of topics, including using caution when sharing information online, utilizing the district's new online digital catalog, using online databases, accessing the district's

books, more efficient web searching and podcasting basics using free software.

Guilderland Elementary Librarian Meg Seinburg-Hughes said the workshops were meant

programs and introduce parents to resources offered by the district.

"A lot of our parents aren't totally aware of those resources that our school subscribes to," she said.

Seinburg-Hughes added the basics of cyber safety are also shared with parents.

"We do it in our schools, but you want to bring families in on it as well," she said.

The families at the program primarily had elementary-aged students, but high school Librarian Bernard Bott said the workshops could appeal to many grade levels.

"Certain sessions are geared towards certain age groups. Like myself and Meg are doing Google better, which can be really for older students as well as parents," Bott said.

The evening featured a program on alternatives on subscription-based databases available to students, such as Opposing Viewpoints, CultureGrams and World Book Online.

We try to teach kids that there are research databases that are age appropriate that are going to help them find information faster," Seinburg-Hughes said.

The databases and resources can be accessed by visiting a school's library page on its website.

"We are still very print orientated, but in conjunction with that we are teaching using the Internet responsibly and safely, and also quickly," Seinburg-Hughes said.

She also stressed the importance of parents taking an active role in their children's digital literacy, which has become an increasingly important element of a student's educational experience.

"Parents should be a part of their child's

information literacy process as well as regular literacy, just to monitor what is online and their progress, and to make sure they are using it for good and not evil, so to speak," Bott said.


Seinburg-Hughes said the workshops are important because "we are all going 90 miles per hour" and might not have time to learn how to use available resources effectively.

Walt Jones, parent of a high school student, said he attended the program to see what research tools were available for students online and to learn about computer security.

The first session Jones attended was on searching databases and finding "vetted" website for information.

"They were actually tools I had not seen, because at home I typically just bring up Google and Google it, and these were much more targeted tools," Jones said.

Gym opt-out on track at BC

District allowed 46 seniors to drop P.E. class this year under state regs

Some Bethlehem High School students were given the opportunity to opt out of physical education class this year in a new pilot program that could potentially be expanded to help cut costs for the district.

Health and Physical Education Supervisor Fred Powers presented further details about the program to the school board on Wednesday, Oct. 16, and provided with an update on the first few weeks of the pilot program's implementation.

"The students started the school year in a class," said Powers, so students could opt to re-join their class at some point.

The program was only open to seniors and participation was subject to a number of requirements. The state Education Department allows for P.E. Opt out if the conditions are met.

Seniors who planned to play two varsity sports could opt out, with the stipulation that the students had played the same sports the year before. The district wanted to make sure students weren't planning to try out for sports teams just to get out of physical education. Any students cut from the team, or who quit the sport they were playing, would need to

begin taking physical education again.

Students who did not play two varsity sports could still opt out if they participated in a sports activity outside of the district. The person instructing the activity had to be certified and students needed to be able to reach achievements while participating in the program.

Powers gave the examples of Karate classes or horseback riding lessons, because the students would receive belts as they progressed or participate in competitions. Powers said 100 hours of instruction is needed.

For any student to participate in the program, certain fitness standards needed to be met in the previous year's state physical fitness exam in P.E. class. The student would also need to show knowledge of physical fitness subject material.

Powers said about 75 students came to his office to pick up applications for the program. About 51 students actually turned in their applications and 46 students were approved, with five pending.

The district did not give an estimate of the projected saving of the program, but another update will likely be given at the end of the year. Saving would result from a decrease in the number of P.E. classes given.

Powers said the majority of the students who opted out of physical education ended up not being able to replace it with a course

because opposite their P.E. class is a science lab. Many took a study hall, and four students regained a lunch period.

"We want to make sure students are using the free period and staying in school, rather then signing out," added Powers.

He also said he is unsure if the program would eventually be expanded to include other grade levels. While it may be possible to allow juniors in, it would be harder to allow underclassman because the district needs to make sure the students who participate meet certain fitness requirements, and to do so the students would need to take the physical fitness exam in P.E.

