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Cumberland Farms seeks rezone in G'land

Gas station targeted for vacant land at intersection of routes 20 and 146

Stewart's could soon have a competitor at the busy intersection of Western Avenue and Route 146 if Tri-Way Services convinces Guilderland officials to rezone the property.

Tri-Way representatives appeared at the Guilderland Planning Board's Wednesday,

June 11, meeting seeking lot line amendments and a recommendation to the Town Board on rezoning 2444 Western Ave. from local business to general business. The company is seeking to build a Cumberland Farms gas station on the vacant land adjacent to Stewart's.

Planning Board members unanimously approved amending the lot lines of 2430 and 2444 Western Ave., with the Tri-Way owning the adjoining properties.

Growing a better future

Leadership Tech Valley project expands **Patroon Land Farm's** growing capacity

A group of area community members turned to the roots of agriculture to build leadership skills and help feed hungry families.

The Leadership Tech Valley Class of 2014 formally unveiled its project Thursday, June 12, which included installing a high tunnel greenhouse and modern drip irrigation system at the Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York's Patroon Land Farm in the Town of Knox. Class members raised \$50,000 from sponsors, along with building the greenhouse and irrigation system. Patroon Farm's growing season will be extended thanks to the effort.

"Three and a half weeks ago, this was a field, and look at it today. It's absolutely amazing," said class member Chris Trant, of MVP Health Care, said. "We put in over 1,000 hours collectively."

seeks to unite a diverse group of people to develop their leadership potential and better serve their organization. Participants are selected from a group of applicants, who then attend an opening two-day retreat and complete nine sessions from October through June.

Each year, class members select a new community outreach project. Justin Priddle, vice president at Berkshire Bank, said fellow class members wanted a project that could sustain itself Regional President and provide long-term benefits, while giving back to community.

"Year after year, this grow food and sustain food for the community as a whole," Priddle said. "To come together and put something up like this was just an incredible experience."



He added Weinheimer's "immeasurable patience" was also helpful, which made many audience members laugh.

"He would be ... showing us how to use these tools, and we'd be holding them backwards and upside down," Trant said. "I learned a lot from you, Mark, and you've got a great sense of humor.'

The class also had funds left over from the project, so a check for \$8,000 was presented to Weinheimer to help maintain the greenhouse and sustain the project.

Trant said he learned a protected land trust in 1997.

Williman managed the farm herself from 2001 to 2005, and Regional Food Bank volunteers would harvest the crops and transport produce to its warehouse for distribution. In 2006, the food bank and Patroon Farm became partners, with the food bank taking over management.

There have been several improvements and additions since the food bank took over managing the farm. The new greenhouse will help the farm counteract the heavy

soils and plant produce not fairing well outdoors.

"It also gives us an opportunity to make better use of our volunteers," Weinheimer said. "On miserable days, they don't want to be out in the fields: although we do have a number of them who are stalwart, and you can't stop them."

Weinheimer said being chosen for the class' project was an honor, and he was "absolutely overwhelmed at the kind of dedication and drive that everybody showed to get this job done."

Most of the produce

grown goes to the food bank, but it also operates a Community Supported Agriculture program to generate revenue to help offset operation costs. Farm yield varies annually, Weinheimer said, but its best year had around 170,000 pounds of produce.

During the warmweather growing seasons, the farm produces tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, cucumber, summer squash and similar produce, according to Weinheimer. In the fall, the farm transitions to leafy greens, with maybe some hearty greens in the winter.

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From the Editor's Desk Follow your own path

A high school degree plus a college degree equals a good job after graduation.

That's been the formula we have been accustomed to for generations. It's what our parents did. Therefore, we expect future generations to continue that tradition.

But, what if that formula no longer works? What if getting a college degree doesn't equal getting a wellpaying job – or any job? What if some high school graduates don't find themselves drawn to that approach in the first place?

Many of our high school graduates are heading off to college to pursue degrees in their fields of interest. But once they have their college degrees, it's no longer a sure bet they will find work. The economy is still sluggish, and depending on the career paths college students take, they may find they will have to wait several months – perhaps more than a year – before getting a job in their chosen field. And even when they find work, they may discover that their paychecks may not help them deal with all of the bills they will encounter.

One expense they may have to deal with for years comes from all the college loans they must secure to further their education. It costs a lot of money to attend a four-year college – even ones within the State University of New York system, which promotes itself as an affordable alternative to private school. For example, the average New Yorker attending the University at Albany can expect to pay more than \$80,000 to receive a bachelor's degree in four years. Doesn't sound affordable, does it?

