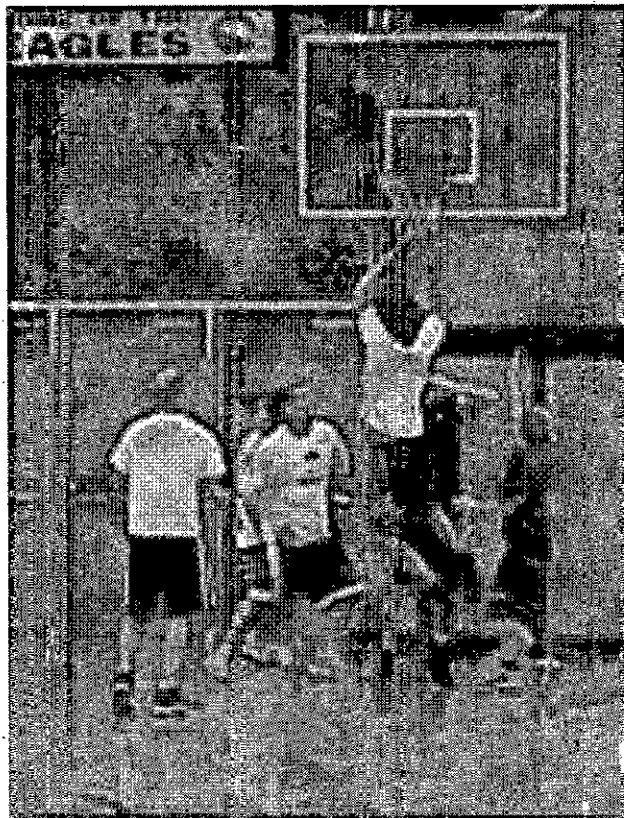

town in the future, and it is under such reasoning a Freedom of Information Law request for the town's bid was denied.

Messina said as much on Wednesday, Feb. 23, when the town submitted its bid.

"We would note that it is possible that a national concern could acquire the Normanside debt as part of a bid for a block of bank assets, and that they could re-sell the Normanside piece," Messina said. "We would not want our bid to the bank revealed to potential local competitors for this property."

While the bid was withheld, *The Spotlight* did acquire minutes resulting from the board's executive session deliberations on the matter. Those records show Councilman Mark Jordan cast the sole vote against placing a bid.

Jordan said his vote was not necessarily in opposition to the idea of Bethlehem obtaining the Normanside property, but was rather due to the details of the arrangement.

Under the bidding process, the winner will acquire the debt Normanside has with the Bank of America, which will afford the ability to foreclose on the club. Normanside would

presumably hand over the deed to the property in lieu of payment of its \$4 million debt.

But absent a contract stating that arrangement, Jordan said he was wary of the terms, which he characterized as putting the town in the role of a bank.

"My thought was that it was a wiser decision to wait and see what would happen with the bid process," Jordan said. "The only way it would work for me is if we were to have a whole slew of contingencies."

Under the terms of the bidding process, the town would also have had to put up 10 percent of the purchase price within 24 hours of its acceptance.

Dan Byrnes, the president of Normanside Country Club, has publicly said the club would hand over the deed should it be foreclosed on. The club had been seeking a buyer that would be willing to continue operating it as a golf course.

Messina said after an extensive review of the issue, he and three

other board members felt confident Normanside would be a financially viable town asset and an acquisition of the club's indebtedness would not put the town in a difficult position.

"I do not have concerns about the details of the instrument, because I think we've done good work and due diligence," he said. "I would not have supported this if I felt in any way this would be a drain on taxpayer dollars."

The town's course on the Normanside matter has been the subject of considerable debate since the club announced in early February it would be closing its doors, including during a public hearing that filled Town Hall's auditorium to the brim.

Opponents to town involvement worried the course would be a financial albatross and said government resources should be spent elsewhere.

Messina argued the town can fix its sewers, water system and roads while still grabbing up Normanside.

"That's something we'll also do. They are not mutually exclusive," he said. "Government has the responsibility of investing where it should, and the golf course is a good investment."

"Once he took me down [in the first period], it was pretty much all downhill from there," said Rue.

"We thought A.J. would have something for [Murphy] with his wrestling style, but he had an answer for everything he did," said Mormile.

Rue – who moved to R-C-S from Saratoga Springs last fall – was dominant in his first two state tournament matches, pinning both of his opponents in the second period. He then edged Chittenango's Wesley Blanding 7-6 in the semifinals to reach the championship bout.

