

Another aid cut changes district's tax cap limit

The Bethlehem Central School District is set to lose an additional \$64,400 in state aid after building aid was recalculated for school districts across the state to reflect the lowered interest rates for capital projects.

The decrease in aid means the school district is now facing a larger budget gap of about \$5.01 million. Under the state's tax cap formula, the district can now raise taxes by 3.75 percent, an increase

from the previously projected rate of 3.64 percent.

The district is planning to use \$1.75 million in savings to help close the gap. If the school board were to put forth a budget with a tax increase at the maximum

allowable limit of 3.75 percent, the district would still need to close a gap of \$1.04 million through reductions.

"Each time these reductions go up, it becomes harder and harder to support our programmatic offerings," said Superintendent

> > Douglas said no one expected to see a fourth year of reductions to the tune of \$1 million. He said district officials last year expected there to be no need for reductions after increasing taxes by 4 percent above the tax cap — and using some savings.

years."

Assistant Superintendent of Educational Programs Jody Monroe presented a list of instructional and staffing reductions suggested if the board elects to keep the tax hike at 3.75 percent. The district could potentially see the loss of up to 6.5 full-time employees, for a savings of \$393,400.

"I know it's not easy for you all to sit here listening to potential reductions, it's also not easy to be in charge of the instructional programs, recommending we reduce every single year," said Monroe to an audience filled with parents, teachers and support

Two Guilderland 'Red Riders' prepare for Tour de Cure


Pedaling for 50 miles on a bicycle would an accomplishment for most, but for an 11-year-old with Type 1 diabetes, it is about more than just the ride.

Svdney Steinhardt, of Guilderland, was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes during the week of Halloween when she was 8 years old. It's been three years since she was diagnosed and she is preparing for her third year riding in the American Diabetes Association's Tour de Cure. The local race kicks off at Saratoga Springs High School on Sunday, June 2.

"For an 8-year-old to be diagnosed the week of Halloween is probably one of the worst things that can happen," her father, Scott, said. "I am constantly amazed with her and how she handles this with such poise and dignity."

Ever since Sydney was first diagnosed, she has given herself the required insulin shot, which her father said "speaks to the kind of person that she is."

Sydney wasn't really interested in joining the tour at first when her father suggested it, but after her friends decided it was a cool idea she joined in, Scott said. The

first year there was 30 riders on her team and they raised around \$15,000. The following year, the riders doubled up and raised around \$20,000.

The distance Sydney has tackled also has increased annually. She did 10 miles her first year as a Red Rider, or a Tour

de Cure rider who has Type 1 or 2 diabetes, then 25 miles and this year is eyeing the 50-mile mark.

"She looks forward to it every year and we have a large team," her mother, Sandy, said. "She likes being a Red Rider that day and she

Local authorities see benefits and downsides to new gun control law

Schools top concern for new assemblywoman

Fahy says education not on radar of Downstate Dems

Education was the main topic of discussion when Bethlehem residents met with state Assemblywoman Patricia Fahy for a "community coffee" gathering on the morning of Friday, March 8

Fahy met with residents for nearly two hours at the Four Corners Luncheonette in Delmar. The program was mostly informal and consisted of a meet-and-greet, followed by a question and answer session. About 30 people attended.

"I really appreciated the support on such a snowy, dreary day," Fahy said to those gathered.

The talks are part of an initiative by the assemblywoman to form a greater connection with those she represents and to help support locally owned businesses. The gatherings began

in January, when Fahy assumed office, and she hopes to hold one a month in a different area of her district. Last month's "community coffee" was held in Guilderland.

So far, Fahy said residents have been most concerned about the state's education system and what is being done to restore education funding to local municipalities.

As the former president of the Albany City School Board, Fahy campaigned on education reform and aid equality. She was victorious after a six-way Democratic primary in September, and eventually beat Republican candidate Ted Danz and Conservative candidate Joseph Sullivan in the general election by a wide margin.

