

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No easy path for School's Out

Variance requirements, neighborhood opposition threaten building sale

The Bethlehem Central School District and School's Out, Inc. are facing an uphill battle when it comes to finalizing the sale of 90 Adams Place.

On Wednesday, Feb. 20, school district officials went before the Bethlehem Zoning Board of Appeals to argue the need for a variance on which the transaction hinges. Terresa Bakner, a partner at the firm Whiteman, Osterman and Hanna, spoke on behalf of the district.

The area in question is

zoned residential, but the building was built in the

neighborhood before the town had a zoning statute.

Bakner said since the property was always in use as

"The school district is not out there to make money like a commercial operation. What they have is a financial responsibility ... to not waste school assets," Bakner said. "They are looking at this not to make a killing, but to make a reasonable return on investment on the fair market value of the property and to stop having on their rolls a property ... which they are no longer using."

But to obtain a use variance, the district must prove a lack of return on investment, that the hardship to the property is unique, that the use variance would not alter the potential character of the neighborhood and the alleged hardship was not self-created.

The district had previously applied for an adaptive reuse

NYSUT calls out tax cap

Area legislators ask for increased state aid to schools

Public schools are in the budget limelight as local lawmakers call on Gov. Andrew Cuomo to modify aid distributions guidelines, while at the same time the state's largest teachers union is suing to challenge the constitutionality of the state tax cap law.

New York State United Teachers President Richard Iannuzzi said every student deserves to receive a quality public

education, but the tax cap inhibits school districts from this standard.

"In challenging the constitutionality of the tax cap, we are fighting for that principle," Iannuzzi said, "just as we are fighting for the democratic principles of one person, one vote' and for the right of citizens, through local control of their schools, to determine for themselves how much they want to spend on their own community's schools."

NYSUT filed its lawsuit Wednesday, Feb. 20, the same day Capital District legislators called for increased state aid to school districts facing the possibility of

Van Dyke Spinney donates land

Conservancy group to develop trails on parcel

The Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy is planning to turn 30 acres of land in the Town of Bethlehem into hiking trails for public use.

The property was donated earlier this year as part of a deal

between the town and the owners of Van Dyke Spinney, a senior housing complex in development near the intersection of Van Dyke Road and Meads Lane. The acquisition means the land conservancy now protects more than 2,500 acres of land in the Capital District.

"The town really worked with the developers to make sure this land was open and able to be used, not just by the residents of the housing complex, but by the public as well," said MHLC Executive Director Jill Knapp.

The majority of the land protected by the organization is donated by residents or given through similar project deals, according to Knapp.

"A lot of people in the area want to see their land protected and give it to us," she said. "In this case, the land wasn't really developable but was pretty. It made more sense for us to own the property and was a good compromise for all." The majority of the land lies to the west of Van Dyke Road. About 25 acres is set to be turned into hiking trails and developed for public use. Another 8 acres to the east along the Phillipin Kill will remain wild.

Knapp said the public can visit the property now, but development on the area isn't expected to begin until 2014. The work is stalled because volunteers are waiting to

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Developer eyes Glenmont intersection for CVS

USA gas station and several nearby buildings would be demolished

A developer has plans to build a new CVS pharmacy on a busy intersection at Bethlehem Center.

The plan that was recently brought before the Bethlehem Development Planning Committee calls for relocation of the current pharmacy within Glenmont Plaza to a new, larger building to be built on the corner on Route 9W and Glenmont/ Feura Bush Road. A USA gas station currently sits on the site.

Developers from Zarembra Group in Cleveland, Ohio, and Larson Design Group in Corning, went before the DPC to informally discuss the project on Thursday, Feb. 21. The project will be officially submitted to the town at a later date.

"This is a big project, but the initial plans we're very happy with," said town Assistant Engineer Terry Ritz.

The plan calls for the demolition of the gas station as well as buildings containing, Manning's Menu, Shannon's Barber Shop and two private residences with garages. The demolition would allow for the development of a 13,225-squarefoot store with 65 parking spaces and a double drive-thru. The plan also includes the possibility of a traffic circle at the corner under a proposal by the state Department of Transportation.

CVS currently owns one parcel of land within the twoacre site, but the company has the option from the owners to purchase the rest of the land in the future. The purchase may be contingent on Planning Board approval.

The store is not planned to be open 24-hours a day, but that could change after the store is opened based upon how it


DPC members asked that CVS consider sharing an access

point with the Cumberland Farms gas station next door to follow the recommendations of the town's Route 9W Corridor Study. They also asked to see additional natural buffers along the property lines and to change the proposed sidewalk path to promote pedestrian visitation to the store.

