RCS pool will remain open

Public — some vocal — turns out strong for special board session

The Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central School District's aquatics center will remain open in the 2011-12 school year, following a decision by the Board of Education Tuesday, March 29, to strike its closure from a list of budget reductions.

The school board was scheduled to meet again April 5 — after The Spotlight has gone to press — when it was expected a budget would be adopted. Check www.spotlightnews.com for the latest budget news.

The decision to keep the pool open for school and community use was made during a well-attended special meeting of the school board convened to discuss budget reductions proposed by Superintendent Daniel Teplesky.

After some discussion among board members, it appeared as if most of those reductions would stand. Among the \$1.1 million cuts: removing more than 10 teacher positions

Clarksville to close

Board votes 5-2 to shutter elementary school next year

Clarksville Elementary School students will not be returning to the same classrooms next year.

The Bethlehem Central School District Board of Education voted 5-2 on Wednesday, March 30, to close the school amid low enrollment and a financial crisis. Board President James Dering and

board member ■ Concessions Lynne Lenhardt shrink BC dissented, voting budget gap instead to form a Page 9 district facilities

committee to more thoroughly study all district facilities and enrollment projections.

The decision came after a long discussion, the first held publicly among the board members. There was some disagreement as to whether the district had collected sufficient data to make a decision, which spurred the split vote.

"People, whether they're for or against closing Clarksville, they want a quick decision," said Dering. "While that might be beneficial for people from an emotional standpoint, I think we need to look at this from a long-term, systemic standpoint."

Board member Michael Cooper, however, said the combination of dropping enrollment and an economic recession have conspired to create a crisis that can't be ignored. He said the district is on the edge of a cliff, being faced down by a hungry lion.

"We've got to take action, and I have every faith in the research we've done so far," he said. "You've

Ground broken on Westmere firehouse

Building to replace outdated facility

Ground was broken on the Westmere Fire Department's new fire station Tuesday, March 29, almost exactly one year after voters approved

borrowing for the roughly \$5-million project.

An outbuilding has been erected since then, from which the department is continuing to operate, and the old station has been leveled. The new facility will be erected on the site of the old building, portions of which were built as early as the 1950s.

This age, along with developments in firefighting apparatuses, was the primary reason the department sought

a new building, said Board of Commissioners members and former chief John Keimer. The building was deteriorating and new trucks wouldn't be able to fit into the vehicle bays, he said.

"To make a long story short, to do nothing but repair what was there was going to cost us about \$2 million of modifications," he said, with a project that would fully bring the building up to code and required specifications costing more than a new

building.

The department is aiming for a November opening date on the new station, and thus far the work is going as planned.

"We've had some unforeseen conditions on the site, such as asbestos removal and some old, old materials that we've had to deal with," Keimer said. "Even with those added expenses, we're still under budget a little bit."

The firehouse is located on Western Avenue.

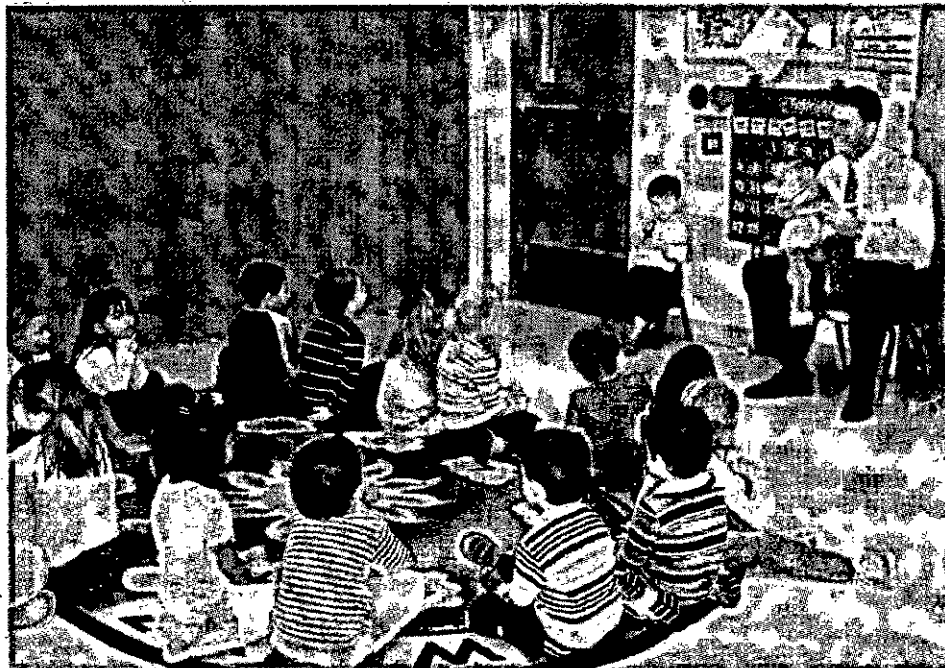
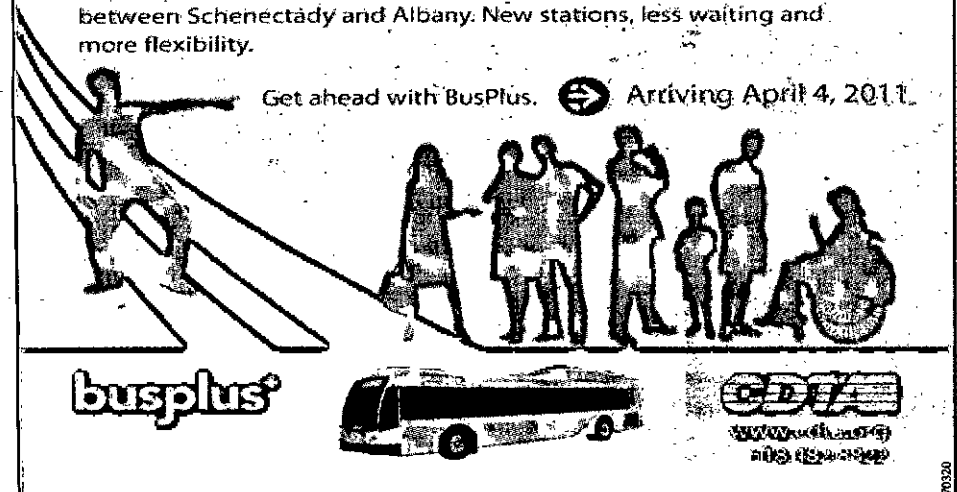

Odyssey ends in triumph

Local teams advance to Odyssey of the Mind World Finals

Odyssey of the Mind teams from Bethlehem Middle School and Voorheesville Middle School have earned the right to represent New York at the Odyssey of the Mind World Finals Tournament. The event takes place at the University of Maryland in College Park, Md., May 27-30.

The local teams were among 235 elementary, middle, and high school teams from around the state that competed in the New York State tournament on March 27 at the University of Binghamton.

Bethlehem's team took first place for Problem 5, Division 2 and Voorheesville took second place for Problem 3, Division 2. Both first and second place teams advance to World Finals.

Bethlehem Middle School team members include: Selin Gumustop, Sydney Klugman, Ben Licht, Tim Mueller, Nora Sheehan, and Luke Thompson, coached by Betsy Gumustop. Voorheesville Middle School team members include: Sadye Goldfarb, Ben Mackay, Lydia Parker, Erik Patak, and Alex Relyea, coached by Jean Mackay.

The teams will be joined at the World Finals competition by teams from throughout the U.S. and about 25 other countries. This is the first time a team from Bethlehem has attended and the third time a team from Voorheesville has advanced to World Finals.

"Competing on the world stage is both a reward and a new level of challenge for these students," said Jean Mackay, coach of Voorheesville's team, who brought teams to World

Come April 10, many staffers will be participating in a race of a different variety, when the 23rd annual Delmar Dash is run. In addition to providing extensive coverage of the race and activities surrounding it, members of *The Spotlight's* staff will be running and volunteering in the event itself.

Several ran in 2010, but this year participation has increased to nearly the entire newsroom (at least those who won't be holding cameras and notepads come Sunday).

last year's Dash. Jung participates in other area road races, including the Turkey Trot in Delmar last year and the Freihofer's Run for Women in Albany. She's thinking about doing the 15K Boilermaker race in Utica this summer.

An Albany resident, Jung said running the suburban streets of Delmar is a nice change of pace.

"I usually run in the city, and out in Delmar, the scenery is far less urban than what I'm used to," she said.

"The spectators are just as supportive," Jung added.

DeVoe ran the Dash last year along with his wife, Jess. They finished side-by-side with a time of 1 hour, 7 minutes, which they hope to best this year. Preparing for the Dash has given both of

them another reason to stay active and healthy.

"It's like a friendly competition with us. ... It definitely gives you something to sort of work towards," DeVoe said. "It gives you a goal, and it's a good goal too. Not only is it a 5-mile run, but it's great community involvement. It makes you not only want to participate, but to do well."

DeVoe's sons, Kevin and Nathan, will be running in the *Spotlight* on Youth Race.

Not all of *The Spotlight's* staff will be pounding the pavement. Reporters will be covering the race from all angles.

Reporter John Purcell will be manning a water station at Hamagrael Elementary School and keeping runners hydrated as they pass. Though he's not a runner, Purcell wanted to help out with what his colleagues have told him is a great event.

