Bethlehem won't support casino

Town passes resolution opposed to Exit 23 proposal

After nearly two dozen people spoke out against the proposed casino at Exit 23, the Town of Bethlehem passed a resolution in opposition to the project.

The resolution was passed Wednesday, May 28, following an informal public hearing. Representatives from Flaum Management and Capital District Off-Track Betting Corp. had been scheduled to make a presentation at the meeting, but they backed out, stating "it would be premature to present information to the town board" before their analysis on local impacts of the project were complete.

"Their rationale for non-attendance for a hearing they initially asked to be included in doesn't hold water," said Supervisor John Clarkson in a letter to the town board. "We never anticipated that their transportation analysis would be complete by this point in time. My letter asked for it by early June.'

Nearly two dozen people spoke against the

Lawmakers seek open space break

Exemption could help Bethlehem landowners: details still being hammered out

Two state lawmakers are backing the Town of Bethlehem's plan to allow conservation easements for landowners.

State Sen. Neil Breslin and Assemblywoman Patricia Fahv in mid-May introduced legislation that would allow the town to grant tax exemptions on open space.

The idea was first discussed in February as a possible goal for the Bethlehem's n e w Open Space Technical Advisory group. Others discussed interest in having such an exemption during



Guilderland students hold 11th annual Living Museum; program to be cut next year

The likes of Thomas Edison, Davy Crockett and Helen Keller will probably not be seen again in Guilderland High School.

Students of the "11X" course held the 11th annual Living Museum in the high school's new gymnasium on Wednesday, May 28, which brought more than 50 American historical figures, some fictional, to life. The event essentially serves as the final exam for the students of the combined history and English class. This year's event was somewhat bittersweet because the resource intensive class has been cut from next school year's budget. The course has two teachers per classroom, and board members determined the district could no longer allocate resources for the program anymore. Several students had lobbied board members to not cut the course, which in prior years was saved during budget development. "The course is fantastic because you have the benefit of both your history and English teacher in the classroom at the same time," Erin McNamara, an 11X teacher, said. "Unfortunately, the course has been cut."

the recent reassessment processes as another way to provide tax relief.


"We're optimistic that the bill will pass," said Supervisor John Clarkson. "We want to help our residents in any way we can, but only landowners who wish to participate would have to do so.'

Landowners could see an exemption of 50 to 90 percent on their general municipal and school district taxes by participating in the program, according to the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance.

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A chair to remember

Chair of Honor installed at Times Union Center, reminder of missing soldiers

One seat will now always be empty at the Times Union Center no matter how many tickets are sold.

A Rolling Thunder POW/MIA Chair of Honor on Wednesday, May 28, was formally installed at the Albany entertainment venue. It serves as a permanent memorial to missing military members. The local Rolling Thunder chapter and Tri-County Council of Vietnam Era Veterans sponsored the installation of the chair, which features the names of four area missing soldiers whose families are still waiting to come home: Col. Christos Bogiages Jr., Col. Charles Burkart Jr., Col. Richard Kibbey and Lance Cpl. Ashton Loney.

"Memorial Day is day of remembrance, and that's what this chair symbolizes. That's what this chair is all about," said Ronald Lewis, president to come in." of Rolling Thunder's New York Chapter 5. "We use the term 'never forget,' and this right here is going to be just a little nudge, just a little reminder to not forget.'

Lewis said the chair urges "full accountability" for bringing home the remains of service members.

"There are remains coming back, but if you do the math — very slow.' Lewis said. "This is another reminder to help the good work that the government is doing ... and to step it up a notch a little bit to get these guys home so we are here to notice they are back."

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy said the chair "means a lot" to the more than 91,000 missing soldiers and their families.

"Just the news two weeks ago, they found a marine and a soldier's body that are coming home from the Korean War," McCoy said. "All this time later, and they are still discovering our soldiers who went out there and defended this country who were not able

McCoy said the chair has brought back many memories for him. He served in Iraq from 2005 to 2006 and is a member of the New York National Guard.

"I don't want to get choked up," he said. "This is just a tough one for me."

Those who sign up for the military, he said, don't do it for "pats on the back" or "the medals," but because they believe in the nation.

"These men and women gave the ultimate sacrifice ... and loved ones out there still wondering where they are," he said.

