The Town of Bethlehem was the only municipality in the Capital District to receive a share of efficiency grants handed out by the state last week.

The town received \$776,107 through the state's Local Government Performance and Efficiency Program. The grant

# **UAlbany unveils RNA Institute**

State-of-the art facility will be home to genetic research on Alzheimer's, HIV, cancer and more

A unique, state-of-theart concept turned into a reality Tuesday, June 11, when the University at Albany opened the doors to its brand new biomedical technology development facility.

After three years of building the \$9.4 million project, the RNA Institute at the University of Albany is ready to be the home of work on drug discovery, technology development and diagnostics. The 15,000-square-foot building will house 60 biomedical scientists, technicians and administrative employees in the north wing of the Life Science Research building on the university's uptown campus.

The institute is set up to focus on RNA, or ribonucleic acid, which is a fundamental molecule that plays a vital role in all living organisms. Researchers will concentrate on treatments for viruses, infections and

diseases including MRSA, Alzheimer's, HIV/AIDS, ALS and some of the more difficult types of cancers.

Several university and state officials spoke before a large crowd at the unveiling of the new facility. The institute secured \$32.7 million in combined public and private investments through state, federal, corporate and the university partners for the project, including \$15.4 million in NYSUNY 2020 and University at Albany investments. NYSTAR matched \$400,000 to the \$5.4 million NIH American Recovery and Reinvestment Act construction award. The Capital Region Economic Development Council designated work on the facility as a priority

In 2012, the institute received a \$2 million grant from Empire State Development as part of Gov. Andrew Cuomo's Regional **Economic Development** Council initiative. He also connected the new facility to his Tax-Free NY proposal, under which businesses located on and partnering with universities would operate tax-free.

"The 'Tax-Free NY' model will help the RNA Institute and similar centers across the state to take the next step in becoming economic hubs for innovation and commercialization, attracting new business and investment to Upstate New York," Cuomo said in a statement.

Partnerships with global corporations have also been established. including computers provided by Dell, Inc., rare online molecular libraries and a student-venture program.

Congressman Paul Tonko called the new facility a "golden crown jewel for the campus at Albany."

"What we're delivering here, in my opinion, is hope: the greatest commodity that government can help inspire," he said.

Inside the facility, natural lighting fills the labs. RNA Institute Director Paul F. Agris walls, a heat recovery system and will meet Silver LEED certification requirements for energy efficiency. Every surface of the facility, including the countertops and floors,

can tolerate nitric acid.

Some of the work that will be done in the facility includes developing probes to image RNA said the innovative in cells, RNA's control building has moveable of gene expression and virology.

> Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences Elga Wulfert said she couldn't contain her excitement for the project.

"We have come a long

way in a very short period of time and we have much to celebrate," she said.

While the institute is still waiting to receive its instrumentation, it will officially open and be fully staffed by this fall. The institute is also affiliated with 57 other labs and 350 researchers nationwide, including Binghamton University, Yale and Williams College.

RNA Biochemist Ronald Breaker described the new institute as a race car.

"You have some of the best pieces of equipment. What do you do with a race car? You drive it hard. Go out, be creative. But don't break it, we want it back," Breaker said. "RNA biologists, start your engines."

# Old Songs plucking on

**Acoustic roots music** festival welcomes families, keeps traditions alive

Music's unplugged roots might seem a far cry from today's auto-tuned, bass bumping pop music, but this weekend you don't have to dig too far to find them.

Traditional acoustic music will once again be played at the 33rd annual Old Songs Music Festival, which kicks off Friday, June 28, at 3 p.m. and ends Sunday night at the Altamont Fairgrounds. There are three larger concerts held each day and during Saturday and Sunday, there will be around 120 performances, dances and workshops. Performances will feature the genres of folk, blues, world, bluegrass, oldtime, Gospel and Celtic music, but listening to music is only part of the festival.

Old Songs is a "musical petting zoo" that allows anyone to get their hands on a variety of folk instruments, including in an Artisan Area, which includes instruments makers. In between activities, you can also visit a diverse range of food concessions offering many different cuisines.

Roger Mock, art director for Old Songs, said the festival started after the Fox Hollow Folk Festival in Vermont ended in 1980 after it ran annually for 14 years.

