Budget calls for 1.23% tax hike

After tough 2013, next year's plan contains few cuts

Supervisor John Clarkson's tentative 2014 budget for the Town of Bethlehem calls for a property tax increase of \$4.98 for the average household, in one of the first years in recent memory the town is not facing a budget gap.

The supervisor and Comptroller Mike Cohen presented the \$38.24 million spending plan to the Town Board on Wednesday, Sept. 25. Expenditures are 1 percent above the 2013 budget. The tentative budget calls for no cuts and is mostly relying on use of the town's fund balance and grant money to stay balanced. "I think this is great news for our community," said Clarkson. "We are in a good position financially

Pastor's calling brings her to Delmar

New head of church a rare occurrence in history of Delmar Presbyterian

For only the third time in 57 years, Delmar Presbyterian Church is welcoming a new pastor.

The Rev. Karen Pollan became the church's new, permanent pastor on Sunday, Sept. 8. She moved to the Capital District from Salem, Ore., where she served as associate pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Salem for the past 12 years.

Pollan said she was first interviewed for the position in April, and was called back by the presbytery in May before being accepted by the church's congregation. She said the process is almost like online dating in that new pastors have to fill out a personal information form in response to presbytery pastor requests that are placed on the denomination's website.

"Something attracted me to New York, and I emailed them back saying God is calling us to work together," said Pollan.

The pastor said she was attracted to Delmar Presbyterian because she liked how open and welcoming the congregation is to all members of the public.

"They also have a string interest and involvement with local mission work," she said. "They've made the strong decision to be a positive force in their community, and a high percentage of the congregation is

"I'm not interested in those who just sit in the pews and feel they've fulfilled their spiritual obligations for the week," she said. "This is a group of people very engaged in advocacy. About 75 percent are involved in

Pollan attended Austin Presbyterian Theological School in Austin, Texas, and later served as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Sulphur Springs. She them moved on to Oregon. Pollan is filling the position left by Rev. Tom O'Donnell.

Pollan said she has no set goals for her new church because they are already so active.

"God doesn't live in the church, but all around us outside," she said. "My plan is to be a partner with the church

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government. We need to be looking for the places God is already at work and strengthen the things already happening. The hard part is I don't know what that is or what it looks like. We just need to be aware."

Linda Krzykowski, co-chair of the Delmar Presbyterian Church Pastor Transition Committee, said Delmar Presbyterian is blessed Pollan is bringing her years of experience, enthusiasm and deep faith to their church.

Pollan said she is

humbled to have come to such a close-knit church community. She said the fact the congregation has only had two past pastors was another big draw.

Pollan said it is comforting to know Delmar Presbyterian is a congregation that has valued and nurtured its pastor relationships, but she also feels she has big shoes to fill.


"I'll just have to do my best," she said. "I think this is going to be fun."

Going green, from top to bottom

Officials tour environmentally friendly infrastructure throughout Albany County

Albany County officials and community members got a firsthand look at what going green looks like during a recent tour.

The Stormwater Coalition of Albany County hosted a Green Infrastructure Tour Tuesday, Sept. 24, for elected and municipal officials, engineers and other community members to see for sites across the county where green ideas have been implemented to manage stormwater issues. Projects ranged from porous pavement being used at Antoinette Estates under construction in Colonie to green roofs helping to reduce "Budgets are tough, but you've got to remember the money we invest today into the environment saves us thousands of dollars down the road."

runoff and provide energy efficiency and atheistic benefits. The event was funded through a state Department of Environmental Conservation grant to help educate local

Environmental Conservation grant to help educate local officials and industry members about green infrastructure, to evaluate existing codes and develop local laws to encourage or support environmentally friendly practices.

"The purpose of today's programs is to make real the green infrastructure and practices that you may have heard about or read about," said Nancy Heinzen, program coordinator of the Stormwater Coalition. "The starting point for green infrastructure is a concern we all share, which is keeping clean. It is a way of preventing stormwater pollution from getting into our rivers. Not only do we want to keep our streams clean ... we want to do things actively that improve water quality."

Heinzen said implementing green infrastructure practices and techniques is how water quality can be improved through smaller projects like a rain garden or larger endeavors such as stream restorations. Green



infrastructure tackles many areas, but the event focused primarily on water quality.

"If we reduce the amount of runoff going into the streams, that means there is less pollution going into the streams and there is less volume hitting the edge of streams so we don't get the erosion and stream instability," Heinzen said.

can reduce runoff, but using plants to absorb water is another method. Plant roots will also slow down the water, allowing for bacteria to start breaking down pollutants. If pipe drainage systems can be opened to form a natural stream, called "stream daylighting," water pollution is also reduced.