We're also at a point in our history where parents aren't as able as they once were to foot the bill for their children to attend college. With all of the economic stress average Americans face trying to stretch their pay to make their mortgage, car loan, credit card and utility payments on time – not to mention their own student loan debts, if they have them – they may find paying thousands of more dollars per year to send their children to college beyond their means.

This leaves today's high school graduates searching for scholarships to make college more affordable to them, seeking loans that may take them decades to pay off or putting off college to get whatever jobs they can in order to save up their own money for a college degree. It can be very stressful, especially when scholarships fall through or other obstacles come up.

It's not as if college is for every high

school graduate, either. Some find the coursework too difficult or are not in the right frame of mind to buckle down for another 4-6 years. Others may know exactly what they want to do with their lives after high school and plunge themselves into careers that don't require a college degree. Depending on their ambitions, some do quite well for themselves without ever receiving a diploma from an institute of higher learning.

So, maybe the traditional formula isn't for everyone. And maybe, we shouldn't push this formula on our children anymore. Maybe we should let them have some time after high school to determine what they really want to do. If it's something that requires a college degree, then we should encourage them to seek scholarships or save as much money as they can to help pay for it. If it's something they can do on their own without continuing their education at the next level, then we should encourage them to do that. And if they don't know what they want to do, the best thing is to let them explore as many options as possible before choosing their path.

The world is wide open to high school graduates. They shouldn't have to follow a formula to successfully navigate it.

Guest Commentary Ice houses wouldn't survive this climate

For several decades leading into the 20th century, German immigrant Valentine Pappalau oversaw his family's ice harvesting business from just outside Albany, New York, cutting natural ice out of the Normans Kill and Hudson River. He was a local pioneer to an industry that introduced luxuries such as ice cream, as well as providing innovative means of food storage to a newly expanding middle class.

Pappalau lived within the Gilded Age, a time many economists agree created consumerism — when the working middle class began bringing home more income, allowing families to not only spend on needs, but luxury items as well. It was the dawn of the material world.

By 1910, the ice harvesting business was at its peak. It is estimated that 134 ice houses were present throughout New York's Hudson Valley. One such competitor of Pappalau was Schifferdicker's, whose ice house was located on the western shores of the river several miles south of Albany, within the Town of Bethlehem. "In the summer, ice barges would come up river from New York City," wrote G.B. Schifferdicker. His grandfather started the family ice business in the 1880s. "These barges were quite large as I remember; about 25 feet by 60 to 70 feet, and about seven-feet deep. The stored ice was... loaded into the barges and sent on its way.

"Of course ice cutting depended mainly on cold weather," wrote Mr. Schifferdicker, "usually mid-December and January. The lightest ice my father would take was 10 inches thick."

By the time Pappalau died in 1919, his aggregate worth was equivalent to threequarters of a million dollars in today's economy. News of his death carried on the front page of Albany newspapers—as was the subsequent fight over his estate.

With the popularity of home refrigeration units starting in the 1930s, thanks in large part to General Electric in the neighboring city of Schenectady, the industry that sustained Pappalau's and Schifferdicker's family businesses disappeared.

Technology makes promises for a better future. But, as the phrases "global warming" and "climate change" have seeped into everyday discussion, people are starting to question what may be attached to the luxuries guaranteed by those advances. York, and speculates how those changes effect the local economy.

"If the winter season becomes short or unreliable," states Jenkins, "there will be fewer users and events. Without the users and events, the facilities will be abandoned, the service businesses will close..."

Though, Jenkins states that the Adirondacks have not experienced such winters, he looks to Western Massachusetts that has witnessed "increasingly brown winters" that have depleted winter-themed business. He suggests, through collected data, that Upstate New York is following a similar fate.

The ice houses of Pappalau and Schifferdicker have long since succumbed to the withering of time. In the hallow of Normans Kill, which also serves as a boundary between the City of Albany and Town of Bethlehem, lies the stone foundation of Pappalau's ice house. It's here where summer revelers once laid upon the sandy beaches that abutted the tricking creek, and the Pappalau's served the rare treat of ice cream. Now, it stands in conformity with the ghosts of a once bustling tourist spot. As Mr. Schifferdicker's memory served him, the winters of today would not support the ice harvesting business.

Calculating the costs of moving

oving is stressful... and boxes at the local liquor store, expensive. On the low end, the American Moving and Storage Association estimates that the average move between states costs \$5,360. On the high end, Worldwide ERC, a relocation services company, estimates that the average cost of a move within the Unite States is \$12,459. Either way, it's a sizable chunk of change. It is also something many individuals and families moving to a new location don't fully account for.

