Fowl request spurs discontent

G'land man seeks OK for chicken coop; zoning code revisions expected

Guilderland's zoning law may be silent on whether chickens are allowed in residential areas, but neighbors of one man requesting to raise the birds weren't.

The Zoning Board of Appeals on Wednesday, March 5, took up its third request since 2011 for a "keeping of chickens application," with

Panel envisions aesthetic overhaul

Meeting focus on ways to beautify one of Bethlehem's major corridors

Bethlehem town officials and community leaders making up the Delaware Avenue Improvement Group met last week for the first time.

The focus of the community



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to start up the program was spurred after reading about a local state Assembly member traveling to the National World War II Memorial. it around two years ago due to health problems.

Frank DeSorbo, founder and president of the D-Day Revisited Association, discovered the area Patriot Flight program wasn't active anymore and wanted to find out what happened. DeSorbo, of Delmar, ended up talking with Peak for three and a half hours one day and decided he

LeVie subdivision, barn conditions approved

Property owner and town agree on timeline for barn relocation, 18 homes to be built

In about a year, the future of the historic LeVie barn should be clear, with New Scotland officials granted additional time to secure funding for relocation efforts.

The New Scotland Planning Board on Tuesday, March 4, unanimously approved the final plans for an 18lot residential subdivision on a 22.4-acre property located in an agricultural district off Maple Road. Country Club Partners and the town also agreed to conditions delaying the development of lot 18, with construction moving forward on the remaining 17 lots. The conditions allow local officials more time to secure funding to

relocate the LeVie barn within the town.

"The town is very interested in preserving the barn, and the owners are very interested in working with the town," Planning Board Chairman Charles Voss said. "Leaving (lot 18) as the last parcel to be developed allows you to put in your roads and everything else.'

The developer is required to offer the barn for free to the town for preservation and relocation efforts. The town would have until Feb. 28, 2015, to notify the property owner it has received a proposal to relocate the barn to another location. Once the

owner is notified. the town would have until May 31, 2015, to deconstruct and relocate the barn.

If the town were unable to relocate the barn, then the property owner would be allowed to demolish or deconstruct the barn without any conditions.

"The May 31 date ... there is nothing magical about it. If somebody really had a deal there and they had to take it out on June 30, there is no real problem," Daniel Hershberg, the attorney representing the property owner, said. "Our goal here is to move it along so that we can get this project moving along."

and town officials are looking to give "first dibs" to someone within the town looking to relocate the barn. but the building could be moved further away if a local home isn't found.

"At least we got the interest level up — that there are people interested to preserve the barn," Hershberg said. "(The owners) certainly don't want someone to deconstruct it and use it for scrap material if something else is available."

First responders honored

Annual townwide ceremony calls out those who went above and beyond

Bethlehem's first responders were honored Monday, March 3, at the annual Community Awards event presented by the Nathaniel Adams Blanchard American Legion Post 1040 in Bethlehem.

The awards ceremony is held each year to recognize a member from each of the town's first response companies who went "above and beyond the call of duty." Awards and proclamations were given out to a total of 11 companies and departments.

"This is the time we in the American Legion honor our emergency personnel in grateful recognition of your devotion to the duty, and in appreciation for the contributions to public safety in the Town of Bethlehem," said Post Commander Al Hofaker, who served as marshal of the event. Bethlehem Supervisor John Clarkson helped present the awards, while Albany County Executive Dan McCoy gave proclamations to each award recipient. A representative was sent on behalf of state Sen. Neil Breslin, with Albany County Sheriff Craig Apple also in attendance.

Bethlehem Police Lt. Thomas Heffernan Jr. presented the award for Police Officer of the Year on behalf of Chief Louis Corsi. This year's award was presented to all of the detectives on the Special Services Unit for their efforts in solving a number of notable investigations over the past 12 months. Those include arrests made in several bank robberies, an armed home invasion, several cases of identity theft from a local restaurant and a lottery scam against the elderly.

"The Special Services Unit was responsible for the seizure and recovery of over a half of a million dollars in stolen property, cash and assets during the investigations taking place over the past 12 months," said

Bethlehem Supervisor hn Clarkson helped esent the awards, hile Albany County cecutive Dan McCoy Heffernan. "Detectives were also responsible for investigating 838 cases, which resulted in over 150 arrests."