Grimm points to Runion's home sale, incumbent supervisor says he's downsizing

Guilderland Supervisor Ken Runion is selling his 3,200-square-foot home, but he has expressed his intent to stay local and chided his Republican opponent for seizing on sale as a political topic.

Runion said he and his wife are looking to downsize and move into another home within the town. Both of his children have moved out and purchased their own homes, he said.

"We have our eye on another home in the Village (of Altamont) and we are negotiating for that purchase," Runion said. "It isn't really news.

... There isn't anything hidden about it. There is a big sign sitting in front of the house."

Runion's single-family home is located on 4.6 acres and has 4 bedrooms and 2.5 baths, according to an online listing that puts the asking price at \$450.000.

Republican supervisor candidate Mark Grimm originally brought the listing to The Spotlight's attention. Grimm said he learned of the sale

through a real estate agent friend, who noticed the home on a listing service. Grimm in an email said Runion "must be planning to move" and said he also owns a home in Florida. Grimm never explicitly stated he believes Runion was looking to leave the

"I thought it was a very curious thing, to say the least," Grimm said.

area.

Runion said he has been told Grimm sent out a "mass email" informing people that he was planning to sell his home. Runion said "most people were kind of angered" to see the email.

"I am not planning on leaving. That is ridiculous," Runion said. "Maybe wishful thinking on Mark Grimm's part."

Grimm said he sent the email to people that

he knows. "It really shouldn't be

a political issue," Runion said. "It is my personal business and I don't think that bit should be invaded by a candidate for public office."

Runion said he was not surprised to see Grimm weighing in on the matter and accused his opponent of negative campaigning in the past. He said Grimm has "never been involved in a positive campaign" and will resort to "bullying."

Grimm, however, said he has talked to "many people" who are selling their home or planning to sell their home while campaigning, and said he wants to call attention to high property taxes.


"He is the town supervisor and people are selling their homes every day in the town because they can't afford the property tax. To a certain extent, it is personal and to a certain extent it is a critical issue in the town,³ Grimm said.

Grimm said he doesn't believe Runion has done enough to address property taxes.

Runion confirmed he owns a home in Florida, but said his father has lived in the home for around a year. Runion said he pays the bills associated with the home, and his father pays for the electricity.

"I basically bought the house for my father to live in," he said. "It was during the slow sales period down in Florida, so my wife and I go down for a week usually in a year and we saw this house. It was short sale and I thought this was perfect for a retiree to live in and it was very

Green infrastructure implementation is occurring across the world, but Heinzen said it's new to the Capital District. Having funds available through grants to showcase possible projects is key, she said.

"We are in this together," she said. "This doesn't happen with one planning board person or one design engineer – it very much is collaborative."

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy said while the county has talked about going green, the sites included along the tour showcased actual implementation.

"I think we are on the right step," McCoy said. 'We still have a lot more to do; it is just the beginning of trying to clean up the environment and give back some green space in this county.'

McCoy said being a member of the coalition is important even with budgetary issues municipalities are facing. He noted one of the coalition's 13 members (Voorheesville) would likely be leaving at the end of the year.

"Budgets are tough, but vou've got to remember the money we invest today into the environment saves us thousands of dollars down the road," McCoy said. "We are going to work with one of the villages that had to drop out to due to budget problems."

The first tour stop was outside the Cook Park Pavillion in the Village of Colonie, where a rain garden was built to catch runoff from a parking lot. They are all native plants and they have big root systems, so they are making channels down in through the soil. ... We are not fertilizing them at all; we are not babying them. They are just on their own and do fine.'

The average cost for a demonstration rain garden like at Cook Park is around \$1,500 for labor, equipment and materials. There are similar rain gardens in the county maintained by Cornell Cooperative Extension volunteer master gardeners and staff, along with Stormwater Coalition staff. Both organizations are also working to develop a training program for the gardens.

Good drainage is required for a rain garden, which is built at least 10 feet away from a home. They range from 100 to 300 square feet in residential settings.

Another stop was to view a green roof located at the University of Albany Liberty Terrace Dorm, which is a LEED Gold facility that opened August 2012.

The green roof captures runoff through a layer of vegetation and soil on the flat roof and then the plants allow for evaporation and evapotranspiration to reduce the amount and rate of runoff.

"As much as I like to think we are cutting edge when it comes to research and academics, we don't quite do the same thing when it comes to facilities," said Diana Delp, architect and project manger at UAlbany.



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From the Editor's Desk Time to resuscitate relationship

We've known for quite some time that the relationship between the Village of Voorheesville and the Voorheesville Area Ambulance Service has been far from peachy. But as bickering between the two parties continues, it has become increasingly clear it's time to seek a permanent solution that's best for the residents of the village.

