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Neglect case heads to court

Horse farm owner may have been taking steps to improve animals' care

The owner of a Bethlehem horse farm and an employee who were charged last week for animal cruelty and neglect may have been taking actions to rectify the problems at the time of their arrests, according to court documents.

Karen A. Burrows, 49, was arrested on Monday, Nov. 18,

following the execution of a search warrant by Bethlehem police at her farm on 80 Waldenmaier Road. She was charged with eight counts of failure to



provide sustenance, a Class A misdemeanor under the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law. Arrested on the same charges was William J. Trianni, 25, Burrows' employee.

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Four G'land students suspended for rap video

High school boys name students in explicit song since removed from YouTube

Four Guilderland High School students have been suspended for posting a video to YouTube consisting of a rap song detailing alleged sexual encounters of students in the school.

High School Principal Thomas Lutsic said school officials were notified about the video on

Tuesday, Nov. 12, "through various sources." The video, titled "Guilderland Sophomore Rap," featured an explicit rap song primarily describing alleged sexual activities of various students by name. District officials contacted YouTube Tuesday to remove a video, but the user had apparently removed it from the website later that day. School officials said the exact

motive or reasoning behind the students posting the video was not readily apparent.

"I don't think there was a concrete explanation of why it happened and why they did it," Lutsic said. "All indicated that it was a bad mistake."

All four suspended students were not sophomores, Lutsic said, but are boys attending the high school.

The district declined to disclose any further identifying information. Superintendent Marie Wiles said she did not

Guilderland school voters OK \$17.3M proposal

Second referendum fails, sidelining football field light replacements and auditorium upgrades

Voters approved the bulk upgrades and improvements proposed across Guilderland schools, but secondary expenditures that district officials believed could be seen as more frivolous failed at the polls.

Guilderland Central School District on Thursday, Nov. 14, presented residents with two building project propositions totaling \$18.17 million. The first proposal totaling \$17.32 million passed, with 897 votes in favor and 790 opposed. That proposition included infrastructure upgrades, safety and security improvements, and districtwide technology upgrades. The second proposition, totaling around \$845,000 failed, with 857 opposed and 829

supporting. That would have included high school auditorium renovations and replacing football field light poles.

Superintendent of Schools Marie Wiles said she was "very thankful" voters passed the first proposition.

"The work involved in that proposition is vitally important to our school district and our facilities," Wiles said. "We very much believe it is necessary to protect our investment in our facilities, and we are looking forward to being able to do some additional work to enhance the safety of our school buildings.'

Wiles said the two projects in the second proposal were "probably less essential" than some of the "very basic work" included in the first proposal.


"I think that we knew that the nature of that work was a little bit different than the rest of the work in the project," she said, "and that is why we separated it out and the community told us it is not as much a

priority as the other."

The second and smaller proposal was contingent upon the first proposition being approved by voters. The first proposal did not require the second to be approved.

The approved proposition results in an annual tax increase of \$65 for a home in the Town of Guilderland assessed at \$246,500, the median value. The second proposition would have likely resulted in an annual tax increase of \$3.

Facilities Committee members recommended separating the two proposals because it was believed the larger proposal best captured needed

He said the school's vote might have been perceived as political if held on the same day, too.

Wiles said voter turnout was consistent with previous capital project votes, but less than a typical budget vote.

There were approximately 1,100 fewer votes for the Nov. 14 project referendum vote than the 2013-14 budget. Almost 1,690 votes were cast to approve the first proposition.

Project design and development is planned to last around six months, with the district in July 2014 submitting the project to the State Education Department for review. Assuming the state approves it, then bidding and awarding of contracts would be completed in March 2015.

The first phase of construction would begin in the spring of 2015 and completed that August. The second phase would then begin and be completed during the summer of 2016.



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
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Quinn returns to work at county

Former deputy exec now information officer; drug case still pending in court

Former Albany **County Deputy Executive** Christine Quinn returned to work with the county last week after taking a nearly two month leave of absence following her arrest on drug possession charges.

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy appointed Quinn to the position of chief information officer in the Division of Information Services upon her return to work. Bradley Fischer, who was director of operations for the county executive, has since been appointed to Quinn's former position of deputy executive.

