Cumberland Farms seeks rezone in G'land

Gas station targeted for vacant land at intersection of routes 20 and 146

Stewart's could soon have a competitor at the busy intersection of Western Avenue and Route 146 if Tri-Way Services convinces Guilderland officials to rezone the property.

Tri-Way representatives appeared at the Guilderland Planning Board's Wednesday,

June 11, meeting seeking lot line amendments and a recommendation to the Town Board on rezoning 2444 Western Ave. from local business to general business. The company is seeking to build a Cumberland Farms gas station on the vacant land adjacent to Stewart's.

Planning Board members unanimously approved amending the lot lines of 2430 and 2444 Western Ave., with the Tri-Way owning the adjoining properties.

"The deeded descriptions don't match up with what the tax map lines demonstrated, so in an effort to conform and correct the title the lot line adjustment is being proposed," said attorney Stefanie DiLallo Bitter, representing Tri-Way. "This lot line adjustment is also to support the rezoning application."

Town Planner Jan Weston said the change would normally be done administratively, but since there was a "big project

District is set to begin projects

Upgrades will impact summer field, playground use in Bethlehem

With summer vacation just weeks away, district officials at Bethlehem Central schools are preparing for upgrade projects to begin as part of the 2012-13 bond initiative.

Seven contracts were awarded by the Bethlehem Central Board of Education in June as part of the facilities improvement projects. The contracts, worth \$16.6 million, will allow for improvements to get under way. The majority of the bond included money for upgrades to district buildings.

"I really hope the public will have some patience with us over the next year and a half to two years," said Superintendent Tom Douglas. "There will unfortunately be some inconveniences, as with any major remodeling."

In March of 2013, the majority of voters approved a \$20.2 million

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Growing a better future

Leadership Tech Valley project expands Patroon Land Farm's growing capacity

A group of area community members turned to the roots of agriculture to build leadership skills and help feed hungry families.

The Leadership Tech Valley Class of 2014 formally unveiled its project Thursday, June 12, which included installing a high tunnel greenhouse and modern drip irrigation system at the Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York's Patroon Land Farm in the Town of Knox. Class members raised \$50,000 from sponsors, along with building the greenhouse and irrigation system. Patroon Farm's growing season will be extended thanks to the effort.

"Three and a half weeks ago, this was a field, and look at it today. It's absolutely amazing," said class member Chris Trant, of MVP Health Care, said. "We put in over 1,000 hours collectively."

Regional President of M&T Bank Michael Keegan, the program's major sponsor, said the project would benefit the community "for years to come."

The leadership program is a shared initiative of the Albany-Colonie Regional Chamber of Commerce and the Chamber of Schenectady County. The two chambers combined their leadership programs in 2006 to form it.

"I am very proud of this year's class and what the group has accomplished," said Mark Eagan, president and CEO of the Albany-Colonie Chamber. "It has been exciting to watch the class members come together and successfully complete a project that will leave a lasting, positive impact on the neediest members of our community."

seeks to unite a diverse group of people to develop their leadership potential and better serve their organization. Participants are selected from a group of applicants, who then attend an opening two-day retreat and complete nine sessions from October through June.

Each year, class members select a new community outreach project. Justin Priddle, vice president at Berkshire Bank, said fellow class members wanted a project that could sustain itself and provide long-term benefits, while giving back to community.

"Year after year, this greenhouse is going to grow food and sustain food for the community as a whole," Priddle said. "To come together and put something up like this was just an incredible experience."

Trant said he learned "a great deal" through the project and farm manager Mark Weinheimer's strong work ethic inspired him.

He added Weinheimer's "immeasurable patience" was also helpful, which made many audience members laugh.

"He would be ... showing us how to use these tools, and we'd be holding them backwards and upside down," Trant said. "I learned a lot from you, Mark, and you've got a great sense of humor."

The class also had funds left over from the project, so a check for \$8,000 was presented to Weinheimer to help maintain the greenhouse and sustain the project.

Weinheimer said his hard work is mostly due to the influence of Pauline Williman, who placed her family's 162-acre farm into

a protected land trust in 1997.

Williman managed the farm herself from 2001 to 2005, and Regional Food Bank volunteers would harvest the crops and transport produce to its warehouse for distribution. In 2006, the food bank and Patroon Farm became partners, with the food bank taking over management.

There have been several improvements and additions since the food bank took over managing the farm. The new greenhouse will help the farm counteract the heavy

soils and plant produce not fairing well outdoors.