It will be difficult to determine whether that's a seismic shift, continuation of business as usual or something in between given the current environment, though. We warrant things have become toxic enough there are very few level heads left. What's needed is a fresh, unbiased look.

As we've previously reported, negotiations over the 2013 contract between the village and ambulance service were fraught with standoffish and intractable behavior - exactly who was exhibiting it depends on whom you ask. It's led to village officials being particularly open about researching dropping VAAS altogether, which has led company officials to be outspoken about what they say is unfair treatment by the village.

Things came to a head yet again this past week. Mayor Robert Conway had very publicly aired some of his concerns about VAAS in the town newsletter, and in response, dozens of VAAS supporters showed up to a Board of Trustees meeting to put their thoughts on the record.

Though the entire situation was described by one ambulance company member as a "pissing contest" (which seems a fairly apt summation at this juncture), at least one constructive idea emerged from the meeting: the formation of a committee to examine the future of ambulance service in the village.

Things have become convoluted enough that neither side can agree on even the simplest facts, figures or events, and that does not bode well for the upcoming 2014 contract negotiations. When two sides are unable to come to an agreement, the common practice is to summon an arbitrator. In this instance, an independent and impartial group of citizens and officials could serve the task.

Honestly, it's well past time for such a measure, given the degree of confusion and disagreement that's been commonplace in recent months. And with the possibility of options other than continuation of VAAS coverage on the table, the case for an indepth study is made all the stronger.

The people of the village deserve a frank look at the costs and benefits of making a change - one that's assembled with cool heads not involved in the ongoing fracas. Let's move on from the business of finger pointing, and get on with the business of mending this situation for the public good.

Budget plan raises questions

Editor, *The Spotlight*:

Town Supervisor John Clarkson presented his 2014 Tentative Budget plan, entitled "Steady & Smooth Financial Path" at the Town Board meeting on Sept. 25. The supervisor describes the 2014 plan as a "Good News Budget." Since the supervisor is running for reelection it is appropriate to review the tax and spending plans he established to assess whether "Steady & Smooth" is an accurate description of Mr. Clarkson's performance as the Town's Chief Fiscal Officer.

First, in 2012 the Property Tax Levy was \$11.2M. For 2013 Mr. Clarkson increased the

tax levy \$1.3M or 11.33 percent. This followed property tax increases of 1.7 percent, 1.6 percent and 2.1 percent in 2010, 2011 and 2012, respectively. The three budgets preceding Mr. Clarkson's first budget might be described as "Steady & Smooth"; a 9.5 percent jump over the prior three year average does not line up with the supervisor's selfdescription of his fiscal policies.

Mr. Clarkson's plan for 2014 further increases taxes on the property owners in Town by \$0.2M or 1.23 percent. If you focus on the 2014 Budget Plan only, you might conclude this is "good news." However, the two budget plans put forth by the supervisor have resulted in an increase of taxation on Bethlehem property owners of \$1.5M. with an annual average increase in the Property Tax Levy of 6.3 percent.

Also included in the budget presentation are plans for a 19.8 percent fund balance to appropriations ratio, which is just under the ceiling of 20 percent,

and over the Town's stated optimal level of 15 percent. At first pass, this financial metric appears positive however, the monies represented by these fund balances come from us, the town residents. The difference between the 19.8 percent presented, and the optimal level of 15 percent, is approximately \$1.8M; this is our money. With that in mind I wonder, was that 11.33 percent tax increase really necessary? Could it have been political posturing in anticipation of the election cycle? Or is it poor fiscal management? This \$1.8M is money not being invested or spent in our local economy; it is now in the Town's reserves. We all know once government takes your money, you're not getting it back. Yet, Mr. Clarkson wants still more of your money to spend as he sees fit.

not see Mr. Clarkson's tax a vision for the future and increases as "good news". If he is re-elected, some residents may be forced to take the "Steady & Smooth Path" out of town.

Clarkson's term full of successes

Editor, *The Spotlight*: I've been watching politics for a long time in Bethlehem and have been a Democrat all my life. I'm also a friend and supporter of John Clarkson, our town supervisor; and I want to see him reelected, so you know where I'm coming from. Here's why I support him.

First and foremost, John Clarkson is genuine. He'll tell you what he thinks even if he knows you might disagree. That doesn't mean he won't listen, consider your point of view, and try to find middle ground. But he doesn't just tell you just what he thinks you want to hear. We've all seen politicians incumbents and wannabe's – who do nothing but pander and promise. They won't even go near problems where there's controversy. As a result, the town is in good financial shape this year. The town will be below the tax cap again, but town employees will be able to get a 2 percent cost of living bump. That's good management, and that's just what we need.