The newly redrawn 109th Assembly district encompasses the southwestern parts of the City of Albany and the towns of Guilderland, New Scotland and Bethlehem. Candidates were vying to replace Assemblyman Jack McEneny, who opted

to retire last year.

Most in the audience at the Four Corners Luncheonette asked what could be done to restore funding for schools and were concerned about growing tax rates. Fahy said she was keeping education aid at the forefront of her work on the Capitol and the assembly does plan to restore some aid, but she knows it won't be enough.

"We have 16 new, freshman Democrats, so

I've been trying to get to know them," she said. "One of my strategies is trying to get to know what they care about so that if I know they have a pet project I can align myself to try and show a united front. I tell all of them my concerns about education because it's not as big an issue for those Downstate."

The Assembly budget allocated \$21.1 billion in school aid across the state, an increase of \$834 million in formula aid from the 2012-13 school year. However, those numbers will not be official until the budget is negotiated and voted on by both houses.

Fahy said Downstate

legislators are more worried about housing and the closure of a medical center in Brooklyn.

"Education is still a concern for them, but because there are so many competing issues, it's not at the forefront of their minds and I'm trying to change that," she said.

The assemblywoman said secondary questions from residents during these talks have been about the local economy, cutsto health care and care of the disabled, concerns over the environment and the federal sequester. She also has been asked about how she spends her time at the Capitol. Fahy said all of her time

Red Cross worker arrested

Police say man sent explicit texts to RCS student

Coeymans police arrested an American Red Cross volunteer after he allegedly sent sexually explicit text messages to a Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk student after a recent blood

Police said Reynaldo Higgins, 30, was volunteering at a blood drive at the RCS High School on Friday, March 1, when he allegedly obtained the phone number of a 19-year-old student from their donor card and then made "inappropriate contact" with the girl. Higgins allegedly sent nude of himself and sexually explicit text messages "in the hopes of furthering the relationship." He also attempted to call her several times, according to police.

The girl rejected his advances and asked him to stop contacting her. When the calls and texts continued over a four-day period, the girl notified school officials, who then contacted the authorities, police said.

The American Red Cross cooperated in the investigation and Higgins has since been fired. He had been volunteering with the organization for four of the generous spirit months.

Higgins, who was temporarily living in Schenectady, was charged with aggravated harassment in the second degree and stalking in the fourth degree, both misdemeanors. He was arraigned in Ravena Village Justice Court and remanded to Albany County Correctional Facility in lieu of \$20,000.00 bail.

All of the students who participated in the blood drive were spoken to by school officials. At the time, no additional students came forward to say they had a similar experience with Higgins, but later another girl said the Red Cross worker also made inappropriate comments to her while she was at the blood drive.

"We are so proud of our students who participated in the blood drive," Bailey wrote in the letter. "The combined efforts of our adult and student population helped to donate 166 units of blood that will potentially save 498 lives. This unusual and uncomfortable incident cannot outdo the good that was done through our donations."

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

Kudos (and attention) in order for EMS

First things first. Things are looking a little different on page 6 this week.

You'll notice things have been rearranged, but more importantly, we've added a sidebar we plan to make a running feature: The word on the street.

We've been running a weekly online poll for some time now, and through it and our letters page we find members of our community are generally more than eager to give their opinions on the issues of the day. We decided to take that one step further by featuring a few local voices here on the opinion page, then letting the community as a whole weigh in on the weekly question at our website.

A Spotlight reporter will be at a public place sometime during the week before the feature's publication gathering opinions. If you spot a Spotlight-er, feel free to say "hi." This presents us with another opportunity for us to get to know you, and vice versa.

Moving on, we aren't the only institution in town that's trying something new this year. Reporter Marcy Velte this past week covered the annual Community Awards that recognized Bethlehem's outstanding first responders. Among the awards handed out was one for the newly formed Delmar-Bethlehem EMS, which was awarded to the entire membership for "their ability to set aside personnel differences for the health and

safety of town residents."

