Town to replace radios

**A pair of
'catastrophic'
communication
failures cause
Bethlehem to
move up plans**

The Bethlehem Police Department will be upgrading its dispatch console earlier than expected, after several radio communication failures occurred in September.

On Wednesday, Oct. 23, the Bethlehem Town Board approved

taking out a \$170,000 bond to pay for a system upgrade three years before it was scheduled. The dispatch console controls the radio communications for the town's police and fire departments, as well as for emergency medical services and the town's inter-department radios.

"We had been having glitches

Rail Trail on the right path

**Three-mile section in
New Scotland to open this fall,
Albany portion eyed for 2015**

Enhancements to two bridges along the Helderberg Hudson Rail Trail are progressing, and a three-mile section of the trail through New Scotland is expected to open next month.

Volunteers have finished improvements to the Vly Creek bridge in Voorheesville, including constructing railings and a new deck to safely span railroad ties. More complex improvements have also begun on another village bridge over Route 155, including installing fencing on each side for pedestrian and vehicle safety.

"We are really fortunate that the bridge was structurally very sound and with the help of a group of skilled volunteers and engineering, we will have an attractive crossing over Vly Creek," project leader Scott Lewendon said.

Tensions are showing on Guilderland school board

Retreat to solve conflicts causes finger pointing before it even begins

Guilderland Board of Education members are scheduled to hold a retreat next month to work out their differences, but some internal tensions spilled out into public before they could get away.

Near the close of the board's Tuesday, Oct. 22, meeting, Colleen O'Connell, former board president, expressed her frustrations about three of her eight fellow board members who had not turned in a questionnaire distributed for the November retreat two weeks after the due date. A facilitator asked board members to complete the multiple choice-style survey, which O'Connell admitted was "quite lengthy," to help prepare for the retreat.

"If people aren't even willing to do the work beforehand and look at this survey, I am not sure why this is a good use of six hours of my time in November," O'Connell said. "I think we desperately need a retreat, but I don't think people are committed to it, so I am questioning why we are having it."

Superintendent Marie Wiles, however, said there was only one questionnaire outstanding as of the Tuesday night meeting.

The planned retreat would be held over two nights next month, over a total of six hours, on district property. The district also hired a facilitator to lead the meetings who charges a fee of \$150 per hour.

Wiles said the board has held a retreat for several years, even before her tenure. This year, the retreat will focus on the board doing a self-evaluation.

At the meeting, O'Connell continued to blast some fellow board members, without naming names, who she claimed are regularly not prepared for meetings.

"I think there is a lack of commitment by a number of people on this board," O'Connell said. "Some members of this board do not respond to school email, which makes it very difficult to schedule things, which means people have to get on the phone."

Board President Barbara Fraterrigo, a longtime member, said the retreat would be used to discuss such concerns.

"From my standpoint,

I think it is those kind of issues that we will be dealing with in the retreat process itself," Fraterrigo said.

Board member Gloria Towle-Hilt agreed with O'Connell and said having board members not complete the survey makes the body appear uncommitted.

"We all need to ask ourselves

how committed are we to this, because the survey was important for setting the groundwork for it. If that's not important, then we need to think seriously why we are paying a facilitator and reserving two nights ... if we are not serious about this," Towle-Hilt said. "We have to have this, but we also have to do it 100 percent. We are here as a board, we are not here as individuals."

O'Connell said Wiles "repeatedly" expressed in emails the questionnaires were required for the facilitator to begin research and preparation for the retreat.

"I don't care if you are a veteran member of this board, a middle member, or a new member — we are adults," O'Connell said. "We give our kids deadlines all the time in school. That is what we expect of kids, but we are not even expecting that of ourselves."

O'Connell said she believes the retreat would be a "waste of time." Fraterrigo reasserted the meeting would be good to work out frustrations, but also said newer members might not be as accustomed to their responsibilities.

"I think it is the learning curve ... and as you go on in years you become more confident, you become more reliable I think," she said, "so I don't have any problems with continuing on with having the sessions."

O'Connell also claimed some board members have been abstaining from participating in negotiations with the district's unions, along with other topics, during executive session. The board is allowed to discuss certain matters, such as contract negotiations, privately in an executive session.

"You are not elected to be abstaining," she said, "so this is not the first time that this has come up."

When Fraterrigo asked if there was a consensus to continue with the retreat, O'Connell said she might not attend.

"I am not committing to be there," O'Connell said. "I'll think about it."

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New faces, new ideas at Bethlehem forum

Candidates for Bethlehem offices discuss plans at event

Four candidates vying for two open seats on the Bethlehem Town Board worked to distinguish themselves from one another at a recent candidate forum.

Candidates were given the chance to answer questions from the audience on Tuesday, Oct. 22, at an event sponsored by Spotlight News, the Albany County League of Women Voters and the Capital Area Council of Churches.

The candidates included Democrats Bill Reinhardt and Julie Sasso, Independence Party member Dan Cunningham and Conservative Linda Jasinski. Reinhardt also has the endorsement of the Working Families Party, while Cunningham and Jasinski are also endorsed by the Republicans, Independents and Conservatives.

Reinhardt is the only candidate running for re-election. He won the seat last year in a special election. Appointee

George Lenhardt previously held the seat after Mark Jordan stepped down to run for town justice. The other seat is being left open by Councilman Kyle Kotary, who opted not to run for another term.

