# Breonics decision tabled again

**Company head says** it's unclear why developer would delay Vista process

The decision to approve tax breaks for first technology company lined up for the Vista Technology Campus was once again delayed by the Bethlehem Industrial Development Agency after the developer pulled the

project from the agenda for a second time.

At the IDA's meeting on Friday, April 26, the agency's Assistant Secretary Tom Connolly said Joe Nicolla of Columbia Development once again sent word he would like the project pulled from the meeting agenda. Connolly said no reason was given for the request, but that "it is in the developer's right" to have the project dropped from the agenda.

The IDA is in discussions with Breonics Inc., an Albany company specializing in organ regeneration research, to lease space within a new building proposed for a now undeveloped portion of the Slingerlands campus. Breonics is considering the move because the lease at its home in the state's Harriman Research Center is ending in August.

Nicolla did not attend the meeting, but in a later interview said he wished not to comment on the status of the project. He also would not say if he plans for the project to be placed on the agenda for next month's IDA meeting.

For Breonics, the development was deemed perplexing.

"I have no idea what's going on," said Breonics Chairman Ernie Green. "I don't know why they would delay the project,

The pledge includes certain expectations listed for drivers, pedestrians and bikers, such as making eye contact with drivers before crossing the road and making sure to yield to pedestrians when driving.

Residents are asked to check off criteria, sign the pledge and return it to the committee. The signatures and pledges will then be kept on file. Committee members hope neighboring towns may use their program as an example.

"We really see the validity in growing this message and sharing it with other communities," said Holmes.

Although the committee would like to see all residents in town participate in taking the pledge, the program will mostly be geared toward children. Through a partnership with school districts, local volunteers from the Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee will be visiting many of the town's elementary schools to talk about the project and presentations will be given to local youth groups.

The project was first adopted after there were discussions about the safety of the crosswalk on Delaware Avenue children use to get to Elsmere Elementary School. This campaign is meant to teach children about how to safely walk to school while

changing the mindset of the town's drivers. The hope is children will then take what they learned back home to educate their parents. Students will also be given extra pledges so their parents can sign and return them.

A former incarnation of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee, called the Bethlehem Citizens for Pedestrian Safety, provided \$800 from an old account of the group to pay for brochures and educational material. The first group was formed in 1997 after the deaths of several young pedestrians.

Former committee member Fran Stevens said much of the group's money was raised through fundraisers after the classmates of Sarah Whiting, a ninth-grader

who was killed when hit by a car, wanted to do something to honor their fellow student. About \$5,000 was raised through several runathons and some additional money was left over from grants.

"The students wanted to do something along with Sarah's parents in order to keep Sarah's memory alive," said Stevens.

Each member of the Bethlehem Town Board signed the pledge and returned their forms. Supervisor John Clarkson said he "very much" supports the program and wants to see it grow.

# Teen faces charges for driving into apartment wall

A Bethlehem teen ran his car into an apartment building on Cherry Avenue after he allegedly was drinking, according to police.

Calvin Warner, 18, of 15 Adams Place, was charged by Bethlehem police with operating a motor vehicle after consuming alcohol under the age of 21. He was released to the custody of his father.

Police said Warner was allegedly speeding while driving down Cherry Avenue around 2 a.m. on Sunday, April 28. Police said he then struck an apartment building at Maple Manor Apartments with his car, causing serious damage.

Dennis LaGrange, a resident of Maple Manor Apartments, said he heard the crash and went outside to see what happened. "It sounded like a loud band," he said. "A kid in a white shirt was yelling at his friends to come back, and said his parents were going to kill him. I called police and then went over to make sure everyone got out of the car."

Police said the car had two other occupants besides Warner. Everyone on the scene was interviewed, and there were no reported injuries. Warner was also charged with reckless driving, a misdemeanor, and several traffic violations, including speeding and failure to stop at a stop sign.

Several area schools held prom this weekend, but the Bethlehem Central School District said Warner is not a student of the district and did not attend this weekend's junior prom. Police said Warner was not charged with a DWI because of his age and his blood alcohol level was between a 0.02 to 0.07. Police said they could not release Warner's blood alcohol level at the time of the accident.

"This is a rare case for us," said police spokesman Lt. Tom Heffernan. "Typically someone in this situation would be charged with driving while ability impaired because of his age, but because of the law, his BAC wasn't high enough."