"The plan might already have reduced access points, but by further opening that access point drivers wouldn't have to jump back onto the road for that short amount of time," said town senior planner Robert Leslie.

Developer Sean McDermott of the Zarembra Group said he would bring the consideration of a shared access point up with CVS representative, but the model may not fit into the company's business plan.

The DPC also requested a further traffic study be done before the proposal goes before the Planning Board. Additional landscaping may also have to be included within the parking

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Room to smile

Boy Scout spends months renovating bedroom for child at St. Catherine's

For 14-year-old Boy Scout Stephen Pelletier, it took about \$1,300, six months of planning, several helping hands and two full days of labor to completely make over a child's bedroom at the St. Catherine's Center for Children.

Although the project was just one of his final steps to become an Eagle Scout, after all of the work, Pelletier couldn't stop smiling while witnessing the child's uncontrollable excitement seeing his brand new room.

"It just feels great. I'm not so focused on that it's done, but just how I helped him. It just feels great knowing I did this, something I can be proud of 30 years later," said Pelletier, a freshman at Berlin Central High School

Pelletier joined a few other Poestenkill Boy Scout Troop 528 members to work on St. Catherine's "Makeover for Kids!" program, which offers an opportunity for groups and individuals to remake a child's bedroom at the center. St. Catherine's, a residential service on New Scotland Avenue in Albany that offers a range of human services to Capital District children coping with issues of trauma, abuse, mental health and unstable family backgrounds. The

agency, which can house up to 20 children, takes in kids up to 13 years old who stay anywhere from six to 18 months.

"It's the first time in many of these children's lives where they've had a room to themselves, customized to their needs, their desires and goals," St. Catherine's Executive Director Bill Gettman said.

The makeover program is similar to what occurs on the TV show "Extreme Makeover: Home Edition," in which a home is remodeled in one week. St. Catherine's program started only last year and has already seen six different makeovers, each with its own theme, including Spongebob Squarepants and Tinkerbell.

"Every child is part of the

planning process. This is not an adult project. It's a kids project," Gettman said.

Pelletier jumped on the opportunity to remake a child's room when he heard about the program in August 2012. After talking to the child, he decided to make a sports-themed bedroom. To raise funds, he held a pancake breakfast in January at the Sullivan Jones VFW Post in Poestenkill and collected \$1,300 from community members. After that, he solicited supplies and received generous donations, including a gift card from the Home Depot and materials from Tru Value.

To keep the sports theme alive,

Dan McCoy vetoes county legislature's 'stall tactics'

Executive wants lawmakers to pick from his list of consultants

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy has vetoed the County Legislature's resolution to hire an outside consultant to study the nursing home issue, calling it a method to stall any decision.

"The resolution really made no sense if you read it. It wasn't clear what they really wanted," McCoy said.

McCoy handed down the veto on Tuesday, Feb. 19. The legislature had passed a resolution by a vote of 19-17 on Feb. 11 to hire an outside consultant to review a proposed agreement with Upstate Services Group. Negotiations are currently underway with USG, a private firm, for a 10-year lease that could save the county more than \$100 million, according to proponents.

McCoy responded to the legislature's request the following day by explaining in a statement that he already had hired an outside consultant, Peter Millock from Nixon Peabody, who had been looking at the deal for several months. Many legislators, including Chairman Shawn Morse, were unaware of McCoy's outside consultant.

Although McCoy vetoed the request, he said he has issued an RFQ, or request for qualifications, to bring in three outside consultants the legislature could then choose from. McCoy said he is not sure whether he will offer Millock as one of the consultants.


"They could use (Nixon Peabody), but they won't," McCoy said. "It would be smart for them to use them, but they want someone that's independent from me."

McCoy said he understands the legislature's skepticism on signing the lease with USG, but he's getting sick of the "stall tactics."

"It's the hardest decision they're going to have to make as legislators. They want to make sure I'm not lying, I get that. They want to make sure I'm telling the factual numbers, I get that," McCoy said. "This isn't about me. It's not about the legislature. It's about representing the people of Albany County."

McCoy said he plans on getting the list put together as early as next week. He said the latest he'd like to see a vote on the nursing home deal is April.

"It's not fair to the residents. It's not fair to the workers. We have to move forward or not move forward. We have to make a decision," McCoy said. "We can't keep dragging it out."