Although they are from different parties, the candidates had similar views on many of the questions asked. Most candidates felt the Wemple Corners Project should not be developed

as proposed. They also felt it might be time to broaden the search for businesses suitable for the Vista Technology Campus.

“Vista has been a disappointment,” said Jasinski, who suggested a manufacturing business might work better than a tech company.

The candidates did diverge when it came to taxes. No one felt year-to-year tax increases should be the status quo,

but Reinhardt said they are needed to maintain staffing levels and town services. Sasso said she had a \$100 increase in her tax bill last year, but “didn’t begrudge giving that money to the town to pay for services.”

Like Republican supervisor candidate Fred DiMaggio, Cunningham said fund balance should be used to provide residents tax relief. Jasinski said just because Sasso is fine with giving an extra \$100 to the town doesn’t mean the increase fits into the budgets of others living in Bethlehem.

Three running for highway job

The three remaining candidates for highway

superintendent also participated in the forum.

After the September primary, remaining in the race were Independence Party candidate Terry Ritz, Republican Howard Hyer and Democrat Brent Meredith. Ritz also has the endorsement of the Conservative Party.

The superintendent position has been vacant since former Superintendent of Highways Gregg Sagendorph retired in April. The Bethlehem Town Board appointed Public Works Commissioner Erik Deyoe to act as interim highway superintendent until January.

This followed a referendum vote put forth by town officials

that would have abolished the office of highway superintendent as an elected position, clearing the way for a civil servant to be hired to help manage the Highway Department under the public works umbrella. That referendum failed 3,086 votes to 1,969.

Specific ideas from candidates ran the gamut. Ritz suggested integration of a GPS system to track trucks and save on fuel. Meredith wanted to repair and install more sidewalks. Hyer said he would like to see an additional use of technology, but said most part the Highway Department is being run efficiently.

Coeymans police sweep up with drug, weapons arrests

Coeymans Police have made several arrests in recent weeks for narcotics and weapons possession.

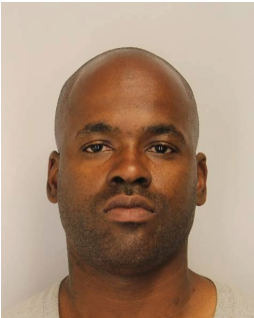
The arrests were made by the Coeymans Anti-Narcotics Team in conjunction with the Capital District Drug Enforcement Task Force, the DEA Tactical Diversion Squad, the Albany County Sheriff's Office, New York State Police and the Albany County District Attorney's Office.

The Coeymans Police said the Coeymans Anti-Narcotics Team recently concluded several investigations that ended with felony arrests. Police also confiscated approximately 3 ounces of cocaine, 18 packages of heroin, more than 225 marijuana plants and about 16 pounds of marijuana, along with materials used to operate an indoor marijuana grow operation.

Besides drugs, the Coeymans police also confiscated three assault rifles, two illegal handguns, other long guns and more than 500 rounds of ammunition. Recent investigations have resulted in the confiscation of nearly \$10,000 in cash and the seizure of three vehicles believed to be part of the drug sale proceeds, police said.

Arrested were:

- Lawrence Black, 54, of Coeymans. He was charged with operating a marijuana grow operation at his Westerlo Street home. He was also allegedly found to be in possession of a stolen handgun. He was charged with felony criminal possession of marijuana, felony of criminal possession of a weapon in the third degree, felony criminal possession of a weapon after previously being convicted, misdemeanor unlawfully growing cannabis, misdemeanor criminal possession of a weapon and misdemeanor endangering the welfare of a child.
- Lisa Tuscano, 44, of Coeymans, was charged with felony criminal possession of marijuana, misdemeanor unlawfully



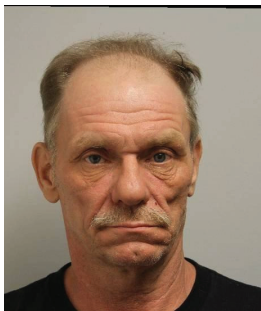

Forum cancelled at last minute

A scheduled forum involving candidates for local office in the Town of Guilderland was called off at the last minute when Democrats said the date and time was not amicable, nearly one month after invitations were first sent.

The forum, which was cosponsored by the League of Women Voters of Albany County, Spotlight News and the Capital Area Council of Churches, had been set for Monday, Oct. 28, at the Guilderland Public Library. It was called off Sunday, Oct. 27, when it became clear one half of the candidates would not be attending.

The League of Women Voters distributed invitations to six candidates – four for Town Board and two for supervisor – by email one month prior to the event. The three

Republican candidates confirmed participation shortly thereafter. The event was publicized by Spotlight News in print and online.

After attempts were made by the League to follow up with Democratic candidates in the days that followed, Councilwoman and Democrat Patricia Slavick notified the League on Wednesday, Oct. 23, that the date was not possible for any Democratic candidate.

“The League offered to change the format or try to change the date. There was no answer to either proposal,” said Maryann Lettau, of the League of Women Voters. “The League of Women Voters, in our effort to present a balanced and fair event for voters, was unable to proceed with the plans for Oct. 28. A candidate forum cannot be a platform for one party only.”

Attempts to reach Supervisor Ken Runion and other town Democrats for comment were unsuccessful. Runion, Slavick and Councilman Paul Pastore were invited to the event.

Guilderland Republican Committee Chairman Matt Nelligan said he was disappointed the GOP candidates – Mark Grimm for supervisor, and Lee Carman and Mark Livingston for Town Board – would not be able to debate.