Heffernan said a time will be set for Warner to have Department of Motor Vehicle hearing, and there is the possibility the teenager could lose his license. A Bethlehem court date to answer the other charges has been set for May 28.

# **Contract talks on life support**

#### Voorheesville **Area Ambulance** Service and village reach deadlock

Four months have passed since Voorheesville Area Ambulance Service's contract with the village expired, and contract negotiations have flatlined.

Negotiations stalled when a majority of the Voorheesville Board of Trustees wanted to withhold about \$8,800 in funding from the ambulance service's reserve accounts, saying the village faces challenges in supporting its \$2.12 million budget. The reserve account typically funds vehicle purchases and capital projects.

Mayor Robert Conway said trustees are weighing their options and discussed the contract at a Tuesday, April 23, meeting.

Conway said the ambulance company is still serving the village, but it is his understanding it is not billing for services within the village.

Conway said he hasn't meet with anyone from the ambulance service since the company's meeting in early March. He said both sides laid out their positions at the end of the meeting and the ambulance service's Captain Ray Ginter said he would talk to the Board of Directors and get back to Conway. According to Conway, this hasn't happened yet.

The village was providing tax-free fuel to the company, which is a common offering because it simplifies the process for the ambulance service. Since there is no contract with the village, continuing to offer the fuel has also raised concerns.

Conway said the village had tried to set a temporary agreement for fuel purchasing. The company now gets its fuel tax-free from New Scotland. The Town Board unanimously approved a fuel purchasing agreement with the company at its Wednesday, March 13, meeting.

Without the purchasing agreement with the town, the ambulance service could go to a private seller and then apply for a refund from the state.

## **Guest opinion Rooting for trees**

Many of the most beautiful things I've ever seen are trees. From graceful willows or stately oaks, to the vivid hues of a Sugar Maple in Fall, I love trees. The ugliest cities I've seen lacked trees. On the other hand, the prettiest towns and cities have had grand avenues of high canopied trees. I think of Washington, D.C., Savannah, Georgia, and Paris as examples.

Besides their beauty, trees add considerable value to our communities. Tree-lined commercial districts are known to increase frequency and length of shopping trips. Mature tree plantings can increase home values significantly.

There are important environmental reasons to value the trees in our community. Our tarmac and concrete cities absorb a great deal of solar heat. Many cities are 10 degrees warmer than their surrounding rural areas. The shade from trees can keep

cooler, saving energy use from air conditioning in warmer months. The net cooling effect of a young healthy tree is equivalent to 10 room-sized air conditioners operating 20 hours/day (USDA). Trees also act as wind breaks and reduce noise pollution.

Trees in urban areas make it easier for people with asthma or lung disease to breath because trees consume tons of carbon dioxide from car emissions and replace it with the oxygen we need (through photosynthesis). Large healthy trees consume 60% more pollution than small trees because of their greater leaf and bark surface. They sequester 1000 times more carbon dioxide in their trunks and branches. Trees are one of our best defenses against climate change.

One of the major problems facing aging cities is that our storm sewer systems are no longer adequate to manage our storm run off (plus, our standards of what should run back into our rivers have

pavements, cars, and buildings become more stringent). Trees are an important part of managing storm run off. Trees catch rainfall, reducing storm water flow, decreasing the burden on our sewer systems, and decreasing risk of sewage getting dumped into our rivers. Trees absorb ground water and evaporate it into the air, another way they lower air temperatures. Trees reduce soil erosion.

> Bethlehem and its surrounding towns have experienced a heavy loss of tree canopy in the last 10 years. Older pines and silver maples have reached maturity and have needed management or replacement. Ash and Elm trees have been lost to disease. Many avenues of taller trees were unfortunately sited under power lines. Bethlehem's treelined streets are disappearing. Severe storms have blown down some of our grandest specimens. Also, Chinese Bittersweet vines (an invasive species) are choking out younger trees in our urban woodlands.

The Bethlehem Garden Club is spearheading an effort to replant trees in our community. In support of our town, we are inviting applications from any landowner in Bethlehem to "host" a new tree in their streetside lot. Resources are limited at this time. Our emphasis will be on planting the right tree in a particular spot. Recipients of a tree will be expected to water and tend the tree, especially during its first two years when regular watering is essential. For an application, visit www. bethlehemgardenclubny.org.

