Delmar man reflects on battle 69 years ago

Adolph 'A.J.' Krenn enlisted in Navy when he was 18

In the spring of 1943, one of the most unusual and yet little-publicized battles of World War II occurred near the former Soviet territory of the Aleutian Islands.

On the morning of March 27 in the northern area of the Pacific Ocean, the heavy cruiser Salt Lake City was commanded on a mission to escort a light cruiser and four destroyer ships to stop Japanese vessels from providing supplies to one of their bases in the Aleutian Islands of Alaska. The result of the blockade was the Battle of the Komandorski Islands, one of the longest naval battles of the war.

On the 69th anniversary of the battle, one Delmar resident told his experiences of being on the Salt Lake City.

"I don't know how many battles I was in, but I was in almost every naval battle of the war except the Battle of Midway and those in the Philippines," said Adolph "A.J." Krenn, now 89 years old.

Group to look at town plan

In an evening spent tackling perennial issues, board also sets fund balance policy

Officials in the Town of Bethlehem discussed and ultimately moved forward several items that have long been on the agendas of Town Board members, or at least the subject of past debate.

The Wednesday, March 28, Town Board meeting saw votes that established a fund balance policy and will lead to the formation of a Comprehensive Plan Assessment Committee.

The latter action sets off the first formal review of the town's Comprehensive Plan to be undertaken in five years. In the 2011 elections, virtually every candidate spoke to the necessity of revisiting the 2005 document, and those thoughts were reiterated on Wednesday.

"It's something I think that we've all discussed as desirable," said Supervisor John Clarkson.

"I was on the board when we adopted the Comprehensive Plan, and I think it's time for a review," said Councilman George Lenhardt.

The committee to be convened differs from advisory groups the town has formed in the past in that there will be two bodies — a "core" committee consisting of town staff and representatives and a "community focus panel" made up of community stakeholders.

State Museum art event is a fundraiser for local food pantry

Once a year, architects, engineers and students across the country forgo the usual building materials to create structures out of cans. From April 5 to 26, the New York State Museum will house its own floor of can sculptures for the Capital District's second Canstruction event.

Canstruction, a notfor-profit organization committed to ending hunger, challenges designers to take canned food and make a structural masterpiece. The public can see every sculpture in exchange for a canned item. Last year was the first locally held event but it's been taking place in cities like New York City and Boston since 1992.

"We were shocked in a good way at the response and how well it did," said Kira Pogge, media and communications

coordinator for EYP This year, it's grown to Architecture and 13 teams and will run for Engineering.

Architects from EYP were the driving force behind bringing Canstruction to Albany. Kelly Donahue, a board member, said EYP was inspired by feedback from teams who had participated in other locations.

"Hearing from our rewarding process this is to create these really challenging structures that are so unique and raise design visibility to the community and put a spotlight on hunger seemed like a really good opportunity to bring something like that to the Capital Region," said Donahue.

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Watch your (and your neighbor's) garden grow

Capital District Community Gardens offers plots, community spirit

As warm weather approaches, local gardeners will be hard at work preparing their plots for the coming growing season. But for those with yards that lack the proper conditions for growing or those without yards at all, gardening can be a tough hobby.

The Capital District Community Gardens may be able to help. This spring, there are plots available for residents of Bethlehem and the surrounding area to garden in the Normanskill Farm Community Garden on Mill Road. The gardens are "designed to improve public health and increase access to fresh, affordable food."

"We do have a very high rate of returning gardeners year after year, so this unique for us to have such a larger amount of space available," said the program's Executive Director Amy Klein. "But this is a great opportunity for people who we have

had to turn away in past years. We're excited to welcome new people and people new to gardening."

Klein said the organization was started in 1975 to help provide fresh fruits and vegetables to the residents of Albany, Rensselaer and Schenectady Counties.

"The concept of community gardens really harkens back to victory gardens started during World War II," she said. "It also gives people a sense of pride to grow their own

The not for profit now services 46 community gardens throughout the Capital District and has eight programs to help beautify the communities and fight hunger.

The Normanskill Farm Community Garden is a two-acre site near the Grace Cemetery nature trails. The original site was started around 1997, but it was moved after being ruined in the landslide in 2000. This year, there are about 35 plots available at

Perry Smith of Heather Lane in Delmar has been gardening in a plot at the Normanskill Farm Community Garden for nearly seven years. He said gardening at a community site is attractive because of the location and the socializing aspects.

"People in Delmar know the deer eat everything and it is really shady so it's hard to grow," he said. "There's a big fence around the garden and the plots are large so you can grow things like corn. ... Most people can't do that in their little yards."

Smith said the gardeners at Normanskill are like a big family who help each other with problems and even share crops on occasion.

"You can walk up to almost anyone and ask for tips. It's a community so people are very open to sharing," he said. Everyone is very nice and it's a supportive environment to learn to garden in.'

Klein said there are programs and materials available through the organization to help new gardeners and staff members are always on hand if someone has questions.

For the upcoming season, nine classes are scheduled for "The Know to Grow" Garden Education series, which focuses on organic

practices, and there are five classes planned for "The Homemade Series," which develops culinary and canning skills for harvest management. Fifteen classes are scheduled for "The Demo Series," which concentrates on technical skills like weed management.