> The town's fire departments also presented awards to the fire fighters who helped save the life of an elderly Slingerlands woman whose home caught fire in September. Slingerlands Fire Chief Brian Sleurs said the fire officers were informed of the fire by a resident who reported a structure fire across from the Slingerlands Post Office. The base then radioed fire control.

> "This is the point in time when the mutual aid system that we all worked so hard to put together worked, as firefighters from five neighboring departments, along with EMS personnel from within the town, gathered to do as they have been trained and saved a life," said Sleurs.

> Despite their efforts, the resident eventually died from her injuries several days later after being transferred to the Westchester Burn Center. The fire departments came together to First Page 5

Knife attack leads police to 410 bags of heroin

A Colonie man was arrested for allegedly slashing the face of a Voorheesville resident, but police then discovered a stash of heroin inside his apartment.

Albany County Sheriff Craig D. Apple Sr. said deputies were

assaulted and slashed in the face with a knife. Police said Nicholas J. Desanctis allegedly attacked the victim and had previously accused them of stealing drugs from him. Desanctis allegedly fled the scene after the assault.

Investigators located Desanctis, 21, in a vehicle at Colonie Center, with two other men in the vehicle. All three were detained and interviewed. The driver of the vehicle allegedly admitted to purchasing two bundles of heroin from Desanctis for \$110. with the understanding he would drive Desanctis to Voorheesville to confront the individual.

Police said Desanctis allegedly possessed a knife used in the assault and had blood stained clothes, along with a cut to his finger.

Investigators executed a search warrant at Desanctis' residence at 420 Sand Creek Road, Building 1, apartment 605, in Colonie Towers, and allegedly found 410 bags of heroin with a street



Patriot Flight on May 10, DeSorbo said. There are a total of 35 veterans that submitted applications for the flight and another 16 veterans the group has contacted. He said the trip would probably include around 50 veterans.

The most time-consuming aspect

of the program is fundraising, which DeSorbo said is a "24/7" effort.

"I can do a lot on the telephone, but I just can't drive," Peak said.

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

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From the Editor's Desk Time to teach interpersonal skills

Let's, for a moment, forget Common Core and look at an educational shortcoming that is causing problems right now for our graduates and their employers.

According to a recent Siena survey, area business leaders — nearly 68 percent who responded to the survey — are concerned about finding qualified workers who have good communication skills and can work as a team.

So while schools are busy trying to teach students how to write and meet new standards in that area, they aren't necessarily doing enough to teach students how to work together to solve problems.

Learning to work with others is a vital skill in any industry. Whether you work in a nanotech lab, an office, a coffee shop or an at-home business, you have to be able to interact with others to get your work done. Even one-on-one interaction can be challenging if you don't have the proper interpersonal skills.

The trouble is, many schools and universities don't make interpersonal skills part of their curriculum. The way they see it, students have to figure out how to interact with one another on their own, and the whole "plays well with others" thing should have been straightened out in the sandbox long ago.

This thinking might have been OK 15-20 years ago, but it's not effective in today's world. Young people have grown up communicating in entirely different ways than the generations before them, with texting, Facebook, Twitter and even newer platforms like Snapchat being the primary means to stay in touch.

This type of communication may seem effective to this generation, but, at the risk of sounding like a bunch of fist-shaking old-timers, it does nothing to help them with the face-to-face interaction needed to do business in the real world. It's easy to say what you want to say when you type it on a screen, but saying it when the other person is standing in front of you can lead to consequences you're not prepared for.

Also, the reliance on texting and Tweeting shorthand may explain the decline in writing skills seen by business owners. While English teachers are still doing their best to teach proper sentence structure and how to compose thoughts into a wellwritten presentation, students quickly throw those skills out the window when they are rushing to text their friends to meet them somewhere. People write the way they practice, not the way they are taught.

So, how can the tide be turned? For starters, more area schools can take a look at what Tech Valley High School is doing by teaching creative ways for students to interact with one another and business owners to solve problems. They can send students on group internships to local businesses, based on what their interests are. They can have students learn about the job application process by sending them on mock interviews. They can encourage teachers to come up with more group projects to get their students to work together. The same concepts can and should be applied at the collegiate level, too.

