Sending secrets



Frank Warren discusses years-long **PostSecret Project at UAlbany visit**



Some have called Frank Warren the most trusted man in America because of his PostSecret Project. Others have dubbed him the person who has seen the most secrets in the world. Warren said he doesn't know if those statements are true, but what he often finds more meaningful are the secrets he doesn't get

Many people have written down their secrets on creatively decorated postcards and intended to send them to Warren's now famous address in Germantown, Md., but instead tore them up. Oftentimes, Warren is notified of this action from his fans, who explain they didn't send the secret either because simply by writing the secret down they felt a weight lifted, or because they felt ashamed. Others decided to no longer carry the secret with them.

"I think it revels the transformative nature of our secrets," said Warren. "How they can change us when we share them, or how sometimes a secret, that secret's actually keeping us."

The PostSecret Project



started in 2004 as a submission to the Artomatic bi-annual arts festival in Washington D.C. Warren handed out 3,000 postcards to strangers on the sidewalk and waited for the submissions to be sent back. From those beginnings, Warren has gone on to receive 1 million postcards and evolve the idea from an art project and traveling art show to five books, a Frank Warren spoke when we think we're keeping popular website, a speaking tour and soon, a play.

Neighbors question subdivision

Proposed Legends Preserve has been before town for eight years

Several Glenmont residents who went before the Bethlehem Planning Board on Tuesday, Feb. 5, disapproved of a plan to build a new housing subdivision off of Jolley Road.

At a public hearing for the project, residents aired concerns such as privacy, trespassing, establishing barriers between property lines

and an increase in traffic.

The plan proposed by LDM Management and known as Legends Preserve has been before the town for about eight years and has been updated several times to fit the needs of the community and town zoning. Tom Andress from ABD Engineering was at the meeting to answer questions from residents.

"The town has regulations that will allow you conservation subdivision status, which is a conventional subdivision with some bonus density for lots based upon the amount of empty space and quality of open space that

you provide to be preserved," said Andress.

The project plans call for 102 single-family units to be built on about 75.5 acres of land adjacent to the state Thruway and Lady Help of Christian Cemetery. Since the project is being pitched as a conservation subdivision, 50 percent of the land, or 42 acres, would need to remain undisturbed, open space.

The project would involve lengthening Jolley Road, as well as extending water and sewer lines. The development would be looked after by a homeowner's association.

Coat collection bundled up

Winter donation campaign nets 1,200 coats

Kaitlyn Drobne said she never knew how much joy could be brought to someone's face just by the gift of a winter coat.

"We don't realize what it means to have a coat and be able to stay warm throughout the winter. It's something people take for granted," said the 20-year-old from Selkirk.

On Thursday, Feb. 7, Drobne and Albany County officials distributed coats collected through the

Katie's Koats initiative to representatives from the Homeless and Travelers Aid Society of Albany on Central Avenue. During the month long campaign, more than 1,200 coats were collected to be distributed to the homeless.

"It was absolutely breathtaking. I started to cry," said Drobne. "I never imagined we would get so many coats. It was really nice to see the community come together to help me and it made such a huge difference."

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy attended the event, as did Charles Burkes of the Albany County Veterans

Service Bureau, HATAS Executive Director Liz Hitt and Best Cleaner's Co-owner Tim McCann. whose company offered to clean the items collected for free.

"Thank you to the generosity of Albany County employees, NYS Comptroller Tom DiNapoli's employees, EMS at Stuyvesant Plaza and other donors throughout the Greater Capital Region for helping out," said McCoy.

Drobne had the idea to collect coats for the homeless after taking a trip to New York City in the fall. She was surprised to see the number of homeless in the streets, many of them without

warm clothing or winter

When the Selkirk resident returned to her job working at her grandmother's restaurant in the City of Albany, she realized how many homeless people there are right in the Capital District. She said the sight "crushed her."

Drobne soon began a Facebook page to start asking for donations, but she had little luck. It wasn't until she began speaking with officials from Albany County who regularly dined at her grandmother's restaurant, PG's Café inside Albany County headquarters, that her efforts gained

momentum.

In about a month's time, Drobne and her grandmother, Patricia Sadowski, had coordinated with the county to place boxes throughout the Albany area as collection places.

Drobne said now she will continue her

efforts in the future, but she doesn't have a goal in mind.



Car charge stations powering up

State and federal dollars mean public chargers more common

Environmentally conscious car owners in the Capital District recently had another location added to the slowly growing list of places to stop and charge up an electric car.

On Tuesday, Feb. 5, the owners of Tri City Rentals unveiled two new electric vehicle charging stations at their Woodlake Apartments complex in Guilderland on Old School House Road. The station is free for the public to use and reservations for a charging time can be made online.