Those who would like to secure a plot for this season will need to attend a one-hour orientation session to learn how the community garden works and place a minimum \$30 donation. Nobody who is interested in a plot is turned away because of an inability to pay, though.

"We'll work with someone to se what they can afford to donate, or if other people can afford to donate more then that money will go towards someone's plot who is in need," said Klein.

Those who choose to garden through the organization will join about 4,000 other people in the Capital District. The hope is to educate people on the benefits of healthy eating in a social setting.

"This way you get the added benefit to interact with people from different backgrounds and cultures that you might not encounter in everyday life," said Klein.

Bethlehem man found guilty of sexual assault

A Bethlehem man was found guilty of attempted rape for engaging in criminal sexual activities with a minor in his home for more than a year.

According to the Albany County District Attorney's Office, Vincent Cassala, 50, was found guilty after a trial by jury.

"This offender was held accountable by the guilty verdicts returned today and now the victim can begin the journey from victim to survivor," said Albany County District Attorney David Soares.

Cassala was found guilty of one count of attempted rape in the first degree, two counts of criminal sexual acts in the first degree and two counts of criminal sexual acts in the third degree, all felonies. He was also charged with one count of attempted rape in the third degree and two counts of endangering the welfare of a child, all misdemeanors.

Cassala was remanded to Albany County jail and faces up to 65 years in state prison when sentenced on May 16.

Police said Kennedy and her boyfriend, Ivan Hempstead, who was also arrested, charged more than \$9,000 to Kennedy's mother's credit card and cashed close to \$4,000 in checks from her bank account to buy crack cocaine.

Hempstead, 37, of 504 Third Ave. in Watervliet, was arrested and charged in February with petit larceny, criminal possession of stolen property in the fourth and fifth degrees and possession of a forged instrument in the second degree, according to police.

Kennedy a n d Hempstead allegedly used the credit card to buy gift cards and then sell them on the street for the half value and used the credit card to purchase gas at local gas stations for other customers in return for cash, according to police. Kennedy and Hempstead also used cash from credit card purchases and bank withdrawals to purchase crack cocaine, said police.

Kennedy's mother initially notified police last December when she discovered through her credit card company that someone had made \$9.667 worth of charges on her credit card without her knowledge and then discovered almost \$4,000 had been withdrawn from her bank account through

cashed checks in November and December, said police.

Kennedy lived with her mother at the time that the thefts occurred and initially fled the area, and arrested when she returned to her mother's home, police said.

Police said additional charges are expected.

My father told me to drink ginger ale and offered to come and sit with me (I told him to stay in his own apartment, thank you). Rachel brought me ginger ale and toast and books to read. at me while I rant. And then I have an out-of-body experience where I am watching the whole scene and a voice inside my head is telling me to shut up, but the ranting continues because the control freak side of me has to have the last word. The result is I have caused stress for my daughter and myself.

My own mother didn't stress me out. We certainly argued at times and as a teenager I felt some of the decisions she made were "not fair,"

but I don't remember her ever nagging me. If she walked into the house from running errands and I had music blasting from the stereo she used to yell "TURN THAT DOWN!!" But I don't recall her saving things like "Do your homework" or "Clean your room." Maybe she didn't nag about homework because I was super self motivated (read: hyper to get an "A"). But I certainly didn't keep my room clean.

It's possible that she didn't nag me because I was the third child and she had used up her nagging energy on my older sister and brother. Or maybe by the time I came along she saw things from a different perspective.

Sticking to our guns

It's long been a news business cliché that if it bleeds, it leads.

A cursory look at most newscasts will confirm this suspicion. Taking a glance at the metro page of most daily papers will give you a similar perspective.

Reporting on crime is an important part of any newsgathering organization. And we can say both anecdotally and with hard evidence that such stories rightfully garner a lot of public

attention. But in the changing world of the newspaper industry, the art of drumming up attention is receiving more attention than the news itself.

Editorial

There is a lot of talk in the news business about search engine

optimization, writing for the attention span of today's Internet user and studying things like "click throughs," "bounce rates" and "engagement."

That's all quite well and good, but we've never been a publication that's bent our coverage to fit into trends or chased a story in the name of pageviews. And we find our readers like that.

That can't be said for everyone. In the past few years, it's become customary for top 10 roundups of year's top stories to be accompanied by a list of the top most-read (or most popular) stories. Those results speak volumes about human nature.

In general, big impact stories like the death of Osama bin Laden and the earthquake in Japan dominated the news for most major outlets last year. But once you get past those, you'd be surprised (or maybe not) at what passes for public interest.

In 2011, abcnews.com's most popular story of the year was a list of the top 50 most Googled female celebrities (we'll note there's a handy link to a gallery of "Celebrity Beach Bods" right after the lede).

The story that was shared on Facebook the third most often last year (after the Japan disaster and an op-ed on teachers) was the earth-shattering exposé on how zodiac signs aren't shifting. That's followed by another op-ed entitled "Parents, don't dress your girls like tramps."

Even politics is not safe. On Slate, which is considered a fairly hip magazine that does a lot of political coverage and commentary, the most popular political story in 2011 was not on geopolitical issues, the Occupy movement or the debt crisis, but was an article examining whether another publication's cover art of Michele Bachmann was sexist.

