## Mushing forward

### BC Middle School teacher travels to Alaska for Iditarod educators event

For Bethlehem Central Middle School teacher Aosta Edelman, her journey to the frozen north started with what she tells her students to do every day: reading.

This past week, Edelman returned from Alaska, where she attended the 2011 Winter Teacher Conference in Anchorage and saw the start of

the famous Iditarod sled dog race.

Though there are many sledding contests in North America, the Iditarod is probably the most iconic. The trail stretches more than 1,150 miles, and while the race was started only in the 1970s, the trail was used in the 19th century during the Alaskan gold rush. Most mushers (the men and women who drive the sleds) cover what is often billed as "The Last Great Race" in anywhere from nine days to two weeks.

Edelman's interest in the race was first piqued in the pages of adventure novels; enough so that she financed her own way to the conference.

"It started with Jack London. I read some

## Closure forum draws crowd

### Speakers say Clarksville Elementary the center of hamlet's community

More than 100 people turned out to the auditorium of Bethlehem Central Middle School Monday, March 7, to let the Board of Education know their thoughts on the prospect of closing an elementary school.

Though administrators splashed five scenarios on the screen (including doing nothing and redistricting all elementary students), it was clear a large portion of the crowd had come with concerns about a closure of Clarksville Elementary, a move administrators say would save the district nearly \$900,000 in the year it's shut down.

But for many in the audience living in Clarksville, with children enrolled there or with memories of its classrooms, it was clear a dollar amount could not be put on the value they place in the school.

Krina Collins said she graduated from Clarksville 20 years ago, and

## Teachers to vote on wage freeze

### Move would save BC about \$1.2 million

Bethlehem Central teachers will soon be voting on a proposal to take a partial wage freeze next school year.

The freeze on contractual salary increases for 70 percent of the year would save the school district about \$1.2 million, according to Bethlehem Central Teachers Association President David Rounds.

"The only thing that's expected is that every penny be used to save jobs," he said.

Rounds added the BCTA approached the district several months ago on the issue when the severity of the fiscal situation became clear.

The district is facing a \$4 million budget gap. The school board is in the midst of the budgeting process, but a proposal from district administration would involve the elimination of

## Flagging flags create a flap

Two tattered flags flying outside the TD Bank branch on Delaware Avenue in Delmar have been removed following an inquiry by *The Spotlight*, and a spokesperson for the company said replacements would be going up shortly.

The flags — a faded American flag torn down the middle and what was possibly the remnants of a New York state flag — were the subject of concern from some town residents, including Joe Bruno, owner of Joe's Barber Shop, located a few doors down from the bank.

Bruno, a Vietnam War veteran, said he first raised his concern about the flags with a bank employee three months ago, and that they had been in bad shape long before.

"They just looked at me like I had four eyes," he said.



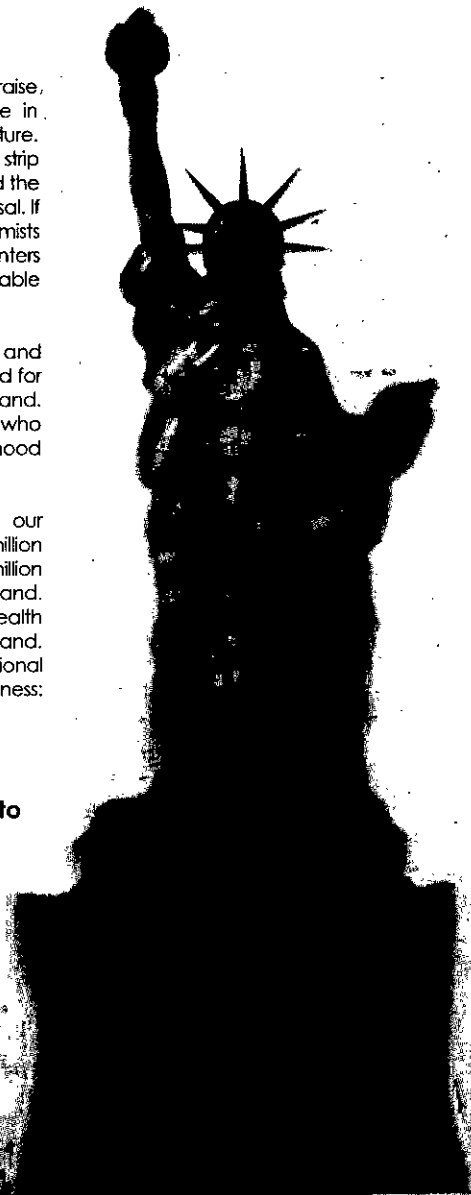

# Town: No puffing in parks

Minor traffic law changes also OK'd

Smokers be advised: There's a new set of places in the Town of Bethlehem you can't light up.

The Bethlehem Town Board on Wednesday, March 9, unanimously approved (with two members absent) a resolution to make portions of the town's park facilities smoke free.

From now on, recreation fields, playgrounds, tennis and basketball courts and the town's pool facility will all be smoke-free zones (smoking at the pool was previously off limits, as well).

The Town of Bethlehem joins 13 other area municipalities that have enacted partial or full smoking bans, according to the Capital District Tobacco-Free Coalition. That group will also be donating signage to the town to make the move cost neutral.

The town decided to go with a partial ban, leaving some areas out of the resolution, including the Capital Acres Golf Course.

"We're trying to be as least restrictive as possible," said Supervisor Sam Messina before voting for the resolution. "On a golf course you have the scenario of playing golf with your group."

This differs from other parkland areas, he said, where other patrons might be bothered by smoke or children might see the activity. Preventing children from being exposed to the habit is cited in the resolution as a chief reason for the ban.

The smoking restriction does not carry legal weight

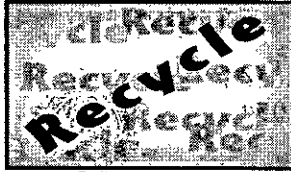
— in other words, police won't be able to ticket or arrest violators (the City of Schenectady is the only local municipality with a criminal law on the books). The Tobacco-Free Coalition has said voluntary compliance has been strong in other communities adopting similar bans.

The tobacco-free zones take effect immediately.

In other news, the Town Board at its Wednesday meeting also approved two traffic flow changes.

Two stop signs will be installed on Saybrook Drive at the intersection with Bayberry Road, which is near Colonial Acres. Homeowners there and the neighborhood association had complained trees and vegetation lend to poor visibility, making a dangerous situation at the intersection.

The town will also extend the 20 mph school zone speed limit near Eagle Elementary School on Van Dyke Road.

# Memories of kitchens quiet and crowded

## From a Caterer's Kitchen

Growing up, I lived just down the street from my best friend. We did all the stuff girls will do: sleepovers, eavesdropping on our sisters, talking on the phone for hours and a lot of lounging around.

The time we spent together was strictly divided into the things we did at her house, and the things we did at my house. You see, her house was very tidy, quiet, and there were lots of rules. We had to leave our shoes at the door and speak quietly. We never made a mess. Her family had a small dog who was always neatly clipped and trimmed. This dog had a bright red slicker and four matching red booties that she wore in the rain.

My house, on the other hand, was typically loud. My mother played the piano and sang at all hours. My father always had the television on, with the sound turned up. He read book after book in his old chair, and they would stack up in piles before he put them away. There were cats lying about, and our dog,

a big, hairy German shepherd, wasn't what you would call neat or tidy. She slept in front of the door and was too lazy to move, so we had to step over her to get in or out.

My friend's house was the place to go for food. Neat and tidy as she was, her mother believed in keeping a very stocked refrigerator. We could count on finding plenty of snacks in the snack cabinet, bagels in the bread drawer, cheese and deli meat in the fridge. Bottles of soda, something forbidden in my house, lined the refrigerator door. Her mother liked to leave freshly baked brownies or cookies on the counter.

So we would go to her house to eat. We'd do it quietly, or course, so as not to disturb her father. And our plates were always rinsed and stacked in the dishwasher, so as not to upset her mother. When our sandwiches and chips and cookies were eaten, we'd clean up and tiptoe to the door, put our shoes back on, and head back down the street to my house.

The place where we could tromp in without taking off our shoes. Play music, nice and loud. Use my father's antique swords to have sword fights and drag every blanket, quilt and pillow we could find into the living room to make an immense fort. My mother would stand by and encourage our creativity.

My house was fun and free and full of love. It was a great place to grow up. Still, I remember liking the peace and order of my friend's house. I liked knowing that if we felt like having chips and dip, we could open the cupboard for chips and the fridge for dip. It was always there. We'd often take out one of the fresh bagels her mother bought and spread it thick with butter. It's funny, but I remember being impressed by how neat and tidy their butter was. It sat in a fancy dish, and there weren't any crumbs left in it from the last person who had toast or a buttered bagel. It was a perfect stick, kept cold under its ornate glass top. With a clean knife, we'd slice off our pieces, then carefully replace the top. It was never left on the counter.

Our butter was a sad comparison. It sat in a saucer, no deluxe and custom dish made for butter. Crumbs left from the last butter user were a certainty. More often than not, it was left on the counter, where a cat would find it. Butter, crumbs, cat-tongue marks and all would have to be thrown away.

The other day, I looked around my house and thought about the little girl I was, wishing for a house with fancy butter. While my house now isn't my parents free-wheeling, sword-fighting, make-a-mess-and-leave-it-kind of place, we're not exactly the fancy butter people, either. I like to think of our house as equal parts fancy butter and fun and free. Kids regularly run in and out, tromping dirt and lots of noise. I love the noise, and the dirt just comes with the territory.

My house isn't exactly what I imagined it would be. I feel like

## Whole Wheat Honey Bread

- 2 cups white whole wheat flour
- 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 egg
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons honey, divided

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a loaf pan. Mix the dry ingredients together. In a small bowl, beat the egg and mix with the butter, milk and 1/2 cup honey. Pour into the flour mixture and use an electric mixer to beat until very smooth. Pour into the prepared pan and bake for 30 minutes. Remove from oven and use a small knife to cut a slit down the middle of the loaf. Pour the 2 tablespoons honey in. Return to the oven and bake for another 20-30 minutes, or until a knife inserted comes out clean. Best served warm with butter and extra honey to drizzle over.