"Her leave had nothing to do with her job performance, and with a month's supply, there would have been no question that she would be returning," said Mary Rozak, a spokeswoman for the county executive. "We believe in innocent until proven guilty."

Quinn, 35, was arrested in September on charges of attempted criminal possession of a controlled substance in the fourth degree, a felony, and fraud, a misdemeanor. The state Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement led an investigation that found Quinn had allegedly illegally obtained methylphenidate, commonly known as Ritalin, in an amount that exceeded her prescribed dosage.

Quinn allegedly went to a local nurse practitioner's office seeking a new prescription and claimed the pharmacy where she filled her previous prescription was only able to partially fill it

according to a complaint filed in Colonie Town Court by a state narcotic enforcement investigator. According to the complaint, the pharmacy dispensed an 84-day supply only 28 days prior, which included 270 tablets of 20 mg Ritalin.

The felony charge stemmed from Quinn allegedly possessing more than 1 gram of a stimulant.

McCoy's July 2012 appointment of Quinn was historic because she became the first woman to hold the position. Before her appointment, she served as acting commissioner of the Department of Human Resources.

Following her arraignment and release, Quinn opted to take a leave of absence using accrued time off, said Rozak. Her position was immediately filled with an appointment

• Never walk alone. Walk with an adult family member, an older student or with a group of students.

 Know where your children are at all times. Make it a rule that your children must ask permission or check in with you before going anywhere. Give your children your work and cell phone numbers so they can reach you at all times.

 Point out safe places. Show your children safe places to play, safe roads and paths to take, and safe places to go if there's trouble.

Teach children to trust their instincts. Explain that if they ever feel scared or uncomfortable, they should get away as fast as they can and tell an adult. Tell them that sometimes adults they know may make them feel uncomfortable, and they should still get away as fast as possible and tell another adult what happened. Reassure children that you will help them when they need it.

• Teach your children to be assertive. Make sure they know that it's okay to say no to an adult and to run away from adults in dangerous situations.

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Man pleads guilty to identity theft

Attorney David Soares announced on Wednesday, Nov. 13, that Heng Li, 27, of Brooklyn, pleaded guilty to one count of felony criminal possession of a forged instrument in the second degree and one count of felony scheme to defraud in the first degree before the Honorable Stephen W. Herrick in Albany County Court.

In August, the Bethlehem Police, United States Secret Service, United States Department of Homeland Security, New York State Police and other local law enforcement agencies executed a search warrant pursuant to an identity theft investigation at the Golden Town Buffet on Route 9W in the Town of Bethlehem. The search warrant did uncover that Li, an employee of the buffet, used a credit card skimmer device to obtain personal identification information of 39 credit card numbers by fraudulent pretenses. Li also was in possession of a forged Michigan driver's license. Li also was under an active deportation order at the time of the search warrant execution, as were three other employees that were present at the restaurant at that time.

Li remains in custody and faces up to $2 \frac{1}{3}$ to seven years in state prison when sentenced on Dec. 11, 2013.

Bethlehem Police Detective Sergeant Adam Hornick said the incident continues to be under investigation. Police are looking for two individuals who are believed responsible for using the stolen cards.

From the Editor's Desk **Patrolling beyond the halls**

Guilderland High School demonstrated what a proactive approach to cyberbullying can do.

High school officials acted swiftly when they were informed last week about an explicit rap video posted to YouTube by four Guilderland High School calling out members of the sophomore class by name. Within 48 hours, the students involved were suspended pending a formal review and a letter was sent to parents about the incident. Students who were affected by the video were offered counseling services. The video - which had been posted on Veterans Day, when school was not in session - was taken down by Tuesday afternoon.

While the damage done may have been mitigated somewhat by the school's prompt action, the incident highlights how quickly cyberbullying can occur and how powerless schools are to prevent it from happening in the first place. All it takes is someone with a computer, a high-speed internet connection and a desire to take a swing at another person, whether maliciously or as a

misguided prank.

Guilderland High School tries to teach students how to be "good digital citizens," as school district Superintendent Marie Wiles said last week. She said the school has regular programs about proper internet usage, as well as anti-bullying initiatives. But if the message falls on deaf ears, then there is nothing that can be done other than to react to the incident.