And as usual, when it comes to what people are looking for on the web, Japan and Osama were both beaten out in overall searches by "American Idol," "Kim Kardashian" and "Lindsay Lohan," among other famous faces.

All of this is not intended to be simply a treatise on the state of the public conversation in this country. What's interesting is that when we sat down and put together data from the past 12 months, we found our readers buck the trend. Along with our crime coverage and breaking news items were stories about local politics, sports and human interest.

While we're putting a lot of effort into our online presence and making sure spotlightnews.com is with the times, what we're finding is when it comes to local news and our readers there's no need to play to the lowest common denominator. And we think that's swell.

So as our staff members congratulate one another on a great showing at the annual New York Press Association awards, we'd like to extend our thanks to you, the reader. Thank you for reading, and moreover thank you for taking an interest in your community.

No excuses for test score policy

If there is one thing that former school chancellors Joel Klein and Michelle Rhee, former President George W. Bush, and the current Secretary of Education, Arne Duncan can all agree on, it is a "No Excuses" policy for all public schools with low test scores.

These reformers believe without exception, that all children can achieve academic proficiency. And if the children fail, these officials also believe that someone needs to be held accountable. It is definitely someone's fault. Who? You know who. Teachers. Forget about the fact that district leadership and elected officials determine school funding, class size, and the allocation of resources.

The whole complicated issue involving the poor economy, the loss of jobs and the growing poverty in our country is on the shoulders of teachers. They are to blame. Regardless of experience, seniority, or even due process, we have to get rid of those evil teachers lurking in our hallways and our educational system will be healed. Well then, we need to identify these bad apples, but how? Once again, you already know the answer. Our prescription to any educational woe... testing!

The formula is simple. Students tested, students fail,

teacher fired! The reformers do not see how absurd it is to evaluate a teacher's dedication and instructional performance on the basis of a multiple choice test given on one day of a school year. Testing can be useful in measuring growth and identifying learning disabilities, but in and of itself, testing will never help us to reach that high goal of proficiency for all.

There is an answer but you won't hear it from officials in control of our educational policies, because quite frankly, they just don't get it. The authentic answer lies within the sanctity of the relationship between teacher and student. A teacher does more than impart knowledge; a teacher inspires, gives the student belief in self, and opens up the world of possibilities for a future yet unknown. Pray tell how do you assign a number to that?

Older adults have the right to live as independently as possible with dignity in their homes and community with appropriate support services. Cost effective and preventative programs such as

home-delivered meals, companion programs, senior transportation, inhome services, adult day care, caregiver support services and congregate programs are the underpinning in the long term care solution both locally and nationally.

I commend and appreciate the legislature's commitment and efforts to provide our most vulnerable residents with the very best quality of care in the very best and progressive nursing home possible. However, I urge the

legislature to carefully consider and invest in the proven cost effective and preventative benefits of funding community based services to our elderly Albany County residents in need of these vital services. Working together we can plan for and meet the needs of present and future older residents and reduce or delay the need for this more expensive model of long term care.

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



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BC's budget situation frustrates parents

Gifted programs, teachers, librarians would be cut to meet tax cap

After its latest meeting on Wednesday, March 28, the Bethlehem Central school board released the last of the budget cuts proposed by the district for the 2012-2013 school year. This final round focused on instructional programs and technology throughout all of the district's seven schools.

Bethlehem Central is facing a \$4.2 million budget gap for the coming school year, a figure that take into account plans to use \$1.75 million from reserves and raise taxes 2.94 percent, the maximum allowed by the state tax cap. The figures do not reflect any extra state aid that the district could receive.

Because of skepticism that the state will provide further aid. the district will use the last of its reserves to fund the coming school year. Superintendent Thomas Douglas and other school officials have been stressing the actual budget gap is \$7.7 million.

"This district is considered wealthy," said Douglas. "This year, that wealth hurt the district because the funding was shifted to less-wealthy districts across the state. Therefore, our gap grew more."

School officials said the option of challenging the levy limit is still on the table, but input is needed from more members of the community. If the district puts forward a tax increase above the tax cap, then at least 60 percent of voters would

have to approve it.

According to Chief Business and Financial Officer Judith Kehoe, for every percent the levy is raised, an additional \$570,000 would be earned through taxes. The average tax levy increase for Bethlehem Central over past 10 years is 4.93 percent.

At the meeting, Douglas said parents should keep in mind that the proposed cuts to instruction and technology represent only a quarter of the total budget.

"But it is probably the most meaningful because it is the mission of the district and that is education," he said.

Proposed reductions to instructional programs at the elementary level included elimination of Challenge and Jumpstart programs and math academic intervention services and reducing the number of days each week students attend "specials" like music, art and physical education. Also up for consideration is the elimination of the fourth-grade strings orchestra and the loss of two classroom teachers, a reading teacher and a reduction for one librarian.

Board member Caitlin Navarro said she would hate to see the Challenge Program eliminated because it provides academic stimuli

for those elementary students who are at a more advanced level. Students have to test two grade levels above their age range to participate in the Challenge Program.

Parents at the meeting said math AIS is integral for students at the elementary level to not fall behind at an early age. Assistant Superintendent Jody Monroe said math AIS is no longer required and the state is now moving toward a less expensive Response to Intervention style with math that is less expensive and allows the child to stay in class, rather than being pulled out for the additional help.

