

Veteran makes his mark

Postal Service issues stamp bearing the likeness of Selkirk war hero

This Veterans Day, a local Selkirk man will be one of a dozen men featured as part of the United States Postal Service's commemorative Medal of Honor stamp.

Sgt. Francis "Frank" Currey, 88, received the Congressional Medal of Honor in 1945. Currey. along with 11 other Congressional Medal of Honor recipients, will be commemorated on the booklet's cover for the new stamp. The actual stamp will depict the medal itself.

Currey was honored locally

on Friday, Nov. 8, at the General Mail Facility on Karner Road in Colonie as part of the Capital District's Veterans Day kick-off celebration.

"As we learn what he has done for this country and we stand before this man, are we not

humbled by his heroism?" asked Albany USPS District Manager Luke Grossman.

Currey received the Congressional Medal of Honor at just 19 years old for heroism and bravery during World War II. His actions on Dec. 21, 1944 in Belgium, led to the rescue of five American soldiers who were trapped in a home under heavy enemy fire. The German soldiers were forced to withdraw from the area after suffering heavy casualties because of Currey's efforts.

'Sgt. Currey was greatly responsible for inflicting heavy losses in men and material on the enemy, for rescuing five comrades, two of whom were wounded, and for stemming an

Another bid for school building

Stram Center hopes to relocate to former BCSD administration site

Another local business is attempting to purchase the Bethlehem Central School District's property at 90 Adams Place, and this potential tenant appears likely to meet the approval of neighborhood residents.

The Stram Center of Integrative Medicine. currently at 388 Kenwood Avenue, is hoping to move to the larger location. A use variance is still needed from the town

in order for the sale to be finalized because the only allowed uses in the neighborhood are for a private home or telecommunications office. The town's Zoning Board of Appeals set a Nov. 20

"The sale is proceeding as planned, and the district is hopeful the Zoning Board review will move swiftly so we can finalize the sale of the building," said BCSD

Superintendent Tom Douglas. "Whether or not the building is sold rests in the hands of the town."

The school district had filed a lawsuit against the town in July after the Zoning Board denied a use variance to sell the property to School's Out, Inc. The local daycare provider had been looking to purchase the district's property at 90 Adams to relocate its headquarters, but the variance decision halted the sale.

However, the lawsuit has since been dropped because another potential buyer

Happiness in a box

Church participates in Operation **Christmas Child**

For some children, a year's worth of happiness can come in just one small box.

For the 15th year, Bethlehem Community Church will be collecting shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child. The project provides gifts for children in need living throughout the world's poorest nations.

More than 9 million shoeboxes were collected by Christian ministries worldwide last year, with nearly 6.6 million coming from the United States. Locally, around terrorism, poverty, disease 1,300 were donated from the Bethlehem drop-off site, with around 460 coming from the church's congregants.

goal is usually 500 boxes," said Tina Bonney, center coordinator for the project at Bethlehem Community Church. "But we are also a relay site, so everyone from the area can drop-off their boxes to us, too."

Each year, local community organizations volunteer along with church members to pack shoeboxes with donated items, count the boxes and load them onto trucks to be sent to the nearest shipping center. The boxes are sent to children in 130 different countries affected by war,

and natural disasters.

The project was adopted in 1993 by Samaritan's Purse, a nondenominational "For our church, our Christian organization founded by Franklin Graham. The organization provides international aid to those in need, while spreading the word of Christianity. The project was first started in 1990 by Dave Cooke in Wales, England.


> The shoeboxes are designed to provide a little relief to children from the worries of their everyday

> Bonney said although many of the boxes contain small toys and candy, the organization also stresses that many of the children are also in need of hygiene products, educational tools and clothing. Items such as t-shirts, pencils and notes pads, books and mini bottles of shampoo are often added to the boxes.

The organization asks that no chocolate, food items, breakable items or war-related items like toy guns be sent.

Once it is brought to a drop-off site, the box is labeled as appropriate for a specific gender and age range. The boxes are then sent to one of seven warehouses to be sorted, inspected and taped for shipping.

the project in Bethlehem with her teenage daughter, Juila - said those who donated boxes can include the funds to ship the box if they wish. The church also does fundraisers throughout the year in order to ship the boxes. The money should be placed in an envelope and attached to the top of each

"These boxes could be one of the few gifts these children receive throughout their lives,' said Bonney. "We put these boxes together out of love."

Some who donate boxes Each box costs \$7 to ship also include a letter to the who also coordinates a more lasting connection. They are encouraged to include their contact information and a picture of themselves in the box, in case the children wish to thank the donors. The boxes can also be registered online so senders can electronically follow the shipment of their packages.

Since the project's mission is also about spreading the gospel, a small pamphlet is included in each box to help the children learn about God and the story of Jesus Christ.

In the past, members of Bethlehem Community Church have been given the opportunity to travel as a part of Operation

Christmas Child to distribute the boxes. Terry Pilon was able to travel to Uganda last May and meet with children as they opened their gifts.

"Those who have gone said it was a life-changing experience," said Bonney.

Bethlehem Community Church is seeking both volunteers and donations this year. Those wishing to donate boxes can do so at the church's Elm Avenue location. Operating hours will be Monday, Nov. 18, through Friday, Nov. 22, from 6 to 8 p.m.; Saturday, Nov. 23, and Sunday Nov. 24, from noon to 2 p.m.; and Monday, Nov. 25, from 10 a.m. to noon.