Rolling Thunder NY Chapter 5 Vice President Tom Griswold dedicated the chair to Army Sgt. Bowe Bergdahl, who insurgents captured nearly five years ago in Afghanistan. Bergdahl made national headlines three days after the chair's unveiling when he was released to American Special Operations troops in exchange for five Taliban detainees held at Guantánamo Bay.

"These men and women

that go overseas that don't ever come home, it is not acceptable," Griswold said. "The only message I can give everybody is never forget."

The honorary chairs have been installed in stadiums and venues across the country, including Fenway Park in Boston

and Gillette Stadium in Massachusetts. A chair is scheduled to be installed at Yankee Stadium in New York City.

McCoy said the chair would serve as a sober reminder of those who lost their lives defending the country's freedom.

"We want them to

leave with the memory of whatever event they're at, but we also want them to look at this chair and say, 'I am enjoying this event

... because someone made that sacrifice for me to enjoy it," McCoy said. "We don't want to damper the mood of the event, but we want people to remember."



A bear was euthanized at the state Department of Economic Conservation's Wildlife Center in Delmar after it spent Memorial Day weekend in neighborhoods throughout Bethlehem and ended up in a tree in Albany.

The DEC received a call about a bear wandering several Bethlehem neighborhoods last weekend, where it attempted to gain entry into a garage. The bear was spotted again on Tuesday, May 27, around 6:24 a.m. in the vicinity of Old Route 9W. The bear reportedly had double ear tags, which means he had previous encounters with wildlife biologists.

The DEC received a second call around 8:45 a.m. about a bear spotted at the toll booth on I-787 at exit 23. This bear, which reportedly was hit by a car

twice, ran into a wooded area between I-787 and the residential area on Morton Avenue. The bear eventually resurfaced in Rose Court in Albany.

Officials at the DEC said the bear's history over the weekend demonstrated it was a dangerous bear with a pattern of aggressive behavior and posed a threat to public safety. Because of his dangerous behavior and injuries already sustained, authorities determined the appropriate course of action was to put the bear down.

Getting back in the loop

Delmar Reformed Church installs new technology to help the hearing impaired

Many of those facing the prospect of hearing loss can feel out of the loop when it comes to remaining an active part of their community.

Wisconsin audiologist Juliette Sterkens is looking to change that by traveling across the country to introduce hearing loop technology to the masses. Sterkens will be giving a presentation at Delmar Reformed Church in June, to highlight the new loop that was installed by the church earlier this year.

"One of the first things I always do is describe what a hearing loop is," said Sterkens. "A loop wirelessly sends a signal from a PA system to a hearing aid without picking up any background noise."

Delmar Reformed Church installed one of the Capital District's first hearing loops in April. The church's fellowship hall, sanctuary and choir hall have all been equipped with a loop. This is done by installing a thin, copper wire around the floor or ceiling of the area.

The loop was installed mostly through the efforts of parishioner Laura Cooper, who herself has hearing loss and is co-president of the Hearing Loss Association of America's Albany Chapter. The HLAA in co-sponsoring the event.

"I thought installing the loop was important for two reasons," said Cooper. "There is the issue of providing accessibility for the people who attend the church, and providing accessibility for anyone in the community with hearing loss who may want to attend an event at Delmar Reformed."

Cooper said the church is used as a venue for a number of local organizations and entertainment groups, like the Friendship Singers. She felt it would be a good starting-off point to introduce the concept to the greater community.

switch the setting on his or her device to hear anything taking place inside the looped area. Sterkens said there's a large chance most people with a newer version hearing aid have loop capability, but a technician has to activate it first.

According to Sterkens, the installation of hearing loops is becoming popular in churches across the country because they are places visited frequently by a high population of seniors. The trend is also expanding into libraries, conference rooms and funeral homes.

"People complain the most about not being able to hear the television, their grandkids or hear at church," Sterkens said. "Once they get a

hearing loop there, they are more able to speak up about wanting one other places, like the local senior center or performing arts center."

Costs for a loop differ depending on the size of the area looped and installation. A small loop can be installed for \$1,500 or a large loop can be as high as \$15,000.

"When I first started advocating for the loops in my own community, there were none to a half dozen in the state of Wisconsin," said Sterkens. "Today, we are well over 300."

In the Capital District, major venues like Proctors, The Egg, The Palace Theatre, Capital Repertory Theatre, and Troy Saving Bank Music Hall all have loops. As does Hudson Valley Community College, Union College and the First Unitarian Society of Schenectady.

