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Property assessments in the mail

Bethlehem sees biggest increases among commercial properties

Bethlehem residents began receiving preliminary property reassessments at the end of March as part of the town's reassessment project, which began last year.

Acting Town Assessor

Laurie Lambertsen said letters began to be mailed out on March 26. A full assessment of town property has not been done since 2006, and officials opted to do a reassessment to make sure all sites were assessed at full market value.

"A lot has changed in the market since that time," said Lambertsen. "It comes in cycles."

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The original plan called for the town assessor's office to complete assessments for residential property, while GAR Associates was contracted to take care of the commercial and utility side. Eventually

it was decided GAR Associates would handle the whole project because of staffing issues.

Former Town Assessor Patricia McVee said at the start of the project last year that some commercial property had been assessed far below market value. The only way for those assessments to be changed was for a townwide reassessment to take place because it is illegal to reassess individual properties.

The project won't necessarily bring the town more revenue,

Trashed turf

Overflow parking tears up FMS field; repairs estimated to cost \$6k

Athletic fields at Farnsworth Middle School were torn up after more than 1,000 people turned out for a state civil service exam and

parking overflowed onto the grass.

The Guilderland Police Department was called at approximately 8:40 a.m. on Saturday, March 22, because traffic was backing up onto Route 155 and Western Avenue as drivers attempted to enter Farnsworth Middle School. Police and

Danielle Mozeleski feels like she was singing before she could speak.

The first time she sang in public was in kindergarten. Each of the students was asked to perform in a talent show, and a teacher had heard Mozeleski singing so she was recommended for a solo. The Disney movie "Aladdin" had just been released, and Mozeleski opted to sing "A Whole New World."

"She got very shy, but with the help of a fellow student, she got up there and sang," said Emilee Foster, Mozeleski's mother. "After that, she always

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It don't mean a thing if it ain't got that zing

Delmar woman's singing telegram business has given her decades of memories

Cynthia Werner was on track to obtain her medical degree when she was enticed to return to a part-time job she held while at the University at Albany.

In 1979, Werner was scouted by a college friend to become a performer for their new singing telegram company. It was a fun concept thought up by the then students, but they needed people who

could sing, dance and be lively.

"I was interviewed and had an audition right there in my friend's apartment," said Werner, originally from Florida, N.Y. "They hired me on the spot."

She worked at Zing-A-Gram as one of the company's original singers while she finished her pre-med degree at UAlbany. She quit after graduation when she began medical school and was offered a job at Albany Medical Center doing research in the Pathology Department studying heart disease.

"The work was fascinating until I was asked to destroy the lab animals at the end of our

study," said Werner. "I objected to killing the animals and stood outside the door crying. My colleagues could see how upset I was, so they told me that I could go home early."

The incident left Werner feeling uneasy about her future career. She had wanted to be a doctor to save lives, not

take them away.

It was around the same time the original owners of Zing-A-Gram had put the company up for sale. They had graduated from college and were ready to move on to a warmer climate. Werner remembered really liking the gig, and had a lot of fun singing. She also thought she could eventually add different characters, so in 1981 she quit medical school and bought Zing-A-Gram.

"I came to Albany to go to college and eventually become a doctor. Instead I ended up taking over a singing telegram service and becoming my own boss at the age of 22 years old," said Werner.

The company is now in its 35th year and based in Delmar, where Werner lives. Zing-A-Gram's official anniversary was in March.

Werner said when she first took over the company, there were only

a handful of costumes. The main performers would dress in tuxedos to deliver their "zings." When Zing-A-Gram is hired for an event, a personal song is written and performed for the honoree. A typical performance is about 40 minutes, but some can take up to an hour depending on the reaction from the audience.

There were few other costumes when Werner started out. There were some belly dancer costumes and a Santa suit, but little else. Over the years, an additional 100 costumes were added

to the list of various characters that can be hired.

Werner is able to do more than 55 different personalities herself. Some of her personal favorites are Cher, Barbra Streisand and Dolly Parton.

"I sang to someone on their deathbed as Barbra," said Werner. "A gentlemen was dying of cancer and his dream was to have Barbra Streisand come sing to him, so his family hired me. He looked at me and said 'My life's complete now.' I'm surprised at myself sometimes that I

can pull off some of these requests.”

Werner not only portrays the rich and famous, but at times has performed for or been hired by them.

Over the years Zing-A-Gram had performed for Rachel Ray, Sally Struthers and for the 50th birthday of former Gov. George Pataki. She has been hired by Destiny’s Child for an event at the Times Union Center.

“My staff and I inflated 1,500 yellow smiley face balloons that day, which successfully floated down from the rafters of the arena over the crowd as they listened to a song lyric that said ‘you always make me smile,’” said Werner. “The very next day we were asked to follow the group to Connecticut to do the same thing on less than one day’s notice.”

Most recently Werner said Bradley Cooper hired Zing-A-Gram when he was in the area filming “Place Beyond the Pines.”

“Bradley Cooper called me and had me send an apology for a cast member because he accidentally hit him when filming,” said Werner. “He hit the guy so hard, he knocked him unconscious, and they needed to call an ambulance. I was hired as a singing nurse, and I sang an apology song.”

Werner has since grown Zing-A-Gram to be a full-service special event company. The company has planned major events during the track season and was recently hired by HBO for a local event for employees of Time Warner Cable. She also has a full repertoire of performers to choose from, including magicians, jugglers, fire eaters and stilt walkers.

“It was really just a natural transition for us,” said Werner. “People would call looking

for different acts and entertainment, so I figured why not have it all in one place?”

Werner said that although she never became a doctor, she works doctor’s hours.

“I have no life, but this

job had brought me some amazing memories,” said Werner.

Her main regret is losing the time she could have spent with her own loved ones. Werner said she’s shared great experiences with other

people’s families, but she’s missed some special occasions with her own. She’s also continued with the company through hard financial times because it’s what she loves to do.