"I've only covered events like this before, so this should be a fun experience," he said. "I wanted to do my part to help out, so I decided I would volunteer. Hopefully I'll get to meet some new people."

The absolute last chance to register for the Dash will be on Saturday, April 9, at Fleet Feet on Wolf Road, from 2 to 6 p.m. The fee at that time will be \$20. The race steps off from the BC Middle School at 9 a.m. Sunday, April 10.

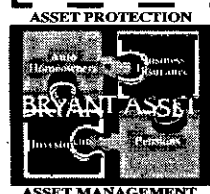

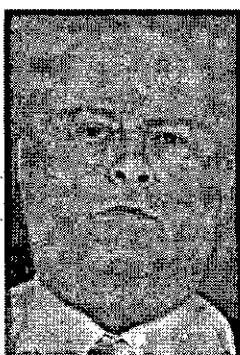

Police: Delmar man scammed \$200k

State Police on Monday, March 28, arrested a Delmar man on charges he scammed over \$200,000 from an Albany County resident.

Frank W. Kindlon, 68, was charged with grand larceny in the second degree, a felony.

Police said Kindlon initiated a scam in April of 2009 and it continued

through March of 2011, with Kindlon allegedly receiving money by "claiming various expenses and fees that did not exist."

Police declined to elaborate on what those expenses were, but did say Kindlon was not employed during the time of the alleged scam.

The resident filed a complaint with police on March 18.

Kindlon was arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court and remanded to Albany County jail without bail.

Anyone who believes they may have been victimized by Kindlon is asked to call State Police at 783-3211.

BPD apprehend alleged fugitive

The Bethlehem Police Department on Saturday, March 19, arrested an alleged fugitive wanted in Texas for probation violation.

Police at about 12:55 p.m. pulled over a 1999 Toyota Corolla because a license plate reader had alerted a patrol that the vehicle's registration was suspended, according to arrest reports. The operator was Dana Elroy Esannason, 52, of 17 Western Avenue, Albany, and a police database check revealed an active arrest warrant from the Denton County Sheriff's Office in Texas issued in 2004, police said.

Esannason allegedly admitted he was arrested for cocaine possession in Texas, served 6 months and then left the state without completing his probation period. He was remanded to the Albany County jail without bail and was scheduled to appear in court on April 19.

arrested Bruce Anthony Bell, 58, of 22 Wilshire Drive in Delmar, and charged him with DWI.

After allegedly failing sobriety tests Bell was placed in custody and a breath test allegedly showed his BAC to be 0.12 percent. He was released to return to Bethlehem Town Court on April 5.

The Bethlehem Police Department on Friday, March 25, arrested Kerie Francis Carter, 41, of 164 Irish Hill Road, East Berne, and charged her with aggravated DWI.

Police said Carter's 2010 Toyota Corolla was observed stopping at a Hess station on

New Scotland Road in Slingerlands at about 2:50 a.m. The station was closed, and police stopped to investigate. Carter and her male passenger were standing outside the car when police pulled up and upon interviewing them police found both to have the odor of alcohol on their breath and displaying other signs of intoxication, according to arrest reports.

The male passenger said they had stopped because the car had a flat tire, and Carter allegedly said she had been driving. She failed sobriety tests and was placed in custody, police said, and a breath test at the police station allegedly showed her BAC to be 0.18 percent.

Carter was released to return to Bethlehem Town Court on April 19.

drugs, felony DWI, unlawful possession of marijuana and traffic law infractions.

Police stopped Smith on Cherry Avenue in Delmar at about 1:08 a.m. for allegedly failing to signal a turn and having an insufficient tail light on his 1996 Toyota Camry. Smith told police he was driving home and he had the odor of alcohol on his breath and displayed other signs of intoxication, according to police. He said he had one beer at about 9 p.m., police said.

Smith allegedly failed sobriety tests and stated he had smoked marijuana earlier and was taking antibiotic Amoxicillin and pain reliever Hydrocodone for a toothache.

Police allegedly found in the car a vaporizer with marijuana residue, two bottles of Amoxicillin pills and a bottle containing liquid that Smith said

with Hydrocodone. The label was faded and unreadable so the bottle was secured as evidence, police said, while the Amoxicillin was later returned to Smith.

Smith agreed to have blood drawn for testing

and a database check showed a 2006 DWI conviction in Saratoga Springs City Court, which increased the charges against him to felonies. Smith was released to return to Bethlehem Town Court on April 19.

The size cap trap

Surprise! The size-cap issue has risen again in New Scotland.

From Charles Wiff's story on page 13: "Councilman Daniel Mackay is expected to introduce a size cap bill at the Monday, April 11, meeting of the Town Board. The board will probably then kick off the review process for new laws, said Supervisor Tom Dolin."

The new bill is a reflection of the one that failed to gain a supermajority vote in March 2010. The proposed bill would create a separate commercial zoning classification — Commercial-B — which would be centered on the Route 85/85A intersection. A variety of limitations would apply within this zone, most notably a size cap of 50,000 square feet for single stores and 100,000 square feet for shopping centers with multiple businesses.

If any of this sounds familiar, it's because the heart of the bill is the same one Mackay and Douglas LaGrange pitched during the 2009 election season.

The size cap is a perennial debate in New Scotland, and an emotional one. Since 2008, the town has stopped just short of enacting a law banning big-box stores, opting to enact moratoriums on building the establishments. Several moratoriums have been passed since 2008, temporarily halting the development of large-scale retail establishments, particularly a proposed Target on the Bender Melon Farm by Cazenovia-based Sphere Development Corp. Since then, Sphere has cooled on the development and big-box talk has waned a bit.

So why would Mackay bring this up now? The flack answer is that it's always a good time to serve the people of New Scotland — but there were good enough opportunities in the year between the last size-cap's failure and now.

No, this is an election ploy. The size-cap debate dominated the 2009 New Scotland elections, so much so that when *The Spotlight* hosted debates for the seats, some audience members questioned if there were any other issues in town that the candidates could address.

But Mackay's not up for election, you say. You're right, he's not, but the seats belonging to Deborah Baron and Richard Reilly — the two dissenting votes that didn't give the size-cap law the supermajority last year — are, and wouldn't it be nice to knock them out to clear the way for a size cap.

Now that Mackay has introduced the proposal, he, Dolin (also up for re-election) and LaGrange can keep this thing afloat — through planning boards, public hearings and spirited public comment — until this fall.

And once again New Scotland elections will be defined by a single issue.

Taxpayers foot the bill for REMS insolvency

Rotterdam residents should brace themselves for REMS Plan B. Unlike the recent ambulance tax scheme, where residents were able to vote on whether or not to establish a special taxing district to fund emergency services, this time residents will have no voice in the selection of the town's emergency medical service provider. They will now have to rely on common sense from their supervisor and Town Board, but they shouldn't hold their breath.

Schenectady County Legislator Tony Jasenski, the well established pro-tax advocate for REMS (Rotterdam Emergency Medical Service), has shifted his focus from the handily rejected taxing district proposal to another scheme attempting to guarantee business for an organization with a history of alarming numbers of dropped emergency calls, gross mismanagement, financial insolvency and taxpayer bailouts. Now, in what appears to be a sudden lapse of sanity, the supervisor and some members of the board seem to be falling for it.

REMS is the merged product of the town's two former volunteer ambulance squads, a merger that was made a condition for yet another taxpayer bailout. The merger condition was prompted by findings in a study commissioned by the Paolino administration, conducted by a professional consultant specializing in the reorganization of medically oriented businesses. The consultant's primary task was to identify the causes of the volunteer squads' insolvency and to recommend solutions based on the facts gathered. Known as the Czalet Report, the study found that the volunteer squads now comprising the paid REMS were dropping more than half of their emergency calls, while failing to bill and collect from insurance carriers for ambulance service. In the simplest terms, neither squad was operating as a business — the only hope for solvency. The corrective solution developed would merge the two squads into a leaner, more efficient operation, and hire a business manager with experience in medical billing, collection and accounting. The merger was eventually achieved only to meet the condition for securing the

requested \$90,000 from the town, but the idea of an accounting professional or any other outside assistance was met with intense resistance and never considered. The predictable result was a change in name and volunteer status only.

They wanted a tax district, insisting that this was the cure for their business ineptitude, and all other problems, for that matter. It was a tax campaign that would haunt the town for years to come while ignoring all along a private proposal from Mohawk Ambulance that would incur no cost to taxpayers; provide reliable, superior emergency medical care; create private sector jobs; and contribute to the property tax base. It is noteworthy to add that during all the years REMS and its formerly volunteer staff were dropping the majority of their emergency calls, Mohawk Ambulance was there.

By the time the tax measure was scheduled for a vote, REMS staff had soared to more than 60 employees running two ambulances. Among the many deceptions employed in promoting the unnecessary tax, taxpayers were told that the tax was necessary to finance capital investments only. Specifically, it would be used to replace aging ambulances. They were also told that payroll and all other expenses would be funded exclusively through insurance billing that, historically, they never collected. Meanwhile, they were racking up a massive debt with the IRS that would have been transferred to taxpayers.