Everything John has done is about saving money and maintaining services. I know you'll hear from people saying they can do better, but none of them stepped up and took responsibility last year when we needed it. John Clarkson did, and that's why he'll get my vote.


Get your flu and shingles vaccines at the library



Elsmere Elementary earns top honor

School one of 18 in New York to be given **Blue Ribbon designation**

The achievements of Bethlehem Central's Elsmere Elementary are being recognized at the federal level, as the school has been named a National Blue Ribbon school by the U.S. Department of Education.

Elsmere was one of 18 schools in the state to be recognized. In total, 236 public schools and 50 private schools were given the award this year.

"I am extremely proud that Elsmere Elementary has received an honor it so richly deserves," said BC Superintendent Thomas Douglas in a statement. "The faculty and staff at Elsmere are part of a strong network of educators and support staff here in Bethlehem who are dedicated and give their best every day to strengthen education for all students in the district."

The National Blue Ribbon Schools program honors public and private elementary, middle and high schools, where students perform at very high levels, according to the U.S. Department of Education.

Elsmere is considered an "Exemplary High Performing" school. This means Elsmere is among state's highest

performing schools, as measured by state assessments. Schools are nominated by state education officials. The criteria they are judged on include performance on standardized tests from the previous year, essays written by faculty and staff and various other data about the school's demographics.

Elsmere Principal Kate Kloss said she believes Elsmere was selected in part because the school places a strong emphasis on family involvement and character education.

'We are a small school, so we know our students very well,' she said. "I think all of those things together helped us to achieve the award."

The award program was first started 31 years ago, and since the Blue Ribbon has been presented to more than 7,500 schools across the state. Hamagrael Elementary won the award in 2009.

"We just learned that we won

the award last week, so we are all very excited," Kloss said.

The Elsmere principal said faculty and staff began writing essays as part of the application process last November. Some of the questions asked about community outreach, important education elements outside of the typical curriculum, such as character development, and math instruction.

"We would really like to emphasis how we (the staff) feel very fortunate to have such a strong relationship with our students' families and the community." said Kloss. "It really makes our job very enjoyable."

Kloss and another faculty member will travel to Washington, D.C. this November to accept the award

in person. Douglas said the Elsmere faculty and staff is a group of professionals who have shown "particular grace under pressure in meeting the many requirements of recent education reform mandates."

IDA approves trial webcasting plans

Bethlehem group reconsiders stance, **OK** six-month trial

The Bethlehem **Industrial Development** Agency will begin webcasting its meetings this month with the approval of a six-month trial period.

The vote was held on Friday, Sept. 27, after recommendations were heard from the agency's Governance Committee. Town Supervisor John Clarkson had asked BIDA members in July to reconsider webcasting meetings in order to promote transparency.

Governance Committee Chairman Sam NeJame said the committee found only two IDAs in the state webcast their meetings. However, because members of the Town Board said they are in favor of having the BIDA webcast, the committee opted to weigh the pros and cons.

Some IDA members had previously said webcasting the meetings may limit open discussion among the agency's members, the discussion could be taken out of context for political reasons. There was also the concern that webcasting the meetings may be a disadvantage for developers who are in the negotiation process because their competitors could easily watch the archived footage on the Internet.

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V'ville mayor's newsletter prompts backlash

Fresh wounds before ambulance contract negotiations, committee proposed

Tensions between Voorheesville officials and its local ambulance service were reignited after the mayor voiced concerns in the village's seasonal newsletter.

Voorheesville Area Ambulance Service members and residents packed the village Board of Trustees meeting Tuesday, Sept. 24. More than 40 people filled the chairs and overflowed into the hallway. The ambulance service rallied for supporters to attend the meeting in response to Mayor Robert Conway's comments in the village's one-page, double-sided newsletter, "The Village Report," mailed to residents. The majority the newsletter consisted of Conway restating financial concerns the board has with its historic ambulance service provider.

Ambulance company members contested several statements made by Conway in the newsletter, which he said is aimed at making residents "aware of the facts and to, hopefully, clear up any misconception or misinformation.

Conway wrote of five instances in which the board felt the company didn't act as "fiscally prudent" as the board preferred, including

prior reluctance towards revenue recovery, losing an ambulance, inability to staff for 24/7 coverage, insisting on continued reserve account funding and not agreeing to include language in the village's contract to return a portion of its assets to the Voorheesville if the company dissolved. The last is the most recent contention resulting from this year's contract negotiations, which was completed recently.

