

Delmar man faces child porn charges

Firefighter accused of having inappropriate online conversations with perceived youths

A firefighter in the towns of Delmar and Loudonville has been arrested after a two-week

investigation concerning alleged inappropriate communications online.

Police said Timothy M. Haverly, 32, of 28 West Poplar Drive in Delmar, had allegedly engaged in inappropriate online involvement with a person he perceived to be a 13-yearold girl. Local detectives were notified of an investigation already under way by police in Fairfax, Va.

During the two-week investigation, Haverly allegedly spoke with undercover officers in both Bethlehem and Fairfax, whom he believed to be underage girls.

Detective Sgt. Adam Hornick said police are awaiting a search warrant on Haverly's computer.

"We will be looking into if any of the images found contain local individuals," said Hornick.

Police are also investigating if Haverly possibly had physical contact with any local underage individuals.

Local drive-in asks for community's help to go digital

This could be the final year for movies on the big screen at Jericho Drivein if a new fundraising campaign is unsuccessful.

Last summer, Jericho Drive-in owners Mike and Lisa Chenette lost

their bid to win a new digital projection machine through a competition sponsored by Honda Motor Company. Drive-ins and independent movie theaters are being forced to upgrade to digital projection machines as the movie industry phases out the use of 35mm film.

'The drive-in should be open in a few weeks," said Lisa Chenette. "We did find out we will be able to get prints for this one

The Chenettes said they were glad for the community's support in the last competition, but were disappointed they didn't win.

"The drive-ins we were up against had 15,000 'likes' on their Facebook page," said Lisa Chenette. I thought we're doing great with 3,000 'likes,' but they were from towns and places where that's the only thing people can do on the weekends.'

This is the 20 year anniversary of the Chenette's ownership of the drive-in. The couple said they hope it is also not their last.

Albany Airport continues to showcase local art

New exhibit features 11 Capital District artists

A new art exhibit will be opening at the Albany international Airport, focusing on body language and human interaction featuring 11 different artists.

The exhibit titled "Body Language"—presented by the Albany International Airport Art & Culture Program — will be open for viewing through Sept. 7. The public reception will be held on Friday, April 11, from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

A statement from the Airport Art & Culture Program describes the exhibit by saying, "Without saying a word, we speak to one another through gesture, gaze and composure. More than any other subject matter in art, the body invites associations with our own sense of self. as well as our notions of other. In contrast to the tradition of aiming for a faithful likeness, the artist assembled present subjects that are not at once who they seem."

The 2,500 square foot gallery has garnered

national attention as one of the best airport art galleries in the country and took seventh place in the USA Today's 10 Best Airports. Created in 1998, the gallery has attracts roughly 300,000 visitors annually. All of the art is created by artists close to the Capital District.

"Our mission is to work with and showcase artists in the region, artists in the airports service area, which is generally within 80 to 90 miles of the area," said Kathy Greenwood, curatorial assistant for the Arts & Culture Program.

The airport generally features contemporary art, which is art that has been created in the last 50 years. The art in the current exhibit was created within the last 15 years.

"We provide a lot of written info here for people may not have a lot of experience with contemporary art," said Greenwood.

In the statement released from the airport, some of the artists and their art describe the different pieces on display. The paintings by Lin Price engage in activities where the objectives are mysterious. Darcie Abatiello, of Albany, created portraits that are based on photographs

of missing persons published since the early 20th century.

Sean Hovendick, an Army veteran that currently works at Sage College, created short, provocative videos that look at contradictions in gender politics.

The third floor exhibit is generally on display for six months before another exhibit rotates in.

"The last exhibition was 'Second Nature.' It was about the development of humans and nonmechanically engineered things — for a lack of a better term, things from nature," said Greenwood.

When exhibits are put together, they are often created to have a flow from one artist to the next, but figuring out that progression is a fluid process.

"Every exhibit design comes together differently. Some of the artists we group together by the way their works looks together," said Greenwood.

With the theme for this exhibit being "Body Language," Greenwood said she feels that it's something everyone can enjoy and understand.

"Looking at the human figure is something I think everyone can relate to and find similarities to their self in," said Greenwood.

Raid at G'land motel turns up drugs, guns


Five Albany County residents were arrested on drug charges following a police raid at a motel and the alleged sellers were armed with guns, according to police reports.