"It also gives us an opportunity to make better use of our volunteers," Weinheimer said. "On miserable days, they don't want to be out in the fields; although we do have a number of them who are stalwart, and you can't stop them."

Weinheimer said being chosen for the class' project was an honor, and he was "absolutely overwhelmed at the kind of dedication and drive that everybody showed to get this job done."

Most of the produce

grown goes to the food bank, but it also operates a Community Supported Agriculture program to generate revenue to help offset operation costs. Farm yield varies annually, Weinheimer said, but its best year had around 170,000 pounds of produce.

During the warm-weather growing seasons, the farm produces tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, cucumber, summer squash and similar produce, according to Weinheimer. In the fall, the farm transitions to leafy greens, with maybe some hearty greens in the winter.

Selkirk man charged with rape following block party

A Selkirk resident was arrested by Bethlehem police officers and charged with felony rape in the third degree after the alleged victim called the New York State Rape Hotline and identified him. Police said Gerald Weidman, 33, of 6 Columbus Circle, Selkirk, was arrested on Saturday, June 7. Police said they were able to locate the victim and interview her at her home. According to the report, the rape allegedly occurred on May 11 after a block party. The victim said Weidman gave her alcohol and marijuana, and the sexual assault occurred shortly after she had passed out. Police said the victim later learned Weidman was allegedly bragging to people about the incident.

The victim said she did not want to report the assault at first because she did not want her parents to be angry with her. Weidman was located and interviewed at his mother’s house. According to police, he admitted to having “sexual intercourse” that day. He was processed and arraigned, and remanded to Albany County Jail without bail.

Other arrests

- Albany County sheriff’s deputies arrested Zbigniew Chalkowski, 49, of 293 Old Stage Road in Altamont, around 5:25 p.m. on Sunday, June 1, and charged him DWI, criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree, drinking

alcohol in a motor vehicle on a highway, failure to yield the right of way and a windshield tint violation. Police stopped Chalkowski at the intersection of New Salem Road and Hill Drive in New Scotland for alleged traffic infractions. Galea was located at his home the next day and transported to the public safety building for processing. He admitted to the theft and was arraigned that morning.



Highlights from a half-century ago

• Delmar Lumber was conceived on a December evening in 1928. A.C. Rowe Jr., a general contractor, casually called at the office of D.A. Bennett, who always installed his heating and plumbing.

During the evening's visit they discovered that each had future plans entirely unknown to the other.

Mr. Bennett, who already owned land adjoining the railroad, was about to add a line of building supplies to his plumbing business which, in those times, included a masonry septic tank and the drainage field.

Mr. Rowe could see advantages in buying lumber in car lots for his building operations. Then too, each hoped to add volume to the new ventures by selling to the public.

As the evening advanced, this little visit turned to serious business. If they had lumber and builders' supplies, why not hardware and paint and complete the line?

As always with younger people, the matter of finance loomed big. Having been friendly since childhood, it was suggested that they pool resources on a 50-50 basis; a condition still existing between the two families.

Follow your own path

A high school degree plus a college degree equals a good job after graduation.

That's been the formula we have been accustomed to for generations. It's what our parents did. Therefore, we expect future generations to continue that tradition.

But, what if that formula no longer works? What if getting a college degree doesn't equal getting a well-paying job – or any job? What if some high school graduates don't find themselves drawn to that approach in the first place?

Many of our high school graduates are heading off to college to pursue degrees in their fields of interest. But once they have their college degrees, it's no longer a sure bet they will find work. The economy is still sluggish, and depending on the career paths college students take, they may find they will have to wait several months – perhaps more than a year – before getting a job in their chosen field. And even when they find work, they may discover that their paychecks may not help them deal with all of the bills they will encounter.

One expense they may have to deal with for years comes from all the college loans they must secure to further their education. It costs a lot of money to attend a four-year college –

even ones within the State University of New York system, which promotes itself as an affordable alternative to private school. For example, the average New Yorker attending the University at Albany can expect to pay more than \$80,000 to receive a bachelor's degree in four years. Doesn't sound affordable, does it?

We're also at a point in our history where parents aren't as able as they once were to foot the bill for their children to attend college. With all of the economic stress average Americans face trying to stretch their pay to make their mortgage, car loan, credit card and utility payments on time – not to mention their own student loan debts, if they have them – they may find paying thousands of more dollars per year to send their children to college beyond their means.