“I don’t know if it’s the

economy or the times we live in, but people aren’t looking for singing telegrams anymore. A lot of people are also working with different types of budgets, but if it’s a job I’m interested in, I’ll take it anyway,” she said. “I just love what I do. “

Police: G'land educator took more than \$100k

District places teacher on paid administrative leave

A math teacher at Farnsworth Middle School allegedly stole more than \$100,000 from the Guilderland Teachers' Association, according to police.

The Guilderland Central School District placed Brenda McClaine on paid administrative leave the morning after the Guilderland Police Department arrested her on Thursday, March 27, for allegedly stealing \$100,382.50 in member dues from the district teachers union. McClaine, 39, of 37 Armstrong Circle in Altamont, was charged with grand larceny in the second degree, a felony.

McClaine served as treasurer for the GTA during the 2012-13 school year. Police allege she stole the union funds between August 2012 and October of last year.

"This is an unfortunate episode in our long history of the union," GTA President Maceo Dubose said. "We put some stronger financial controls in place, and we are continuing to do so."

Dubose said the union's executive board appointed a new treasurer soon after McClaine resigned.

Guilderland officials said McClaine has been at the school district since 1999 and most recently

taught math at the middle school. She worked with approximately 70 students in grades 6, 7 and 8 in an Academic Intervention Services classroom setting. Shortly after police released evidence, she was reassigned to the district office.

"This is an incredibly unfortunate situation for everyone involved," Guilderland Superintendent of Schools Marie Wiles said in a statement. "However, as educators, our primary focus needs to remain on what's most important, and that is educating the nearly 5,000 students who come through our doors each and every day."

Dubose echoed Wiles and said the union does not want the incident to distract from educating children.

"Our teachers do a great job, and we are focused on helping kids," Dubose said.

A certified substitute math teacher has been covering McClaine's classroom duties since she was reassigned and "will continue to do so for the foreseeable future," the district said in a statement.

The GTA is the district's largest bargaining group and covers around 450 staff members, including teachers, social workers, school counselors, psychologists, nurses and others.

District officials stressed McClaine has not been accused of stealing school funds and the charges are tied to her role in the union.

McClaine was arraigned in Guilderland Town Court and released on \$15,000 bail.

Guilderland man guilty of burglary and arson

A Guilderland man has pleaded guilty to burglarizing two Albany businesses and setting an abandoned building ablaze.

Matthew C. Woelfersheim, 37, of Guilderland, pleaded guilty to arson in the third degree and two counts of burglary in the third degree, both felonies, before Judge Stephen Herrick in Albany County Court on Friday, March 21, according to county District Attorney David Soares.

Woelfersheim illegally entered a business on West Street in Albany between July 25 and Sept. 1, 2012, and stole more than \$1,000. He also entered a business on Watervliet Avenue in Albany on Aug. 28 and 31 of last year and stole money both times.

He also intentionally set an abandoned building ablaze on Sept. 30 of last year at 3400-10 Carman Road. Police said the fire "totally destroyed" the building. The fire also spread from the unoccupied building and damaged a neighbor's garage and vehicle, according to the District Attorney's Office.

Woelfersheim will be sentenced to serve two to six years for each burglary charge, which will be served consecutively and total four to 12 years in State Prison, according to the District Attorney's Office.

He also faces a concurrent sentence of four to 12 years in State prison for the arson charge when sentenced on May 9.

Woelfersheim remains in custody at the Albany County jail without bail to await sentencing.

Deputy Chief Assistant District Attorney Cheryl Fowler is prosecuting the case.

Bethlehem police arrest third Golden Town assailant

Bethlehem Police detectives arrested Saihing Chan, 20, of Brooklyn, on Thursday, March 27, on identity theft charges. Bethlehem police, as well as the New York State Police, Homeland Security and U. S. Secret Service executed a search warrant at the Golden Town Buffet on Route 9W in Glenmont, after an investigation determined that credit cards were being skimmed at that location. The ongoing investigation determined that Chan allegedly was involved on numerous occasions in using counterfeit credit cards with the identities of individuals whose credit cards were skimmed at the business. Police said Chan allegedly was the primary user of these fraudulent cards and was involved in using these cards at multiple locations for the purchase of merchandise, gift cards and expensive perfumes. Chan was arrested by Bethlehem detectives, with the assistance of the New York State Police Troop NYC Manhattan Criminal Squad. The investigation leading up to the arrest was further assisted by the FBI in Albany and Manhattan.

Chan was arraigned in the Town of Bethlehem Court, by the Honorable

Judge Andrew Kirby. He was arraigned on six felony counts of identity theft in the first degree, two felony counts of criminal possession of forged instrument in the second degree, felony grand larceny in the third degree, felony scheme to defraud in the first degree, as well as a felony count of identity theft in the second degree.

Police said the investigation also determined that Chan is currently wanted in Somerset County, N.J., on a charge of fraudulent use of a credit card. As a result of this, Chan was also charged as a fugitive from justice. He was remanded to the Albany County Correctional Facility without bail. He was scheduled to return to the Town of Bethlehem Court on April 1 at 4 p.m. for a preliminary hearing. Additional charges in the Town of Bethlehem and surrounding jurisdictions are pending.

With arrest of Chan, police said all subjects who were responsible for using the counterfeit cards of the victims of the Golden Town Buffet have now been arrested. Also arrested were Pheng Sathongoth, 52, and Bao Hua Liu, 51, both of Manhattan. The investigation into this case continues with multiple federal and out of state law enforcement agencies.

• Guilderland police arrested Brett Arron Scelzi, 22, of 1 Deer Path Drive in Albany, around 4:35 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 7, and charged him with criminal contempt in the

first degree, a felony, and aggravated harassment in the second degree. Police arrested Scelzi at his place of employment on a signed complaint.

• Guilderland police arrested Anthony J. Fenner, 25, of 444 Clinton Ave., second floor, in Albany, around 7:10 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 20, and charged him with grand larceny in the fourth degree, a felony. Fenner was arrested on a warrant issued Jan. 30 for allegedly stealing a credit card at his place of employment.

