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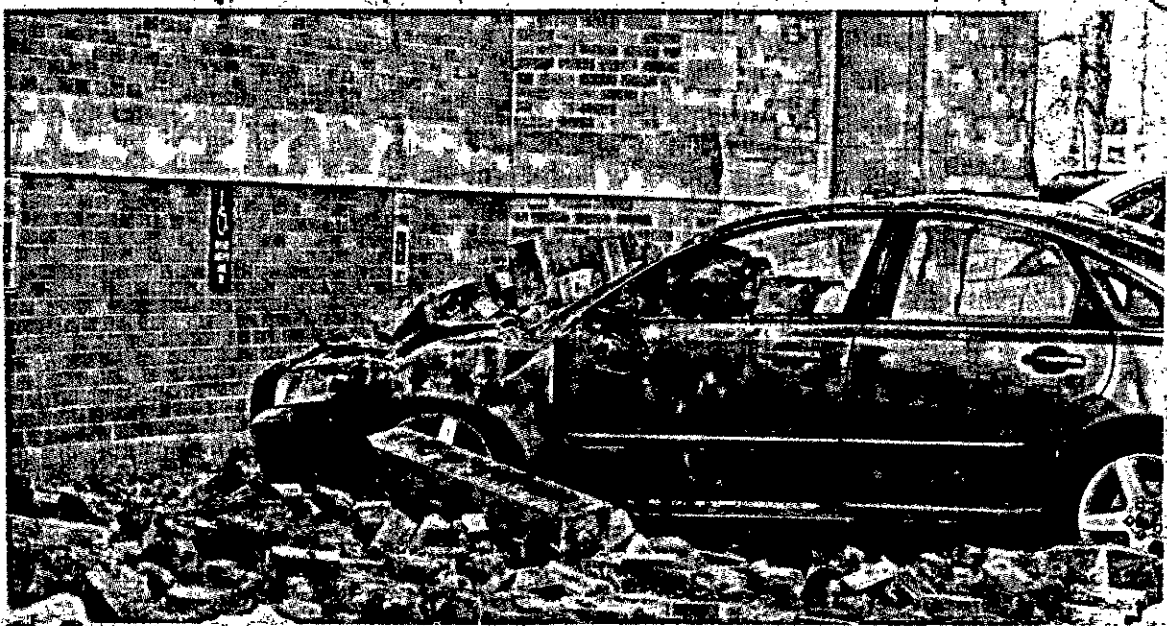

Town Hall repairs had been discussed

Parapet problems identified in 2009;
DPW commish says town
could have moved faster

On Tuesday, March 1, the aging parapet wall lining Bethlehem Town Hall's roof gave away, sending bricks and mortar down onto four cars parked beneath it. Engineers say the cause of the collapse was expanding ice that weakened the feature over time.

There were no injuries, but Anna Colonna Carroll, a member of the Bethlehem Senior Chorus, had just pulled into a parking space when the bricks hailed down. Luckily, her windshield did

not break and her Toyota Matrix shielded her from debris; her daughter, Candice Stellato, said.

Carroll, 87, was not interviewed by police or attended to by paramedics before being given a ride home, according to Stellato. Her family was not contacted, she said.

"She didn't know what had happened, she couldn't figure out what was happening," she said. "No one checked her out to make sure she was OK."

Nearly one week later, Stellato is dealing with the municipality's insurance company, which she said wants to repair, rather than replace.

Vista taking shape

Developers hope to have
retail component
finished in early 2012

The Vista Technology Campus is continuing to take shape. The Town of Bethlehem Planning Board on Tuesday, March 1, saw plans for the first group of buildings that will be erected at the sprawling development. These will be primarily retail establishments near the entrance to the park, which will likely lead planners to give the buildings designs a thorough looking over.

Taking art to heart

Photography exhibit
features wounded soldiers

Students in the Voorheesville High School were in elementary school when the U.S. invaded Iraq in 2003.

For these youngsters, a "post-9/11 world" is more of a constant than a new way of being. Still, despite living in an era of instant communications, in Voorheesville, like the rest of the country, conflicts overseas seem distant and unrelatable.

But from now through March

18, students at the high school and middle school have at their fingertips a world-renowned photography exhibition that aims to humanize the impacts of modern warfare. "Purple Hearts," by Nina Berman, is on display in the Performing Arts Center lobby and is open to the public.

The exhibit was arranged by Robert Alft, a Voorheesville resident and Vietnam-era veteran. He saw "Purple Hearts" at the Sanctuary for Independent Media in Troy and was moved by it.

"After it was over, Nina offered us the photographs that were used in the exhibit to put in local

Students planning to pursue history or museum work can apply for award

New Scotland Historical Association is offering an award to a high school senior residing in the Town of New Scotland and planning to further his or her education in some field related to history or museum work. The students competing for the award would be required to submit transcripts and references and write a 250-word response to a given task. Any student who will complete high school studies in June of 2011 is eligible to enter the competition, whether he/she attends a public school, parochial school, private school or is home-schooled.

The requirement of furthering one's education in the fields of history or museum work

can be met by studying, for example, American History, Political Science, International Relations; Archaeology, Anthropology, or museum courses of study for museum curators, conservators, archivists, museum technicians or specialists. These are just examples of potential college majors or concentrations of study.

The award is provided through the generosity of the Don and Ann Eberle Fund, established by Todd Slingerland, principal managing partner for Capital Financial Planning. Don retired in 2006, and the Fund was established to honor Don's 35 years as a financial advisor, and, in addition, to further honor the years

of volunteering both Don and Ann have given to the New Scotland Historical Association. It is the wish of the Eberles that the funds be used for the Historical Association's missions of preservation and education.

Applications are available in local high school Guidance Offices, the Bethlehem and Voorheesville Libraries, New Scotland Town Hall, and the Wyman Osterhout Community Center in New Salem. 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G'land Library expanding literacy partnership **IN BRIEF**

Need for tutors greater than ever; group searches for new volunteers

For many nonprofits these days, finding money for programming is a difficult task.

At Literacy New York-Greater Capital Region, that task has become a bit less pressing with a nearly \$28,000 grant from the New York State Library to the Guilderland Public Library. There, Literacy NY is embarking on a round of programming that is hoped to bolster adult literacy rates in the area—they just need some extra help.

The group is just starting a new round of group classes at the library, and they need volunteer tutors. One of the ways Literacy NY makes its dollars go a long way is to use volunteer labor to teach its classes.

Guilderland was one of 11 libraries statewide to be awarded a grant to support adult literacy. The "Team Up for Literacy" funds are now arriving at the library.

The partnership between the Guilderland Library and Literacy NY has been going on for more than 10 years, said Adult Services Librarian Maria Buhl, and it has increasingly been more useful to the community as Guilderland's demographics have changed.

"Our efforts began in earnest after research of Census data, and our own observations at the library, showed that there was a significant increase in the number of Guilderland residents whose first language was not English," Buhl said. "We recognized that this part of our community needed our services."

Literacy NY's mission does not only involve English as a second language courses, but also helping adults working towards their GED. Immigrants will oftentimes need a good

knowledge of English to obtain citizenship, said the group's Greater Capital Region Associate Director Sue Hensley-Cushing.

"There's a huge demand," she said. "We never advertise for students, students find us."

That's certainly true at the Guilderland Library, where over 75 people have volunteered to be tutors over the years. The

"Team Up for Literacy" grant will hopefully increase that number even more, and also impact more people in need of the services by putting them in front of small groups rather than holding one-on-one tutoring.