Police investigated the alleged drug tracking operation at the Western Motel, located at 2019 Western Ave. in Guilderland, for three months and made "several controlled drug purchases" at the location. There were two individuals allegedly running the operation and selling

office, according to police. A search warrant was



drugs out of the motel executed on Monday, March 31, and investigators seized more than 9 pounds of marijuana, 9.5 ounces of powdered cocaine, 6.5 grams of MDMA, a "small quantity" of hash, "several" Xanax pills and three Glock semi-automatic handguns. There was also nearly \$5,000 in cash, which police believe to be proceeds from illegal narcotic sales.

Police arrested Joshua Bojkovic, 27, of 2019 Western Ave., Guilderland; James K. Sawyer, 23, of 19 Robin Ann Lane, Westerlo; Thomas H. McLaughlin Jr., 39, of 1205 Hillside Drive, Watervliet; Jennifer McLaughlin, 39, of 1205 Hillside Drive, Watervliet: and Jack A. Evans, 19, of 508 Orchard St., Delmar.

Before executing the search warrant, police observed Jack Evans enter the motel office and leave after a few moments. Police stopped Evans a short distance away, and he was allegedly found to be in possession of 13 grams of cocaine, "several" Xanax pills and small quantity of Hash.

Shortly after police raided the motel office and were searching the area, Thomas McLaughlin arrived at the office with a backpack looking to speak with Bojkovic. Investigators allegedly found McLaughlin to be in possession of a loaded .40 caliber Glock handgun and two pounds of marijuana.

McLaughlin said his pistol permit was revoked because he is a convicted felon, but said he had never surrendered the guns since his wife has a state pistol permit.

Police executed a second search warrant at McLaughlin's home and allegedly found two additional handguns and 1.5 pounds marijuana.

Fire damages home

Local fire companies responded to a mid-day blaze on Thursday, April 3, that caused severe damage to a home at 6 Adams Place in Delmar.

Neighbors said the homeowners were spending the winter in Florida and were not at home when the fire broke out. The fire was first spotted by a woman walking her dog around 11 a.m.

Delmar Fire Chief Dan Ryan Jr. said it looked as if the fire had gone on for some time before anyone was able to call for help. Firefighters responded to the scene about 15 minutes after the initial call.

"Upon arrival, we had heavy fire on the right-hand side of the building," said Ryan.

According to Ryan, access to the home was compromised because of damage to the indoor staircase, and part of the second floor had collapsed. Fire officials used a saw to cut holes in the roof and cut a whole in the side of the home to gain access to flames in the walls.

Ryan said the cause of the fire is still being investigated. He also said the home looked to be a complete loss.

"It's up to the insurance company whether they will rehab it or tear it down,' said Ryan.

Delmar, Elsmere, Slingerlands and Selkirk fire departments all responded, with neighboring fire squads on standby.

Bojkovic was charged with criminal possession of a controlled substance in the first degree, criminal possession of a controlled substance in the third degree, criminal possession of a weapon in the third degree, all felonies, and two counts of criminally using drug paraphernalia in the second degree, a misdemeanor. Bojkovic was arraigned in the Guilderland Town Court and remanded to Albany County jail without bail.

Evans was charged with criminal possession of a controlled substance in the third degree, criminal possession of a controlled substance in the fourth degree, both felonies, two counts of criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree, two counts of criminally using drug paraphernalia in the second degree, unlawful possession of marijuana, possession of a controlled substance in a non-original container, and two vehicle traffic law violations. Evans was arraigned in Guilderland Town Court and remanded to the Albany County jail in lieu of \$10,000 bail.

Thomas McLaughlin Jr. was charged with criminal possession of a weapon in the second degree, criminal possession of a weapon in the third degree and criminal possession of marijuana in the second degree, all felonies. He was arraigned in Guilderland Town Court and remanded to Albany County jail in lieu of \$40,000 bail.

Jennifer McLaughlin was charged with criminal possession of marijuana in the second degree, a felony. She was arraigned in Watervliet City Court and released under the supervision of the Albany County Probation Department.

Sawyer was charged with two counts of criminal sale of a controlled substance in the third degree, a felony. He was arraigned in Guilderland Town Court and released under supervision of the county Probation Department.

Man guilty of heroin use prior to driving

A 27-year-old New Scotland man pleaded guilty to driving after using heroin and faces two-tosix years in state prison. This would also be served simultaneously to a one-tothree year incarceration for violating his felony probation.

Kyle Pianowski pleaded guilty to felony driving while ability impaired by drugs before Judge Thomas Breslin in Albany County Supreme Court

on Wednesday, April 2, according to county District Attorney David Soares.