Proposed cuts to the middle and high school instructional programs include eliminating or phasing out the Chinese language program, eliminating two librarian positions and reducing the number of sections offered in some core classes, which would lead to larger class sizes. Some electives would also need a larger interest in order for them to run.

Sal DeAngelo, the chief technology officer for the district, said \$79,000 could be saved by reducing printing and BOCES services, delaying the replacement of equipment and reducing the hours of a computer technician.

Douglas has repeatedly stated that without challenging the levy limit, the district would need to enact on priority one, two and three cuts to close the budget gap. All of the priority lists can now be viewed on the district's website.

Parents expressed frustration over what the cuts would do to Bethlehem's reputation of providing a quality education, and many said the reason they moved to Bethlehem was its school system.

Tara O'Keeffe, a mother of two students in Slingerlands Elementary, said she feels a sense of hopelessness listening to all of the proposed

Tanya Choppy said she felt the district could save additional money if it would close another elementary school. This year, the district shuttered Clarksville.

"Looking at the enrollment numbers and the fact that Eagle and Slingerlands it looks like

is going to have 460 to 480 students, if you close another school you could have four schools within that same range," she said.

Other parents were angered by what they said was a lack of cooperation from teachers, staff and their unions to take pay cuts in trying times, and noted salaries and benefits make up the largest chunk of the budget.

Parent Mandy Fallon said she appreciated that Bethlehem's teachers were the first in the state to make concessions in the past, but the same thing needs to happen this year.

"I guess I feel a little remiss that I've been sitting here tonight without some significant give from the teachers," said Jim Devine. "I would ask once again that the teachers and the union step up to the plate on behalf of our children as they always have.'

The school board told parents it is currently in contract negotiations and could not comment on whether teachers and staff would seek their step raises for the coming year. The next budget

workshop will be held on Tuesday, April 3, and include a recap of the entire budget proposal. The school board is scheduled to vote on the budget on Monday, April 23. The community will vote on the budget in May.

Lockbox not a lock in Bethlehem

Receiver of taxes speaks against automated payment collection

Bethlehem Town Board members listened to arguments for adopting an automated bill payment processing system on Wednesday, March 28, but will be taking more time to review the proposal before making a decision on using a Lockbox system.

Lockbox is something many people already use, though they might not realize it. In this instance KeyBank offers the service. The bank would pick up payment checks mailed to a P.O. Box, open them, scan the checks, make the deposits and electronically deliver the information to the town.

The proposal on the table is to use Lockbox for water and sewer payments, 70 percent of which are made by mail. At this time, Receiver of Taxes Nancy Mendick transports the checks to KevBank for deposit after they've been processed at Town Hall.

The benefits, said Comptroller Michael Cohen, include the fact deposits would land in the bank at least a day faster and some labor would be taken off of the receiver's office, where there are three full-time employees.

Using Lockbox wouldn't cost the town anything, said Cohen, because KeyBank offers it as a service paid for by credits the town accumulates via non-interest-bearing accounts. In 2011, \$32,000 worth of credits expired because they were not used, and the total annual cost for using Lockbox is \$24,450. The town would be able to stop use of the service at any time without penalty.

The town has relationships with six different banks.

Mendick stood at the start of the meeting to voice her concerns about the Lockbox system. She said after speaking with other receivers she's troubled about exactly how accurate the system would be.

She related her own experience, saying on one occasion a resident mailed an insurance payment of \$50 into the town instead of a tax payment of \$3,500, having mixed up the envelopes. While Mendick caught the error, the insurance company's Lockbox service cashed the \$3,500 check despite

the fact it was made out to the town, tying up that money.

"As you can imagine, this taxpayer was not happy with the insurance company's Lockbox system," Mendick said.

Cohen said in its review, the town contacted officials in the City of Albany and Rensselaer County, both of which use Lockbox, and received glowing comments about the system's ease of use and accuracy.

Cohen added the optical character recognition technology used by Lockbox has become much better in recent times, and said the town would be able to set rules for the handling of checks so that any payment with a possible discrepancy would be sent to the Receiver's office to be processed.

"I think a lot of Nancy's concerns may be stemming from older issues years ago," he said.

Any cost savings to the town were not discussed in detail, though if staff spends less time processing payments there would potentially be staffing implications. Supervisor John Clarkson said he is opposed to making any layoffs but shrinking staff through attrition is definitely on the table.

"We're not saying we're going to make any reductions in staff now ... but it is a major workflow reducer," he said of Lockbox.

Clarkson expressed his support for the system, but other board members were less enthused. Councilman Kyle Kotary said he'd like to hear more testimonials from other municipalities and also wondered at the size of the benefit to the town.

"What is the real savings to the town? A credit is a credit," he said.

After the meeting, Mendick said she is still opposed to the Lockbox system, but if the Town Board decides to adopt it she would work with that decision.

"I like the way our office is now, I think we offer good service and I'd like to continue it," she said.

Storytelling fest marks 10 years

Event will span six days, multiple venues

Libraries are always filled with storytellers; shelves upon shelves of books bear their names on the binding and their words inked within.

But for a week in April, storytellers themselves will take over libraries in Albany and Rensselaer counties for the 10th Riverway Storytelling Festival.