"That festival was a real gem at the time, people went to it especially for traditional music as opposed to the singersongwriter movement that was growing at the time," Mock said. "That community has stayed central to our festival and has grown over the years ... generations have been to it now."

Andy Spence started Old Songs along with her husband, Bill, in 1981. The community around the festival is what has keep it going for more than three decades, Mock said.

"It has a very strong community sewn through it. It is like a magical little community that happens overnight and then goes on for three days."

At the festival, you'll likely hear the same style of music you would have heard years ago, Mock said, because it's still music that's "under the radar" and is generally not played

on most radio stations or television.

Typically, around 3,000 people attend the festival, with peak attendance topping out around 4,000 in recent history. Mock said people wouldn't feel "overwhelmed" going to the "nice little festival."

But what really sets Old Songs apart is interactivity. Through workshops, singalongs and dances, the audience gets a chance to be a part of the festival and not just spectate.

Lea Gilmore, who is performing Sunday, will also lead a series of Gospel Choir sessions that culminate with the attendees performing a few songs at the festival. She, along with other performers, is also a leading a Gospel Sing.

This will be Gilmore's third time at the festival, which she said is an "amazing gathering of musicians and talent.' Gilmore said the festival is above all simply just fun.

"I'm looking forward to just being surrounded by so much great music from all around the world. The audience is so appreciative of the music," Gilmore said. "They come to this festival to hear all different types of music ... there is something for everyone

Gilmore is a classically trained pianist and an award-winning blues, gospel and jazz singer. She has also appeared in more than 45 musical and dramatic theater productions.

One fond festival

memory she has is watching the gospel choir perform on stage even as the electricity

went out. "There was so much joy, so much pride and I will never forget that feeling of oneness and unity that was created during that moment," she said. "It was just a magical feeling. We often hear so much bad news, so to have a weekend of just joy from different cultures is like a utopia."

Gilmore also remembers an older woman coming up to her after the performance and thanking her for "changing her life." The woman told Gilmore that she could now express herself and not be ashamed to do it.

"We are doing a lot more than ... just singing some songs," Gilmore said.

Tickets are now on sale, with discounts offered for seniors and students. Adult tickets for Friday and Sunday are \$40. Saturday tickets are \$70, but a \$30 refund is offered to anyone who leaves before 7 p.m. If you are planning to attend all three days, all-festival tickets can be purchased at a discounted price. Children 12 years old or younger get in for free.


## Ravena man charged with sex act against 14-year-old

## **New Scotland zoning change official**

**Town Board rezones**, will pursue further refinements

New Scotland has officially become a lot less industrial after a significant portion of the town's industrial-zoned land near the railroad tracks was rezoned.

The Town Board on Wednesday, June 12, unanimously approved a widespread zoning change intended to better reflect the character of the community and what the land is suited to contain. The rezoning changed 163 acres of Industrialzoned land to Residential Conservation (R-2), and another 43 acres of Industrial-zoned land to Residential Agricultural (RA). A pocket of 24 acres of Commercial zoned land below New Scotland Road was shifted to Residential-Hamlet (RH).

There was only a minor change made after a public hearing was held. A property owner with commerciallyzoned property along the railroad tracks asked town officials to include it with surrounding RA zoning. The Town Board agreed to the change, for the small parcel of land. Before the zoning change to commercial for the property it had been RA, so the town was essentially reverting the zoning. Another public hearing wasn't deemed necessary by the town.

a significant change that would have to start up the process again ... because it's a request of the property owners and there is no real significance to the change," Deputy Supervisor Douglas LaGrange said.

The rezoned industrial area had lacked needed infrastructure because only a limited amount of land is connected to the town's water supply and the town's sewer does not service the area.

Board members

agreed to continue investigating any possible refinements or further zoning changes.

"I personally don't really think we are done here with this area. We still have some industrial zone there that may not be appropriate for that area," Councilman William Hennessy said. "I still think there is a question of going down that road a little bit further even as you cross the tracks."

Town Supervisor

Tom Dolin agreed with Hennessy and said the board decided to tackle "the easy part first." Dolin said most of the rezoned found a minor leak in the land was vacant.