• Guilderland police arrested Leah Pamela, 23, of 461 Route 146, A 311, in Guilderland Center, at 4:50 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 6, on the strength of a bench warrant from Nov. 29, 2012, on the charges of DWI, drinking alcohol in a vehicle on a highway, aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle in the third degree, unlicensed driver operating a motor vehicle, failing to obey a traffic device and her vehicle lights not meeting standards.

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AN OPEN LETTER TO THE BETHLEHEM TOWN BOARD

March 31, 2014

Supervisor John Clarkson and Town Board Members
Joanne Dawson, Jeff Kuhn, Bill Reinhardt, and Julie Sasso:

After a long winter, in what seems like a re-enactment of Ground Hog's Day, residents of our town emerged from hibernation last week only to find our doorsteps overcast by some very large tax re-assessments that arrived in the mail. The message for many was clear, expect a long, long tax-winter here in Bethlehem.

Like the proverbial ground hog we humans had a long winter to contemplate what "Assessment Day" might bring. The town's re-assessment process began two years ago when Supervisor Clarkson thought, in the interest of "fairness", that it was time to re-allocate the property tax burden. What we found out last week was that the results were not only unfair but also created a host of seemingly unintended consequences.

First and foremost this re-assessment has not delivered "fairness". New property values place an increased burden on those who can least afford to pay with the effect of pricing home ownership beyond the reach of families and the elderly who live their lives in, and for, Bethlehem. From a policy standpoint, raising taxes on farmland and open spaces (some by as much as 522%) will force landowners to "sell" in what will quickly become a buyer's market: most likely to developers who have no vested interest in maintaining our culture or our community. Finally, in a business environment where our town is actually losing its commercial tax base, the new allocation imposes new costs on the tax-paying business owners who are already hobbled by Bethlehem IDA give-away's and the Governor's "Tax Free NY" trickery.

Supervisor Clarkson was entirely correct when on March 26th he said assessing was an "inexact science". And yet the result of his \$300,000 re-assessment is no more precise while it imposes a greater burden on the people and businesses who are the lifeblood of our Town. Adding insult to injury, the hand-off to an external consulting firm demonstrates once again a disregard for the concerns and sensibilities of town residents.

As with any plan, there is risk in the “unintended consequences”. I strongly urge you, our elected representatives, to immediately address those consequences and put this genie back in its bottle. It’s time to focus on making our town more financially secure and affordable by promoting business development and relieving families, and the elderly, of what-has-become an excessive tax burden.

A perfect storm of miscommunication

Cars and warm temperatures may have led to the damage done to a Farnsworth Middle School athletic field, but the list of who is culpable for what took place Saturday, March 22, extends to the New York State Department of Civil Service and the Guilderland Central School District.

As has been widely reported over the past 10 days, the Farnsworth field was torn up when people parked on it to take state civil service exams at the school. They were directed onto the field by a Guilderland police officer to prevent a larger public safety hazard. However, when the field thawed out in the warm air during the afternoon hours, it became a soft, muddy mess that trapped some vehicles and forced others to dig into the turf in order to get out.

The police shouldn't be faulted in this matter. They were trying to mitigate a situation created by a miscommunication between the Department of Civil Service and school district officials over the number of people scheduled to take the tests.

Civil service officials told the district they anticipated 1,000 people total, but they failed to indicate that

the number was per session, not for the entire weekend. District officials believed that was the total number of people scheduled to arrive for each of the two tests during the two-day period, or roughly 500 people per session. Since Farnsworth's parking lot can handle up to 500 vehicles, school officials gave the green light.

Obviously, both sides are at fault here because neither civil service nor school district officials felt it was necessary to be absolutely clear on their numbers. Civil service officials should have made certain the school district understood that there would be 1,000 test takers arriving at Farnsworth for each session, and the district should have made certain that civil service understood the absolute parking lot limit was 500 vehicles. And even if only 500 people were going to show up per session, both sides should have known the importance of having a traffic control officer on hand to keep the cars flowing.

Thankfully, civil service officials have been quick to act. Commissioner Jerry Boone met with Guilderland Superintendent Dr. Marie Wiles on March 25—three days after the incident—to offer the department's apologies

and work out a reimbursement agreement to allow the field to be fixed without the district having to bear the full expense. It was not only the right thing to do, but also the only thing to do given that civil service rented out the building and its grounds. When damage is done to any property being rented out for the day, it's the renter's responsibility to foot the repair bill.

Even though civil service is taking responsibility for what took place at Farnsworth, the school district also must learn from this incident. If it is going to continue to rent out its facilities for non school-related events, it has to know exactly what it's getting itself into every time and let those organizations know what those facilities can comfortably handle. It cannot make any assumptions that outside organizations will automatically understand the rental terms or will treat the facilities the right way.

Ultimately, it was a perfect storm of miscommunication that left a Farnsworth Middle School athletic field unusable for the spring. We can only hope the lessons learned from this incident will prevent it from happening again.

This week, we all received a letter from our town government informing us of our new real property tax assessments. A private, independent consultant was hired to do a complete, impartial assessment of all residential and commercial properties in town. The goal was to accurately reflect property values and provide a more equitable basis on which school, town and county taxes can be levied.