This leaves today's high school graduates searching for scholarships to make college more affordable to them, seeking loans that may take them decades to pay off or putting off college to get whatever jobs they can in order to save up their own money for a college degree. It can be very stressful, especially when scholarships fall through or other obstacles come up.

It's not as if college is for every high

school graduate, either. Some find the coursework too difficult or are not in the right frame of mind to buckle down for another 4-6 years. Others may know exactly what they want to do with their lives after high school and plunge themselves into careers that don't require a college degree. Depending on their ambitions, some do quite well for themselves without ever receiving a diploma from an institute of higher learning.

So, maybe the traditional formula isn't for everyone. And maybe, we shouldn't push this formula on our children anymore. Maybe we should let them have some time after high school to determine what they really want to do. If it's something that requires a college degree, then we should encourage them to seek scholarships or save as much money as they can to help pay for it. If it's something they can do on their own without continuing their education at the next level, then we should encourage them to do that. And if they don't know what they want to do, the best thing is to let them explore as many options as possible before choosing their path.

The world is wide open to high school graduates. They shouldn't have to follow a formula to successfully navigate it.

Ice houses wouldn't survive this climate

For several decades leading into the 20th century, German immigrant Valentine Pappalau oversaw his family's ice harvesting business from just outside Albany, New York, cutting natural ice out of the Normans Kill and Hudson River. He was a local pioneer to an industry that introduced luxuries such as ice cream, as well as providing innovative means of food storage to a newly expanding middle class.

Pappalau lived within the Gilded Age, a time many economists agree created consumerism — when the working middle class began bringing home more income, allowing families to not only spend on needs, but luxury items as well. It was the dawn of the material world.

By 1910, the ice harvesting business was at its peak. It is estimated that 134 ice houses were present throughout New York's Hudson Valley. One such competitor of Pappalau was Schifferdicker's, whose ice house was located on the western shores of the river several miles south of Albany, within the Town of Bethlehem.

"In the summer, ice barges would come up river from New York City," wrote G.B. Schifferdicker. His grandfather

started the family ice business in the 1880s. "These barges were quite large as I remember; about 25 feet by 60 to 70 feet, and about seven-feet deep. The stored ice was... loaded into the barges and sent on its way.

"Of course ice cutting depended mainly on cold weather," wrote Mr. Schifferdicker, "usually mid-December and January. The lightest ice my father would take was 10 inches thick."

By the time Pappalau died in 1919, his aggregate worth was equivalent to three-quarters of a million dollars in today's economy. News of his death carried on the front page of Albany newspapers — as was the subsequent fight over his estate.

With the popularity of home refrigeration units starting in the 1930s, thanks in large part to General Electric in the neighboring city of Schenectady, the industry that sustained Pappalau's and Schifferdicker's family businesses disappeared.

Technology makes promises for a better future. But, as the phrases "global warming" and "climate change" have seeped into everyday discussion, people are starting to question what may be attached to the luxuries guaranteed by those advances.

In his book "Climate Change in the Adirondacks: The Path to Sustainability", Jerry Jenkins documents the observed changes to the winters in Upstate New

York, and speculates how those changes effect the local economy.

Jenkins, an ecologist by profession, identifies several different businesses dependent upon Adirondack winters — tourism, skiing, ice fishing, ice climbing; which, in turn, precipitates towards lodging, restaurants and local retail stores.

"If the winter season becomes short or unreliable," states Jenkins, "there will be fewer users and events. Without the users and events, the facilities will be abandoned, the service businesses will close..."

Though, Jenkins states that the Adirondacks have not experienced such winters, he looks to Western Massachusetts that has witnessed "increasingly brown winters" that have depleted winter-themed business. He suggests, through collected data, that Upstate New York is following a similar fate.

The ice houses of Pappalau and Schifferdicker have long since succumbed to the withering of time. In the hallow of Normans Kill, which also serves as a boundary between the City of Albany and Town of Bethlehem, lies the stone foundation of Pappalau's ice house. It's here where summer revelers once laid upon the sandy beaches that abutted the tricking creek, and the Pappalau's served the rare treat of ice cream. Now, it stands in conformity with the ghosts of a once bustling tourist spot. As Mr. Schifferdicker's memory served him, the winters of today would not support the ice harvesting business.