The worst part about cyberbullying is that the scars are invisible. You can't see the damage done to a child who's been victimized by a cyberbully because it's emotional, not physical. And those emotional scars can lead to devastating results. A couple of years ago, Guilderland brought Vermont resident John Halligan to its high school to talk about how the impact of a cyberbullying attack led his 13-year-old

son, Ryan, to commit suicide in 2003. The toll of being ridiculed by students at school and online was too much for Halligan's son to take.

Unfortunately, even Halligan's story isn't enough these days to put a stop to cyberbullying. That's why schools and communities must come together to combat it when it happens. The schools can't do it alone because they don't have the resources to monitor the internet every minute of the day. Parents and students have to be watchful for any signs of cyberbullying and be willing to report it to school officials as soon as they see it. Silence is not an option.

We applaud Guilderland High School officials and those people in the community who alerted them for quickly dealing with this cyberbullying incident. And we hope that other schools and communities learn from Guilderland's example when dealing with similar incidents when they occur. To paraphrase Superintendent Wiles, this should be a learning experience for everyone.

Guest opinion Learning lessons on fire prevention

A fire broke out at Fenimore Trace apartments in Watervliet early on the morning of Sept. 20. The fire damaged 21 apartment units, and Building 12 had to be destroyed that evening.

The week of Oct. 7-13 was designated as fire prevention week. I am a 13-year resident of the Beltrone Living Center in Colonie. The Colonie fire department held a meeting at our independent living facility during fire prevention week. In attendance at the meeting were the fire marshals (volunteers from our building) to discuss fire emergency procedures. There was a video shown and training on the operation of the fire extinguishers.

I have attended many meetings regarding fire

prevention, but this year I made sure to pay close attention to the details. Three weeks prior to the fire marshal meeting, the fire at Fenimore Trace apartments had occurred.

My grandson, David Lombardo, had recently rented an apartment in Building 12 on the second floor. On the morning of Sept. 20, he was awakened at 3 a.m. to a strange odor in his apartment. He quickly called 911 to report the odor, but at that time, no problem was found. However a few minutes later, he smelled smoke and saw smoke coming into his bedroom window. He immediately threw on his jacket, his flip flops and ran outside. Looking backwards at his apartment, he saw flames shooting out of the third floor roof. He quickly called 911 again to report that the building was totally engulfed in flames.

The fire departments

Island and others responded immediately, and the quick actions of the fire departments helped to save lives. People that were trapped in the third floor were hanging out windows; luckily, all were rescued safely. My daughter and son-in-law, Robin and Dominic Lombardo, were called by David and were at the scene in minutes. The fire department helped to keep what could have been a totally chaotic situation in control.

The fire burned for hours. When it was totally out (around six hours later), the residents of Building 12 were unable to return to their apartments as the structure was deemed

of Watervliet, Troy, Green unsafe. Needless to say, the residents of Building 12 lost all of their possessions. If not for David's quick response, this fire could have easily turned deadly.

Honestly I don't know what happened at the farm, but I do know that the horses that seamed dehydrated would have been put down by now if Karen hadn't bought them. Karen means not only a lot to me and my family, but to a ton of other families, too.





Bethlehem officials are looking to make changes to the law that establishes which employees of the town must also live within its borders.

Supervisor John Clarkson said the town law already has a provision in place, but it's not very specific about which positions are covered. All elected officials must live in the town, but the provision covering other employees wasn't as clear.

"A local law can supersede state law and be more specific," Clarkson said, referencing former Bethlehem Supervisor Jack Cunningham becoming the Colonie Commissioner of Public Works, even though Cunningham didn't live in that town.

Clarkson said he would like to see Bethlehem's law become more detailed, in order to be a better guide in the future. "The bill we have drafted, the local law rather, does not apply to a single, specific position. Rather, what it attempts to do is identify all the positions for which we believe state law would already require residency," said Clarkson.

Positions mostly include that of department heads, but some positions can be grandfathered in, such as long-time employees, for exemptions. The town can also waive the requirement if officials are looking for a certain skill-set that isn't found within the town.