Pianowski was driving on Western Avenue in Guilderland on Feb. 22 when State Police pulled him over for allegedly committing "multiple" vehicle and traffic violations. Police said Pianowski displayed several signs of drug impairment and also had multiple warrants for his arrest in Schenectady County. Police also found four envelopes of heroin, 10 hydrocodone pills and a hypodermic needle in his vehicle.

Pianowski was under the influence of heroin while driving and when arrested was on probation for a prior felony DWI conviction.

He will be sentenced on May 21, and the Court already imposed a minimum \$2,000 fine, revoked his license for at least one year and required an ignition interlock device to be installed in his vehicle for three years once released from state prison.

Drugs and guns found during traffic stop

Albany County Sheriff's deputies stopped a vehicle in the Town of Guilderland for traffic infractions and allegedly discovered a gun and drugs. Police on Wednesday, April 2, stopped Walt M. Daminger, 28, of 553 Higley Hill Road in Wilmington, Vt., and learned his driver's license was suspended. The passenger in his vehicle was Valentina M. Centra, 31, of 37 Ontario St. in Albany.

There allegedly was a loaded Smith and Wesson 9mm semi-automatic handgun and a "small quantity" of marijuana and hashish inside the vehicle, according to police.

Daminger was charged with criminal possession of a weapon in the second degree, a felony, criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree, unlawful possession of marijuana and aggravated unlicensed operation of a motor vehicle in the third degree.

Centra was charged with criminal possession of a weapon in the second degree and criminal possession of a weapon in the third degree, both felonies, and unlawful possession of marijuana.

Both were arraigned in Guilderland Town Court and remanded to county jail, with bail set at \$30,000 for Daminger and \$25,000 for Centra. Both were scheduled to reappear in Town Court on Thursday, April 3, for a preliminary hearing.

From the Editor's Desk Stakes are high in casino discussion

Town of Bethlehem officials are keeping an eye on a proposed casino near the border with Albany, and they are encouraging residents to as well.

The large-scale E23 casino proposal near Exit 23 of the Thruway and off Route 9W has generated a lot of buzz in a short time, with stakeholders in Albany like Sheriff Craig Apple and Mayor Kathy Sheehan expressing support of the multi-million-dollar project. And even though the 63,000-square-foot casino and 275room hotel complex - which could also include an indoor horse riding rink and a 40,000-square-foot indoor water park - would be completely located inside the city line, it's close enough to Bethlehem that town officials rightly want to know the impacts the casino would have inside its borders.

The swiftness with which this project has become a household name only underscores the importance of making sure everyone has a chance to weigh in, and the town is opening the floor to Bethlehem residents at the Wednesday, April 9, Town Board meeting to gauge the prevailing sentiment. Quality-of-life issues, ranging from concerns about traffic and crime, seem to be high on the list of questions residents have, and it is important to bring these issues up when the town still has a say.

Thus far, the town has been gathering information about the project and passing it along to its citizens through a page on its website. Additionally, town officials have been in touch with their counterparts in Albany to let them know they will be asking that the traffic impacts, as well as what the quality of life and economic impact on Bethlehem, be considered in future discussions.

Those are reasonable requests given the proximity of the E23 casino proposal to the town. So far, Albany officials have been willing to listen to what Bethlehem has to say, and we can only hope that, if this project moves forward, the town will continue to have a seat at the table.

We'd like to applaud the town for actively encouraging its citizens to share their feelings about the E23 casino project and keeping the information out there through the website. This allows residents to know as much about the project as the town knows, which puts everyone on the same page. In an age where political transparency is sought after, this is a positive step.

There is always the chance the E23 casino proposal will burn out as quickly as it came on the scene. The state is picking only four upstate New York sites for casinos, and there is no guarantee Albany will be one of them. But the frenzy surrounding casino development makes it even more important that those who will be affected weigh in sooner rather than later.

Letter-writer's claims are totally off base

Editor, The Spotlight:

Last week in an offensive and irresponsible letter to the editor, Fred DiMaggio essentially accused the Town of Bethlehem, including the entire Town Board, of illegal acts. While his reckless letter borders on defamation, it was unfortunately in keeping with Mr. DiMaggio's long history of false attacks. Mr. DiMaggio's willingness to debase our town's political discourse apparently knows no bounds.