“The Democrats have a history of refusing to participate in debates, which I think speaks to their lack of transparency on their record,” he said. “I think the only thing that’s going on here is the Democrats want to hide from their record ... it’s unfortunate for the taxpayers.”

The election is on Tuesday, Nov. 5.

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State OKs farm ‘tax cap’

Agricultural land assessments held to 2 percent increase annually

Rising agricultural land assessments have increased the tax burden on farmers statewide, even with a local property tax cap in place, but new legislation should slow that growth.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed legislation on Tuesday, Oct. 22, capping agricultural land assessments at 2 percent annually. The measure aims to offer a more stable and predictable tax climate for the state’s agricultural industry. Annual assessment increases were previously

limited to 10 percent.

State officials said the base assessment value for agricultural lands has nearly doubled over the last seven years, which alongside increasing property taxes led Cuomo to petition and implement the “2 percent” tax cap.

Acting State Agriculture Commissioner James B. Bays said capping assessments would help agriculture remain a viable industry. It accounts for 25 percent of land usage statewide.

“Protecting our farmers from unsustainable tax hikes is part of our work to change our state’s reputation as the tax capital of the nation by controlling spending while reducing the tax burden on New Yorkers,” Cuomo said in a statement. “Agriculture is big business in New York, and our state government is committed to doing everything we can to help this vital industry thrive and continue to create jobs and economic prosperity, particularly Upstate.”

New York Farm Bureau President Dean Norton applauded the law and said it was a “victory for all farmers.”

“The 2 percent agricultural assessment cap has long been a priority for New York Farm Bureau,” Norton said in a statement. “It is a big step forward in reducing the increasing property tax burden that has limited our farmers’ ability to grow. It will also help young and beginning farmers as they endeavor to provide locally grown food, fuel and fiber.”

State Senator Cecilia Tkaczyk, a member of the Senate’s Agriculture Committee, said holding the line on agricultural taxes is important because the industry annually generates more than \$31 billion.

“It will help small family farms to grow, invest in their farms and create new jobs,” Tkaczyk said.

New York Apple Association President Jim Allen said the cap would benefit apple growers

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operating more than 54,000 acres across the state.

Northeast Dairy Producers Association Board Director Dale Stein said without the cap, “costs will escalate to an unaffordable level for the farms and force many family farms out of business.”

Assessments of agricultural land are calculated differently when compared

to residential and commercial property. It is influenced by a national formula.

Property taxes account for approximately 15 percent of the average farm’s net expenses in the New York, which is 5 percent above the national average, according to Farm Credit East, a company providing loans and financial management services to farmers. The average property tax

bill for a New York state farmer in 2007 was \$5,544 and it increased to nearly \$7,650 in 2011, almost \$2,500 above the national average.

The average farm in the state is also smaller than the national average – 195 acres compared to 420 acres. The average state farmer pays \$38.41 per acre in property taxes, according to Farm Credit East, which is above the national average of \$12.34.



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From the Editor's Desk

It's not only candidates on this year's ballot

New York voters will head to the polls on Tuesday, Nov. 5, to pick their local representatives, public servants and judges. It will be an important day, to be sure, and while we always advocate on this page for the electorate to gather as much information as possible on their candidates, it's not just people voters will be deciding on come Election Day.

This year brings a bevvvy of constitutional amendments and other propositions to the ballot – six, to be precise. But as experienced citizens already know, it can be tough to make a decision on these issues based simply on the proposition's language, which can waver between lopsided and indecipherable.

So, we present you with a summary of what will appear on the ballot, and the arguments pro or con for each measure. We hope you'll keep this page handy for reference when it comes time to head to the polls.

Proposition 1: Casinos

This is the constitutional amendment that has been drawing the most attention. In short, if this proposition were passed, the state legislature would be allowed to authorize up to seven casinos to be built in New York. The locations of those hypothetical casinos have been the subject of much debate, but nothing has been decided officially.

It's a pretty simple idea, but also one with strong opinions on both sides. Proponents argue casino gambling would create jobs and revenues for municipalities and schools, lifting the tax burden from residents and driving the economy. They also note casino gambling already exists at five Native American casinos in New York, and that thanks to a loophole in the existing law, legal slot machines hooked into the state's lottery system are already in operation elsewhere. This measure, by that argument, would not greatly expand on what already exists.

Opponents, however, argue casino gambling would increase the impacts of gambling addiction across the state, exploit those suffering from that addiction and negatively impact the communities casinos would be located, including through increased crime. Some also question the possibility of meaningful job creation and

economic impacts.

Proposition 2: Veteran credits

This proposal, if passed, would amend the state constitution to entitle a veteran to an additional one-time credit toward civil service exams, under certain circumstances.

Under the existing rules, vets get five extra points on civil service exams (2 ½ if the exam concerns a promotion). Disabled veterans are entitled to a larger benefit: 10 points, or 5 on a promotion. The amendment would create an exception covering veterans who are certified as disabled after having already received this one-time credit, so they could be credited the difference.

There doesn't seem to be any outspoken opposition to this amendment.

Proposition 3: Sewage debt

Strap in for an exciting ride.

If New Yorkers pass Proposition 3, it would extend until 2024 the authority of municipal governments to exclude from their constitutional debt limits indebtedness contracted from the construction and reconstruction of facilities for the conveyance, treatment and disposal of sewage.