I'm airing my dirty laundry, but yes, there are crumbs in our butter. It sure is a lot louder than I had hoped. And it isn't always as tidy. We tend to stack up our library books and newspapers, just as my book-loving parents did. Paul and I do have rules about picking up, though sometimes they are forgotten.

And just like my friend's mother, I do like to keep a stocked cabinet. Work and busy schedules sometimes keep me from being as zealous as she was about keeping it full, but it's good to have snacks in the cupboard when the messy, loud group comes running in the door. I don't mind clanking dishes, laughter and the general ruckus children create.

Again, like my friend's mother, I will often bake for my children and their friends. Our methods are much different, as I don't ever remember her kitchen having flour strewn about or batter-covered bowls piled in the sink. My friend and I never stood elbow to elbow with her mother, mixing batter. But the end result is the same: a plate of warm cookies or slices

of sweet, warm bread. While it's sure nice to have a small person close to help with the mixing (and the tasting), I do sometimes feel a kindred spirit with my friend's mother when I quickly, efficiently stir up a batch of cookies, baking them silently, and cleaning the bowl as the last batch bakes. I'm reminded of the calm and serene place we once went to for a quiet bite to eat.

This particular bread is one that we've been making for years. It has a smooth texture and a fine crumb. This is the sort of recipe that's good for making with a child, as there is plenty of measuring and pouring to go around. On the other hand, making a batch of Honey Bread in the solitude of a quiet kitchen could be quite relaxing. And soon enough, there will be lots of kids, messy, loud and looking for a snack. Thick slices of this bread will please every one of them. When they do come, I'll pull out this sweet bread and the butter dish, the one that's not fancy and holds the butter with crumbs on it, and offer it to one and all.

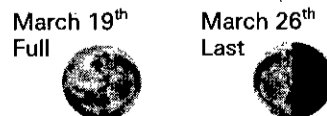

## Police blotter

# Bethlehem police make Leandra's Law arrest

The Bethlehem Police Department on Saturday, March 5, at about 2:47 a.m., arrested Susannah May Ford, 42, of 9 Mountain Road, Ravena, and charged her with felony DWI under Leandra's Law, aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle in the third degree and various traffic law infractions.

Police said they responded to a report of a vehicle off the roadway on River Road in Glenmont, and arrived on the scene to find Ford's 2003 Hyundai Elantra overturned in the ditch. Ford was standing with her 8-year-old daughter on the other side of the road, police said, and when interviewed she allegedly had the odor of alcohol on her breath and showed signs of intoxication.

Police said Ford admitted to having a couple of beers earlier in the evening and also said she'd been taking Hydrocodone, a pain killer. She said she had been driving home from Albany when she lost control of the car due to black ice, according to police. Officers said there was no evidence of a substance on the road.

The girl's father was contacted and later arrived on the scene to take possession of the child, and Ford was transported to Albany Medical Center for treatment of an injury to her hand. There, she consented to having blood drawn, police said.

Ford was given a court date of April 5 and her license was seized and suspended pending prosecution.

## Other arrest

• State police on Saturday, March 12, arrested Jonathan R. Vairo, 18, of Setauket, and charged him with criminal possession of a controlled substance in the fourth degree, a felony, and other crimes following a traffic stop on the Thruway in the Town of Bethlehem.

Police said Vairo was a passenger in a Honda Pilot stopped for traveling 83 mph. The odor of marijuana was coming from the car, police said, and a search allegedly revealed 2.1 grams of marijuana and a glass pipe, in addition to a plastic bag containing 50 Adderrall pills, which is a controlled

substance.

Vairo was remanded to the Albany County jail in lieu of \$15,000 bail. He was scheduled to appear in court on April 5.

• State police on Saturday, March 12, arrested Darrel J. Bielawski, 31, of New York City, and charged him with aggravated DWI.

Police said Bielawski was stopped for driving 86 mph on the Thruway and was found to be intoxicated. A breath test allegedly revealed his BAC to be 0.24 percent. He was issued tickets returnable to the Village of Ravena Court on March 23 and released.

• The Bethlehem Police Department on Friday, March 4, arrested Kaelin Mary Berg, 25, of 16 Henderson Road Apartment B, Glenmont, and charged her with menacing in the second degree, criminal possession of a weapon in the fourth degree and harassment in the second degree.

Police said a call was received at about 8:06 p.m. from Applebee's restaurant in Glenmont about a female with a knife threatening patrons. En route, police were told the suspect

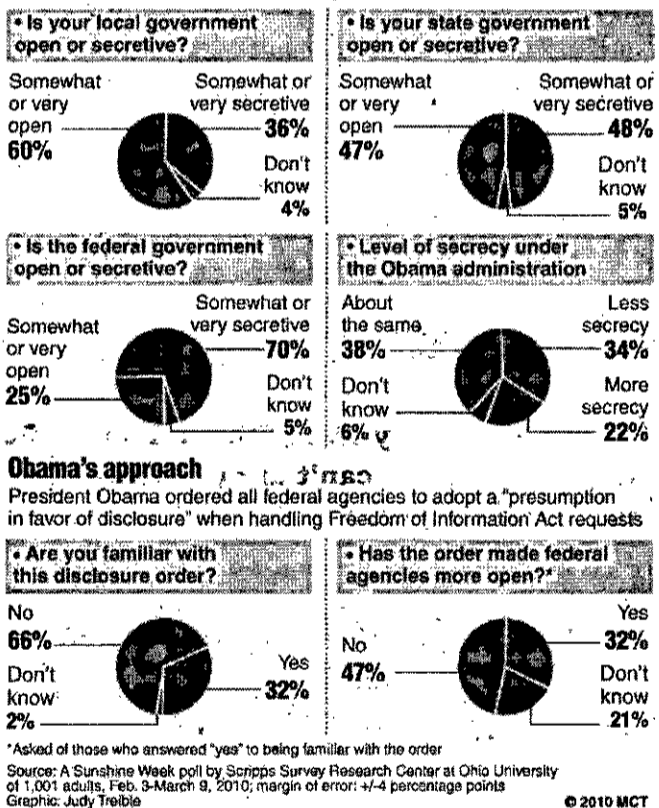

# House attacks women's health care with major funding cuts

M. It represents New York's Planned Parenthood affiliates and other family planning centers, as well as hundreds of organizations and thousands of individual members.

Too many women and families cannot afford the health care they need and deserve in this struggling economy. To make matters worse, the new Republican leadership in the U.S. House of Representatives just passed extreme and dangerous legislation that is a direct assault on women's health. The House voted to eliminate funding for lifesaving cervical cancer screenings, birth control, annual exams, HIV counseling and testing, testing and treatment for sexually transmitted infections, breast health, pregnancy prevention education and more.

Under the guise of deficit reduction, members of the House voted to prohibit Planned Parenthood from receiving federal funds for any purpose and to eliminate the Title X national family planning grant program, a bipartisan bill first signed into law by Richard Nixon in 1970. This highly political attack will cut off health care to millions of women and men who need it the most, including tens of thousands in the Capital Region and well over 400,000 statewide.

Family planning health centers in the Capital Region, including Planned Parenthood, treat women and men of all ages, regardless of one's ability to pay. Some patients are between jobs, others are uninsured or underinsured and still others are just starting out as young professionals no longer on their parents' insurance. What they all have in common is that they turn to community-based health centers, like Planned Parenthood, for quality, affordable health care.

## Point of View

One local woman, now in her forties, has turned to Planned Parenthood for preventive and primary care now that her yearly insurance deductible has risen to nearly \$2,000 per family member — an amount that is way out of reach for her. Many college students also rely on Planned Parenthood for preventive and primary care, citing the rising costs of tuition, textbooks, rent and food as the impetus for them to seek affordable care.

Sixty percent of the women who are patients at Planned Parenthood and similar health centers report that these centers are their only source of health care. In particular, women in rural areas of the state often find that a family planning health center is their sole source of preventive and primary care.

More than 90 percent of the care Planned Parenthood health centers offer is preventive, yet House leaders are steadfast in wanting to defund Planned Parenthood because it also provides women with abortion care when they need it. Every year, Planned Parenthood doctors and nurses carry out nearly one million lifesaving screenings for cervical cancer and nearly one million breast exams. They also provide contraception to some 2.5 million patients and nearly four million tests and treatments for sexually transmitted infections, including HIV.

Planned Parenthood does more than any other health care organization in the U.S. to help people plan their families and to help them avoid unintended pregnancy through the use of contraception. It is hard to understand why those who say they are opposed to abortion would go to such extremes to harm health centers that provide family planning, birth control services and lifesaving cancer screenings for women.

As for fiscal discipline and

deficit reduction, we know from experience that public investments in family planning and preventive health care pay for themselves. For every public dollar invested in family planning, nearly \$4 in Medicaid costs is saved. Yet, in their ideological zeal to attack women's health, the House leadership does not seem to care about these cost savings.

Their attack on Planned Parenthood and other family planning health centers shows contempt for mainstream values and common sense, and it hurts the very people who sent them to Washington. Even before they adopted this extreme measure, polls showed that 71 percent of voters — including 60 percent of those who voted Republican in the last congressional election — support the kind of care that Planned Parenthood provides. These measures to defund Planned Parenthood and end Title X family planning grants are bad policy, bad politics and bad for the women of the Capital Region and beyond.

Local and state officials have demonstrated their support for Planned Parenthood and Title X family planning funding by urging Representatives and Senators in Washington to protect women's health care. Gov. Cuomo, too, has called on Congress to maintain funding for Planned Parenthood and other family planning health centers. In a letter to Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, the Governor expressed his deep concern over recent actions in the House of Representatives that "not only attack women's rights but endanger women's health and safety."

The fate of women's health care now lies in the hands of the U.S. Senate. As the Continuing Resolution spending bill is negotiated, it is imperative that our U.S. Senators stand up for women's health. Make a call. Send an e-mail. Write a letter. Let Senator Kirsten Gillibrand and Senator Chuck Schumer know that their constituents in New York's Capital Region value their commitment to women's health care.

# Keeping Clarksville open will hurt rest of school district

# Flawed data being used in Clarksville closure

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

Whether or not to close and mothball Clarksville Elementary is a fiscal issue, not an emotional one, as the parents and teachers' union would have you think.

The enrollment and potential enrollment just does not support keeping it open. The School Board already has all the information it needs to make this decision.