Of course, we encourage everyone to go ahead and replace trees that they have had to remove. Be mindful of underground systems (call 811 to identify underground systems in your yard), overhead power lines, and town code setbacks from the street when siting a tree. Seek advice on good urban trees (salt tolerant and the right height for the spot), especially near sidewalks, streets and buildings.

# **Full court press for compressions**

#### **Colonie boys affected** by CPR part of effort to teach method in schools

Two Colonie boys learned about the power of CPR the hard way, and now they're advocating that it becomes mandatory for their peers to learn the life-saving method.

Joey Mendrick, 12, and Casey Stashenko, 14, stood before the Legislative Office Building in Albany on Tuesday, April 16, and urged state lawmakers to pass the "CPR in Schools" bill. They were joined by members of the American Heart Association, state officials, other survivors of cardiac arrest and parents who had lost children to cardiac arrest.

The bill calls for every high school student in the state to learn CPR before graduation. Sponsored by Long Island lawmakers Assemblyman Harvey Weisenberg, D-Long Beach, and Sen. Charles Fuschillo, R-Merrick, the legislation was passed in the Senate last year but did not see a vote in the Assembly.

"Every child is a potential lifesaver through this simple and inexpensive instruction. The entities opposed to this bill need to rethink their priorities," Weisenberg said at the event. "You can't get a better 'thank you' than to see a person who isn't breathing, breathe."

For Stashenko, his father may not be alive today if it weren't for CPR. While his father was suffering from a heart attack in May 2012,

Stashenko watched as his mother began performing CPR and realized she was doing it incorrectly. The Sand Creek Middle School student had learned the Hands-Only CPR method in school and immediately started using that technique on his father.

"CPR was easy to learn in the classroom, and I used that teaching a few months later to save my father's life," Stashenko said.

Mendrick, on the other hand, was struck in the chest by a baseball during a Little League game on April 16, 2012. After going into cardiac arrest, Brian Curran, an adult on the field, performed CPR and saved his life. The American Heart Association celebrated his new "birthday" at the event with cupcakes.

"At my game, I was surrounded by adults that knew what to do, but what if it was pickup game with just kids present? CPR being

something fun, easy to learn and can quickly become a real game changer," Mendrick said.

Some, however, weren't as lucky, though. Karen Acompora of Northport lost her 14-year-old son in 2000 when he was struck in the chest while playing lacrosse. In his honor, she founded the Louis J. Acompora Memorial Foundation to ensure the placement of AEDs,

places.

"Training the next generation of life savers who know how to respond in the event of a cardiac emergency should be a top priority in our school districts. With faster response times to a cardiac emergency, we actually have the ability

defibrillator, in public to reduce the number of sudden cardiac deaths in our nation," she said.

According to the American Heart Association, about 300,000 sudden cardiac arrests occur in the United States annually. The survival rate is below 8 percent. Hands-Only CPR has become

the preferred method since many people were afraid to do mouth-tomouth CPR. Bob Elling, a Colonie paramedic, said use of CPR can double or triple the survival rate.

'There's only so many people I can save as a paramedic ... but we can train people to save people," he said.

# V'ville board of ed adopts \$22.6M budget

#### Tax hike of 3.23% settled on, freshman basketball could be restored

The Voorheesville Board of Education unanimously adopted a \$22.56 million 2013-14 budget during a special meeting on Tuesday, April 23. The tax levy would be raised by 3.23 percent under the plan.

The budget was largely unchanged from the board's previous meeting, with only fine-tuning reductions. The tax hike is below the district's state imposed tax cap, and the budget increases spending over this year by nearly \$694,000, or 3.17 percent. Fund balance allocation is also increasing by \$100,000 to total \$700,000.

"The cuts this year are all as painful, but they weren't as painful as they could have otherwise been," Board President Timothy Blow said after the meeting. "Our administrators did some things, like the change in the health care, to try and tighten the belt where we can."

Board members cut around \$316,000 from the

budget, largely avoiding classroom instruction. Some additional savings were also attainted through restructuring, such as cutting natural gas costs by \$33,000 due to joining a larger consortium and streamlining services contracts.

Freshman basketball is slated for elimination, but Blow was fairly optimistic it would be restored. Board members primarily proposed the cut because of the possible lack of competition at that level, Blow said.

"As things develop over the next couple of months, I'm fairly confident that freshman basketball would be restored," Blow said. "My last report from the athletic director was that he is fairly confident he could get a reasonably good schedule for next year. That



was the one reason it was on the cut list."