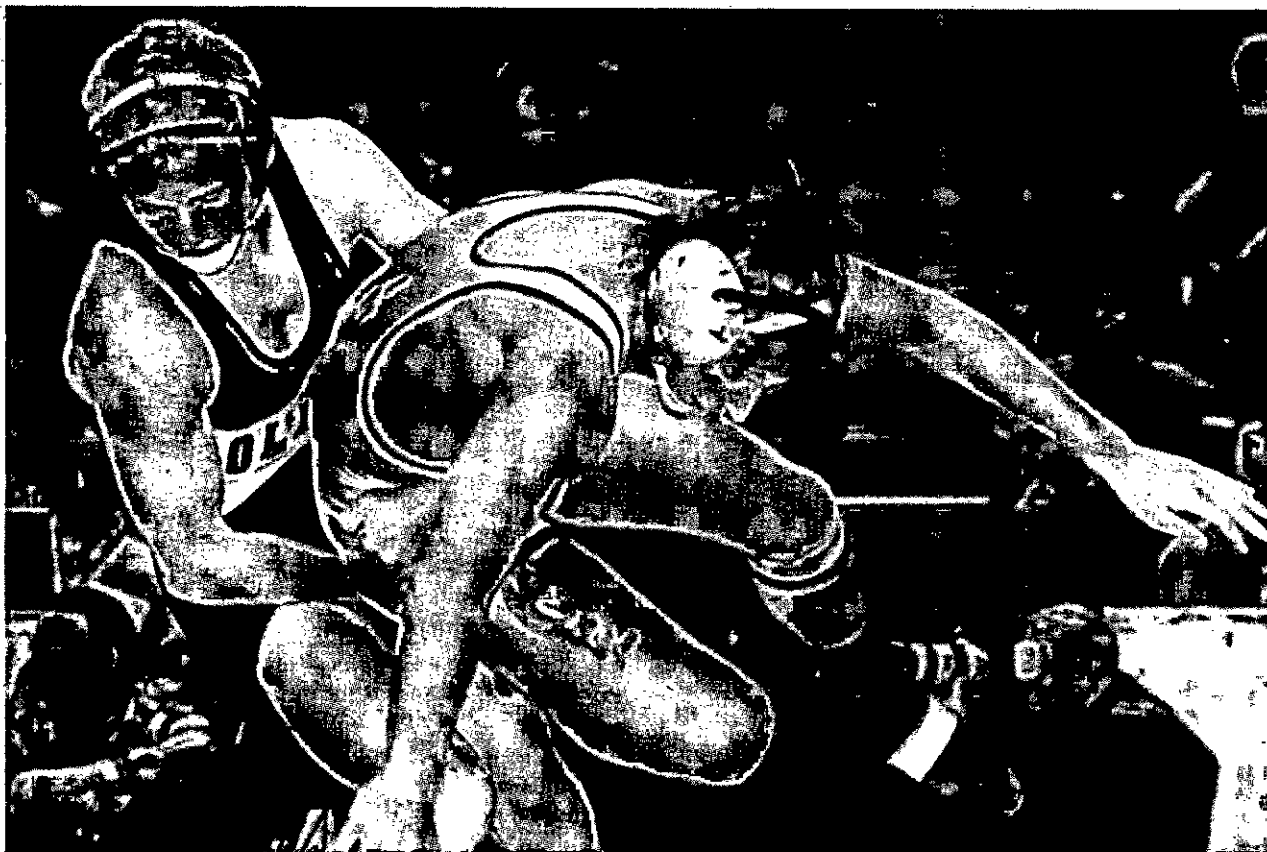
"I can't tell you how proud of him I am," said Mormile. "To get him from not getting past a Sectional semifinal before to the state finals in one year is an

incredible achievement."

"I knew I had it in me," said Rue. "I looked at [states] as just another tournament. My coach told me that each match is a two-person tournament, and if you win each period you win the match."

Rue and Lyman were two of Section II's five finalists in Division II. Duanesburg's Nick Gwiazdowski won his second state title at 215 pounds, while Hudson Falls' Luke Albrecht defeated Holley's Kacee Sauer 2-1 for the 285-pound division title.

R-C-S finished ninth in the individual team standings with 44 points, a half-point behind eighth-place Hudson Falls. Section V's Palmyra-Macedon led the way with 70.5 points. Section II was fifth in the intersectional standings with 174 points. Section V took top honors with 266.5 points.

a chance to reach the America East semifinals. Then again, that's only because the Great Danes need one win to get that far. Siena will need two wins in the MAAC tournament to get to the semifinals, and even with Ryan Rossiter and Clarence Jackson leading the way, I just don't see it happening.