"There's an added benefit to people working in a small group. They learn from each other as well as the teacher,"

said Hensley-Cushing.

The library also has a wide range of language learning materials, including a laptop loaded with Rosetta Stone software patrons can check out, said Buhl.

With program funding in hand, Literacy NY and the library are looking for new volunteers. Time commitment is minimal, with most tutors working two or three hours a week. That's following a training session.

The next orientation session will be on Monday, March 14, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the Guilderland Public Library. For more information, contact Literacy NY's June O'Connor at 452-3382.

And they wouldn't let me bring in my own coffee, even after I told them it was prescription.

Our \$10 meal wound up costing us close to \$40.

Over the weekend I found myself paying to park at the same venue two days in a row — a waste of money if there ever was one.

Friday night we took the kids to the Times Union Center to see a hockey game. On our way back to the parking lot, I got a great idea.

"You know," I said to Jess, "we have to be right back here

tomorrow for the Kidz Expo."

"We could save \$5 by sleeping in the car."

My wife stopped. "So, you want me and the kids to sleep in a public parking lot and go to the Kidz Expo unwashed messes just so we can save \$5."

A lot of the Feed the Pig stuff we've already done. We brown bag our lunches. We don't order appetizers. We've combined our telephone, Internet and cable bills.

"Well, it does say that it's the Special Edition," she looked at me from behind her computer monitor. "With over ten hours of special features."

"I'm pretty sure the one I borrowed had no hours of special features," I said. "Is there any way we can get one like that?"

"Well, the only other one available is the box set with Karate Kid parts two through four included."

"You're kidding me. There were more of them?" I knew I was in the wrong to have lost the movie, but this went against every cheap bone in my body. "Listen," I said, and moved in real close to the librarian, "if I buy that box set, do I get to keep Karate Kid 2, 3 and 4? Because that's the only way this is happening."

My wife was understandably peeved that I wound up paying \$10 for a "free" movie I got at the library, so I told her that I would make coffee at least another two or three times a day so that we saved more money.

"I'm not sure that — You know what? Go for it," she said.

Delmar man charged with DWI, drug possession

The Bethlehem Police Department on Thursday, Feb. 24, arrested Matthew L. Taylor, 37, of 161 Adams Place, Delmar, and charged him with DWI and unlawful possession of marijuana.

Police at about 7:07 p.m. allegedly observed Taylor's 1997 Cadillac DeVille speeding on Delaware Avenue in Delmar, and pulled him over in the Hess gas station parking lot. He had the odor of alcohol on his breath and was slurring his speech, police said, and allegedly failed field sobriety tests. After Taylor was placed in custody, a search of the vehicle revealed \$1,910 in cash in a white envelope, a glass pipe containing marijuana residue and a pill bottle with marijuana in it, according to police.

At the station Taylor refused to take a breath test. He was given a court date of March 1 and released to his roommate.

Other arrests

The Bethlehem Police Department on Saturday, Feb. 26, arrested Barbara Jane Kelp, 39, of 568 Columbia Turnpike, East Greenbush, and charged her with reckless endangerment, DWI, driving in the wrong direction and other vehicle and traffic law infractions.

Police said they received a call at about 6:18 p.m. reporting a car driving the wrong way on the Route 32 bypass. The caller also said the car crashed into a snowbank at one point and was speeding, according to arrest reports. Police allegedly located Kelp's 2005 Toyota Camry in Delmar traveling northbound and stopped the vehicle. Kelp allegedly had the odor of alcohol on her breath, was "blasting" music and had her wiper blades on. She failed field sobriety tests and said she was on the anti-depressant Xanax, according to police.

At the station, Kelp allegedly refused to take a breath test. Police said they found several boxes of jewelry in her car. She was remanded to the Albany County jail on \$500 cash bail with a court date of March 15.

Colonie police have arrested a suspect

There are other charges still pending, according to the report.

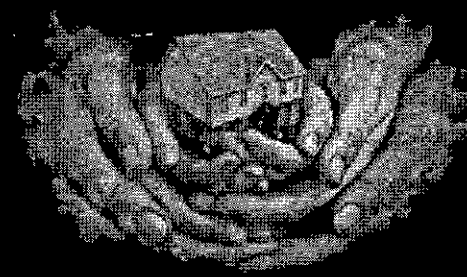

The rabble among the rubble

We have the luxury here, on the editorial page, to play Monday-morning quarterback with town policies and decisions, but we'd like to think that we at The Spotlight are somewhat constructive in our criticisms and offer what we think would be a better solution.

We did this last August when we pointed out the inactivity of the Bethlehem Town Board in addressing the crumbling parapet and other Town Hall repairs was costing the town time and money. We didn't know then that it would cost a handful of town residents their personal property and safety, as well.

See, in 2006, the town decided a facility needs study at a cost of \$80,000 that looked at Town Hall, the DPW garage on Kenwood Avenue, the Adams Street garage and the Elm Avenue Highway Department garage. That study suggested a major overhaul of Town Hall facilities — construction costs alone would have come to more than \$16 million at the time.

Last April, the board failed to pass a motion to spend \$365,000 on the projects. At that time, Supervisor Sam Messina supported all the projects — which included public "windows" for the Building Department and DPW, as well as moving the Youth Bureau so the Human Resources and Comptroller's offices could expand — and Councilwoman Joann Dawson expressed her support for the roofing expense, but Councilmen Mark Jordan and Kyle Kotary said alternatives should be examined — Jordan going so far as saying the town should move out of the building in the next few years.

So what do we have today, other than scaffolding on the east side of Town Hall?

We have a bunch of officials pointing fingers at one another, each with a horse in the race. We have council members pointing at the supervisor, saying he shouldn't have bundled the parapet repair with other "non-essential" Town Hall work; we have the supervisor saying the entirety of the work proposed last year is essential; and we have the DPW commissioner saying the work wouldn't have been done in time, anyway.

(And, of course, all of this comes right on the heels of the town trying to buy a local country club, something some residents — and this newspaper — felt it had no business doing. But see the POV to the right of this editorial for a little insight into that process.)

There is a lot of political hay to be made in pointing fingers and playing Monday-morning quarterback, particularly from a circumstance such as the one we saw at Town Hall last Tuesday. You can bet this issue will be brought up during this November's elections, but if you really want a good gauge of who deserves your vote, see who drops their fingers first, rolls their sleeves up and gets to work fixing this problem.

Normanside bid made after careful consideration

I appreciate the opportunity, truly the first opportunity I have had, to report the full story to the residents and businesspersons of Bethlehem regarding the Town's efforts to acquire Normanside Golf Course.

Bethlehem bid on the Normanside property, but was not the successful bidder. This may be disappointing to some of our community members, and comforting to others. Let me tell you what your Town did during this entire process and why we did it. I would also add, that in my 40-plus years in public service, I have never seen the principles of good government and active citizen participation practiced so well, by our town government and the residents of Bethlehem, as it was on the Normanside Golf Course matter.

During the fall of 2010, upon hearing of Normanside's continuing financial challenges, I reached out to Normanside on two occasions and indicated that the town would always be willing to have discussions if the club wanted to do that, but that I understood that there was an interest from the club to keep the club private and I respected that.

We learned near the end of January 2011 that Bank of America, the mortgage holder, intended to sell the Normanside property debt owed by Normanside, which effectively meant control of the Normanside property, in a sealed competitive bid process with bids due on Feb. 23.