Despite these disturbing facts, town officials were firmly intent on following through with a vote on an unnecessary tax that would cost taxpayers more than \$30,000 only to suffer a crushing rejection, immediately preceded by what is unquestionably the most disturbing revelation to date: Just days before the vote, the public was informed that over at least the last four to five years, REMS had been billing, collecting and retaining all revenues generated by Advanced Life Support (ALS) administered by tax-funded paramedics, a service REMS is not qualified to provide. Annual revenue for ALS service is estimated to be more than \$100,000. Of course the public will never know exactly how much was collected because REMS never recorded the income or accounted for its spending. Their idea of accounting was to simply tell us through their attorney that the money was spent on "operations."

Really? Then why didn't REMS ever mention this revenue as a source of income while they were campaigning for a tax windfall, without which they claimed they could not survive? Oh yeah ... that's right ... the public wasn't supposed to know because REMS was improperly retaining money that did not belong to them, but in fact belonged to the town.

And their defense? According to the attorney for REMS, former Supervisor Steve Tommasone

simply told them to help themselves to your money. Incredibly generous of Mr. Tommasone, don't you think? Never mind that Tommasone had no statutory authority whatsoever to do so, but just in case these co-conspirators claim unawareness of proper procedure, they should be reminded that ignorance of the law is still not an affirmative defense.

That would be the law that requires a contract for ALS (Rotterdam paramedics) billing and collection by a Basic Life Support (BLS) transporter (REMS) that does not provide the ALS, for the purpose of verification by the NYS Department of Health's Emergency Medical Services Bureau that funds collected for the ALS portion of the bill is forwarded to the agency that administers the ALS. BLS transport services are the only agencies that can bill and collect for ALS. If they are not the providers of the ALS, as is the case with REMS, the only legal way they can bill for it is with contractual proof that the ALS portion of the collection is being forwarded to the ALS provider. No wonder they didn't worry about the trivial matter of a contract. And no wonder Tommasone slipped \$120,000 into the budget for REMS on his way out — suspiciously comparable to the annual ALS revenue estimates. He knew it was the end of the ALS gravy train for REMS and made sure the funds were replaced via the budget.

Supervisor Frank Del Gallo has responded to the ALS scandal with numerous calls for an audit of REMS finances, seeking reimbursement of the funds improperly retained. Now that the bidding process is under way, he is considering awarding an ambulance contract to the very subject of that proposed audit, who can now suddenly and miraculously offer its service at no cost to taxpayers, while making no statements indicating any intention of reimbursing the town.

Most troubling about this prospect is the fact that the BLS ambulance provider awarded the contract will be the first dispatched to emergency calls and therefore would likely be the virtually exclusive biller and collector for ALS when it is employed. This means that if REMS is awarded that contract, they would once again be given access to the same revenue source that was pilfered from the town, which is unconscionable.

In a question recently posed to Supervisor Del Gallo, the businessman extraordinaire was asked: If you found out that an accountant you hired to maintain your financial records admitted to illegally keeping hundreds of thousands of dollars from your business over the last four or five years, would you hire that accountant again? His immediate answer was a simple, but firmly stated no.

Residents should now be asking why he is considering imposing upon Rotterdam residents the real-life equivalent of the theoretical accountant that operates under the name of Rotterdam Emergency Medical Service. The disparaging attitudes and remarks the students of the Clarksville have been subjected to for decades by Bethlehem CSD students, teachers, and administrators is a "dirty little secret" that is not so secret which has plagued BCSD. One only has to ask BCSD alumni who were lucky enough to live in the town of Bethlehem to hear the confirmation of this problem. This situation is not going to get any better because of there will be social-economic factors that many of these

elementary students will face. Having your child in the other elementary schools in BCSD can be a trial of not having the "right clothes," your parents not driving the "right car," not participating in the "right" sports, music, or dance activities, and being unable to be an obvious material spender. The culture shock these students faced when trying to integrate into the middle school was bad enough but for younger students to face these challenges could be very detrimental to them with lifelong consequences.

I am sure the taxpayers from New Scotland would like fairer treatment, as (New Scotland Town Supervisor Tom) Dolin pointed out recently, which could be accomplished by retracing the physical boundaries of the BCSD to the boundary lines of the town of Bethlehem.

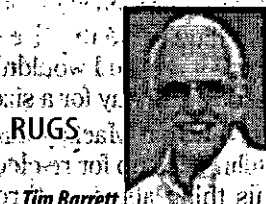

Canine parvovirus is a highly contagious disease that affects dogs and attacks rapidly dividing cells. Dogs catch this virus by ingesting infected feces. The virus can survive freezing temperatures and is essentially everywhere. Puppies from the age of 6 to 20 weeks are most susceptible to infection. However, dogs of all ages can be affected especially without proper vaccination. Dobermans, Rottweilers and Staffordshire terriers are most prone to infection. Vaccination is a very important means of prevention. Puppies should receive their first parvo vaccination at 6-8 weeks of age. The vaccination needs to be boosted every 3-4 weeks until the age of 16 weeks. Puppies should not be exposed to other dogs, until they have received their complete vaccination series.

Following an incubation period of 3-7 days the infected individual begins to show signs of illness. Lethargy, anorexia, profuse diarrhea and vomiting with or without a fever are the most common clinical signs. Due to bone marrow involvement, infected individuals often experience a drop in white blood cell counts.

With hospitalization and aggressive treatment by a veterinarian, the survival rate can be as high as 80%. The outcome depends on the preexisting health of the puppy, the viral strain and the severity of clinical signs. Seek veterinary assistance if your puppy has vomiting or diarrhea since early treatment is crucial for this potentially fatal infection.

Now is the time for high-speed rail

With a rail oriented Federal Administration interested in improving the nation's rail system-high speed rail is the resurrected transportation topic of the day.

The Obama administration is expected to appropriate \$8. million for nationwide passenger rail projects with their focus primarily on high speed rail projects, (100 mph plus) across America.

Once again there is no discussion of commuter rail—moving the working masses to their work sites.

With the Middle East Region an ongoing crisis, the cost of gasoline approaching \$4-per gallon, the questionable status of the Suez Canal and the Libyan oil fields, coupled with our government's refusal to drill our own ample oil supply in the Prudhoe Bay Alaskan oil fields—not to mention the perpetual auto gridlock on all highways—commuter rail transportation should be given equally important attention. Considering multiple problems with oil supply and costs, failure to consider

auto to local commuter rail transportation could present very serious consequences for the economy. Contrary to the nation's usual response to crises—it is time to act now rather than react at a later date.

In our immediate area, high/higher speed rail is feasible where it currently exists in the Northeast Corridor, (Washington to Boston), but not adaptable to areas from Albany north to Canada. Rock cuts, inadequate right of way for expansion, lack of straight

track all contribute to the detriment of high speed in that northern Adirondack area.

After years of neglect, with the government finally directing their attention to our decaying rail infrastructure, pursue the goal of high speed rail, but do not neglect the necessity of commuter rail to counter the emerging oil crises.

Federal funds should be allocated for commuter rail between Fort Edward and Albany to provide for a needed transportation alternative when the price of operating an auto becomes unaffordable.

With rail infrastructure already in place, (Albany to Fort Edward), with the subject of commuter rail studied years ago, implementation of commuter rail in the Northern Capital District would be rapid, hastened by the use of Budd type rail passenger car train seats.

With our tendency to react to crisis, now with Federal funding available and willing, railroad oriented Federal Government involved—an opportune time exists to act—confronting a looming problem ready to happen.

Our absurd dependence on foreign sources of energy, most noticeably oil, when we have the largest untapped reserves in our territory must be corrected.

Concessions shrink BC budget gap

The Bethlehem Central School District is expected to save about \$1.3 million on next year's budget through contractual concessions from staff and faculty.

All the district's bargaining units agreed to some change in the terms of their contracts, generally taking a full or partial pay-freeze for the coming school year.

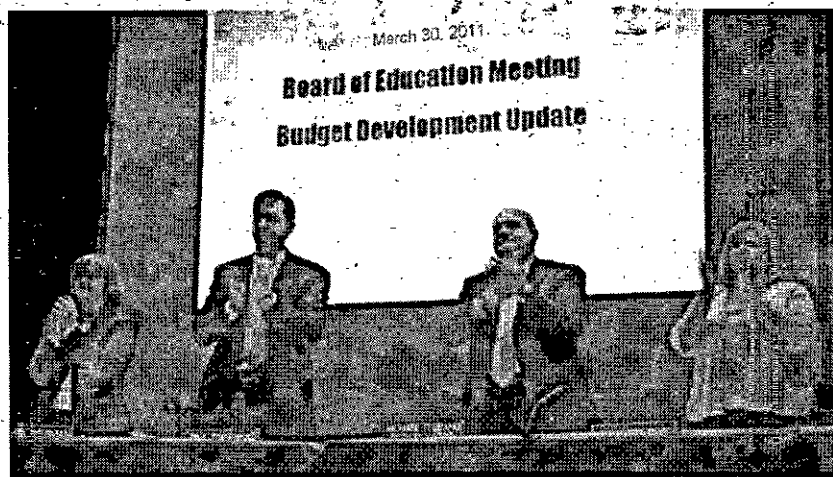
The BC Teachers Association is offering the largest of these in terms of dollars saved with an agreement to freeze salaries for its 448 members for 70 percent of the 2011-12 school year. That should return a savings of about \$1.2 million for the district, which the union has stipulated will be put toward reducing the number of teacher layoffs.

BCTA President Dave Rounds offered the terms to the Board of Education on Wednesday, March 30, and received a standing ovation from that body in return. Board President James Dering said the board had not received a formal proposal yet, but it's expected one will be accepted at the next board meeting.