The meeting on March 7 was a farce. It seemed as if everyone who lives in Clarksville was there and speech after speech supported keeping the school open. One woman went on for at least a half hour ignoring repeated requests to keep her comments to five minutes. The audience repeatedly burst in to applause despite the Board's request not to. Comments were frequently insulting and condescending.

Another meeting on an issue that has been talked to death is a sign of lack of leadership on the part of

the board of education.

You can question the decision of previous boards, and a previous superintendent, to put all that money into Clarkville or to build Eagle but that does not change the need to cut almost a million dollars out of the budget. The School Board needs to bite the bullet and make this hard decision so it can move on to other hard decisions.

Who is at fault? There is plenty of blame to spread around, particularly in New York State government. Blaming, however well deserved, will solve nothing.

If you live elsewhere in the district, you need to attend the next facilities meeting on March 21 at the Middle School. A decision to keep the school open will result in damage to the educational experience of all of the students in the district.

Over the past 11 years the Bethlehem Central School District budget has almost doubled. Not the student enrollment — not even remotely close — just the budget.

Despite the continued reduction of state aid received, and all of the prior years' reduced increases, the 2011-12 school budget year will be the first time the budget does not head north. However, that was not the original plan.

In order to close the remaining \$1 million gap, the district is proposing to close Clarksville Elementary School located in the Picturary Town of New Scotland. The \$871,000 claimed to be saved by this closure (an increase from \$500,000 only a few weeks ago) and other data surrounding this idea are flawed and tipped toward the district's desired outcome. There are more errors and inconsistencies than space will allow, so I am only able to list a few.

The school claims that no additional costs will be incurred by busing New Scotland elementary school students to Bethlehem. Did the cost of \$55,400 to perform this service as cited in the 2003 Elementary School Options Report (a report that led to the \$93 million building project and the construction of Eagle) become less expensive?

The district claims it can maintain

a "mothballed" school for \$3,700 per year. By the board's own admission they plan to drain the plumbing; that means no heat for a structure designed and built with materials intended for a temperature-controlled environment. Unheated, this building, and \$3 million plus worth of improvements, will be destroyed as the building quickly deteriorates from neglect. Warped wooden gym floors, curling floor tile and moldy walls.

The district also admitted at the March 7 meeting that the savings has a life of two years at best. One year seems much more likely. Are we really going to close a school, redistrict children, blight a beautiful community and ruin an investment for a highly questionable one time savings?

The district has misled the public to believe that only 33 Clarksville students attend the school based on its flawed ZIP code chart. New Scotland students from Unionville and areas in the eastern section of Clarksville have a Delmar (12054) mailing address. New Scotland students also come from Feura Bush (12067), plus the western side of Clarksville that is serviced by the Voorheesville Post Office (12186). Let us not forget the students in the northeast area of New Scotland, which is serviced by the Slingerlands Post Office (12159), also attend

this school and are New Scotland residents. Clearly, it is inaccurate to use ZIP codes as a geographic locator.

If you apply the same illogical ZIP code to try to justify closing Elsmere Elementary, all of the students would be from Delmar (12054) and zero from Elsmere because Elsmere doesn't have a post office, therefore it doesn't have a ZIP code.


The \$60,000 claimed to be saved by firing the Clarksville kitchen staff is pure baloney. The district stated at a recent meeting that food service is self-sustaining, therefore it doesn't require tax dollars to operate.

Lastly, now conveniently absent from the district's criteria, is "...the district's commitment to neighborhood elementary schools." Well, I am sure this will reappear the next time it is helpful to a district cause.

These \$55,000 inaccuracies here and \$60,000 there, just for starters, eventually add up to real money. Be skeptical of the district's data, do some reading and some research, and ask a lot of questions.

Do not allow the district to take this jewel of a school from the children or the New Scotland community.

# Closing Clarksville would betray district's 'commitment to neighborhood schools'

Editor, *The Spotlight*.

Having read "Think Tank" information on the Bethlehem Central School District's web site, Superintendent

Michael Tebbano's "Feasibility Study on District Facilities" (Feasibility Report), listening to the overview presented at the beginning of the March 11 meeting, and the speakers at that meeting I have come to the conclusion that there is a critical and fundamental issue which needs to be thoroughly addressed by the Board of Education before any decision to close an elementary school.

The issue is that the closure of any K-5 school flies in the face of what I consider is the major strength or foundation of the district. The more than 60-year policy in support of neighborhood/ community based

elementary schools is being threatened and undermined without the board addressing such a change.

Before the board considers closing any elementary school for fiscal reasons it should

conduct a policy review and analysis separate and apart from the budgetary process. The review should include participation from the catchment area residents from each elementary school. The board needs to listen to all residents. Ask the questions, do you want consolidation of your neighborhood school into several large centralized elementary schools similar to Eagle? Do you consider Eagle as the beginning of centralizing elementary education? Is Eagle a threat to neighborhood schools?

Policy making is the responsibility of the board, it should address this issue directly and not pass it off to a "think tank" or an administrative "feasibility study."

Every building has a life cycle for many reasons - physical, programmatic, demographic. For example, Elsmere will most likely age out since it is the oldest. What is the board's long-range plan to replace Elsmere - neighborhood or centralized?

The neighborhood policy commitment and addressing the long term use of aging buildings should be addressed before the use of statistics, ratios, and other data in an

attempt to close a school as part of the budget process. Policy decisions via the budget process are nothing but slight of the hand. Back door policy making is frequently found in government. I certainly would hope that the board is above what occurs in state and local governments.

Dr. Tebbano's Feasibility Report should be amended to read under "Disadvantages" in Options A. & B. for the closure of Clarksville and Option D. for the closure of Elsmere that "This option will result in the board not fulfilling the District's long standing policy commitment to neighborhood/ community based elementary schools."

Option C - Redistricting states the 2007 Redistricting Criteria 2007 would "...enhance the District's commitment to neighborhood schools".

What is the board's position today on maintaining that criteria? The board has at this time only one choice - keep all schools open. The range of options presented in the Feasibility Report recognizes that the district has the fiscal resources available to keep all elementary schools open for at least another year.

Complete the 2011-12 budget process with open schools. Address the neighborhood elementary school policy issue after the budget is adopted.

# Keep Clarksville, use Eagle for biz offices

It was my privilege to be employed at Clarksville for 25 years. My association began as a parent in 1979 when we first moved to Clarksville. Coming from a large city elementary school of over 800 students, Clarksville was a welcome change to my children. The intimate climate (only 9 classrooms at that time), exceptional teachers who really got to know their students, a principal (Dorothy Whitney) who knew the names of each of the students, and the safety of the area, were all new to them as students. Being employed there through the years just strengthened my feeling of assurance that we made the right decision to locate in Clarksville. I really enjoyed going to work every day.

Through the years Clarksville School has seen many changes. New developments were added: Brookfield, Adams Station, the building phases of Cedar Ridge, the Mansions, etc. These additions made Clarksville School even better by creating a larger diversity of students, but still maintaining that special "something" that makes Clarksville different. When the district bond approved additions to some of the other elementary schools, Clarksville was host to kindergartens from Hamagrael, Glenmont and Slingerlands for a year. Clarksville School was again the host to students outside of the

area when the Glenmont Enclave Development was extended and could not be accommodated by their home school.

Through all of these changes several people stand out in my mind, especially when transitions were difficult: The McNerney family from Brookfield, Principals Cheryl MacCulloch and Joe Schaefer, PTA presidents Cara Kennedy, Ellen Sax, Martha Baker, Bonnie Turner, Patty Wukitsch. All faced difficult times but were outspoken and supportive, never letting the students, teachers or staff down - carrying out their responsibilities even when difficult times tried to upset the program of the school.

Before my retirement, I was privileged to work with Dorothy McDonald, a person I easily learned to love and respect. She was the epitome of Clarksville - she knew and genuinely loved the area, the school, students, staff and the gifts of teaching and leading. It was time for me to retire, but it was difficult leaving the Principal and school I love so much. Her loss was a terrible blow to the school and I feel has been followed by a crisis situation. Not an easy position for the school to be in especially with the loss of a dearly loved and respected leader, a PTA that is not functioning as it should with hidden agendas, thus creating a situation that some may think is weakness that can be exploited.

Where is the support? Where is the leadership? Fine people have come forward pleading the case for "Keeping Clarksville Open" to the District and the Board of Education.

I believe the District has other areas that can be investigated to alleviate the stress of budgets. A return of areas of attendance to the Clarksville School can be accomplished with little cost because they have the original model and we pay District individuals to use their know-how to solve problems.

To close even one school in the district will cause overcrowding. How can a District justify spending bond money on Clarksville or in any other area then close the very schools where that money was used. Upon investigation, the district will find that their quote for mothballing the Clarksville school is underestimated, and a much more complicated process should be used since Clarksville is on the Historical Register.

There is also no guarantee that it will stay viable for future use. The decision to build another elementary school was ill-advised, but it is here.

Instead of closing buildings, why not work with what already exists. Bring students back to Clarksville, bring the Business offices into Eagle. Conveniently located, plenty of parking - what could be better!

# Lack of cooperation, not leadership, in Town Hall

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

Having now read the media comments of Town Board members and reviewed the record on the Town Hall parapet, as a resident and Deputy Town Supervisor and member of the Planning Board, I must speak out to the residents of Bethlehem.

Taking responsibility for one's actions is a fundamental principle we instill and expect from our kids, our colleagues, and in this instance, our elected officials.

Since he was elected to the Town Board and then as Supervisor, Sam Messina has encouraged teamwork and cooperation among his colleagues on the Town Board. Sam's actions have consistently been initiated to move our Town forward, to be a safer and better place in every possible way. In his first year he has put forth many initiatives to ensure fiscal security, delivery of town services, planning improvements and environmental protection.

Recently, after the collapse of the Town Hall parapet, we have seen the Board members run for cover with respect to the delays they caused to the planning and financing of the repair work. Some have called it finger pointing

but the facts are that last April they themselves (Council persons Dawson, Hennessey, Kotary and Jordan) thwarted the financing proposal put together by the Supervisor, the Comptroller and the Town's professional staff to advance the essential repairs and modifications to Town Hall. That \$425,000 bonding proposal for capital improvements included the masonry repair to the parapet, roof repair in Town Court and much needed office renovation in the offices of Comptroller, Human Resources and Police Department. The Supervisor, Commissioner of DPW, and Comptroller advised the Board on several occasions that all projects were necessary and the bonding process needed to start then. The meeting minutes illustrate the Board members lack of cooperation, and in some circumstances, their outrageous and expensive alternatives as well as their failure to comprehend the basic process of bonding, competitive bidding and final contract approval.