The great successes of any era didn't get to where they wanted to go by doggedly sticking to an itinerary. They learned and adapted, were willing to admit faults without shame and turn them into victories. Facebook creator Mark Zuckerberg's early software creations were hardly major successes. But through hard work and adaptation, he's worth an estimated \$13.3 billion at the ripe old age of 29.

Zuckerberg's story is, of course, off the standard charts. But he and others of the Silicon Valley "hacker" set share a common dogma that we could all learn from - that experimentation, up to and including the point of failure, is a worthy endeavor. That doing is far better than planning. By this mode of thinking, starting down a road and being unable to finish is not a disaster, it's an opportunity to grow.

It's an idea that's easy to absorb and far more difficult to live by. But don't worry. You have the next four years to work on it.

Jared King is correct; the County Republican Party leadership is thoroughly corrupt.


Answering last week's article, King "has regularly derailed meetings. ... There are members who have walked out when he's gone on his diatribes and disrupted meetings."





## Callanan's upgrades draw National Grid grant

After completing construction on a new power substation, Callanan Industries has received a \$250,000 grant from National Grid as a capital investment for replacing its aging infrastructure.

The award comes from National Grid's Capital Investment Incentive grant program, which "provides funding to help offset costs associated with upgrading utility infrastructure to support a business expansion or attraction projects located in National Grid's Upstate New York service territory." The grant is given to applicants who plan projects that will improve National Grid's electric or natural gas system.

The paving materials supplier is in the midst of a \$24 million capital improvement project at its South Bethlehem site after moving the majority of operations to Ravena in the 1990s. Last year, Callanan moved its asphalt and stone operations back to Bethlehem and later decided to upgrade its energy infrastructure. The company was founded by Peter

Callanan in 1883 in South Bethlehem as an aggregate mining company.

"We are excited about the move back to South Bethlehem and how it has helped Callanan maintain a strong presence in the Capital Region," said Callanan President Jonas Havens in a statement. "We look forward to continuing our service to communities in our area that will realize the benefits of our recent business expansion."

The company purchased and constructed a state-of-the-art asphalt pavement plant and a new primary crushing system was designed to increase efficiencies. Havens said the former substation was a "pile of rust" and needed to be restored. So the company committed to building a new one with power provided by National Grid.

In return, National Grid spent \$100,000 to upgrade and maintain the transmission lines that provide the substation with power. To replace the entire 2.5-mile line, the utility is expected to spend about \$2.5 million by completion in 2015.

National Grid also extended a new highpressure gas service more than 800 feet. It will provide fuel-to-heat aggregate in the asphalt plant, the lab building and offices, and is said to be a cleaner, more cost-effective alternative to the waste oil that the company was previously using.

"Supporting the Upstate New York economy and jobs is at the core of National Grid's commitment to the



## This old house

**Group looks back** three decades to start of Pruyn House renovations

When architect Vincent J. Lepera stood before the Casparus Pruyn House in 1983, he knew he had his work cut out for him.

The Troy architect, now of Architecture Plus, needed to completely restore the dilapidated historic home within a four-month span and a budget of merely \$200,000. The bricks on the house were ready to fall out and the floor was rotting away. But Lepera said he's always liked a challenge, and this was another one to add to his list.

"It was pretty ambitious for the budget we had, and a challenging project,' he said on Wednesday, June 12, before a small crowd at the Pruyn House on Old Niskayuna Road. "This place was full of surprises.

Lepera spoke of his experience using a slideshow last Wednesday as part of a kickoff event to celebrate the Pruyn

House's 30th anniversary, hosted by the Friends of the Pruyn House. The two-story, 15-room mansion sits on 5 1/2 acres of land and now serves as a cultural and historical museum that hosts events, weddings, tours, classes and more.

The home was built in the 1800s to serve as a summer home for tax collector Casparus Pruyn and his family. After a slew of owners throughout the years, the Town of Colonie, under then Town Supervisor Fred Field, decided to preserve the historic site by purchasing the home and accompanying acreage for \$110,000 in 1983.

"A lot of people thought the town acquiring this was an unnecessary expense. And then there were others that thought it was a remarkable idea ... to give the community a sense of history," Lepera

An experienced architect who has worked on buildings such as the Troy Savings Bank Music Hall and at colleges like RPI, Lepera got to work with Zandri Construction. The list of renovations


included exterior masonry restoration; interior flooring restoration; fixing the heating, ventilation, A/C and climate control; roof replacement; and window restoration.