"Having a loop really can help a person's quality of life," said Sterkens. "In a way, it's nothing more than what a ramp would be for those in wheelchairs. It improves access and is a necessity for many."

The event will take

place on Tuesday, June 10, at the Delmar Reformed Church from 5:30 to 8:30 p.m. At the event, listening devices will be available for those without a telecoil hearing aid so attendees can try the loop out for themselves.

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From the Editor's Desk Casino is not a good bet

When it came time for Flaum Managament to put the cards on the table in its high-stakes game of casino development, it hesitated. And that was enough for the Town of Bethlehem to determine that it couldn't give its blessing to Flaum's E23 casino project, and rightfully so.

The fact that Flaum representatives didn't show up at last week's Town Board meeting as scheduled indicates they might be bluffing about what's in their hand. And considering they initially unveiled their proposal to Albany residents early in the process with much fanfare, freebies and promises of future prosperity, we find their current reluctance to provide details cause for concern.

Flaum representatives were given the perfect chance to answer questions about the proposal and drum up that much-needed community support, but instead they avoided the town and its residents. They said they hadn't completed a transportation analysis and didn't have specific plans for what would be included in the casino. To be fair, when bowing out of their May 28 Town Board appearance, representatives promised to be in touch when they had more details, but with the June 30 deadline for completed applications fast approaching, that leaves little time for residents to take a measured look at the proposal in its entirety.

And so far, it's hard to really know what Flaum's promises are worth. They certainly have made plenty of them — among them a gleaming water park and tidy indoor equestrian facility rendered beautifully in an artist's conception of the E23 plans. However the developers are now saying those were just "concepts" and may or may not be included in the final proposal. Given the lack of specifics of this and other details, Bethlehem made the right choice to withhold its support. There's just too much to lose.

Not that Flaum is relying solely on Bethlehem's support to build a casino. The project is within Albany's borders, which means it's the city's backing that's key to the plan. However, despite the sometimes portrayal of the town as NIMBY naysayers standing in the way of real job opportunities for impoverished city residents, the potential for trouble is the same on both sides of the border.

Even without hard numbers, local law enforcement officials were already warily eyeing the proposed casino. In a letter to town officials, the police department outlined several areas of concern, including increased traffic offenses and crime, leaving fewer resources for the rest of Bethlehem, which is already dealing with an increase in white-collar crime, such as identity theft.

Meanwhile, area business leaders are beginning to wake up to the reality that a casino isn't necessarily going to direct customers their way. All anyone has to do is look at the areas surrounding Turning Stone, Foxwoods or the casino strip in Atlantic City. Casinos are meant to be self-contained entertainment centers — that is their entire business model. Once people arrive, they don't leave until it's time to go home. They're not going to drive — even a short distance — to a local restaurant when they can get anything from five-star cuisine to bargain-basement buffet food inside the casino's walls. And it's a fairly safe bet that museums, art galleries or outdoor attractions won't be gaining visitors from the casinos either.

And all those jobs that were promised? We still don't know how many and what kind they would be, but are a few more service-level positions really going to make that much of a difference in a region that already has its share of low-wage positions? Add to that the fact that casino employees tend to spend a good deal of their earnings at their place of employment, doing little to spur the economic growth of the surrounding area.

What casinos are good at is making promises — whether it's the promise of easy money or financial security — and like Flaum's promise of jobs, economic prosperity and family-friendly entertainment, these promises, more often than not, turn out to be empty.

Is this really the future Albany and Bethlehem should hope for? Do we want a shiny casino surrounded by a bleak, crime-ridden landscape of shuttered businesses? Bethlehem doesn't think so, and neither do we.

It's time to send Flaum, and any casino developers without a clear vision and transparent process, on their way. After all, nobody likes to be bluffed.

Guest Commentary Take precautions against Lyme disease

Too often Lyme disease goes undiagnosed and untreated. With the warm weather of spring and summer, comes the risk of contact with ticks. Deer ticks can spread Lyme disease, and unfortunately our area has a high population of deer, thus creating a high concentration of deer ticks.

Congressman Chris Gibson is currently in the process of passing legislation in Congress that will help us with the burdens of Lyme disease. His bill focuses on five main areas of Lyme disease.