VAAS recently submitted its proposed 2014 budget to the village, which is reduced 4 percent from this year's budget. Conway, in the village's newsletter, said the expenditure reduction was "good news," but suggested the decrease should be greater.

"We must bear in mind that the squad is on duty 35 percent fewer hours and answering an estimated 70 percent fewer calls," Conway wrote. "Picture what would happen if you told your employer that you would be working 35 percent less hours but still expected 96 percent of your pay.'

He encouraged everyone to voice concerns or ask questions by attending board meetings, or contacting him, and that call was answered Tuesday.

"We're losing very, very good people because they don't want to deal with any of this," VAAS Treasurer Laura Blow said at the trustees meeting. "We are not wasting any taxpayer

money or blackmailing or sticking it to the village. We're doing the best we can on a volunteer squad with what we have to work with."

VAAS First Lt. Kate Odell read aloud the company's response letter to Conway's comments, in which it contested several statements he made.

Conway said costs associated with the ambulance service in the village's 2005-06 budget approached around 42.5 percent of the total taxes collected. Odell claimed this was inaccurate and said its proposed 2014 budget would be approximately 2.6 percent of the village's budget.

Voorheesville's adopted 2013-14 budget totals \$2.12 million and increases spending by around \$140,000, or 7 percent. The village is budgeted to

money. We're not stealing raise more than \$275,000 from taxes.

The company's proposed budget for next year is nearly \$90,250, which would be approximately 32 percent of real property taxes levied for 2013-14. The general fund — excluding water, sewer and special districts — totals more than \$1.4 million.

Odell also contested the loss of an ambulance, resulting in \$40,000 in taxpayer money being essentially thrown away.

VAAS retained a broker used for two prior ambulance purchases, but this time the broker took a current ambulance and cash deposit as down payment and pocketed the revenue. The broker died soon afterwards, leaving an estimated loss of \$40,000, according to Conway.

Odell said the ambulance manufacturer reduced the cost of the new vehicle purchased, so the "actual loss" was \$23,345. The company tapped reserve funds to cover the loss.

"There is nothing where you guys want to put a dollar ahead of a life, and that is what you are doing here," Finkle said. "We're going to sit there and watch somebody bleed longer if Voorheesville (Area Ambulance Service) disappears, there is no question."

Kathy Martin, a veteran member of the ambulance company, expressed support for the village's contention over reserve funds, which was the primary sticking point in budget negotiations.

"I think it is a little ridiculous to argue over," Martin said. "I have to agree with the village that there is no reason why they need to continually give that amount of extra money at this time. If the money is needed all they have to do come to them and they can work having money ... for an extra ambulance."

Martin said the 10-year ambulance replacement recommendation expressed by company representatives also isn't necessary, because the ambulances don't get used every day and don't sustain the same amount of wear and tear.

One of her biggest concerns, though, is what each side is saying about the other publicly.

"In my opinion, it has gotten really into a pissing contest," Martin said.

Due to declining volunteerism, she said a committee should be established compromised of ambulance, village and community representatives to tackle what the future of ambulance services should be in the village.

"The time has come that volunteering isn't what it used to be and sooner or

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

Village targets two taps for shutoff

Voorheesville says leaky pipe has wasted more than **1** million gallons

Voorheesville officials have warned two village homeowners they could soon be without water after more than one million gallons of water has reportedly leaked from their connection since May.

The village sent notice via certified mail, dated Sept. 3, to two State Farm Road homeowners, Dominick Mariani and Lauri Sargent, that water service would be discontinued to each of their properties on Monday, Sept. 30. Repairs were made to the water pipe the weekend before the deadline, but the problem hasn't been completely addressed, according to village officials.

Both letters stated village rules and The village had regulations prohibit the 'willful waste or use of water through improper or imperfect pipes" and asserted that no corrective action had been taken. The village also requires property owners to "protect and maintain" all water pipes on their property.

"We have asked them to fix it or address it, or even have a conservation about it, and they haven't," Mayor Robert Conway said during a Village Board of Trustees' workshop meeting Monday, Sept. 16.

Voorheesville Clerk Treasurer Linda Pasquali said the Marianis have since been in contact with the village. If plan is outlined with village officials, an extension could be granted.

Jennie Mariani, Dominick's wife, said on Thursday, Sept. 26, they are working on resolving the problem, and declined a chance to further comment on the situation.

Pasquali said Public Works Superintendent William Smith informed village of aficials the Marianis had work done to fix the pipe, but it was were still leaking significantly.

Pasquali said the shared line was still leaking 5.8 gallons per minute, which totals to around 8,350 gallons daily. The total water bill for between the two homes has ballooned to \$12,000 since May, according to Pasquali.