DiMaggio Mr. claimed that the current reassessment project "played favorites" by 'rewarding incumbent office holders at the expense of nearly all of us citizens." What is the basis of this startling accusation? Mr. DiMaggio's charge is based solely on the fact that three of the five members of the Town Board did not receive an assessment increase, whereas Mr. DiMaggio personally received an increase of 8.3% (the assessment on his property was increased by \$25,600 to an estimated value of \$334,700 - which is not unreasonable for a 2,582-square-foot house in Slingerlands). Mr. DiMaggio's oddly selfcentered conspiracy theory ignores the fact that a majority of Bethlehem homeowners - 52% saw no increase in their preliminary assessments. Thus, the ratio of Town Board members who did not receive an assessment increase is exactly what this figure would predict.

Mr. DiMaggio's line of "reasoning" is even more ludicrous given that the other two members of the Town Board, Councilwoman Julie Sasso and myself, saw the assessments on our properties go up by more than the 8.3% increase on Mr. DiMaggio's property. The preliminary value placed on my house went up by 9%, while the assessment on the home owned by Councilwoman

Sasso increased by 70%. These facts demonstrate the patent absurdity of Mr. DiMaggio's wild charge that the reassessment "played favorites" for "incumbent office holders."

While I would prefer to ignore this kind of baseless nonsense, the fact that Mr. DiMaggio is the chairman of the Bethlehem Republican Committee and a twiceunsuccessful candidate for town-wide elected office compels this response.

Mr. DiMaggio's goal is simply to spread disinformation and foment discontent in the apparent belief that it will further his political ambitions. The current reassessment project has been discussed for years (although New York State recommends that municipalities conduct reassessments at 100% of market value once every four years, it had been eight years since Bethlehem's last full reassessment in 2006). The project was carried out by licensed and independent professionals in accordance with New York State law. And, perhaps most importantly, the reassessment will provide a substantial benefit to the vast majority of homeowners who may have been carrying an unfairly high tax burden in recent years.

An appeals process exists for those property owners who believe the reassessments of their parcels are too high. If any citizens find this review process inadequate, I urge them to communicate their concerns to the Town Board.

Like any issue confronting our town, our discussions of this reassessment process should be fact-based and true to the Town of Bethlehem's proud tradition of responsible civic discourse.

Assessment puts properties at market value

to the Bethlehem townwide reassessment. Everyone has received their reassessment notification, public awareness workshops have been held, and the informal grievance process is underway. My observation, as a town board member and as a local realtor, is that by and large, residential property owners are seeing modest or no increase in their assessed value while the assessed value of commercial and vacant land parcels have increased (and in some cases quite significantly). The total taxable value in Bethlehem, based on the new preliminary assessments, has increased by approximately 10% so the good news is that if your property assessment increased by less than 10% your share of the tax burden is likely lower than it was. The bad news is that 72% of vacant land parcels had their value increased by more than 25%.

It is standard practice for municipalities to regularly reassess all properties (residential, commercial, vacant land) so that the tax values remain in line with market value -- the price at which your property would likely sell on the open market. NYS

Editor, *The Spotlight:* recommends conducting Iamwriting in regards a reassessment every 4 years, which makes sense as market value fluctuates and without regular revaluations, property assessments can slip out of line with market value. This results in some properties bearing more of the tax burden than they should and others bearing less. In the ideal, every property would be assessed at its accurate market value and every property owner would be paying their fair share of the property tax levy.

> Bethlehem last reassessed properties in 2006 so we were overdue for a revaluation. Apparently the ball was dropped on fully assessing commercial and vacant land in past reassessments

(they weren't reassessed at all in 2006 and not fully assessed in 1998) and the result is that many are experiencing a "kick in the gut" as one land owner described it to me, because it had been so long since their properties were fully assessed. There will be a presentation at the April 9th town board meeting (6 p.m.) concerning the valuation of vacant land and I encourage interested town members to attend. If you have specific questions or comments regarding the reassessment process, you have an opportunity to voice those at the start of the meeting.

If you feel that your property is not assessed at current market value (or if you feel like the assessment is out of whack with other similar properties), you can, and should, schedule an informal review (call 1-800-910-1776 before 4/11). You are also entitled to contest your assessment by filing a written complaint on or before Grievance Day, which is May 27th. 




Frederick C. Stimmel, newly-elected president of the group, said the association would present a "factual summary of the situation in the nature of a community information briefing."