The results were interesting, if not alarming. Many residents saw significant increases in their assessments, which will be reflected in much higher taxes starting this fall unless successfully appealed. What is very disturbing is how the new tax rolls

play favorites, rewarding incumbent office holders at the expense of nearly all of us citizens
In my circumstance, my assessment increased \$25,600, amounting to an 8.3% increase.
This is in sharp contrast to nearly all of our six town-wide elected officeholders. Their assessment increases were: Supervisor Clarkson (0%), Councilman Reinhardt (0%), Councilwoman Dawson (0%), newly-elected Superintendent of Highways Meredith (0%), Councilman Kuhn (9%), and Councilwoman Sasso (3%). Does elective office give you the privilege of not paying your fair share? How do these assessments compare with yours?
At the very least, this begs the question, how fair was this reassessment? Is it a mere coincidence that

those in power stand to benefit, while the rest of us pay the price? We all are willing to pay our fair share, but does this reassessment sound like it was fair?
Beyond that, the bigger question is how can people afford to live in a town that is perpetually raising taxes? In the past two years, town taxes alone increased 8% and 2% respectively, and for each of the next three years are projected to rise 2%, the maximum under the state tax cap 2%. With higher assessments and resulting tax increases, how is this going to impact your budget? And when is enough, enough? This is one more example of the deaf ear of our town board.
In past years, we've gotten good services for our tax dollars. One can

hardly claim that this year, driving through town on our pothole riddled streets. You can't even drive within the vicinity of town hall, without risking a blown tire or an accident avoiding potholes.
The answer "Our hands are tied, those are state roads" is hardly satisfactory or befitting the trust we placed in our elected officials. It's unconscionable that we're going to be hit with higher taxes as a result of this assessment, at a time that even basic town services aren't being provided.
I encourage town resident to do their homework, contest their assessments and demand fair and reasonable treatment from town hall.

Highlights from a half-century ago

From *The Spotlight*, April 2, 1964:
The National Aeronautics and Space Administration Spacemobile and two teacher-lecturers will move into the Albany area from Aug. 10 through Aug. 28 as part of the Heldeberg Workshop's "Adventure in Learning."
In an announcement from NASA Headquarters in Washington, D.C., Mr. John Sims, Chief of the Spacemobile Services Branch, office of Educational Programs and Services, said, "This will be a pilot program, the first time that NASA has attempted working with elementary and high school students for a prolonged period of time."
Sims also said that he was singularly impressed by the desire of the Heldeberg Workshop to seek the best of specialized teaching talent for the students of the Capital District, and that this was the primary factor in the election of the Voorheesville program for the experimental classes.
Mr. Frank Lucarelli, a native of Schenectady and formerly of the Scotia-Glenville school system, will be one of the teachers assigned by NASA to teach a class in space science to elementary students during the August program.
Lucarelli is no stranger to the Heldeberg Workshop, having headed the science staff for two summers. Since joining NASA, he has taught and lectured throughout Italy and Austria, as well as presented the nation's space program in over 500 schools in the United States.

The list of 75 public and 75 private institutions appears in the book “The Best Value Colleges: The 150 Best-Buy Schools and What It Takes to Get In,” published by Random House and the *Princeton Review*, as well as on *USA Today’s* website at bestvaluecolleges.usatoday.com.

“SUNY Oswego is an outstanding college and value for our students, and it is particularly rewarding when a reputable source such as the *Princeton Review* agrees,” said Dan Griffin, director of admissions at Oswego.

“It speaks to our commitment to our students’ education, their development and the amazing variety of in-demand majors and experiences we offer. Particularly as higher education costs seem to escalate each year, to be recognized as a ‘Best Value’ means a lot to our students and their families,” he said.

Based on cost and other data for 2013-14 and student interviews, the book’s report on SUNY Oswego includes a “bottom line” section quoting one student who said the college provides “a great education for the money” and citing the Oswego Guarantee.

hands-on training for our students and alumni,” said MVCC President Randall J. VanWagoner, Ph.D.

With the demand for new maintenance technicians expected to be 650,000 worldwide through 2026, with an average starting salary of \$40,000, MVCC has graduates working in New Zealand, Australia, the Caribbean as well as throughout North America.

Many of those graduates find the best opportunities locally, right down the flightline from MVCC's Hangar Road facility. The region's largest aviation companies are located just down the street from MVCC's Aviation Center. MidAir USA and AVRS are seeking to hire more than 100 mechanics in the next two years and have been providing MVCC's students with paid, part-time positions while they are still students. This gives the students hands-on experience and provides insight into the industry that they wouldn't get otherwise.

MVCC has arranged several cooperative ventures with BOCES (Boards of Cooperative Educational Services) across the state to connect high school age students with career opportunities in aviation maintenance. The most recent collaborative effort is with Fulton-Hamilton-Otsego BOCES, which is adding an aviation maintenance program to its curriculum in September.

To support this relationship, MVCC provided Model FP-101 aircraft, which will be used for lab instruction. This aircraft is a “kit built, heavy ultra light” without the en-

gine in instrument panel. MVCC is also providing a Lycoming engine on long-term loan and working with BOCES on an aviation-oriented goal that makes the curriculum credit bearing in the College's aircraft maintenance program.

“There is a need the area for aircraft mechanics and we offer our students the opportunity to get into the industry,” said Constantini, Director of the Airframe and Powerplant Technology program.

MVCC is also working closely with the U.S. Army on training technicians for the FAA exam in preparation for civilian life. The college is offering an 80-hour review course for soldiers from Fort Drum through the Center for Corporate and Community Education. Since May 2012, for two weeks each month, 10 soldiers spend 40 hours weekly with MVCC's instructors at the Aviation Center. This program is certified through the Veterans Administration and soldiers can use their GI benefits to cover expenses. The FAA examination is done on site in Rome.

There are other expectations for regional A&P career opportunities as Griffiss Business and Technology Park was named recently as one of six North American test sites for drone development. Research and development of domestic drone prototypes and FAA certification is expected to be up and running within the next six months.

“This is a whole new industry, and we at MVCC are just getting involved.

We don't know what that training will consist of because it is still emerging, but we are looking forward to providing highly trained personnel for this work,” said Constantini.

MVCC's Airframe and Powerplant Technology program is a 12-month, 40-hour per-week schedule that leads to a one-year MVCC certificate and readiness for the FAA certification exam. There are three sessions beginning each year (Jan. 2, April 30, Aug. 27) with class size limited to 24 students. To learn more about this program, call the MVCC Admissions Office at 792-5354.

loved being on stage.”

Mozeleski, who now might be better recognized as Dani Moz, is one of 32 contestants left competing on this season of NBC’s The Voice. The Bethlehem native said the experience so far has been surreal.