Immediately, the Town Board and our staff engaged in extensive and detailed analysis to determine if the town could achieve the two goals of protecting and preserving 269 acres of pristine open space, and continuing to provide golf and other recreational opportunities (walking, jogging, sledding, cross-country skiing and snow-shoeing) with no burden on taxpayers. Our due diligence included consideration of extensive public input; careful review of budgets and financial statements of several public golf courses; detailed interviews with golf course operators; a rigorous

assessment of Normanside's finances, operations, resources, inventory and other matters

And the public certainly did have extensive input into the process. The Town Board received scores of e-mails, letters and phone calls. The public meeting held at Town Hall attracted 250 residents and every speaker on both sides of the issue addressed the Board with passion and civility. This was a model of good government and public participation in action.

Based on all of our analysis, we were confident that the open space preservation, recreation and break-even or better financial goals would be achieved. Therefore, the Board decided in a 4-to-1 vote, with the dissenting Board member voting no for primarily procedural reasons, to submit a bid. We believed then, and we do now, that the bid amount we submitted to BOA was both responsible and realistic.

We reached out to BOA to ask if they would remove the Normanside piece from the 28 properties that were being auctioned off in a package, so that we could negotiate with BOA directly and offer a separate bid. This was not acceptable to BOA.

We met with environmental organizations and they indicated that given the short time available for their due diligence, the best that could be offered was front-end loan funds with the potential of additional direct financial investment after further review. This offer was certainly appreciated by the town and might have worked out well if we had won the bid. (I must also note that a citizens group, "Friends to Preserve Normanside" reported at the public meeting that there was an offer from residents to loan up to \$270,000 of their personal funds to enable the Town to submit a purchase bid.)

After speaking with a state agency representative, we felt that Bethlehem would have been in a reasonably strong competitive position to receive a grant of up to \$400,000 to offset some of the acquisition costs. But while that grant could be retroactive and therefore cover prior purchase costs, the application process would only begin in late spring.

Throughout the entire process, we released as much information, and made as many public statements as we could, without jeopardizing our bid submission. I know that the use of executive sessions to legally discuss confidential matters was frustrating for some residents. I can tell you that it was also frustrating for the Town Board because we believe in the maximum amount of openness and transparency and that is how we conduct our business, each and every day. But there are times when the law permits

withholding information, because doing so is in the best interest of the public we are sworn to serve. We simply could not discuss our underlying financial analysis, without tipping our hand to other bidders and driving up the price of acquisition.

From my "Point of View," the entire policy decision-making and public involvement process worked in an exemplary manner. The board did its job effectively and in short order. Our staff performed superbly and provided meaningful, detailed and accurate information quickly.

The Town Board fulfilled its duty to act responsibly, by carefully considering all available information, listening thoughtfully to public opinions, and then exercising sound judgment to make a decision. That is precisely what your elected officials are supposed to do. I would also add we were never faced with the choice of shortchanging water and sewer infrastructure to acquire Normanside as some folks have suggested. Particularly with our plan to have the Normanside Golf Course break-even or do better, our full intention was to address both of these areas. We must continually set funding and action priorities on a broad array of responsibilities, and we must continually evaluate and balance those responsibilities and move forward on all of them.

I also recall a few people saying that "government has no place running a golf course." This is a philosophical perspective that I can respect, but do not agree with. In my view, there are times when government is at its best when it is visionary, and that sometimes calls for investments to be made for the entire community, so such assets as open space and recreational opportunities are acquired to enrich Bethlehem in its entirety. And these types of investments are certainly opportunities we must seriously consider, when, like Normanside, taxpayers are not going to foot the bill.

Now, where does the story end? I am not sure, but my hope from the very beginning is that the reasons, the only reasons, for Bethlehem submitting a bid for the Normanside Golf Course was to protect and preserve 269 acres of pristine open space, and to continue to provide golf and other off-season recreational opportunities — while operating the golf course at no impact to taxpayers. Those goals are still attainable under other ownership scenarios. So, who knows, perhaps the end of the story can attain these goals and perhaps more. I remain hopeful that this may occur. Actually, while I have no official confirmation, like other residents I have heard rumors that the winning bidder intends to operate a golf course at Normanside. That would be outstanding for Bethlehem, and I hope the new owner will operate the course profitably and keep this unique recreational property a golf course in perpetuity.

I appreciate your consideration of my point of view.

District should do homework before closing school

On Feb 17, a meeting of approximately 80 concerned citizens gathered at the Clarksville Community Church to discuss the possibility of the closure of the Clarksville Elementary. Though the night held many surprises, the most enlightening was that a lot the folks there did not live in the hamlet of Clarksville and some didn't even have children in Clarksville. And then there were those who didn't even have children in the district. Why were they there? Because they had been following the story and wanted to help save Clarksville School.

Of course there were many concerned parents there as well. Their plan? To ensure their children continue to receive the unique and verifiably sound education they have now at Clarksville (check Clarksville state test scores-Go Clarksville!). They spoke of the individual successes they had witnessed or been a part of. The notable growth in their children,

both academically and personally. The sense of belonging that extended beyond the students and teachers to the families attending Clarksville. They shared their concerns about larger classrooms, less teachers and a current decision making process that may not recognize the danger in eliminating a vital school until it was too late.

We heard from residents of the Clarksville tax base that shared real world concerns about property value if the neighborhood school were closed. It was pointed out that the impact of declining property value would reach far beyond the boundary lines of the hamlet of Clarksville. Town of New Scotland Supervisor, Tom Dolin was also present and shared in what he felt were very valid concerns.

There were questions by many regarding the report submitted by the Board. Such as the inclusion of the kitchen staff salaries as a savings. Fact is that the food staff funding comes from a

self funded program and should not be included in actual savings because it pays for itself. Not to mention the additional inaccuracy of indicating 2.0 kitchen staff, when there is only 1.5. Of course, this brought questions regarding other figures and their validity?

Another item of concern was the 12041 ZIP code used to define the number of residents attending Clarksville. The hamlet of Clarksville extends beyond and into other zip codes, and therefore is not the best way determine number of residents. Furthermore, the number of students at Clarksville was decreased during the redistricting process.

The report also included an amount of \$3,700 as the overall cost to maintain a closed Clarksville Elementary. The \$3,700 is to cover the cost of mowing, plowing, heating and general maintenance annually. This amount seems very conservative and was presented without any back up of actual,

known costs for these services.

The meeting ended with a collective determination to do what makes sense in keeping with what's best for the children overall. What's best for all of our children are to ensure quality, safe educational environments, while yes, reducing our overall cost. This would mean looking in other areas for savings, like sports and identifying programs that benefit only a few students, programs that are non-essential in the over all good of the students.

We have our homework to do and would ask the district to do the same. There needs to be more time for such a huge decision like closing a school. It's difficult to believe the best interest for all is being considered when you really look at the current process, which unbelievably included a proposal for a technology bond providing laptops to each student.

Flores said he'll be focusing on making Normanside a premier location for weddings and special events. The club was already a draw for such business when the club announced it would be shuttered earlier this year.

"Normanside is a perfect location for us, there's not really a lot else around there," he said.

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Funding for Vista infrastructure moves forward

Cost of the road into business park estimated at \$6.2 million

Plans for a financing partnership between the Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency and Vista Technology Campus developers are lurching ahead, with the public agency approaching the end of a review of the plan.