Bethlehem Central closes in on final budget plans

Proposed cuts include ending **Chinese language program**

By MARCY VELTE veltem@spotlightnews.com

Recommendations were made to cut some staffing and phase out the Chinese language program at the final budget presentation for the Bethlehem Central School District.

Assistant Superintendent for Educational Programs Jody Monroe said on Wednesday, April 2, the district could make do with some further staff reductions because of a decline in enrollment at the elementary levels. She also said it is becoming harder to find someone to teach the higher levels of the Chinese program, which is making it hard for students to obtain enough credits to graduate or take college level courses.

"At the elementary level, we are

seeing a loss of about 75 students and looking at the numbers ... we would look to see a reduction of two teachers," said Monroe.

The total proposed reductions include the loss of two elementary school teachers, with one coming from Eagle Elementary and the other coming from Glenmont. The middle school could also possibly see the loss of one full sixth-grade teacher. Smaller staffing reductions would come in the loss of what equates to partial full-time equivalent positions in art, music, physical education, foreign language, ELS and ELA. This would most like lead to a reduction is sections offered to students.

The staffing reduction would lead to a savings of \$341,000.

"We make sure kids are getting what they need to the degree possible, but with the amount of reductions we've







Since 2010, Bethlehem Central has faced the loss of 70.6 full-time equivalent positions. Monroe said this has led to larger class sizes, loss of electives and class sections. "less individualized instruction" and "increased stress on staff." She also said programs can't be added without something being taken away.

GCSD: More money, same problems

Additional state aid will be used to cover increasing BOCES costs, gap nearly unchanged

Additional state aid was included in the recently adopted state budget, but the Guilderland Central School District budget will remain essentially unchanged.

BOCES recently did an internal review of its special education programming and found the tuition being charged was insufficient to cover actual costs. The adjusted costs for programming some increasing up to 36 percent and others decreasing up to 36 percent — will cost the Guilderland school district nearly \$500.000 more than what was expected for next school year. The additional state aid the district is receiving will increase, but leaves essentially nothing to apply toward restoring programming.

Guilderland Superintendent of Schools Marie Wiles at the school board's Tuesday, April 1, meeting described the additional BOCES cost as a "significant" amount.

"It came at a time that is pretty difficult since we had already made our

is this is something that at this point there really isn't anything we can do about it," Wiles said.

She said the district was first notified about the tuition increase on March 14, which led administrators to evaluate what students were being sent to what programs.

Wiles in a statement said the district was thankful for the additional funds, but the 2014-15 budget "will not change significantly." Without the additional \$500,000, the district would have been forced to cut deeper into programming.

"In that sense, we are very fortunate," Wiles said.

Guilderland school officials said the district would receive an increase of almost \$1.04 million, or 4.9 percent, in overall state aid compared to this school year.

School board member Christine Hayes asked Wiles why BOCES would choose to do unexpected increase right before districts adopted a budget.

"It seems like a big inconvenience for everybody," Hayes said.

Wiles said the "timing is unfortunate" and she believed the timing of the increase was tied to when the problem was noticed. "They certainly

plans, but the bottom line couldn't go another year dramatically underfunding programs," Wiles said. "I don't know what the catalyst was to begin the process when they did."

BOCES enrollment has dropped, according to Wiles, which increased the costs per students. She added staff has also been reduced and, similar to school districts, the least senior staff are laid off first.

"You have fewer staff, but they are your most expensive staff because they are higher on the salary scale," Wiles said.

Board Vice President Allan Simpson questioned what other options the district has instead of using BOCES.

"I don't think we can afford to take someone else's extra cost especially when we are seeing shrinking revenues, Simpson said. "There has got to be another solution."

Wiles said she proposed to area superintendents that the region have a "meaningful conversation" about programming available to students with disabilities.

"I think what we are experiencing in Guilderland is not atypical," Wiles said. "We have more students with complexities who are not good fits for the programs that we have. I think BOCES is in a similar type of position."



primary topic discussed was how private tutors using space at the library has led to some issues.

Wiles' husband, Tim Wiles, is also the director of the Guilderland library.

Marie Wiles said that during the last school year, the district started its "PM school," because the library was "truly inundated" with tutors working with students who were suspended from school. All of those students needing oneon-one tutoring would come to the library.

"I know it created an issue for (the library), and it was not particularly effective for us, and that had nothing to do with the library," Wiles said. "It was very hard to get the appropriate work to the kid in time so that he or she could do it. We'd find days and days going by when it just didn't happen."