Business owners want to hire people who can work well together, and schools have to recognize that this is a skill today's students are not picking up on their own. So when we talk about preparing kids for the 21st century workforce, the issues go far beyond the Common Core.

This Grandma's Got Gigs column originally appeared in the March issue of Capital District Parent Pages.

Grandparents have a reputation for breaking the rules. There is a popular T-shirt that says it all: "What happens at Grandma's, stays at Grandma's."

We had the grandchildren staying with us on a crisp March evening when the moon was barely visible and the sky crystal clear. For their bedtime story, I chose a children's book about the night sky with glow-in-the-dark constellations. Without mentioning the "glow" capability to the children, I read about Orion the Hunter and Leo the Lion in the current sky. On the last page, on cue, Grandpa comes in and turns off the lights. With the lights out, the constellations light up.

With great formality, Grandpa announces: "You will be our honored guests at a Backyard Star Bash!" "When?" they scream. "Tonight," we both respond.

Instead of getting under the covers, the children were bundled up to go outside. With gig bag in hand, we traipse out to the backyard for some uncomplicated star gazing. The experts tell us to keep it simple, let the magic of wondering be in control. The sky belongs to everybody, and viewing what is up there is as unique and individual as the imaginations of the stargazers. What we learned from the children's book gave us just enough basic information to get the children started on a lifelong appreciation of our natural world. Another secret for sharing the night sky with children, is to ask questions to get them thinking. What do you see? How many stars are in the sky? Can you count them? Do stars come in different colors?

Sometimes it's enough to have the questions even if you don't know the answers. If you Google free sky maps for cellphones, you can easily load an app to be your guide. We took our cellphone outside. By clicking on the app and holding it over our heads, we had a sky map with locations and labels. You could also take the glowin-the-dark book outside; that will work too!

There we were, outside after bedtime, standing in the backyard looking upward when one of the children spotted in the west the three brilliant stars in a row that make up Orion the Hunter's belt. After we find Orion, we spot Betelgeuse, the orange star on his shoulder, and Rigel, the blue star at his knee. When we turn in the opposite direction, we face the majestic Leo the Lion making his debut on the eastern horizon. We have a light bulb moment when we realize the source of the saying, "March comes in like a lion." Leo is shaped

like a backward question mark. Right where his heart should be we see a sparkling white diamond star aptly called Regulus.

Does Orion really look like a hunter and Leo like a lion? That's the fun of it all; the patterns imply the image and our imaginations do the rest, just like people have been doing with the stars since the beginning of time. Before retreating back to the warmth of our beds, we wished on the stars as we remembered beloved family members no longer with us on earth.

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

Although no definite site has been chosen for the Memorial, the letters which were sent to the various organizations in the township brought responses in which they expressed the wish that they be allowed to donate certain specific sections. Individuals who have read about it have written and offered to help with personal donations toward the landscaping.

The Memorial, a large 20-acre park site, would be one of the outstanding spots of its kind in the State because it would offer a more varied program than most.

Among the proposed features are a beautiful, rustic outdoor theatre where plays could be staged during the summer months. Another feature, which has long been under consideration in the Tri-Village area, is the swimming pool. The pool, when finished, would be complete with sea sand beach and a separate shallow section for beginners and the smaller children.

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

BC budget talks continue

Presentations focus on special ed, tech needs

As Bethlehem Central continues budget discussions for the 2014-15 school year, recent presentations highlighted possible staff reductions in the special education department and needed technology upgrades.

The second round of budget presentations were held on Wednesday, March 5, at the Bethlehem Central High School. The district is facing a preliminary budget gap of \$4.8 million, while residents could face a 3.12 percent tax levy increase that would not challenge the state's tax cap.

Kathy Johnston, director of Special Education and Student Services, said after reviewing possible costsaving measures for her department, the district could save about \$62,000 by getting rid of a social worker. The district currently has eight social workers and seven psychologists.

"Although social workers work with both special needs students and the general population, they are not mandated by the state," said Johnston.