Glenmont man dies in house fire

Glenmont homeowner died of smoke inhalation after a fire engulfed his home on Glenmont Road Wednesday, Feb. 20.

Firefighters from the Selkirk Fire Department pulled Brad L. Woodworth, 61, from a bathroom at 173 Glenmont Road, according to Bethlehem police. He was pronounced dead shortly thereafter.

The Bethlehem Police Department and the Selkirk Fire Department responded to the fire at about 10:12 p.m. and with assistance from neighboring fire departments had the structure fire extinguished in about an hour. Glenmont Road was closed for about five hours, police said.

Selkirk Fire Department Chief Bill Asprion said the fire is believed to have started in the home's kitchen. The cause of the fire was later deemed to be electrical. The house was fully engulfed in flames at the time fire officials arrived on the scene. Asprion said the house could not be saved.

"Part of our early

efforts was to knock the fire down enough to do a search of the home," he said. Once the homeowner



What's in a wage?

The minimum wage is one of those quagmire-type issues that have seemed to flock to the forefront as of late.

Both Gov. Andrew Cuomo and, more recently, President Barack Obama have advocated for a hike in the minimum wage from the current \$7.25 federal minimum to \$9 an hour. It's not a bad conversation to have, especially as the gap between poor

and rich widens and the number of Americans in the middle class spirals downwards.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, 59 percent of all workers are paid hourly. About 5 percent of them, or 3.8 million Americans

are paid hourly. About 5 percent of them, or 3.8 million Americans, work for \$7.25, the federal minimum wage, or less. That's a lot of people whose lives would be immediately improved and who would put more money into the economy should the minimum wage be increased.

But there are ramifications to the proposal, the most obvious being the immediate impact it would have on employers who have to pay their workers 25 percent more. (And even though minimum wage employees make up a relatively small percentage of the workforce, the hike would assumedly work its way up the line to make for higher wages for all.)

The vast majority of businesses in this country employ fewer than 30 people. Yet while politicians are simply fervent about being "pro-small business," few of the policies that have been adopted in recent memory are of any help to most of these organizations.

Case in point: so-called Obamacare. One sticking point of the health care overhaul was the theory making health insurance mandatory would increase the pool of premium payers, thus pushing the average cost of health care coverage down.

That may very well end up being the eventual case, but in the short term what businesses are finding out is premiums are spiking in 2013, arriving along with a raft of new paperwork that becomes so onerous for businesses with more than 50 workers many employers in a good position might choose to hunker down rather than grow—in other words, the exact opposite of what is needed to climb out of a recession.

The Affordable Care Act was founded on the best of principles and aimed at solving a terrible social injustice. And so is a proposal to increase the minimum wage.

So how to avoid the seemingly inevitable pitfall of further straining businesses? We say the way out of this apparent unsolvable quandary is clear.

Increase the minimum wage to a more livable level (even a \$9-per-hour job is still tough going in many places), but couple that with meaningful changes to meaningless labor regulations and cuts to payroll taxes. In order to ensure this does not fuel corporate largesse, restrict these changes to small businesses.

Though the common theme we're fed pits government against business as the champion of the working man, we'd wager many if not most employers would rather pass higher wages to their workers (ensuring happier and more competent people) than send the money to the tax man.

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The fate of the nursing home

The fate of the Albany County Nursing Home is one of the most important decisions county government has faced in years. While legislators all feel a deep responsibility to provide care for the sick and elderly, we must also take into account the county's precarious financial position and the tax burden the nursing home places on our residents.

The Albany County Nursing Home presently serves approximately 218 patients and employs more than 320. The building is in dire need of repair. The home is not run efficiently or managed properly. In recent years the county has commissioned numerous studies to determine the nursing home's problems, and all the studies have reached the same basic findings. Until now, however, no concrete changes have been proposed.

We must face the fact that the home continues to be an enormous drain on county finances causing staggering deficits. In his annual report, the county comptroller has stated the figure to be over \$140 million in the past decade. The county executive estimates the 2013 deficit alone to be \$18 million, which is over 20 percent of the total tax levy. We must remember that these deficits are placed squarely on the backs of our taxpayers.

Because of the drain of the nursing home, other social service programs, especially those for our seniors, have had to be reduced or eliminated during economic times when the needs for those groups are growing. We have not been able to provide additional

assistance to those seniors who want to stay in their homes but need some level of assistance. It is the classic case of "putting all our eggs in one basket."