Because the home had survived more than two centuries of use, neglect, weather and old-fashioned aging, Lepera said the restoration was "closely watched" by the New York State Office of Historic Preservation.

With the back of the house's brick wall, Lepera said they salvaged as much of the original brick as they could, buying new ones that resembled the old ones if necessary. When it came to the exterior of the house, Lepera said they washed the home with "gentle soap and water," which revealed a part of the window shade that had been painted white was actually a brown decorative stone.

"That brown stone doesn't want to be painted," Lepera said, and renovators let it be when they repainted the whole house.

The interior was a much bigger mess. Most of the

wallpaper and plaster had peeled off. None of the wallpaper could be saved, and it was difficult to tell what may have been the original wallpaper and what had been changed over the years.

"The floor was interesting. We took virtually every floor board out," Lepera said.

The house's 10 fireplaces were mostly

intact and original. Lepera said the biggest - and best – surprise was finding the original bread and beehive oven in the basement.

"This is my favorite. This is really a find because there are very few examples in this region," Lepera said. "You will not find that very often."

While the house hasn't had another makeover since the early '80s, Lepera said maintenance still needs to be done often to keep the house in good shape. Friends of Pruyn House Curator Diane Morgan said work on the interior and exterior of the house is ongoing.

"I think it just requires constant observation, care and attention," Morgan

Friends of the Pruyn House spends about \$15,000 on the house every year, and the Town of Colonie matches that.

Morgan said lately, she's seen some new cracks in the parlor wall and recently saw one of the outdoor shutters hanging off. The paint, too, is constantly peeling, she said. Over the years maintenance has included replacing the roof again, chimney repairs almost every year, repairing and staining the shutters and touching up the paint.

Last month, the white picket fence that outlines the front of the house was taken to the town landfill when it completely rotted out. Morgan said they are working on replacing the fence. Other buildings on the land, mainly the Buhrmaster Barn and the schoolhouse, are in need of repairs and painting. Morgan said the Friends recently spent \$9,000 to fix one of the barn's walls.

"We do feel it's worth all of the money we're spending ... tourists come to visit us. It's a lovely setting for cultural, educational and social events. It's part of our community," Morgan

# Prince of planning stepping down

Morelli was
Bethlehem's point
man on major
developments for past
eight years

The Town of Bethlehem is looking for a new director of economic development and planning, as Mike Morelli approaches his retirement date at the end of this week.

Morelli has worked for the town for eight years and has spent his entire 33-year career in the public sector. He is set to retire on Friday, June 28.

"I've worked for a county, city, state and town," he said. "I joke that I should find a village to work for first to round out my resume."

Morelli said his career has been very rewarding, but has opted to retire to help his wife with a new health and wellness business she started out of their home.

"I've done this my whole life and it's time to pursue other interests," he said.

Over the past eight years, Morelli has played a key role in the development of major projects in the town, and there are a number in the pipeline he will pass the torch on. He could have retired two years ago, but decided to wait a few years because he wanted to see the Vista Technology Campus go "from a vision to reality."

"I had some goals and I knew we were really close to construction of Vista," he said. "So I thought, why not go a few more rounds and help get it off the ground?"

Morelli said Vista is one of the largest projects he's ever worked on and he's pleased with the way it is unfolding. He is happy that the infrastructure is in place and he saw businesses open before his time with the town was over.

He said it will take years before Vista is fully spaced out because there's fierce competition to attract tech companies from similar campuses in the area. But the site is now shovel ready and open for business. With most of the secondary use space now claimed by retail businesses, medical facilities and banks, the rest of the space will be filled by tech companies over time.

"I almost wish we called it something different, instead of Vista Technology Campus, because I think it confuses people," he said.

Other initiatives undertaken on Morelli's watch have been changes to the town's Comprehensive Plan and updates to the town's land uses code that have helped bring businesses to the town.

"The Town of Bethlehem, not unlike other suburban communities, developed the reputation that it's a hard place to do business," he said. "We work with developers, show them our issues, make sure it meets town, state and federal guidelines. We never have really been challenged."