Eliminating the freshman team is estimated to save around \$4,500, which Blow said could be found through additional cost savings or shifting athletic department funds.

"We'll find the money if we need to, but I think it will be here next year in one form or another," Blow said. "It's a relatively minimal dollar amount. I'm sure we could cover it."

The aquatics program budget is reduced by almost \$8,500, but the athletic director is working to restructure it, according to Assistant Superintendent for Business Gregory Diefenbach.

Other reductions include eliminating one bus route and cutting field trips by 50 percent for \$24,5000 in savings; reducing clerical work time by one month for a \$19,000 savings; eliminating the middle/ high school art club, FBLA, Masterminds and Envirothon clubs; reducing humanities funding for speakers, supplies and stipends; and reducing equipment purchases by \$41,500.

The four clubs eliminated have had funds allocated in previous budgets, but there was not a lot of interest in them, according to Diefenbach.

"They are basically clubs that are just not active, so there is no sense to hold a dollar amount aside for them if it is not going to be used," Diefenbach said.

Voorheesville residents can expect to see their taxes increase after officials adopted a budget that increases the property tax levy by 2.6 percent, within the village's tax cap limit.

The Voorheesville Board of Trustees on Tuesday, April 23, unanimously adopted a \$2.12 million 2013-14 budget, which increases spending around \$140,000, or 7 percent. Robert Conway said. Sales tax revenue in the village has steadily increased, with around \$831,000 received in 2011 and \$864,000 in 2012.

> Board members across-the-board salary increases from 3 percent to 2 percent. Conway's salary will remain flat. Conway said the board made adjustments to accommodate raises and the board was "comfortable" with offering a 2 percent increase.

> "We have been careful in our budgeting and the village runs well, it runs efficiently, and the reason it does is because of the dedication of our employees. We certainly want to do whatever we can to reward them for that hard work," Conway said. "It was with difficulty

that we reduced the originally proposed raise from 3 to 2 percent, but we just felt that we had to make some adjustments in the budget."

General fund balance allocation is increasing by around \$65,000, with the added expenditures aimed at addressing drainage issues on Pleasant Street. Almost \$115,000 is scheduled to be used from general fund reserves in the 2013-14 budget.

One side of Pleasant Street is higher than the other, Conway said, and storms over the last few years have caused water damage to homes on the lower side. A couple of years ago, the village paved the street in hopes of fixing the problem. The mayor said the original drainage was "under engineered," and the proposed project should fix the drainage.

"The piping underneath the road needs to be replaced and there are catch basins that need to be enlarged," Conway said.

Village officials have started putting together bid documents for the project with an aim to complete it this construction season.



the costs of substitutes," Diefenbach said.

Instead of calling a substitute, Blow said classes could be covered by a study hall with classroom work to complete, or a test could be given.

Christina Berte, a high school science teacher, said the reduction could potentially have "a lot of negative impact." The cut wouldn't affect the elementary school.

"We depend on qualified substitutes when we are absent to conduct classes for us, whether that is administering a test, showing an educational video or conducting an actual lesson," Berte said. 'A concern would be a loss of instructional time if those students were simply sent to study halls ... because a teacher there

... would be unable to do those things that we depend on."

Superintendent Teresa Thayer Snyder said she understands the concern, but it seemed to be a way to "insulate teachers" from cuts.

"I hear you," Snyder said. "We are worried about that, too."

Board member Diana Straut stressed any restorations should

go towards priorities identified by the board, such as freshman basketball.

"I just want to make sure that we restore purposefully with things that closely affect classrooms and kids,' Straut said.

Diefenbach told The Spotlight on Wednesday, April 24, the district was not prepared to offer figures on how the budget would increase tax rates for homeowners. He said district officials are hoping to present estimates at the board's Monday, May 13, budget hearing.

"We will do our best to try and get the best numbers as possible," he said.

Assessed property values aren't known by the district until July, Diefenbach said, which is when the tax rate is calculated for municipalities.

Voters will head to the polls Tuesday, May 21, to weigh in on Voorheesville's 2013-14 budget from 2 to 9 p.m. in the middle school foyer. Voters will also be presented with two referendums alongside the budget. One referendum seeks approval to purchase two 60-passenger buses at \$214,000 and the other to transfer up to \$250,000 from unallocated fund balances to the repair reserve.

# **Governments concerned about college charge-backs**

**Town wants** protection from school charges. county wants reform

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy recently visited Bethlehem to update residents on the state of the county, but Town Board members were more concerned the County Legislature may opt to pass down college charge-back fees to towns in next year's budget.