Leashing in school safety

District plans to bring in K9 for locker searches; prior school shooting almost attempted

Guilderland school officials are implementing several measures to address safety issues, but the one attracting the most attention involves man's best friend.

The Guilderland Board of Education met with the town's police department in September to explore the possibility of introducing K9 search dog "Rocky" into its school buildings for potential drug and weapon sweeps, said district Superintendent Marie Wiles.

"In the context of that conversation, we realized our school district — in concert with the Guilderland Police Department — does a tremendous amount of work together on the topic of school safety," Wiles said.

The Board of Education heard a program report on school safety from high school Assistant Principal Lisa Patierne and district Resource Officer Nick Ingle on Wednesday, Nov. 6.

The presentation focused on the district's partnership with the police department, why the district needs to be more sensitive towards safety issues and the strategies implemented, along with what safety initiatives are being planned. "We can't inspire, we can't cover the common core, we can't do all those things we need to do as a school if first we don't keep our students, our staff and our faculty safe and secure."

Wiles said the issue of school safety is "at the center" of the district's goals, with it appearing in the first sentence of the district's vision statement.

"It is so important to put this in the context of all the work that we do in our school district and this might be a night where we talk about school safety, but it is in the context of our overall mission," Wiles said. "We can't inspire, we can't cover the common core, we can't do all those things we need to do as a school if first we don't keep our students, our staff and our faculty safe and secure."

Part of the district's approach to increasing the police presence in the schools involves bringing in "Rocky" to search for drugs and weapons.

Patierne said when a dog search is undertaken, all students and staff would be locked down in classrooms, and only a designated area of the building would be searched. Lockers would not be opened unless "Rocky" detects something and district administrators choose to open that locker.

The searches would be at a "random times" throughout the school year, Patierne said, and

"certainly would not be every day."

Patierne started her presentation sharing a statement from the National Center for Analysis of Violent Crime, which said, "Forms of school violence are not just a school problem or law enforcement problem. They involve schools, families and the communities."

Patierne said the district has partnerships with many community organizations tackling several different issues such as bullying prevention, individual wellness and mental health, community enhancement and helping high school seniors transition to secondary education

School shootings increasing

Patierne said between 1992 and 2004, the victimization rates for students 12 to 18 years old declined, but "targeted school shootings" have been increasing.

In the 1970s there were four incidents of targeted school shootings, with the number only jumping to five the following decade, Patierne said. In the 1990s, there were 28 targeted school shootings. In 2000, there was 13 shootings, which

increased to 15 in 2007, 18 in 2008 and 37 in 2009 — a high for that decade.

"That is very concerning," Patierne said. "As you can imagine, fear has a direct impact on higher brain functioning needed to learn, and school shootings have a profound impact on the county and community."

Ingle said in 2001, a senior at Guilderland High School had planned to commit a school shooting, which he said most people were probably unaware of. Andrew Hernandez, who murdered his mother, wrote a plan for the attack which involved bringing guns into school wrapped in an American flag

"He had names of students that he was going to kill and use as hostages, human shields," Ingle said. "He was going to then walk to the resource officer's office and kill the officer because he knew he had a gun. Then, he was going to take an elevated position on the roof and shoot first responders as they came in."

Ingle said on the night before Hernandez's planned attack, he decided to "test" himself and shot his mother. Hernandez then went to Crossgates Mall to see a movie, Ingle said. Later that night, Hernandez turned himself into police.

"This school was hours away from having it happen," Ingle said.

Wiles said the presentation was aimed to provide the board, school staff and community members with a broader picture of measures undertaken by the district.

We only hope that come January, those in power keep in mind the ideas and questions brought forward by their opponents during the campaigns. After all, those ideas did resonate with a fair number of voters in all of our coverage areas.

For example, there were a number of ideas tossed around during the Bethlehem candidate's forum on Oct. 22 regarding the Vista Technology Campus off Route 85. Supervisor John Clarkson has indicated he intends to continue pursuing high-tech tenants for the space, and some of his opponent Fred DiMaggio's solutions about aggressively reaching out to those companies could prove useful in that goal.

While his attacks on what he called a lack transparency and fiscal responsibility in Supervisor Paula Mahan's administration did not resonate with most voters, Colonie Republican supervisor candidate and small business owner Todd Drake's background did make him qualified to speak about encouraging economic development in town.

And finally, although Guilderland supervisor candidate Mark Grimm never had the opportunity to engage incumbent Ken Runion in a debate, some of Grimm's ideas - as seen on his campaign's website - have merit. Those include raising the town's online profile with a more interactive Facebook page and an opt-in alert system to keep citizens informed in times of

We know that in every election, there are winners and there are losers, but even in the wake of the overwhelming results in all three towns, there are some ideas from the other party worth taking note of.

A Civil War soldier's story

By Bill Howard

The author is a historian and author who graduated from Bethlehem Central High School in 1979. A lifelong student of history, he has authored several books and published many articles on historical topics. His latest book, "The Civil War Memoir of William T. Levey," is available from the Northshire Press.

A rare document that recalls the military service of a Civil War soldier from the town of Bethlehem was recently discovered for sale on an online auction website.

The document, an officer's commission dated June 1, 1864, appointed Bethlehem resident Leonard Lasher to serve as a Second Lieutenant in the 43rd New York Volunteer Infantry. The document was signed by New York Governor Horatio Seymour and was purchased by a private collector.

Leonard Lasher was born in 1845, and his parents were Anthony and Anna (Litchfield) Lasher. When the 43rd New York was recruiting volunteers in the summer of 1862, Lasher enrolled to serve three years. Although the military records list his age as 21, he was actually only 17 when he enlisted.