"I certainly wouldn't recommend it for freshman," Powers added.

Powers said one concern is that a student would quit their sport or activity in mid-year and then be too far behind to make up the P.E. classes in order to graduate.

After the presentation, Superintendent Tom Douglas asked if any of the students in the audience were participating in the program. One girl raised her hand and said it was an advantage because she has an after school job and she is now able to take a study hall and give more attention to her advanced classes.

"It's a great opportunity for me to study more and do more homework that I wouldn't have time to do when I'm getting home a 5 o'clock every night," she said.

Town to tackle sewer near school

Work at Hamagrael would take place over coming summer, involve installing gravity line

Bethlehem Town Engineer Paul Penman visited the Bethlehem Central School District recently to discuss a sewer easement request near Hamagrael Elementary.

Penman gave a presentation to the school board on Wednesday, Oct. 16. He said the town needs access to the property in order to do work on a nearby sewer line that would allow replacement of a nearby pump station. The town began replacing various pump stations that needed to be upgraded in 2005.

"This pump station was built in 1973, so it's 46 years old and has seen better days," said Penman.

Penman said the town approved the work about a year-and-a-half ago, with only preliminary engineering work having been performed.

The new gravitystyle sewer line would extend from McGuffey Lane, follow the school's sporting field toward the back of the school, and then cut across a brush field toward Route 9W.


Penman said this route was chosen so as to not have to cut down some older, large trees that lie in a direct route from the existing pump station to Route 9W. He also said the pipe would have to be laid deeper into the ground because of the amount of rocks in roots in the path if that course was taken, and it would end up costing the town much more money.

BC Operations and Maintenance Director Gregg Nolte said because of the work, some brush would need to be cleared away and the playing field in back of the school would potentially be expanded.

Some school board members were worried about the safety of the school's children while the work is underway. Penman said they would like to do the work over the summer, before the beginning of peewee football. He also said the few manhole covers involved would be flat to the ground, so children could not trip over them,

G'land man charged with setting three blazes

Guilderland police believe a town resident intentionally burned down three buildings over three months.

Police arrested Matthew C. Woelfersheim, 37, of 1105 Siver Road in Guilderland, on Monday, Oct. 14, and charged him with arson in the third

a felony. Three days later, Woelfersheim was charged with two additional counts of

arson in the third degree.

The original arrest stems from an abandoned building fire on Sept. 30 at 3400-10 Carman Road, which is across from Greulichs Market. Police said the blaze "totally destroyed" the building.

The additional charges are connected to fires destroying two other buildings, police said. Woelfersheim allegedly set ablaze the Town of Guilderland garage, located at 3424 Carman Road, around 2:45 a.m. on July 8; and the town's barn, located at 40 Stone Road, at approximately 6:17 a.m. on Oct. 14.

Police said investigation into the incidents is ongoing.

Woelfersheim was arraigned in Guilderland Town Court and committed to the Albany County Correctional Facility. He reappeared in Town Court on Thursday, Oct. 17, for the two additional arson charges.

Other arrests

- Guilderland police arrested Michael Stephen Fink, 27, of 20 Kellogg Ave. in Schenectady, around 1:30 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 23, and charged him with grand larceny in the third degree, a felony. Police said Fink stole \$14,300 from a Robinhood Road resident through overcharging for paving work at the home.

generate about 3.3 million kilowatt-hours of electricity per year, providing about 6 percent of the plant's annual power usage.

According to Owens Corning, if that same amount of power were generated using typical nonrenewable resources, about 2,339 metric tons of carbon dioxide would be released into the atmosphere. That equals the annual emissions of about 487 vehicles.

"The products we manufacture in this plant are a primary way to reduce consumption in residential and commercial buildings, saving consumers and businesses billions of dollars in heating and cooling costs," said Julian Francis, Owens Corning's vice president and general manager of residential insulation. "And, of course, not using energy in the first place is the best way to protect our natural resources.