Two of these are awareness and tick suppression. There are certain measures and precautions an individual can engage in, in order to prevent direct contact with deer ticks. The first and foremost method is by being aware of the presence of deer ticks. Before you go on a hike, work in your garden or your lawn, be sure to ask yourself if you will be within proximity of possible Lyme disease transmitters. If the answer is yes, wear clothing covering as much skin as possible and use insect repellant that contains DEET. After any outdoor activities be sure to do a thorough and complete tick check, as it takes 24 hours of skin attachment for the tick to pass on Lyme disease.

Congressman Gibson's bill also focuses on testing, treatment and healthcare coverage. With this legislation, there will be stricter and more extensive research done by the National Institute of Health(NIH) and the Centers for Disease Control(CDC) on the most effective prevention and diagnostic methods. It will also provide guidelines for insurance companies to be the most effective in giving patients the best care, while being affordable for everyone. It is vital that we take these initial steps in order to combat this growing

steps in order to combat this growing epidemic. By focusing on awareness, tick suppression, testing, treatment and healthcare coverage we can create long-term solutions.

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Legislator proposes term limits This week in history in

Loudonville lawmaker lobbies for limits to be included in charter revisions

Not only might there be fewer Albany County legislators soon, but they may also be serving shorter terms.

Legislator Peter Crouse, R-Loudonville, on Thursday, May 29, announced he had submitted a proposal to the county Charter Review Committee requesting term limits be included in the revised charter presented to voters. The proposal would allow legislators to serve no more than three consecutive fouryear terms, but would not be effective until Ian. 1. 2016. Crouse is serving his first term.

Crouse said the time is ripe to consider adopting term limits, because the charter isn't frequently reviewed.

County should be given the opportunity to decide on how long county legislators should serve as well as the size of the county legislature," he said, "which the original Charter **Review Commission** recommended be reduced from 39 to 25 seats."

Spotlight News reviewed how long each legislator has served using information from the county's website and found 12 of the sitting legislators, or 30 percent, have served more than 12 years.

"There are a number of individuals serving a long period of time," said Crouse. "I didn't present this as a partisan issue."

There were 10 Democratic legislators holding their seat for more than 12 years, which is 35 percent of all Democrats. Only two Republicans are exceeding the proposed term limit, which is 20 percent of all Republicans.

Legislator Gilbert Ethier, D-Cohoes, holds the longest tenure at 33 years and Majority Leader Frank Commisso, at 30 years. There are three more Democratic legislators serving more than 20 years.

The two Republicans legislators exceed the proposed term limit include Peter Clouse at 21 years and Deputy Minority Leader Christine Benedict at 20 years.

No legislators would be removed under Crouse's proposal, because years of service would only start adding up at the start of 2016.

"The reason I put that in is because I am also a realist. You can't just yank

out the rug from under people that are in office," Crouse said.

The proposed reduction, if any, of the legislature also has not been finalized. If the Charter Review Commission's recommendation were followed, then 14 legislative seats would be eliminated.

If Crouse's amendment were added, voters would likely be voting on the revised charter as a whole rather than individual changes, he said. This means voters' feelings on term limits would have to be factored into other proposed revisions.

Crouse, while lobbying for people's right decide on term limits, said he doesn't believe including it would sway the vote either direction.

"I don't think the term limits proposal would be one of those things that would make the document pass or fail," he said. "It is an important issue and I think people should be given the choice."

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

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Town supports armed forces

The people of Bethlehem are very patriotic and supportive of our veterans and our service men and women on active duty. Our town's Memorial Day parade is always a highlight of the year as we line the route to show our pride, appreciation and gratitude, especially for those who made the ultimate sacrifice to protect our freedom.

The Bethlehem YMCA has always participated in the parade, just as the Y – on a national scale – has always been there to support our troops.

It was a time of war and tremendous national strife. The President called on the YMCA for volunteers and Y members came by the thousands to service as surgeons, nurses, chaplains, even helping to provide basic educational skills to the soldiers and distributing food and supplies.

The year was 1861 and the President was Abraham Lincoln. With the Red Cross not yet established, some 5,000 YMCA members volunteered to support and care for the soldiers of the Union Army in the Civil War, including taking horse-drawn canteens onto the battlefields. When President Lincoln learned of the YMCA's plans to provide physical and spiritual comfort to the soldiers, Lincoln wrote to the Y leaders saving, "I sincerely hope your plan may be as successful, as it is just and generous in conception."