He had an interesting, if convoluted, career with the famed 43rd New York, a regiment known as "The Albany Rifles." Lasher was initially made a Sergeant

in Company H of the Regiment shortly following his enlistment in the fall of 1862, but was later returned to the ranks and made a Corporal. He was not promoted back to non-commissioned rank until early in 1864, but then lost the Sergeant's promotion again when his company of the regiment the 43rd was consolidated with another unit.

On June 1, 1864, Governor Seymour signed his commission as Second Lieutenant, but Lasher never served in that rank. He was put on the rolls of another regiment, the 59th New York Infantry, in December 1864, but never joined the unit. This may have been a bureaucratic courtesy to allow for the award of his commission.

The 43rd New York served in the Union Army of the Potomac and was composed primarily of

Corporal Lasher was wounded during the Second Battle of Fredericksburg in May 1863, but the Albany newspapers reported that his wounds were slight; one paper reported him as wounded in the "arm, not seriously," and


another reported wounds to the "head and arm." Most of these newspaper accounts were based on letters that were sent home by officers and men serving with the Regiment in the field, and the

excepting Corporal Lasher.' Burhans would later be killed in action at Spotsylvania, Virginia on May 10, 1864.

After the Union army's hard fought campaigns in the summer of 1864, Lasher was finally promoted to Sergeant in

November. He had been given an officer's commission to the rank of Second Lieutenant in June 1864, but was never formally mustered into the position. In a statement provided to the Bethlehem town

was awarded a widow's pension. The couple is buried in the Elmwood Cemetery in Selkirk in a lot that features an impressive stone obelisk. His gravestone notes his service with the 43rd New York Infantry.

A place for peace or play?

Opponents of proposed sports complex say it would destroy serenity of the adjacent cemetery

A local developer is hoping to build a sports complex next to Memory Gardens, a memorial park on Watervliet-Shaker Road, but opponents say such a move would destroy the serenity of the place.

Much of the outcry from the public and Memory Gardens' board of directors stems from concerns that cheering crowd noise could interrupt a funeral service or a solemn moment as someone is paying respects to a loved one.

Afrim Nezaj, the owner of Afrim Sports, Inc. who is seeking a variance from the Colonie zoning board to allow him to build the multi-use sports complex says those concerns are misplaced.

Nezaj compared the worries of the board of directors to those of a child who thinks there is a monster under the bed.

"All the things they think are in the closet or under the bed aren't really there," Nezaj said, adding that he thinks Memory Gardens is beautiful place, and he would most likely be buried there. "I respect what they do; they should respect what I do."

Opposed to Nezaj's plans for a sports complex is Latham resident Zelda Golden, 83, who purchased four plots at Memory Gardens in 1950. Her husband is buried in one of them.

"I think it would be too boisterous next to a place of dignity and respect. I could see myself at a funeral service and hear cheers go up; it just makes me go cold," said Golden.

Cheryl Rebhan, who is vice president of the Memory Gardens board of directors said she believes noise from an adjacent sports complex would destroy the peacefulness of the memorial park.

"People go there to read, eat lunch by the pond. It's very serene and quiet. To take all that serenity from people, it's hard to fathom that," Rebhan said. "There is a man who comes in and will sit next to his wife's grave all day and read the newspaper or a book. I can't imagine how he would feel if there was cheering in the background."

Memory Gardens sits on 200 acres on a ridge that is one of the highest points in the town of Colonie and is the final resting place

of approximately 36,000 people. There is room for at least another 140,000 burial sites. There are fountains, ponds and well-manicured landscaping throughout the grounds.

Afrim Sports is applying for a land use variance permit so it can build four soccer fields and an 86,865-square-foot dome. Currently, the land on 969 Watervliet Shaker Road is zoned for commercial and office buildings. The variance permit is required because a law passed in the Town of Colonie in 2007 would classify the new complex as a major amusement area. The zoning board will be taking a look at the variance request at its Thursday, Nov. 21

Nezaj said he believes the land next to the memorial park would be ideal for a number of reasons.

"When I went there, I saw flat land and a cemetery next door. It has the least amount of people it would affect," said Nezaj.

There is a ridge lined with trees that borders the property line and separates where the field would be and the burial sites, but at their closest point, the field is less than 100 feet away from a gravestone.

Rebhan said she is not against the sports park, just the proposed location.

"It's just the noise," she said. "I'm all for sports; kids need a place to play. I just don't think this is the right place."

Andrew Carroll, director of the cemetery, echoed Rebhan's concerns.

"We usually have anywhere from 10 to 20 burials a week, with Saturday being the busiest day." Carroll said. "It's not that we don't like soccer or kids playing sports; we just think it's too close."

Nezaj said the proposed location is important for the sports complex because the Colonie soccer teams need to be where other teams can easily get to the field. He said that in order to play the teams that they need to play, they need a big facility that will draw in teams from other areas. He said he wants teams to come here instead of going to places like Maryland or Connecticut.

"For any facility to be successful it needs to be someplace easily accessible. I know I could go someplace cheaper or different, but people won't go," Nezaj said. "These four fields could be the pride of the Capital Region."

In an attempt to ease citizens' concerns about noise, Nezaj hired Chazen Companies to test the sound levels at various

spots at the Rotterdam soccer facility while five youth games were being played. Those recordings found the decibel levels were all below the normal level of conversation, which is 60.0 to 65 decibels.