No bull at this rodeo

CDTA event tests the skills of its top drivers

There were plenty of cones, barrels and fancy maneuvering at a recent CDTA “roadeo,” but no bulls, horses or clowns as organizers crowned a repeat winner.

On Tuesday, June 10, at Crossgates, 22 veteran drivers made their way through 11 different obstacles at the 29th annual CDTA Bus Roadeo, but it was Robert Rzeszuto of the Schenectady division, who has been driving buses for CDTA for 28 years, who came out on top.

The top three winners of the event go on to the state competition and battle it out with other top bus drivers in the state.

“It builds camaraderie and stimulates a lot of trash talking between the divisions. Even though it is an individual competition, we are winning it for the division,” said Alton Ming, who has been driving for CDTA for eight years.

If a driver is interested in competing, they first have to qualify. In order to qualify for the competition, drivers need to be high quality employees that excel at their job.

“They have to meet certain criteria,” said CDTA Communications Manager Jaime Watson. “They have to actually qualify. They have to

have a safe driving record — no accidents out on the road, no employee problems, basically have to have a clean record all around.”

The obstacles in the are designed to be similar to situations the drivers may face on the congested, sometimes narrow streets of a city in the Capital District, although some are just for fun.

“Some of the obstacles are very near to real-life situations. We obviously put a spin on some of these just for the rodeo — as far as going through the barrels, obviously, that’s not going to be a real-life situation — but some of them, like backing up (in tight spaces) or going through the narrow cones. These are situations drivers run into out on the roads, like bad weather, snow particularly,” said Watson.

While the course is meant to be challenging and fun, it also serves to help drivers hone in skills and keep them on their toes.

“You’ve got some challenges every day. Sometimes, going without having an accident and you’re being safe, you can develop a cockiness about you. This brings you back down to earth. If you don’t finish first here, you know you’re not as good as you thought. There’s room for improvement. It’s a humbling experience,” said Ming.

Local law enforcement officials volunteered their time as judges to assess the contestants’ driving skills, knowledge of safety rules and time performance. Contestants were judged on their times and ability to navigate the course with precision.

Second-place winner Keith Strait comes from the Schenectady Division with 27 years of service. Bobby Venturiello, who came in third, is also from the Schenectady Division with three years of service. Corey Bixby, who has eight years of service with the Schenectady Division, placed fourth.

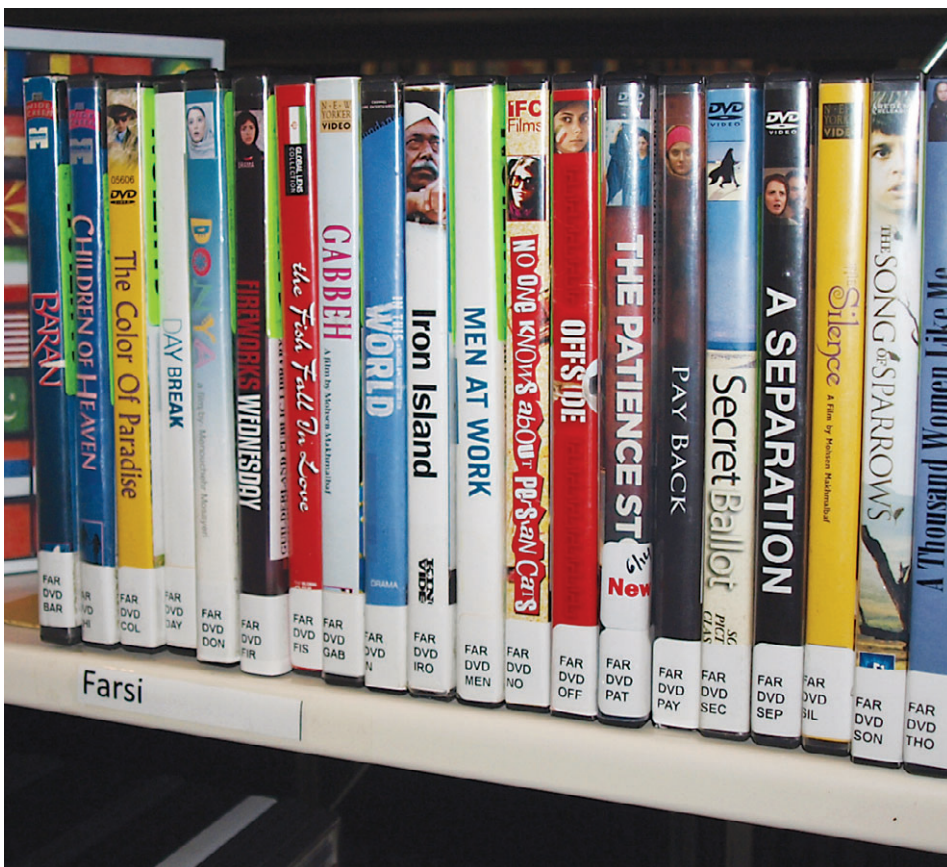
The film was released in 1960, and is contemporaneous with today's "Mad Men." It's interesting to see the visual similarities between the movie and the TV series.