You see, a merger of Delmar EMS and Bethlehem EMS became effective as of the first of this year, effectively combining two separate services into an ambulance corps that covers the entire town. And we think the organization as a whole should be recognized for that groundbreaking effort, and even treated as a trailblazer in this regard.

We'll have to wait for the real-world figures to roll in, but the town's District Board of Ambulance Commissioners estimated the merger would result in about a \$100,000 decrease in the tax levy. Maintaining quality of service while reducing taxes qualifies as a win in our book.

Not everyone was initially on board with the plan, though. When the aforementioned board came out with the idea in September of 2012, it was said the merger was being met with some resistance, and EMS leaders said the timetable was too aggressive. Nevertheless, a scant three months later, a combined EMS force was online.

Government does not typically move at anything approaching that speed. It says a lot about the leadership in these organizations that rubber was wedded with road so quickly. Likewise, it speaks to the caliber of those riding with EMS in Bethlehem, volunteer or paid, that everyone was willing to adapt.

There's a lesson here that can be applied elsewhere.

There are five fire departments serving the people of Bethlehem (seven if you count the multiple arms of the Selkirk Fire Department). A 2011 study, commissioned collectively by those departments, suggested they be merged into two organizations and finally, in a decade's time, a singular unit.

There's effectively been zero movement on the suggestion — indeed, when we originally reported on the study's findings some firefighters basically shrugged the idea off despite an agreement it would save money and even help firefighters do a better job. It would seem that for many, autonomy and individual identity is more important than effectiveness, even in a job so serious as fighting fires.

What's happened with the town's ambulance service challenges that outmoded thinking. These organizations found a way to organize a speedy merger that saved money, and lo and behold, the world kept turning. For fire departments, it might be time for another look at consolidation — a serious one, this time.

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

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Voorheesville schools facing \$440k budget gap

Proposed cuts forthcoming, two bus purchases eyed for referendum

It remains to be seen how deeply \$440,000 worth of cuts will affect the Voorheesville Central School District, as administrators consider how to stay within a tax cap of a 3.87 percent increase.

The district won't be getting any respite from the state either, despite

Gov. Andrew Cuomo increasing state aid to schools by 4.4 percent. Voorheesville is projected to see a 4 percent decrease in aid, a total aid package of \$4.9 million. During the last three years the state's gap elimination adjustment has reduced aid to the district by \$2.87 million. Declining enrollment is another issue, with Voorheesville shedding 56 students during the last five years and facing another projected decline next school year.

The projections were

offered at a Wednesday, March 6, meeting of the school board. If the district presented a budget at its tax cap, the 2013-14 budget would total \$22.6 million, a \$720,000 increase. Homeowners with a property assessed at \$250,000 could expect taxes to increase by \$194 in the Town of New Scotland (4.83 percent), \$270 in Guilderland (5.75 percent) and around \$350 in Berne homeowners.

Superintendent Teresa Thayer Snyder said most Berne homeowners fall below an assessment of \$250,000, so the tax increase wouldn't be as large.

"This year, in all the years I have been in the

business (20 years), I have never such a more difficult with the budget," Assistant Superintendent of Business Gregory Diefenbach said. "This is a budget that is fluid ... the state hasn't passed a budget yet so school districts are working again in the dark."

Potential cuts are being targeted for staffing, professional development, supplies, equipment and athletics, but the district didn't offer any specifics.

Possible reductions are expected to be presented during the Board of Education's Monday, March 11, and Monday, March 25, meetings. Adoption of the 2013-14 Budget is scheduled for

April 8.

District officials are also weighing whether to join into the governor's proposed flat-rate employee contribution plan, at 12.5 percent for 25 years. The state Teachers' Retirement System first needs to approve the measure though and school officials don't expect it to be done before adopting next year's budget.

If the district went with the proposal, its tax cap next year would be reduced to 2.58 percent.