"The decision to introduce EV stations at Woodlake was an easy one," said Tri City General Manager Tim Owens. "This not only provides a positive impact to our Woodlake community but also provides a positive impact for those in the Capital Region."

The charging stations were installed by Plugin Stations Online and were paid for through federal and state grants. The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority also helped as part of a joint effort to get 325 new charging stations installed throughout the state.

industry reshaping the way we think about our vehicles," said John Doran, owner of Plugin Stations Online. "This NYSERDA program reflects the environmentally conscious effort New York State is undertaking and thanks to forward thinking companies like Tri City Rentals, we're going to see more charging stations installed as this industry trend progresses."

Owens said additional Tri City Rentals communities in Buffalo and Rochester also have plans to install charging station with the help of NYSERDA. He said locally, Woodlake Apartments was chosen because of its proximity to a major highway, local businesses and major areas of employment.

"Gas prices are going up to \$4 and it could hit \$5 again," said Albany County Executive Dan McCoy. "This is the type of outside-the-box thinking that we need and I thank NYSERDA and



Gov. Andrew Cuomo for putting the money in last spring to open these stations."

The funds are part of a statewide initiative to cut carbon emissions. The Cuomo administration eventually would like to see 3,000 charging stations installed all over New York.

There are currently 10 public charging locations in the Capital District, including at new ShopRite grocery stores in the area. Eventually, 35 stations will be installed at 15 different locations through the NYSERDA initiative.

For the foreseeable future, the owners of Tri City Rentals will be paying any electricity costs associated with the stations so patrons can stop and charge their hybrid or electric cars for free. It can take up to 6 hours to fully charge some electric car models, and the stations are compatible with all existing electric cars.

The stations are connected to the ChargePoint Network, and car owners can visit a website or use a smartphone to reserve a time. The system is meant to cut down on energy theft, ensure safety for customers and make finding time to charge a car more convenient. Customers can pay a one time fee of \$25 to purchase a Chargepass swipe card to use the stations or make a reservation using a credit card, but they will not be charged for the time.



The first time he proposed, she said she would think about it. He didn't get down on one knee, but told her he thought she was the right girl for him. It was not love at first sight, she said, and she was cautious.

The second time, only a few weeks later, he came to her holding a huge heart filled with candy, a single rose and a card that read "Love forever." This time, she said yes.

It was Valentine's Day.

But this isn't a typical boymeets-girl story. The couple, Athena and Alex Loupessis, had never dated before the proposal and spent the first year-and-ahalf of their engagement getting to know each other. The two had separately moved to America from different parts of Greece to start a new life but wound up meeting through Athena's aunt in Newburgh.

"He was a baker. He was the greatest baker in the world," Athena said.

After moving to Long Island, Alex got situated in

a bakery. While visiting the island as governor, Nelson Rockefeller got his hands on the baker's strawberry shortcake, loved every bite and recommended he set up shop in Albany. The couple took his advice and found their way to Colonie in 1971, and only two years later, they opened the Latham 76 Diner on Route 9.

The Loupessises worked day and night together, building the restaurant from scratch, raising two children and later, welcoming five grandchildren. The hardworking couple devoted their lives to the diner and to each other.



Lunch line limbo

It seems like just yesterday we were reporting on a brave new future in our school cafeterias in the form of a federal mandate dictating a new set of guidelines for what schools must serve their students.

Though government mandates tend to be given an extraordinarily bad reputation (with good reason, a lot of the time) this was one order that was easy to get behind. That goes doubly for those young expected to recent the recent state of

enough to recall the recent state of school lunches, in which "cheese," "breading" and "sugar" seemed to occupy their own, prominent slots on the food pyramid.

Editorial

This story seems like it landed just yesterday because it practically did. The standards were put in place at the beginning of this school year. Yet already, districts are bucking the trend and dumping the program.

We recently reported the Niskayuna Central School District moved to drop the new guidelines by April 1 after its lunch program operated at a \$70,000 loss in the first half of the school year (you can read all about it at spotlightnews.com). It seems kids weren't going for the new food options, and those who were forced to buy the lunch out of need or for other reasons were tossing their fruits and veggies straight into the trash in favor of going hungry or grabbing some other, easily obtainable source of "nutrition" in the form of candy or junk food.

It's surprising to see schools quickly discarding the lunch guidelines because that also means the loss of federal aid dollars. In a time of dwindling aid, that's astonishing. But evidently the issue is so profound it would be preferable to go it alone.