"On behalf of the board, thank you so much. We think that's fantastic," Dering said.

The members of the BCTA approved the concession on March 24. Though the exact vote was not discussed, Rounds said the proposal passed by considerably more than the two-thirds approval needed.

Also on Wednesday, it was announced a contract with the BC United Employees' Association had been extended to include a

partial wage freeze. Support staff in the BCUEA will not see their pay increase until Feb. 1, 2012, for a savings of \$266,000.

BCUEA members will also pay more in health insurance premiums. The contract extension will run through June of 2013. Members of the central office clerical staff will take a similar freeze, though they are not BCUEA members.

Earlier in the year, it was announced 26 district administrators, including Superintendent Michael Tebbano, would take a wage freeze in 2011-12.

"Every employee in the Bethlehem Central School District for next year has taken some sort

offreeze," Tebbano said Wednesday. "That's pretty significant for the Capital District."

These concessions will play a substantial role in the school board's deliberations Wednesday, April 6, when it is expected a budget will be adopted. With a state budget in on time, it was also recently revealed BC will be receiving a year-to-year loss of \$2.3 million in state aid, which is still \$465,000 less than proposed in the executive budget.

The district has been aiming to come up with a plan that includes a 2 percent tax levy increase and use of reserve savings. The instructional program will also be discussed at Wednesday's meeting, including teacher reductions. Though more than 40 faculty were expected to be shown the door earlier in the process, with recent developments that number could well fall below 20.

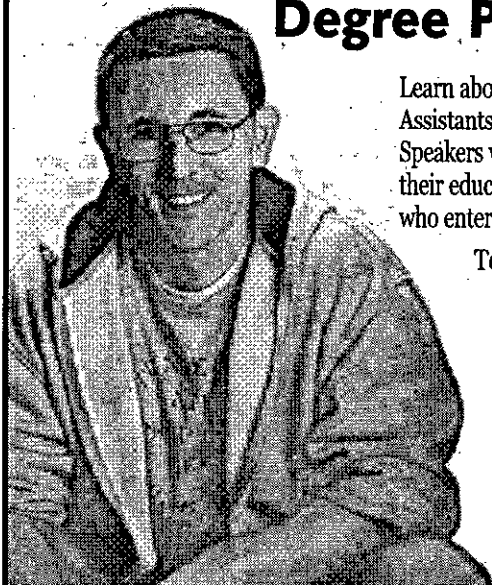

Three caregivers to be honored

Alzheimer's Association to hold luncheon

Debbie Waite of Schenectady is caring for her ailing mother, Sharon, who has been suffering from Alzheimer's for the past 10 years.

"She was always there for me and my brother and anyone who needed her," Waite said. "In my opinion, she was the best mother anyone could ask for. She always took care of me, and it is my turn to repay her and take care of her the best I can."

On Thursday, April 14, the Alzheimer's Association of Northeastern New York will honor Waite and two other caregivers, Jane Agee of Saratoga Springs and Jane Newman of Greenville, at a luncheon, highlighting their commitment to caregiving, as well as their ability to do it while maintaining a job and a family.

Waite began caring for her mother just one year after her grandmother passed away from Alzheimer's. She said she

appreciates the little things in her life more now, such as her 22-minute drive home from work and the free time she has to listen to music. When she gets home, the first thing she does is tend to her mother. Just the fact that Waite's mother recognizes her fills her with joy.

"Seeing her recognize me is all I need," she said. "It helps me to do what I have to do."

Agee was the primary caregiver for her husband, who passed away three weeks ago. She said that since his death, it has been easier for her to speak about her duty in a more sensitive way.

"I've been through the whole thing," she said. "Being a caregiver and having a job is pretty demanding."

Agee is a full-time associate professor at the University of Albany, but said being a college professor made it easier for her to take care of her husband. Being able to teach online classes allowed her to still act as caregiver. And having the job is what sometimes helped her get through the stress.

All of the caregivers being honored said they

wouldn't be able to do what they do if it wasn't for the support that they receive from their family members. Newman, a general clerk at Engineering and Design for Price Chopper Supermarkets, who takes care of her 92-year-old mother, said her husband and two boys help out tremendously.

"To be very honest, I could not do what I do without my caring and loving husband," she said. "He switched his hours so he could work the night shift so he could take care of her during the day, and I switched my hours so I can take care of her during the evening."

Waite said she and her husband sold their house a year ago so they could move into their parents' house to take care of her mother. She said she also receives help from her family, as well as hospice.

"My kids and husband pitch in. Everyone pitches in," she said. "Someone will step up and be available. I have good boys."

There are still tough moments for all of them.

Newman said a moment occurred on Sunday, April 3, when her mother thought her car was at the house. Something then clicked in her mother's mind when she realized Newman was now taking care of her.

"She then got upset and said, 'I'm losing

my mind,'" she said. "I changed the subject and said, 'Dinner's ready,' and that's the end. That's kind of how you deal with this a lot."

All of the women said this has been a learning process for them. Agee said that it has been a personal growth experience for her, allowing her to connect with more people she said she would not normally have to opportunity to meet. She said it is also important to act as a caregiver as there are many gaps in the care provided by the state.

"It is very tough to make sure he was getting the care he needed," she said of her husband.

While the women all said they are honored to be recognized by the Alzheimer's Association, Newman said she doesn't think what she's doing is all that special.

Elmwood re-vote slated for April 18

Voters in the Elmwood Park Fire District will soon have a chance to vote — again — on the district's proposal to borrow money for a land acquisition.

A Feb. 8 vote to bond to pay for part of a six-acre land purchase shook out to a 47-47 tie. The only difference between that proposal and the one up on April 12 is the district will be using \$50,000 of operating funds to lower the bond authorization to \$265,000.

The fire district (which is tied to the North Bethlehem Fire Department) is seeking to purchase land from the neighboring church. That will allow a good location to build an outlying structure to provide more space for equipment management and training, said Chairman of the Elmwood Park Fire Commissioners John Mahoney.

"The property, if we purchase it, will give us the ability to stretch out a little bit," he said.

The department runs a rehab tent program, which is deployed to large fire events across the area to provide a climate-controlled space for firefighters on extended calls. It can be difficult to dry out the tent after calls, especially in the winter, in the firehouse space.

The district's existing property

doesn't allow a good place for such a structure, Mahoney said. This project wouldn't require all six acres, but that's what the church is selling, he added.

The department would seek to subdivide and sell a portion of the property that also has a trailer on it. That would put the property back on the tax rolls, if successful, with proceeds going toward bond repayment.

Though there are thousands of voters in the fire district, the nearly 100-voter February turnout was considered high for a fire district vote. Officials said some voters complained they did not know about the vote far in advance, and the Elmwood Park Fire Commissioners have held two public meetings prior to the upcoming second vote.

"There was statements about how whenever the department needs the fundraising events they go and put fliers out...we had to explain that the department and the district are two different entities," said Mahoney, who added the legal obligations for advertising a vote have been met for both instances.

Voting will take place from 5 to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, April 12, at the North Bethlehem firehouse on Russell Road in North Bethlehem.

Size cap law returns

Thorny issue will be reintroduced in New Scotland

The commercial size cap issue is set to rear up once again in the Town of New Scotland.

Councilman Daniel Mackay is expected to introduce a size cap bill at the Monday, April 11, meeting of the Town Board. The board will probably then kick off the review process for new laws, said Supervisor Tom Dolin.

"I expect the board will move that it be sent to the town Planning Board as required, and also to the county Planning Board for their review and their comment," he said.

A public hearing would also have to be held before the law could be voted on.

The new iteration of the bill closely resembles the past effort. If passed, it would create a separate commercial zoning classification — Commercial-B — which would be centered on the Route 85/85A intersection. A variety of limitations would apply within this zone, most notably a size cap of 50,000 square feet for single stores

multiple businesses.

The proposed law's language explains those requirements are well in line with the town's comprehensive plan and what leaders heard from the public during the last debate over the size cap.

Mackay did not return multiple calls for comment.

This cap, if approved, could actually serve as something of a stop-gap measure. The town is in the midst of a committee review of the 85/85A area, funded by a grant from the Capital District Transportation Committee. That review is expected to return zoning changes in the area but isn't due until early next year.

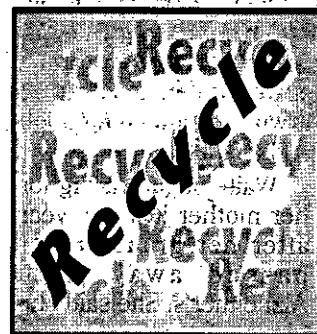
The previously proposed size cap actually had a majority support on the board, but a 3-2 vote in January of 2010 wasn't enough to pass it. A supermajority was required since business owners in the area submitted a protesting petition with more than 50 percent of the affected parties' signatures. It's assumed an attempt to pass this law would meet the same obstacle.

Mackay and Dolin both supported the cap along with Councilman Douglas LaGrange. Councilwoman Deborah Baron and Councilman Richard Reilly did not. The discussion over

commercial development in the town was touched off by plans by Sphere Development LLC to build a Target store on the former Bender Melon Farm. The company dropped its proposal after several years before the town.

Proponents of the original law said such a measure would preserve New Scotland's rural atmosphere and prevent the growth, traffic and other trappings of big-box development. Detractors said the law could have unintended consequences including limiting retail growth the town does want and restricting a commercial tax base, placing a heavier tax burden on homeowners. Some argued the law was vague and poorly written.