"Like any state thing that has happened over the years, some things are half baked and then it comes out and is given to us and it is not even figured out," Diefenbach said. Diefenbach, along with other school officials, appeared hesitant to jump into the 25-year commitment, but resident Tricia Putnam urged the board to go for the reduced rate. The district currently has a contribution rate at 16.25 percent and would save around \$300,00 under the proposal.

"I think I would be more apt to go for it," Putnam said.

District officials are also proposing to present voters with two referendums alongside the budget in May, the first for purchasing two 60-passenger buses at \$214,000 and another to transfer up to \$250,000 from unallocated fund balances to the repair

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Trustee cautions contingency usage

Altamont board OKs Wastewater Treatment Plant project change orders

Altamont Trustee William Aylward expressed concern about again tapping contingency funds allocated for the wastewater treatment plant improvement project at a Tuesday, March 5, meeting, but other town officials argued the move to be responsible budgeting.

The Altamont Board of Trustees Tuesday authorized two change orders totaling nearly \$18,400 for the \$3.5 million capital improvement project, which includes installing new equipment. Board members awarded project contracts in May 2012 after the Department of Environmental Conservation mandated the improvements following a 2010 order of consent citing the village for overflow of untreated sewage during weatherrelated, high water events.

In the end, the change orders were unanimously approved, but Aylward first questioned why the first change order presented included allocating funds for additional concrete and grout demolition at the tertiary filters.

"Would that not be part of the original plan?" Aylward asked.

Jason Ballard, project engineer from Barton & Loguidice, said the additional demolition couldn't be foreseen because engineers only had plans from when it was first built in the 1950s. Ballard added the filters weren't drained until work began to avoid interrupting operations.

"It was an unforeseen condition," Ballard said. "When we drained it and started looking at the filter we realized we had to remove that."

After approving \$16,700 of contingency allowance, there is \$5,345 remaining in the contract budget.

"My concern is we are using up contingency funds rather rapidly," Aylward said. "I am concerned we

are going to end up with a change order for \$100,000."

Ballard said he doesn't see that happening, but there could be further change orders brought to the board.

"When you keep digging, there is stuff unforeseen," Ballard said. "We are going faster with our contract than we are with our contingency.

The second change order allowed tapping \$1,697 in contingency funds to include electrical grounding of a panel in the existing tertiary filter building. There is \$2,000 of contingency funds remaining for that project.

Mayor James Gaughan said the board is tracking the project carefully to make sure money is spent "efficiently and effectively." Before any change order reaches the board it also goes through a subcommittee, Gaughan said.

"I welcome the conversation, but I don't personally think there has been irresponsibility on this," Gaughan said.

Aylward said he didn't want to "give the impression that change orders are routine."

The project must be completed by June, and this is the first year sewage system users will see increased bills to pay for the project, which will be paid off during the next 20 years. The increase is approximately 25 cents per household daily.

In other business, the board approved spending \$41,000 to purchase a new four-wheel drive police vehicle, approved holding it organizational meeting on Tuesday, April 2, at 7 p.m. and scheduled a budget public hearing during its April 2 meeting.

Bethlehem Opportunities Unlimited holds event, invites town

Struggling spellers who may have fantasized about getting even with a demanding English teacher will have their chance at revenge, as educators are set to take on Bethlehem residents in the inaugural Community Spelling

The event is being sponsored by Bethlehem Opportunities Unlimited, a local nonprofit group that funds youth activities and alcohol and drug prevention education to teens. The spelling bee is meant to be the group's main fundraiser of the year, and takes the place of the "March Madness" faculty basketball game that is now sponsored by the Bethlehem Central Community Foundation.

"We usually sponsor the basketball classic but we wanted to do something a little different that would not only involve teachers and students, but also the greater community," said BOU Co-President Javne Deane-White.

The group decided to move away from the basketball event because many felt the game was getting too competitive. Deane-White said one of the organization's goals is to promote education, and members wanted to focus on an event that would intellectually challenge participants.

Deane-White said a fellow board member suggested a spelling bee after a member of her family successfully ran a similar event as a fundraiser in Connecticut. So far, 14 groups have registered to participate in the bee. BC teachers and administrative staff at all levels have signed on, as have employees from

local businesses like Price Chopper and Kinderhook Bank and members of town government.