Soon after Sam took office in 2010, the Comptroller and Town staff prepared the necessary documentation for the bonding; it was presented at the April

meeting and blocked by the four board members. If they now choose to point fingers for the delay, they would be most successful if they found the nearest mirror at which to point that finger.

It has, at times, been shameful and embarrassing to listen to the rancor, whining, and mean-spiritedness of the four board members. We elect officials to consider legislation and programs to advance our town to a better and more secure position. We expect politics to be left at the door and we expect a team of the Supervisor, the Board, and professional staff to advance initiatives for the betterment of Bethlehem. The Supervisor and staff consistently meet that expectation.

While I'm only writing my opinion here, I suggest that citizens attend Town Board meetings, read the minutes, listen and watch the audio and video tapes of meetings and judge for themselves if all of our elected officials are living up to their responsibilities and the citizen's expectations.

# No one pointing fingers over Town Hall incident

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

I would like to comment on your editorial "The rabble among the rubble" (March 9).

First, I am deeply sorry for the unfortunate parapet wall failure and damaged vehicles, but thankful nobody was hurt. I will continue to do whatever I can to help those individuals and families who suffered property damage and see that this entire matter is resolved quickly.

The Supervisor, Town Board and Town Staff are all responsible for the safety and upkeep of our facilities but the buck really stops with the Supervisor and Board. I have not heard - nor have I witnessed - any Board Member, publicly or privately, pointing fingers at each other or anyone else, so I was surprised to read *The Spotlight's* take: "We have a bunch of officials pointing fingers at one another, each with a horse in the race."

In fact, I specifically told *The Spotlight* in an interview that I am not going to point fingers at anyone, and that the only things that matter now are getting the roof fixed and the damaged cars replaced. But I also directly answered *The Spotlight's* questions - as I did last April and August - as to why I did not originally support Supervisor Messina's additional spending bonds last spring but did push to pull out the emergency expenditures to fix the roof, which I and others did in August. I'm also confused by the editorial's assertion that I said "alternatives should be examined"? What alternatives?

Below is an excerpt from my Aug. 25, 2010, *Spotlight* letter, which clearly states my position, then and now:

"As part of a compromise to address the much-needed repairs to Town Hall, the board and I did support spending \$34,600 for required engineering and necessary design work for those renovations [to Town Hall] but did not support the Supervisor's request to spend an additional \$20,200 for a feasibility study both *The Spotlight* and

the Board determined to be unnecessary and unaffordable at this time. I would note that the funds we did approve were available in the current year operating budget and the entire board agrees we need to repair the disrepair at Town Hall.

And last week [Aug., 2010], we approved budgeted funds for only what we need - to fix a leaky roof, failing wall, and inadequate facilities. In my opinion, that's "the lower cost of appropriate action."

The Board and I were pretty clear - we wanted the roof and wall fixed. My statement above is both precise and clear.

Furthermore, about six weeks ago in a meeting at Town Hall, I asked whether the roof repairs were done, as we had witnessed buildings throughout New England cave under the heavy weight of winter's snow. I was not pleased to learn they had not been completed but was told they would commence this spring. Clearly that was too late.

While none of these points will fix the damaged roof or four cars, I do hope they provide some clarity as to what was done or said prior to the falling wall and exactly where I have stood along the way.

So let's fix the wall, replace the cars, and not delay any longer on a whole host of other urgent issues.

## Town sends request for information to area businesses

The Town of Bethlehem has reached out to local businesses in hopes of expanding vending options at its parks and other properties.

The town distributed a request for information to at least 25 people and companies this past week in hopes of soliciting ideas. The concept was born out of last year's budget process when it was said the town needs more non-tax revenue, said Councilman Mark Hennessey, who spearheaded the proposal along with Councilman Mark Jordan and Parks and Recreation Department Director Nan Lanahan.

"I remember sitting around budget time and saying, why don't we go out there and do something that we never have before?" Hennessey said.

Right now, the town rents space at the Elm Avenue Park Pool Complex for a vending operation run by Thomas Rowlands of Ellisson Enterprises. That agreement nets the town \$5,400 without costing hardly anything, said Lanahan.

"In certain businesses, it's nice to have an outside vendor concession, because they know their business, and we don't know their business," Lanahan said.

That's really the only formal example of a private-public vending partnership, though. With all the pocket parks, passive recreation areas and seasonal activities that are popular in town, the thought is the pool could be the tip of the iceberg.

"There's so many different people out there that provide the kinds of services that are anticipated under the RFI," Hennessey said. "I think you can get a better class of service out there."

Though Elm Avenue is the largest of the town's parkland facilities, the RFI suggests there could be plenty of other opportunities out there. Possibilities include skate rentals at the Elm Avenue ice skating rink, food concessions or even a small restaurant setup at the Colonial Acres Golf Course and vending at Henry Hudson Park, which many in town government say is underutilized in general.

"Some kind of coffee vendor or snack vendor would probably do quite well; because it's very

busy down there in the early part of the season," Lanahan said.

There are plans to build a fishing pier at the Henry Hudson Park this spring.

Cathy Callan, the owner of Java Jazz Cafe in Delmar, was one of the businesspeople to receive an RFI. She said she has to look into the idea more to see if her restaurant could make the investment that would be needed to have a presence in a town park or elsewhere.

"I think it's really a great idea. Things have been kind of hard in town, and all over the state," she said. "Restaurants are kind of having a hard time, and the more venues they have to offer their stuff, the better."

Java Jazz already makes breakfasts at the Delmar Farmers Market, which Callan said has been a great partnership.

The town is looking for ideas not included in the information request, too. Unlike a more formal request for proposals, which kicks off a competitive bidding process, the RFI sent out is more of an exploratory move. Those who did not receive a copy direct from the town but are interested should contact Lanahan.

Responses are due to the town by March 18.

# RCS top officials to take pay freeze

Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School District's top three officials— Superintendent Daniel A. Teplesky, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Elisabeth Smith and Assistant Superintendent for Business Lyn Derway— have announced they are taking a salary freeze next year in the face of the district's extreme fiscal challenges: Collectively, the freezes will save the district approximately \$16,000.

Board of Education President Scott Hughes stated, "We are very pleased with the leadership and commitment demonstrated by the RCS

top officials taking action to freeze their salaries."

The RCS Board of Education accepted Teplesky's offer to forgo his four percent salary increase that is stipulated in his contract for 2011-12. This represents a savings of \$6,552 for the district. Unlike the superintendent's contract, the two assistant superintendent contracts are negotiated on an annual basis. Both Derway and Smith announced to the

Board on March 1 they are not seeking a salary increase for next year and in doing so, freeze their pay at current levels saving the district \$9,543.

"As district leaders in these difficult economic times, this is the correct choice to make for students," said Superintendent Teplesky. "In trying to close a \$3.2 million dollar budget shortfall, every dollar makes a difference."

# IDA takes big step in Vista financing

The Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency on Friday, March 11, passed a key milestone on the journey to building Vista Boulevard.

The board of that entity voted unanimously in favor of an inducement resolution, a precursor to issuing the tax-free bonds with which it hopes to finance the construction of the 3/4-mile road into the Vista Technology Campus.

The next step in the process will be gaining approval from the taxing districts in the area to collect payment in lieu of taxes (PILOT) money to pay off the bonds, which will be sold to investors. The town, Bethlehem Central School District and Albany County all have to sign off on the deal for it to proceed.

Vista stakeholders and members of the IDA should begin visiting those

groups in coming days to pitch the plan. The group wants to issue about \$6 million in bonds, and still hopes to get \$1 million from Albany County that was promised years ago to fund the project's infrastructure.

That promise was contingent on the development of high-tech jobs, though, and so far developers have largely put forward retail tenants and have kept news of interested commercial entities tightly under wraps, citing competitive reasons.

At the IDA meeting, there was talk of how the partnership should proceed in attempting to secure that money. Town Supervisor Sam Messina said the IDA should tackle things one step at a time and get the PILOT agreements cemented.

"Or else, it's going to get, in my opinion, bogged

down," he said.

Time is of the essence, as the buildout of Vista buildings hinges on the construction of Vista Boulevard, which will provide access and utilities to the site. Developers have said some tenants need to be in place by Nov. 15.

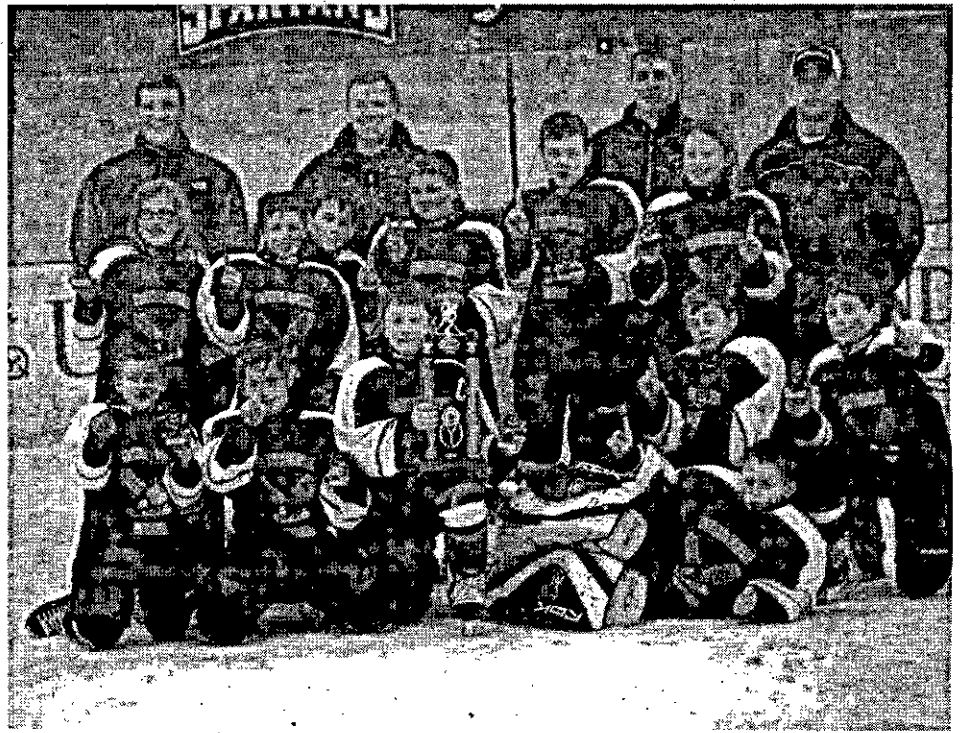
IDA board member Joseph Richardson said he's confident the county money will materialize once it's clear the project is underway.