McCoy was a presenter at the most recent Town Board meeting on Wednesday, April 24, at which board members

brought up a state law requiring each county in New York that does not have its own community college to pay a fee for each student to attend school in another county. The fee charged to the county per student is the "charge-back" and it cost Albany County about \$12 million last year.

Those costs could

soon be pushed down to the town level in order to fix the holes in the county's budget. The fees would cost the Town of Bethlehem an estimated \$1 million next year. Board members earlier in the year passed a resolution asking the state for protection from counties passing the fees down.

About 5,000 Albany County students now attend HVCC, and officials are hoping the shorter commute might entice some students to switch.

Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn wanted to know if McCoy would be willing to ask the State Comptroller's Office to look into the fees being charged by HVCC. Kuhn said Albany County is essentially being charged double per capita when compared to what Rensselaer County taxpayers are charged. He said this is done through a loophole where college officials allegedly manipulate their estimated budget data for the year and use fund balance to pay in-house contributions.

"Even if it turns out these calculations are technically legal, a comptroller's audit could bring attention to the issue and help drive the change in the system," Kuhn said.

McCoy said he has testified in front of the state senate on the issue. He's also spoken with Comptroller Thomas Dinapoli, who said his office is beginning an audit. McCoy said he would like to see the law repealed to give "true mandate relief," or have the county help students by need level.

Town Supervisor John Clarkson applauded the county executive's efforts.

"This appears to be a gaming of the system," he said. "It may not be illegal, but still we have to get the full background that only a comptroller's audit would bring forth."

# **Chamber: Guilderland businesses in bloom**

#### Entrepreneurs see bright side to starting and owning business

There are more than just flowers blooming in Guilderland this spring, as new businesses sprout up one after another.

That's how officials at the Guilderland Chamber of Commerce see it. They have been attending numerous ribbon cuttings over the past several months, in the fall and late winter bringing their big scissors to 13 businesses openings, according to Chamber President Kathy Burbank. New businesses opened in storefronts that went dark during the last several years as the economy slumped.

"There has been at least the same amount of businesses closing over the last three to four years," Burbank said. "It's just that the buildings or spaces remained empty for a while and now all of a sudden these last six months have been very active for new businesses opening. I would say all of the empty spaces except maybe a few have been filled."

Burbank said there has been a combination of professional offices, retail stores and restaurants opening primarily along Western Avenue, including in Crossgates Mall.

around and is making people more confident in opening a business here," Burbank said. "The recent flurry of activity is more than I have seen in my six years here and I think it may be a first for Guilderland."

Burbank said the Chamber doesn't do much to attract new businesses, because it "can't promise" anything to potential businesses. She said commercial realtors primarily are the main force in attracting businesses to the town.

The Chamber does help struggling businesses by meeting with them to develop marketing strategies and by holding events at their stores. Burbank said community events, such as Restaurant Week, also help draw customers to new businesses.

"Most of these events are free or very low cost for businesses," Burbank said.

Penny Shure, owner of Healing with Movement Pilates,

said she is looking forward to joining the Chamber but said the business community as a whole has been welcoming since she opened on Western Avenue in November. She started her business 10 years ago and is moving from Voorheesville to Guilderland, where she lives.

"This is an area that I wanted to be in for a long time and the stars lined up," she said. "My lease was up in Voorheesville and I just started looking around and I found the space at 2012 Western and fell in love with it."

Shure had a dance background and enjoyed Pilates, so she trained and educated herself in the skills. At first, she said it felt like "jumping off a cliff" and she has learned as she went along.

"I am really proud of the fact

I have set this example for my sons," Shure said, whose two sons are 15 and 17 years old.

Garry Robinson, the secondgeneration owner of Robinson's ACE Hardware, said Western Avenue is a highly desirable area to locate a business.

"I truly think Western Avenue is the main thoroughfare and people that are on that main strip do pretty well," Robinson said.

Sarah Severino, co-owner of A Timeless Elegant Designs, opened her interior design business on April 6 at the same Western Plaza offices as Shure, and said the location was a big factor in her decision.

"We think it is a pretty good general area there," Severino said. "We do the whole tri-city area and we think it is pretty centrally located. ... Guilderland is a really great community to have a business in."

Severino said the Chamber introduced to her to fellow business owners and many turned out to support her open house.