So what are our options? As things stand now we must choose between closure of the nursing home, receivership (which puts the facility under the control of New York state), continued county operation of the home with increasing deficits or leasing the facility as recommended by the county executive.

In my opinion, only the fourth option, leasing the facility to a private management company, meets our objectives and reduces the flow of red ink.

The proposed lessee, United Services Group (USG) is recommended by the New York State Department of Health and currently operates 11 facilities in New York. USG has several homes where a union is recognized as a bargaining agent and has agreed to this same option for the Albany County Nursing Home. Through a transition plan, USG has also agreed to hire most, if not all of the current employees, and will keep the same admissions policy to provide a "safety net" for our residents.

It is projected by the Albany County Budget Department that leasing the nursing home would save the county an estimated \$31 million in just four years. And this is a conservative estimate. Over a 10-year period, the county executive has projected the savings to be \$70 to \$100 million. While the lease agreement does call for a loan to the lessee of \$12 million, the county will have saved more than 2 ½ times that amount

in the first four years of the lease alone.

The legislature has already taxed Albany County residents \$9.7 million for the nursing home's operation for the second half of 2013. If the lease agreement can be quickly approved and the turnover of the facility is made by June 30, that \$9.7 million could be used to reduce the 2014 tax burden on our residents and businesses. Delays which move the transition date past June 30 will waste the money of the Albany County taxpayers to the tune of (in rounded figures) \$1.6 million every month, \$375,000 every week and \$55,000 every day.

The above facts, not politics, should be the basis for dealing with our nursing home. I therefore urge my fellow colleagues to move forward with the proposed lease agreement for the good of our elderly and our taxpayers. I hope you, the reader, will contact your county legislator and do the same.

Synthetic track a good investment

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

Residents should vote "Yes" on Proposition No. 2 in the upcoming Bethlehem school bond referendum because it represents the best value for their tax dollar.

Yes, you read that correctly.

But how, you may ask, can the multi-purpose synthetic field and eight-lane track, which costs \$3.4 million more than the drainage option, represent the best value?

First, the landscape architect hired by the district has stated that the land around Bethlehem High School is sandy and moist. This means that the fields are

often not usable after the slightest rainfall. The district has expended significant effort and money over the years to attempt to improve the situation. Nature has won this battle in the past and will, in all likelihood, continue to do so.

Second, while the initial cost of the synthetic field is greater than drainage, the annual maintenance cost is about one-third that of a grass field.

Third, unlike the existing field, the synthetic field is more durable and can be used nearly year round. So the total cost for every hour of usage is projected to be less than half that of the current field.

Finally, many of our youth sports clubs currently spend thousands of dollars annually to play on synthetic fields in other communities. They will now play, and keep their money, in Bethlehem. This both offsets the cost and strengthens our community.

While cost matters, value matters more. When you look at the data, we believe you will conclude that the synthetic field provides the greatest value and is deserving of your "Yes" vote on March 12.

DEC plans cleanup of former dry cleaner

of Environmental Conservation is taking public comments on a plan to clean up the location of a former Roxy Cleaners on Delaware Avenue in Elsmere.

The agency will hold a public meeting Monday, March 4, at 6:30 p.m. at the Bethlehem Public Library to outline the plans and take comments from the public. The property, at 156 Delaware Ave., was declared a superfund site by the agency in 2010. Best Cleaners is now located there, though the DEC previously told The Spotlight Roxy Cleaners is being treated as the originator of the contamination.

A DEC investigation found elevated levels of a number of chemicals associated with dry cleaning in the soil, including tetrachloroethene, or PERC, in the groundwater.

The state Department The area is served by public water. The DEC classified the area as a "class 2" superfund site that "represents a significant threat to public health or the environment."

> The DEC's remediation plan includes removing and taking off site 340 cubic yards of contaminated soil. Afterwards, a chemical oxidation layer will be put down before clean soil is put back at the site.

> The agency said any buildings at the site or neighboring buildings may need to have a sub-slab depressurization system installed to prevent vapors entering buildings from the groundwater. Such systems typically collect vapors from underneath a concrete floor and vent them outside.

In addition to comments collected at the upcoming public meeting, the DEC will be accepting written comments through March 24.

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Bethlehem Youth Court sees decrease in cases

Number of youthful offenders down from previous year

The Bethlehem Youth Court saw a marked decrease in the number of sentences handed out to youthful offenders last year.

Director Katrina Charland said just 23 firsttime youthful offenders were sentenced through the program last year, down from 43 in 2011.