The project is being partially supported by NYSERDA. In March of 2013, Gov. Andrew Cuomo announced the state would provide funding through his New York Sun initiative to "develop and construct large-scale solar projects throughout the state."

"Clean, renewable business is good for the environment and good for New York businesses,' said state Sen. Neil Breslin, D-Bethlehem, who was also in attendance. "Through the NY-Sun initiative we will continue to create clean energy jobs and a more sustainable future for our

According to Bethlehem town officials, about 50 percent of the project will be paid for through a NYSERDA grant. Owens Corning also entered into a 20-year power purchase agreement with Constellation and in exchange, the company will pay to build and maintain the system. National Grid also contributed about another \$1 million in energy efficiency grants.

National Grid President Ken Daly said the utility is delighted to provide the company with "highly reliable" electric service and congratulated Owens Corning on its "environmental stewardship."

Bethlehem Councilman

Bill Reinhardt represented the town at the ceremony, along with Deputy Supervisor and Planning Board member John Smolinsky.

Reinhardt said he was excited to see Owens Corning's solar project come to fruition because the town has applied for funds in order to complete a similar project on town property.

"If this project is successful, it could be seen as a precedent to help our application get approved," he said.

In August, the town approved a resolution to sign a letter of intent with Borrego Solar to develop the town's clay mine site on Bridge Street in Selkirk.

The town has a project application submitted to NYSERDA for funding. Borrego Solar would grant additional financing, so the town would incur no capital costs. The thought is for the town to target underutilized land to generate energy credits for a large energy consumer, like the water treatment facility.

If the application were approved, the town would need to enter into an easement agreement and power purchase agreement with Borrego.

Erik Deyoe, the town's commissioner of public works, said he believes the solar panels would not be viewable from the street and many people would forget the power generation system was there once the project was complete. The plan would need to go through an environmental impact review.

The project would be comparable to the Owens Corning array. About 10 acres of the site's available 80 acres would be utilized for the project. The town would then have the opportunity to expand the site in the future.

Deyoe said the savings for the town depends on a number of variables, but could be about \$100,000 to \$175,000 a year.

"I think it's an exciting opportunity for the town," said Reinhardt. "It's great to see Bethlehem turning into a truly sustainable community.'

The project would rely solely on the town receiving a bid approval from NYSERDA for the grant. The town would then need to enter into a power purchase agreement with Borrego Solar.

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

When I went to the public hearings on this year's (2013) budget, I found out about the terrible financial jam we were in because of many years of bad decisions, the most damaging ignoring the end of a \$1.7 million special payment from the Selkirk Cogen plant.

If we want a town leader that believes in telling us what's real even though we don't want to hear it, then we have to look to Supervisor Clarkson again. 



Road takeover moves ahead

Guilderland begins eminent domain proceedings to acquire private road

Stitt Road neighbors are celebrating the longawaited conveyance of a private road to the Town of Guilderland. At a recent Town Board meeting, some residents even gave hugs to landowner Timothy Larned.

The Guilderland Town Board proceed with plans on Tuesday, Oct. 15, to acquire Stitt Road through eminent domain after Fred Wagner, owner of Helderberg Excavating & Trucking, Inc., requested additional time to finalize a land purchase at the board's Sept. 17 meeting. The proposed easement was not negotiated, however.

Wagner at the previous meeting said he was looking to purchase a right of way to access his landlocked property. He feared Stitt Road might not meet standards for heavier vehicles and equipment.

Fewer than a dozen homes are along the secluded roadway owned by William M. Larned & Sons, Inc., which decades ago was used to access several quarries.

Larned's special use permit required him to convey the roadway over to the town, but approximately 1,400 feet of the road was located off of his property. Two property owners along the right-of-way refused to hand over deeds to the land, which required the

town to pursue eminent domain proceedings.