The best way to de-stress a move and control cost is to plan. The following list provides a look at some things you should account for:

• Movers and/or rental truck or container. If you're

Delays. Closings get delayed. It's one of the surprising twists and turns that are an unfortunate but not uncommon part of the process. It is also expensive. First, you may need to put your household goods in storage. Second, you may need to pay for additional truck rentals or moving expenses. Third, you may need to pay for someplace to temporarily live. You would be well served to account for each of these unforeseen expenses in your moving budget.

Deductible expenses include moving your household goods and travel. For more information, see IRS Publication 521, Moving Expenses. You can't plan too much or too far ahead when you're making a move. Also, while it may be stressful, there are many resources available to you, from the Internet to moving professionals, friends, family and even your banker. You just need to seek out help.

You can verify licenses and insurance by visiting www.safer.mfcsa.dot. gov/CompanySnapshot.aspx. Moving at nonpeak times, such as the middle of the month or from October to March, can help you get more competitive rates. If you're more of a do-it-yourselfer, recruiting friends and family to help you move can save you a lot of money. You'll still have the cost of a truck rental or cargo container/pod, but the overall cost savings is significant. Be sure to book early.

• Packing materials. Ask friends and family if they have any boxes lying around that you can use. You can also find access to capital, and strategic financial planning.

Albany County neuters unscrupulous pet dealers

Legislature adopts law strengthening state regulations. seller voices concern

Fido would likely be wagging his tail if he knew stricter laws were recently adopted to protect his four-legged brethren in Albany County.

The Albany County Legislature on Monday, June 9, unanimously approved a local law requiring the permitting of cat and dog sellers, along with regulating breeders. Animal advocates spoke favorably of the tighter regulations and standards aiming to curb inhumane treatment alongside implementing regular enforcement. At least one local pet store owner is against the law though, claiming it's unnecessary government intervention.

Legislators adopted the law largely as first presented, but Democrats did make a concession to reach bipartisan support. according to Gary Domalewicz, D-Albany. The threshold for someone to obtain a pet seller permit was increased from 10 dogs or cats annually to 17.

'Albany County will have the first and strongest law in the state that will protect our pets and our pet owners," Domalewicz said. "This bill is going to make sure that you get pets that are really top shelf, in good health and well groomed."

State lawmakers in January repealed a 15-year prohibition on local laws regulating the pet industry. This allows communities to craft its own regulations, which must at least meet state regulations but can exceed it.

The county's law regulates minimum standards of care such as necessary housing, exercise, grooming, sanitation and feeding and watering. Consumer protections are also included.

Domalewicz and legislator Bryan Clenahan, D-Guilderland, crafted the law working with the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals

Clenahan said a "small handful" of pet sellers and breeders had expressed the United States Department of Agriculture and the state Department of Agriculture and Markets were effectively performing inspections.

"The reality is ... only 15 people work on these investigations for Ag. and Markets in the entire state," Clenahan said. "And of those 15, they only work on these issues about 25 percent of the time."

Clenahan also claimed there are only 70 veterinary inspectors working countrywide for the USDA, with "only one maybe two" operating in the state.

"This is creating a situation with really no oversight," he said. "Many breeders and pet sellers operate completely in the shadows with little or no fear of oversight or regulation. This has led to far too many animals being kept in cruel, unsafe and unsanitary conditions."

Ted Bell, owner of Pet Zone in Crossgates Mall, said pet stores were unfairly being characterized as ignoring immoral breeding. Clenahan previously said pet sellers too often "turn a blind eye" to the practices of breeders.

"We work very hard to prevent this type of thing," Bell said. "Every pet store puppy comes with a micro chip ... and I have a five year warranty. Business

101 tells us any can't survive putting out a good product." Bell, а Knox native, referenced two cases of breeders having violations. asked for help and has since

passed every inspection. The other breeder did not improve conditions and is no longer in business, he said.

"That is how the system works, government and business working together," said Bell. "We all want responsible breeding.... Substandard breeding just does not work."

Clenahan contended issues the law addresses are "happening every day." He also claimed 99 percent of puppies sold at pet stories come from "puppy mills."

'Nearly all the puppies at pet stores have some kind of parasite. Nearly half of them have some kind of illness," he said. "Local Law C will put an end to this in Albany County. ... It's also going to protect the honest and reputable sellers and breeders."