The debate heavily influenced the 2009 local elections. The coming election season is fast approaching and three seats on the board are up — Dolin's, Reilly's and Baron's.

Court rules Cunningham can't serve as Colonie DPW commissioner

Former Bethlehem supervisor named to position in 2010, after unsuccessful re-election bid

Jack Cunningham can no longer serve as commissioner of the Town of Colonie's Department of Public Works.

So says a ruling issued by The State Of New York's Appellate Court on Thursday, March 31. The court stated that to hold the position as the commissioner of DPW, a person must be a resident of the town.

"Given the nature of this position - and the crucial role it plays providing essential services for the town - we conclude that the Commissioner of Public Works is a town officer who must be a town resident," the ruling said. "Since Cunningham has acknowledged that he was not a Town resident when he was appointed to this position, and does not intend to become one in the future, his appointment as Commissioner of Public Works does not comport

with relevant state law and is invalid."

Cunningham is out of the office until April 11 and did not return phone calls for comment.

Colonie Town Attorney Mike Magguilli said the town has removed Cunningham as commissioner of DPW for "practical purposes." But that could change if the Town Board decides to accept a resolution that would clarify the requirements for his position to only have to be a resident of Albany County.

"What will happen is he will be reappointed retroactively to March 31," he said. "This lawsuit accomplished nothing."

Magguilli said this will not only affect Colonie but also other towns in the third judicial district.

"Everyone is probably scrambling through their employee list to see who is affected," he said.

The court continued to say that due to the ruling on the issue of his residency it did not rule on Theodore W. Ricket's, the plaintiff in this case, argument that Cunningham could not hold the position because he is not a qualified engineer.

The Town of Colonie plans to amend its municipal law to allow Cunningham to retain the position, said town officials.

Colonie Republicans hailed the court's decision as "a victory for the residents of Colonie" and said that it upholds the idea of appointing those who are the most qualified for the job.

"It reinforces the importance of hiring the most qualified people to deliver important services to our town and reverses the Mahan [Supervisor Paula Mahan] administration's attempts to give away these critical jobs to political cronies," said Chairman John Graziano, Jr. "Supervisor Mahan has referred to this case as a 'frivolous lawsuit.' The court's ruling today highlights that it is the

Mahan administration that has been frivolous in their approach to ensuring the health, safety and welfare of town residents."

The town does not plan to appeal the decision as Mahan said it does not want to spend any more taxpayer dollars.

"In my opinion, it's a politically motivated lawsuit," she said. "There were employees who live outside the town that weren't targeted."

She added that she is unsure as to whether this ruling means Cunningham must leave his post as commissioner immediately. The state has allowed municipalities in the past to amend local laws for department head positions, which she said would allow the town to choose from a larger pool of candidates.

"We will be amending that by clarifying the local law," she said, referring to the April 7 hearing regarding Cunningham's and Library Director Richard Naylor's positions. "The ultimate goal is to get the best candidate to serve the people in Colonie best."

Mahan said she is going over the ruling with the town's attorneys to see what next steps the town can take. She added that she has not spoken with Cunningham regarding the court's decision but said she will be calling him to let him know.

CDTA celebrates Busplus service

Local officials praise the timing of new express service

A crowd of more than 50 people showed up for the unveiling of the Capital District Transportation Authority's Busplus at Colonie Center on Monday March 28, where several local officials praised the service and then hopped on one of the buses.

"This is a great day for CDTA and a great day for the Capital Region," said Carm Basile, CEO of CDTA. "We are on the brink of bringing what we hope will be the best way to travel in the Capital Region.

It combines the best features of bus service with the best features of rail service."

Busplus, which will be implemented on April 4, will be a 17-mile route that will go down Route 5 from Schenectady to Albany, while only making 18 stops. The cost for the service is expected to be \$36 million, with \$16.5 already invested in infrastructure, according to Margo Janack, spokeswoman for CDTA.

The red and grey bus will be stopping at stations that will soon have wireless Internet, a service that will also be on the bus. At the stations, there will be real-time information for those traveling on the bus.

Colonie Supervisor Paula Mahan, Cohoes Mayor John T. McDonald and Congressman Paul Tonko were at the unveiling and all praised the new bus service.

"We have the distinction of being the most gluttonous users of

energy in the world, and we're looking at energy costs sky rocketing," Tonko said. "So the timeliness of this kick-off couldn't be more appropriate and better situated."

Mahan, whose town is located directly in the

middle of the Busplus route, hailed the project as a primer for others that will promote energy efficiency.

"I think this is just the beginning of one of the many possibilities that Busplus will bring to this region," she said.

At Pieter B. Coeymans Elementary in the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk School District, students recently raised over \$100 selling Houses for Japan Pins at a March 22 art show, and the student council there will be planning future fundraisers.

Review" this Thursday and Friday.

Though casting, costuming and rehearsing this number of students is a challenge, director and Slingerlands music teacher Sarah Platek makes it a point to ensure all are included.

"Everyone has a line, everyone dances, everyone sings," she said. "I think that's important at this stage, to give them a taste of musical theater."

The experience prepares students well for the

opportunities they'll have during the rest of their education at Bethlehem Central, Platek continued.

"It's nice to go to the middle school and high school [productions] and see all the Slingerlands alumni," she said. This is Platek's 10th year directing the annual play.

Students are split up into groups so they only have to rehearse after school once a week or so. As showtime approaches, however, they're getting together for dress rehearsals.

"The 1890 Music Hall Review" runs about 45 minutes and, as the name implies, focuses on the events of the 19th

century's final decade in song and dance. There are musical numbers about the introduction of the Kodak camera, the invention of the bicycle and women's suffrage, for example.

The play has been performed as one of the yearly fifth grade plays before, but it's unlikely too many recall that 1983 production. Students performed "The Princess and the Pea" last year.

"The 1890 Music Hall Review" shows on Thursday, April 7, and Friday, April 8, at Slingerlands Elementary. Tickets are \$3 at the door and \$2 in advance. They can be purchased ahead of time at the school.

(resulting in some class size increases); cutting more than half of the budget for clubs and intramural sports (from \$83,000 to \$33,000); cutting the building operations budgets; removing several bus runs; and cutting staff positions.

The board asked that a proposal to close facilities on Sunday and to delay the start of foreign language studies form seventh to eighth grade also be reconsidered.

While there were many topics under consideration, the aquatics center was clearly on the mind of many attendees. The district had proposed last week to shutter the facility for a savings of \$77,000.

That cost is eclipsed by the value of the facility, said school board member Sarah Hafensteiner.

"We don't live in the middle of a city, where we have easy access to a lot of facilities and advantages," she said. "This is the only facility that's here for everybody."

Several of her colleagues echoed those thoughts and many of the perhaps 200 people who filled the RCS High School auditorium cheered, hooted and hollered whenever the topic of keeping the pool open was raised. A handful left after the decision was made, but others stayed to thank the board.

"It's not really a school fixture, it's a community fixture," said girls varsity swim team captain Jess

Cooper, who also spoke of the many programs for the young and old at the pool. "I see longtime friendships built there."

Keeping the pool open will mean an increase in the probable tax levy, to about a 3.8 percent hike. The district's state aid was cut by \$900,000 in the proposed state budget.

The night after the board's deliberation, a state budget was adopted that restored \$350,000 of that aid. That should go toward keeping some of the teachers slated for removal, and could possibly affect the tax levy or use of district reserves. Teplesky on Tuesday advised the board it would be wise to save some of the return for next budget season.

The superintendent also lumped blame on the state for the cuts, saying the district could well have made the tax levy flat if school aid weren't cut this year.

"Prior to what the governor took out, we had you at zero," he told the audience.

Though many praised the board for keeping the pool, others were decidedly more critical of the district, with administrator numbers and salaries being the most frequent point of contention.

John Allen handed the board a petition with "several hundred" signatures demanding a more thorough, line-by-line look at the budget, and railed against what he said were senselessly numerous and overpaid administrators.

"A lot of us think it's a cheap shot," to put athletics, clubs and teachers on the chopping block, "when you don't look at the heavy burden of administrative costs," he said.

Allen and others questioned why the middle school has more than one principal and made other criticisms of the administrative structure. The top three RCS administrators — including Teplesky — agreed to a pay freeze in next year's budget, for a \$16,000 savings.

During board deliberations, board members Michael Robbins and John Vadney said they'd compiled a list of potential line item reductions that could save hundreds of thousands. Some of the items he mentioned included a \$2,000 budget for dry cleaning services and slashing the Board of Education's budget.

"We came to \$1.1 million, and we weren't touching any of the teachers, the pool, any of it," Robbins said, eliciting an outburst from some in the audience.

Teplesky asked for a copy of the cuts and promised district staff would review them before the April 5 budget adoption meeting. For the latest budget news, check www.spotlightnews.com.