“They contacted me, and I never thought in my wildest dreams something like that would happen,” said Mozeleski.

At Bethlehem High School, Mozeleski was in chorus and tried out for all the school musicals. She also played saxophone in the band and took piano lessons since second grade. One year, she won the area’s Albany Idol competition, and she later placed second in the local Capital Region’s Got Talent competition in Troy.

“I wasn’t that big into sports,” said Mozeleski, who said she believes her talents come from her father’s side of the family. “Every free second I had was dedicated to music.”

When she graduated from high school, she went on to Marist College, but chose a major in communications. While there, she joined the Marist Singers ensemble group, but for the most part, music took a backseat to her education. If she did have spare time, she took the opportunity to begin writing some of her own lyrics.

“It was a good time because I was going through break-ups and new relationships,” said Mozeleski, 26.

After graduating, Mozeleski

Her first audition was in New York City in late 2012. She had a private audition and then waited months to be contacted again. During that time, she had packed her bags and moved to L.A. to pursue her music career. She was eventually contacted again, this time auditioning for an executive producer of the show.

Each time the show films, Mozeleski has had to take weeks off from her job at a public relations firm in Los Angeles.

Back home, Foster said her daughter has her own small fan club cheering her on. So far, Foster has been able to be with Mozeleski each time she’s filmed for the show.

“We’re just so proud of her and glad everything is moving in the right direction,” said Foster.

Guilderland school district officials described the incident as a public safety issue. In the scramble to park vehicles and clear up roadways, though, athletic fields at the school were ruined when people left after the test.

G u i l d e r l a n d Superintendent of Schools Marie Wiles estimated repairing the fields would cost around \$6,000, which is also how much the state paid to hold the tests at the school.

“From everything I heard, it was a disaster,” Wiles said.

Capt. Curtis Cox said police, upon arrival, directed traffic into the school and onto the fields.

“The field was authorized by an employee of the school district. We believed at that time of the day, the ground was frozen,” Cox said. “Our intent down there was to get the traffic cleared up ... so it is a safe environment.”

As the day went on, the frozen fields thawed and people taking the test were forced to drive off the wet ground, which resulted in deep tire tracks through the muddy surface.

“I am not sure who directed to park them on the field, but, in fact, they had to,” Wiles said. “I don’t

think there was a choice. If we are going to make a choice between a public safety issue and the field ... it would have been horrible if someone got hurt.”

District officials were under the impression 1,000 people would be coming to the two scheduled testing times on Saturday, with 500 people attending each testing session. Another two rounds of tests were scheduled for the following day but were canceled because of the overflow problem.

The state Department of Civil Service wrote 1,000 people would be coming on the form, Wiles said, but it didn’t specify if the figure was per session or the whole day. After the morning session, the same number of people turned out for the afternoon session, she said. The parking lot has approximately 500 spaces.

“If we knew that 1,000 people were coming for each session, we probably would have said we can’t do it at the middle school and may have suggested the high school, Wiles said.

Ed Walsh, spokesman for the Department of Civil Service, said state officials thought the turnout was clearly identified before the event.

“We have to be more diligent that the whole school and us are on the same page in regards

to volume,” Walsh said. “We are reviewing ... our process, and the goal is obviously to make sure we don’t have any other misunderstandings of this type in the future.”

For the most recent exam, Walsh said, tests were held at more than 20 locations statewide and there were no other issues. He also said that a similar incident has not previously occurred.

J e r r y B o o n e , commissioner for the state Department of Civil Service, visited the fields located in front of the middle school on Tuesday, March 25. Boone also met with Wiles to explain the process for presenting a claim to the state to be reimbursed for field repairs.

“We hope to start the repairs immediately,” Wiles said Friday, March 28. “We are just waiting now for the weather to

cooperate.”

Repairing the fields will likely take a couple days of labor, Wiles said, but the extensive damage on the four acres will result in the affected land not being used during the spring season. Wiles said the fields might still be closed during the fall sports season, too.

The damaged fields are primarily used for lacrosse and soccer, along with physical education classes. The district plans to move activities on the field to either the back or side fields at the school.

“We are going to go ahead and make the repairs right away, and hopefully we get reimbursed for all of our costs,” Wiles said.

Some homeowners near the school also claimed to have sustained lawn damage from the incident. Wiles knew one family called the district about damage and others had

reached out through social networks or email.

The district posted a link on its website, www.guilderlandschools.org, with information on how homeowners could file a claim regarding the incident.

The district did hold a state exam at the school

on March 8, but only around 460 people turned out. Wiles expressed reservation over the district hosting another state exam.

“I don’t know,” she said. “Right now, I would lean against it. At the moment we are not keen on it.”

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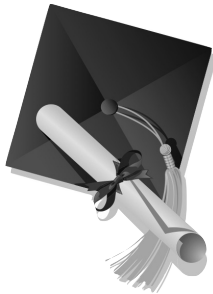

but will likely shift some of what residents are paying onto commercial property owners.

According to GAR Associates, the total taxable value of town properties will go up an average of 10 percent. Commercial property will, on average, see an assessment increase of 18 percent, residential property will see an increase of about 6 percent.

In recent days, some residents have said the reassessment project is not being done fairly.

Bethlehem Republican Chairman Fred DiMaggio said he didn’t think the reassessment was needed because most property was already evaluated at 100 percent, and some areas of town may have been assessed differently.

“Not far behind will be tax increases,” he said. “The town board is tone deaf to what taxpayers are facing in Bethlehem. We are all willing to pay our fair share, but what is fair?”

Lambertsen said information was not yet available to identify trends within the town to see which areas decreased or increased the most. Property owners could see a change in their assessment because of changes in the real estate market, or because they made additions or were

originally assessed low and “got a good deal.”

“Some don’t like to question their assessment or go through the grievance process so their assessment might be thrown out of whack,” said Lambertsen.