The IDA's Finance Committee on Wednesday, March 2, unanimously voted to forward to the IDA board a favorable recommendation on the deal, which would see the public agency taking over construction of Vista Boulevard, to be financed by the issuance of tax-exempt bonds.

Those bonds would be paid back through the creation of payment in lieu of taxes (PILOT) agreements with Vista tenants. That will require Albany County, the Town of Bethlehem and Bethlehem Central School District to agree to hand over their receipts of those fees to pay back the IDA loans.

The town would assumedly be open to this, given its collaboration with the IDA up to this point, but the county and school district have yet to be approached.

Columbia Development's Joe Nicolla, who has been spearheading negotiations on the financial arrangement, said the school has nothing

to lose (a town road, Vista Boulevard wouldn't generate taxes).

"If we can explain there's no loss of tax dollars, I don't think it's a very heavy lift," he said. "They get all of the taxes that would have been due otherwise."

The bonds themselves will be sold to investors. It's likely that would be a bank or other financial institution. The tax-exempt, 25-year bonds should be more attractive to investors than what developers would be able to raise themselves, said IDA bond counsel Joseph Scott.

"I think the major concerns are the inability to borrow on a long-term basis," he said.

Such an arrangement would keep the IDA clear of exposure, according to Scott, which has been a concern since the idea of a financial arrangement was raised weeks ago. Should Vista be a flop and the bonds be unpayable, the agency's obligation would be limited to whatever PILOT payments can be collected and to a foreclosure on a mortgage on the property.

The remaining concern is that the IDA would be heading up construction, handing over the 3/4-mile road to the town upon completion. The cost of the road is pegged at \$6.2 million, though estimates have varied. The IDA will look to an outside source for a more exact figure before closing any deal.

The road, which will also supply sewer, water and power to the entire project, should take about eight months to

complete. With a major tenant (yet to be named) requiring a Nov. 15 move in, that leaves developers little time to work. Many structures will likely be erected the moment the road reaches their plots.

Nicolla said developers would likely begin work on the road before the bonds are released due to the time constraints.

"People become less likely to believe you'll get it done the more you make them wait," he said.

Flap over fees

Though much of Wednesday's IDA meeting involved financing Vista Boulevard, there was also plenty of haggling over fees the developer must pay to the agency.

A tentative agreement called for the Vista Development Group to pay a 4 percent fee on the bonds, which would amount to over \$200,000. After about half-an-hour of back-and-forth, followed by about 10 minutes behind closed doors,

the IDA voted to set that fee at 2 percent.

That fee would go into the agency's coffers, which are nearly empty at this point, to pay the town back for its staff's work and to pay other operating expenses.

The IDA usually charges a lesser portion on its deals, such as 1 or even .75 percent. This fact led to an objection from Nicolla, who said a 4 percent fee (to be followed by more as the park is built out) would hamper the project's momentum.

"We're burdening tenants with this cost," he said. "This is a tax. Call it anything you want...I am trying to keep that down."

But some IDA members said the agency has already conducted extensive reviews of the project without payment

(though the developer pays for Joseph Scott, engineering studies and other work out of its own pocket), and argued the construction of Vista Boulevard itself won't create any permanent jobs, which is the goal of the IDA.

"Our concern, I think, is the up front costs associated that we're not guaranteed on," said IDA member Sam NeJame. "We want to be covered. We don't want to make money just to make money."

IDA Member Joseph Richardson cast the sole dissenting vote. He, like Nicolla, argued the agency should not encumber the developer any more than absolutely necessary.

"We have a partnership here, and we need to work with the developer to get this project under way," he said.

"Fur mowing" in cats is defined as excessive licking of their coat which eventually results in baldness. Most often cats lick due to itchy skin and not due to physiological abnormalities such as stress or anxiety. A recent study performed at the University of Guelph Veterinary Teaching Hospital found that only 2 cats out of 21 were licking due to a psychological cause alone. The most common medical causes for fur mowing in cats are parasites, fungal infections and allergies. Using a flea comb to check your cat for fleas and flea dirt is an easy first diagnostic step. Skin scraping and skin tape tests may reveal the presence of mites such as Demodex, Noteredes and Cheyletiella. A fecal examination may be useful as intestinal parasites can cause itchy skin and occasionally Demodex mites may be observed in the feces. The use of a Wood's lamp (fluorescent light) may identify the presence of a ringworm infection. A fungal culture should be performed if the Wood's lamp test is negative. If all of the previously mentioned tests return negative, a steroid trial may be attempted. The purpose of using a steroid is not only to provide relief of clinical signs but the response or lack of a response can help provide a diagnosis. Steroid non-responsive mowing is most likely to be from parasites, fungal infections or food allergies. It can be difficult to resolve fur mowing in cats and requires close work with your veterinarian.

mother's car. She said the family is holding off on any decision about legal action until the insurance process pans out.

Stellato said her mother has been having difficulty sleeping since the incident, and she criticized Supervisor Sam Messina for not reaching out to her mother.

"He was very curt and rude to me on the phone. He never expressed any remorse whatsoever," she said.

Messina said he did his best to get information out.

"They [Stellato and her sister] were angry that not more was done, and I'm not sure how much more could be done," he said. "This is the first time I've ever heard the issue of a paramedic raised. ...The feedback I get here is that no one was injured, and therefore the call for a paramedic was not needed."

He added that it's the role of the town's

insurance provider, Burt Anthony Associates, to handle the claims.

"I have to leave this to our insurance agent; they're our representative," Messina said. "Nobody I think should be in there adding advice or comments at this time."

While the collapse came as a surprise to Carroll, concerns about the parapet wall had been raised well over a year ago, and it was about 10 months ago the funding to repair the parapet, which is original to the 1920s-era building, was first put to the Town Board.

Board considered parapet in April

In April of 2010, the Town Board considered about \$1.8 million in bonding resolutions, included amongst them repairs to the parapet and the courthouse roof.

Records of that meeting and past Spotlight articles show members of the Town Board were in favor of repairing those items. But they show no action was taken at that meeting

or the next one, when most of the rest of the bonding packages were approved.

Instead, the next time the repairs came up was Aug. 11, when the board voted to contract with the firm of Barton and Loguidice for design work.

The bond resolution did not only include repair work, though. Packaged with it were upgrades to Town Hall amounting to about \$365,000, the majority of which would cover expansions to the comptroller and human resources offices.

This touched off a heated debate on the Town Board. Members said the extra work was unnecessary and sprung on them by Supervisor Sam Messina, leading to a delay on the bonding vote.

Messina — then and now — characterized the expansions as necessary. Staffing changes left employees without places to work, he said.

"I personally tried to move this forward as quickly as I can with strong recommendations

from staff," he said. "Action steps got delayed a little. You have a month or two delay here and there, and pretty soon you're up to six months."

Councilman Kyle Kotary said he feels the extra work neutered the board's ability to move expeditiously on repairs.

"It's unfortunate that Supervisor Messina originally put forth a bond proposal that included a bunch of unnecessary spending on office furniture and office expansions with necessary repairs to the structure of the courthouse and Town Hall," Kotary said.

Between April and the August 2010 approval, town staff continued to study the Town Hall project, said Department of Public Works Deputy Commissioner Erik Deyoe.

"We spent from April into August doing the preliminary design work on the inside, doing some hazardous material surveys on the roofing materials," he said. "We

were advancing those preliminary design efforts in the April to August timeframe."