A decision from the village board is forthcoming on what action will be taken, she said.

The village requires a minimum fee of \$150 to be paid in advance to cover 25,000 gallons of water use, and the out-of-village customer rate is double that amount. The prior rate before June 1 was \$130. After the initial fee, there are increasing rates for usage.

outside of the district in serving large-scale meals as a banquet chef at the Empire State Plaza for 12 years. He also previously operated his own restaurants.

While serving dinner from a school cafeteria is unique, for Mulligan it was a practical solution to help keep the district's lunch program afloat.

"I don't know what other school districts are going to try to do ... but this is just me cooking the meals and it is fun cooking," he said. "Any money we make is better than not making money."

Voorheesville dropped new federal lunch guidelines after less than six months following the program. Other local districts have followed suit – Bethlehem dropped the guidelines at its high school and Niskayuna dropped from the federal program on the heels of Voorheesville.

Mulligan petitioned the Board of Education to drop the federal program, along with the extra funding tat comes with it, after seeing lunch lines shortening and food waste piling up.

"Our participation rate dropped almost in half," Mulligan said, "but what really got me was the amount of food these kids were throwing out that we were forced to put on their plates. ... It was absolutely killing me."

To prove his point to district administrators and the board, he saved up food waste from one day.

"I don't know what other school districts are going to try to do ... but this is just me cooking the meals and it is fun cooking. Any money we make is better than not making money."

In fruit alone, students passed up three boxes worth of food that could not be donated and was worth \$180.

Ironically, Mulligan said, "When we are not forcing kids to take the fruit, they take the fruit."

Mulligan said getting older students at high school to eat certain meals is difficult because their eating habits and patterns are more established. For elementary school students, Mulligan tries to "stick close" to the federal guidelines.

The meals he chose were things he likes to cook and he "threw them on there to see how they would go." So far, the programs appears to be going well.

"The first night was totally a hit," he said. "I thought we were going to do 25 meals to go for (four people) and we did 60-something. It was totally shocking to me and I was very pleased with everything, and I hope the

community is pleased with what they got."

Meals to go are offered in serving sizes for two people for \$15 and four people for \$25. Reservations are required and must be made 24 hours in advance.

Reservations and payments can be arranged by contacting Christy Rivenburg at crivenburg@ voorheesville.org or through www.instantseats. com. At InstantSeats, type "Voorheesville" in the search bar at the top left corner of the website. There is a website service charge of \$2.38 for a meal for four and \$1.89 for a two-person meal.

Mulligan said people with bad memories of school cafeteria food should give the meals a chance before passing judgment.

"They would probably be surprised by the quality they would get out of the school," he said.

The meal scheduled for Wednesday, Oct. 16, includes chicken or shrimp tossed in a light flavored cream sauce served over penne pasta, with Caesar salad and breadsticks. The following meal on Wednesday, Oct. 30, is scheduled to be a half-pan of mixed green salad with choice of steak, chicken or shrimp, with dressing served on the side and breadsticks. Pick up is scheduled from 4 to 6:30 p.m.

years." Under the tentative budget, the property tax increase would be below the state's tax cap, coming in at a 1.23 percent hike in the levy. This would equate to a 0.6 percent increase in the tax rate, or \$4.98 for a home valued at \$250,000.

The plan uses \$10,000 from the town's fund balance and money from the state's Efficiency and Performance Award given to the town this spring to eliminate the town's dispatch fee for residents and implement projects over the next three years such as installation of sidewalks and contributing to make the Delaware Avenue Enhancement Study and Sustainable Bethlehem projects come to fruition.

Clarkson said he expects the major discussions for the budget cycle to be based on what projects the award money should go toward.

Some residents may see their tax bill

go down based on the water, sewer or ambulance district they live in. Because the town's three ambulance districts have now been consolidated into one, many residents in Selkirk and Glenmont are expected to see a tax reduction.

This year's budget dealt with a \$3.5 million budget gap through cutting 16 positions and a property tax levy increase of 7.9 percent.

Town Board members voiced no objections with the tentative budget at the Wednesday meeting.

In a later interview, Democratic Committee Chairman a n d Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn said he felt the Town Board had made "intelligent fiscal decisions, which left the town in much better shape for next year."

"I think this is great news for our town," added Kuhn.

Republican candidates challenging incumbents in the local elections disagreed.

Republican supervisor candidate Fred DiMaggio criticized Clarkson's spending plan because it would raise taxes during a time when he thinks it to be unnecessary.

"For two years in

a row, John Clarkson has increased taxes and raised spending on town residents," DiMaggio said. "The bottom line is, he can't seem to balance the budget without raising taxes. Clarkson is irresponsible in suggesting a tax hike when Bethlehem residents already pay one of the highest tax rates in any of the county's suburban area.'