"Overall, this is a very good thing for the community," she said. "Juvenile arrests are down. Some of them (sentenced through the program) go on to do jury duty themselves."

Youth Court is alternative to traditional court for first-time offenders still in their teens. Those tried in Youth Court must admit guilt as a precondition, and it is only an option

for those with low-level offenses. Volunteers in high school are trained to perform courtroom roles from prosecutor to judge to jury. The volunteers are then responsible for conducting the peer led sentencing hearings for the young offenders ages 10 to 19.

The most common charges heard in 2012 were of unlawful possession of marijuana (48 percent of charges considered), and petit larceny (30 percent). The previous year's most common charge was trespassing. The jury assigns community service hours to offenders.

"A total of 520 hours of community service were sentenced to young offenders by their peers," read the court's annual report. The total number of community service hours jumps to 1,500 when volunteer time at the program itself is considered.

The program has been in operation since 1995 when it opened under the "Overall, this is a very good thing for the community."

Katrina Charland, youth court director

umbrella organization Youth Courts of the Capital Region. Charland said it now operates as an independent nonprofit organization with support from the Town of Bethlehem and other community organizations.

Twenty new volunteers graduated from the training program in 2012.

Charland said when there is a direct victim of a crime, the person is usually asked to write an impact statement for the court. If the person requests the offender to work with a certain organization to pay their debt to society, youth court officials do their best to place them there.

About 13 percent of those who were

sentenced last year went on to volunteer with Youth Court. Volunteers and those sentenced maintain a stretch of highway along Route 32 and the program also partners with the American Legion to provide workers for their pancake breakfasts.

"We try to maintain a low profile while we're

doing community service projects so the kids aren't stigmatized, but we do want the public to know what we're up to and that we're here providing a service for the community," said Charland.

She said she believes the program provides a better resolution for youthful offenders than the criminal courts. It can help keep kids out of the system and is a much more mature process, she said.

"This is just sentencing," she said. "They have already admitted they are guilty and by doing so they take ownership of what they did. It can help repair the hardships caused to the community or a victim."

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

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


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

becoming fiscally insolvent.

Senator Cecilia Tkaczyk, a former Duanesburg Board of Education president, said Cuomo has led initiatives to improve the state's economy but properly funding education is a key element to ensuring progress.

"A strong, well-funded public education system is absolutely necessary to prepare the next generation of New Yorkers for the high-tech jobs of the future," Tkaczyk, D-Duanesburg, said. "The proposals we're making today will provide an investment in our children, without adding to the crushing burden faced by property taxpayers."

The lawmakers' letter to the governor proposed "equitable" restoration of gap elimination aid cuts by reallocating \$203

million in Fiscal Stabilization Funding, \$50 million in efficiency and performance improvement grants, funds targeted for bullet aid and any unused funds from 2012-13 competitive grants. They called for GEA restoration formulas to be adjusted to more fairly distribute funds.

Outside of GEA restoration, the letter requested \$350 million in additional school aid funding, with priority for high- and average-need districts.

NYSUT spokesman Carl Korn said it was merely coincidental that lawmakers requested more education funding the same day the union filed its lawsuit.

"The state has shifted the burden of paying for education on the back of local property taxpayers," Korn said. "Now it has put in place a property tax cap that is devastating to schools in the Capital Region.'

Assemblywoman Patricia

Fahy, D-Albany, stressed securing more state aid is important this budget cycle, even in light of the lawsuit.

"Even if NYSUT was to prevail tomorrow it does not negate the need for (additional) state aid," Fahy said. "I am sympathetic to what NYSUT is trying to do, but I don't want to lose my focus on state aid. ... I think their lawsuit probably has some merit."

Fahy, a former member of the Albany school board, believes the lawsuit "does have a point" in challenging the supermajority requirement for school district budgets exceeding the tax cap. Many area school districts have spoken out against the requirement, which means budgets above the cap must pass by at least 60 percent instead of by a simple majority.

NYSUT's lawsuit detailed declining state aid to schools, a \$1.86 billion drop from 2008-09 to 2011-12 school years. The 2011-12 school year funding saw the state providing around 39.7 percent of school expenses statewide. NYSUT said previously the state's portion of school funding on average across all districts was between 41 to 47 percent.

"Across New York State, superintendents, board members, educators and families fear that their schools will never again be able to match the opportunities they are providing to students now," said Robert Reidy, executive director of the state Council of School Superintendents, in a statement. "Financial and educational insolvency are on the horizon for many districts."