Under that schedule, an earlier approval probably wouldn't have meant work would have been done before winter, when masonry work becomes difficult and expensive, Deyoe said.

Wall was targeted in 2009

Problems in the parapet were identified much earlier though, in 2009. The repair was made part of the 2010 capital plan, which was finalized later that year. So there was about half of a year between the discovery and the initial proposal for bonding.

Department of Public Works Commissioner Josh Cansler said he would have preferred to see the repairs pushed on a different path from other Town Hall work.

"I would rather it had gone through separately, and I think that was our initial goal," he said. "I do remember trying to get it on a board meeting earlier than [April]."

Cansler went on to say if the parapet wall had been focused on independently in April, it's possible a repair could have been made before the winter. Connected to other projects, though, it languished.

"I remember standing up in that April meeting and saying, 'At a minimum you have to repair that parapet.' But no movement was made on that," Cansler said.

Kotary said he recalls the Town Board giving town staff instruction to begin repair work at the April meeting. He said he was surprised to find the parapet had not been repaired.

"The Town Board was pretty clear in our direction, and I'd like to know why it wasn't fixed earlier," he said.

"My view was that we were going to look at some incidental things

... and then that we were going to move forward," said Councilman Mark Hennessey. "I didn't think we needed to wait for another agenda item to move forward on this."

Town infrastructure in forefront

How the town spends its money has been a matter of considerable public debate in recent weeks. The town put in a bid in hopes of acquiring the Normanside Country Club's land in February (the amount of the bid is unknown, but Bank of America started the bidding at \$1.3 million).

Councilman Mark Jordan wondered why that resolution was struck in a matter of days while Town Hall repairs were stalled all summer.

"That was put forward into fast forward, warp speed ... and it seems this safety concern was put on the back burner," he said.

Jordan was the only member of the board who voted against putting a bid for the course in. Other board members considered the course to have been a potential revenue source.

That doesn't mean the two issues are not related, said Hennessey. Had the town got involved with Normanside before the Bank of America

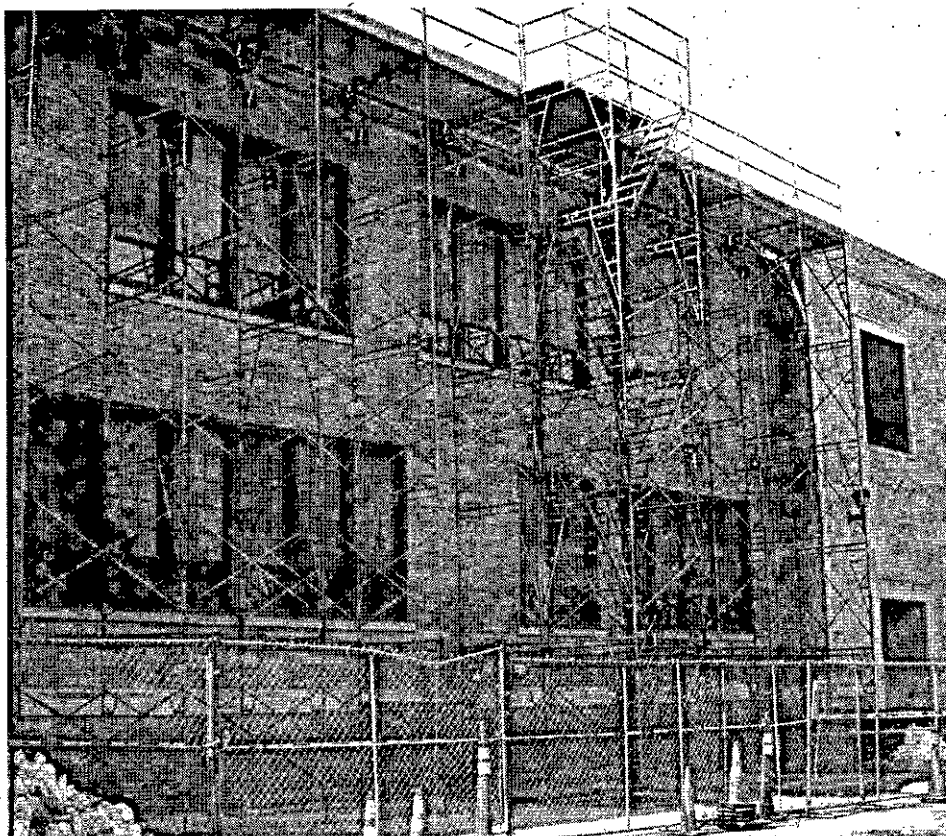
put it up for auction, he argued, the town could have struck its own deal, perhaps for much less.

"You know about this issue, it sits there, it sits there, it sits there, and nothing gets done," he said. "If we plan ahead for things like this, instead of letting them become an emergency, we'd be in a much better place."

Today, scaffolding stands at Town Hall, waiting for workers to begin the repair process. The collapsed area has been shielded from the elements, but a fix will have to wait until warmer weather in the spring.

The town will actually not have to deviate much from its repair plans in light of the collapse. The intent had been to bid the work later this month or in April. The Town Board will consider a resolution to approve emergency expenses related to the repairs at its meeting Wednesday.

One of the two entrances to Town Hall that were closed earlier this week has been reopened. The Delaware Avenue entrance remains cordoned off. On that side of the building, the parapet can be seen bowing outwards, likely due to the same expanding ice that is attributed to the collapse.

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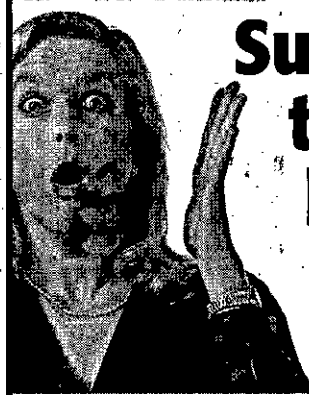
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Academy students make a French connection

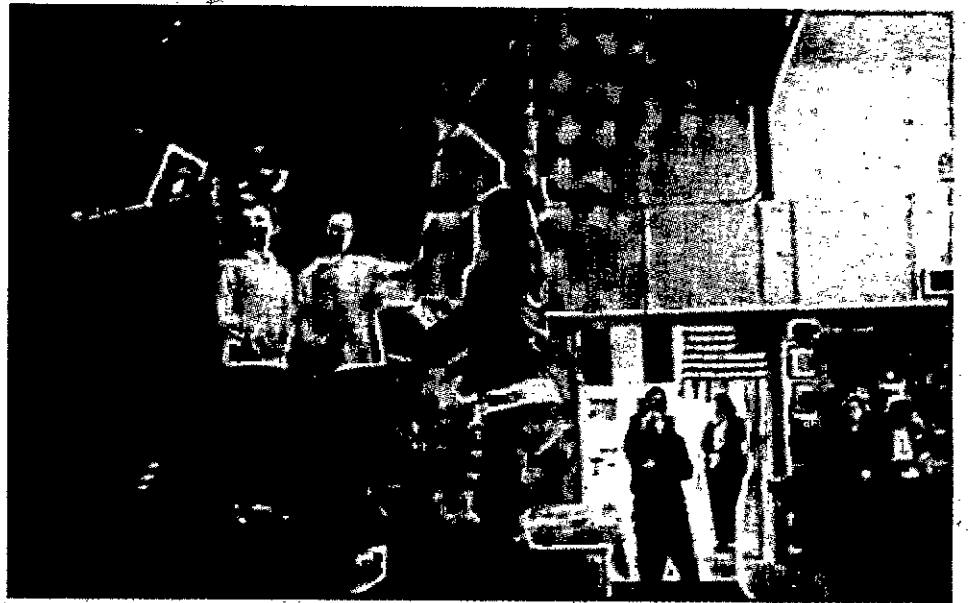
authentic manner."