Another \$100,000 would be saved through staff retirements, but service costs to BOCES have increased to be nearly just as much. If a social worker was let go, the potential cost savings for the department would be \$67,000.

Johnston said about 712 students within the district receive SESS help. Students are reevaluated on a yearly basis to see if changes need to be made to their special education programs, or if they are no longer needed.

"One year, we might have a lot of students move out. This year, we had a lot of students move in," said Johnston. "There's not an exact science to it."

Johnston said because of these year-to-year changes in need, it can be hard to make reduction recommendations. She thanked her team for carefully putting the needs of students first.

The special education director also said previous cuts had resulted in challenges scheduling aids for middle school students, teachers losing valuable time with students because of the need to travel between schools and little time for professional development.

Despite these challenges, the graduation rate for special needs students remains at 82 percent, with many students also involved in extracurricular actives like the school play. Sal DeAngelo, the district's chief technology officer, proposed restructuring the technology department, but also requested additional money for equipment.

DeAngelo said although the recent bond provided funds to upgrade tech support, it did not provide money for equipment. He asked for \$200,000 to upgrade the online testing capabilities of the district's buildings.

"The state is requiring us to be able to do more assessments online," said DeAngelo. "The hope would be this could be used more in the classroom, as well."

Also budgeted was \$3,000 to hire additional help over the summer.


Proposed restructuring of the department would call for one of the district's help desk technicians be turned into an IT Services Specialist, with a slight raise. DeAngelo also asked for the elimination of a BOCES technician, with the work done in house. The total cost would be an additional \$30,000.


"We have current employees with the skill set and education," said DeAngelo.

The next round of budget presentations will be held on Wednesday, March 19, and will discuss athletics, along with operations and maintenance.

Neighbors wary of new placement of townhomes

Two buildings in **Delmar Pointe moved**, but residents say they are too close

The repositioning of two housing units within the proposed Delmar Pointe development to placate several neighbors was met with opposition from another set of neighbors.

A public hearing to grant subdivision approval for the Delmar Pointe project was held at the Bethlehem Planning Board meeting on Tuesday, March 4. A plan had been proposed to move two of the housing units so they would not be visible to several residents who live along Hedgerose Lane in Delmar. The plan also called for a berm to be built and several trees to be planted.

However at the meeting, a resident said moving the two units toward the front of the development would cause similar problems for those living along Ridgefield Drive.

'They're relocating it into an area that is specifically right outside my kitchen and right into my backyard," said Tom Mocerine of 21 Ridgefield Drive. "My comment today is, is there any opportunity to push those units somewhere else because we already have two units right next to my residence.'

Mocerine said he respected the residents of Hedgerose Lane and their efforts to get the units moved, but because of drainage issues, a berm would not be able to be built for the Ridgefield Drive residents as a barrier.

Delmar Pointe would include 46 townhomes on about 21 acres of land. The project received Planned **Development District** approval in June 2013. Viscusi Builders originally proposed the project about seven years ago, and condominiums were planned at the time. In 2011, the project changed to townhomes because of a change in the market.

There would be a mix of two- and three-bedroom designs and one- and twofloor setups, all with frontfacing garages. Customers will be able to choose one of four possible layouts. The entire property will have a buffer around it from other nearby properties and will be maintained by a homeowners association.

New sidewalks will also be built along the developments access road. The building of the road would eliminate a curb cut for the medical building from Delaware Avenue, and provide a safer entrance and exit to the building's parking lot. The project would be similar to the Walden Fields development off Elsmere Avenue.

Charles Dumas of Lemery Greisler LLC said although a berm would not be possible with the new configuration, trees were planned to work as a buffer for the residents of Ridgefield Drive.

"We've had a fair amount of public scrutiny of the project," Dumas acknowledged at the meeting. "First there was the public hearing for the PDD, and then the two subsequent appearances before the Planning Board and colloquy with the public through the public forum."

Mocerine said he will already be dealing with street light, aesthetic issues and loss of privacy from the proximity of units one and two. Adding the additional two units will make it worse.

Leslie said planning staff agreed to add the berm, not for screening of buildings, but to block the light from disturbing residents of the adjacent property.