Supervisor John Clarkson said none of the assessment work was influenced by him or anyone else on the town’s staff.

“The sole decision the (town) made was, we wanted a reassessment of property that was fair, and we wanted to make sure it was something we could keep up with in the future.”

The supervisor said the hope is this project will be the start of more frequent reassessments. The goal is to do an assessment every four years.

Although there will most likely be an increase in the town’s tax levy, Clarkson said many who own residential property should see their tax rate decrease or stay the same. He also predicted about a 1.5 percent levy increase next year, which is below the state’s tax cap.

“But a lot of times, the town’s tax base will increase, and then the tax rate will go down,” said Lambertsen.

This is what Clarkson predicts will happen.

“Even if a person’s assessment increased by 5 percent, they will be paying a lesser share of the burden and should

see their taxes decrease,” he said.

GAR Associates Project Manager David Barnett said two public workshops will be held, and residents looking for additional help understanding the assessment can call the toll-free hotline at 1-866-910-1776. For those who wish to challenge their assessment, informal reviews will be held through April, with the formal grievance date set for Friday, May 27.

Barnett said the preliminary assessments also don’t include any exemptions residents might have. All changes during the informal review period are binding if the property owner is happy with the change. If not, they can grieve their assessment, and if they are still unhappy, continue on through litigation.

The final assessment will be filed on July 1.

The new assessments will first be used to determine taxes this August for the 2014-15 school year, and then for the 2015 town taxes in January.

“We’re never going to get it perfectly accurate for every house, but we’re trying to get there,” said Clarkson.

Parents express concerns over cuts, increasing classroom size

More than 100 people turned out to the Voorheesville school district’s budget forum on Monday, March 24, and several parents expressed an overarching fear the community was losing its distinguishing characteristics.

Voorheesville Central School District is facing a budget gap of around \$320,000 to stay within its state-mandated tax cap. The gap does not include any additional state aid proposed to be included in the state budget, which was not adopted before The Spotlight went to press Monday, March 31. Voorheesville’s proposed 2014-15 budget totals nearly \$22.9 million, which increases spending by 1.45 percent, or around \$327,500. District enrollment has also gradually declined from 1,227 in the 2008-09 school year to 1,173 this school year.

The district’s budget presentation on March 10 had the Board of Education looking to cut around \$418,000, but they made adjustments outside of staffing. The new reductions cut about \$97,500 from the gap through reducing supplies and contracted services, decreasing health and dental insurance premiums, reducing supplied and contracted instructional services, and cutting \$7,500 from the athletic program.

Board President Timothy Blow said the community budget forum

was primarily to receive feedback and input from the community on the proposal. The meeting lasted around two hours after an initial budget presentation.

“Our goal tonight is not to react, respond or make a decision tonight. Our primary purpose is to listen,” Blow said. “I don’t want to leave the impression that this doesn’t mean anything; it means a lot, but there is a process we are going through.”

Blow also stressed the budget is not finalized yet, with a lot depending on how much state aid the district receives. He said the district prefers to predict state aid conservatively to be ready for the “worst case scenario.”

“Last year, we went through a series of versions where things keep getting added back to the line items because it (state aid) ended up being more than we originally anticipated,” Blow said.

Julie Reynolds, who is the parent of a kindergartener and fourth-grader in the district, said the district’s focus on “special” areas is what has made it positively stand out. Reynolds said she and her husband moved back to Voorheesville three years ago partially because of the school district.

“I would like to argue it is not our sports teams or excellence in the core subject areas, but that in a small community like ours we have something that makes us special,” Reynolds said. “Science, music, computer and arts are given importance in the elementary school. ... I believe these priorities enrich our community as a whole.”

Reynolds said she applauded the district for

not eroding special areas during prior budget years, but urged board members to find other ways to close the gap.

Several parents of third-grade students were concerned next school year there would be one section reduced, which would increase class sizes to an average of 26 students per class in fourth grade. There are 104 students in the grade level with five sections currently. Eliminating the section, results in a savings of around \$69,000.

There were also a couple parents claiming the class has a higher level of special needs students, who would be negatively affected in a larger class size.

Kristen Reno, principal of an elementary school in Chatham, said class size “absolutely matters,” and 26 students would be too

many for one classroom. “The love of education is fostered in the elementary school, and with the larger class sizes that becomes very difficult,” Reno said, who has a first-grader in the district.

Another contentious proposal was the district phasing out French classes, which would leave Spanish as the only foreign language taught. All students currently taking French would be allowed to continue studying the language.

Winnie Scherer said French is the 10th most commonly spoken language in the world and is spoken by our closest international neighbors in Quebec.

“In an increasing connected world, knowledge of a foreign language is becoming increasingly important,” Scherer said. “When I think about why French is important, I think of my daughter who found her strength in foreign languages in the sixth grade when she took an after-school Chinese class.”

Scherer said the district “cannot afford” to shrink its foreign language program to only one option.

Voorheesville Teachers Association President Kathy Fiero, a remedial math teacher at the

elementary school, said the union has believed the process could have been more collaborative.

Fiero added there could be potential savings through reorganization of the district office following the recent resignation of Assistant Superintendent for Business Gregory Diefenbach. Fiero also said Superintendent of Schools Teresa Thayer Snyder has expressed she may retire in “the near future.”

“It may be an opportunity to look at how we structure our district office administration, and I would like to ask that some consideration be given to that,” Fiero said. “I would hate to see us sort of have a knee-jerk reaction that we have to fill this position and then a year or two down the road are looking to go in a different direction.”

Snyder said crafting the budget has been a “truly painful and grueling task.” Blow added there are “no easy answers” to determining the budget.

“If anyone has any creative options or creative suggestions or thoughts whatsoever please do not hesitate to bring them forward,” Blow said. “It may seem stupid, but if we don’t hear them, it is not something we can consider.”

Siena stomps out violence against women

Awareness event culminates with dance

On Valentine's Day, activists around the world participated in an event called One Billion Rising for Justice, which was created to raise awareness about violence against women. Due to inclement weather, Siena had to reschedule theirs.