"I wanted to captivate people with the art of storytelling and bring them to their public libraries where stories reside in all kinds of formats," said Mary Fellows of the Upper Hudson Library System and a founder of the festival.

Fellows had just moved to the Capital District 10 years ago and was eager for new "cultural opportunities" to explore when the festival idea first started festering.

"I noticed there wasn't a big storytelling festival so it seemed like it was something we could use," said Fellows.

The first year's event lasted three days and now the festival spans six.

"The first year was during the worst ice storm the Capital Region had had in years, which allowed us to learn, to fail, and to learn," said Fellows, organizers blamed the attendees tell their favorite terrorizing weather for poor attendance.

Now, the festival draws regulars and impacts new listeners of all ages.

"We get terrific comments. We collect testimonials at the end of every program and we've had people say this is better than a Broadway show," said Fellows. "We've had people who are 90 say that they loved every minute. had 5 year olds say that they can't wait to come back."

This year's Riverway Storytelling Festival runs from Monday, April 16, to Saturday, April 21. Events and programs vary by library location but there's something for everybody whether they're in Albany or Rensselaer.

"We have programs that are specifically family programs. ... We have some programs that are just for senior citizens and we have performances on Friday night that's really aimed at teens and adults and not something you want to take your 6-year-old to," said Fellows. "The later show Saturday evening is funny stories and really humor that's meant to speak to the experience of an adult."

On Saturday, April 21, there are afternoon programs at William K. Sanford Library in Colonie like "Passport to Adventure" that's appropriate for all ages

who admitted festival and "Story Swaps" where story in seven minutes or less. That night there's a comedy program for families and another for adults and 10th birthday festivities.

"We're going to be having a little celebration on our Friday and Saturday events," said Fellows.

The festival draws nationally and internationally acclaimed storytellers to perform alongside local ones.

Kate Dudding has performed at Riverway several times and this year will be sharing stories of people who made a difference.

"I'll be telling a story about an 11-year-old girl who, when she read about the oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico, decided she wanted to help," said Dudding. "She is an artist and has loved birds her whole life and has painted 500 watercolor paintings and done other things to raise money. So far she has raised \$200,000 and she's only 13 now."

Dudding said being part of the festival is exciting for the storytellers and their

"It brings so many storytellers together and so many listeners to this wonderful art of storytelling," said Dudding. "... The featured tellers we have coming in are extraordinary. These people are rarely in our area and well worth seeing.

The guest storytellers are David Novak, Michael Parent and Valerie Tutson.

"We always have featured storytellers ... who are professional performers and win awards and perform all over the world," said Fellows.


Dudding said the art form isn't something people regularly turn to for entertainment, which is what makes the festival so unique and important.

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

In Saratoga Springs, a call to change last call

Spa City nightlife at the root of recent discussion between bar owners, public

A near capacity audience gathered for two hours on Tuesday, March 27, at the Saratoga Springs City Hall's Music Hall at the invitation of Commissioner of Public Safety, Christian Mathiesen for a workshop entitled "Night Life in Saratoga Springs: Is it a Problem?"

Though many issues were discussed, the one that proved to be of greatest interest was a proposal to change the city's last call from 4 a.m. to 3 a.m., a proposal Mathiesen has said has his support. Neighbors to the downtown area, business owners and concerned citizens approached the microphone to voice their thoughts on the matter and some issues connected to it, like noise.

There was a similar meeting on March 7, coordinated by Lt. John Catone of the Saratoga Springs Police Department, that included bar and restaurant owners, the state department of licensing, and the Prevention Council, among others. Issues of whether or not to have bouncers certified and responsibilities of businesses that serve alcohol were brought to the table.

"We needed to address

downtown.... We put together a group of people that hadn't been done before. We all got a lot of good things out of it. We didn't address last call, that wasn't the purpose of the meeting," said Catone.

Before the public spoke at Tuesday's meeting, Mathiesen took a few minutes to share some of his own observations. Last June, he set his alarm clock for 3:10 a.m. and drove downtown to check things out for himself.

He read from his first entry into what became a diary of sorts, saying, "I can hear the crowd many blocks before I arrive at Caroline Street...there are many Saratoga Springs police, with one mounted on a horse. Also, there are three sheriff's deputy cars, one of which arrives with sirens blaring and one State Police car. It's a very large crowd of people, many intoxicated and filling the entire two blocks of Caroline Street."

Other entries from over the summer are similar, he said, and gave his accounts of witnessing altercations between patrons and police, one of which involved a riot at Club Shadow on June 26. Mathiesen noted to the audience that of the many altercations he witnessed, none were reported in newspapers, except the Club Shadow riot. Club Shadow was closed soon thereafter.

Besides the time of last call, issues like manpower in the

form of police patrol, noise generated by music, lack of cabs and revenue made in those last couple of hours before many bars close were brought up. The image of the city portrayed to tourists and convention goers was discussed as well.

"It's turned into a dangerous situation...and it needs to be addressed," said Mathiesen who called attention to the fact that although many police are present during summer months, they are not able to make a lot of arrests because they're busy keeping the crowds under control.

Assistant City Attorney Tony Izzo spoke briefly about changeable regulations, ordinances and updates to insurance requirements regarding businesses and noise in the downtown area. There has been a noise ordinance in effect in the city since 1937.