A new kind of movement

Saratoga Women's Festival includes lectures, movies and workshops

Standing at the checkout line, Sierra Sullivan's spirits sagged as she looked at the women's magazines on rack.

The headlines told women to do things like lose weight, hide their wrinkles, update their wardrobes.

Where, Sullivan wondered, were the magazines telling women they were OK the way they were?

It turned into a mission. She looked all over for a positive women's magazine. Finding none, Sullivan had an idea.

She would start her own.

The RAY started as an e-zine and grew into a full-color, glossy magazine. Perhaps more importantly, it was Sullivan's first step in embracing what she calls the "modern women's" movement. This week, she took another huge step in that direction, launching the inaugural Saratoga Women's Fest in conjunction with the 100th anniversary of International Women's Day. The opening ceremonies were held on Tuesday, March 8. There will be closing ceremonies on March 27. In between, there will be lectures, movies and workshops, all aimed at spreading the ideal of "self-love."

The idea is deeper than just rallying women for a month, though. Sullivan and other organizers hope the festival will spur lasting change in both big and small ways.

"We hope to inspire women," said Celeste Caruso. She pointed to her own work with Sustainable Saratoga, an organization that promotes economic and environmentally sustainable practices. She hopes women who take part in the festival will be moved to tackle topics like the environment, create stronger bonds with their families, and to love and nourish their bodies.

Caruso acknowledged that it "sounds very lofty and grandiose." But having been an active participant in the first women's movement in the '60s, Caruso thinks it's an important time for women to re-evaluate, to "become more like women."

That's a common theme of the festival. In fact, while the first women's movement may have been centered on giving women choices – the choice to have a career, to have a family, to do both – it created a lot of anger, said Lin Murphy, another festival organizer. This time around, the movement is "more loving and inclusive," she said.

Sullivan grew up in a home with abundant female energy. A native of Oswego, she has three sisters, and her mom founded Harborfest, a celebration that has grown synonymous with the city. So when Sullivan was living in California and saw those magazine covers, they went against the strong sense of self she had developed.

The RAY, which stood for Real Authentic You, came upon hard times in recent years, like many magazines. So Sullivan came back to upstate New York to reconnect with her past and hopefully decide what to do moving forward. Her father lives in Troy, so Sullivan spent time in the Capital District, talking to women about her magazine, her philosophies and her wide-open future.

The ideas of self-love and acceptance resonated with everyone she talked to, she said. She started to feel like this area could use someone to promote those ideas. She had always vowed she'd never move back to New York, but suddenly, she was staring at a new mission, and she knew she wasn't going anywhere.

"The calling was so great," she said. "I hit the ground running."

Sullivan started meeting with women around the area, just talking and trading ideas about "feminine power." She wanted to do something to celebrate the centenary of International Women's Day, but she wasn't sure what. She and four other women met in a living room to talk about the possibilities. Then 10 of them got together in a coffee shop; then 17.

"I'm really excited about the way it happened," Murphy said. "It's taken off like wildfire. People are just throwing money at us."

A large aspect of the festival will be looking at women's role through history. Sullivan said women were held in high regard in Native American history, to the extent that when the settlers and Native Americans would meet to negotiate, Native Americans would wonder why the settlers hadn't brought any women to the meetings.

That cooperative spirit has died out over the years, Sullivan believes. Today, women are competitive – "We're even competitive with our husbands and our boyfriends."

There's nothing wrong with striving to be the best, Sullivan stressed. But it can't come at the expense of other things. She sees women getting burned out because they're too afraid to ask for help. They don't make time to share with other women or to connect with their families.

"We're not taking the time to nurture ourselves," she said.

She's been juggling a lot trying to get the festival together, and she can fall into the mindset that "it's easier if I do this on my own," she said. In the end,

though, she feels better reaching out for help.

"We've been conditioned to do things ourselves," she said. "We have this Lone Ranger mentality that we can do it all."

Murphy is a big advocate of stepping away from it all and just making time to sit down and talk. She frequently facilitates women's circles, including one she was part of locally last year in honor of International Women's Day. Everyone went around and talked about issues that were important in the community, about changes they wanted to see.

They wanted an end to domestic violence. They wanted more women to get involved in politics. They wanted people to support the arts.

Those are the kind of concrete ideas that organizers hope the festival will move people to take action on, with the idea that women will see these things – and themselves – as important.

"We need to reconnect with our intense power," Caruso said.

Not every undertaking has to be life-changing, Sullivan noted. Women can benefit even by doing simple things like getting together for a book club, or by picking one topic and talking about it, like the challenges of being a mother.

By listening to one another, by exchanging ideas, women strengthen themselves and others, she said.

"You see how much alike you are," she said. "It's so profound."

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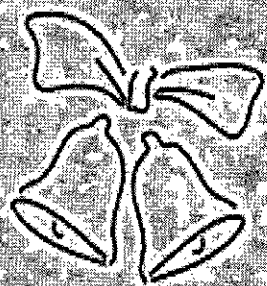

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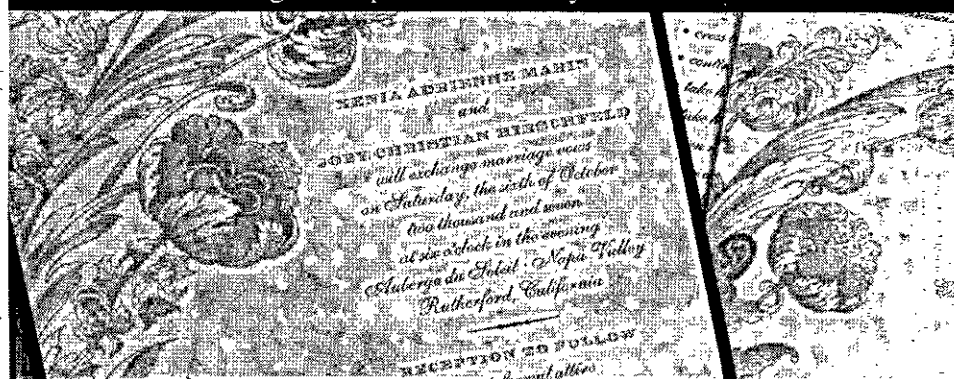

Jonathan deForest. "That would be the goal. First quarter of 2012 could be a reality."

Not all of the retail tenants have been identified, but Vista developers have said a ShopRite grocery store would be the biggest one. Also slated for storefronts are CVS, SEFCU and Berkshire Bank. A yet-to-be-named restaurant has a standalone location that will likely feature outdoor dining.

There will also be office space going up while the way is paved for retail, including on the second floor of one building over shops. The project is cleared by the town to only be 20 percent retail, based on square footage, but this construction will bring developers right up to the 50/50 split that is the maximum allowed at any stage of development.

Though the plans for this phase of construction are conceptual, members

of the Planning Board singled out the walkways that will weave through the park. Providing good pedestrian access has long been a goal. Member Nicholas Behuniak referenced the Price Chopper Plaza just across the street from the site, saying it can be tough to get to those stores on foot.