District would bond nearly \$1M for vehicles

Guilderland school district voters will likely vote on a separate proposition alongside next year's proposed budget this May, which includes purchasing eight buses and a maintenance truck for nearly \$1 million.

Danielle Poirier, transportation supervisor for the Guilderland Central School District, presented the proposed purchase of six 66-passenger buses for \$694,000, a 66-passenger bus with chains for wheelchair bus for \$145,000 and a \$36,000 maintenance truck to the Board of Education on Tuesday, March 4. State aid would cover about 50 percent of the \$995,000 purchase, according to district officials.

The bond proposal would be placed on the 2014-15 school budget ballot as a separate proposition, and board members are scheduled to vote on purchases at its Tuesday, March 18, meeting.

Board Vice President Allan Simpson questioned if the bus purchases were the most economical choice given the fiscal stress facing the district. Simpson also asked if there was another, less expensive option.

Assistant Superintendent for **Business Neil Sanders** said the purchase is a "needs-based approach" for the aging district fleet. The district also attempts to follow its vehicle and equipment replacement schedule.

"We buy a few buses each year and those age out, so now we are at the 11-, 12-, 13-year mark of those buses within the fleet where reliability becomes a question," Sanders said. What we are talking about is phasing out buses that are at the end of their life and replacing them with new buses ... so we always have an infusion of new equipment and updated

safety requirements."

G'land asks for new buses

Fleet Supervisor Mitch Carkner said the district has already fallen behind on replacing buses, and delaying the proposed purchase would be detrimental.

"We still have three buses that should have been surplused already, so I kept buses on the property for parts because, as the time went on, as we've been purchasing vehicles, we haven't maintained the numbers of big vehicles," Carkner said. "With this replacement tonight, we will still be short of the goal of our replacement cycle that was started years ago."

Simpson also asked if there would be less demand for buses next \$120,000, a full-size year since the district is proposing to contract out five more bus runs. This year, the district saved money contracting out two bus routes for special needs students.

Poirier said eventually there would be less of a need, but she cautioned against not replacing buses this year since the district is still testing contracting out transportation services. She said the arrangement has worked well so far.

"I am not sure we are ready to reduce our fleet just yet until we determine that outsourcing is something that is going to go well," she said. "We just want to make sure that this is the plan we want to continue on with in the future."

If the district stopped contracting out routes, she said, then it would need the buses to accommodate children.

Sanders pointed out the district would only purchase full-size buses under the proposal and not any smaller buses.

The district owns a 2004 full-size wheelchair bus with 151,000 miles, which is nearing the end of its life cycle, and Poirier said she'd like to have two in the fleet. One would be used on a day-to-day basis for a route.

There is one child the district contracted out to transport because a wheelchair prevents that child from using the district's wheelchair bus, Poirier said. The current bus only has one configuration with 24 seats and fits up to three wheelchairs.

The new wheelchair bus would have five different configurations and allow for the child

to be transported. It is more expensive than a standard setup because there is a wheelchair lift, air conditioning and other requirements for special needs students.

Building and Grounds Supervisor Clifford Nooney said the district also must replace its existing salt truck, which is 21 years old. For the first 14 years, the district had used it as a maintenance truck before transitioning it to salt duties.

"I can honestly say we've squeezed every single penny out of this vehicle," Nooney said. "It no longer makes sense to make any repairs on it, and it is going to become dangerous to operate.'

The new truck would take the place of the district's 12-year-old utility truck, which would transition into "semiretirement" and become the new salt truck. Purchasing the truck through state contract also reduces the costs around \$10,000 to \$15,000.

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The developers stalled the project for some time because of the economy. The town's Planning Board previously asked for several studies to be done on the site, including

on a walk with members of the Garden Club, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary, and Kiwanis to see what kind of improvements could be made to make the corridor look more appealing. Kilcoyne said the group was now gathered to make those plans come to fruition.

The town was awarded a \$1.2 million grant in January as part of the state's Bicycle, Pedestrian and Multi-use Enhancement Projects initiative. The grant is through the federal Department of Transportation's Transportation Enhancement Program, and the funds are expected to be used to turn the town's Delaware Avenue Hamlet Enhancement Study into reality.