The PM school, which is being held this year at Pine Bush Elementary School, was created to correct the problem, and has proven effective, according to Wiles. She said it is also a costeffective solution with high school teachers signing up to work with kids at the PM school.

Wiles did acknowledge that it

didn't solve all of the problems. "I know that there are still tutoring issues at the library," Wiles said.

Guilderland Library Board of Trustees member Judith Kahn said the library changed its tutoring policy last spring. Previously, private tutors were allowed to sit anywhere in the library, but some patrons complained the tutor and student talking were disturbing.

At first, tutors were designated to one of the libraries larger rooms, but the procedure eventually changed to allow for more leeway.

Tim Wiles said the preferred location for tutoring is in the Guilderland Room, which is a larger room accommodating three to four tutors at a time. When that room is filled, a tutor can reserve one of three individual study rooms. If all those rooms are filled, tutors are allowed in the general area but are asked to try to be quiet to not disturb other patrons.

"The people who are affected by our tutoring policy ... we have gotten a lot of flak from people who are not happy," Kahn said. "The public had this sense of entitlement."

Tim Wiles said he had just talked to a parent earlier that day about the library's tutoring procedures. He acknowledged tutoring still happens all over the library, even though rooms are designated for the activity.

"Tutors are usually paid, so it raises the issue for us if you can run your tutoring business here, why can't you run your financial planning business here, or your insurance sales business here ... or whatever it is that you would want to do," Tim Wiles said. "People would be logically perfectly within their rights."

He said the library's policy is if there are people who appear to be in a tutoring relationship, they are made aware study rooms could be reserved.

"We try to get them into a quieter spot if they are bothering their neighbors in the library, but it is often just practically too busy," he said.

Wiles said one library staffer described the situation as evolving essentially into a "don't ask, don't tell" policy.

"There is a policy on paper, but you can't, and shouldn't perhaps, stop every instance of tutoring that takes place in the library,' he said. "If people are able to use their library voice and tutor somebody, there certainly is no harm done. Libraries are a place for learning to occur, but it remains kind of an unsolved problem."

The planned library expansion, which was voted down, would have added more space to mitigate the problem.

Bethlehem Public Library Director Geoffrey Kirkpatrick, who was not at the meeting, said he also sees tutors using the space at his library. Kirkpatrick said there is enough space in the library to allow for tutoring and there has not really been any complaints over the activity.

"Tutors used to be more comfortable sending tutors to people's homes," Kirkpatrick said, "but people are more aware there are risks to both parties. Doing the tutoring at a public space is a smart choice.'

Richard J. Naylor, director of the William K. Sanford Town Library in Colonie, said tutoring activity has seasonal spikes at the library. Guilderland and Bethlehem also saw similar trends.

"It seems to wax and wane because of the school year," Naylor said.

Naylor admitted the library does not have "a great way to deal with it."

"It is not really up to us to decide whether somebody gets paid for something or not, but the concern for us is if they are bothering somebody," he said. "We can't really put up a sign and

Naylor believed tutoring happening at the library was ultimately a good thing, because it falls within the library's mission to educate the public. He said tutoring has only "occasionally" been a problem.

say no business."

He said the library has been successful placing tutors in certain areas, so patrons are not disturbed.

"We don't try to distinguish between two people taking about a book they just read ... or two people who are learning something," he said.

Guilderland Board of Education member Colleen O'Connell said she did not believe it was a library's responsibility to provide space for tutoring.

O'Connell said all three of her children have had private tutoring at some point, and the minimum for a tutor is around \$50 an hour.

"This is a not-for-profit taxing institution ... but that doesn't mean that people have a right to have commercial activity here," she said. "

Tim Wiles on Monday, April 7, said he would not be surprised if the library board decides to take another look at its policy toward tutors, but there are no plans at the moment.

"It seems to be working out OK right now," he said.

began chatting with a person he believed to be a 13-year- old girl in Virginia on March 19. The conversation became sexual in nature, and Haverly allegedly sent a video of himself masturbating to the "girl."

On March 20, court documents said Haverly again began to send online messages to a girl he thought to be 13. He allegedly then sent sexual images to the "girl."

'Specifically, Haverly did send images of his penis to solicit the female to engage in a sexual behavior by masturbating," read the court document.

On March 28, police said Haverly engaged in a conversation sexual in nature with someone he believed to be a 15-year-old girl. During that incident, court documents showed Haverly allegedly invited the girl to a hotel room to "share the bed."

Bethlehem police did not say what led Fairfax police to begin their investigation into Haverly's alleged activities.