According to the memorandum, the town "will continue to recruit broadly and will make every effort to identify qualified town residents for town positions. Out-oftown applicants for these position will be told that relocation to Bethlehem will be necessary unless the Town of Bethlehem or town justices... are willing to grant a specific waiver."

The public hearing for residents was set for Tuesday, Nov. 26, at 6 p.m. at the beginning of the next town board meeting.

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Styrofoam banned at chain food businesses

Albany County Legislature makes decision amidst community support, industry outcry

Getting a hot cup of coffee or take-out food in a Styrofoam container will soon be a rare, if not forgotten, experience at local food establishments.

The Albany County Legislature on Tuesday, Nov. 12, approved the Food Service Waste Reduction Act by a vote of 24-12, which prohibits usage of polystyrene foam containers, commonly known as Styrofoam, at chain food service businesses. The ban will be effective in six months and only applies to food businesses with at least 15 locations nationally.

People filled the room on Tuesday and debated the law for more than a hour during a public hearing before the ban's passage later that night.

An overwhelming majority of comments were in support of the ban, with most pointing to health or environmental concerns of the product that many claimed is "These went into our streets, our parks, our waterways, clogged up our landfills where it takes hundreds of years to decompose."

difficult to recycle. Those who rallied against the law were all industry representatives or lobbyists.

Paul Tick of Delmar pointed to the federal Environmental Protection Agency and International Agency for Research on Cancer identifying styrene, which is used to make Styrofoam, as a "possible carcinogen."

In 2006, Tick said, Americans disposed of 870,000 tons of polystyrene foam containers, which included 25 billion such cups. The EPA has determined the polystyrene manufacturing process is the fifth highest producer of hazardous waste nationally.

"These went into our streets, our parks, our waterways, clogged up our landfills where it takes hundreds of years to decompose," Tick said. "The companies that produce Styrofoam suggest that we recycle it rather than restrict it, but there is numerous problems with recycling Styrofoam."

Several speakers, along with lawmakers, said recycling Styrofoam is not viable, because there is no profit to be made for recycling companies. There is also the need for such containers to be cleaned of food waste.

Mike Levy, senior director for the Plastics Foodservice Packaging Group of the American Chemistry Council, rebutting environmental claims against Styrofoam.

"This product is not only economical, it is actually better for the environment than what you've heard. More importantly the product is also recyclable," Levy said.

Levy claimed banning the product from chain food businesses would cost from \$600,000 to \$2 million, with more

1,500 jobs in-state tied to companies manufacturing such products.

"Polystyrene is a safe product. It has been used for 50 years. It's been regulated by the FDA and when I (say) regulated, I mean it has been tested for exposure to consumers," Levy said. "Polystyrene foam in consumer food services is not an issue; the low levels are not going to harm anybody."

Legislator Mary Lou Connolly, D-Guilderland, said coming into the meeting she supported





the ban, but was swayed by arguments against it. "I've been doing a little" bear any burden related to using an alternative product.

Legislator Douglas Bullock, a sponsor of the bill, said the cost would be "prohibitive" for nonprofits and similar establishments.

"We would have gone for everybody, but we want voluntary compliance with all those that are not covered under this law," Bullock said. "I don't like singling people out either, but you have to start somewhere. This is where you start, you start with those that can afford it."

Bullock said as the demand for alternative products that are more environmentally friendly increase the costs to purchase such products will decrease, allowing it to be affordable for small businesses.

According to the EPA, people exposed to levels of styrene exceeding regulations for a short period of time may experience nervous system effects such as depression, loss of concentration, weakness, fatigue and nausea. Those exposed to it at high levels for a lifetime may develop liver and nerve tissue damage, along with cancer.



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
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Lafarge modernization plan moves forward

Final approval granted for extension to build new kiln. strengthened pollution standards

Lafarge North America has received the final approval on an amended settlement granting additional time to construct a new kiln while further reducing pollution at its Ravena cement plant.

Lafarge officials on Friday, Nov. 15, announced its extension agreement was finalized. The agreement was drafted in July with the federal Environmental Protection Agency and state Department of Environmental Conservation. It was released for public comments earlier this fall, and no changes were made to the company's extended timeline to construct a new kiln at its Ravena cement pant.