All participants are asked to work in teams of three to five members, and are encouraged to wear matching uniforms. At the bee, each team captain will be deemed the designated speller, but team members will be allowed to give their advice. The words are to be written out on a large white board, and each team will have 60 seconds after the second pronunciation of the word to spell it correctly.

The teams will be asked to spell 12 words in two preliminary rounds, and teams will be eliminated for misspelled words. The two winning teams from each round will then move on to the quarterfinals and finals, where they will spell five words each. BC Superintendent Tom Douglas will participate on the judges panel.

BOU is hoping the event turns out to be successful financially. A team in the competition can be sponsored by a local organization for \$100 and companies or groups may also pay \$75 to sponsor a word.

"These words aren't going to be easy," Deane-White said. "We had a local dental practice sponsor a word from the dental field, so participants are going to have to bring their thinking caps."

She added for those who don't want to compete in the bee, BOU is hoping the community will come out to watch and show their support for their favorite team.

"We're hoping to sponsor a friendly competition that will become popular and turn into an annual event," said Deane-White.

Refreshments will be served at the event and a 50/50 raffle will be held.

Teams can register to participate in the spelling bee until Wednesday, March 20. The competition will take place the following week on Wednesday, March 27, at 7 p.m., in the BC Middle School auditorium. Admission is \$3 for students, seniors and veterans, \$5 for adults and \$10 for a family.

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


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
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

likes the special recognition of being a Red Rider.'

Another Guilderland native. Erin Parks, is also looking forward to riding again this year.

Parks, a 25-year-old living in Glenmont, had just started her fall semester as a senior at Syracuse University when she started noticing symptoms. In a little more than two weeks she lost around 20 pounds, but doctors didn't diagnose her correctly at first.

"I was thirsty all the time and very lethargic and tired, so I went to the doctor's a few times and they said it was just a virus at first," Parks said.

Both Parks and Sydney Steinhardt didn't have any family history of diabetes, so the diagnosis was a surprise to both families.

Parks said she was glad it was "something very manageable" and was

happy to start addressing the problem to feel better.

"I just always have to be prepared and make sure I have extra insulin on hand and something to eat, or some juice in case my blood sugar gets a little bit low," Parks said.

Parks said she checks her blood sugar level about six times daily, typically before and a few hours after a meal. The first year she did injections, but she now uses an insulin pump to help manage her diabetes.

Sandy Steinhardt said she makes sure Sydney understands that having diabetes is not what defines her.

"My biggest struggle with her as a parent is making sure she continues to be an 11-year-old," Sandy Steinhardt said. "She can't just be like a regular kid outside playing all day. ... It is a constant thing that she has to deal with.'

Scott Steinhardt said Sydney remained a competitive swimmer after being diagnosed. The year

of her diagnosis she won a state title in the freestyle eight and under category.

Sydney, a Pine Bush Elementary student, will also be joined, adults from her school community, with five of her teachers, principal, and school nurse riding on her team, "Sydney's Spinners."

Parks, who formed Team Parks, said education and awareness are big aspects of Tour de Cure, besides raising funds for the ADA.

"A lot of people don't know the differences between Type 1 and Type 2 and how much money is spent on diabetes each year," Parks said.

The event also helps people with diabetes connect with others to share experiences and support.

"You know that the things you are experiencing are normal," Parks said.

staff. "Unfortunately, given the state aid picture, we're forced to make decisions that we don't like to do.'

The recommendation includes reducing staff in the subjects of English, science, art, foreign language and physical education at the high school level. The plan also calls for the reduction of a librarian, a social worker, a monitor and a guidance counselor.

Monroe said a new plan could potentially be enacted at the high school level to allow students who participate in two or more sports to drop physical education class, thereby reducing the number of classes taught. Action would need to be taken by the school board to change school code.