There is no proposed announcing system nor are there any bleachers planned that would add people and noise, said Nezaj who will be presenting his findings at the Nov. 21 Zoning Board meeting. He said he encourages Memory Gardens to hire its own contractor to run a test if they don't agree with his findings.

While opponents of the field cite noise as one of their biggest concerns, the visual impact of the dome and the 75-foot-tall

lights has also been part of the discussion. Memory Gardens staff are also worried people would drive into the cemetery to park and walk to the fields, which would be closer to the fields than the proposed complex's parking lot.

Nezaj said those are non issues.

"If we have lights, it won't bother them because they'll only be on at night," he said. He also said there are ample parking spots planned, and he doesn't think seeing the fields will be an issue because of the ridge and the trees that separate the field and the cemetery.

Meanwhile, Memory Gardens has a created a petition on Change.org which has currently been signed by 1,354 people. They have also sent out letters and asked people to write to newspapers and voice their opposition.

Despite the organized opposition to the sports complex, Nezaj said he has been getting a lot of positive feedback to his plans.

"A lot of people are coming up to me who say, 'I've got people buried there, and I support it," said Nezaj.

There will be a zoning board meeting held at the Public Operations Center on Thursday, Nov. 21, at 7 p.m., at which time the public can comment on the proposed sports complex.

Bethlehem Dems sweep election

Clarkson beats DiMaggio 5,684 to 4,064

With the Democrats sweeping Tuesday night's general election, only one Republican continues to hold an elected office in the Town of Bethlehem.

Supervisor John Clarkson beat Republican candidate Fred DiMaggio 5,684 to 4,064. Clarkson said the election's results signify a unified Democratic party in Bethlehem. Democratic candidates won all races including town board, highway superintendent and town clerk. The lone Republican in elected town office is receiver of taxes Nancy Mendick, who was not up for re-election Tuesday.

When I first decided to run, we weren't a healthy party," said Clarkson on Tuesday night. "We had left the voters. We have now reconnected with the voters."

In 2011, Clarkson chose to run for Supervisor against Town Board member Kyle Kotary after Sam Messina made it known he would not be seeking re-election. Messina's decision left Kotary the sole candidate, who was endorsed by the town's Democratic, Republican and Independence parties.

The following year, Clarkson played a key role in helping develop the town's Reform Democrat movement, which continued the perceived split in the party after some longtime committee members were replaced.

"I think the majority of voters realize that we're now trying to move the town in a positive direction," said Democratic Chairman and Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn. "I think this demonstrates how unified the party is now. The new members of the committee rallied around the nominees and delivered a resounding endorsement."

On Election night, many of the candidates also thanked Messina for his advice and leadership during the past several election cycles.

DiMaggio said the reason he

opted to run for office is because he did not feel comfortable with a one-party majority in the town's elected offices.

"I don't think one-party rule is a good thing," he said. "It wasn't good for the last 150 years with the Republicans, and it's certainly not good for the past 10 years with the Democrats."

Kuhn argued the main function of a political party is to get their candidates elected to office.

DiMaggio led a multi-party coalition called "Bethlehem United" that was endorsed by the town's Republican Committee. DiMaggio said the coalition came together in the spring after it was announced a referendum would take place to decide if the town should abolish the elected position of highway superintendent and place those responsibilities under the commissioner of public works. The referendum failed 3,086 to 1,969

The GOP endorsed candidates for Town Board were Linda Jasinski, a Conservative, and Dan Cunningham, a member of the Independence Party. The group's main goals consisted of cutting taxes, lowering the town's fund balance to provide tax relief and promoting economic development.

"When you talk about tax cuts, it doesn't affect everybody the same," said Cunningham. "So maybe the issues that we focused on were not as important to the people as we thought they should be."

Julie Sasso and Councilman Bill Reinhardt were endorsed by the Democrats, and won with about 28 percent of the vote each.

Reinhardt said he was happy the Democratic Party remained positive throughout the campaign and Clarkson agreed.

"We don't need to rely on false alliances. We don't need to create fictions. We are the majority party. We are the responsible party," said Clarkson to committee members during his victory speech. "The intelligent electorate we have in Bethlehem, they do not take easy answers, they do not take kindly to negative politics, and they certainly don't want to see low-

grade attack literature arriving in the mailboxes."

DiMaggio said he felt the Democrats did their fair share of "mudslinging" as well, and did not feel all the blame should be placed on him.


"I don't think there were major mistakes made in the campaign," he said. "I think there were equally nasty and vindictive responses from the other side."

Kuhn later responded that the Democratic Party did not send out "one negative mailer, email, or website link that had personal or misleading facts."

"I don't think there is any basis for that comment," said the Democratic chairman.

Looking to the future, DiMaggio said he would continue to be involved in the town's Republican committee but did not think he would go back to being the party's chairman because he felt it was time for a new voice.

Clarkson said now that the Democrats had won, their responsibility is to leave the town a better place for future generations.

Guilderland Republican bids fall short

Democrats sweep town races. Runion reelected to eighth term as supervisor

Guilderland Republicans presented a full slate of candidates for the first time in a decade but failed to pick up any seats against Democrat incumbents and newcomers.

Town Supervisor Ken Runion defeated Republican challenger Mark Grimm and secured his eighth two-year term. Runion received 4,855 votes, or 53 percent, with Grimm garnering 46 percent of votes and trailing by around 580 votes, according to unofficial election results.

"I have a good record, and as we were going door to door everyone seemed to be very happy with the town, they were very happy with the services we provide, and how the town had been managed over the last 14 years," Runion said.