An overview of the project was presented by Rob Leslie, the town's planning director, who also encouraged the town to apply for the grant in August.

The entire project is estimated to cost around \$3.1

million. The TEP grant is for \$1.2 million so the town will need to make up the remainder of the cost unless additional funding can be found through grants or fundraising. Construction is not expected to begin until 2015.

Suggestions made in the original plan include upgrades to sidewalks and the addition of bicycle lanes, as well as decorative lighting and better landscaping along the road.

In 2003, the intersection of Delaware and Kenwood saw improvements with new lighting, plant hangers and improved sidewalks. Town Supervisor John Clarkson said he had wanted to see this course of action continued and was prepared to put forth a scaled-back version of the plan until this grant became available.

It was previously suggested that the town would use some of the aesthetic suggestions in the study as guidelines for private property owners. Officials would work with business owners to start slowly implementing the plan through code changes.

Some suggestions included requiring business signs to be more relative to their trade or instituting "hamlet" signs that overhang buildings. Officials would also like to see parking in the rear of buildings, entrances placed towards the front of buildings so they are more visible from the street and wider setbacks from the street to allow for outdoor cafes or courtyards.

Those ideas were once again showed to community members who attended the meeting. Clarkson asked how they felt about the changes and what could be done to entice business owners to participate in sprucing up their property. Garden Club and Delmar **Progress Club representatives** said it might be nice to have its members visit businesses and provide suggestion to owners about landscaping and natural beatification techniques.

The study also calls for the beautification of the railroad overpass to act as a gateway to the town. A partnership with the school district was suggested to have a mural painted by art students on one side of the Delaware Avenue Bridge overpass, with trees and a garden placed on the other.

Construction for the third phase of the Helderberg Hudson Rail Trail is expected to be completed this fall after federal funds are provided through the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) Program totaling \$3.637 million. The third phase encompasses the Delaware Avenue Bridge, with the possibility of some funds provided to help with aesthetics. Also targeted for

upgrades would be several access points to the rail trail. which are within Bethlehem.

John Phillips, of Phillips Hardware, asked if there was a list of businesses available that members of the group could begin targeting.

Clarkson said no, but one could be put together, He also cautioned this was a project for willing participants and no business owner should feel like they have to donate or make costly improvements to their business.

"It will all work as long as we keep it voluntary and cooperative," said Clarkson. "We don't want to be in the business of telling people what they must do. We want to encourage them to visualize the things that they might do."

The meeting left off with committee members asking to look for designs from other communities they might want to incorporate into the improvements project. The next meeting will be held on April 3 at 5 p.m. and is open to the public.

or two away." Owen, who has four children, said his family grows "a substantial amount" of their vegetables and most of his family is vegetarian, so they go through "a ton" of eggs. He said keeping chickens is also an opportunity to teach his children responsibility.

"It is consistent with the residential character of the neighborhood," Owen said. "There would be minimal disturbance to the adjacent properties ... and any remedies for disturbances would be no different than a nuisance dog or a cat that is getting into your garden.'

The chickens would only be in the coop and a run located at the back of his property, which he didn't believe would be readily visible from the road.

Owen said the noise level of chickens falls around 65 to 70 decibels. but at 20 feet away the noise drops to 50 decibels, which is similar to an air conditioning unit or normal office environment. A typical dog bark at the source is 60 to 90 decibels, he said. John Marotta, who lives directly across the street from the Owens, said dogs don't bark consistently and claimed chickens make noise all day. "I, for one, am strongly against it," Marotta said. "The neighbors ... have been astir over this. ... More people are against this than are for it in the immediate area.' Marotta said he likes the Owens, but felt if they wanted to keep chickens, they should have lived

somewhere more rural. Marotta also said he is planning to sell his home in three months and is worried the chickens could affect the sale.

"If anybody on the panel could sit there and say that if you were selling your home you wouldn't be concerned with having 10 chickens in the house 50 feet from you for market value and maybe incoming perspective values,' Marotta said. "I interpret that as a negative quality to any potential sale.'

He later added that if Owen were allowed to keep chickens, it could create tensions in the neighborhood.

"Dale has to live with the community he chose to purchase a house in, and the community is not happy," Marotta said. "He is going to jeopardize relationships in the community."