In plain English, towns, villages and counties would continue to be able to borrow money for expensive sewer projects without maxing out the credit card (as far as the state is concerned, at least). This exclusion was originally authorized in 1963 to encourage governments to undertake responsible sewage projects without worrying the work would exclude making other capital improvements down the road.

Again, there doesn't seem to be much in the way of opposition to this proposition.

Proposition 4: Raquette Lake land dispute

This constitutional amendment would settle a longstanding land dispute in the Town of Long Lake, up in Hamilton County.

In short, for the past century, the ownership of many parcels of land around Raquette Lake has been in dispute, with both the state and private landowners claiming ownership. About

200 parcels are still contested despite attempts to settle the matter in court.

Under a settlement on the table, the contested land would be conveyed to private landowners and replaced with land elsewhere in the Adirondack Park to be added to the forest preserve. The private landowners would have to pay into a fund held by Long Lake until enough money is raised to buy the land.

So why must the entire state of New York sign off on this? Well, the area in question is in the Adirondack Park, which is declared forever wild in the state constitution. The lease, sale, exchange or taking of any forest preserve land is forbidden. This proposition, if passed, would amend that article to allow this swap (and this swap only). That is, if the legislature later determines the offered land would benefit the forest preserve more than the disputed parcels.

Those in favor of Proposition 4 say it would settle a problem that has left many homeowners and business owners in a state of uncertainty for years, and has cost much wasted money in the courts. It would also add to the forest preserve. Conservation groups feel the state would likely target the Marion River Carry for acquisition, which would open up new recreational opportunities in the area.

Opponents, however, argue the deal would set a dangerous precedent for other land disputes within the park. Some question whether the fees would be sufficient to acquire better land, as well.

Proposition 5: Mining land swap

This is another forever wild proposition. NYCO Minerals wants to mine about 200 acres in the Town of Lewis, in Essex County, which is located on forest preserve land.

In exchange for conveyance of the land, the company would give the state another parcel of about 1,500 acres to be added to the preserve forever and, when mining is finished, replant the 200 acres and give it back to the state.

NYCO is mining wollastonite in the area, which is used in ceramics, paints and as an asbestos substitute. It's clear the company would continue to operate in the area regardless of Proposition 5's outcome, but

the deal would obviously open up new business.

Proponents point out the deal would be a net gain for the state from a numbers standpoint. The 1,500-acre parcel NYCO would convey also contains choice pieces of recreational resources that are not presently accessible to the public. The 200 acres known as Lot 8 is directly adjacent to NYCO's existing mine and does not see much recreational use.

Opponents argue the swap would not create new jobs or drive the local economy. They also say the deal would set a dangerous precedent by allowing commercial access to land designated forever wild. Some worry it could become common for businesses looking to harvest the Adirondacks to buy the state off through land swaps.

This slippery slope argument is chief among the reasons groups like the Sierra Club and Adirondack Wild oppose the proposition. Groups like the Adirondack Council and local and state business groups have endorsed the swap.

Proposition 6: Judicial age

This constitutional amendment would increase the maximum age until which certain state judges may serve.

The language of the actual proposition is somewhat confusing, but the amendment would effectively raise the maximum age on the bench to 80 for judges on the Supreme Court or in the Court of Appeals. The retirement age would still officially be 70, but in the case of the Supreme Court, justices would be able to serve five additional two-year terms upon a certificate their services are needed (they can currently serve three additional terms). Court of Appeals justices would be able to remain in office for up to 10 years after the retirement age in order to finish a term.

The amendment would also prohibit the appointment of any person over the age of 70 to either court.

Those in favor of the measure argue the state would continue to benefit from experienced judges and point out the average lifespan has increased since the retirement age was put in place. Some opponents feel extending the maximum age would favor long-serving judges and discourage diversity on the courts.

Walk to School Day quickly becoming a growing tradition

Editor, *The Spotlight*:
We are happy to introduce a new tradition in our community that is quickly taking root, the Walk to School Day event that three Bethlehem schools celebrated on Oct. 9. While Walk to School Day (and its sister event, Bike to School Day, in May) is only one day of the year, the goal is much greater: to promote safe walking and bicycling as part of our everyday lives and throughout the whole year.
This is how, on a beautiful fall morning, three of Bethlehem's elementary schools brought the International Walk to School effort - celebrated by over 4,000 schools around the world - to our doorsteps. Elsmere Elementary, a school struggling everyday to deal with daunting traffic issues just outside its front door, celebrated its first-ever Walk to School Day supported by Principal Kate Kloss with an estimated 100 students participating. Slingerlands Elementary continued the tradition for a second year by gathering the 225 students who walked in a group

activity led by its physical education teachers Robin Young and Joanna Crawford and Principal Heidi Bonacquist around the school's athletic fields. At Hamagrael Elementary, neighbors were astounded as they watched crowds numbering 250 participate in a group 'walking school bus' led by Bethlehem School Superintendent Dr. Thomas Douglas, Principal Dave Ksanznak and Officer Mike Whiteley of the Bethlehem Police Department.
These elementary schools were not alone in this exemplary effort, but were supported by the Bethlehem Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee and its Roll Model campaign to promote safe walking, biking and driving; several parent volunteers, the Healthy Kids Committee, Physical Education Departments and PTA/PTO members at each school; the Bethlehem Police Department with extra patrols; Shop Rite and Price Chopper for food donations; Capital CoExist and NYSDOT for handouts and educational materials; and Albany

County for the electronic message signs leading up to the event.
This year, Bethlehem had the honor of having more schools participate in the Walk to School Day event than any other municipality in the Capital Region. We hope to see this new tradition continue to grow - and with it, bring growing attention to the need for safe walking, biking and driving practices in our community. For whether we have lived here our whole lives or just moved here recently to start a family, the desire to create a more walkable, bikeable - and ultimately liveable - community is shared.