The Civil War was the first,



but not the last time, that Y volunteers answered the call to help America's military in time of war.

The YMCA initiated entertainment for the troops during the Spanish-American War, a program that would eventually be combined with other service groups to form the USO. The Y also provided medicine and other supplies. In fact, as Teddy Roosevelt led the Rough Riders, he wrote dispatches on YMCA stationary.

The Y was also very involved in providing educational services to troops during World War I, as well as activities to help with their morale, welfare and recreational needs.

During World War I, the YMCA provided military support services on a scale that had never been attempted by a community-based organization, serving 19 million soldiers of the Allied armies, as well as prisoners of war.

The efforts of Y volunteers in the Great War was praised by U.S. General John J. Pershing, and by French Commander Marshal Foch who thanked the YMCA for programs "into which the tired solider came for new strength and to find a touch of that family life, or at least that familiar contact, which seemed to him an infinite comfort."

Following World War I, many of the troop support programs and efforts conducted by the YMCA were adopted by the military, but the Y's service continued, particularly focusing on efforts at prison-of-war camps which began during the Civil War when Y volunteers cared for both Union and Confederate prisoners. These efforts continued on a greater scale in World War I, and even reached into the U.S. internment camps of Japanese-Americans during World War II.

The Y's support of our military has continued through Korea, Vietnam, the Gulf War and the war on terrorism. Today, the Armed Services YMCA provides free or low-cost youth development, healthy living, and social responsibility programs for junior enlisted military and their families to make military life easier.

So, as the Bethlehem YMCA's staff and volunteers marched down Delaware Avenue on Memorial Day, joining our community in saying thanks to our troops and paying respect to those who gave their lives to protect our country, it is a line of support that goes back in time through the trenches of Western Europe and the battlefields of Manassas.



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


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V'ville seeking \$1.3M grant for rail trail project

Village officials target state grants for enhancing trail's end

Voorheesville officials are targeting grant funding to enhance its end of the Helderberg Hudson Rail Trail and build a museum honoring local railroad history. Without the funding, realizing its vision would take much longer.

The Voorheesville Village Board of Trustees on Tuesday, May 27, approved submitting an application requesting \$1.3 million of federal Transportation Alternatives Program funding for its rail trail project. The state Department of Transportation is administering the funds, which would leave the village responsible for covering 20 percent of the cost, or \$260,000. Receiving the funds would fast track development of

vision for the rail trail's end. The grant would not cover paving the rail trail itself.

To receive the funding, village officials must prove it could cover its share of the costs upfront. The hope is in-kind services could reduce its share, but the village isn't allowed to factor that in the application.

"I think we're comfortable realizing that we can certainly front the money and it not be a problem," Village Mayor Robert Conway said.

He said reserve funds could be tapped to cover the cost if needed.

Trustee Brett Hotaling has served as liaison on the project and chaired a citizen committee that developed the plan. Village resident Rich Straut, who works for the engineering firm Baßrton & Loguidice, had informed local officials about the grant. "We do have

its recently completed permission from Albany County to cross the road and extend the trail." said Hotaling.

> The most extensive work would be shortly past where the Rail Trail currently ends. Under the project, the trail would be extended along Grove Street either along a strip of land or creating a bike lane on the roadway roughly to the location of Voorheesville Self Storage.

> Then, on a patch of land, would be an overlook tower with restroom facilities, and a museum would be located across the street. There would be roughly 50 paved parking spaces at the new trailhead off Grove Street, which wouldn't require removing any trees.

The museum is hoped to be constructed to replicate an old rail station, or by using an old rail car. If the full amount requested isn't received, the museum

could be sidelined.

Regardless of outside funds, the village is looking to create a paved parking lot for about a dozen cars off Pine Street. Additional funds could be used to create some amenities at the site.

Hotaling said around

150 signatures were collected during the village's Memorial Dav event on Saturday, May 24, to show community support. Village officials were hoping to get letters of support from Albany County and the Town of New Scotland.

"If we don't get the grant money, it certainly John Purcell/Spotlight

won't be from a lack of effort," Conway said. "If grant money isn't coming, there are things we can do on a local scale within our own budgets to enhance the experience."

Hotaling said, "At least we will be that much farther ahead for next time."

The town's Open Space Technical Advisory group is discussing the guidelines for Bethlehem's program. Clarkson said the first step is to get the bill passed in the legislature to make sure the exemption is legal.