"I think once you put in a bulldozer and start to build the road, that's the time to get the million dollars," he said.

The IDA will be taking over construction of Vista Boulevard and is in the process of hiring the firms needed to build the road. Once completed, it would be handed over to the town.

Admission to SUNY Oswego is competitive.

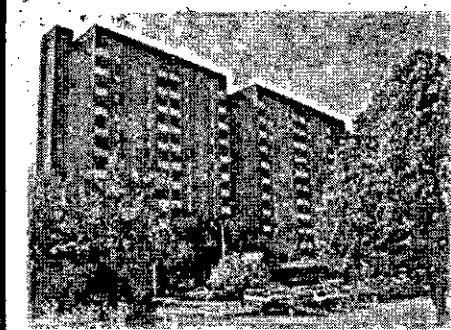

# 'They should be ashamed of themselves'

## Owners of vehicles damaged by Town Hall parapet collapse air grievances

On March 1, Anna Colonna Carroll drove her Toyota Matrix from her Delmar apartment over to Bethlehem Town Hall to rehearse with the Bethlehem Senior Chorus. It was the normal weekly trip she made every Tuesday morning as a member of that group.

What is far from ordinary is what happened next. As Carroll turned off her car and prepared to step out, a 60-foot portion of the parapet wall lining the roof of Town Hall gave way, sending bricks crashing down onto her car and three others.

The concussion was enough to make Carroll think a bomb had gone off. The windshield of her car cracked.

"I thought I was under water," she said. "The

whole thing was wavy and blurry."

When the bricks stopped falling Carroll, 87, pushed open her door. A nearby police officer told her to run from the car, she said, and she made it away from the danger as quickly as she could.

Now, Carroll wonders if she'll ever rejoin the chorus. She doesn't want to go near Town Hall again. She says she wakes up in the middle of the night, replaying the experience over and over with the knowledge that had the bricks fallen just seconds later, there would have been a very different ending to this story.

"Most 87-year-old people would have died from this by now," she said.

### Picking up the pieces

Town officials have cited the wear of expanding ice as reason for the collapse. The facade had been targeted for repair in 2009 and was part of a package of Town Hall renovations

that was delayed last year.

The process of picking up the pieces is rolling ahead. The Town Board this week made the approvals necessary to conduct an emergency repair of the feature. Two of the four vehicle owners have accepted offers by the town's insurer, Trident Argonaut Insurance.

But the two others, including Carroll, have not, and they're not happy with

their experience so far.

John Hotchin's 2004 Toyota Prius was one of the two vehicles written off as a loss. Trident has offered him \$11,375 for the vehicle, which he said he will be turning down. He said his car is in like-new condition, having been garaged all its life and with just 30,000 miles on the odometer, and he doesn't feel he'd be able to buy a comparable car for that money.

The loss report added \$1,600 to the base market value of the vehicle in light of its low mileage. He'd like to see Trident or the town pitch in more.

"I'd like to see them take into consideration the fact that if I had been out of the car 10 minutes later, I would have been killed," Hotchin said. He has been visiting Town Hall on Tuesdays and Thursdays for a Seniors in Motion fitness program. He's turning 90 later this month.

"I think they're being a very hard sell considering they've been very negligent," he continued. "I think they should have done more about this whole thing happening, and as a result I think they should be fairly generous in their compensation."

Hotchin said he's leveled complaints against Trident with the Better Business Bureau and the New York State Insurance Department.

Trident has determined Carroll's Toyota Matrix will

be repaired, not replaced. That's not an acceptable outcome for her or her family, though, who worry the car has damage the repair won't fix and will continue to be trouble.

Carroll said she laid out plenty of money to make sure she has a reliable car in her golden years. She's active in St. Thomas the Apostle church and isn't comfortable driving the Chevy Impala the rental company gave her.

"I had the most gorgeous-looking car in all of Delmar and now I have nothing," she said.

She also had to shell out \$100 to take the Impala, money that has not yet been reimbursed.

Locally, the town works with Burt Anthony Associates, but the company's Greg Turner said it's still too early in the process to say for sure what will end up being covered for the town or the vehicle owners.

"The process is proceeding along on course," he said. "There has not been any coverage determination finalized at this point."

Vehicle owners The Spotlight spoke to also indicated they've received calls from Trident about their rental car coverage being pulled, and have had to hash those troubles out with the town and Burt Anthony. It's not clear how long rentals will be covered.

A call to Trident's Texas offices was not immediately returned.

Bethlehem Supervisor Sam Messina said getting more time on the rental cars was one thing the town has been involved in when it comes to the insurance process.


"To the degree that we can, we are advocating for these people," he said.

claimants, though, that is far from enough. Both Carroll and Hotchin said they feel if the town is unable to negotiate a better offer out of Trident, it should offer to close the difference on a new car.

Carroll said the town knew about the condition of the parapet is justification enough.

"They should be ashamed of themselves," she said.

Councilman Mark Hennessey said the town should assume some responsibility.

"This person's car was destroyed by a piece of our building, I think we at least want to get them what makes them whole," he said of Carroll's situation. "I don't think doing a repair in this case, given the amount of damage, actually makes them whole."

But Town Attorney James Potter barred the town from making a supplemental payment to those affected.

"We're looking into

the issue of whether a payment over and above the fair market value of the car would constitute a gift in violation of the state constitution," Potter said.

Article 8 of the constitution outlines what local municipalities are prohibited from doing with their money.

"No county, city, town, village or school district shall give or loan any money or property to or in aid of any individual," that article reads in part.

"Our hands may be tied," Potter said.

### Memories linger

According to Carroll and her family, the discussion should not only be a material one.

The falling bricks did not injure Carroll, as she was in the car when the collapse occurred, but ever since the incident, she's had trouble sleeping and eating and says she often hears the crash of bricks.

These are not physical injuries, but to her, they're real enough.

"It's disgusting because this is a human being. It goes beyond laws and papers and insurance

companies," Anita Clayton, Carroll's daughter, said.

But without physical injuries, Clayton doubts they'd be successful with any legal actions. While a payout wouldn't keep the memory of March 1 at bay, it would at least be an acknowledgment, she said.

"We shouldn't have to have an attorney. The town was negligent, they admitted to it, they should do what's right for these people," she said.

Clayton and her mother also complained the town had not been quick to offer sympathy or assistance, and instead they've been forced to make call after call to get even simple answers and retain the rental car.

Messina said he and staff have done their best in a difficult time.

"I'm focused on trying to be as responsive and be, and I think that we are," he said. "I know that people are unhappy and distressed in a situation like this. ... My job is to not get controversial or argumentative with people."

"I understand the stress they're under, and I'm doing what I can from here," he added.

### Repairs to start in coming weeks

The Town Board on Wednesday, March 9, voted to issue an emergency declaration related to the repair of the parapet wall. The declaration will allow the town to bypass the competitive bidding process normally required for such work.

So far, a contractor has stabilized the 60-foot section of parapet wall and erected scaffolding

outside of Town Hall. The initial cost projection for a repair of this section, including the work that's already been done, is \$60,000, said Department of Public Works Deputy Commissioner Erik Deyoe.

"I would estimate there would be some activity in a month or so," he said.

Not included in the repair would be the section of wall facing Delaware Avenue, which is also deteriorating. Design work is just being completed on a package of Town Hall repairs and upgrades that includes the parapet wall and the leaking, 35-year-

old courthouse roof. There are also expansions to offices on the second floor of the building and other work in the package.

That design work should be brought to the Town Board in the near future, said Deyoe, at which point that body will decide what elements should go forward and how to pay for them.

The parapet repair will come out of the general operating fund, minus whatever insurance covers. The rest of the parapet will still be part of the renovation package, Deyoe said.

# Oh, the places you'll act

## BC students bring Dr. Seuss to life

If there's one author who's managed to work his way into the hearts and imaginations of the young and the old, the dreamers and the down-to-earth, it's Dr. Seuss.

His weaving of language, art and good old-fashioned words to live by continue to be a cultural touchstone. Now, at Bethlehem Central High School, those works are jumping off the page and onto the stage as a cast of students tirelessly rehearse for "Seussical the Musical," showing later this month.

"Seussical," as one might gather, is based on the works of Dr. Seuss, drawing heavily from "Horton Hears a Who" but incorporating elements

of many other books. The play largely centers on Jojo, a child whose imagination is running out of control. This, along with the whimsical nature of Seuss' work, sets a flamboyant atmosphere.

"It's not very serious; it's just a big ball of fun," said junior Mary Allendorph, who is playing Jojo.

The play did not do well on Broadway, but it has since been reworked and is becoming quite a hit in school theater programs across the country. At BC, Director James Yeara has modified things to include a cast of 66.

"We've had to work to stage it so we can use all 66," he said. "It's tough, but it's rewarding."

There are also dozens of students in the crew and involved in making the set.

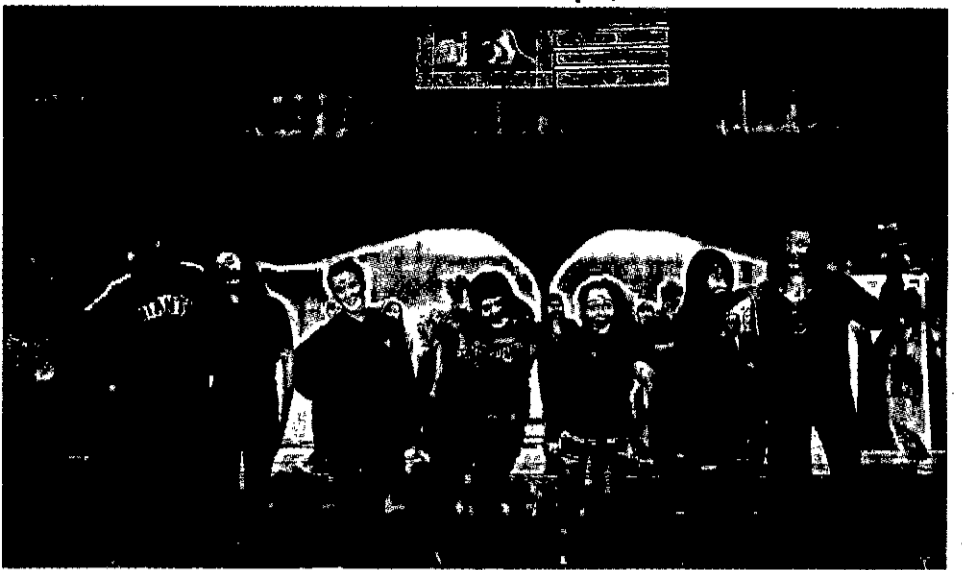
Last year, students performed the musical

"Once on This Island," written by the same team that crafted the work of Seuss for the stage. Yeara has also directed Shakespeare performances for years.