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Traffic troubles in Glenmont neighborhoods

Residents of Haswell Farms and Enclave complain of dangerous drivers

Following a number of resident complaints, the Town of Bethlehem is looking into a traffic calming initiative in the Haswell Farms and Enclave neighborhoods. Senior Planner Rob Leslie reviewed options with the Town Board on Wednesday, Oct. 23. He said a number of residents came forward over the summer and were concerned about speeding vehicles and the safety of their children as they play outside. In response, a traffic officer was sent to the

location, along with a speed signal trailer. The police officer agreed there was a traffic problem in the area of Hasgate and Forsten drives. “My frustration, as a Town Board member and supervisor, is that I don’t like it when complaints come in and we keep having to say, ‘this is all we can do and we can’t solve your problem,’” said Town Supervisor John Clarkson. “I don’t think we should accept that in this case, or we should at least find new ways to tackle this problem.” Clarkson said the town often receives requests for new stop signs to be placed in certain neighborhoods in order to slow traffic. The problem is, sometimes too many stop signs create an additional problem with drivers rolling through them if they don’t feel the sign should be there. The state also now rarely approves “Children at

Play” signs. Leslie, who is also the town representative on the Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee, detailed a 10-month plan to implement and review solutions to the problem. The first step was to have a meeting with neighborhood representatives from the Enclave and Haswell Farms. Next, the town plans to install automatic traffic recorders to collect data on vehicle volume and speed. However, some Town Board members wondered if residents would see the tubes lying across the street and slow down, skewing the data collected. Clarkson said because it is believed the problem lies with residents entering and leaving the community, some solutions could be having a community meeting, sending letters to residents or installing temporary speed bumps. A number of residents from the neighborhood spoke at the meeting. Neal Sorell, who lives on Barrington Court, said he loves his home and neighborhood, but what he doesn’t like are the traffic issues. He said the problem started when the Enclave was built, and the development was connected to Haswell Farms by Forsten Drive. “Traffic has increased significantly, to the point where at high drive times ... speed and aggressive driving is the rule, rather than the exception,” Sorell said. Residents described cars passing drivers on residential streets, driving close to school busses and clipping mailboxes. “It’s a challenge to back out of the driveway,” said Sorell. Others said they were concerned about letting their children play outside in their own yards. Police Chief Louis

Corsi said in a later interview that officers have been to the area frequently in the past year. “Generally speaking, when new developments go in, there is heavier traffic,” said Corsi. The police chief said the department is doing the best it can, but it’s hard to dedicate a traffic officer to a specific area. “I was really impressed with the board last night because they took a proactive stance,” he said. Corsi and residents said the traffic issues would be alleviated if the two developments had more exit roads. Leslie said more roads are planned, but the developments need to continue being built out before they can be placed. He said the Planning Board would never approve developments with only one access road because it could create a problem for emergency vehicles. The installation of the automatic traffic recorder is scheduled for the end of the fall. Work will continue on the traffic calming plan once the data is obtained.

G'land sidewalk project on track

Residents near Western Ave. corridor want DOT to target drainage, too

Residents and business owners were invited to share comments about proposed sidewalk improvements along Western Avenue in Guilderland, but most thoughts centered on drainage issues and fears that future repairs would require new sidewalks to be ripped out and repaved.

Around 45 people attended the state Department of Transportation's public information meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 23, concerning the planned sidewalk improvement project, which would also tackle crosswalks and meet Americans with Disabilities Act requirements.

The project area stretches approximately three miles from around Alvina Boulevard to the entrance of the University at Albany. Sidewalk would be installed in most locations where there are none and replaced where they fail to meet standards.

The project would be completed in two phases and cost \$2.6 million. The first phase would tackle the north side of Western Avenue and begin in the spring of next year, to be "substantially completed" in 2014. The second phase would focus on the south side of the street, with work starting the fall of next year and completed in the spring to summer of 2015.

The Capital District Transportation Committee approved the project through a competitive process. The agency distributes federal transportation funding for the Capital District.

"Bicycle and pedestrian improvements are an important part of our long range revisions plan," said Christopher O'Neill, principal transportation planner for CDTC. "We see this project as making a significant achievement in (pedestrian access). We do think that pedestrian improvements

are very important to the transportation systems of the community."

O'Neill said the project includes many safety benefits for pedestrians and motorists.

Nancy Dover, a Knowles Terrace resident, came to the meeting to learn more about the project and show support. Dover, who lives off Western Avenue, said her concerns are likely different from property owners along Route 20.

"From where I live, there is no sidewalk and there is also no shoulder in the road, which means that come winter it is basically impassable on foot," Dover said.

Geoffrey Wood, design supervisor for the project, said the DOT is "confident" the \$2.6 million budgeted would be sufficient for all renovations, but there are not "any firm numbers exactly yet."

Several people questioned why the project would not tackle any drainage issues, particularly in the hamlet of McKownville, but Wood said federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement funds could only be used for specific purposes.

McKownville residents have complained of basements flooding often during rainstorms.

"It is impossible for me to say off the top of my head how roadway drainage relates to wet basements," Wood said.

There are still some improvements that should yield better drainage.