"One of the things currently most ripe for discussion is sidewalk cafes. ... Since 1975, if there have been two violations for a sidewalk cafe only, that operator will automatically revoke the license for that sidewalk cafe for a period of one year. It is proposed at this point that it be expanded to include hotels, eating and drinking establishments. It's on the table," said Izzo.

A majority of the audience was made up of restaurant and bar owners who took the opportunity to voice their

John Baker, owner of Gaffney's said that imposing an earlier closing time would likely contribute to a 15 to 20 percent reduction in work force and "hundreds of jobs being lost" among establishments that cater to the nightlife.

"At this time, according to the National Restaurant Association, restaurants had 250,000 jobs in 2011 and expect that trend to continue in 2012. Many establishments do 20 percent of their business between the 2 and 4 (a.m.) time period," said

He added that a drop in business would also lead to a drop in sales tax revenue.

Linda Crawford, a resident. said the city's nightlife is hurting its image.

"I look at it to where you're the enforcers. I love the restaurants and the bars but if you've got downtown, which you have ... you know what happens. Girls fall down on their knees on Caroline Street at 11:30 or 12 because they're so plastered. The businesses would not lose any money if you closed at 2. If you had a 2 o'clock last call and stayed open until 3, how are you going to lose money? They're just going to drink faster.'

Patrick Klimaszewski, a senior at Skidmore College and anthropology major, has chosen to examine Saratoga Springs bars for a research paper.

'Saratoga sells itself as a place with health, horses and history – yet we are also a place that offers more chances to get drunk than anywhere else in the county. We started off as a place associated with mineral water. ... I think Saratoga is confused as to what it's selling itself as. As a family town but also as a place for entertainment," said Klimaszewski.

No decisions were made at the workshop, but Mathiesen hopes to bring issues discussed at Tuesday's meeting to the City Council next month.

New lines draw GOP concerns

Republicans in southern Saratoga **County not pleased** with new districts

Newly drawn congressional districts that shift lines in Saratoga County are proving to be a boon to some, but not for others.

The others, it seems, are Republicans.

Congressional districts were redefined after the 2010 census, and New York's number of districts has dropped from 29 to 27. A federal court drafted the lines after the state Assembly and Senate were unable to complete the

Southern Saratoga sits in what is to become the most northern reaches of the 20th District. North of Saratoga Springs will be the expansive 21st reaching up

to the Canadian border. The new 20th District also encompasses areas like Albany and Schenectady and has a higher number of Democrats—and that is not sitting well with some Republican leaders.

Many Republican leaders in Saratoga County feel that this process yielded districts that are more focused at keeping officials in office, rather than representing the people.

Clifton Park GOP Committee Chairman Brian Telesh's sentiments echo what other members of his party in the county feel about how the process was carried out.

"I'm actually very, very disappointed that the Legislature just failed to do its constitutional obligation and complete this process. And now New York is kind of the laughingstock of the nation because we had to go under federal supervision to have a judge

to draw lines, similar to how the federal government needed to supervise the segregation of the South," he said.

Telesh said he's embarrassed to have New York, which he characterizes as "a trailblazer," being put in the position where Clifton Park, a suburban, rural and agricultural community, is lumped into an urban congressional district.

"There's nothing really

in common other than the population exodus from those places to come to move to places like Clifton Park," he said.

Telesh blamed both parties for the way redistricting lines fell, and said they knew this was coming and decided to "wash their hands of it."

Rep. Chris Gibson, R-Kinderhook, has represented much of Saratoga County since 2011, and will be headed to the 19th district where, if elected, he'll be representing much of the Mohawk and Hudson

Bill Smith, chairman

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

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

Presenting a fresh way to play

Clifton Park studio offers non-traditional approach for aspiring musicians

Learning a new skill isn't always easy, and that's especially true when it comes to music, which can be overwhelming when all you really want to do is belt out a tune.

One Clifton Park music studio aims to take a different approach. The Modern Day Music's Rock School Music Academy attempts to take away some of that overwhelming feeling by getting away from the traditional music lesson.

Modern Day Music opened in May of 2011, has about 250 students and is still growing. According to owner Stan Denis, there will be more locations opening in the coming months.

Modern Day Music teaches a song-based approach to learning not only rock 'n' roll, but other types of music as well. They still teach chords and scales, just in a different way.

"We opened the school to empower students, not just kids but all students, to be able to come in and learn to play the music that they love. We only teach the instruments that occur in most music: guitar, bass, drums, keyboard and singing,' said Denis.

Denis owns the school with managing partner Paul Benedetti. Denis, a businessman, was inspired to open the school by watching his 11-year-old

daughter Talia attempt to pursue her dream of becoming a pop star.

The first teachers had suggested songs from Disney movies, but Talia wanted to sing pieces by Peter Gabriel and Adele. She went along with more classical lessons for a while before trying to tailor lessons to meet what

Well, they did and through simplifying some of the songs she wanted to learn it worked out to be a much more positive experience.

Benedetti had the same experience with his son who wanted to learn drums, and since the two had already been business partners in the past it made sense to embark on a new adventure that would benefit their children and others who were also passionate but discouraged about learning music.