Bell said his biggest industry ... concern is how the law enforcement will be if you're not handled, because nongovernmental agencies could perform the inspections. He contended "retail" animal rescue organizations exist, but did not specify any local examples.

"Local Law C will have One breeder unintended consequences for businesses," Bell said. "There is nothing in there that talks about Internet sales. That's a huge thing right now that robs consumers of all their protections."

The rezone recommendation, however, was tabled until board members heard comments from the state Department of Transportation regarding potential traffic impacts of the more intensive usage. The rezone would affect the 1.35-acre parcel at 2444 Western Ave.

Board members tentatively placed Tri-Way on the agenda for its next meeting on Wednesday, June 25, but stressed a reasonable amount of time would be needed to review DOT comments.

John Haluska, of Lone Pine Road, said he was concerned the "deteriorated" bank building on the property next to Cumberland Farms would not be demolished. Tri-Way does own both properties.

"This building has been here for a very, very long period of time deteriorating probably going back to 2000," said Haluska. "My concern is if we don't do anything

about this at these particular meetings, we are going to have the same problem in 2024. I don't think anybody here wants to see that building sitting around as is in 2024."

Haluska also suggested combining the two lots into one, which would allow for an area as a pad site for possible development.

"That would serve the community a little bit more and much more than what we have now," he said.

Tom Burke, president of Tri-Way Services, Inc., said the bank building was deteriorated when he purchased the property, and he intends to redevelop the site.

"Our intention is when we get this corner developed ... and get Cumberland Farms going, we have interest from people who want to be there, but it is all contingent on the first thing happening," Burke said. "I want to redevelop the property. I don't make any money with a vacant lot."

Bitter, when asked, said the developer was not looking to have one, larger combined lot zoned general business.

Weston said she was "hesitant" to recommend the requested rezone without "a more comprehensive approach and study" of the property.

"While I am not necessarily opposed to a convenience store gas station on this site, there are a number of comments and concerns that should be addressed before the town moves forward on this request," Weston said.

Once the property is rezoned to general business, any permitted usage could not be restricted. The rezone also can't be conditioned on what usage will be on the property.

"It is incumbent upon this board to make sure this lot is appropriate for any of those uses and support any of those uses, particularly in traffic," Weston said.

Bitter said Tri-Way is proposing to build a 4,500-square-foot store, with six pumps each having two dispensers. The local business zoning allows for the convenience store usage, but not gas pumps.

"The key decision here is the rezone," Planning Board Chairman Stephen

Feeney said. "You would be very hard-pressed to deny the project once it is zoned appropriately.'

Feeney said the board would need to see DOT comments before making any decision because traffic implications are a main concern.

Burke said there are "legitimate" issues to be considered with the project, but they were only seeking approval for the rezone. He said the rezone would be consistent with

the "character and nature" of the community.

He did acknowledge the rezone was different from what is described in the Guilderland Hamlet Neighborhood Plan, but said it's "a living, breathing document."

You can't look at something static and old," Burke said. "Stewart's was zoned (general business) and expanded. Residential property was converted into general business."

Planning Board

member Bruce Sherwin took umbrage with Burke's characterization of the study.

"I don't think it is proper to kind of write it off as something that can be just ignored because you want something else to happen," Sherwin said.

Fellow board member Thomas Robert said the traffic patterns at the proposed store would be different from what Stewart's experiences and has different issues.

As awareness of the rail trail grew, so did the popularity of the summer solstice event. Last year's theme was Fairytales and Fireflies, since the trail walk was held in the evening to coincide with the actual solstice. The date and time was changed this year so more people would be able to attend.

Kathy McCarthy, a volunteer with the MHLC, said a lot more people wanted to attend in past years, but it was hard with the solstice being on a weeknight. Others typically would have to leave early.

To fix the problem, this year's celebration will be held on Sunday, June 22, from noon to 3 p.m. There will be three access points: the intersection of Adams Street and Hudson Avenue in Delmar, Fireman's Park in Slingerlands and the newly opened western terminus of the trail at Voorheesville Avenue in Voorheesville. In order to ensure all visitors can participate in all the events, a shuttle will be available to bring people to each access point. "We found the one-mile stretch could be too long for children, so we decided to include the shuttle so people could enjoy all the festivities," said McCarthy. The afternoon will include performances by musicians and dancers, baby animals, food vendors, nature walks and some history discussions. For the children, there are typically games, crafts and face painting.

be asked to take part in creating a special piece of art.