"I have seen places where the sidewalk is two feet below the road. So we

are going to bring that up, and all the water from that sidewalk is going to drain to the street, and run along curb and go in the catch basins along the street," Wood said. "I have heard stories that there are some issues with the piping system underground."

Don Reeb, president of the McKownville Improvement Association, claimed the DOT only puts down asphalt when a broken pipe causes the road to cave in. He said the broken pipe is never repaired.

"We seem to have not been able to get any reaction from DOT at all about coming in and fixing those (state-owned) lines or enlarging them so that we don't have the water backed up," Reeb said.

Wood said "if money were no object," then repairs would also be made to the drainage system.

Doug Smith, a McKown Road resident, said the DOT should be "smart" and coordinate to get needed drainage repairs completed, so new sidewalks are not ripped up again.

Gavin Hogan, a Westlyn Court resident, agreed with Smith and said different sections of the department should work together so the same "mess" isn't made a year later.

Wood said it's too late in the process for drainage to be tackled.

"The planning that you are talking about, either it has occurred or it hasn't occurred," he said. "We can't just now, at the last minute, do a new project. It really takes years to get to this point."

Few changes to Bethlehem budget

General reception to spending plan positive, taxes would increase 1.23 percent

The Bethlehem Town Board passed the town 2014 preliminary budget with few changes to what was originally proposed.

The budget calls for a property tax levy increase of 1.23 percent, which is below the state tax cap. This would equate to a 0.6 percent increase in the tax rate, or \$4.98 on a home valued at \$250,000.

The Town Board is scheduled to vote on the final budget adoption on Wednesday, Nov. 13.

"This is a good news budget," said Supervisor John Clarkson.

The 2013 budget dealt with a \$3.5 million budget gap by cutting 16 positions and through a property tax levy increase of 7.9 percent.

The plan for 2014 uses \$10,000 from the town's fund balance and money from the state's Efficiency

and Performance Award given to the town this spring to eliminate the town's dispatch fee for residents and implement projects over the next three years, such as installation of sidewalks and contributing to make the Delaware Avenue Enhancement Study and Sustainable Bethlehem projects come to fruition.

During budget workshops, the Town Board discussed when the projects would take place and how much of the grant would be allocated. Over three years, \$175,000 will be spent on front-loaded tax relief, with \$50,000 going toward Sustainable Bethlehem projects, \$300,000 to sidewalk enhancement and \$251,000 reserved for contingencies.

Some residents may see their tax bill go down in 2014 based on the water, sewer or ambulance district they live in. Because the town's three ambulance districts have now been consolidated into one, many residents in Selkirk and Glenmont are expected to see a tax reduction.

The town will no longer be using a consultant for some sewer work, and some administration services are also being reimbursed from the general fund.

At the public hearing portion of the meeting, nearly everyone who spoke was in favor of the budget.

One resident said he felt many administrative salaries and compensation for elected officials were too high. He suggested making further cuts in order to save more money.

In favor of the proposal were both former Supervisor Sam Messina and Deputy Supervisor John Smolinsky.

"I have carefully considered all 2014 budget documents that have been posted on the town's website and I believe this is a strong plan for Bethlehem's fiscal accountability and quality of services for 2014 and into the future," wrote Messina in a letter to the board.

Another resident said she liked that the budget had no "gimmicks or one-shot deals."

the section of trail is open to the public. The new three-mile portion will be limited to pedestrian usage because of the existing trail surface quality and some unprotected, steep sections. The project will have a total cost of around \$21,500 for bridge improvements.

Selkirk-based JAT Construction will install needed fencing along the Route 155 overpass for approximately \$17,000. The Albany County Department of Public Works will provide traffic control assistance along the bridge as work progresses.

“The recent progress made to this point on the Rail Trail affirms that partnerships work,” Albany County Executive Dan McCoy said in a statement. “I want to commend the Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy for working with the county on this vital recreational project and for energizing volunteers to vary out the work needed to be done.”

The county would not allow portions of the trail to open without the bridge improvements. Lewendon, a member of Friends of the Rail Trail Group, petitioned the New Scotland Town Board in mid-September to provide the remaining \$4,500 to complete the project. The board awarded the funding, which will be drawn from the town parkland fund. Developers building in the town pay into the account, which is reserved for park improvements.

New Scotland Town Supervisor Tom Dolin said he was “very pleased” to

see the trail improvements progressing and welcomed further collaboration.

The project will allow the portion of trail between Upper Font Grove and Voorheesville Avenue to be accessed for the first time.

New Scotland Highway Superintendent Ken Guyer previously said this portion of the trail, though it was only open to volunteers to clear the trail, has received “a lot of use” and “sees a lot of walkers.”

The Voorheesville Community and School Foundation contributed \$10,000 and the Mohawk-Hudson Land Conservancy compiled its restricted funds and donations for \$7,076.

Albany County has initiated engineering and design work for another portion of the trail stretching from the South Pearl Street in Albany to the underpass on Delaware Avenue. This section would be completed as a paved, shared-use path for pedestrians and bicyclists.

The Albany project would tap federal funds administered by the state Department of Transportation, state Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation and matching funds from Albany County. Construction is planned to start next fall and be completed in late 2015.

and couldn’t diagnose the problem,” said Police Chief Louis Corsi. “The system was so old, the hardware and software were not supported and diagnostic equipment no longer available. A fear from the technician was if it went down entirely, it might not be able to go back up.”