The company has an additional 18 months to complete construction. In exchange for the extension, Lafarge agreed to reduce pollution emissions beyond its original agreement.

Lafarge must complete construction by June 30, 2016, with the agreement holding a detailed construction schedule and penalties for not meeting project milestones.

Craig Campbell, vice president of Environment and Public Affairs for Lafarge, said the finalized agreement is important, because it's "another important step" toward modernization of the plant.

The existing Ravena plant, which the company said is in compliance with all current environmental standards, will be shut down after its new kiln is

equipped with advanced efficiency features that will enable the plant to compete successfully and meet the economy's need for high-quality cement."

The new plant will have modern air pollution control technology to reduce specific air emissions and have a continuous monitoring systems "to meet, if not exceed, the strict new emission standards adopted by the EPA,' according to Lafarge.

a m e n d e d The settlement includes annual allowable emissions for nitrogen oxides and sulfur dioxide at or below the original agreement. These pollutants contribute to smog and soot pollution, along with acid rain. Lafarge, in a separate agreement with the state, will limit mercury emissions to levels 25 percent lower than the plant's current air pollution control permit.

Lafarge also agreed to provide funding of \$1.5 million toward projects to further reduce emissions at the plant and in surrounding communities.

The modernization project maintains more than 100 local jobs, Campbell said, along with Lafarge estimating an additional 800 temporary jobs added during construction.

"The benefit to the local economy is very significant," Campbell said. "They can look at the plant and know what we are building is a stateof-the-art manufacturing facility. We plan to be there for 50 years."

Several high-profile projects in the state have drawn from the cement produced in Ravena, such as the new Freedom Tower and the World Trade Center Memorial in New York City and GlobalFoundries' new plant in Malta.

"Even under challenging market conditions, the Lafarge Ravena plant is supplying more than one million tons of locally produced cement for construction projects of all sizes and in many locations throughout the region," added Kralik.

Lafarge h a d approached state and federal officials about receiving an extension to its 2010 consent decree requiring the company to limit pollutant emissions at its Ravena plant.

The original deadline to meet imposed limits was Jan. 1, 2015, but the company claimed the cement industry was recovering slower than expected from the country's recent recession. This led Lafarge to delay funding construction of its new kiln.

Without this agreement we would not have the time or the economy to support such a large investment," Campbell said.



experience with horses, to help care for the animals.

"When I started, the horses were in worse physical condition than now," Trianni told police. "Over the last six months, I have made efforts to improve the horses' care."

Trianni told police he had several veterinarians out to visit the property and provided a notebook with some medical records. He was then able to get a hold of a veterinarian who provided some receipts. Trianni also said he added a weight supplement to the horses' feed.

"I had been pushing Karen to get rid of as many of her horses and ponies as possible because the fewer we have on the property, the better care, attention and training we can provide," Trianni told police.

Police and animal control found 33 horses on the property. After an investigation, some horses were allegedly found to be in various stages of neglect and malnourishment. Others were allegedly found to be without water.

The police report indicated many of the horses' water buckets were dry and there was limited hay on the property. Some horses were reported as having open wounds and scars, while others had lice, missing teeth and internal parasites.

All horses were examined by licensed veterinarians, and as a result of the examinations, eight horses were seized to undergo further evaluation, treatment and care.

Court documents indicate animal control was notified of the situation after two people visited the property to look at a horse Trianni was trying to sell. Upon seeing the conditions of the horses, the two became concerned and decided to tell the authorities.

Detective Sgt. Adam Hornick said police had received complaints about the farm in the past, but no arrests were made. For now, the farm, which allows people to pay to go horseback riding, is still allowed to operate because no court order has been issued.

"We have no way to force them to cease," Hornick said.

Both subjects were released on appearance tickets and are due to return to the Town of Bethlehem Court on Sunday, Dec. 3, at 4 p.m.

want to identify the suspended students "in any way at this point."

Suspended students are required to have a superintendent's hearing within five days of their suspension, which will determine the full scope of disciplinary action.

The district spoke to the parents of the suspended students, and Wiles said there has been no push back from those parents regarding the suspensions.

"Put yourself in the role of a parent and think about how you would feel after hearing something like this, so it is mixed emotion," Lutsic said.