"We are going to create a community mural printed on vinyl so that it can travel," said Montalto-Rook. "We commissioned Bethlehem artist, Ellie Prakken, to create a mural representing the rail trail."

C o m m u n i t y participants will then work together to complete the project, with fair attendees asked to create the leaves for the murals trees. facilities proposition as the district was already a year behind its five-year maintenance plan due to lack of funds and staff cutbacks. Upgrades were suggested to fix the infrastructure of buildings, upgrade water and lighting fixtures, replace aging equipment and upgrade outdated technology systems.

Voters did not approve funding for the installation of a \$3.8 million artificial turf athletic field, which included a regulation-size track, improvements to spectator seating and press box and a new score board.

According to District Business Officer Judi Kehoe, the district anticipates that it will receive aid on 95 percent of the cost of the project. The state then applies a building aid ratio to that total to determine the amount of aid the district will receive.

"For Bethlehem, the aid ratio is approximately 70 percent," said Kehoe. "Building aid from the state is paid over the life of a project, not in a lump sum. This corresponds to the repayment term on the bonds issued to finance the project and helps lessen the local tax burden over that same period."

Douglas said students will not be disturbed during the final two weeks of the school year because inside work will begin during vacation.

One of the first things to be worked on are the district's athletic fields. Many of the fields need work to help with drainage issues and irrigation. also be planted. The tennis courts and track will all be resurfaced, and lighting will be added to the stadium field.

With these upgrades, Director of Facilities and Operations Gregg Nolte said the public will not be able to access those areas, and use of district fields will not allowed this summer. Some woods will also be cleared near the middle school tennis courts.

"A lot of the trees are growing into the fences and causing debris, and the root system is causing some of the courts to heave," said Nolte. "That's part of the reason the courts have deteriorated so we're creating a little bit of a buffer."

Nolte said if anyone is looking for field use, the public should contact the district office for scheduling purposes.

Douglas said the main athletic field will not be ready by the fall, but the district has agreements with Union College and the University at Albany for home games to be played on their fields. The district will also make sure all senior nights continue to be special events for Bethlehem's student athletes. June 18, 2014 • Page 21

Members of the public will also not have access to Elsmere, Glenmont and Hamagrael Elementary because of asbestos abatements and playground installation. The playgrounds will be available for use until about mid-July, when the equipment is slated for installation.

Nolte said asbestos abatement will take place in part of Slingerlands Elementary. The town will be running its camp in part of the building and the playground, but the rest of the building will be closed off.

"We want to make sure the town talks to anyone involved in the program that we have work going on at the school, but it is safe to have their kids there," said Nolte. "We would never put the safety of the kids at risk."

The middle school will have restricted access as the bathrooms are being renovated. Summer enrichment programs will continue there as planned. The high school will also have restricted access as the water line is replaced and technology upgrades are made.

Douglas said district officials are working hard to make sure the projects come in on budget and on time.

"If any members of the public have questions, they should feel free to call our office or visit the website," said Douglas. "We would ask that once construction is fully under way, please stay out of the construction areas so we can ensure safety and not hold up the project."

Nolte said residents can expect updates from his office about the project over the next two years.

Study suggests shuttering one Guilderland school

Altamont or Lynnwood targeted for closure; community to weigh options at meeting

Four out of five scenarios to run the Guilderland Central School District more cost effectively involve closing Altamont Elementary School, according to a recently completed district-wide building capacity study.

The school district contracted with Paul Seversky, a consultant with the planning service at Madison-Oneida BOCES, to analyze how building space is used, scheduling patterns, current enrollment and future enrollment trends. Seversky then used the data, along with performing observations, and developed five suggested scenarios for the district. The potential savings for scenarios ranged from \$1.16 million to \$1.99 million.

There were also two more scenarios including doing nothing different and the school community developing its own option.

The school district hosted a community meeting to discuss the scenarios Monday, June 16, which was after The Spotlight went to press. For coverage of the meeting visit www. spotlightnews.com.

"We are not making a judgment at this point about the findings and recommendations," said Assistant Superintendent for Business Neil Sanders on the morning of Monday, June 16. "Those are options to be looked at and evaluated, and we really need the input of the board and community on those."

The scenarios presented from "B" to "F" all adhere to class size goals of the district, current pupil capacity of buildings and enrollment projections. Three of those five include shifting fifth grade to the middle school. The only scenario not closing Altamont Elementary School includes closing Lynnwood Elementary School.