"The benefits of preserving open space are numerous, but so often communities have a difficult time preserving undeveloped lands and conserving open space. Towns just don't have enough funds available for preservation of such lands," said Breslin in a statement. "Creating an open space tax exemption can be a vital tool for land preservation and doesn't require the appropriation of any new funds."

Fahy said the program would help the town promote open space preservation in "a fair manner," while calling Bethlehem a "model community for land-use planning.'

A local law would need to be approved by the town for the exemption to take effect in the future.

McNamara said students choose individuals who had a great impact on society's perception of the American Dream. This year there were some fictional characters, but they were allowed because of their impact on American culture.

Superintendent of Schools Marie Wiles previously said the district is hoping to rework the course and offer something similar in less resource-intensive method.

Director Rob Leslie presented the Bethlehem Town Board with examples of conservation easements in other municipalities across the state and how one could be implemented in Bethlehem.

Depending on the amount of acreage approved to qualify for an easement, 157 parcels of land were identified in the town as "possible participants" in the program. Land already receiving an agricultural exemption would likely not qualify.

During the presentation, Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn asked if a participating landowner would be in violation of the easement agreement if they began planning to sell or develop the land before the timeframe was up.

Leslie said it was those details that would need to be worked out before the law was passed, but it would be unlikely the landowners would be in violation if no actual development took place. He also suggested a tax clawback be set into the law, so a landowner could sell or develop the land if they wished. However, they would then need to pay the back taxes on the property. Clarkson said the bill is

now before the Committee on Real Property Taxation. The hope is for the program to be in place for the 2015 town and county tax billing cycle.

Many said they were concerned about the impact the casino would have on the local economy, and that the state could become oversaturated with casinos. Others questioned the types of jobs the casino would bring and worried about an increase in crime.

At the same meeting, the Bethlehem Police Department provided the Town Board with a statement regarding potential problems and complications.

"This proposal, if built, will change the character of the town in many respects," the statement read.

The concerns included an increase in traffic issues and crime due to an influx of people, which would "raise demand on police services." The police department also said a casino's population is "extremely transient in nature," which would make if hard for the police force to complete investigations.

"The impact on the detective office in regards to follow-up investigations would be profound," read

the letter. "Currently the office is handling a wide array of identity theft [cases], and while they are typically viewed as white collar cases, the complexity to these cases and types of offenses, including credit card scams, counterfeit credit cards, counterfeit currency, as well as cons, tricks and swindles, would undoubtedly increase."

Only one resident spoke in favor of the proposal, saying he was worried that if the casino were approved in a neighboring location, Albany County would lose the benefits and economic opportunities that come with it.

According to the developers, the project is expected to bring 1,800 permanent jobs and 1,500 construction jobs. It will also provide an annual hosting fee of \$11.5 million to be split between the city and county, an estimated \$5 million in property taxes for the city, \$2 million for scholarships and social programs, as well as funds to the county through sales and hotel taxes.

The original plans also called for the casino to be built on 60 acres of land off Noonan Lane in Albany, with a 63,000-square-foot gaming floor, and 275room hotel. Also proposed was a 40,000-square-foot water park, restaurants, and an indoor horse-riding facility and trails.

Town buys parcel on Wright Lane

Land near former landfill used to store removed snow and leaves

The Town of Bethlehem has purchased land located at the former landfill after renting it for more than a decade.

The property on Wright Lane was purchased for \$80,000 following a permissive referendum. The land had been rented for years as a site to store removed snow and leaves, when the seller approached the town about purchasing it in 2013. The original lease was for 32 acres of land. The town purchased the entire parcel, which is about 85 acres

"The purchase price was better for us economically over the years then continuing to pay rent," said Clarkson. "The owner was looking to sell and we were in a position to buy it."

The town approved a six-month lease extension on the property in January. It was at that time Commissioner of Public Works Erik Deyoe told the Town Board the property owner was interested in selling.

The town had been paying \$65,000 for use of the land over 10 years. It then entered into a shortterm lease for \$20 a day over six months until the purchase could go through.

Deyoe said the main reason it took so long to purchase the property was because of an overlap of land in the deeds between a neighboring property and the one the town wished to purchase.

Final approvals of the sale took place appropriately in April during executive session.



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

Coming off first playoff trip, Dutchmen look for more in 2014 season

Last season's taste of postseason baseball has whetted the Albany Dutchmen's appetite.