Since the video was posted online Monday when school was not in session for Veterans Day, several parents had already contacted the Guilderland Police Department about it, according to Lutsic.

Wiles said police may be conducting their own investigation, but it would be separate from the school's investigation.

"We frame this in the context of the Guilderland Code of Conduct," she said. "(Police) have other laws and rules they need to follow up.'

Song unleashed on students

The description for the YouTube video posted by the user "Anon Guild" read. "Guilderland 2016 is a slut fest." The video was an audio clip set to a picture of the Guilderland High School entrance sign. It was the only video that account had posted to YouTube.

Before the video was removed it had more than 1,550 views, with approximately 30 "thumbs up" and 19 "thumbs

"Children were mentioned by name and in a manner that was highly inappropriate and hurtful," Wiles said. "I was stunned by the graphic and obscene nature of the comments made. ... The comments were shocking and insulting."

There were "a number of students" called out by name in the video, Lutsic said, with some students mentioned "not very much at all" and others more extensively.

Lutsic said all of the students named were sophomores, along with "the sophomore class as a whole" being mentioned. Support services have been offered to all those students.

"We had our counseling department and social workers talk to all of the students that had been mentioned on there, and many parents have been contacted, and some parents have contacted us also," Lutsic said.

Lutsic on Tuesday sent a letter to parents about the incident.

"We take very seriously our responsibility to provide a safe learning environment for our students," Lutsic said in the letter. "Bullying and harassment, such as the kind displayed in the audio clip, violates the Guilderland Central School District Code of Conduct and will not be tolerated."

Lutsic said the high school does its "best to encourage an atmosphere of respect and consideration." He said even if the rap was posted as a "prank," it's a form cyberbullying that could be harmful to others.

"As with any sort of bullying or harassment, there is undoubtedly a resulting negative impact on the entire school community," Lutsic said in the letter.

"We made some changes (at halftime) that helped us," said Kinnally. "I would have liked to score another goal, but they were such a great team.'





Communications. "Young people are interested because so much of what they use in their daily life is driven by nanotechnology. It's really at the center of their world."

Janack said sparking curiosity about nanotechnology at this age is a great opportunity.

The museum event is part of Nanovember, a monthlong celebration showcasing nanotechnology in New York state.

"We have renamed November, Nanovember." Janack said. "Basically it's a month of events and activities designed to showcase how important nanotechnology has become in society and the number of industries it's affecting."

Janack said children are key to the industry, adding that the opportunities available to children in the future in terms of both education and careers in nanotechnology are huge.

"A number of activities are designed to introduce children to nanotechnology and for younger people to understand

how nanotechnology is shaping our world," he said.

The family fun day will include activities such as creating a polymer chain to take home and learning about LED lighting with the help of ice cream.

"There will be some futuristic stuff like invisibility cloaks and an elevator that might take you to outer space," said Sarah Fisk, CMOST director of education. "They will investigate some cool new science that can be



created through the use of nanotechnology.'

Kids will also get a demonstration of clean room gowning with a chance to try on "bunny suits."

Deborah Onslow, CEO at CMOST, said it's important to teach the kids at a scaled-down level.

"We explain it in a way that a child can understand," she said.

Fisk admitted that at the

elementary level, it can be a little bit of a stretch for the younger ones.

"However our bigger goal is to expose kids to science and get them curious," Fisk said. "If we can engage them and encourage them to explore the world around them, we can break down those barriers."

Fisk said parents can also benefit from the experience.

"There is a hook to get the kids in, but there is also an

education factor that happens with the adults," she said. "Sitting where we are in the tech valley, educating folks on the nanoscience happening in our backyard is really critical."

But, the hands-on experience doesn't end after Nov. 23. The museum and the nanocollege have made sure the opportunity for young minds to interact with nanotechnology goes on all year.

In October 2012 the children's museum partnered with the nanocollege and launched a permanent display with the goal of introducing kids to nanoscience. The interactive exhibit is available at the museum and provides a firsthand experience for families. Visitors are able to build giant carbon nanotubes and use spy skills to find examples of nano products and phenomena in interactive challenges, build a stable nano future on a tippy table and spin disks to compare the effects of static electricity and gravity.