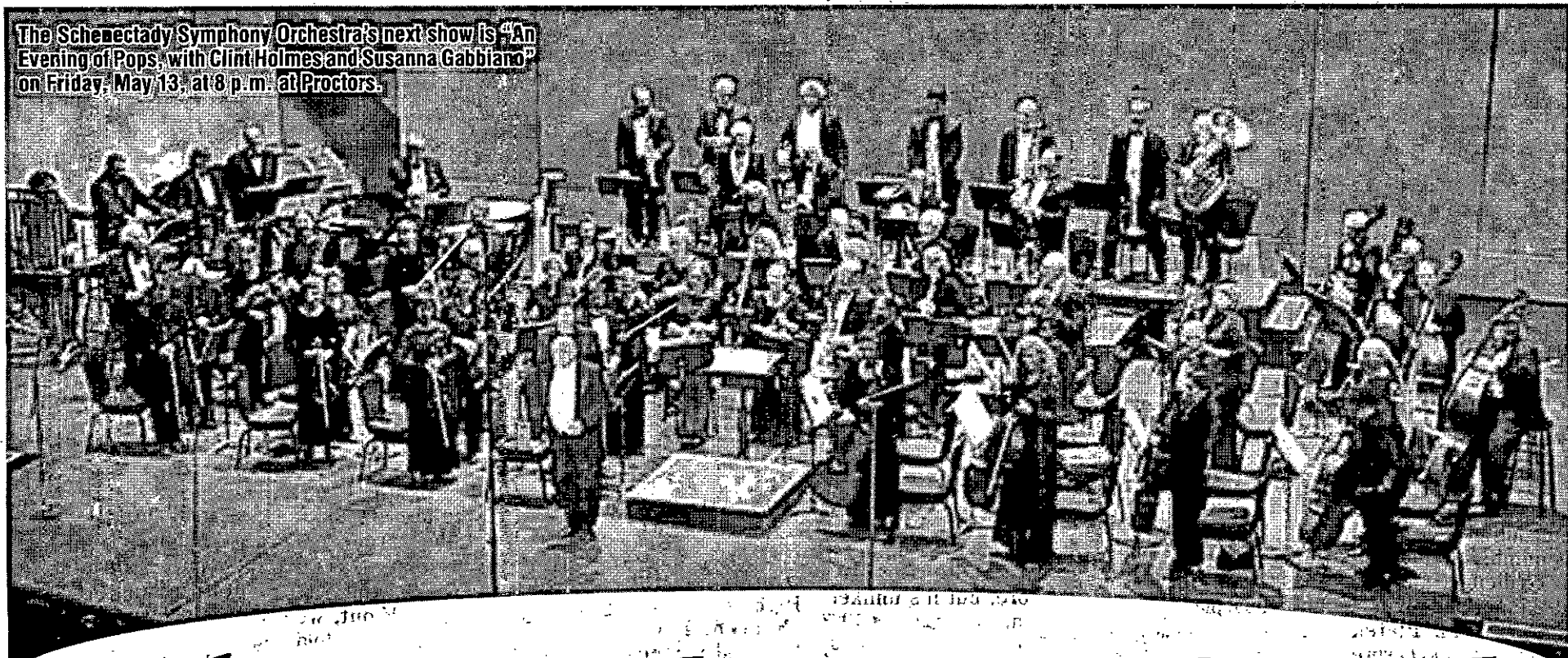

A symphony of style

Schenectady orchestra holds its annual fashion show fundraiser

The Schenectady Symphony Orchestra has sold raffle tickets. It's held garage sales.

But the biggest event, year after year, is its luncheon and fashion show.

Now entering its 53rd year, the fashion show brings in as much as \$10,000 to \$15,000. That's money that helps keep the symphony afloat even as the arts flounder elsewhere.

"It's just so important to all of us to have this symphony," said Anne Phaup-Phillips. "We can't imagine not having it."

It's been a long time since the area hasn't had the symphony. Established in 1934, the orchestra has more than 70 members, playing violin, viola, cello, bass, flute, oboe, clarinet, bassoon, horn, trumpet, trombone, tuba, harp, piano and percussion instruments.

Behind the scenes, more than 200 people make up the orchestra's fundraising arm, the League of the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra. It has its own long history, dating back to 1956.

"We all do wear many hats," Phaup-Phillips said.

Among Phaup-Phillips' duties is co-chairing the fashion show with Marie Gorman. Set for Monday, April 11, at the Glen Sanders Mansion in Scotia, the show will feature fashions from Casual Set of Stuyvesant Plaza. Members of the league will be the models: Betty Carol Barlyn, Andrea Golub, Kate Koseneki, Fran Callahan,

Lanna Jensen and Joann Paulsen.

Debbie DeLuke will commentate and Mike Purcell will provide music. Rolando of La Femme will style the models' hair.

"The ladies come and enjoy seeing the fashions," said Phaup-Phillips, who added that lunch is another draw. The menu typically includes soup, salad and a main course.

The show will feature popular standards sung by Las Vegas entertainers Clint Holmes and Susanna Gabbiano. Two shows will be held on the Mainstage at Proctors: at 8 p.m. on Friday, May 13, and a matinee performance at 2 p.m. on Saturday, May 14. Proceeds will benefit Proctors and the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra.

at base of bush and tree

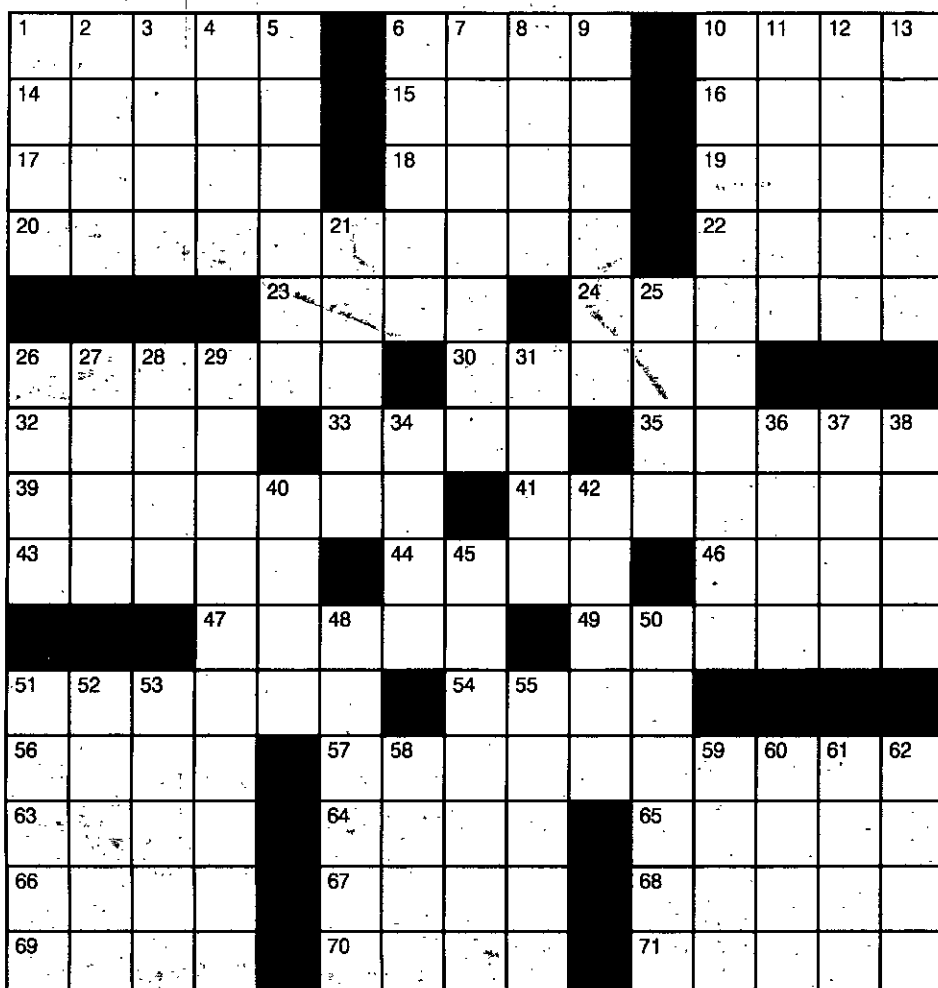
nevermind so recent

How to avoid the 'lottery curse'

Local lawyer weighs in with advice in light of local Mega Millions win

What would you do if you won \$1 million? How about just over \$19.1 million? That's the question seven Capital Region residents are asking themselves after splitting the \$319 million Mega Millions jackpot prize they won March 23.

The group of state workers regularly pool their \$2 and buy lottery tickets when the jackpot hits \$100 million. This time, they hit it right with a Quick Pick from a corner store in Albany, making John Hilton, 57, of North Greenbush; Gabrielle Mahar, 29, of Colonie; John Kutey, 54, of Green Island; Tracy Sussman, 41, of Colonie; Mike Barth, 63, of Bethlehem; Kristin Baldwin, 42, of Clifton Park; and Leon Peck, 62, of Johnstown, overnight millionaires.

While their immediate plans seem tame—Mahar wants a dishwasher, Barth wants new tires and to fund his son's college education, Hilton wants to fly first class and Kutey wants to take his wife to every Disney Park around—the "lottery curse" can strike in the blink of an eye.

Jim LeBrou, an estate planning attorney with a financial planning background, said the lucky seven can take several simple steps to ensure their newfound wealth remains intact in the long-run.

"There are horror stories about lottery winners and all the tragedies that they have ... they wind up broke, filing for bankruptcy or completely broke or a lot of other problems," said LeBrou, who works at Tully, Rinckey and Associates, PLLC.