Grimm's bid marked his return to politics after not seeking a second four-year term on the Town Board. Grimm had often clashed with Democratic board members and Runion.

Grimm said he knocked on letters were responsive." 9,200 doors and received "a ton of support," but he was not sure why he fell short on Election Day.

"I really don't have an explanation for it," Grimm said. "We are going to have to study the numbers and see what happened."

Grimm did point to voter turnout as a possible reason for falling short.

"I think there is a difference between how people feel and how many people vote," Grimm said. "There is an issue with turnout tonight ... maybe it was a series of last-minute negative attacks that in many cases I wasn't even aware that may have depressed the vote for me and for my team."

Runion said town Democrats sent out last-minute "responses" to residents on Republican campaign literature that arrived at some homes the weekend before Election Day

"I believe they felt there would be no response," Runion said. "It contained misinformation about me and about the town, but we obtained those letters on Saturday and framed responses to two of the three letters.... Our letters were not negative; our

Runion said he believe those Republican mailers backfired and emboldened voters, who otherwise would have not came to the polls.

More voters did turn out on Election Day this year than when Runion faced a challenger in 2009. Runion ran uncontested in 2011 after Grimm, who was then a Town Board member, withdrew

If everyone in town had voted. Grimm believed he would have

"Too many people stayed home," he said.

Runion said he believed the race was going to be close from the beginning, because of the town Republican's campaign

"It's probably the nastiest, most negative campaign I have ever seen ... it was terrible," Runion said. "We talked about the things we have done over the last several years."

Runion did not express concerns that he won by a tighter margin than in his last election challenge.

"In the end it isn't the margin of victory, it is the victory," Runion.

Democrats nab every seat

Town Board incumbent Patricia Slavick secured 4,833 votes (26.9 percent) and fellow Democrat Paul Pastore garnered 4,646 votes (25.8 percent). Republican Lee Carman, who is an Albany County legislator, captured 24.6 percent of votes and held 227 fewer votes than Pastore. Republican Mark Livingston's first bid for office yielded 4,073 votes, falling around 22.7 percent.

Democrat Jean Cataldo was elected town clerk and had 5,800 votes (64 percent), with Republican Jason Wright receiving 3,231 votes (36 percent). Democrat Lynne Buchanan was elected receiver of taxes and had 5,262 votes (58 percent), with Republican Bryan Best receiving 3,737 votes (42 percent).

Democrat Denise Randall was reelected Town Justice with 31 percent of votes and fellow Democrat Richard Sherwood was elected to the newly created Town Justice seat with 30 percent of votes. Republican candidates fell short, with Christopher Aldrich holding 20 percent and Stephen DeNigris at 19 percent.

DeNigris, a registered Democrat, said he plans to become a registered Republican.

"Tomorrow I change parties," he said. "As I got into this race even more I started seeing that the people that I thought were protecting our interests really weren't protecting our interests. Now I've got to the point where I couldn't even look at them anymore."

Town Republican Committee Chairman Matthew Nelligan said the party had "great candidates" and he was not disappointed in the campaigns.

"The effort we put forward is making a difference; it is showing residents that the Republican Party is alive," Nelligan said. "Our message is not going to die down. We are going to continue to raise the issues publicly and challenge the other side whenever there is problem. ... I do promise you we will be back."

Grimm echoed Nelligan's remarks and said the party is stronger.

"We did make progress. We had a competitive race ... and we gave people a choice," Grimm said. "We haven't convinced them yet that we are the right alternative. ... There are going to better nights ahead for us and I hope to be a part of that."





Food banks throughout the country could be in need of additional donations this holiday season because of a recent decrease to all Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program benefits.

With Thanksgiving weeks away, cuts to SNAP have come at an inopportune time. As of Nov. 1, all recipients of SNAP benefits will see an average decrease of \$11 per person, per month. It is now expected a greater number of people will need to supplement the loss through the use of food banks.

"We are definitely expecting an increase in usage," said Natasha Pernicka, director of The Food Pantries of the Capital Region, a coalition of 53 food pantries from across the region. "Many pantries are already reporting a record number of families seeking assistance."

Pernicka said the cuts could be catastrophic for some families. The benefits are supposed to be used as a supplement to the recipients' income, but oftentimes, tough decisions have to be made between paying essential bills and food. These decisions often leave people with less food to eat than desired.

The decrease to SNAP benefits come as the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009

expires. The act was passed during the recession to help those in need during the economic downturn. Many SNAP recipients saw an increase of 13.6 percent in their allotment.

Ann Malak, a managing attorney at the Legal Aid Society of Northeastern New York, said unfortunately the economy hasn't returned to the same level.

Paralegals at Legal Aid help clients to navigate the food stamp application process. Malak said they too are waiting to see what the outcome of the expiration of ARRA will be. Some may opt to not bother signing up for the benefits because taking the time to do the paper work may be perceived as too troublesome for the amount they receive in aid.

Along with the average person seeing a cut of \$11 per month, the minimum payment was reduced from \$16 to \$15 per month. Malak said her organization is now working with recipients to better educate them about budgeting their benefits, as a family of four would see a reduction of \$44.

"It's possible it hasn't hit some people yet that they have less money until they get to the end of the month and it's gone already," said Malak.

Mark Quandt, director of the Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York, said it's hard to know what the fallout will be, but past experience has been whenever programs are cut or the economy takes

local pantries tends to increase.

"I would assume that it will have a negative impact on peoples lives," said Quandt.