"You get to the bank, and then it gets a little hairy," he said.

There was also talk of breaking up the parking lots to avoid creating a vast wash of asphalt.

Developers also presented an initial design for the campus' entrance sign on Route 85. It's designed to be somewhat minimalist — the intent is to not have it too busy, said deForest.

"This was supposed to be not an opportunity to advertise...but to be more of a destination," he said.

Once motorists or pedestrians get inside the park, additional signage would direct them to shops and businesses.

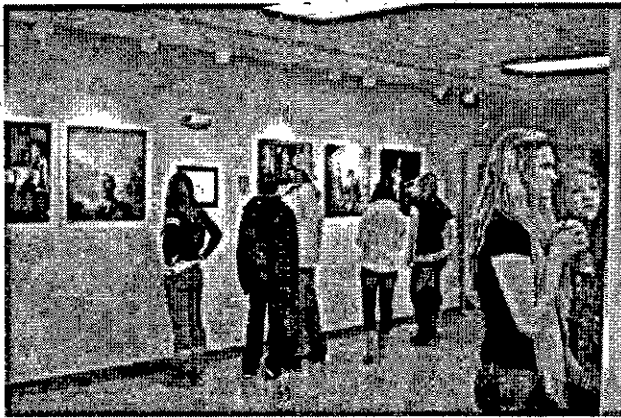

schools, high schools, community centers, things like that," Alft said. "She really wanted someone that was involved in the community to get these images closer to where people go, rather than in a gallery."

Voorheesville High is the first of what Alft hopes will be many places the remarkable work goes on display. "Purple Hearts" has been shown all over the country and been featured in the like of the New York Times.

It's easy to see why. The exhibit is a series of photographs of soldiers who have come home from the Iraq War badly wounded. Some of the images are graphic, like those of soldier scarred by their burns. One particularly moving image is "Marine Wedding," a photo of a Marine and his bride on their wedding day. The groom is blank and featureless, his injuries so extensive his face is erased.

The decision to allow

such an intense, graphic exhibit into the school was not one that was arrived at lightly, said High School Principal Imran Abbasi. District Superintendent Teresa Thayer Snyder put it best, he said.

"She said, 'Our kids are going to see one of these guys in the grocery store.' It's reality...I think some things are there and they're out there," Abbasi said. "It's thought provoking and it will make them ask questions...then they make their own decisions and judgments."

Art teacher Marie Triller, who manages the gallery space, said it's a great opportunity to have not only world-renowned work in the school, but also work that encourages students to think about the world around them.

"Overall, it's been very positive," she said of student reaction. "They're very moved by it."

High school student Anna Mae Lanahan said with two cousins serving overseas, the images touch close to home.

"I think it's good for people to see what it's like

there," she said. "They're sacrificing their lives for others."

Though many might expect "Purple Hearts" to carry an anti-war bent, Berman did her best to keep the work removed. She interviewed the soldiers during the photography sessions, and their thoughts are reflected in captions posted with the images. They run the gamut, much as public opinion towards the war might be varied in civilian circles.

"I spent a lot of time with guys fresh back from Vietnam that still had time to serve. And all the things they experienced, we talked about," said Alft, who was stationed in Louisiana. "I see these returning Iraq War veterans and it's a lot of the same stories... It's honest, it's what they really felt, and I think that's what shines through, is the truth."

"Purple Hearts" is open to the public and free to view. Those who wish to stop by during school hours should make sure to sign in at the main office.

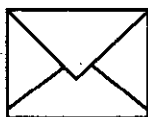

psychology from Boston University.

"That's the biggest hurdle. After losing a bunch of games in a row and sometimes doubting that we could do that, that's where my psychology degree kicks in," said Eslinger.

To help him in his efforts, Eslinger started recruiting players that not only met CalTech's high academic standards, but also had significant playing experience on their high school basketball teams. And he wasn't afraid to look outside of Southern California to find them.

"Our advantage is we're not targeting Southern California kids or California kids or west coast kids. We can recruit from around the globe because of CalTech's reputation as a fine academic institution," said Eslinger.

Eslinger's recruiting efforts over the past two years paid off this year. After winning once in Eslinger's first two years in Pasadena, CalTech won four non-conference games and had several close losses within the SCIAAC this season.

"We expected to win more conference games," said Eslinger. "If you look at our scores, we lost several games by only a few points. It wasn't a fluke or a surprise to us that we beat Occidental. If anything, our team believes we underachieved in conference."

Beating Occidental in its final game of the season wasn't easy. The Beavers had to rally from an eight-point deficit late in the second half to pull out the victory in front of a packed house at the CalTech gymnasium — a place that had been a virtual ghost town before Eslinger came to town.

"Our gym is not very big, but when it's packed you can definitely feel it. It gets very loud and very warm in there," said Eslinger. "Our stands pretty much every game were full, and we've had to bring in extra bleachers to the other side."

The victory drew a level of national media attention that Eslinger never anticipated. He and his players were inundated by interview requests including from ESPN.

"I knew it was going to be big news. I didn't really grasp how big it was going to be," said Eslinger. "It really has been international news and pretty much every major media outlet has contacted us."

Once the news got to Bethlehem, Eslinger's phone started ringing even more.

"I first heard from Charles Abba," said Eslinger. "I also heard from old high school friends. It's been a great vehicle for reconnecting with people [from Bethlehem]."

"He was very well liked and respected by his peers and his coaches and teachers here at Bethlehem," said Abba.

The timing of CalTech's first league win meant that Eslinger and his players could enjoy it for much longer than if it happened in the middle of the season. But the Beavers aren't planning on resting on their laurels.

"This program's goal was not breaking the losing streak. We never talked about the streak," said Eslinger. "Our goal was to compete in the league, and our goal next year is to win the league and go to the NCAA [Division III] tournament. We only lose two seniors this year, and one of them didn't play very much. We're still a very young team."

Those sort of lofty expectations would have seemed out of place at CalTech three years ago. But that was before Oliver Eslinger came to the school.

"I think he's going to have more success," said Abba. "If MIT can do it, I think CalTech can do it. The kids who go to MIT are just as dedicated and as talented as the kids at CalTech."