LeBrou said striking it rich out of nowhere can be understandably confusing. Most lottery winners are of average or below average

wealth, so they've never had to deal with lots of money. That, coupled with no professional financial background and family and friends chirping advice in their ear, can make for a dangerous outcome.

"They listen to bad advice, that's the No. 1 one thing they do. No. 2 is they spend a lot of money on assets that depreciate, assets that immediately as soon as you buy the item, loses value," said LeBrou.

That means buying an expensive new car (or two or three) is throwing money around on something that will lose value as soon as its driven off the lot. Buying a million dollar house (or several vacation homes) may not seem like an outrageous expense, but LeBrou said there are increased property taxes that will be "astronomical" and incredibly expensive insurance, not to mention the cost of everyday maintenance.

"It's not a one time purchase ... now you've got this ongoing expense," said LeBrou.

Most lottery winners also quit their job, meaning they must now rely on this "one-time income," said LeBrou, which can dwindle quicker than you'd expect.

The trick to avoiding those common pitfalls is having a solid team of professional advisors that can help the new millionaire handle their fortune in a smart, savvy way. LeBrou suggests getting at least one lawyer, accountant, financial planner/money manager and an insurance agent. Of those, one should act as the quarterback, or the primary guider who can take the reins.

"Someone who can understand investments and cash flow and finance," said LeBrou.

One thing this financial advisor would do is help the person understand controlled versus uncontrolled gifting. That means, instead of giving away \$10,000 to each family member or friend who asks all at once, set a more structured plan.

"That way, if things change you can stop or reduce gifting. If you do it all at once you can't get it back," said LeBrou.

Another tip a financial ringleader will give is to stay away from get rich quick schemes and to stick to more mainstream, secure investments like treasury securities from the federal government, municipal bonds or stock portfolios that track Fortune 500 companies.

"If you're going to get a bit risky and play with the money, put a max cap of 2 percent or 5 percent that you can use," said LeBrou. "For the average person who wins, you've won the game, the fourth quarter ended. Get off the field and don't come back and play overtime because if you do that and start investing in risky things, you may end up losing the game after you were winning."

LeBrou said if the seven lottery winners invest their money in a conservative portfolio between stocks and bonds at a 4 percent rate of return each year with a lump sum of \$15 million, that would mean they'd have \$600,000 a year to live off of.

"Can you live on \$600,000 a year? And of that, are you going to spend it all or keep getting I piled back into an overall account? It's really about how you go about it," said LeBrou.

So, staying rich can be done quite simply. The question is, will the seven millionaires prevail?

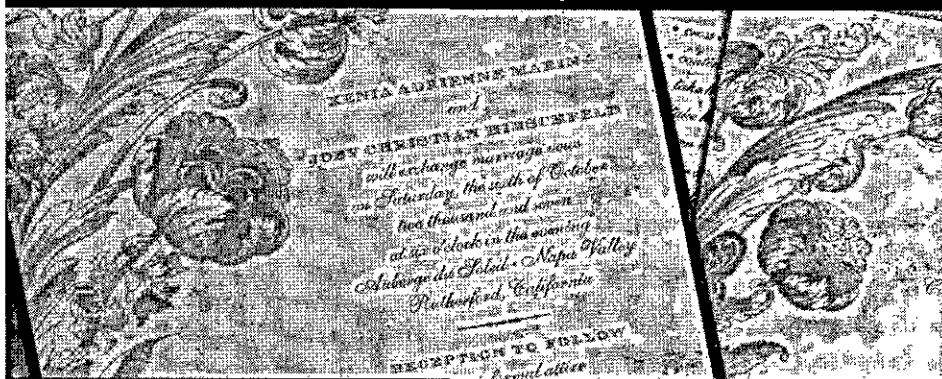

got to make the choice of whether to jump or to let the lion eat you, and this is a case where I think we have to jump."

The district conducted an internal feasibility study earlier this year that lays out enrollment projections, cost savings estimates and other statistics associated with downsizing facilities. Later in the evening, the board approved acquiring a broker to investigate selling the district offices in Delmar, another possibility raised in the report.

The district offices were assessed at \$670,000 in 2009.

The topic of the district's facilities has been under discussion for months now, since a fiscal "think tank" raised the topic of closing a school and/or the district offices. The discourse has ramped up in intensity in recent weeks as the process narrowed in on Clarksville.

There have been two well-attended public forums and district officials said a mountain of mail has materialized. Signs in yards and by the roadside have popped up urging that Clarksville stay open. Emotions have run high on occasion.

Despite the topic under consideration, the audience packed into the BC Middle School auditorium Wednesday was largely decorous. There was a brief period of public comment before discussions, and during that time, New Scotland Councilman Douglas LaGrange read a letter from Assemblyman



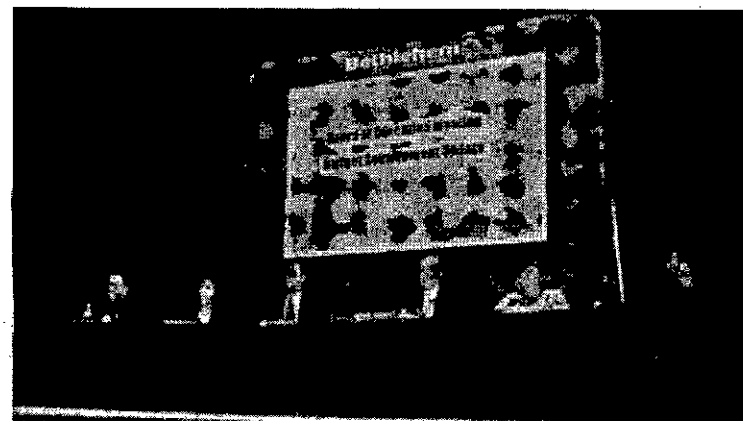

John McEneny supporting keeping the school open for many of the reasons community advocates have been raising.

In the letter, the school was described as a "vital community resource."

"In a world of centralized education, it provides a small school atmosphere with the



advantages of a modern school district," LaGrange read.

It is Clarksville's size that was cited by administrators as a reason for its closure, though. With just over 200 students, there would have likely been nine class sections across six grades next year, one of them a multiage classroom. That

model of teaching has proved controversial to some Clarksville parents in the past.

That forces the district to spend a disproportional amount of resources running the school, said school board member Matt Downey. Clarksville students will be sent to Slingerlands and Eagle elementary schools next

year, where there are empty classrooms.

"It is a wonderful school, but we have six wonderful elementary schools here," said Downey, whose children attended Clarksville. "There is capacity. Those schools aren't being fully utilized today."

This will enable the district to shed nearly five full-time teaching positions, plus staff and administrative jobs, for a one-time savings of about \$800,000. There will also be operational savings of about \$80,000 from mothballing the school, though some in the community have questioned the district's maintenance figures.

The pipes in the school will be drained and the heat will be shut off. Measures will be taken to prevent deterioration and the school can be reopened should enrollment turn back around, officials said.

Throughout its discussion, the board defended a 2003 decision to build Eagle Elementary. Back then, enrollment was projected to keep rising but a recession and housing slowdown have seen growth stalled throughout the region.

"I could sit here and say maybe we could have done things differently...however the facts and information we had at the time warranted the decisions I and the other board members made then," said Lenhardt.

The district has drawn up new draft enrollment boundaries for Slingerlands and Eagle, with the final zones to be set mid-April. There will be open houses at those two schools for Clarksville Elementary families.

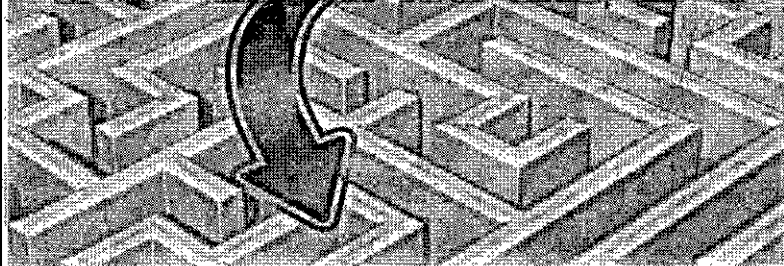

but it would also not surprise me if someone beat the Lady Dutch. That's how strong the Suburban Council is this season.

• In the college women's lacrosse world, the University at Albany continues to raise its national profile.

With wins over Boston College and Stony Brook last week, the Great Danes now own a 9-0 record and are the No. 7-ranked team in the country according to the latest media poll. That is the best start and the highest national ranking in the program's Division I history.

Hopefully, this is a streak that will keep going for UAlbany and carry the Great Danes into more uncharted waters – perhaps a top-five ranking.

• If there is a direct correlation between a hockey team's record and how many penalty minutes that team has amassed, then the Albany Devils would be a prime example of why self discipline is important.

Entering the final four games of the season, the Devils own a 32-39-14 record, good for seventh

place in the AHL's eight-team East Division. But when it comes to penalty minutes, the Devils are No. 1 in the league with 1,835.

How insane is that last number? The closest AHL team to Albany in total penalty minutes is the Connecticut Whale (aka the former Hartford Wolfpack) with 1,682 minutes. That is still more than 100 minutes less than the Devils. Ironically, Connecticut is in third place in the Atlantic Division and should make the Calder Cup playoffs.

Even NHL teams don't commit as many penalties as Albany. The worst team in the NHL in terms of discipline – the New York Islanders – has only amassed 1,419 penalty minutes. By comparison, the Islanders have shown incredible restraint (just don't ask the Pittsburgh Penguins or the New York Rangers to agree with that statement).