Weather nearly scuttled the event a second time as organizers quickly scrambled to bring the outdoor gathering inside, and on Friday, March 28, students, faculty, dance groups and News Channel 13 anchor Elaine Houston gathered in the Sarazen Student Union at Siena College to participate in the global initiative that started last year.

"Our mission is to promote a safer campus. We're excited this year's event is bigger than last year's. That means we're making progress. We're excited to get more of the community involved. Each year, we hope to make it bigger," said Olivia Emigh, a junior at Siena and member of PEEP's (Peer Education and Empowerment Program).

The PEEP's go to freshmen classes and tell students what

signs to look for to help identify abusive relationships, how to recognize situations at a party where someone may need help and how to change situations to prevent bad things from happening to other students.

"It's wonderful that we are all here so that we can let our voices be heard," said Houston. "If you think this is something that only affects women and girls, you would be wrong because it affects men as well. You are the people that are primarily the ones that can help us stop this because you, as men, can go talk to other men and ask them to respect women ... I'm very happy and very hopeful to see so many men out here."

This year's event featured three dance groups and is a different way of raising awareness than picketing or demonstrating.

"When you think about raising awareness for something, you're thinking of protesting and people with signs. So, why do we choose dance? Dance is something that you can go anyplace in the world, and people love to dance and people understand dance," said Houston.

The event culminated with all three dance groups and at least 100 students participating in a dance.

The event started on

Valentine's Day 2013 as an estimated one billion people in 207 countries around the world gathered and danced to support the movement to end violence against women and girls. The movement was created after national statistics stated one out of three women will be beaten or raped in their lifetime.

This year's event was sponsored by the college's Anti Violence Task force. The group's mission is to provide collaborative programs and resources to assist the Siena College community in recognizing, reporting and preventing sexual violence, relationship violence and stalking.

Southwest Airlines donated pizza and bottled water to the event. Other organizations on the campus came together to help promote the event as well.

Houston has participated in the program at Siena since it started last year. Houston was asked to participate because she reports on education and also does documentaries on women.

"They asked me to do this, and I thought what a great thing to be a part of," said Houston.

A reason for the increase in the number of elite runners is the timing of this year's Delmar Dash. Unlike last year's race, which was the day before the Boston Marathon, Sunday's race is two weeks before the marathon. On the men's side, Terry is a past Delmar Dash champion, having won the race in 2008, while Julia, Treadway, Ricardo Estremera and Tom O'Grady have ran well at other local races leading up to Sunday's event.

Beyond the elite runners, the Delmar Dash is a showcase for the town's road racers. Knobloch said many of the participants are from Delmar, and the neighbors along the course have been known to help out at a moment's notice.

"We've had people coming out of their homes

to volunteer as course marshals," said Knobloch. "They've said, 'Let me help. I've done this before.' We're pretty fortunate that we have this support system of volunteers to help out."

Bryant Asset Protection is sponsoring the Delmar Dash, and Knobloch said its owner, Mark Bryant, has been offering he and his wife advice about operating the race when needed.

"He's been very helpful and supportive in helping us put on this race," said Knobloch. "He's a runner himself."

The Delmar Dash begins at 9 a.m. on Kenwood Avenue near Bethlehem Central Middle School and ends in the middle school parking lot. The annual Spotlight Kids' Fun Run follows the adult race.

Wily Dutch win opener

Dyer's go-ahead goal sparks Guilderland against Queensbury

Sean McConaghy wasn't certain what he'd see out of his Guilderland boys lacrosse team in Saturday's season opener against Queensbury.

What McConaghy saw, he liked.

Kevin Dyer's goal midway through the third quarter turned out to be the game winner as the Dutchmen pulled away for a 9-5 victory over the Spartans at

Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs.

"That's exactly what we hoped for to start the season," said McConaghy.

There were several questions the Dutchmen had to answer – at least partially – in the opener. Sectional finalists prepare for 2014

Guilderland seeks more than Class AA title it won against Bethlehem in 2013

The Guilderland softball team wants more than another Section II Class AA title.

"The message (to the players) is we're not happy with just being Sectional champions. We don't want to just maintain. We want to win the state title," said Guilderland coach Lou Marino.

Several teams are out to stop Guilderland from repeating, though, including the team the Lady Dutch defeated in last year's final – Bethlehem.

"We barely made it into Sectionals with a 9-7 (league) record, so you could say we pretty much snuck up on people last year," said Bethlehem coach Karen Gentile. "But over the

last four years, we've been to the finals three times and won it once (in 2011). So, we have the experience factor working for us."

Here is a closer look at what last year's Sectional finalists have entering 2014.

Guilderland

The Lady Dutch lost a key player from last year's championship team when catcher Abi Peck suffered a season-ending knee injury during the winter. That plus the graduation of Jenna Cubello and Mallory Harrigan leaves three holes in the starting lineup for Marino to fill.

Guilderland is returning several key players from last year's team, though. Position players Tori Greco, McKenzie Lozano, Doris Kane and Gabriella Marino are back, as is starting pitcher Taylor Tewksbury. Marino moves in

from the outfield to replace Peck behind the plate.

Tewksbury was one of the top Suburban Council pitchers last year with 12 victories. Torie Rathwell will make spot starts for Guilderland and play second base when she isn't pitching.

Lou Marino said the rest of Guilderland's lineup will feature sophomore and juniors who will be getting their first taste of varsity softball.

"I think what we've done is increase our team speed, and I think our defense is going to be very good," said coach Marino.

Bethlehem

The Lady Eagles are loaded with pitchers. Gentile said she has four eligible hurlers this season, led by four-year starter Meghan Sullivan and second-year veteran Emma Downing.

"It'll be challenging to get everyone the work they need and still produce a winning

team," said Gentile.

"Obviously Meg has the experience, but Emma is catching up to her in terms of experience."