"There is quite a bit of analysis about enrollment projections and capacity in buildings, and that is really the genesis for the options," Sanders said. "Part of his analysis is looking at what has been the enrollment and projecting the enrollment going forward."

Sanders said the district has been aware of the middle school having more space go unused. He said the declining enrollment at the building led the district to go from a four-house to a three-house model.

"We have fewer students in that building then we used to," he said.

The middle school was found to be 25 percent under utilized, which accounts for 5 percent allocated to allow for programming flexibility. The excess pupil capacity not being used, or allocated for flexibility, across all five elementary schools totaled 455 students. "We are not making a judgment at this point about the findings and recommendations. Those are options to be looked at and evaluated, and we really need the input of the board and community on those." There were two elementary schools this school year falling below the district's minimum pupil capacity goals. Altamont has 290 enrolled this school year, with a minimum district goal at 318. Pine Bush had a minimum goal of 417, but only had 396.

Westmere was the only elementary school exceeding its pupil capacity goal of 385 students, with 445 attending this school year.

Superintendent Marie Wiles previously said the study would be a "fantastic tool" for the school community as it works to make "really good decisions" for students.

During the community meeting introducing the study, Seversky said it "isn't all about closing schools," but said the option could be presented.

Scenario B involves serving K-5 across

for elementary schools and closing Altamont for a projected savings of \$1.16 million to \$1.52 million.

Scenario E also would close Altamont, but would have K-2 served at Lynnwood and Westmere and 3-5 at Pine Bush and Guilderland. This scenario was projected to save from \$1.62 million to nearly \$2 million.

The three other scenarios all involve shifting fifth grade to the middle school.

Scenario C would close Altamont and serve K-4 at four remaining elementary schools. Scenario D would do the same except instead close Lynnwood. Both have similar saving projected from \$1.34 million to \$1.77 million.

Scenario F is similar to B, but the middle school would take on fifthgrade. This scenario would have K-2 at Pine Bush and Guilderland and 3-4 at Lynwood and Westmere. Once again, Altamont would close. This scenario is projected to save from \$1.62 million to nearly \$2 million.

In 2013-14, Guilderland received 86 percent of the prior school year's transportation expenses as state aid. The local cost per bus route is on average nearly \$5,000, according to the study. Any addition or reduction of routes would roughly hold this effect on the district's budget.

"Four days off — that was a long stretch. Too long of a stretch, but you can't control the weather," said Albany coach Nick Davey.

It took some time for Albany's offense to get going against Glens Falls (4-4). Left fielder Ryan Toomey had the Dutchmen's first hit with a leadoff single in the bottom of the third inning, but shortstop Danny Hrbek lined into a double play at first base to negate Toomey's single.

Center fielder Will Miller lit a fire under the Dutchmen with a leadoff triple in the bottom of the fourth. Third baseman Reid Matthews drove Miller home with a sacrifice fly to right field to give Albany a 1-0 lead.

Starting pitcher Jake Welch turned in six strong innings for Albany, scattering five hits and striking out three. The only hiccup was when he gave up a two-run homer to Glens Falls first baseman and Latham native Teddy Cillis in the top of the fifth inning, which put the Golden Eagles in front 2-1.

"I was worried about our pitching because of the time off, but Jake Welch gave us another quality start," said Davey of his right-hander, who improved his record to 2-0.

Glens Falls' lead was short lived. After a leadoff walk to catcher Cameron Miller in the bottom of the fifth inning and right fielder James Locklear's single, Toomey lofted a deep fly ball over the head of Golden Eagles right fielder Alex Wichmann for a two-run triple that gave Albany a 3-2 advantage.

"Ryan had a great approach on the baseball and did a good job of going the other way aggressively," said Davey.

Hrbek came through for Albany in the bottom of the seventh inning with a two-out triple to right field that drove in Cameron Miller, who was hit by a pitch to start the frame. The Dutchmen then tacked on two runs in the bottom of the eighth courtesy of a Glens Falls error. Cameron Miller hit a high pop up to third base, but the ball bounced off Brian Fay's glove, which allowed designated hitter Josh Lee and first baseman Nick Jewett to score.

"Our guys did a great job of responding when we were down 2-1 and regained the lead, and it was great to see the guvs get back in the swing of things after a long break," said Davey.

Albany hit the road for its next two PGCBL games. The Dutchmen visited Glens Falls Monday, June 16, and Utica Tuesday, June 17. They return home Wednesday, June 18, for a doubleheader against the Watertown Rams, to be followed by a single contest against Amsterdam Thursday, June 19, at Bellizzi Field.