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Moving can make you feel like a fish out of water, planning can bring you home

Life changes have a way of making us feel like fish out of water. They pull us from the familiar and leave us with an internal desire to wiggle back to a place we are more accustomed to—a place that makes us feel safe. Sometimes these changes are small, like shopping at a new grocery store or being rerouted on your way to work by a detour in the road. Other changes, such as starting a new job or school, are more monumental. But when it comes to really pushing us out of our comfort zone, few things knock the fish tank over quite like a move.

Moving can be and often is an emotional rollercoaster. It's full of twists and turns and steep climbs we know will barrel us toward a great unknown. That's part of the fun...and part of the discomfort. But not every part of a move needs to be so exhilarating and edge-of-your-seat. In fact, the more you can anticipate and control when you move, the more you can enjoy the ride and quicker you can feel at home. The following 12 tips will help you better acclimate.

1. Complete a change of address. Updating your legal documents, investment holdings,

bank accounts, insurance policies, driver's license, etc., is a good place to start as you funnel your way to your new town.

2. Check with your current providers in the following areas for referrals in your new town:

- General practitioner, pediatrician, Ob-gyn, etc.
- Mechanic and car dealer
- Plumber, electrician and project contractor

3. Contact the local chamber of commerce and inquire about both personal and business benefits. For the self-employed, this is a must. Chambers of commerce are great advocates for new businesses and can help you get your business up to speed in an otherwise unfamiliar environment.

4. Make a list of contact numbers for local hospital and emergency services. Learn their location relative to your new home. Although it may feel primitive, having that all-important emergency contact list in a central location still works when you've got a bleeder.

5. Contact your town's parks and recreation center to learn about their programs and services. Look for ways to volunteer and become active in your new community. Sometimes when we put ourselves out there we can't help but discover what we didn't think to look for.

6. Take advantage of your smartphone to find local businesses, such as grocery stores, farmers' markets, gas stations, AAA, dry cleaners, child-care providers, movie theaters, restaurants and religious organizations.

7. Review your current auto and homeowner's policy with your insurer for possible discounts and/or changes to your policy. We are busy people, so finding time to review our auto policy usually isn't top of mind for most of us. However, making a move is a great catalyst to review policies that are designed

to protect you in the event of a liability claim and/or accident.

8. Review state income and sales tax rates for your new town. Consider changing your income tax preparer, especially if you have moved to a different state. When it comes to understanding and managing your local tax liability, don't mismatch your provider—stay local.

9. Visit payscale.com to estimate the cost of living in your new town and its relative impact on your expected disposable income. Some towns are less obvious when it comes to relative costs, so it is best to find out ahead of your move than it is to fall short at the end of the month.

10. Review any and all trust documents. Consider referrals for local attorneys from your current estate attorney and/or local bank. Your advisors know you and they know your situation, which positions them to make the best referrals.

11. If working for a new employer, gather and review all your employer benefits. The benefits you receive today will determine the benefits you will get in the future.

12. Consider working with a financial planner to help you model your goals. Moving provides an opportunity to "clean the slate," assess your current position and define your goals.

In the end, we can't be fish out of water forever. That desire to wiggle in a new environment is our natural instinct—our minds telling us we need a sense of home and a return to structure. The best way to successfully do this when making a move is to minimize the shock of displacement. Much like when a goldfish travels from the pet store to the kid's room, it's all about acclimation. The list above can help. It can take away some of the unexpected twists and turns that, while great on a rollercoaster, are not ideal for easing into a new environment. More important, it can provide the structure you need to more quickly fall into your new routine, which is really what makes a house your home.