Cuomo's 2013 spending proposal increased education aid by \$889 million, or 4.4 percent, which Assemblyman Phil Steck, D-Colonie, commended the governor for providing, but also

Steck joined area legislators petitioning for additional funding.

"We certainly want to work with our two former school board members, Cecilia Tkaczyk and Pat Fahy, to have any additional funding used in a manner that will best benefit the school districts of New York State," Steck said in a statement.

Senator Neil Breslin, D-Delmar, also called for more state aid and said it was "critical" to provide adequate funding to schools.

"Our local school districts simply cannot absorb any more cuts," Breslin said in a statement. "These cuts have already had a negative impact on our students with numerous educational programs being eliminated. Without additional state aid, our local schools will not be able to provide the top-notch education our students deserve."

of School's Out would fall under a childcare facility and is not specifically an educational institution.

Finding buyer difficult

In December, the BC Board of Education

accepted an offer from School's Out to buy 90 Adams Place for \$475,000. The 6,850-square-foot property had been on the market for nearly a year with a \$650,000 asking price, but the price was dropped to \$575,000 after little interest was shown in the building.

The building was vacated by staff last April and has

since been "mothballed," meaning the facility's power has been turned off and the thermostat turned down. It has cost about \$8,000 per year for basic heating and maintenance since then. District officials said companies had scouted the building with an eye towards converting it to office space, but they felt it would take too much effort. The property is

also too large to reasonably be turned into the site of a house

School's Out is looking to move because they need more space than where they are leasing now, at a storefront on Delaware Avenue. About 80 children would attend programs before and after school, and during the summer. Five to seven buses would be dropping off children for about 10 to 15 minutes each day during those two time periods, according to School's Out staff. Parents would also be dropping their children off and picking them up before and after school.

Concerns hinge on traffic, character

A traffic study conducted by Creighton Manning Engineering found that about six parents would be dropping off students at any given time and the increase of traffic would be about one car every two minutes during the peak morning and evening hours. Much of the information presented was provided to the firm by School's Out.

The zoning board later asked for an independent traffic study to be done at the school district's expense.

The conversion plans call for a play area to be established and fenced in at the back of the property. Several parking spots would also be removed. School's Out officials have a verbal agreement with the nearby church for their staff to park in the church's parking lot. They said they are working to get a written agreement in place.

A public hearing was also held on Wednesday. Of the nearly 40 people in attendance at the meeting, only four publicly gave their opinions on the project. All those speaking were against it, but members of the ZBA said one woman wrote a letter in favor of the plan.

"Allowing School's Out to operate a business in our residential neighborhood would change its character and create unsafe conditions, not only for the children at School's Out, but also for the residents in our neighborhood," said Adams Street resident Stephen Malinowski.

In an eight-page statement, Malinowski detailed why he believed the neighborhood would change due to increased traffic, why the parking situation is unsafe, why the property should be sold to an owner that

would produce taxes for the town and why the quality of life for current residents would diminish.

"Property owners in the neighborhood, especially those located adjacent to the property, will have their quiet enjoyment use of their property threatened as School's Out plan to build a playground less than 10 feet from the property line," he said.

Resident Brent Yanulavich said the move would destroy the unique character of old Delmar and he asked the board to "think long and hard about the decision, as it will affect many families."

Steve Gravel, of Adams Place, said the move might harm property values. He said his family wouldn't have moved to the neighborhood 10 years ago if he knew a childcare facility would be operated down the street. He said if School's Out makes the move, his children would no longer be allowed to ride their bikes after school because the increased traffic may cause unsafe conditions.

The Zoning Board also ordered further environmental reviews. If a variance is granted, the project would still need to go through a site plan review with the town's Planning Board.

develop the trails until the town has completed a plan to make improvements at the Van Dyke Road and Meads Lane intersection.

Town engineer Paul Penman said the town received a federal grant to lower the steepness of the intersection to fix the range of view for drivers. Spinney developers contributed an additional \$50,000 to the project.

"This is something that's been on the town's radar for some time," said Penman. "There were safety concerns for us and the Spinney developers."

The town will be working with MHLC volunteers to help install a parking area. Access to the land may have to be changed based on the extent of the work done by the town.

Knapp said an additional 50 acres of

land on Maple Avenue Extension in South Westerlo was also recently donated by Delmar Place resident Joseph Restifo. The property is mostly wetlands and won't be developed into walking trails, but Knapp said it is a beautiful spot to stop and bird watch. A visitor's kiosk will be erected on the property in the spring.

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
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