On the day of his arrest, Haverly was allegedly found to be in the possession of a still photograph on his computer of a girl in between the ages of 9 to 12 in a sexually compromising position. Court documents also showed he was in the possession of a dagger, a "dangerous knife," a dirk, a stiletto knife, an imitation pistol, two 12-inch daggers found in his bedroom. more than 16 grams of marijuana and a pipe.

Haverly was charged with promoting a sexual performance by a child, possessing a sexual performance by a child, and attempted disseminating indecent materials to minors. all felonies. He was also charged with criminal possession of a weapon in the fourth degree, and attempted endangering the welfare of a child, both misdemeanors, and unlawful possession of marijuana, a violation.

After being arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court, Haverly was remanded to the Albany County Correctional Facility without bail.

The Delmar Fire Department posted a comment on their website, which said it had accepted a resignation by a family member on Haverly's behalf. It also said the department was "shocked and disappointed" about the arrest.

Haverly, who has been working as a paid firefighter with the Shaker Road Loudonville Fire Department, has been chief officer.

Haverly appeared in court for a preliminary hearing on Monday, April to a grand jury. 7, where he was released on \$50.000 bond under special conditions due to the nature of his charges.

Under the direction of Judge Ryan Donovan, Haverly's conditions include having no contact with minors or residing with them. He also cannot be within 1,000 feet of a school, possess pornography or weapons, use the computer or the internet, or leave the house overnight. Donovan said Haverly must undergo a mental evaluation and must check in with his probation officer every day.

Cheryl Coleman, Haverly's attorney, said to remember anyone

Project Playground nears its financial goal

Final fundraiser will showcase performances from local bands

As the Glenmont Elementary PTA closes in on ending its fundraising efforts for a new school playground, the group is capping off its campaign with a concert at a local restaurant.

is now outdated, and school officials are looking to replace the playground out of safety concerns.

At times, some pieces of equipment has been roped off with caution tape to keep children away, while some parts of the playground are missing large pieces of plastic. The bottom of some slides now touch the ground, as do some ropes and chains that are meant for children to climb and balance on. There is also an issue with drainage, and some equipment is not up to code for children with disabilities.

The school district had worked to keep up with the repairs, but eventually there were too many and the costs climbed.

Fundraising efforts by the group included the Glenmont Elementary Fall Community Day and Family Fun Day in September, the Gold Gala, a 5-kilometer walk and a silent auction. Other community members have donated money outright, and some children have opened lemonade stands and donated the proceeds to the cause. The school also sponsored a dunk tank at the Glenmont Fireman's Fair, with district faculty and staff taking the seat.

"We're so glad the end is in sight," said Sharf. "A tremendous amount of money was raised, and we are so proud."

The final concert event at Swifty's will showcase performances from local bands Grainbelt, The Acres and Katsura Duo.

Paula Labarge, the coordinator of the concert event, said her husband is a member of The Acres. The band was formed by a group of dads who live within Colonial Acres in Glenmont. All of the bands have members who are parents of Bethlehem students.

The concert was originally going to be held in the fall but was postponed because of timing. It eventually grew into a much larger event.

"There's only a few thousand left to raise, so we are hopeful this will be it," said Labarge, who thanked Dave Swift for use of the space.

The concert will be held on Sunday, April 27, from 1 to 5 p.m at Swifty's. Cost of admission is \$10 for adults and \$5 for students. The admission price includes one drink per person. There will also be buckets in place for those who wish to donate extra funds.



Niskayuna High School graduate Louis Serafini won the men's division title by three seconds over former Voorheesville track star Macky Lloyd. The 22-year-old Serafini, who now lives in Brookline, Mass., finished with a time of 24:43, which race organizer Aaron Knobloch said is believed to be a record for the current course, while Lloyd placed second with a time of 24:46.

"I've been training very hard for a marathon in May, so I knew I was in good shape for this race," said Serafini.

"I knew it was going to be competitive, so I just wanted to race the race," said Lloyd, who is 24 years old.

Serafini, Lloyd and Ricardo Estremera separated themselves from the pack quickly and raced each other for first place.


"I had two guys on me the whole way. They didn't give me an inch," said Serafini.

Fighting words

n a time of instant communication, distant human interaction is often accomplished by way of tweets or texts. The act of using a pen and paper is rare these days, still nothing captures a moment like a personal letter, especially a war letter.