Owen said he had reached out and met with surrounding neighbors about his proposal before coming before the board. He was unable to meet one neighbor face-to-face because that person was maintenance" animal is planning to submit and must be constantly cleaned up after.

"Be aware that the smell from a chicken coop is very offensive and that neighbors on either side, on a summer day with a breeze, will be exposed to the odors from the chicken coop," Kane said in the email.

Teri Conroy, an Altamont resident keeping chickens in an agricultural zone, contended cleaning a chicken coop is a simple process and doesn't require much effort or time.

Marotta said the odor of chickens would attract more predators to the neighborhood, which could potentially make it more dangerous for people.

Owen said he talked to the town animal control office about what predatory animals are in the town, knowing neighbors were concerned chickens could attract predators, and found out the most prevalent are foxes. He has already seen foxes on his property, too.

proposed changes in around a month or two. The Town Board

would have to approve any changes to the zoning code, with the committee providing recommendations.

"(The committee) has been active for a couple of years, and during that process, there have been a couple of local laws ... the zoning review committee has presented to the Town Board," Barber said. "We pulled some things and advanced them more quickly.

One local law pushed through already was simplifying the home occupation permit process and allowing business conducted within a residence.

Currently, Barber said, there are "at least some people" keeping chickens without the town's permission, and there is little the town can do to impose regulations and conduct inspections.

"They are doing it under conditions that may or may not be good, so we felt it would be better to

empower the town to go in and inspect," Barber said. "Right now, someone could have chickens in their backyard and we don't know what's going on, and the town has no legal right to enter the property."

Fowl feelings

The committee unanimously supported including chickens into the zoning code, but Barber said there are still people opposing the inclusion, including former Town Clerk Rosemary Centi.

Centi, who opposed previous chicken requests, questioned why the board was hearing Owen's request in an email sent to Barber on Feb. 26.

"I had been assured by Ken [Runion] that this was a nonissue. When it came before the Zoning Code Review Committee, I left them with quite a number of emails opposed to any consideration of chickens in residential zones," Centi said in in draft mode regarding the new zone code. Please inform the Zoning Board of my personal opposition and other residents' vehement opposition to this proposal."

In a letter the town received Feb. 27 from Centi, she cited similar concerns as those attending the recent zoning board meeting and said enforcing regulations would be "very difficult."

Barber, in a Feb. 28 email reply to a resident, said previous applications for chickens received 'positive comments" from the state and county health departments, "as long as well-recognized standards" for keeping chickens are followed.

"More than three dozen NYS municipalities, including NYC, permit the keeping of chickens, but only under enforceable conditions," Barber said in the email. "And while there has been some opposition to Guilderland taking the same course, far more residents have appeared at public

out of town.

Opponents at the meeting also worried about what, if any, odor would come from chicken excrement, with 10 hens producing around twothirds of a pound daily, according to Owen.

"Frankly, I don't want to live on a smelly property," Owen said. "I'd be the first one to say, 'This stinks, I'm going to clean it.' ... I've got my compost pile, and we've got friends who would drive to my house to clean the poop for me to take it back to their own compost pile."

Joseph Kane, of 128 Mohawk Drive, in a March 2 email to town officials, said he grew up on a 25acre farm and claimed chickens are a "highpredator-proof coop Those regulations also interpreting? The town's zoning code is in the process of being rewritten through the Zoning Review Committee and a provision slated to be included would allow chickens in residential zoning. 


"That's just the way it worked out. The double A's have the opportunity to play inter-divisional games the first two weeks, and you try to get the best match-ups possible," said VanDerzee.

That casual jam session was the start of big things for Danú. The group has since recorded seven albums and has toured North America, Europe and the Middle East.

McCarthy said the band, which consists of seven almost 40-year-olds, all came from some sort

of musical background, which he says is pretty typical in Ireland.

"Most everyone plays music in Ireland traditional Irish music. It's a great tradition," he said. "Since 6 or 7 years of age, it was our social life, our hobby, our passion. We were all playing music maybe 13 to 14 years before we made a career out of it."

McCarthy explains how traditional Irish music can be described in a variety of ways.


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

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