"Seussical" bucks many theatrical conventions, though, bringing in audience participation and improvisation. In fact, two contests will be held during intermission: a "Seuss-off" in which audience members can recite their favorite Seuss passage and a costume contest for the best-dressed Seuss character in the audience.

"There are no limits to this musical," said senior Katie Looney, who is playing the Cat in the Hat. "This is really unlike most conventional musicals that are out there."

Also unusual is that there is really no spoken dialogue in the play. There are interludes between

musical numbers, but "Seussical" is a musical in the truest sense.

That means choreographer Danielle Vincent, who teaches Spanish at the high school, has her work cut out for her.

"There are very few songs that don't have some sort of choreography to them,"

she said. "They really have to be moving while they're singing."

Vincent added that many of the young actors seem to really take to the subject matter. It can be a lot more tangible than other stories in theater, she said.

"I think that Dr. Seuss conjures up a lot of meaning for all of us,"

she said. "I just feel like everybody on the stage has a connection to Dr. Seuss."

## Managing your family finances: It's your business

### Budgeting for success

Some people cringe at the word budget and the idea of having to account for practically every cent; however, budgets are the foundation of fiscal responsibility. They are the financial blueprints for households looking to better manage their money. To plan a budget, begin with these general steps:

1. Track all of your expenses, including credit cards, utilities, entertainment expenses, school costs, groceries, etc.

2. Evaluate your necessary and miscellaneous expenses. Are there things on your list you can live without? Netflix?

It's not personal; it's business.

This, according to the cutthroat businessperson, is the key to success. When in doubt, look at the bottom line. When faced with a hard decision, grow thicker skin. Because to make it in business, or to turn around a struggling venture, the reasoning is that you need to be tough, calculated and driven to maximize revenue...not motivated by feel-good emotions.

The problem is, controlling emotions is difficult. Controlling our emotions for something as personal as how we manage our money is even harder. Think about it: how many times have you had a rough week at work and decided to treat yourself to dinner, a movie, a new pair of shoes or a round of golf?

The hard truth is that many American families don't manage their money well. In fact, in a 2010 Zogby survey of 2,068 adults, nearly 60 percent of all respondents said they do not follow a monthly budget. More than 10 percent of respondents said they were not knowledgeable or had below average knowledge of personal finance. Furthermore, a 2010 survey by the Employee Benefit Research Institute revealed that 43 percent of American workers have less than \$10,000 in savings.

So what's the solution? How can it get better?

My suggestion: get less personal. Remove emotions from your decision-making, and treat family finances like a business.

### The plan

All good businesses start with a business plan, which outlines the vision for the business concept and sets goals. This is a logical first step for the "family business." Sit down with your family and write out your plan. This plan will give you a foundation and a starting point for successfully managing your family finances and can act as a motivational tool for your family. Once you know where you want to be, you can figure out how to get there.

First, define your goals as a family. Where do you want to be in 5, 10, 20... even 30 years? So often we neglect to see the big picture, but forecasting is crucial to a business.

Once you have listed your goals, prioritize them. Discuss how to achieve them. In the business world, this is the "buy-in" phase, because for any initiative to be successful, all interested parties must believe in it, be motivated to act on it and be committed to achieving

Coffee from a retail chain? Are there things you can live with? A few less dinners out? More time between haircuts? It's important to be willing to make sacrifices now in order to get what you want later.

3. Incorporate flexibility into your plan. Like a child who rebels against too many rules, you could end up rebelling against your too-strict budget and sabotaging yourself.

4. Evaluate your budget every few months for effectiveness.

You will undoubtedly have unplanned expenses that arise—the septic tank needs pumping, your car dies, an ice dam forms on your roof and causes some interior water damage, etc. Save for emergencies in advance. If you find things like this happening often and you can't account for them financially, then it is probably time to review your budget and make some tweaks.

Remember, the budget is a tool to help your family achieve important life goals—short-term and long-term—that you establish together. Make it work for you, make everyone accountable and create incentives by being flexible and allowing for some fun.

### Saving strategies

For the average person, entertainment and miscellaneous expenses can be the biggest budget busters. \$4 coffee or \$17 IMAX movie, anyone? While it is important to allow yourself some fun money every month, there are many small and simple ways to cut back on spending:

- Brew your own coffee at home (and save about \$15 a week).
- Take a list to the grocery store.
- Scale down on your dining out.
- Vacation within driving distance to your house...or consider a "staycation."

Exercising restraint

in spending is probably the most difficult aspect of sticking to the budget, but if you were able to save \$15 a week on coffee, that translates to a savings of \$780 over the course of a year. And that's just one example.

It is also important to contribute to savings every month. Whether it is a basic savings account, 401K or one of many other investment types,

contributing to savings is a necessity for the family business. If you have a small budget right now, then start small. As your budgeting begins to improve your finances, you will be able to contribute more.

Remember, emotion can drive us to want things we can't really afford. Resist the urge to splurge. Be mindful of your budget. Just because you can afford the payment does not mean you

can afford the purchase.

Your family's financial health is your business—it is your whole family's business. It is probably not feasible to remove all emotion from your financial management and decision-making, but making the effort could certainly pay off, and learning to save and monitor your cash flow will definitely pay off. As for the barista at your coffee shop or the server who says

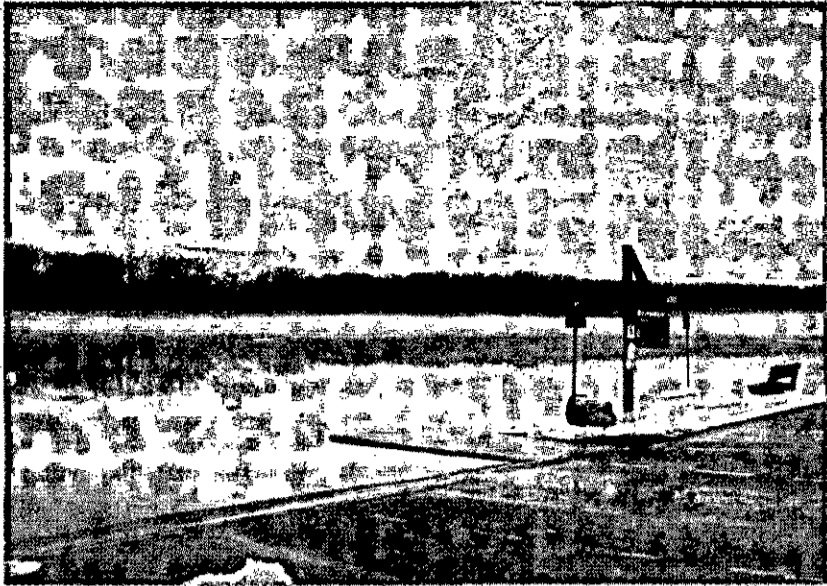

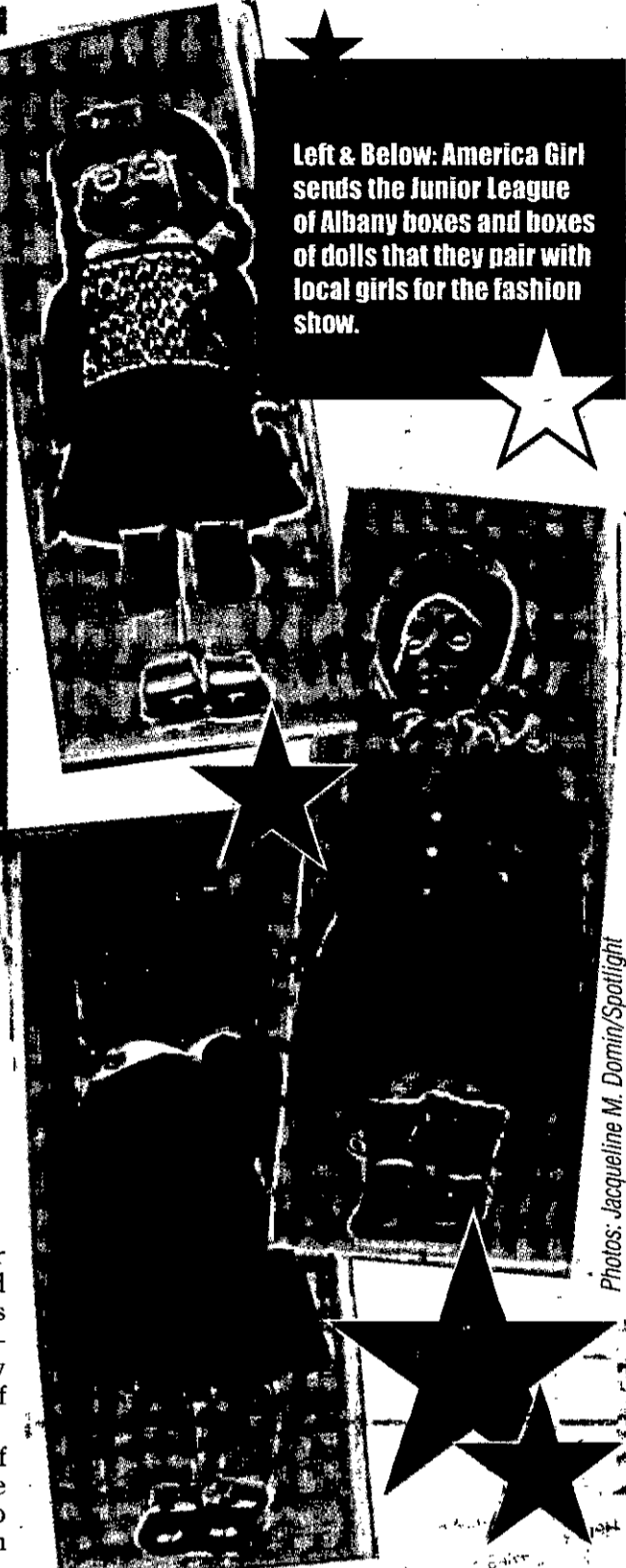

# All Dolled Up

**American Girl fashion show supports Junior League's effort to get books to needy children**

**C**assandra Carraher figures she owns four or five American Girl dolls. So taking part in the American Girl fashion show at the Albany Country Club is kind of a big deal.