The world o f nanotechnology can also be found in local libraries at various times throughout the year when CNSE CMOST brings Nano Days on the road. Presentations, experiments and demonstrations are conducted that explore different topics and concepts in nanotechnology. In past presentations, kids had the opportunity to play with model fuel-cell cars and experiment how exciting science and

with working photovoltaic panels, which power small items such as a calculator, small fan or radio.

Summer campers can also be immersed in the world of nanotechnology and experiment with nano concepts, meet professionals from the College of Nanoscale Science and Engineering, and have the opportunity to visit CNSE and explore everything from the gowning up process to the work that happens in the clean rooms.

"Each year we bring thousands of elementary, middle school and high school students through CNSE," Janack said. "One of the big activities we do four times a year is what we call Nano Career Day, where we bring in students from 10 different schools, and they go through an assembly line, tour the clean rooms and do activities."

Janack said open houses and regular tours for kids to have a chance to see people in bunny suits and be involved in nanotech activities go on all year.

"We find the younger that you can demonstrate

technology is, the more apt that children are going to want to pursue that as a future education path or career path," Janack said. "Nanotechnology is an increasing part of their world. Young people are using smartphones, iPods and laptops ... all of that is driven by nanotechnology.'

Janack said it's important to helpyoung people to understand that nanotechnology is what is driving this part of their world.

"It's a chance to turn on the lightbulb and see how they can be part of that world," he said, adding that the opportunities are only increasing on a daily basis, and exposing kids at a young age is the first step in building tomorrow's workforce.

"More companies, more jobs ... we need to prepare young people to be part of the

nanotech economy," Janack said. "It's a win-win; we prepare them for good jobs and careers, and we get to keep them here in New York state."

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

going outside," Nancy Engel, director of Thacher Nature Center, said. "We get into the holiday season, and we value that even more. There is a lot of stress and pressure on sort of our commercial holidays."

"Usually by the end of the event it is like a little community, and everyone gathers around

the fire," Engel said. "We certainly get a lot of very positive feedback. We have some folks who come every year, and they love it as a day to do simple things that we normally don't do."

A holiday classic, reinvented

Patrick Barlow alters Dickens for the modern age

A modernized version of the holiday classic, "A Christmas Carol," will open at Albany's Capital Repertory Theatre this week.

English actor, comedian and playwright, Patrick Barlow, best known for his hit Broadway adaption of the espionage thriller "The 39 Steps," has built a career on stripping stories down to their basics, and finding frivolity in the midst of tension. In "The 39 Steps," one actor played the role of spy hunter Richard Hannay, and three actors played everyone else, often switching characters at high speed in mid-scene. The result was a Charles Ludlam-like wackiness that never lost sight of the true heart of the tale.

Barlow's take on "A Christmas Carol" is funny, sweet and redemptive, with, as the playwright says, "the beating heart of Dickens still safe and sound within."

At Capital Repertory Theatre, a quartet featuring Kevin Kelly, Marcy McGuigan, Doug Trapp and Kristyn Youngblood

create Victorian London all around McGuire's stingy Scrooge. Barlow and show director, Michael Bush, keep the actors busy. In addition to juggling roles, they are creating even more characters with puppets and straw dolls; singing Yuletide favorites; and providing all of their own accompaniment on a variety of musical instruments.

"This kind of theatre is true theatre to me," Barlow said of the piece, which strongly depends on the enthusiasm and investment of the cast, "and I think what theatre should be."

Bush is a Capital Repertory Theatre veteran. He has previously helmed "Cactus Flower," "The Sisters Rosensweig" and "Leslie Uggams' Uptown/ Downtown" on Pearl Street, and is a former associate artistic director of the Manhattan Theatre Club.

Broadway star Kevin McGuire returns to **Capital Repertory Theatre** as Ebenezer Scrooge. McGuire founded the Theater Company at Hubbard Hall, was recently at the REP. playing artist Mark Rothko in John Logan's criticallyacclaimed "Red," and

previously appeared as Don Quixote in "Man of La Mancha." McGuire plays a decidedly different Scrooge downtown, surrounded by actor/ musicians who remember the fun found in the original tale.