Morelli said some of his favorite projects while he's worked with the town have been those involving redemptive reuse of old businesses. He cited the old Saratoga Shoe Depot that is now the new Berkshire Bank on Delaware Avenue and the former CVS site across the street, which is now Community Care Physicians. He also said Glenmont Plaza had over 100,000 square feet of vacant space, but has been completely redone.

"Adaptive reuse and infield development is a goal of the Comprehensive Plan and we wanted to achieve that goal," he said.

The Planning Department also has been working to diversify the types of housing in town to allow its aging population to find a more comfortable living situation but stay within Bethlehem. Morelli said a recent review of the Comprehensive Plan shows their plan is working and the town should stay on track.

The town is seeking applications for a new Director of Economic Development and Planning until the end of the month.

Morelli is in charge of two departments with a total of 11 employees. He said whoever fills his position next should be able to work well with people and know it's a demanding job. His

departments have lost 24 percent of their staffing through attrition in recent years and everyone is doing more with less.

Morelli said he did not know if the new hire would also take on his work with the town's Industrial Development Agency. It all depends on who takes the job.

According to the town's posting, candidates will need a background in regional planning, economic development, or business management, with between six to eight years of experience. A master's degree is preferable. The position also calls for promoting the town to businesses for the purpose of economic growth.



Clarkson said because of Morelli's retirement, the town and IDA would be pushing back a plan to hire a part-time employee in the Economic Development and Planning Department that would have been mostly funded by the IDA. Clarkson said it is more important to first find the appropriate person to fill Morelli's position.

"He has done such great work for us over the years and we will miss him greatly," said Clarkson.

Morelli said he believes he will miss the people he's worked with the most.

"I've formed a lot of friendships both within the town and with developers," he said. "And I can honestly say, there's been very few boring moments."

## **Entertainment** in the Spotlight



f you happen to pass by miSci (Museum of Innovation and Science) this summer, don't be alarmed if you hear a loud roar – it's just a lively group dinosaurs spending a few months at the museum.

The prehistoric creatures are in town from June 29 to Sept. 29 and have brought the whole family along. Executive Director, William Sudduth, said the interest in dinosaurs never gets old.

"I think it's because they are so mysterious," he said. "They are all gone and we only know about them through science, through the study of earth and fossils."

Despite the fact dinosaur exhibits have been finding their way into museums for many years, Chris Hunter, curator of collections and archives at miSci, said this particular exhibit highlights the latest in dinosaur research.

"As the paleontologists do more research, the exhibit will incorporate

> that research into the design," he said.

Although scientists are continually researching the life of dinosaurs, they still have a lot to learn, explained Hunter. Scientists can make educated guesses, but no one



will ever truly know, for example, what color a dinosaur's skin was or how a dinosaur really sounded.

bianchid@spotlightnews.com Hunter said a common question from people visiting the exhibit is how scientists reach these conclusions.

"A lot of it is actually based on surviving reptiles and amphibians," he said.

The dinosaurs in the exhibit are created based on existing patterns from fossilized dinosaur skin. In addition to 18 animatronic dinosaurs on display, visitors can learn about the prehistoric creatures in a dino dig site, fossil rubbing station and other hands-on discovery areas.

Sudduth said the museum looks for topics that people in the Capital District would find interesting.

We do lots of audience research and a survey on our website on different topics," he said. "With kids out of school and more leisure time, we wanted to have a couple of exhibits that would really appeal to audiences."

> In addition to the dinosaur exhibit opening on June 29, Notion of Motion, a yearlong exhibit which opened on June

15, offers 30 interactive exhibits all about motion.

"We like to think of the museum as sort of a library – a library of exhibits – we want everyone to come find exhibits that they like." said Sudduth. "I like to think we have something that appeals to everyone in the family."

The Dinosaurs! exhibit is open from June 29 through Sept. 29, at miSci, located at 15 Nott Terrace Heights in Schenectady. General admission to the museum is \$6.50 for children ages 3 to 12, \$8 for seniors 65+ and \$9.50 for adults. General admission includes access to all exhibits including Dinosaurs!





"The PBA now has a very effective leadership that is willing to work with us," she said.