Cassandra is assigned an American Girl doll and gets to wear an outfit that matches the doll. Holding it, she walks out in front of a crowd of a couple hundred people. An announcer tells everyone her name and her hobbies.

Seven-year-old Cassandra is giggly as she talks about the experience. But the girl who helped her mom collect donations for the YMCA when she was just 3 she doesn't laugh when she talks about her favorite part: knowing that she's helping to raise money for charity.

Cassandra provides a snapshot of an event that's equal parts fun and philanthropy. Now in its 14th year, the fashion show, sponsored by the Junior League, will be held at the country club in Voorheesville on Friday, March 18, at 6:30 p.m. and Sunday, March 19, at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

"It's a great way to have a multi-generational outing," Cassandra's mom, Jennifer, said. "It's a nice event, a nice day or night, and it's also raising money for a good cause."

That cause changes every few years. This year, the show will benefit the Junior League's pairing with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, which provides one age-appropriate book each month to children up to 5 years old within Albany city limits.

Carraher learned about the fashion show – and the Junior League – a few years ago when her daughter wanted to visit the American Girl doll store in Manhattan. As Carraher was doing Internet research on the store, she stumbled upon a listing for the fashion show.

"It looked like something I'd like to get involved in," said Carraher.

So, she joined the league, an organization of women bound by volunteerism and a desire to improve the community. The Junior League isn't a charitable organization in and of itself; its members both help out existing causes and launch new ones. Projects it has helped get off the ground in the Capital District include the Ronald McDonald House, Equinox, Gilda's Club and Race for the Cure. It adopted the Imagination Library in 2008 with hopes of helping it also establish roots here.

American Girl throws its support behind groups that benefit children by letting them host the fashion shows. American Girl sends organizations across the country dolls and dresses; they just need to find models and venues.

So, this is a busy time of year for the Junior League. There are e-mails detailing girls' sizes and doll preferences. There are sessions to sort dresses and make sure girls fit into them. As fundraising co-chairs of the event this year, Kirsten Kropp and Ginny Rosborough are in the middle of everything. Both of them embrace the flurry of activity.

Kropp, after all, grew up in Florida dreaming of joining the Junior League. She got involved when she moved to Washington, D.C., and the league was able to transfer her membership to the Capital District when she moved here.

"It was a great way to meet people," said Kropp, who likes that the league's charitable activities aren't limited to one cause.

"You get a little flavor of all the projects going on in the community," she said.

Rosborough grew up in Clifton Park and came back to the area for law school. Like Kropp, she was looking for a way to get involved and was drawn to the Junior League.

"I've made a lot of great friends through it," she said.

They and other members will welcome several hundred people to the country club for the fashion show, with a crowd of about 250 expected at each of the three sessions. For a \$35 admission fee, people get to watch the show, sign up for raffles, have refreshments and take home party favors. There are also extras, such as souvenirs and photos, with this year's highlight being a salon where girls can bring their dolls to have their hair done.

The event isn't just pomp and circumstance; the American Girl line features dolls that have a historical backstory. Carolyn Daggett, the show's model coordinator, said one reason she likes the dolls is that each comes with a book detailing that story. For example, Kit, one of the line's flagship dolls, is from the Great Depression. Her book talks about how her family had to take in boarders for money. More recent dolls deal with such topics as bullying.

The models – girls from around the region who pay \$30, or enough to sponsor

one child through the Imagination Library – will all be dressed in historical clothing. An emcee will introduce each girl, as well as give some historical background on the matching doll and clothes.

Everyone involved stressed how family-friendly the weekend is.

"It's very G-rated," Kropp said. "It's just a sweet, sweet event."

Tickets are sold online on a first-come, first-served basis on the Junior League's website, [www.juniorleaguealbany.org](http://www.juniorleaguealbany.org). The event is a popular one, with Saturday's afternoon session selling out early this year. The event is the Junior League's biggest fundraiser of the year, bringing in thousands of dollars for the club's current cause.

played a definite role in putting her on a path to be a counselor, for which she is pursuing a master's degree.

"I believe Clarksville Elementary had a hand in creating in me empathy and a desire to help others," she said. "What I remember most is the feeling of belonging, the warm and loving feeling of being part of something special."

Many speakers said the school is a meeting space and a lynchpin for the entire hamlet.

"The closure of Clarksville would be tantamount to removing the heart of the community," said Susan Dee.

Dee said she'd been working with a group of other concerned citizens and presented the board with an in-depth letter that not only addressed the role of Clarksville in the community, but brought up concerns that a mothballed school could deteriorate and become a blight on the hamlet.

A "Fiscal Think Tank" had last year identified the closure of Clarksville as one possible scenario to help put the district on the path to long-term fiscal stability. State aid to the district has been falling in recent years, and this year that's contributing to a \$4 million budget gap.

Adding to the problem is the fact elementary enrollment is dropping instead of increasing. Clarksville was left with

203 students this year, by far the lowest enrollment in the district. That has led to the propagation of multi-age classrooms, which some parents have objected to.

But Robert Jessup, the parent of a Clarksville student, said the school's small, tight-knit atmosphere has been a boon to his child.

"The environment at Clarksville has actually been wonderful for him," he said. "I think that small school environment is very important."

But others argued Clarksville enrollment is already dangerously low, and if it should dip any more it would deprive students of growth opportunities like chances for socialization.

"Due to redistricting, this is not the same school it was five years ago," read an online comment submitted by one of the roughly 150 at-home viewers of the forum.

Many in the audience on Monday clearly felt the closure of the school was a foregone conclusion. Board of Education President James Dering said comments the board has been receiving reflect that sentiment.

"I can assure you that no decision has been made. That's the reason for these forums," he said.

Also on the table is the closure of Elsmere Elementary School. Administrators figure that would save a comparable amount to closing Clarksville, but it would also require a full redistricting effort since the closure would impact a more densely

populated area of the district and thus multiple schools.

A few members of the audience — both at home and in person — took pot shots at both institutions in defending their neighborhood school, but others urged civility and told their peers not to turn against one another. Still, some members of the Clarksville community said that as the only school outside the Town of Bethlehem they have long felt they are second-class citizens.

Town of New Scotland Supervisor Tom Dolin argued his constituents pay a disproportionate share of taxes, given the number of BC students from the town versus the portion of the levy paid by New Scotland residents.

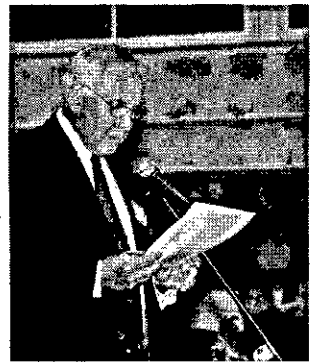
"They are, as it turns out, subsidizing the education of other schools in the district," he said.

No matter what option is chosen, it won't entirely solve the district's budget woes. The Board of Education is aiming to close \$3 million of the budget gap, and is holding workshops in hopes of adopting a budget plan by April 6. So far, the plan includes shedding 42 teaching positions, in addition to other staff layoffs. School closures would involve the loss of additional

jobs. Then there is the belief long expressed by administrators that the state aid crisis is unlikely to rectify itself anytime soon. Some in the audience wondered at what point the district bottoms out on the cuts it can make while still providing a quality program.

"My concern is that this is a stop-gap measure," said Karen Williams. "It seems to me there are alternatives."

There will be another public forum on facility closures on March 21 at the middle school.

## Union-funded survey finds community opposes closure

A telephone survey funded by the Bethlehem Teachers Association shows people living in and around the Clarksville area oppose the closing of Clarksville Elementary School.

The February survey, in which Benchmark Polling group of Latham polled 205 residents, indicates 60 percent of those asked said they "strongly oppose" the closure, and another

12 percent "somewhat oppose" it. Twenty-four percent indicated some level of support, leaving 5 percent undecided.

The survey also asked respondents to identify alternatives to closing Clarksville. The most popular answer was that the district should close another facility or school, or at least more fully research that possibility.

Another popular suggestion was to cut deeper into the budget with wage freezes, programming reductions or layoffs.

The survey tapped households in the Slingerlands, Clarksville, Delmar, Feura Bush and Voorheesville areas. The goal was to canvass every household with a student at the school.



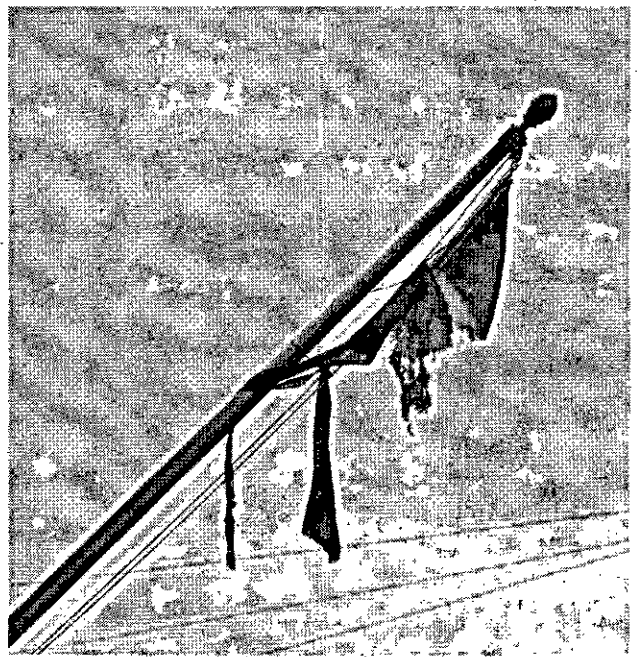

Paulsen and then I kept going," she said.