Bottom line: area college basketball fans will have to satisfy themselves watching Jimmer and BYU in the NCAA Tournament this year because the local teams are staying home this March.

• One local college team area fans will be able to watch in an NCAA Tournament is the Union College Dutchmen.

With Saturday's 5-0 victory over Princeton, the Dutchmen (now ranked No. 4 in the nation) clinched the ECAC hockey regular season title. And though it doesn't guarantee Union an at-large berth should something go wrong in the ECAC playoffs, it certainly makes it difficult to deny the Dutchmen a berth.

Union will have to be wary of its quarterfinal matchup, especially after last year's league playoffs when last-place Brown stunned regular season champion Yale. The bottom feeders this year have been getting stronger

as the regular season has wound down – especially last-place Colgate, which has won three of its last six games after starting the season with one win in its first 16 league contests.

But even if Union can't get through to the ECAC Final Four, I think the regular season title will be enough to gain the program's first NCAA Tournament bid since moving to Division I in 1991.

Of course, it would be better if Union won the ECAC Tournament and locked up a No. 1 seed.

• Finally, the Shenendehowa wrestling team proved you don't always need a champion to win the individual team title at the state championships.

The Plainsmen failed to get any of their seven wrestlers into the finals last weekend at the Times Union Center, but five of them placed in the top six to help Shen finish with 83.5 points, well ahead of runner-up Fox Lane.

As a whole, Section II fared better than last year, when only two wrestlers won state titles. That number doubled to four this year – LaSalle's Connor Sutton, Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk's Andy Lyman, Duanesburg's Nick Gwiazdowski and Hudson Falls' Luke Albrecht. Three other area wrestlers – A.J. Rue (R-C-S), Brian Walsh (Loudonville Christian/Watervliet) and Matt Lashway (Queensbury) – finished second.

Congratulations to all the champions and the place finishers from Section II.

Is it bad that my cat is overweight?

Yes! Obesity, defined as over 30 % excess body weight, is the most common disorder seen in domestic cats. Approximately 40-50% of all household cats are obese. Obesity predisposes cats to type II diabetes, heart disease, arthritis, cancer, urinary tract problems and liver disease. Genetics may play some part in obesity, but it is thought that diet and environment are the main culprits. Indoor cats tend to be more obese than their outdoor relatives. This is likely due to increased food consumption and decreased exercise common in indoor cats.

Diet will play a key role in keeping your cat fit and trim. Remember that cats are carnivores, meaning that their bodies rely on protein metabolism and are not competent at digesting carbohydrates. If your cat is obese or obese-prone, you must be vigilant when choosing a cat food for them. Although the perfect commercial diet for cats is constantly debated, it is generally thought that a mixture of canned with a small amount of dry food is best. For example, feed a small can of high quality, grain free wet food in the morning and then a small portion of high protein dry food at night. Cats do not need to have food available to them all day. In fact, this tendency to graze goes against their natural instinct and can be metabolically detrimental. When choosing canned food, select the pate version over the calorically rich gravy, sauce and giblet varieties. Canned food will typically contain more protein than dry food due to manufacturing processes. Ask your veterinarian which dry food will best suit your cat's needs.

With feline obesity, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Please ask your veterinarian for more information about an appropriate diet for your cat that fits your cat's metabolic needs and your budget.