Pernicka said the Food Pantries of the Capital District have seen a 52 percent increase of use since 2008. She said about 65,000 people in the greater Capital District struggle with food insecurity on a regular basis. Friday, Nov. 8, to become executive director of Community Caregivers, which is a not-for-profit offering home-based, non-clinical services for Albany County residents.

"We are confident that Erika Gauthier has the capability to lead the chamber through the transition," Chamber Board of Trustees President Jenni Bliven said in a statement.

Gauthier has worked at the Guilderland Chamber for four years and started her career at the Montgomery County Chamber of Commerce focusing on tourism. After a year at the Montgomery Chamber, she worked in marketing at corporate and small businesses. She also has worked with the Bethlehem Chamber of Commerce on membership issues.

Gauthier said since she already knows chamber members, the transition should be an easy one.

"I am excited for this opportunity to get to lead the chamber during this time," Gauthier said in a statement.

Gauthier's new position will see her getting out of the office more, she said, as she steps up to become the "face" of the chamber.

Not only is the chamber transitioning to a new leader, but health insurance reforms through the Affordable Care Act are affecting all chambers over the next year, according to "The challenge of the chamber ... is really going to be to show our members, businesses and our community that we are more than just health insurance. The Guilderland Chamber has about 500 members, and many take advantage of health insurance plans offered through the chamber. Members that are sole business owners will have to go through the state health insurance exchange under the new regulations.

"The challenge of the chamber ... is really going to be to show our members, businesses and our community that we are more than just health insurance," Gauthier said. "We are still here as a community organization, and I think that is going to be the challenge in the near future."

Gauthier said the chamber, along with others, has offered high-deductible health insurance plans, but the ACA mandates 10 points of coverage for every plan. Many of the high-deductible plans did not offer all needed points.

Gauthier said she talked to a member on Friday, Nov. 8, that's seeing their plan increase from \$330 a month to around \$900.

"We can still help them enroll in the exchanges, and there is a

couple different ways they can still go through a carrier, but they will not be eligible to get a tax break," she said.

There are many services and opportunities the chamber offers that Gauthier does not think people are aware of, such as community events, networking events, seminars, and low-cost advertising through its website and email blasts.

She said the larger events like Souped Up on Guilderland are growing in size every year, while smaller events like mixers have been remaining flat. The chamber is going to be looking at what events members would like to see more of and how to best network with fellow business owners.

"I think in the last few years with the recession ... people are really kind of taking a step back and prioritizing what is really important," she said.

The Chamber's Board of Trustees will be forming a Planning Committee to develop a strategic plan for the organization's future as it searches for a new president.

has been found.

If the sale goes forward, the district would be selling the property for \$50,000 less than what was asked for from School's Out. The district previously said it had trouble selling the property because of its location and because renovation costs and soft costs were deemed to be "economically infeasible" by other potential buyers.

To obtain a use variance, the district had to prove a lack of return on investment, that the hardship to the property was unique, that the use variance would not alter the character of the neighborhood and the alleged hardship was not self created.

In the case of School's Out, most board members had agreed the hardship was unique and the school district did not create the problem, but said the sale would change the neighborhood's character, mostly due to traffic. Neighbors argued buses and parents dropping off students at School's Out would lead to an unsafe environment. They also said quality of life would diminish for residents, and the move would destroy the unique character of the old Delmar neighborhood.


The district's lawsuit challenged the Zoning Board's determination that the building's purchase by School's Out would change the character of the neighborhood. The district also claimed the Zoning Board failed to consider the property's size and how the district first received the building from the library in 1931, before existing zoning regulations were adopted.

In the application submitted to the town at the Nov. 6 Zoning Board meeting, The Stram Center indicated about 4,500 square feet of the building would be used to treat patients, while 2,303 square feet would be turned into offices. They also said the available 20 parking spaces would be adequate because the medical office currently shares a parking lot of 24 with popular businesses like Perfect Blend, I Love Books and I Love NY Pizza.

The Stram Center is also only open from 8:30 to 5:30 p.m., with two days open until 7 p.m. for acupuncture, as opposed to the early mornings and later afternoon of School's Out. In addition, most sessions last 30 to 45 minutes with typically just a patient and family member in attendance at appointments.

Stephen Malinowski, who has acted as a spokesperson for the group of Delmar neighbors living near the property, previously had stated residents felt a medical office would be suitable in the location. His wife, Lyn Malinowski, said in a phone interview that she believed most living in the area approved the sale of 90 Adams to The Stram Center.

The public hearing has been set for Wednesday, Nov. 20 at 7:10 p.m.

"I like to think about it as my specialty," said O'Brien.

"We've been just riding the restart wave as far as we can," said Guilderland coach Mike Kinnally.

O'Brien was closer to the midfield stripe than he was to the penalty box when he launched the free kick into the penalty box. But, he could see where he wanted to place it.

"I saw them (the Baldwinsville defenders) on the back post, so I knew if they could get past their defenders and they could lay it across for one of our guys down the middle, it would work," said O'Brien.

Connolly saw the ball arcing towards him, so he got to it and knocked it past Baldwinsville goaltender Nicholas Lindovski for the game winner.

"I just knew I had to hit it," said Connolly. "Great ball by O'Brien."

O'Brien was a big part of most of Guilderland's quality scoring chances. Whether from the corner or from the middle of the field, O'Brien's kicks consistently landed in places where his teammates could generate shots on goal.

"They had maybe one poor service all day," said Baldwinsville coach Tim Scheemaker. "They were just so good on services all day."