Calculating the costs of moving

Moving is stressful . . . and expensive. On the low end, the American Moving and Storage Association estimates that the average move between states costs \$5,360. On the high end, Worldwide ERC, a relocation services company, estimates that the average cost of a move within the United States is \$12,459. Either way, it's a sizable chunk of change. It is also something many individuals and families moving to a new location don't fully account for.

The best way to de-stress a move and control cost is to plan. The following list provides a look at some things you should account for:

- Movers and/or rental truck or container. If you're going to hire movers, get bids from reputable providers and be clear on their price structure—by the hour, pound or cubic foot. You can verify licenses and insurance by visiting www.safer.mfcsa.dot.gov/CompanySnapshot.aspx. Moving at nonpeak times, such as the middle of the month or from October to March, can help you get more competitive rates. If you're more of a do-it-yourselfer, recruiting friends and family to help you move can save you a lot of money. You'll still have the cost of a truck rental or cargo container/pod, but the overall cost savings is significant. Be sure to book early.

- Packing materials. Ask friends and family if they have any boxes lying around that you can use. You can also find

boxes at the local liquor store, grocer or recycling center. If you need additional boxes, shopping online can help you land significant discounts.

- Delays. Closings get delayed. It's one of the surprising twists and turns that are an unfortunate but not uncommon part of the process. It is also expensive. First, you may need to put your household goods in storage. Second, you may need to pay for additional truck rentals or moving expenses. Third, you may need to pay for someplace to temporarily live. You would be well served to account for each of these unforeseen expenses in your moving budget.

- Tax deductions. That's right. If your move is job related, you can deduct some of your moving expenses. The following conditions apply: you must move within a year of your first day on the job and your new office has to be at least 50 miles farther from your old house than your old office was. Deductible expenses include moving your household goods and travel. For more information, see IRS Publication 521, Moving Expenses.

You can't plan too much or too far ahead when you're making a move. Also, while it may be stressful, there are many resources available to you, from the Internet to moving professionals, friends, family and even your banker. You just need to seek out help.

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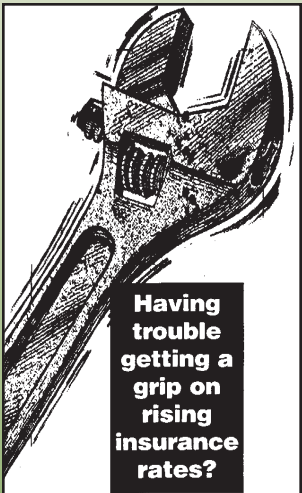

attached to it,” the lot line amendment came before the board.

The rezone recommendation, however, was tabled until board members heard comments from the state Department of Transportation regarding potential traffic impacts of the more intensive usage. The rezone would affect the 1.35-acre parcel at 2444 Western Ave.

Board members tentatively placed Tri-Way on the agenda for its next meeting on Wednesday, June 25, but stressed a reasonable amount of time would be needed to review DOT comments.

John Haluska, of Lone Pine Road, said he was concerned the “deteriorated” bank building on the property next to Cumberland Farms would not be demolished. Tri-Way does own both properties.

“This building has been here for a very, very long period of time deteriorating probably going back to 2000,” said Haluska. “My concern is if we don’t do anything

about this at these particular meetings, we are going to have the same problem in 2024. I don’t think anybody here wants to see that building sitting around as is in 2024.”

Haluska also suggested combining the two lots into one, which would allow for an area as a pad site for possible development.

“That would serve the community a little bit more and much more than what we have now,” he said.

Tom Burke, president of Tri-Way Services, Inc., said the bank building was deteriorated when he purchased the property, and he intends to redevelop the site.

“Our intention is when we get this corner developed ... and get Cumberland Farms going, we have interest from people who want to be there, but it is all contingent on the first thing happening,” Burke said. “I want to redevelop the property. I don’t make any money with a vacant lot.”

Bitter, when asked, said the developer was not looking to have one, larger combined lot zoned general business.

Weston said she was “hesitant” to recommend the requested rezone without “a more comprehensive approach and study” of the property.

“While I am not necessarily opposed to a convenience store gas station on this site, there are a number of comments and concerns that should be addressed before the town moves forward on this request,” Weston said.

Once the property is rezoned to general business, any permitted usage could not be restricted. The rezone also can’t be conditioned on what usage will be on the property.

“It is incumbent upon this board to make sure this lot is appropriate for any of those uses and support any of those uses, particularly in traffic,” Weston said.