Corsi said there had been minor difficulties with the system in the year prior to the failures. On Sept. 2 and 14, there was a total loss of radio communications for up to 30 minutes. Corsi called the failures “catastrophic” in a letter to the Town Board.

Supervisor John Clarkson said given the circumstances, he did not feel the town should wait any longer.

“What is comes down to is (the system) is old,” said Clarkson. “It’s beyond its service life and you’re always better advised to upgrade when you get to that point.”

The system was first installed in 1999, and upgrades were done in 2003 to include the Elm Avenue Tower and Clapper Road site. According to Corsi, the technician also said additional parts for the system are now hard to find.

“We weren’t confident we wouldn’t lose communication again,” said Corsi.

The town had budgeted to replace the system in 2016, but has opted to instead bond in order to upgrade the system now. The

new system should be ready in six to eight weeks.

Corsi said to make sure another system failure doesn’t occur, the police department has hooked up its mobile command vehicle and its communications system to the station. Both radio systems will be run side-by-side until the upgrade is installed and the department knows all the “bugs have been worked out.”


“It gives us a redundant system in case another failure were to occur,” said Corsi. “We know this

isn’t a permanent fix, but it’s a temporary solution.”

The new radio system will be purchased through Motorola. The newer model has an advanced platform that will pick up additional frequencies. Corsi said this is important because Albany County is proposing to switch to an 80 MHz system, and now the two municipalities communications will be interoperable.

Corsi said the new radio system was ordered the day after the Town Board meeting.

Defending champs fall in Class AA quarterfinals

The Bethlehem boys soccer team knew it was in for a tough game against Big 10 champion Albany in Saturday’s Section II Class AA quarterfinal game.

What the Eagles didn’t expect was to come out on the losing end.

Emmanuel Ishimwe’s goal with less than 15 minutes left in the second half gave Albany a 1-0 victory over Bethlehem in Delmar and its second consecutive Sectional semifinal berth.

“We believe in our talent,” said Albany coach Dave Weiss. “Unfortunately some people don’t believe in our talent, but we do.”

“Just a bounce, that’s all it was,” said Bethlehem coach Phil Ridgway. “We had possession throughout the game, and they played great defense.”

Bethlehem (13-5-0) had a golden scoring chance early in the second half go for naught. Matt Henning got ahead of the Albany defense and had a one-on-one with Albany goaltender Lucas Phayre-Gonzales, but he sailed his shot high over the crossbar.

Neither side seriously

threatened to score again until Erick Kwizera sent a crossing pass into the Bethlehem penalty box. Ishimwe collected the ball and shot it past Eagles’ goaltender Liam Dole to give Albany a one-goal lead.

“What can I say? He’s a goal scorer, and he’s a freshman,” Weiss said of Ishimwe. “If anyone is going to sneak in and score a goal like that, it’s him.”

Bethlehem applied heavy pressure on Albany’s defense and generated a pair of dangerous corner kicks in the final 14 minutes. Henning had one that hit the crossbar and went out of bounds, and he had another that Austin Lang couldn’t catch up to in time.

After the final whistle blew, Albany’s student section mobbed the Falcons at midfield while the defending Class AA Sectional champs from Bethlehem lay scattered on the field trying to absorb the sudden end to their season.

Warnken does it all

Quarterback uses his feet and his arm to beat Scotia in Class B quarterfinals

Whenever the Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk football team needed a big play, David Warnken made it. The junior quarterback rushed for 155 yards and a touchdown, threw a critical scoring pass and intercepted a Dan Zeglen toss in Ravena's 22-12 victory over Scotia-Glenville in last Friday's Section II Class B quarterfinal game.

Where art takes flights of fancy

Albany International identified as a top artistic airport by USA Today

Even the thought of going to the airport can be stressful to most people. Between the lines, security checks, lost luggage or waiting on a delayed flight, some go out of their way to avoid air travel.

For more than a decade, airports have been adding amenities aimed at destressing the traveler. Yoga rooms, meditation

areas, therapy dog programs, rocking chairs, private lounges and mini spas are popping up at airports worldwide, as has contemporary art.

Boston's Logan Airport has 40 rocking chairs that are not only comfortable to sit in, but are hand-painted by local artists. Chicago O'Hare boasts a mile-long kinetic light sculpture in a connecting concourse. Travelers at Orlando International are said to often do a double take when they see a life-like sculpture that portrays a vacationer at the end of his trip.

Albany International Airport is no exception. In 1998, the airport's art and culture program began working with local and regional artists to bring in works of art to display throughout the airport. The airport was recently selected by USA Today as one of 20 airports that will compete for the title of best airport art in the country.

"We are very honored to be nominated for this

The paint is dry at new artistic haven

Albany Art Room reopens at new location, owner committed to staying in city

Finding a permanent home for a local business catering to artists of all ages ended up taking much longer than watching paint dry.

Karen Schupack, of Delmar, founded the Albany Art Room in 2007 and never expected her unique business to catch the attention of artists, budding and established, as much as it did.

"I didn't know it would be as sort of popular and community based as it ended up being," Schupack said. "It became clear to me that people really counted on the place as sort of an extension of their homes almost but with different options."

The business offers a bevy of art classes

in drawing, painting, pottery, printmaking and various crafts, but its open studio feature became the "main identity," she said. Anyone can walk in and pay \$8 per hour and work on their own art or craft, with materials included.

"There aren't a lot of places like that and I think it is nice to have a place where people who don't necessarily know each other ... can be creative in the same environment," Schupack said. "So I think that is why it kind of naturally grew into a community center."