Tremblay-Glassman said it took some time to get the grievance through the stages it needed to go through with PERB before it could come back to the town to be negotiated. Town officials and the union began meeting several months ago before coming to terms at an undisclosed monetary agreement.

## Foundation doles out grants to BC teachers

#### \$9k from donations go to teachers for innovative learning projects

The Bethlehem Central Community Foundation is looking to ease some of the burdens put on teachers through a grant program now in its second year.

This year, \$9,000 in awards were presented to teachers for 11 different projects through the group's Classroom Innovation Grants. The prizes were awarded through a competitive process to faculty and staff from all levels of Bethlehem Central schools for projects to be implemented in the next school

"I guess my first reaction was how really impressed I was with the projects," said BCCF Trustee and Middle School Principal Mike Klugman. "I consider myself to be pretty innovative when it comes to education, but some of these projects I've never heard of before."

Some of the ideas that were approved include money to purchase a green screen to be used during announcements at the middle school, helping students learn graphic design; funds to purchase iPads for struggling readers at Elsmere Elementary; a recycling project at Eagle Elementary; and equipment for the middle school's garden.

Klugman said as word has spread, more teachers applied for the grants this year. The foundation was also able to hand out more money. Last year, about 10 teachers applied for three grants of \$1,000 each. This year, Klugman said applications tripled.

"We were very excited about that."

Klugman said the BCCF thought the classroom grants were needed because of budget cuts and growing state mandates on lesson plans. Little money is left over for innovative ideas, he said. The foundation looks for proposals with a research base that will help to provide insight into positive teaching methods.

The BCCF also gave away scholarships to 20 students this year.

The foundation was established in 1998, but the group had little initiative to go out and do a large funding campaign because donations were not tax deductible. Many trustees felt there wasn't enough incentive for people to donate to the organization. That has changed, however, and with the group's new nonprofit status all donations are tax deductable.

This past year, trustees worked towards a goal of raising about \$10,000 through a mailing effort and smaller fundraisers.

The scholarships and grants were made possible through membership donations and fundraising. Klugman said a successful year of fundraising allowed the group to give a greater number of grants and scholarships than ever before.

"We're very thankful for that," he said

Clarkson said. The town also implemented a digital Lockbox system for the processing of some resident bills.

"The reward is based on a formula of how much saved and town population," Clarkson said. "I was cautious with telling my expectations to the public when we applied, because I didn't think we would receive that much."

The New York Department of State gave away a total of \$12 million to 13 municipalities. The LGPEP "rewards local governments for undertaking significant and innovative actions that reduce the property tax burden confronting residents.'

"This program is an integral part of Gov. (Andrew) Cuomo's agenda to improve efficiency and reduce costs at all levels of government," said New York Secretary of State Cesar Perales in a statement. "The governor is vet again applying a competitive process to stimulate creativity and innovation among decision makers, and the big winners are the taxpayers who will benefit from smart, cost saving investments in their

communities' futures."

The two biggest winners were Nassau County with a \$5 million grant for reducing personnel within its police department and consolidation of precincts, and the City of Rochester with about \$1.9 million for "neighborhood and business development consolidation." The projects presented by the 13 applicants were expected to amount to \$38.2 million in combined annual savings.

The award will be paid out over three years. Clarkson said the money may be used to address some of the town's capital needs or may be used to provide some temporary tax relief as the town's new contract with its EMS providers kicks in.

"We have a contract that

could result in \$200,000 in savings, but we won't see that money for the first year," said Clarkson. "We could use some of the grant money to see the savings up front that you are expected to see in future years, and then tax less to provide that service using those funds.'

Clarkson said the grant could also help the town in other ways.

The supervisor said he would like to look at the efficiencies achieved by other municipalities that won grants to see if they could be implemented in Bethlehem.

"Several counties also won big awards for privatizing their nursing homes, which is something I think our county should focus on," he said.

fared well on the recent State Comptroller's Physical Stress test, with the town's finances ranked among the best in the county. Clarkson said the good score was because the town was operating on a surplus with fairly low debt. The town has also built up its reserves and implemented a new multi-year budget projection system.

"In very many ways, we're receiving indications elsewhere that the steps we're taking are correct," Clarkson said. "We're on the right course, it seems."