O'Brien's first service led to Guilderland's first goal. O'Brien sent a corner kick into the penalty box, and Chris Czekay sent it on to Connor Rubin, who knocked it past Lindovski for a 1-0 first-half lead.

Scheemaker said he was surprised by the way his team reacted to the play as it unfolded, especially since Baldwinsville had been on a six-game shutout streak entering Saturday's regional.

"There was no reason for that goal to be scored," said Scheemaker. "We just stood around and watched it happen."

Baldwinsville didn't pull even until the 64th minute, and it too was off a corner kick. The ball came out to Braden Miles, who launched a long shot that bounced off Guilderland goaltender Kedrick Weeden's hands. Connor Ross was there to knock the rebound in to tie the score at 1-1.

"We don't go to the net well, but he's one of the few that does go to goal," Scheemaker said of Ross.

Guilderland slowly took control of the game after Ross' goal, and it resulted in Connolly's tally with 10:57 left in the first 15-minute overtime period.

2 teaspoons vanilla

Give thanks to area farmers, businesses by **buying local ingredients**

A bounty of area businesses and markets make shopping local for all the ingredients of a customary Thanksgiving dinner a relatively easy task.

The turkey is the star of the show on Thanksgiving, and the Delmar Farmers Market, now held indoors at Bethlehem Middle School, is a good place to find one. Frantzen's Scenic Acres Farm, a family-operated farm located in Knox, takes preorders for its heritage turkeys at the farmers market. Heritage turkeys are allowed to breed naturally, opposed to commercially bred turkeys.

Frantzen's breeds their turkeys on its farm, along with incubating the eggs on site. The turkeys are raised on grass, and their diet is supplemented with natural, locally grown grains.

"Most store-bought meats and poultry have been bred for the convenience of the breeders and the convenience of the stores ... and not for the well-

being of the animal and not for the quality of the product," Paul Tick, manager of the Delmar Farmers Market, said. "The heritage breed is something that has been allowed to breed naturally and of course without artificial hormones added to it and artificial feed. It makes for a much tastier and much healthier animal, and we think that is a better product for the consumer."

Falvo's Meat Market owner Joseph Robilotto said hundreds of people come to his store every year looking for a

A Southern spin on Turkey Day

Acorn Bites Mini no-bake pumpkin cheesecake bites

By JODIE FITZ

Mini fillo shells

Melting chocolate (or morsels)

Chopped pecans

4 ounces whipped cream cheese

2 tablespoons milk

1 tablespoon confectioner's sugar

7.5 ounces 100 percent pumpkin

¼ cup light brown sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

3/4 teaspoon cinnamon

½ teaspoon allspice

4 ounces whipped cream

Place the chopped pecans in a bowl or plate. Melt 1/4 cup of the melting chocolates at a time in a glass bowl in the microwave by following the directions on the package. Dip the top edge of the mini fillo cup into the melted chocolate and then immediately in to the chopped pecans. Continue this process until they are all rimmed with chocolate and pecans. Let them set on a flat surface until they chocolate has fully set. Note: This can be done the day before you plan to serve the Acorn Bites.

Mix the whipped cream cheese, milk and confectioner's sugar together. Then add in the pumpkin, brown sugar, vanilla, cinnamon and allspice. Mix all of the ingredients together.

Fold in the whipped cream. Note: You can make the filling ahead of time and let it set in the refrigerator, but don't fill the mini fillo cups until you are ready to serve.

Place the pumpkin mixture into a Ziploc lunch-sized bag and seal it. Clip a corner with a pair of kitchen shears and pipe the filling into each cup just before serving. The filling will fill approximately 30 mini fillo shells.



Growing up right here in Watervliet, Thanksgiving was the holiday I looked forward to the most. I guess I was a "foodie" even then. The event started early in the morning with Mom stuffing the bird and making all the sides.

I moved South after college and married into a Southern family. The traditions were quite different from my Upstate NY upbringing. That's when I learned to how to make Southern recipes — chicken and dumplings (recipe below), corn casserole, biscuits and gravy, and green beans (cooked to death with ham hocks) and country ham with red eye gravy.

So today, my Thanksgiving meal is pretty much the same as my mother's. It is nice, however, to switch it up every once and a while and surprise folks with some Southern downhome goodness.

Southern Style Chicken and Dumplings

3 stalks of celery, diced

1 large onion, diced

4-5 large carrots, diced

Put all ingredients in a large pan and cover with water. Let simmer until the chicken is completely done (almost falling off the bones). Remove the chicken from the stock. Let cool, then remove the chicken from the bones and discard the skin.

Make the dumplings

3 cups of all-purpose unbleached white flour

1 tablespoon salt Pepper to taste

1-1/2 cups water

Place flour, salt and pepper in a large bowl. Add water and stir

4-5 bone-in, skin-on chicken together with a fork to form a soft dough. Turn out onto a floured surface and knead the dough until incorporated, soft and elastic. Roll out on a well floured surface until thin. Dust with additional four and use a sharp knife or a pizza cutter and cut the dough into rectangular noodle size pieces. Dust with additional flour.

> Bring the chicken stock back to a rolling boil and drop the dumplings in one by one. The stock will then thicken to a more gravy-like texture. All the cut up chicken to the pot and continue to cook for 15 minutes. Add a handful of chopped, fresh parsley.

turkey from Jaindl Farms, a family-owned farm in Pennsylvania.

"They don't even ask the price; they just order the turkey, and they know what they want," Robilotto said. "This is a good turkey, and it does show that they are satisfied with them since they keep asking for it."