DiMaggio said he would like to see the Town Board use more of the town's fund balance for tax relief, pointing out the fund balance is currently above the state's recommended 15 percent.

According to Cohen, more reserve money was not utilized because those funds are projected to dip below 15 percent in 2016. DiMaggio argued that the town's fund balance policy is selfimposed and merely a recommendation from the state. He said more money could and should be used for tax relief.

The preliminary budget presentation and public hearing is scheduled for Wednesday, Oct. 23. Adoption of the budget is scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 13. Two budget workshops will be held on Sept. 26 and Oct. 10.

Vellano wasn't selected in April's NFL Draft. In fact, it took Vellano until the end of April to receive a contract offer from the Patriots.

Vellano certainly deserved a look from NFL teams coming out of the University of Maryland. He had 94 total tackles during his junior season in 2011, and he added 63 tackles and a career-high six sacks for the Terrapins last season. His junior season statistics earned him first team All-Atlantic Coast Conference and All-American honors.

Still, Vellano didn't get a call until after the draft ended. And in the NFL, going undrafted makes the road to playing in the league that much harder. An undrafted player has to compete against both veterans and those selected in the draft, and they're usually among the first to be released in training camp. Basically, there are no guarantees for an undrafted player.

However, Patriots'

saw something in Vellano because he kept Vellano on the roster when the final cuts were made. In the cut-throat world of the NFL, that's a huge victory for Vellano in itself.

Now, Vellano may be on the verge of another breakthrough. That is, only if the Patriots don't go out and either trade for or sign a veteran defensive tackle to replace Wolfork. This being written on a Monday, there is always a chance the Patriots will look for reinforcements from outside the organization by Tuesday.

Even so, you can bet that Vellano will continue to play a significant role for the Patriots this season. He already has.

On the other side of the spectrum, Guilderland High School graduate Drew Smith was back at his alma mater last Friday night watching the Dutchmen beat Shaker 31-28 in overtime. The running back looked like he was going to have a shot to stick on an NFL roster as an undrafted player until he injured his thumb during a Buffalo Bills' preseason team to call him.

> The move came as a surprise, since the Bills offered Smith a three-year contract before he suited up for rookie mini-camp in May. NFL teams don't usually offer undrafted rookies a three-year deal unless they believe they will be good.

> The Bills may come to regret dropping Smith from their roster. Smith's collegiate stats at the University at Albany (4,721 all-purpose yards, 45 touchdowns, two consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons) and his pro day effort in March (4.53-second 40-yard dash) should still carry some weight among other NFL teams. And if Smith gets into the right situation, he could find himself on an NFL field before the end of the season. After all, there are plenty of teams in the league that could use help at running back.

> It may take a little more time for Smith to realize his NFL dream than Vellano, but the opportunity is there. All he needs is one

Sentz's overtime field goal lifts Guilderland past Shaker in non-conference game

Andrew Sentz kicked the biggest field goal of the season for the Guilderland football team.

Sentz's 28-yard kick in overtime gave the Dutchmen (4-0) a 31-28 victory over defending Section II Class AA champion Shaker (3-1) in last Friday's non-conference game in Guilderland.





"It was scary, you don't know anyone, you are going through this tremendous part of your life, and you get on a bus with a bunch of women," Doyle said.

But she said it was the best thing she has ever done.

Camp Braveheart offers women fighting cancer a variety of different weekend retreats, such as rafting down a river, relaxing on a beach or tackling high ropes. Doyle's first experience was on one of the less physically challenging retreats.

"I felt like I wasn't alone. For the first time, I felt like I could talk to people. It wasn't with pity that they were looking at me. They were truly understanding, encouraging and supportive," Doyle said. "You could talk to them about anything ... how medication worked to hair loss, makeup, lack of sex life or too much of a sex life, or how family reacts to you differently. They understood that."

Doyle explains that even with a supportive family, 'your family still treats you differently, and they get that, they just get it.'

The camp is open to all women facing the diagnosis of any type of cancer, not just breast cancer, and can be as

physically challenging or as soothing as each woman chooses.

"You can make the weekend as busy or challenging as you want," said Eva Simpson, a staff member at Camp Braveheart. "It's unbelievable the strength that the women undergo and overcome fears."

Simpson said that through the exercise activities, as well as wellness education and social interaction, the organization helps to increase self-esteem and confidence, in addition to helping address the fears that women face during and after treatment.

"We have women who are currently in treatment, women coming out of treatment that attend, and we also have campers that are survivors 10, 15, 20 years out," Simpson said. "It really gives it a powerful essence for those women to bond with."