Would Albany have done better this season if it didn't have to kill off so many penalties? Possibly. More than half of the 16 teams headed to the AHL playoffs have between 970 and 1,300 penalty minutes – not exactly saintly, but certainly in control by AHL standards. Certainly, you can see a trend where the teams that stay disciplined have more

success than the ones that pile up time in the penalty box.

Hopefully, the Devils decide to embrace a more disciplined approach to next season. It might result in a playoff appearance.

• I'm not surprised that Dennis Rodman was elected into the National Basketball Hall of Fame. The man could defend and rebound better than most NBA players, and he had the guts to paint his hair in patterns that you'd find in most modern art museums.

The interesting thing come induction day won't be what Rodman says during his acceptance speech, but what he wears to the ceremony. Maybe he'll pull that wedding dress out of his closet for the occasion. As my nephew Jeremy would say, that would be awesome.

• Finally, I would like to thank Mother Nature for the ridiculous weather swing during last Friday's Suburban Council boys lacrosse opener between Shaker and Colonie at Union College. It went from a spring rain shower to an Arctic-cold winter blast in the course of 48 game minutes.

I hope the weather makes up its mind that it is spring before we see a snowstorm in the middle of May.

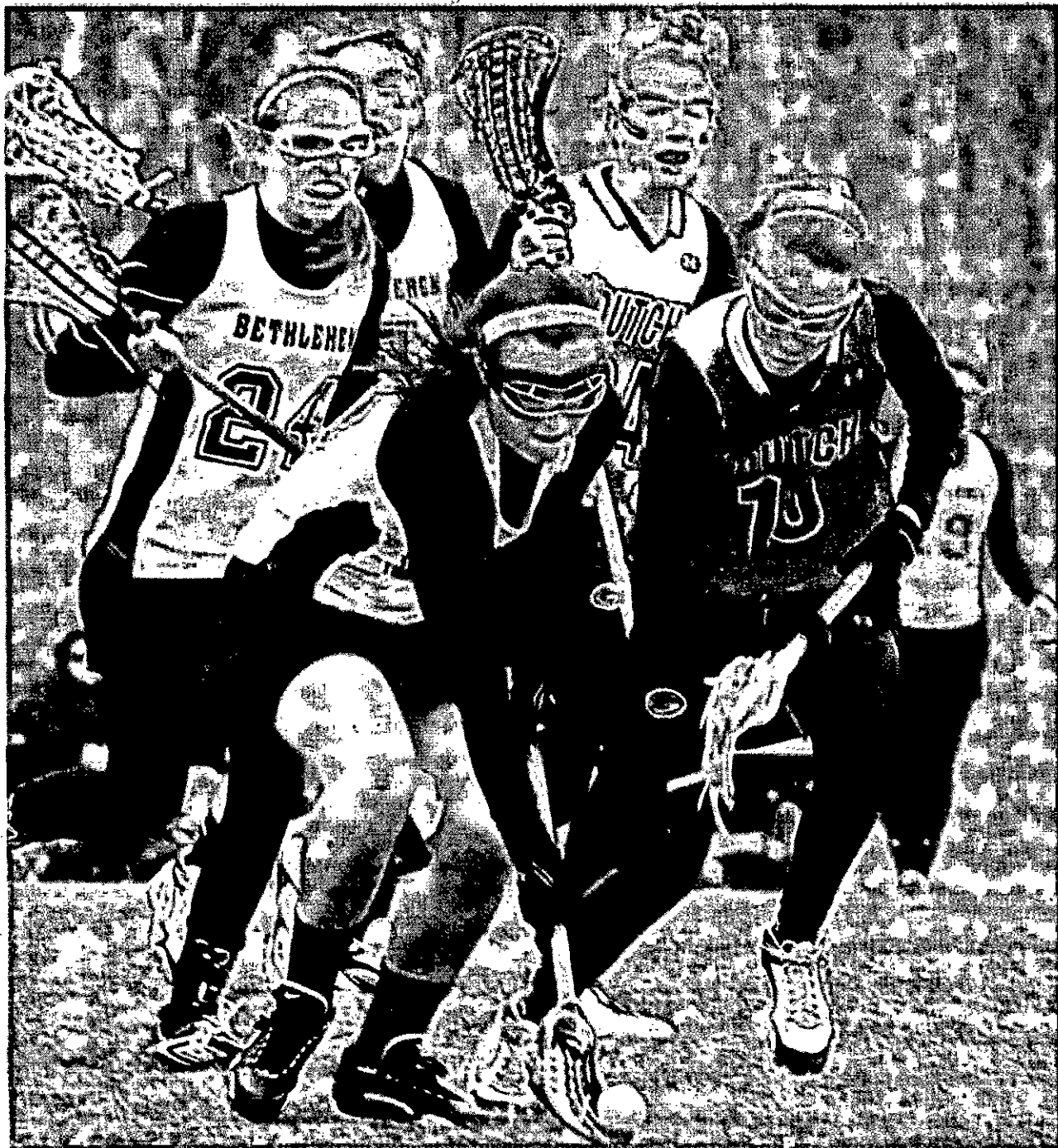

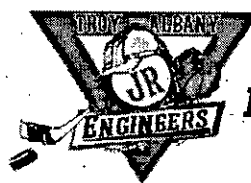

Here is a scary thought for the rest of the Suburban Council:

The Guilderland girls lacrosse team has scored 35 goals in its first two games, and the Lady Dutch aren't at full strength yet.

Guilderland has been scoring goals in bunches without junior attacker Kelly Camardo, who suffered a leg injury prior to the start of the season.

"I think when Kelly comes back, that's going to be a big boost for us," said Chatnik.

The defense has also been solid for Guilderland, even though Fayetteville-Manlius found the net 14 times. Junior goaltender Jessica Madsen had seven saves to help the Lady Dutch hold on for the win.

"I think Jess is the top goalie in the area, and she hasn't let us down yet," said Chatnik. "The goals she gave up were point-blank shots."

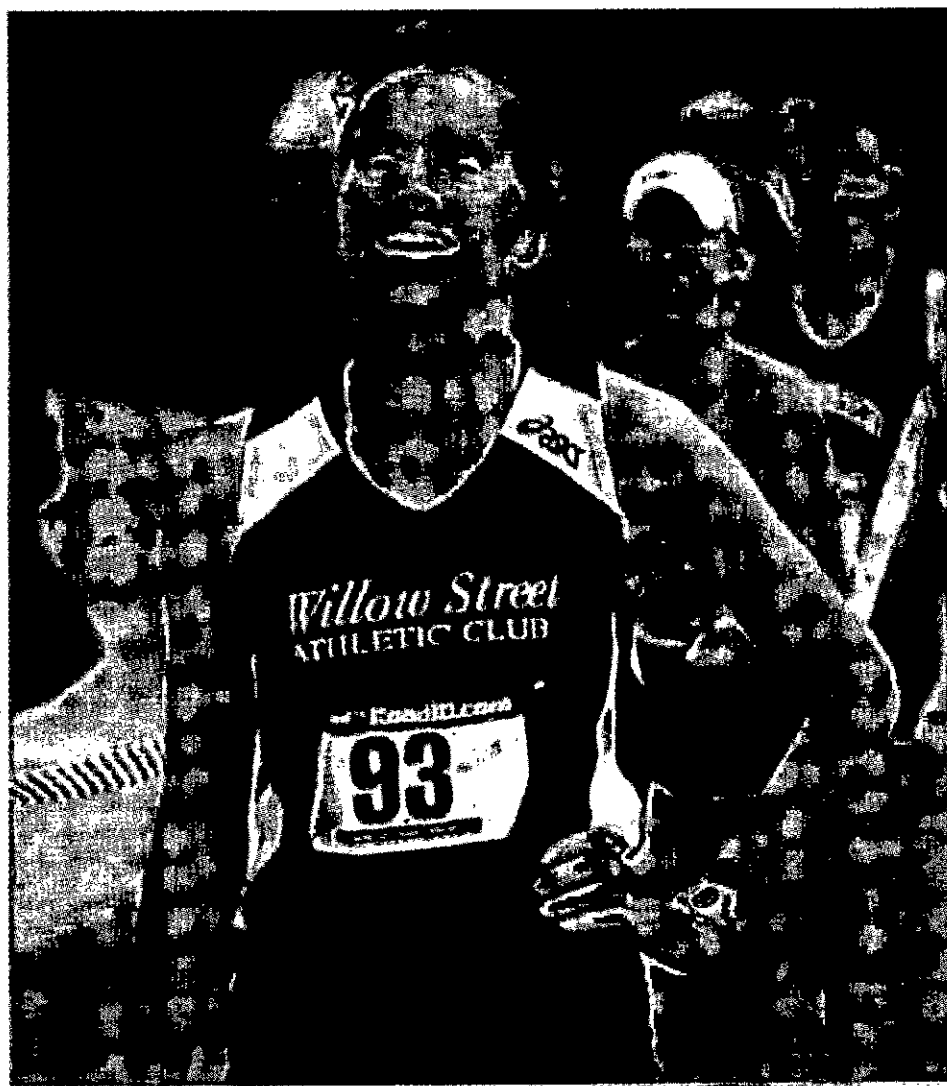
Two area veteran runners headline this year's Delmar Dash.