If the school board

decides to set the tax increase lower than the maximum allowable limit, the district could see the loss of up to nine additional full-time positions at the elementary and middle school levels and a 20 percent reduction to electives. This plan would see the sixth grade schedule reduced by one period and middle school students taking fewer sections of foreign language and physical education. These changes would save \$652,000.

Monroe said previous reductions to staff have already led to larger class sizes, less specialized attention from teachers, the loss of class offerings and a drop in standardized test scores.

District officials also offered further potential reductions to the district's operations and athletics budgets beside \$260,000 in cuts recommended earlier in the month. An operations and maintenance supervisor

could be cut and the district could reduce sports levels from three to two for a combined savings of \$180,000.

"Everyone here is trying to do everything they can to preserve one of our most sacred trusts — our students. And the education of that youth for a great tomorrow," said Douglas, pushing for greater advocacy to state lawmakers to restore aid.

David Rounds, the president of the Bethlehem Central Teacher's Association, said he sympathized with the board because they have been "boxed in" by the state legislature.

"Every person in this community has done their job, it's the State of New York that's not, specifically the governor," he said in response to the last-minute aid reduction.

"Given the fact that you've been forced into this situation, I urge you

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


"This is the first year I have made a theme of it, calling it 'Irish-style,' so I am gearing my musicians and performers toward that," Young said.

Town backs off on SAFE Act plan

In letter, board states support but will not pursue resolution

The Bethlehem Town Board is no longer pursuing a resolution stating its support for the SAFE Act, as officials say it would be a distraction from local issues.

"We received some emails and calls from residents on both sides of the issue," said Supervisor John Clarkson. "We now feel the topic might detract from town

business and we, as town officials, are elected to oversee issues within the Town of Bethlehem."

Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn had originally proposed the measure at the Wednesday, Feb. 27, Town Board

meeting. The resolution stated the town support for the state's newly enacted Secure Ammunition and Firearms Enforcement Act.

Although a majority of the board was in favor of the resolution, some residents were strongly opposed to the motion and there should have been more time for them to weigh in. The proposal was brought up during the "new business" portion of the meeting and was not on the agenda.

On Thursday, March 7, a letter to the editor was submitted to The Spotlight signed by Kuhn, Councilman Kyle Kotary, Councilman Bill Reinhardt and Clarkson, which said the board would no longer pursue the resolution because members did "not wish to distract" from important town business.

The four Town Board members also wrote while there is support on the board for the SAFE Act, they "acknowledge that there are also many in our town who are strongly opposed to some or all of its provisions.'

Kuhn said he had proposed the resolution in response to efforts across the state to get local municipalities to pass resolutions opposing the law, as well a protest being held at the Capitol. He said he felt those in favor of the SAFE Act should also speak out.

Resident Linda Jasinski

had asked during the public comment section that the board pass a resolution in opposition of the SAFE Act, "if for no other reason than the way it had been passed.

At the Feb. 27 meeting, Reinhardt was in favor of passing the resolution. Clarkson said he agreed with the idea but also felt residents should have more time to voice their opinions on the matter, Kotary did not speak for or against the resolution and Councilwoman Joann Dawson said she felt the law was not something the board should take a stance on at all.

The board had planned to take the issue up again at its next meeting on Wednesday, March 13.

We strongly support the SAFE Act, stand in solidarity with those who enacted it, and certainly do not support its repeal," the letter from the board members read. "However, we also do not see the advantage in a protracted discussion at the town level on the details of the act.'

input from outside of the Capitol.

"We were never given a chance, at least the sheriffs in the state, to participate in the debate for or against it because there really wasn't any," Apple said. "I certainly want provisions of this law repealed."

The New York State Sheriffs' Association previously voiced similar concerns over not being included in discussions and suggested portions of the law be amended or clarified.