Now, they want to win the Perfect Game Collegiate Baseball League title.

"Obviously, it's the goal to win the division and make the playoffs," said Albany manager Nick Davey. "We've set the bar of success pretty high."

Dutchmen General Manager Jason Brinkman said he thinks he and Davey have assembled the best group of players in the organization's five-year history. Nearly half of Albany's 2014 roster features players from NCAA Division I programs, including three from Baylor University and two each from Rutgers and Indiana University.

"I think first and foremost, over the past several years you've seen the talent level of the entire league improve," said Brinkman. "Another thing that helps is we try to provide a first-class environment for the players. Thirdly, working those connections (with Division I coaches) have helped us get more players from larger programs."

Albany's 2013 on-field performance — a 28-24 record, a

third-place finish in the PGCBL's East Division, a playoff victory over Mohawk Valley and pushing eventual league champion Amsterdam to a deciding third game in the semifinals — also

helped, said Davey.

"The better the season you have, the better the opportunity you have of impressing these (college) programs," said Davey. "I think the success we've had the past couple of years has helped us get a better group of players."

It's also a larger group of players. The PGCBL is allowing its nine teams to carry up to 35 players on their rosters this season — an increase of five players over last year's limit. That increased depth could help teams that lose players to injuries.

"It's extremely helpful to have those extra five roster spots," said Brinkman, who's Dutchmen lost 16 players to injuries last season. "The schedule is brutal. Some of these guys are not used to playing five or six days in a row. It really helps us increase our talent pool, and it gives us some flexibility if we lose players to injury."

The Dutchmen are using their extra roster spots to add as many pitchers as they can. With a Wednesday, May 28, announcement that Jose Hernandez is returning for a second season in Albany, the Dutchmen have 16 pitchers, and Davey said he will use as many of them as he can.

"Some of them get so much work during the college season that they need a break. So, what I do is I give my guys an extra day of rest between starts," said Davey. "Plus, we know it's a long season. You lose a lot of guys. We lost 16 kids last year, and 12 of them were pitchers."

like to shake up audiences' expectations," Smith said. "We think if we can do something people never heard of, we can do anything."

Smith adds that the recent partnership with the Palace Theatre has helped make doing shows like "Hands on a Hardbody" possible.

"It has opened up the programming we are doing and allows us to do new and exciting shows and go



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outside the box," Smith said.

That being said, Smith assures audiences that the classics are still a large part of Park Playhouse.

"Of course, we don't want to turn our backs on our history, the classic Broadway that everyone knows," he said. "And we are able to serve those patrons by doing 'Oliver' in August."

Featuring the students of the Park Playhouse alongside professional talent, "Oliver" will run from Aug. 2 through 16. Charles Dickens' classic story of Oliver Twist, an orphan in 1830s Great Britain who leads the life of a pickpocket in London, will take the Lakehouse Stage for the first time.

"Everyone knows 'Oliver," Smith said. "The music is light, joyful, and family audiences will love it."

"Oliver" will feature students from the Playhouse's youth program.

"We have an ongoing program for ages 9 to 18 where we do 24 hours of workshops across a four week period. In addition to rehearsing a full-scale

musical, workshops are drawn from every area of theater production such as improvisation, acting, various styles of dance, auditioning techniques," Smith said.

Smith said the program gives kids a look beyond classroom learning.

"A lot come from middle school and high school theater, where they do shows, but maybe not with all the elements of professional theater involved," he said. "And they can expect a fullfledged theater show seen by 2,500 people a night on our park's stage."

Smith said the August show is not just about the kids on the stage, but also the kids in the audience.

"Last year 'Shrek' drew such a family crowd, and I believe 'Oliver' will do the same," he said.

The start time of the family-oriented August production will be begin earlier this year at 7:30 p.m. in order to accommodate a younger crowd.

Amphitheater hillside seating is free for all guests, but about 40 seats can be reserved for a small fee, and this year "Oliver" is a GE Kids in Free event. Kids 12 and under will receive free reserved sitting with the purchase of an adult ticket.

"Last year with 'Shrek' we saw so many more people sitting there," Smith said. "It's good for the kids, they feel like they are part of the action and can see things up close."

Smith said picking the programming is the most difficult part of his job. With only two large feature shows a year, Owen said deciding on the right shows to please a wide audience can sometimes be difficult, but he believes this year's lineup will please everyone.