Camp Braveheart was started 13 years ago when three women, all newly diagnosed with cancer, met at a similar breast cancer support group just outside of Rochester.

"Just being away from it all and with folks dealing with the same stuff was very healing and very positive,' said Karen Haag, one of the three co-founders of Camp Braveheart. "That fellowship was a real powerful experience for us."

Haag said they wanted that same experience to be available to women in the Capital District.

"We didn't want the retreats to be 'cancerish.' We didn't want them to be clinical or cold. We wanted them to be full of love and laughter and about support, friendship, stretching our limits, finding reserves of strength and courage that maybe they didn't know they had before" Haag said.

Each year, close to 500 cancer survivors attend the Camp Braveheart retreats, which are offered

from May to October in Lake Luzerne, Shelter Island and The Pocono Mountains.

Sherry Huzar, a Camp Braveheart staff member, said it's not just about challenging yourself on the high ropes or horseback riding.

"The All About Me weekend in August is very pampering," she said.

Campers do need permission from their doctors to attend, and Simpson said an oncology nurse is always at each campsite if needed.

Doyle said the experience was a lifesaver for her.

"Just ask my family what I got out of it. They said I came alive. I was talking nonstop about it. The women were inspiring. It makes you sit back and say, what I went through is nothing compared to what they went through, and yet they are still out there living full lives, "Doyle said. "There is life after cancer."

Huzar said the goal is that the women "walk away with a feeling that they can do anything they want, they are not limited and that they have a whole new family. It's a sisterhood."



Local families have chance for a great time with their neighbors while at the same time helping children who suffer from serious medical conditions have their "best day ever."

The second annual Guilderland Community Fest will be held at Tawasentha Park on Saturday, Oct. 5, from noon to 3 p.m., and all proceeds will go to Maddie's Mark. The community event, presented by Christ's Church Guilderland, features food, music, a rockclimbing wall, pony rides, a martial arts exhibit, bounce house and other family-friendly activities.

Dawn Jacobson, event coordinator and congregant, said Christ's Church previously held an annual picnic for its members. Congregants decided they wanted to do something more geared toward the community.

'We started last year and wanted to reach out to the community and share with them what we do and invite people to have a good time and raise money for a good cause," Jacobson said.

Last year, more than 1,000



people were estimated to have attended the event, and around \$4,000 was raised to benefit the Rodino family, who has been battling Huntington's disease. Each year, the church plans to select a different organization or family for proceeds to benefit.

Last year, the weather wasn't ideal, but the turnout was still strong, Jacobson said.

"Being our second year it is really tough to guess what it will be this year and we can only hope that more people do show up and we have great weather," Jacobson said.

Maddie's Mark was established to honor the memory of Madeline Musto, a 5-year-old girl who succumbed to an inoperable brain tumor.

The nonprofit strives to continue Maddie's legacy of love and kindness through helping to support children with serious illnesses and their families.

Maddie's Mark Foundation Board of Directors President Erin Musto, mother of Madeline, Amelia and Lucy, said she was "really excited" to find out the organization was selected for the event.

"I know last year for the Rodinos it was very helpful for their family, so I thought it was a very kind and generous thing to have the community help us, too," Musto said. "A big chunk of this is getting to share Madeline's story and telling what we do."

Madeline was diagnosed

with diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma (DIPG), a rare brain stem tumor that there isn't a known cure for. Since the tumor is located along a delicate area of the brain stem it cannot be safely removed. Chemotherapy often is ineffective and drugs can't reach the tumor. Radiation does offer temporary benefits.

"When everything happened with Madeline it was very, very fast," Erin Musto said. "She had some symptoms, but we weren't worried.'

Maddie's Mark administers grants to fund child enrichment projects. But it was the "best day ever" program that really appealed to congregants and led them to choose the Guilderland family's nonprofit. The program offers a family

facing serious medical issues an opportunity to go to some place, visit someone or travel somewhere that wouldn't be possible without help from the organization. Musto said the goal is to give each family a unique experience that's individually tailored.

"We have several members that are very close and some that do help out with planning the 'best day ever,' which is kind of a local Make a Wish," Jacobson said. "Trying to give those families that extra special time when needed is something that drew us in."

Any New York resident 18 years old or younger can qualify for the "best day ever" program.

The most rewarding thing for Musto is seeing Madeline continue to touch people's lives and helping families enjoy their time with their children.

"The day that people don't remember Madeline will be very difficult for me," she said.

There is no admission to enter Guilderland Community Fest, but donations are asked for at certain areas, such as for food or attractions. Jacobson said only collecting donations opens the event up to all.