"I think the more businesses, the better," Severino said. "The more revenue, the more positive things for the community."

Robinson, who previously served on Guilderland's Zoning Review Committee, said there are "a lot of hoops" every business owner has to go through before opening their doors.

"To get through the process to start a business is quite overwhelming," Robinson said.

But it was on a whim one day that he found himself called to the circus.

"I was auditioning for a dinner theater show and it happened that the director of the show was also directing Ringling Bros.," Iverson said. "They were actually looking at the time for a singing ringmaster."

# **Bethlehem Central makes last-minute budget shift**

#### **Cuts restored using** expected surplus from this year

The Bethlehem Central Board of Education made changes to its adopted 2013-14 school year budget in an early morning meeting held less than two weeks after the spending plan was adopted in a 6-1 vote.

The budget remains at \$90.4 million and would still raise the property tax levy by 3.59 percent, which is 0.05 percent under the hike allowed by the state tax cap.

On Monday, April 29,

the board shifted funds from equipment and supply purchases in order to retain a \$100,000 capital improvement project, keep freshman sports and keep 1 full-timeequivalent hall monitor position and a 0.2 FTE health instructor position in the budget.

"For the first time in what seems like a long time, the Bethlehem community will vote on a budget that does not reduce or eliminate educational opportunities for our children," said board President Diane Giacone Stever in a statement.

"We knew we were going to come in below budget, substantially so, because of some of the savings from the teachers contract that had settled after the budget was adopted last year," she said.

The school board elected to use some of that windfall for these changes. Superintendent Thomas Douglas emphasized the

# Albany RV considers Colonie headquarters

Company wants to consolidate four area stores into one spot

Albany RV is hoping to build its headquarters in Colonie, right off of the Northway.

The RV company has four other locations in the Capital District but is looking to downsize to one larger, single location off of exit 6 at 48 Rensselaer Ave. The project is starting to take shape after the Colonie Planning Board granted concept approval for the three-story, 40,891-squarefoot RV sales and service superstore at its Tuesday, April 23, meeting.

This is not the first time the idea has been before the Planning Board. Transitioning to one location has been a plan in the works since March 2007, but the process has been slowed down due to stalled applications with the Department of Environmental Conservation and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Daniel Hershberg, of Hershberg and Hershberg Engineering, said they had to get approval to make sure the building would not impact any site critical to Native American tribes. Although the site won't be a problem, the process took much longer than anticipated. Albany RV is the only RV dealership in Albany County, and the company also has stores in Buffalo,

Des Moines, Iowa and Orlando, Fla. Don Strollo, president of Albany RV, said they turn the inventory six times a year, and the longest a vehicle is at the store is about two months.

The recreational vehicle company sells "every RV brand," Hershberg said. The RVs would be on display outside, but behind the building. The building would face the Northway and Hershberg said the building would be seen best by cars traveling north. Some of the RVs, however, may sit next to the building on display in front of the Northway to be viewed by travelers.

"We did think we should be entitled to a view of some RVs on 87 ... (but we're) not looking for a sea of RVs," Hershberg said. The company will have to come before the board again to gain final site approval before starting any construction.

current building would not meet FDA regulations for clean rooms. He said it is best to specifically design clean rooms to fit the specifications of the research being performed.

Green said if the building is not complete on time, the company may be able to extend its lease for another month at the Harriman Research Center, but it would delay their work. The company previously owned a 52acre property in Orange County, but it has since been sold.

Breonics previously owed the Orange County IDA about \$200,000 for a no-interest loan to allow the company to build there. IDA officials were angry after the company suspended operations and laid off a majority of its staff before moving to Albany County.

"No one on the IDA board was happy (Green) packed up his company and tried to start new, said James O'Donnell, executive director of the Orange County IDA. "Our goal is for them to be successful and for Orange County IDA to be made whole.'

A "convertible note" settlement has since been reached between the Orange County and Breonics. The Orange County IDA now holds a bond over Breonics that can eventually be converted into stock in the company or cash. This means if Breonics is not successful in the future, the debt cannot be repaid. Currently, the company operates mostly on grants until their product is deemed safe to be used for human organ regeneration. "I'm sure the Bethlehem IDA works very similar to us, and they'll do their homework and background checks before doing potential tax abatements," said O'Donnell. Green said he expects no problems with the company's future research and hopes the Vista project can get back on track. "I'm still hoping we can go through with the move as planned," he said.