It seems fitting this issue is coming into focus again, given February is American Heart Month — you can read more about that in the Point of View article opposite this editorial. Suffice it to say, this is a time when the American Heart Association and other groups are encouraging Americans to be more cognizant of their overall health, including how they eat.

This development is a setback for that overall mission on several levels. First, it is unfortunate to see schools kowtow to the taste buds of its students so quickly. Parents know getting a child to eat healthy is no easy task, but it is a winnable battle.

But it is not one that's made simple through the new federal guidelines, which are so restrictive they allow cooks little room for maneuvering. They go so far as to break down vegetables into groups based on color, requiring dark green veggies to be served one part of the week and red or orange options another. These restrictions were drawn up with the best of intentions, but we have to wonder if setting more general guidelines and simply banning the worst of lunch line offenders (cheese sticks, pizza, French fries, vending machine foods, etc) and mandating the use of fresh ingredients might have been met with more success.

We may never know. Sadly, the students who need better nutrition the most, those in poorer urban districts, may end up with the short end of the stick as they're offered unpalatable, unimaginative options while the vending machine beckons. In the suburbs, we simply hope schools opting out of the program will take their experiences as a learning opportunity instead of returning to the status quo.

Blissful planning, catalogued

Just after the holidays, the gardening catalogs begin to arrive at my house. It is the perfect remedy for the postholiday blues and I am always happy to see them clutter up my mailbox. While it is cold and snowy outside, these catalogs offer me a glimpse of spring and the promise of gardening delights to come. I have my favorites of course, and those go to the top of the pile for viewing. Where to start is the dilemma and usually I opt for the seed catalogs. With paper and pen at hand, I peruse each page of "Johnny's Selected Seeds" and "The Cook's Garden" catalogue. Before I commit my seed order, I check online with "Victory Seeds" as they no longer mail a catalog. "Victory Seeds" is a great source for rare and unusual seeds and their forte is openpollinated and heirloom seeds at a fair price.

Decisions made for seeds, I start looking at the "Miller Nurseries" fruit catalog. A New York State nursery, Miller offers many fruit varieties that were developed by Cornell University at the Geneva Fruit Station. Developed and grown in New York State is important to many Capital Region home fruit growers and Miller's has been offering gardeners good plants with a wealth of cultural information since 1936.

I have long been a fan of mail order for plants and so I consult with the "Bluestone Perennials" catalogue to see what is new. Another favorite is "Garden Crossings" but this is Internet ordering only. Plants shipped from either of these nurseries have never disappointed, as the packaging is superb. My plant budget dictates that I find small sizes and grow them on, which is fine with me, and mail order fits that bill perfectly.

Point of View

"Gardener's Supply" in Burlington is a terrific source for all things horticultural from plants to composters and rain barrels. This catalog is not a quick read as it is chock full of items to help one garden better. A few years ago, "Gardener's Supply" began to offer heavy duty growing bags for potatoes. After one season I was hooked as this method allowed me to expand my garden onto the driveway and grow a crop that I had not had the room to grow. At the end of the season after harvest, the soil is removed and the bags shaken and allowed to dry before storage. These bags are easy and fun and now there are several choices for different crops. The "Kinsman Company" offers unusual wire planters and hanging baskets, liners, moss and garden decoration all with a British flair. "Lee Valley Tools" and "A.M. Leonard" are companies that sell unusual and hard to find tools of exceptional quality and gardeners will tell you that it is money well spent when buying a well made tool. You may buy one over a lifetime instead of several.

Both a resource and a reference are the catalogs that offer products for problem solving in the garden. Two favorite catalogs are "Arbico

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

Railroaded! Yes, I feel that the residents of Selkirk have been railroaded by the Town Board.

A meeting was held on Jan. 29 at the Selkirk Fire Department with members of the Town Board, town engineer, CSX reps and approximately 75 concerned citizens.

One of the topics discussed was the final phase three of the sidewalk project on Rt. 396 (which consists of approx 2,000 feet of sidewalk). This project was approved in its entirety by the Town Board years ago. All engineering work has already been done and paid for and project is shovel ready.

We were told that the remaining section of sidewalk from the fire department going across CSX track up to Pausley Court would now cost \$700,000 - cost for the sidewalk \$200,000 and \$500,000 for a newly mandated automated pedestrian gate by the RR crossing.

This pedestrian sidewalk gate was mandated due to a potential "liability issue." Note however that this automated gate was not mandated by the Federal or State Governments or even CSX - but in fact mandated by the town attorney and the board.