"We use what we call a song-based approach. What that means is that we'll have a student come in who wants to play guitar. The very first thing we ask them is, 'Who is your favorite artist?' A lot of the girls will want to learn something by Taylor Swift so we'll teach them a very simplified version of a Taylor Swift song," said

"She wanted to learn the songs she was hearing

on the radio. We went to Modern Day Music's open house and she signed up for lessons the very next week and has absolutely loved it. She takes one on one coaching instruction and is now part of the newly formed rock school band. ... She learned how to personalize a song, it's been a totally different experience," said Clough.

Tunes from Lady Ga Ga and Adele are popular with Ann and her band at the moment.

"There's a lot more freedom, I can learn whatever I want and everyone is going to help me learn how to play it," said Ann.

She added that learning music helps her to concentrate in school as well. She spends about three hours a week practicing outside of her Modern Day Music lessons.





Krenn, originally from Hamden, Conn., volunteered to enter the Navy at the age of 18 in October of 1940.

"I was of draft age, you see, and I figured I could not picture myself jumping into fox holes, so I volunteered with the Navy for six years," he said.

After training, he was assigned to the USS West Virginia, a battleship with the home port of Long Beach, Calif. He was there one year, until the ship's home port was transferred to Pearl Harbor. "Things were heating up by that point with the Japanese," he said.

On Dec. 7, 1941, the day of the attack on Pearl Harbor, Krenn was aboard the ship at his station when it was struck by a torpedo. He was blown overboard and for a minute was in a daze, before he could

swim to Ford Island. The battleship was struck by six torpedoes in all.

"Luckily I was close enough to land to be able to swim and then crawl to reach an airfield," he said.

He stayed at Pearl Harbor for a few weeks on guard duty while rescue and clean up occurred, then he was asked by a petty officer if anyone wanted shore duty in Salt Lake City. Looking back, with the country now at war, Krenn said he wished he had been a little more skeptical.

He collected all of the possessions he owned quickly into a bucket, got into a launch with the rest of the volunteers and sure enough, was taken right to the Salt Lake City, floating in the middle of the harbor.

"I asked, 'That's our shore duty?" said Krenn. "He (the petty officer) said, 'Yep.' I could have shot him right then and there."

Krenn said it was hard to adjust from the life aboard an orderly battleship during peacetime to that in a heavy cruiser during wartime. He was extremely unhappy with his decision, not believing that he could possibly be aboard a U.S. Navy vessel.

"It was like going from two extremes," he said.

He would stay with the Salt Lake City for the next two years of his naval career. The first real action he saw after Pearl Harbor was after his ship picked up Marines in Wellington. New Zealand for the Battle of Guadalcanal in the Solomon Islands in November of 1942.

"That was night action, and oh boy was that scary," he said.

The Salt Lake City was then transferred to Alaska, when in March of 1943 it was given orders to escort four destroyers and a light cruiser to stop Japanese supplies from reaching a base in the Aleutians.

An article in the

Saturday Evening Post by John Bishop titled "My Speed Zero," called the battle "one of the strangest sea engagements ever fought."

"We had been ordered to intercept any Japanese ships going to Kiska, because they had established a foothold there," said Krenn. "It was the longest battle in United States Naval history. It lasted threeand-a-half hours and there were no aircraft involved."

As the four American destroyers and two cruisers formed what is called a 'scouting line" to form a blockade, two Japanese transports were spotted with destroyer escorts. American ships then turned in attempts to cut off the line of retreat for the ships, but more Japanese were then spotted coming for the east. In total, the Japanese had two heavy cruisers, two light cruisers and four destroyers.

"They got off a couple

shots and one caught our main fuel line so we were stuck," said Krenn.

In actuality, salt water had entered the vessel and extinguished the boilers aboard the Salt Lake City. The only option, then, was to stay and fight. Dozens of men were killed during the fierce battle.

Krenn worked at his station as a signalman, providing a bird's eve view to officers below.

"Our destroyers set out like David going up against Golith," said Krenn. "Then they had to get out of there because they were being raked by fire."

Shots were exchanged until the boilers could be restarted. As the Salt Lake City increased speed and American destroyers continued to fight, the Japanese retreated.

According to the article by Bishop, "Afterward, Americans who were engaged in the (battle) came to look upon it as a miracle at sea. For surely it is a miracle when a great fighting ship walks wounded on the water, halts in her tracks to die, then comes alive to lob victorious shells at her foe.'

According to Krenn, the battle got so bad from the time they were attacked to when the ship was repaired, commanding officers called soldiers to the bridge to drink a farewell toast.

"That's how bad it was," he said. "We were lucky."

Krenn said he wished the battle was better publicized more and was focused on more because to him, the battle was important.

"The way wars are fought now, you don't even need battleships anymore," he said. "The fighting style is all different and with missiles you don't even see the attacks coming. It's important to remember our history and honor those who are no longer with us. They are the real heroes."

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
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

A committee of 15 was pitched as a size for the latter group, but Clarkson said Wednesday it could conceivably be larger.

Several board members touted the plan's allowances for public input. In addition to the focus panel, it calls for public surveys and neighborhood meetings around town.

"Public participation is absolutely critical," said Councilman Kyle Kotary. "I think it's a good outline and it's a good way to both get at the fundamental aspects of the Comprehensive Plan ... but also get public input.'