"We have exhausted all possible avenues of negotiating the realignment of Stitt Road and bringing it up to town specifications short of bringing the eminent domain proceedings," Town Supervisor Ken Runion said. "As we have seen, Stitt Road is deteriorating very quickly and if something isn't done soon, we are going to have school buses that are not going to go up and down Stitt Road that could jeopardize safety of some of the children.'

The Guilderland Central School District agreed to continue picking up students living on the private road since the town was proceeding with plans to take over the roadway, according to Runion. The district recently declined to pick up students along Stitt Road because the road was not owned and Runion said. maintained by the town.

Wagner could still negotiate purchasing the right-of-way from landowners despite resident objections, because it is a private land purchase. The town could regulate how the land is used in that scenario.

Larned also read a letter five neighborhood homeowners sent him

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opposing Wagner's initial proposal.

"In spite of their claims that only light traffic would be using that proposed new easement," the letter read, "we feel that it is inevitable that large gravel haulers and heavy excavation equipment would be using that route, in view of the presence of unexploited valuable gravel deposits in the immediate vicinity."

Runion said Wagner has since expressed to him a different option of upgrading an "old haul road" to access his property and exit onto Osborn Road.

Steve Wilson, a longtime Stitt Road resident, said it has been a long process and he was "ecstatic" to see the end nearing. Neighborhood residents also thanked Larned after the meeting for sticking around during the process and making repairs when needed.

Stitt Road resident David Hubbard, like many others, said he didn't expect the process to take more than 30

Changes to town ethics law pitched

One year after formation, members of Bethlehem **Ethics Board deliver** annual report

Members of the Bethlehem Ethics Board have recommended policy changes to the town's ethics law in their annual report.

Chairwoman Theresa Schallaci presented the annual report to the Town Board on Wednesday, Oct. 9. Schallaci said the committee isn't obligated to submit an annual report but members of the group opted to do so because they were proud of the work they did and wanted to reflect upon the law's effectiveness.

The town's new code of ethics was adopted in June of 2012, and members of the Ethics Board were appointed in September of that year. The majority of the new code follows guidelines established by the state Comptroller's Office, but some portions were changed after several board members felt they did not match the needs of the town.

The town's code allows the Ethics Board to give "advisory opinions" to town employees. Ethics Board members can also receive complaints, conduct investigations and make recommendation to the Town Board about those complaints.

Members of the board are inquiries regarding the board's appointed for terms of three

After a year applying the code, the Ethics Board provided the town with several recommendations for potential changes they would like to see implemented.

'One of our first orders of business was to work with the **Human Resources Department** to develop training materials for an orientation program for all town officers and employees," said Schallaci.

Schallaci said no formal complaints were filed with the Ethics Board over the past year, but it did respond to three requests for advisory opinions and answered two procedures.

"The board is happy with the fact that folks came out and sought out our guidance with regard to interpreting the code," she said. "We hope to work with Human Resources again to kind of build up our PR a little bit to let folks know we're out there and a resource for them."

The recommended changes include amending the code to include a way for town staff and employees to appeal an advisory opinion issued by the Ethics Board. The group would also like to amend the code to render advisory opinions issued by the Ethics Board to be binding.

"Absent an appeal process or binding application, the issuance of an advisory opinion is of limited value," read the recommendations.

Other recommendations included authorizing the Ethics Board to initiate an inquiry into an alleged violation of the code, since it currently cannot launch an investigation absent a formal complaint. Schallaci said this change would allow for the board to take initiative in some cases.

Members of the Town Board thanked the Ethics Board for its hard work. No changes were made to the law on the night of the meeting, but Supervisor John Clarkson said the matter could be discussed at a later date. A public hearing would need to be held before changes to the law could take place.

Guilderland's proposed budget brings tax decrease

Grimm says budget layout less transparent

Guilderland homeowners would see slightly in 2014 under the levy decrease of around

town's proposed spending plan, which totals nearly \$32.2 million.