In every American conflict, from the Revolutionary War to Iraq and Afghanistan, soldiers have captured the emotions of war in their letters. Skidmore College's theater department brings some of those letters to life in the war letterinspired production, "If All the Sky Were Paper."

The play tells the story of war from the viewpoint of the men and women on the front lines and the loved ones on the home front.

script ... it seemed the perfect project," said Lary Opitz, Skidmore professor and director of the show. "I read the New York Times every morning and am quite surprised that every day, though we are still at war in Afghanistan, the news about our troops in Afghanistan is buried. We have troops in harm's way at this very moment, yet the conversation that we are currently engaged in a war is so far from us, particularly with young people, unless they have a relative or friend who is serving."

Opitz said that through the play and the course that is attached to it, he hoped to give students a better understanding of the nature of combat in American history.

"I wanted to help them make this discovery and understand the toll of war on individuals in combat," Opitz said.

The play is based on author and historian Andrew Carroll's books "War Letters" and "Behind the Lines," which are the result of a three-year journey traveling the world in search of war correspondence. Carroll's goal was to remember the Americans and their stories. Since then, Carroll has collected more than 90,000 letters from every conflict in U.S. history as part of what he calls the Legacy Project.

Carroll wrote the script for "If All the Sky Were Paper" in collaboration with a theater professor at Chapman University in California, John Benitz, after Benitz read about the project and approached Carroll with the idea of turning his project into a play.

"Carroll was interested; they got together and turned the letters into a play performed at

Chapman in 2012," Opitz said. "Since that time, Chapman has become the repository for all the letters.'

Opitz said the play was performed at The Linda in Albany last year with Carroll playing the narrator.

We are expanding on that," Opitz said. "My goal was to make the piece as theatrical as possible. Although written for five actors and a narrator, with Andrew Carroll's permission, I have expanded that to 11 actors total."

Opitz adds that he has also dramatized the events more than previous productions.

"Some of the narration I have turned into short scenes interspersed with people reading the letters," Opitz said. "There is a section on the personal toll on war, the enormity of war and the numbers of casualties over many years."

Opitz said the play rides a rollercoaster of emotions, including a humorous side to the letters.


Conor Mullen, a Skidmore College senior who plays the narrator, said he was surprised at the almost comical side of dealing with war from the letters.

"I thought a lot would revolve around wanting to be home, the cost of violence and things, but what's funny is within those themes there is so much variation," Mullen said. "It's so funny how different soldiers chose to deal with their situation and describe their situation."

Mullen describes one of his favorite letters in the play, which is a letter from a German housewife.

"She is writing about her sexual frustration of having all the men in the country off at war," he laughed. "It's a different perspective on the war."

Mullen's said his job as the





narrator is to "lay the track so that the train that is the story can pass.'

"I play the narrator, who is Andrew Carroll. He is somebody who goes on a journey around the world trying to collect and preserve war letters from throughout history," Mullen said. "I may say, 'Here is a letter written in WWII by such and such. This is the context in which it happens, and this person went on to write this book or this person unfortunately didn't make it home."

Opitz said the audience at last year's show at The Linda varied greatly, but it's clear that the letters tug at the hearts of veterans and others involved in war the most.

"They were old, young and veterans," he said. "The vets really did appreciate it — it was a true image of what they had gone through."

Mullen said the play has given him an appreciation for the variety of experiences that happen in war.



"I've always had a respect for people who choose to participate in combat, but what really came is more of a respect for how the different ways war can be experienced. Each experience can be so different and so unusual," Mullen said. "It's so unreal and so real at the same time.'

Opitz said what makes the production even more special is how the handwritten letters are something of a lost art.

"So much of the correspondence with Iraq and Afghanistan was email. I have a nephew who never wrote a letter. Now they can Skype and actually see and speak to families at home. And there is a lot of texting going on," Opitz said.

He says that what adds mystique to the letters is that time was a factor.

"It wasn't immediate. They would wait and wait for letters in WWI and II and Korea. There was quite a time lapse," he said. "The vets who spoke with us said that, even in Vietnam, mail call was so important. It was

the highlight to get those letters from home.'

Mullen believes however that it's more the act of writing the letter and not so much the medium that will keep memories such as those from war alive, and email is here to

stay, he said.

"There is a unique perspective when people write a letter. You don't have to look into the eyes. You are really communicating almost with your own internal thought," Mullen says. "So I think people will continue to write emails and because of that, the relationship of person to pen, will still get these emotional revelations of war through letters."