The National Turkey Federation has selected Jaindl Farms' turkeys as the "grand champion" for more than 40 years, which designates what turkey is served at the White House on Thanksgiving.

Preordering a turkey from Falvo's is recommended to ensure the size of turkey desired. Around 90 percent of the sales come from preorders, Robilotto said. The store is located directly off Route 85 on Route 85A in Slingerlands.

The turkeys come in "at the last moment," Robilotto said, so it is "really fresh" and will not need to be defrosted.

Falvo's has also been selling their own sausage stuffing for more than a decade.

"It is an old fashioned sausage dressing just like my mom used to make," Robilotto said. "We use good, fresh seasonings and the meat is not loaded with fat, so it is not going to be greasy."

Thanksgiving Traditions

Camp Chingachgook **Thanksgiving Bread Pudding**

5 Slices of bread cubed (I use whole wheat but almost anything will do)

1 16-ounce can of crushed pineapple with juice

1 stick of butter melted (but I cut it back to three-quarters of a stick and it's still fine)

3 eggs slightly beaten

1 cup of sugar

Couple dashes of cinnamon

Mix all the ingredients in a bowl with the bread last, then lay it out in a casserole.

Bake at 350 for 45 to an hour, should crust on top.

Camp Chingachgook bread pudding became a tradition in our family about 10 years ago when we had an odd Thanksgiving where we didn't have plans with either my husband's family or mine. Instead we spent the day at Chingachgook (or first experience with the camp) and my family of four was seated at a table for 10 with another family. The beauty of it is that it tastes so good, but it's so easy to make.

"We have probably another dozen students who do lights, sounds and backstage that are part of the crew from both the middle school and the high school," Suriano said.

Lights and sounds is not the only place high school students can be found.

Tenth-grader, Stefanie DeFronzo, who has performed in a number of school shows and community theater since elementary school, and two other Voorheesville High School students, Jaynie Parmenter and Noah Robinson, decided to take their theatrical skills off stage as student directors for this year's middle school production.

"It's very rewarding getting to share with the kids what the people in community theater have taught me," Stefanie said.

Suriano said the three students are not considered assistants, but work alongside him, the musical director and choreographer.

"They have been involved in every aspect, including the audition process," Suriano said. "They have as much input in the casting of the show as did me, Brian as musical director, and Kelly as choreographer. We are six equal voices ... that is how much I value their judgment."

DeFronzo, Parmenter and Robinson work with students individually and in groups on dialogue scenes, songs, dances and movement. They also help the choreographer and music director.

"I trust them to help a student bring out the personality needed for a character," Suriano said. "They are phenomenal. They have vision for directing. They are self motivated."

Suriano said the whole group works very well together.

"This is probably the best overall group we have worked with as far as interest, excitement, behavior and enthusiasm," he said. "Every year is talented, but the overall group has been an absolute delight for not only myself but everyone with the production."

Suriano adds that the talent brought to the show by the lead roles this year is outstanding.

"Ariel has an incredibly beautiful voice; Sebastian, Flounder and Scuttle's personalities are outstanding ... they are all characters in their own right when not characters; and Ursula oozes evil ... she does evil like nobody else and has an incredible voice as well," Suriano said.

Eighth-grader, Cassidy Danz, who plays the part of Scuttle, said she didn't originally audition to be the boisterous seagull, but finds that she is morphing

into her part fairly well.

"He's crazy and loud and doesn't know when to stop," Danz said. "In some aspects I am the same, but something clicked when I read for him. I enjoy getting to be a different person that I usually am. I get to be crazy and interact with other characters."

Lucas Wilson who plays Sebastian, a Jamaican crab, prepared for his role by watching videos on YouTube.

"I went on the internet and looked up how to talk Jamaican," Wilson said.

The eighth-grader played the main role as Aladdin last year and said he is enjoying the change of pace with the part of Sebastian.

"Aladdin was more serious, and Sebastian is crazy," Wilson said. "He's fun and exciting, and I think that's my personality." Emma Ries is the only sixth-grader with a main role in the production playing Flounder. Ries said she is glad to have the opportunity to meet the seventh- and eighth-graders. In fifth grade, Ries was a part of the "Wizard of Oz" production in the elementary school.

"It's a lot different," she said. "I get to interact with tons of people that are so nice. Last year we just did it with our grade, so it's different."

Suriano adds that in addition to the cast and crew, the parents are crucial to the production.

"Every year we have phenomenal parent help," he said. "You can't do this without parent help. We have parents that are basically not getting any sleep for the last month at all."

One of the jobs the

parents take care of is making costumes; however, there is one costume for this year's production that didn't need to be made.

"Thanks to Barrington Stage in Massachusetts, we have an incredible costume for Ursula the sea witch that uses black light, and it is absolutely amazing," Suriano said.

Morgan Galvin who plays Ursula said the costume can be a bit heavy.

"It has six tentacles in black light paint. There are six people operating them," she said.

Galvin who has played the role of a stepsister and the stepmother in "Cinderella" and the wicked witch in "Wizard of Oz," said she enjoys playing the evil roles.

"I actually really like it," she said. "It's not really like me, so it's a challenge and it's pushing me to do something that's out of what I do everyday."

Suriano said the benefits go way beyond adding "drama club" to your transcript.

"No. 1 is the sense of community," he said. "And the confidence you see developing in students right before your eyes. I have to think that the confidence to stretch themselves in theater spills over in other areas of their life ... sports, clubs and academics," he said.