Schupack said she closed her first Madison Avenue location after the cost of renting the space turned out to be more expensive than she could sustain. For the

last two years, she kept the business going on a scaled down level at 40 Broadway near the Port of Albany.

Albany Art Room's new location at 350 New Scotland Ave. in Albany marks the return of open studio and expanded class offerings. Art supplies and local handmade crafts are also sold.

A ribbon cutting ceremony was held Thursday, Oct. 24, at the Art Room, and a grand opening party was held Saturday, Oct. 26.

The new location costs around a third less to operate than the Art Room's original location, Schupack said, and this time she owns the building. She said finding the right building was a challenge.

"I had to invest a lot of money into this building," she said, "but since I owned it I was investing money into my own property, so that made it worthwhile."

Extensive renovation were made, including tearing down the walls

of four rooms on the first floor to create an open space and ripping up the wall to wall carpeting and refinishing the wood flooring underneath. A fair amount of electric and plumbing work was also completed.

Besides finding a building to purchase for the business, Schupack said the most challenging thing was getting out the message of what exactly the Art House is.

"Early on, it was just getting people to

understand what it was about," she said. "It was a challenge to get people to understand the business model."

The idea for Schupack's business came from a desire to take art classes herself, but not wanting to drive all the way to Troy. She also wanted to allow her child to have an artistic outlet, but was "hesitant to make really big messes because it is a pain."

"I was thinking about kids and adults right

from the beginning," she said. "It was kind of a wide variety of people I was hoping to cater to, and also lots of levels of experience."

Placing her artistic venture in Albany has always been important to her, so even through the difficult search, she kept her focus on the city.

"I believe that Albany needs places like this and I want to provide that," Schupack said. "It could have been easy enough to find that place in suburbs when I was having trouble finding a building, but I was committed to saying in Albany."

contest,” said Kathy Greenwood, curatorial assistant of Albany Airport’s Art and Culture Program. “We are up against some of the biggest airports in the country, like LAX, San Francisco, Seattle and Philadelphia, so it’s pretty exciting for us.”

The nominated airports were selected by Harriet Baskas, USA Today’s airport columnist. Greenwood said Baskas has contacted the airport frequently in the past and written stories about art at the Albany Airport.

“We are one of the airports with the earliest



programs. Before that, I believe it was only Denver,” Greenwood said. “There are many airports now that have art programs of any style you can imagine.”

Greenwood said that besides the fact the art is a way to preoccupy

the minds of anxious travelers, it also gives local artists a chance to showcase their work and get exposure in a place other than a traditional art gallery. Greenwood said the mission is to exhibit work from artists that live and work in the area.

“This can be someone’s first encounter with our city and region, and to showcase the artists and the art organizations present in our region gives travelers the sense that this is a culturally rich, diverse and progressive region to be in. It’s attractive on many levels,” Greenwood said.

“Even if the traveler is in hurry, they might pause and see a sculpture on the way,” she added.

Greenwood explained that while the airport has no permanent exhibitions, the gallery

spaces and exhibition cases stay filled with the work of regional artists and loans from area museums. It is rare to see rotating galleries at airports, she said. Most keep permanent exhibits, and some cities, urban beautification efforts have created ordinances that often require a percentage of public-building construction budgets to be spent on art.

“We are very unique in that we curate the programs ourselves and do a lot with a little in terms of our overall budget compared to what other big city airports do,” Greenwood said.

The piece recognized by USA Today is called “Flying Fish” by Lillian

Mulero, which turned a 10-foot round concourse window into an aquarium.

Other installation pieces that can be found throughout the airport are Dana Filibert’s “Flight of Fancy,” a mass of cloud-like forms tucked into the corner of an entry vestibule protruding from the exterior wall. Just inside is Ben Entner’s monumental, inflatable “American Gothic,” a tongue-in-cheek reinterpretation of Grant Wood’s iconic painting.

Recently opened at the third floor art gallery is an exhibition called “Second Nature,” featuring eight artists who interpret what they describe as the evolving

human relationship with the world around us. The idea is that "nature" is a word used to describe something naturally occurring, but in today's world it is sometimes hard to distinguish what hasn't been modified by man.

"We were thinking about ecology and contemporary concerns

about the environment and the way artists address the environmental issues — not politically, but aesthetically," Greenwood said. "We selected artists that represent nature and natural phenomena in unexpected ways."

The exhibition features a variety of mediums including paintings, prints, sculptures, video and installations.

Greenwood said artist Roberley Bell creates abstract sculptures that show nature, but that also comment on how people control and create spaces within nature.

"These pieces kind of reference organic natural forms but at the same time have this sort of space-age fabricated look to them. They are shiny and smooth and don't really look like something that you would come across in the natural world," she said.

Artist Laura Moriarty alters reality using encaustic, a pigmented beeswax, to build sculptural forms that resemble fantastical

geologic treasures. Artist Jill Parisi creates very small prints that look like little sea creatures.

"She groups them together into installations where they look like little ecosystems," Greenwood said.

Greenwood added that a video viewing room was created for a work by artist, Adam Frelin. Other artists with pieces in the exhibit are Katie DeGroot, Jenny Kemp, Jason Middlebrook and Karin Stack.

"Second Nature" will run at the Albany International Airport's gallery through March 9. The gallery is located on the third floor of the Albany International Airport and shared with the observation area. Gallery hours are 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily.