"Any time government decides it is necessary or desirable to nibble around the edges of a Constitutional right that it should only be done with caution and with great respect for the Constitutional boundaries," read a statement previously released by the Sheriffs' Association. "And it should only be done if the benefit to be gained is so great and certain that it far outweighs the damage done by the constriction of individual liberty. While many of the

provisions of this bill have surface appeal, it is far from certain that all, or even many, of them will have any significant effect in reducing gun violence, which is the presumed goal of all of us."

Apple didn't explicitly call the law unconstitutional, but claimed it infringes on the right to bear arms.

"I think it does in fact start to encroach on our second amendment," Apple

Other local law enforcement officers had opinions that varied


from that of Apple, who holds an elected office. Bethlehem Police Chief Louis Corsi acknowledged the controversy over the law, but declined to share his opinion and thus get involved in the politics of it.

"From alawenforcement perspective, at the end of the day we are charged with enforcing the law ... and that is what we intend to do," Corsi said. "My personal opinion on this has no bearing at all."

understands the emotional response some gun owners have towards the law, but believes there are "a lot of great things" within it.

"I am probably one of the most in the middle kind of people, I am not a gun enthusiast and I am not anti-gun either," Heider said.

Heider said once past emotional issues, people might see the positives to the SAFE Act. He also reaffirmed police officers

wouldn't go to people's homes and confiscate weapons newly banned under the law.

"This bill does not create a police state," Heider said.

Heider, along with Apple and the Sheriffs' Association, pointed to new reporting requirements for mental health care professionals as a benefit of the law.

The state Conference of Local Mental Hygiene Directors said requiring practitioners to report people who are a dangerous to themselves or others to the local Director of Community Services, a provision that becomes effective

March 16, would overburden mental health offices and would "cost local governments millions of dollars" annually.

Other SAFE Act provisions like strengthening penalties for those who kill first responders, requiring safe storage of firearms and increasing penalties for illegal use of weapons have generally been uncontroversial.

Apple and Heider said some sections of the law are based on good faith, such as limiting magazines to holding seven rounds, and police likely wouldn't ever discover those violations

unless investigating another charge.

"To take a 10-round magazine and tell people to only put seven rounds in it, come on," Apple said.

The act also strengthened penalties for crimes like possessing an unloaded illegal gun. Apple suggested penalties for carrying an illegal gun be even tougher, with a mandatory five-year sentence.

Heider said the proliferation of illegal weapons has only increased gun violence because people who want to do bad things can more easily obtain a weapon.

"The unfortunate part is that there are just so many guns available for people that want to do something bad with them and unfortunately, this law does not address that," Heider said.

In the hilltowns of Albany County, guns aren't a large concern for law enforcement, Apple said. During the past decade there have been two murders in the hilltowns, with the weapons of choice being a bungee cord in one and cutlery in the other.

"Bad people are always going to do bad things," Apple said.

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

Experienced Falcons hand Bethlehem its first loss

Experience trumped youth in last Monday's Section II Class AA girls basketball final at the Times Union Center.

Three Albany players reached double digits in scoring to lead the Lady Falcons to a 64-47 victory over Bethlehem.

Senior guard Emia Willingham-Hurst had 15 points, 13 rebounds, three assists and five steals to help Albany (20-1) win the Sectional title one year after losing to Colonie in the Class AA final.

"That was a big one," said Willingham-Hurst. "It was great to get over (the hump).'

Playing in its first Sectional final since 2009, Bethlehem (20-1) had a difficult time getting into an offensive rhythm. The Lady Eagles made only 27 percent of their shots from the field and turned the ball over 21 times.

First step toward the NFL

Guilderland grad Smith impresses pro scouts with his speed

Drew Smith took another step toward a career in the National Football League.

The Guilderland High School graduate participated in a pro day last Wednesday at Fordham University and so impressed the NFL scouts in attendance that he was kept behind to run several drills.

"They had me run some routes, and the scouts were all watching me," said Smith. "It was actually kind of nerve wracking, but it was a good sign."

The 6-foot, 2-inch University at Albany senior tailback set himself apart from the pack by running a 4.53-second 40-yard dash.