Offensively, Bethlehem returns several key hitters including Sullivan, Downing, outfielder K.K. Palmerino, shortstop Carrie Maniccia and catcher Kaitlyn Rarick.

"Everyone looks different when they're hitting off a (pitching) machine ... but (the offense) looks really good," said Gentile.

Guilderland and Bethlehem must wait another week before starting their Suburban Council seasons on Wednesday, April 9. Guilderland meets defending South Division champion Colonie, while Bethlehem plays Averill Park.

"Averill Park is going to be real strong. I see us really battling Averill Park all year (for the division title)," said Marino.

Lecture illuminates historical innovation

Speaker at Spa history museum to discuss gas lighting

The Saratoga Springs History Museum, located in the Canfield Casino in Congress Park, will host “The Story of the Springfield Gas Machine: Illuminating Industry and Leisure in the Late Nineteenth and Early Twentieth Century,” a lecture that is the first program of the 2014 Alfred Z. Solomon Charitable Trust Program Series. The talk, given by Professor Donald Linebaugh, takes place Wednesday, April 15, at 7 p.m. Admission is \$5 per person, free for Members of the History Museum. Developed just after the close of the Civil War, the Springfield Gas Machine was a unique commercial and domestic gas lighting system marketed for use in homes and businesses outside the reach of a

city’s gas works. Two structures in Saratoga Springs, Spencer Trask’s Yaddo estate and the residence of George V. Watson, are known to have used the Springfield system. The self-contained unit was perfectly suited to accommodate an expanding rural and suburban U.S. landscape as middle- and upper-class American families were looking to find simplicity in the countryside without losing any modern comforts of the city. Industries, too, were looking for a means to operate more efficiently and implement longer work hours for various consumer operations. Perhaps more important, owners of the Springfield system could retain control of their light production during a time when corporations were reaping large benefits from their monopolistic hold over municipal gas

works. Linebaugh will explore the story of the Springfield gas machine from its invention through its replacement in the early twentieth century with less expensive and more accessible forms of lighting using electricity. His lecture will investigate how gas lighting was, for its time, a major innovation in domestic and commercial lighting, and it changed daily life and social behaviors in the late nineteenth century as the comforts of home became a reality for suburban and rural Americans. Linebaugh is professor and area chair of the Historic Preservation Program in the School of Architecture, Planning, and Preservation. He has also held faculty positions and managed research units at the University of Kentucky (1997-2004) and the College of

William and Mary (1988-1997). Linebaugh holds a doctorate in American Studies and Masters in Historical Archaeology from the College of William and Mary. His most recent book, “The Springfield Gas Machine: Illuminating Industry and Leisure, 1860s to 1920s,” focuses on historic lighting in the 19th century. This book, which examines the social and technical aspects of an extraordinary gasoline-powered system for lighting home and industry, was published by the University of Tennessee Press in late 2011. The Saratoga Springs History Museum is open Wednesday through Sunday, 10 a.m. through 4 p.m. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$4 for seniors and students, Children under 12 free. The cemetery was founded in 1867 as part of a rural cemetery movement. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and designated by the Hudson River Valley National Heritage Area as a site for tourism.

Grimaldi says that old cemeteries are becoming appreciated for their

cultural and historical significance. She also came up with the name for the room that opened in March 2013.

“The Living Room is a pun, it’s intended. Since it’s opening it has hosted quite a few successful events. The reason we called it the Living Room is because the dead don’t visit our cemetery; they’re just here. It’s the living that come visit the dead, and we wanted to give them another way of looking at the cemetery as a place for art and history,” said Grimaldi.

Currently on display are pictures by Richard

Endres, a former biology teacher from Albany High School. He photographs have been featured in the Conservationist and Adirondack Life Magazine. His exhibit is of photos from all over the country with pictures from the Rockies to the Adirondack Mountains.

Grimaldi selects the artists on display, and she said the room is already booked into 2015. She is currently working on booking artists for the rest of next year. Artists have heard about the room mainly by word of mouth.

“They come to me now. I don’t even have

to advertise. I get a lot of artists who are engaged in our painting program that we offer here. We have historic lectures, clear out all the furniture and have 28 people at a time here painting,” said Grimaldi.

The painting classes cost \$20 and include paints, canvas and refreshments. Grimaldi is looking to expand the program and move it outdoors when the weather gets better. There will also be an abstract art painting contest where the winning prize is \$500. For information on classes, exhibits and the contest, go to capitaldistrictcemeteries.org.

All aspects of the show, from developing the idea, casting the show, securing the rights to stage the show, choreographing, tickets, auditions and scheduling rehearsals with fellow student actors are solely the responsibility of the students. Hsia and another teacher, Sean O'Brien, are available to advise the students when needed.

"They help me with questions I have and provide their point of view," Glanton said.

But, Hsia said, it's really the students who are doing everything.

Quinones admitted Tech Valley's main focus is not the arts, but the things he is learning at the school has helped him to learn to apply his skills in more ways than one.

"We learn to be self directed at Tech Valley, so we can implement that. The teachers will give you support for whatever you want to do," he said. "If we're willing to put in the effort, they are willing to support us."

It's the school's goal to teach the students 21st century skills, among those skills are collaboration, self direction and time management. Hsia said Quinones' and Glanton's success with the production has proven they are grasping those skills well.

"I'm really impressed with what Andrew and Dan do with the musical; not only did they organize it, plan everything, direct, taking parts in the musical themselves,

contacting many different organization/companies for support, leading others to help the musical, and so much more. In the process, they set great examples of how to be leaders to others," she said.

"Mulan" isn't the first production to be produced by TVHS students. In previous years, students staged musicals such as "The Producers" and "A Very Potter Musical."

This year's production of "Mulan" will feature more than 30 students. The script is based on the popular Disney animated feature film about the legend of Fa Mulan who enters the Chinese Army to serve in her father's place despite breaking tradition and going against typical expectations.

Glanton and Quinones said when they first started at Tech Valley they would sometimes find that people didn't understand why they would choose to attend TVHS rather than their local high schools.