In regards to the cost of the automatic pedestrian gate proposed

by our engineer for a cost \$500,000 - instead of contacting the firm of Dewey, Cheatum & Howe for an estimate as it was done - I decided to do another 5 minutes of research. The estimate is too high! In fact my research shows that the town of Wauwatosa. Wisconsin in 2013 installed for railroad safety - 25 sidewalk "Stop for Train" decals, 28 metal yield "Look for Train" signs, 15 new railroad sign posts, five pedestrian railroad gates, an entire railroad crossing with lights and bells and 8,000 feet of railroad track fencing all for \$1.3 million! ... and we get one gate for \$500,000!

The last segment of the meeting concerns \$7 million given to the town by NYS for the proposed Selkirk bypass - a project which has been in the planning stages for 20 odd years. Due to inaction by the town, the state wants their (our) taxpayer money back (the nerve).

Now the town reacts by wanting to have a community meeting to

discuss the southern Selkirk bypass road, the only option which can be funded for the \$7 million. It should be noted to the board that if they took the time to read the minutes of all past meetings held on this issue, they would realize that it would be a waste of time. We the people have already voiced our opposition to taking the road from our front yards and placing it in our backyards. The Selkirk residents have previously decided that the only viable options to eliminate truck traffic was to either have the bypass redirected to Clapper Road or Wemple Road, neither of which the state will fund. At this time I am suggesting that the town give the taxpayer's money back to the state - perhaps the state will be able to find a neighborhood that needs something done, like installing safe sidewalks.



Porco movie to air March 23

Lifetime movie to showcase infamous **Delmar killing**

The Lifetime television network has released the airing date of its small screen movie about the Christopher Porco murder case.

The network announced the movie, called "Romeo Killer: The Christopher Porco Story," will premier on Saturday, March 23, at 8 p.m. The movie will focus on the Delmar native and University of Rochester student who was convicted of killing his father and attempting to kill his mother with an ax in 2004.

According to the network, the movie will show the night of the murder all the way up through the trial, but some details may not be totally accurate. The credits will state the tale is "inspired by a true story."

Production of the movie began

in late 2012 in Vancouver, according to a Lifetime spokeswoman. Porco will be played by Matt Barr, who was most recently in the History Channel miniseries "Hatfields and McCoys." Erik McCormick from "Will and Grace" will play Bethlehem police detective Joe Sullivan and actress Lolita Davidovich will play Joan Porco. Other Hollywood media outlets previously reported that a girlfriend character for Porco was also cast.

Though Porco still maintains his innocence, he was found guilty in August of 2010 of having murdered his father, Peter, and attempting to murder his mother, Joan, as they slept inside their former Brockley Street home. The incident is presumed to have been over forged co-signatures on a student loan and car loan that Christopher Porco took out without his parents' knowledge.

Joan survived the Nov. 15, 2004, attack, but was badly injured. She later claimed no memory of the incident and

professed her son's innocence, even though police claimed she indicated with a nod her son had made the attack. That nod was later the basis for a long appeals process by Porco's legal team. In April of 2012, the United States Supreme Court denied a petition to review the murder conviction.

Porco is now 29, but was 20 at the time of the murder. He is serving a 50-year prison

Lifetime said the film to portray Porco as a "beloved, handsome college student ... who was every girl's dream in the small town of Delmar, New York."

The Lifetime network released the first still from the movie on its press website, which depicts Barr (Porco) and McCormick (Detective Sullivan) sitting across from each other at a table, in what appears to be a police station.

The movie's description says prosecutors believed Porco to be "a devious and cunning sociopath" while "many in the town of Delmar firmly believe the jury wrongfully convicted an innocent young man."

The film is being produced by Romeo Kill Productions for Lifetime, and was directed by Norma Bailey. The screenplay was written by Edithe Swenson.


The trip was organized by Karen Cavanagh and John Mason of



aid BC has received since the 2009-2010 school year by nearly \$12 million. Bethlehem has also seen a 70 percent reduction in its high tax aid from the state. Chief Business and Financial Officer Judith Kehoe said property owners are now paying for about 59 percent of the school budget, up from 46 percent in 2008.

legislators," Douglas

The district was able to find savings last year through a reduction in transportation costs and a renegotiated teachers contract that resulted in savings of more than \$1.6 million.

The district would have to spend \$90.6 million to maintain this year's programming in 2013-14, with approximately \$21.8 million being

a conservative estimate. Voters approved an \$88.2 million budget for this school year.

The district faced a similar shortfall last year of about \$4.4 million, a figure that included the use of \$1.7 million in reserve funds. Officials are still unsure how much, if any, reserve funds will be used to bridge the new gap.

Any additional cuts would most likely have to come from programming and extracurriculars to maintain an appropriate student-to-teacher ratio, officials said.