"I was really kind of nervous about it because they hold that (40-yard dash time) in such high regard," said Smith. "I know they were impressed with it.'

After completing several agility drills, Smith was one of two players at the pro day asked by the scouts to stay and show what they could do when asked to run some plays. The scouts liked with what they saw.

"Afterwards, a couple of (NFL) scouts came up to me and said they were hoping to keep me under the radar (on draft day) so they could sign me as a free agent," said Smith.

Smith is hoping be one of a growing number of NCAA Division I Football Championship

Subdivision players to make the jump to the NFL – a list that includes reigning Super Bowl most valuable player Joe Flacco of the Baltimore Ravens.

"These (NFL) coaches, they don't look at where you've played. They look at what you can do," said Smith.

Smith has accomplished a lot during his four-year playing career at UAlbany. He's led the

Great Danes in rushing each of the last three years and gained more than 1,000 yards in 2011 and 2012. He was also one of the nation's leaders in touchdowns last season with 19.

"It was a blast. I had a great time," said Smith, who gained 4,721 all-purpose yards and scored 45 touchdowns in his career. "I wasn't sure what to expect coming to Albany. There

are so many kids coming in with you, you don't know if you're going to make it. I was fortunate to come in and given the chance to contribute right away."

A quarterback at Guilderland, Smith switched to tailback in his freshman season - a transition he said wasn't hard to make.

"I was always between those two positions. So, it wasn't that

Buonaguro didn't get the job done

I think Siena will miss a golden opportunity for creating stability with its men's basketball program if it doesn't promote assistant coach Mitch Buonaguro to succeed Fran McCaffery as the Saints head coach.

I'm glad Mitch Buonaguro is getting his chance to coach the Siena College men's basketball team. As I said in last week's column, Buonaguro gives the Saints stability. He knows the players and what they're capable of, and the players know Buonaguro and the style of play he'll be implementing.

March 13, 2013

So much for creating stability.

After an 8-24 season – its third consecutive losing campaign - it appears that Buonaguro's days as Siena's head coach may be coming to an end. The embattled coach is slated to meet with Atheltic Director John D'Argenio this week, and if past history is any indication of what the Loudonville school is going to do in this situation, Buonaguro is as good as gone. The last two coaches to lose 20 or more games in a season - Bob Beyer and Rob Lanier – were fired after that happened.

Buonaguro had established some good



will among the Siena faithful when the Saints finished with a 14-17 record last year, despite only having seven scholarship players on the court due to injuries. People figured with time and a new recruiting class that Siena was headed for better days in 2012-13.

That good will evaporated quickly this year as Siena lost 13 of its first 15 games on the way to its 8-24 finish. The Saints didn't win a home game until it defeated Canisius 57-54 on Jan. 11. They finished with a 4-10 record at the Times Union Center.

What really bothered Siena fans was how careless the Saints were with the ball. Siena ranked near the bottom of all NCAA Division I teams in total turnovers (490), and the Saints had a -4.3 turnover margin.

Certainly, you can blame the turnovers on the players. But Buonaguro must share in the blame for not getting the players to

correct the problem. A good coach will find a way to fix what isn't working, and Buonaguro didn't do that.

Injuries also played a role in Siena's struggles this season. Rakeem Brookins missed 12 games, while Trenity Burdine was out for nine games and Rob Poole sat out four games. That's 60 percent of Siena's starting lineup missing significant time due to ailments.

Ultimately, though, a college basketball team's performance is a direct reflection of the coach's abilities of directing the on-court results and recruiting the players. It's hard to see Buonaguro as a success when the players he recruited led Siena to a ninth-place finish in the 10-team Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference.

If Buonaguro is allowed to return to Loudonville for the 2013-14 season, he will have to find a way to get his players to improve their level of play. If he isn't allowed to return, that challenge will be left to Buonaguro's successor. Either way, the turnover issue has to be the first priority.

As for Buonaguro, all I can say is I really hoped he could maintain Siena's winning tradition. Unfortunately, he couldn't do it.