The race is preceded by a full week of other activities, including the Junior Iditarod, for mushers 14 to 17, and the educators' conference.

There, Edelman heard from past mushers who took part in the epic race as Target-sponsored Teachers on the Trail, and also shared and learned with other educators. She's bringing not only that knowledge into the classroom, but the spirit of

the Iditarod as well.

Edelman's reading students are following their mushers through the course of the race, reading about the Iditarod and its rich history and using the Internet to hone their researching skills. The topic has been a real hit.

"It's reading, writing, vocabulary... Working with students on this level, it just really pulls them in," she said.

She's taking her show on the road, so to speak, spending her free time slots visiting other classes like Jack Rightmyer's seventh-grade English class to give presentations. She's even stepped in to a

Spanish class, where the teacher helped conduct a discussion in that language. During her trip, she Skyped with students from Anchorage.

Rightmyer's students heard all about the trip Wednesday, March 9.

"I tried to time it so all my students are reading adventure stories," Rightmyer said. "A lot of it is trying trying to get kids interested in reading."

Students studying the work of Jack London or Gary Paulsen had plenty of questions for Edelman, especially about the sled dogs that pull mushers across Alaska. She also told them about how the spirit

of the Iditarod carries with it an important message about self reliance, hard work and caring for others.

"They [mushers] learned not to put themselves first, but to put their dogs first and to put other mushers first," Edelman said. The history of the race contains stories of mushers sacrificing their own chances of winning to pick up injured or stranded comrades.

"I'm even willing to buy them a flag," Bruno continued. "I went to Vietnam so I believe in our flag."

Bruno said he banks with TD and has no issue with the bank other than the flags.

Rebecca Acevedo, a corporate spokesperson for TD Bank, said the branch has been working on replacing the flags since February.

"It's just a process that we have to go through to get them and make sure they're exactly what's needed," she said. "We do understand, and we're

going to replace them and get new ones out there."

Acevedo could not elaborate on the replacement process or say for sure when the flags would be replaced. On Friday, March 11, she said the bank had just received the replacements. The old flags were removed over the weekend, and as of Monday, there were no flags displayed outside the bank.

The U.S. Flag Code dictates that once the flag becomes tattered or worn, it should be destroyed and replaced. The American Legion is one organization that conducts flag-burning ceremonies.

42 teaching positions. Some of those would involve teachers taking early retirement, but the majority would be layoffs.

Rounds estimated the partial wage freeze and the retirements could bring the number of teacher layoffs down below 20. Eliminating layoffs altogether is something the union just wouldn't be equipped to do alone, he said.

"In order to save 42 positions, you would have to basically somehow come up with \$2.6 million," he said. "There's really nothing we could do short of cutting people's salaries."

The union members still have to approve the

contract amendment. A 2/3 majority vote will be required, and the vote will be taken by secret ballot on March 24.

The school district declined comment until the union vote has been taken.

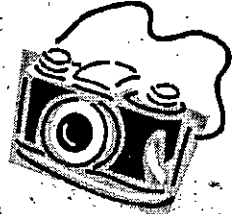

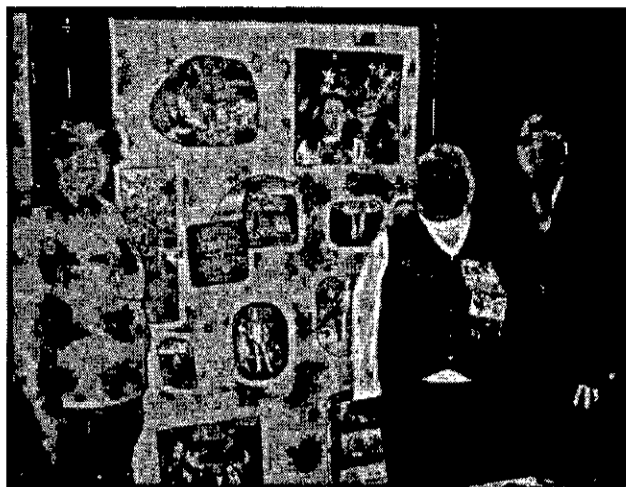

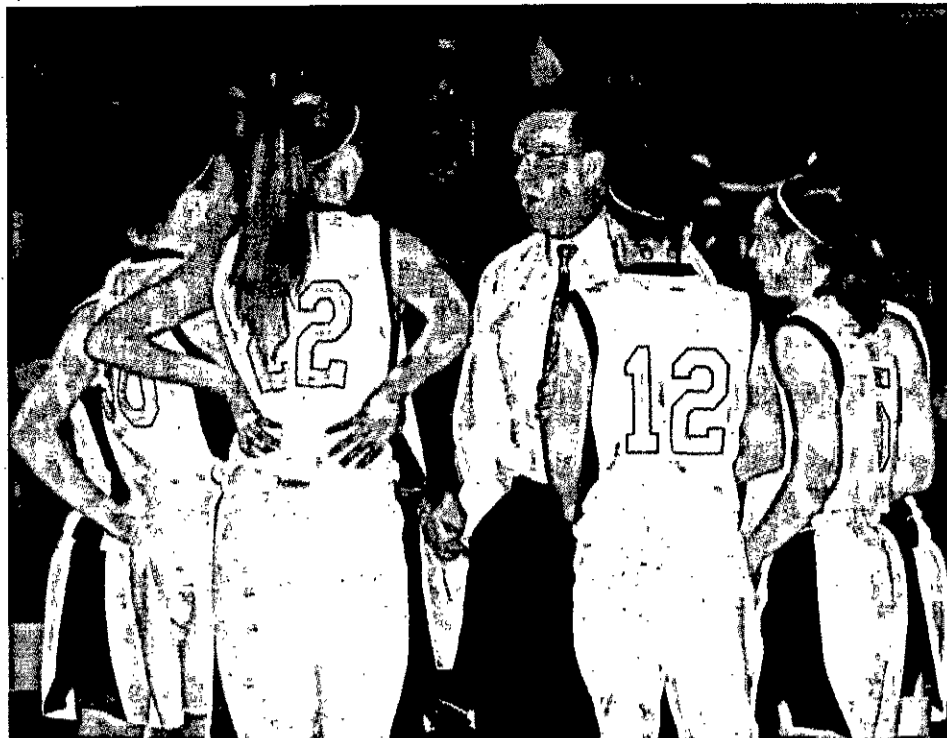

with a team-high 12 points. "Anna and I have been working on our layups and our short jump shots a lot in practice."

"When we get those inside shots, it makes everything easier because then you start opening up those outside shots," said Baron.

Madrid-Waddington made one stab at a comeback early in the fourth quarter. Down 33-17, the Yellowjackets went on an 8-0 run capped by consecutive three-pointers by Bridgett Beldock to trim Voorheesville's lead to eight points.

That was as close as Madrid-Wadding-

ton got. Feller hit a layup off a pass from Melissa Bogart, and Voorheesville was off on a 12-6 run to seal the victory.

"They did their job by expanding that lead to 17 points [in the third quarter]," said Baron. "You knew that [Madrid-Waddington] would make a run, which is why having that 17-point lead was important."

Feller contributed 11 points, while Bogart and Emily Blow combined to score 10 points for Voorheesville. Beldock netted 13 points to lead Madrid-Waddington.

Voorheesville advances to the state semifinals for the first time since 2006. The Blackbirds' last state title was in 2002, when they took home the Class C crown.

# Defense prevails

## Blackbirds sting Yellowjackets in regional final

The Voorheesville girls basketball team put on a defensive clinic.

The Blackbirds forced 38 turnovers and more than a dozen jump balls on their way to a 45-31 victory over Section X champion Madrid-Waddington in last Saturday's Class C regional at Hudson Valley Community College.

Voorheesville (16-7) advances to this weekend's state tournament at HVCC. The Blackbirds meet Section V champion Gananda at 2:15 p.m. Saturday (see page 35 for more information).

"We're looking forward to the challenge," said Voorheesville coach

Robert Baron, who will be involved in his first state semifinal in his four-year varsity career. "Every game is a step up, and you have to be ready to make that step."

It didn't appear that Voorheesville was ready to make the step up against Madrid-Waddington in the first half. Despite all the turnovers, the Blackbirds never got their offense on track as they slowly built an 18-13 halftime lead.

"We weren't really focused," said Baron. "What we did was we settled for jump shots instead of getting the ball down low to our forwards."

Voorheesville started finding its forwards in the second half, as Sarah Madden and Anna Feller made some tough shots down low to help the Blackbirds expand their lead to as much as 17 points.

"We usually have a height advantage [over our opponents], so we like to get it down low," said Madden, who finished

# Union's bad weekend costs Dutch a No. 1 seed

You never know what you're going to write until you finish, so let's get started. OK, moving on...

• The Union College hockey team just lost its chance to have a No. 1 seed for the NCAA Tournament.

Like Brown a year ago, the last-place Colgate Red Raiders took down the first-place Dutchmen 2-1 in their best-of-three ECAC quarterfinal series last weekend to reach the semifinals. And the crazy thing is, Union could

have prevented this from happening.

The Dutchmen won the first game convincingly 4-1 last Friday and had a 2-0 lead on Colgate entering the third period of Saturday's second game before the Red Raiders rallied for a 4-2 victory. Whether Union was lulled into a false sense of security or Colgate turned it up a notch is immaterial. The Dutchmen simply got caught with their pants down by the Red Raiders.

Sunday's series finale was a tense affair that required overtime before Colgate prevailed 4-3. Penalties proved to be Union's downfall, as Colgate scored on two of its seven power plays. And each time, the Dutchmen were clinging to a one-goal lead. You can't afford to make that many mistakes in a close game, and Union did just that.

Thankfully for Union, it doesn't appear that this slip should prevent the NCAA committee from selecting it for the 16-team tournament. The Dutchmen were rated too highly nationally prior to the start of the ECAC Tournament (No. 4) to completely tumble out of the field. After all, if Yale could make the NCAA Tournament last year after losing to Brown in the quarterfinal round, I sincerely doubt that the committee will deny Union this year for having the same thing happen.

Unfortunately for Union, what it does do is drop it from a No. 1 seed to - at best - a No. 2 seed, or maybe even a No. 3 seed. And given the number of strong teams in the national pool (Michigan, Notre Dame, Miami of Ohio and Denver to name a few), the