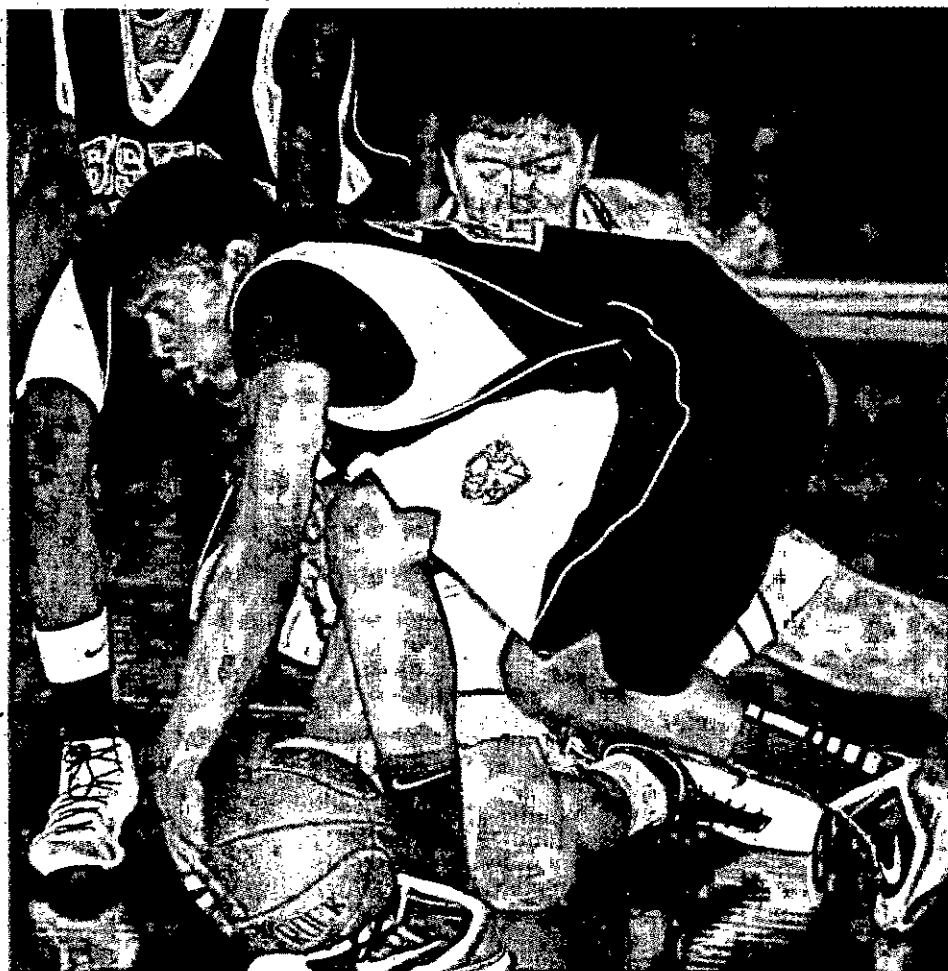

Lyman takes title

R-C-S senior wins state tournament

Andy Lyman did exactly what he needed to do to win his first state wrestling title.

The Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk senior scored an escape midway through the third period and held on for a 2-1 victory over Bainbridge-Guildford/Afton's Danny Gormley to take the Division II (small school) 125-pound championship at last weekend's state tournament at the Times Union Center.

"It's like everything that I've been working towards my whole life has paid off," said Lyman.

"The kid rode him parallel," said R-C-S coach Henry Mormile. "If Andy did the same thing, he would have deserved a [stalling] penalty."

The penalty point gave Lyman the momentum shift he needed. Less than 15 seconds later, Lyman escaped from Gormley's grasp to take the lead, and the two of them spent the last 56 seconds of the match trying in vain to get a takedown.

When the final whistle

sounded, Lyman shook hands with Gormley and his coaches before running and leaping into Mormile's arms for a big hug.

"This is a storybook ending for me," said Lyman.

Nothing came easy for Lyman in the tournament. All of his bouts were decided by one or two points including his 6-5

semifinal victory over Windsor's Colton Perry.

"I really had to step it up," said Lyman. "At this tournament, a win is a win as long as it means I move on."

"It was a stacked weight class," said Mormile. "There were seven or eight kids who placed at states before. I think he had a tougher draw than

[Gormley]."

Lyman's teammate, A.J. Rue, also had a shot at a state title. The senior made it to the 135-pound division finals before running into Holley's Quinton Murphy, and the two-time state champion made quick work of Rue by earning a third-period technical fall.

Kearney beats Harris in finals at qualifier

Carpinello and Crawford will also be competing individually at the state meet. Carpinello finished second in the 1,000-meter race with a time of 2:38.33, and Crawford finished third in the 600-meter run with a time of 1:25.99.

Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk's Mike Morrow earned a spot on the intersectional distance medley relay team after finishing fourth in the 1,600-meter race with a time of 4:36.50. Morrow joins Shenendehowa's Kevin Hulbert, Ballston Spa's Phil Williams and Ichabod Crane's Nicholas Accuosti in the distance medley relay.

and give opposing coaches insomnia as they stay up late trying to figure out how to stop the Glens Falls native.

But how has Jimmer transcended from college basketball superstar to a one-name pop culture phenomenon? Why is he being talked about by the likes of Ohio State super freshman Jared Sullinger, NBA superstar Kevin Durant and rapper (if you can call him that) Nelly?

I suppose it has something to do with Jimmer's physical traits. He's not a tall, lanky man like most NBA prospects – he's built more like a barrel than a redwood. Yet somehow, he can twist his body in manners that most humans wouldn't think of so he can get around defenders and create a shot when he's being denied on the perimeter.

It also has to do with where Jimmer can shoot three-pointers from. Some players like to stay close to the three-point line before attempting a shot.