The town's revised preliminary budget for next their taxes decrease year calls for a property tax

1.35 percent, or \$153,000, for a total of \$11.1 million in tax revenues.

The decrease would be made possible through another \$200,000 of fund balance usage, to a total of \$1.7 million. The budget also contains a 2 percent raise for union and nonunion employees, as well as for elected officials.

"We have the lowest town tax in Albany County and we have been very, very frugal over the years and our salaries ... compared

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with other municipalities, we are always lower," Town Supervisor Ken Runion said. "We have never had a budget that even came close to the tax cap since that legislation came into being. We've made each department hold the line on spending, so we have had minimal spending increases.'

Runion said even though fund balance usage would increase under the plan, over the previous three years, the town has not tapped into what was allocated. He also said revenues are "always" budgeted lower than the prior year.

We put it in there to make sure we keep our tax rates level," Runion said. "We are closely approaching the point our fund balances are getting to 50 percent of our budget. If we allow our fund balances to increase too much more, we will be criticized by the state comptroller for having too large of a fund balance."

Mark Grimm, Republican supervisor candidate, criticized Runion for breaking out pension costs, a practice that began in 2012.

"The most important thing to see about this budget is that Ken Runion split the town tax between two taxes," Grimm said. "This is very misleading, and it is very important people understand what has happened."

Grimm said the change made Runion's budget less transparent, with town taxes appearing to be reduced, because one of the biggest cost drivers was broken out.


"You can't change the definition of the town tax line in order to cut taxes, you have to really do it, Grimm said.

Runion, however, argued breaking out state retirement costs made the budget more transparent. The proposed 2014 total tax levy adjustment takes into account all property taxes.

"Taxpayers should know what they are paying for and ... what is being mandated," Runion said. "I think that by doing that we are showing the town residents exactly what is driving budgets.'

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No contest in New **Scotland elections**

Insiders say GOP regrouping this year, plans to come out swinging in 2015

Calling the winners of New Scotland races requires no political prowess this year, because the election has effectively been over for weeks.

The New Scotland Republican Committee offered no candidates for town offices this year, allowing Democrats to cruise to the finish line with no opponents to spar. Any voter who is disillusioned with incumbents or with how the town has been governed will likely have to wait another two years.

"Right now, the Republican Party to an extent is regrouping,' said Glenn Schultz, a town Republican Committee member.

Schultz previously said in a letter to The Spotlight that the party felt it would better serve the community by not running candidates, and instead "promote ideas to improve our town and present real solutions" to problems facing the town.

Albany County Republican Committee Chairwoman Rachel Bledi said there were three factors leading to the empty slate: there was a late start getting potential candidates interested; the county committee is going through a transitional phase with her assuming leadership in January; and town committee Chairman Tim Danz had his priorities shift because he was getting married.

"At this point they (the town committee) are in the rebuilding stages and are gearing up for the next election cycle," Bledi said. "We are in the process of rebuilding and I can guarantee the Democrats will not be getting a free

Danz could not be reached for comment.

Fellow town committee member Roselyn Robinson said Danz stepped up to lead the committee primarily because no one else was interested. She said he has been busy with his family business, along with getting married.

"I think he will not be chairman for long, not because we don't want

him ... but because he is not committing as much time," Robinson said. "That might be the next step, somebody else to lead the helm. It is hard when you don't have the time.'

Robinson was optimistic about the future of the town party, though, because several months ago the committee held a public meeting to attract new members and around 50 people turned out.

She said the meeting did yield some potential candidates, but nobody wanted to step up this election cycle. The committee also wanted to get to know the new faces better, too.

"We decided as a committee, rather than throw a name up there, we really wanted to concentrate on the new people and bring them up to speed on the town," Robinson said. "It is disappointing. I believe in a two-party system ... but it just wasn't meant to be and this is the first time ever I think it happened."

Bledi said while there are no Republican candidates for town offices this election cycle, there are still county races in which party members can show their support.