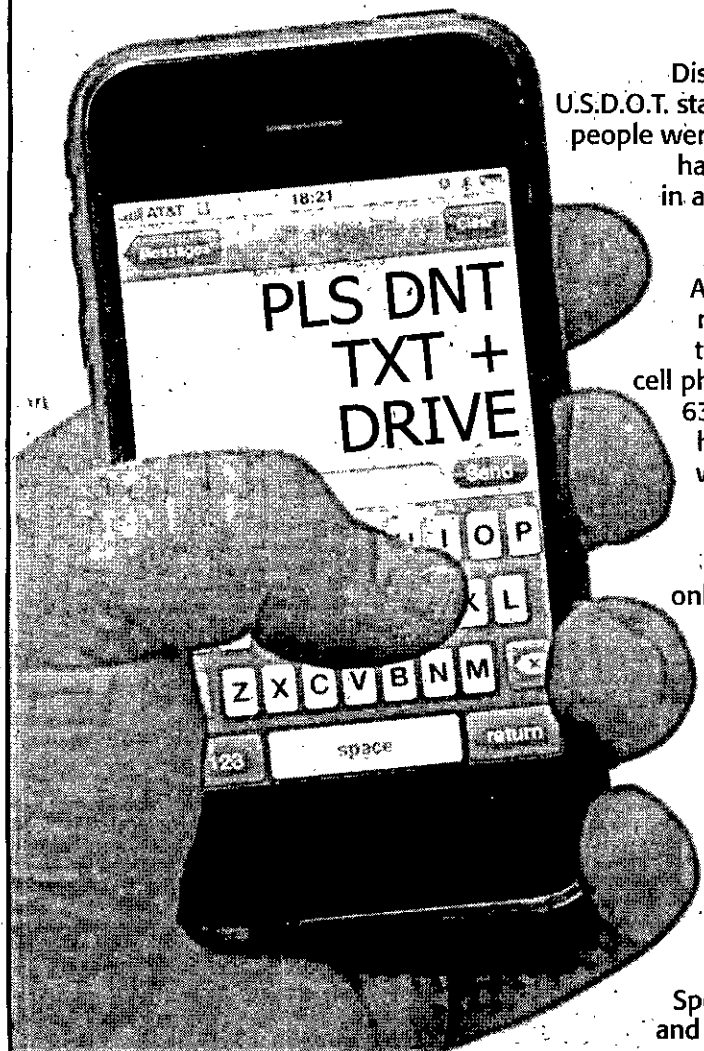
it matters in the grand scheme of things — just an interesting statistic to pass along.

Eslinger gets CalTech on track

Glenmont native helps Beavers end 26-year league losing streak

The California Institute of Technology men's basketball team had been on such a long losing streak in the SCIAC that Ronald Reagan was still president the last time the Pasadena school had been on the winning side of the scoreboard.

That finally changed on Feb. 22 when the Beavers edged Occidental College 46-45 to end their 310-game conference skid.

The man responsible for helping CalTech end its 26-year losing streak was head coach and Glenmont native Oliver Eslinger.

"Everyone rushed the court. There was a lot of dancing and cheering and screaming," said Eslinger, a 1993 Bethlehem Central High School graduate. "I hugged everyone in my path, whether it was a fan, a teacher or an administrator. The feeling was like nothing we've ever experienced or anything I've ever experienced as a coach."

Eslinger hadn't been at CalTech for every league loss. He only came in three years ago after being an assistant coach at the Massachusetts Institute

of Technology — a school that, like CalTech, was more highly regarded for its academics than its athletics.

"Most of what I did at MIT for six years was in preparation for my first head [coaching] job, and I certainly wouldn't be here if not for my experiences at MIT," said Eslinger.

BCHS principal Chuck Abba, who taught Eslinger in his senior year and later took him on as a volunteer assistant coach, said he knew the man he called "Ollie" would be a success.

"I talked to him after he was appointed, and I was very happy. I knew he was walking into a very challenging situation in terms of athletics, and the basketball team in particular," said Abba. "But I also knew he could be successful because if he had success recruiting at MIT, he would eventually have success there too. He's tireless, he's dedicated and he knows what he wants to do and how to do it."

"Knowing what he's like ... he's got a wonderful way with people, and he is a very patient and understanding person. But he also is a very good motivator."

The challenge for Eslinger was convincing his players — all of whom were at CalTech for academics first — that they could compete with any opponent. Fortunately for Eslinger, he came armed with a doctorate in sports

The biggest surprise with the game was how dominant Mohonasen looked early on. The Mighty Warriors scored 10 of the game's first 11 points and didn't allow the top-seeded Tartans to reach double digits on the

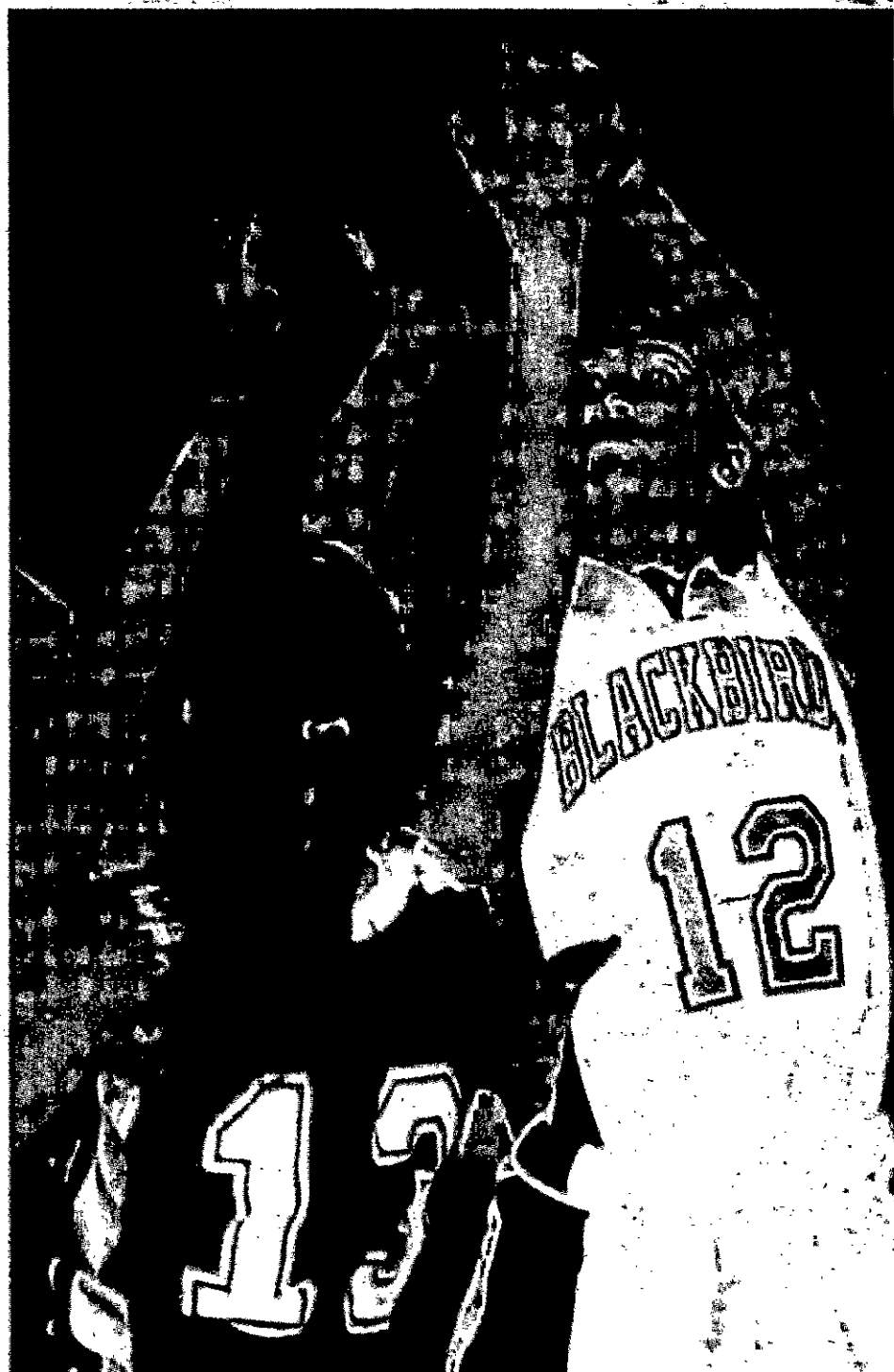
Voorheesville advances to play the Section X-Section VII winner Tuesday at SUNY Plattsburgh at 7:15 in a sub-regional game.