"We're OK for now, but it's like tension in a rubber band that's stretched as far as it can be," Douglas said.

Voters in May ultimately decided to exceed the tax cap with a tax levy increase of 3.99 percent, reducing the budget gap by \$3.8 million. The plan cut some programs and clubs, increased class sizes and implemented centralized bus stops for students.

Bethlehem Central school board members also unanimously voted

in January to allow two propositions to go before the public in March on bonding for facilities upgrades and a new turf athletic field.

The facilities upgrades stand at about \$20.2 million, with athletic turf costs at about \$3.5 million. If the field proposition were not passed by the public, upgrades and drainage repairs would still be made to the existing grass playing field. If both proposals were passed, annual taxes would rise by about \$20 for a home valued at \$100,000 over the 20-year life of the bonds.

Any tax increases

from the bond would be on top of those expected for the 2013-14 budget.

The district is now asking parents, town residents and staff to advocate along with the district for mandate relief and a return to previous state aid levels.

"You can see that the numbers don't add up and that's why our communities need to finally rally and say enough is enough," Douglas said.

The next meeting about the budget will take place on Wednesday, Feb. 27, and will focus on operations, maintenance and athletics.

Rick Touchette, the director of cemeteries for the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany, had concerns about the proximity of several planned units to the property line of Lady Help of Christian Church Cemetery. He asked for a forever-wild buffer to be put in place between the properties because the backs of some units would be as little as 20 feet from the lot line.

"I think that would be disrespectful to the cemetery," he said.

Andress told the Planning Board the area is already wooded and argued that could act as a natural buffer, but Touchette said they would like to see more.

"Our cemetery property is meant to be used for cemeteries and if it's undeveloped now, that doesn't mean it's always going to be undeveloped," said Touchette. "We can't really say if our area that's wooded now is going to be developed, but that can't be the buffer. If there's going to be a buffer it's got to be on the other side."

But the most common issue raised was a possible increase in traffic in the area. Some residents said it can take 20 minutes at high traffic times to make it across the intersection of Glenmont Road and Route 9W, and others

said the road can be backed up for miles.

Andress said a traffic study estimated Legends Preserve would add 70 cars to the road. Some residents questioned how a development of 120 units, many of which would probably have multiple cars, would have such a slight impact.

Andress said a standard formula is used to determine the number of cars and impacts, but residents asked him to be realistic about the number and plan for

Planning Board members said concerns from the community would be taken into account before the project can move forward.

On Tuesday, Feb. 5, Warren gave a keynote presentation at the University at Albany as part of the college's recognition of Sexuality Month. Many of the secrets Warren receives are sexual in nature or about mental health, while others are humorous and lighthearted.

Warren said while some sexual secrets are discussed during his presentations, like those about intimacy, sexual orientation or abuse, he hoped the event would allow students to feel more free to talk about their concerns, questions or desires about sex.

"I think that's one of the reasons they have a sexual recognition month," he said before the show. "I think sometimes there are important issues that get suppressed down as secrets, but instead if we brought them up and explored them, we'd be more likely to find a solution together."

But students were also interested in

Warren's project itself. All postcards are sent to him anonymously from people around the world and Warren said its very important to him that people are allowed to keep their anonymity so the secrets remain real and the project remains a nonjudgmental space.

"I think there's something about secrets that is inexhaustible and as long as I'm true to the project and maintain a relationship where people trust me with their secrets, I think the project has infinite life,' said Warren. "And for me it's been a joy to follow where it's led me. This project has found me and turned my world upside down."

Warren reads each of the secrets and said he hasn't grown bored of it. He's no longer surprised by what he reads, but some more painful secrets can feel burdensome. The secret collector said

the two most common secrets he receives are admissions to urinating in the shower, and the sharing of a desire to find the one person the writer can share their whole self with.

"I see that secret dozens of times over," said Warren. "The idea about finding that one person we can show our true selves to and no longer have to keep secrets from."


In his program, Warren told the audience one of his own secrets and how he relates to some of the postcards he receives. He later asked the audience to tell some of their own secrets live in front of the group.

"I think one of the reasons I'm comfortable with that is because I've been doing it for years, but also because before I started this I was answering phones on a suicide hotline and I feel parallels between the two," he said. "In fact, I feel myself falling into the same voice, just nonjudgmental and empathic. That's the voice I fall into out there."

Through t h e PostSecret books and Warren's speaking engagements, more than \$1 million dollars have been donated to suicide prevention charities. Warren said he hopes the project will allow people to seek the help they need and give a voice to those who need it in order to prevent tragedy.



Diego finished the outburst when he charged in alone on Walter and slammed one by him to give Bethlehem a 3-1 advantage.