Robinson commended town Democrats for running an effective campaign in the last election cycle, which allowed the party to hold all seats on the Town Board. She said Republicans would focus on more effectively sharing their message and using social media next time around.

'You need more than one vision on the Town Board," Robinson said, "but they won, and to the victor goes the spoils."

scores were mailed.

The Guilderland Central School District mails student exam scores in-house, so it did not have the same error.

Voorheesville Superintendent Teresa Thayer Snyder said a district administrator, who also has a student in the district, noticed the error upon receiving her child's score.

Voorheesville contacted NERIC about the issue, who then had EDGE determine if the error affected the entire district. The printing vendor determined all district letters were affected.

"They took full responsibility and said they were really sorry," Snyder said. "They have been very reliable in the past... it happens to be the most highly sensitive test they made the mistake on."

New York State United Teachers officials, along with some parents and school leaders, have expressed concerns about how significantly declining test scores might affect students. Snyder said having parents act as a "buffer" was more important than ever with many students seeing scores dropping.

Snyder, in her most recent "Superintendent's Page" post on the district's website, said she has received "numerous phone calls and emails" from parents concerned about declining scores.

"Children who received high scores in previous vears and who carry high academic averages, this year fell below the benchmark contrived to indicate proficiency,' Snyder wrote. "Their parents are surprised, but the children are distraught. I have received messages indicating that some children burst into tears and declared themselves dumb. I have heard from parents who are expressing disdain of a system that would inflict such nonsensical messages on school children."

Snyder said as of Friday, Oct. 18, she had not heard of any student opening their test score results letter without a parent present.

The Bethlehem Central School District appeared to notify parents and guardians of the error before test scores were received with a statement released Wednesday, Oct.

"We are awaiting a detailed explanation from the vendor in question as to how such a serious error could occur, but wanted to alert you as soon as possible so you can address this issue at home, as you see fit," the announcement read. "We apologize for

this unexpected turn of events and hope this error does not cause any undue concern for our students."

Sabre Sarnataro, spokeswoman for BC schools, said the district did not appear to have received any complaints about students opening the letter without a parent.

Voorheesville released the letter Brian Hussey, Jr., account executive for EDGE, sent the district apologizing for the error.

Hussey said EDGE developers and the production team reviewed the issue and determined the company "inadvertently overwrote" the phrase addressing letters to the parents or guardians with the Intelligent Mail Barcode.

"As in years past, all live work went through a final review and start up process to verify everything was in order," Hussey said. "With the changes to the layout of ELA and math parent reports this year, the emphasis was placed on verifying that the program(s) were pulling and merging all applicable data correctly. While this was performed as prescribed, the verification of the verbiage that should have appeared on the cover letter was overlooked in our facility during testing phase."

In the letter, Hussey wrote he could "appreciate a parent's confusion and concern" over the letter being directly addressed to the child.

"The EDGE organization takes pride in delivering a quality product and apologizes for any inconvenience this has caused," he said.

organizations like CEG and GlobalFoundries ... for their employees that are looking to move here."

if you needed something," Miller said. "It seemed like every function was well attended and everyone respects her."

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



Albany County marks 330th anniversary

Public can view original 1683 Dongan Charter as part of celebration

Albany County is celebrating its 330th anniversary in part by recognizing the sheets of paper that made its existence possible.

On Thursday, Oct. 31, the Albany County Hall of Records will host an open house with an exhibit of the county's oldest records, including the original document that split New York into counties. The exhibit will move to

the Times Union Center on Sunday, Nov. 3, where it will join the "Live Life Local" celebration.

The 104,000-cubic-foot Hall of Records serves as an archives repository for the very oldest documents in the county. The public mostly uses the hall to study genealogical records. They can get water records, voter registration cards, state and federal census reports and building records, amongst other documents.

ew people can boast they've traveled the world in the matter of a few hours, but through the longtime work Manoj Ajmera and the Festival of Nations, held each year in Albany, thousands throughout the Capital District can now claim they've come close.