The "core group" will consist of Clarkson, Deputy Supervisor John Smolinsky, the chairpersons of the Planning and Zoning boards, Director of **Economic Development** and Planning Michael Morelli and (as unanimously approved by the board on Wednesday) Councilman Kotary. Town staff will also assist the group.

The policy does not specify a timeline for the creation of a report, but Clarkson said he'd like to see the committee begin work in the spring and have a product in hand by the end of the year.

The resolution sets a fairly broad charge for the committee, but it's likely the town's stance on the preservation of open space will play some role in the dialogue. The question of how (or if) the town should be involved in green space

initiatives has been a matter of considerable debate in recent years, including a particularly lively discourse over whether the town should attempt to buy the Normanside Country Club when it went up for sale (the town made an offer but was outbid).

Details on how to express interest in serving on the focus panel should be posted in the near future on the town's website at townofbethlehem.org.

Fund balance policy 'memorialized'

The town of Bethlehem now has a formal policy on fund balance levels that codifies what has been the general planning practice in recent years.

The Town Board on Wednesday debated the fund balance policy for over an hour before unanimously adopting it. Its central tenant is the town should aim to hold in reserves 15 percent of its level of budgeted appropriations. If that level climbs to over 20 percent the town would transfer the extra money into the capital reserve funds (requiring that money to be earmarked for a specific purpose) and if it dropped below 7.5 percent the comptroller and Town Board would be required to formulate a plan to return the reserves to at least that minimum level within three years. The policy applies only to the general fund.

Though there is little guidance from the state comptroller's office on fund balances, the National Government Finance Officer's Association recommends governments keep about two months worth of spending on hand (or 17 percent of the budget), according to Bethlehem Comptroller Michael Cohen.

Cohen described the plan as "memorializing" what has long been the town's budgeting practice, but some board members were concerned a formal policy might hobble the town's ability to adjust to changing fiscal conditions.

"When you put in any policy ... you're taking what is unrestricted and restricting it," said Kotary. "At what point do we go too far in creating restrictions?"

Clarkson described the policy as a "tripwire" that will prove to be more of a guide than a restrictive framework.

The town's general fund reserves have been spent down considerably in recent years. In 2003 the town had \$5.6 million on hand, and by 2010 that figure had fallen to \$3.7 million (32 percent and 12 percent of general fund expenditures, respectively). Cohen's office is projecting in 2011 the fund was spent down by another \$100,000, but will also be nearly 15 percent of expenditures because of spending reductions.

Before adopting the policy the board voted to remove language giving the comptroller "authority to deviate from this policy if it is in the best interest of the town." The policy is not legally binding, so the board could go outside its provisions if deemed necessary.

The policy also outlines changes in accounting practices to bring the town into compliance with new government accounting standards required by the

The best path to paving roads?

The Town Board on Wednesday had a brief discussion about borrowing for road paving before unanimously approving the bonding of \$600,000 for such projects this year.

The town began borrowing for paving expenses in 2010, but in the past year some leaders have expressed an aversion to the practice. This year's budget dialed back borrowing by about one-seventh, with the goal of eventually weaning the town off of bonding for paving and resume using general appropriations.

It was clear on Wednesday that there is still some disagreement about the wisdom in borrowing for this yearly expense. Kotary described it as an acceptable and prudent practice, while Clarkson and Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn said it's bad form to borrow for such regular spending items.

Nixing the borrowing entirely would lead to a large tax increase in the highway fund though, since it's mostly funded by property taxes, so even board members against the practice voted for the borrowing. It's clear the practice will become a part of the 2013 budget discussions later this year, though.

Union needs to keep mental approach

When last we left the Union College hockey team, it was holding the NCAA East Regional championship trophy after beating UMass-Lowell 4-2 in the finals to advance to the "Frozen Four."

Nearly two weeks later, the Dutchmen finally get to skate again. They will take on Ferris State – a school from Big Rapids, Mich. – in one of two national semifinals Thursday in Tampa, Fla.

(Side note: I know that the NCAA wants to give hockey as much of a national spotlight as possible by waiting until the men's and women's basketball tournaments ended. But nearly two weeks? Really? Wasn't there another way - like, let's say, holding the national semifinals on the Wednesday preceding the men's Final Four and then playing the final that Friday?)

The nice thing about this semifinal match-up is that these are two small schools making their "Frozen Four" debuts by playing each other. Had either team had to play a traditional power such as Boston College or Minnesota (the other two teams in the "Frozen Four"), they'd have been subjected to two weeks of that whole Davidvs.-Goliath storyline that the media likes to



use when a small school meets a well-known program.

Of course, this takes away one mental advantage Union might have had over Ferris State. When you come from the same set of circumstances (in this case, a small school on the big stage for the first time), your approach tends to be the same as your opponent's approach.

The thing Union has going for it Thursday is it's treating this national semifinal game as if it were just another playoff game - at least, that seems to be their outward approach. Even though the Dutchmen know that a national title shot is at stake, they seem calm and determined to play their best game against Ferris State.

If Union does get by Ferris State, then it can start answering all of those Davidvs.-Goliath questions as it gets ready to

meet either Boston College or Minnesota in Saturday night's national championship game. Hopefully, though, those questions won't affect the Dutchmen's approach to the game. The last thing they need is to get wrapped up in superfluous talk about what it means to be a small school in a big game.