In 1972, the first year of the festival, Aimera took part in the community event as a dancer to represent his home country of India. Now, 42 years later,

"This is my passion," said Ajmera. "As long as I can do it, I will."

The festival was moved that next year to the field house at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute to allow more people to be admitted, but it was moved again in 1978 following the construction of the Empire State Plaza. Aimera said the new space was in a more central location and there was a modern sound system, which allowed for the expansion of the festival's activities.

The festival has since grown to include the participation of people from more than 25 countries, with the newest representation coming from Burma and Indonesia.

Between 3,000 and 5,000 people attend the festival each year. The day includes native dancing and music, crafts and lots of food.

"The dancing is popular, people come to watch, but people also love food," said Ajmera. "Where else can you have all different home cooking from all over world?"

Ajmera said the festival is a great place for people to try new foods they may have been too afraid to try in the past. Many who attend also bring containers with them to bring food home, because there is no way to try everything within the festival's timespan.

Attendees can sample such fare as Turkish dumplings called manti, Israeli challah bread pudding and Colombian corn pies with cheese. Other dishes include Greek moussaka (eggplant), pastitchio (pasta and meat) and baklava (phyllo, chopped walnuts, syrup, spices.)

"Some people stay away from ethnic restaurant because they aren't sure if they will like the food and will waste money," Ajmera said. "This is a way for people to try the food and decide if they would like to go to a restaurant themselves later."

He added the event is also a good experience for children. He said volunteers will be on hand to answer different questions about their country of origin and it can help spread understanding of other cultures throughout the Capital District.

"None of us know about all the countries, so they can get a glimpse of the music, food and culture. This is how America was built," said Ajmera.

Many of the community groups also sponsor girls in the festival's "Miss Festival of Nations" competition. Ajmera said the event is not a beauty contest. Instead, contestants are judged on their personality, community service and knowledge of their countries.

The first round of judging already took place on Wednesday, Oct. 23, at the Marriott Hotel in Albany. The day of the festival, those in attendance will gather to hear the names of the finalists. Those contestants will then be asked a final question, a last round of judging will be done and the winner will be crowned.

All the proceeds from the event are split among the different community organizations that participate. Ajmera said the tables are set up by nonprofit organizations, many of which are churches, different religious institutions or community centers.

"The money does go to good causes, after expenses," Ajmera said.

The Festival of Nations takes place at the Empire State Plaza on Sunday, Oct. 27, from noon to 5 p.m. The entry fee is \$5 for adults and \$2 for children ages 3 to 12. For more information, visit festivalofnations.net.

signed by Royal Governor Thomas Dongan and the New York Colonial Assembly on Nov. 1, 1683, and states it is "An act to divide this province & dependeys into shires and countys." The act divided New York into 12 counties, two of which are now in other states. At the time, Albany County encompassed almost the entire northern portion of the state, but by 1808 Albany County assumed its current borders.

Dongan, a Catholic from Ireland, fled to France to escape religious persecution after the overthrow of Charles I. After the Treaty of Nijmegen was signed, establishing peace between the French and Dutch. Dongan was forced to return to England. James, Duke of York, appointed Dongan provincial governor of New York, where he served from 1683 to 1688.

Today, the original Dongan Charter is contained in a vault with four-hour firewalls – it would take four hours of raging fire before its structural integrity was compromised. The 330-year-old charter is an 11-page, handwritten document. It looks like a giant note pad, with Dongan's seal threaded through the binding itself.

Thomas Clingan. Albany County clerk, said most of the county's current projects involve digitizing documents - taking microfilm or paper documents and

"We can take virtually any size document and digitize it," said Clingan.

The Dongan Charter will be the highlight of the upcoming exhibit, but there will also be a display of the Fort Orange Minutes from 1652 to 1660, a transaction book between early Dutch settlers and Indians, Farm Surveys of from Rensselaerwyck Manor (currently Albany and Rensselaer Counties) and an exhibit on John Randel. Randel was a surveyor and cartographer who created