Bitter said Tri-Way is proposing to build a 4,500-square-foot store, with six pumps each having two dispensers. The local business zoning allows for the convenience store usage, but not gas pumps.

“The key decision here is the rezone,” Planning Board Chairman Stephen

Feeney said. “You would be very hard-pressed to deny the project once it is zoned appropriately.”

Feeney said the board would need to see DOT comments before making any decision because traffic implications are a main concern.

Burke said there are “legitimate” issues to be considered with the project, but they were only seeking approval for the rezone. He said the rezone would be consistent with the “character and nature” of the community.

He did acknowledge the rezone was different from what is described in the Guilderland Hamlet Neighborhood Plan, but said it’s “a living, breathing document.”

“You can’t look at something static and old,” Burke said. “Stewart’s was zoned (general business) and expanded. Residential property was converted into general business.”

Planning Board member Bruce Sherwin took umbrage with Burke’s characterization of the study.

“I don’t think it is proper to kind of write it off as something that can be just ignored because you want something else to happen,” Sherwin said.

Fellow board member Thomas Robert said the traffic patterns at the proposed store would be different from what Stewart’s experiences and has different issues.

As awareness of the rail trail grew, so did the popularity of the summer solstice event. Last year’s theme was Fairytales and Fireflies, since the trail walk was held in the evening to coincide with the actual solstice. The date and time was changed this year so more people would be able to attend.

Kathy McCarthy, a volunteer with the MHLC, said a lot more people wanted to attend in past years, but it was hard with the solstice being on a weeknight. Others typically would have to leave early.

To fix the problem, this year’s celebration will be held on Sunday, June 22, from noon to 3 p.m. There will be three access points: the intersection of Adams Street and Hudson Avenue in Delmar, Fireman’s Park in Slingerlands and the newly opened western terminus of the trail at Voorheesville Avenue in Voorheesville. In order to ensure all visitors can participate in all the events, a shuttle will be available to bring people to each access point.

“We found the one-mile stretch could be too long for children, so we decided to include the shuttle so people could enjoy all the festivities,” said McCarthy.

The afternoon will include performances by musicians and dancers, baby animals, food vendors, nature walks and some history discussions. For the children, there are typically games, crafts and face painting.

At this year’s event, the community will also

be asked to take part in creating a special piece of art.

“We are going to create a community mural — printed on vinyl so that it can travel,” said Montalto-Rook. “We commissioned Bethlehem artist, Ellie Prakken, to create a mural representing the rail trail.”

Community participants will then work together to complete the project, with fair attendees asked to create the leaves for the murals trees. Montalto-Rook said once it is complete, the mural will go on tour to town halls and libraries before being displayed at the Albany Visitor’s Center until June 2015.

MHLC Executive Director Mark King said he thinks the Summer Solstice celebration will be bigger and better than ever before.

“I think the event reflects the momentum the entire rail trail project has now that things are moving forward,” said King. “The pace is quickening, and we can’t wait for the improvements that are going to take place over the next year.”

Montalto-Rook said the event provides a chance for people to explore the rail trail who have never visited before. She said the trail is not only a great recreational opportunity, but will eventually provide another way for people to commute from their local communities into the City of Albany.

“It’s also a nice, little pocket of nature right in our backyard,” she said.

The Summer Solstice celebration will be held on Sunday, June 22, from noon to 3 p.m. in Delmar, Slingerlands and Voorheesville.

facilities proposition as the district was already a year behind its five-year maintenance plan due to lack of funds and staff cutbacks. Upgrades were suggested to fix the infrastructure of buildings, upgrade water and lighting fixtures, replace aging equipment and upgrade outdated technology systems.

Voters did not approve funding for the installation of a \$3.8 million artificial turf athletic field, which included a regulation-size track, improvements to spectator seating and press box and a new score board.

According to District Business Officer Judi Kehoe, the district anticipates that it will receive aid on 95 percent of the cost of the project. The state then applies a building aid ratio to that total to determine the amount of aid the district will receive.

“For Bethlehem, the aid ratio is approximately 70 percent,” said Kehoe. “Building aid from the state is paid over the life of a project, not in a lump sum. This corresponds to the repayment term on the bonds issued to finance the project and helps lessen the local tax burden over that same period.”

Douglas said students will not be disturbed during the final two weeks of the school year because inside work will begin during vacation.

One of the first things to be worked on are the district’s athletic fields. Many of the fields need work to help with drainage issues and irrigation. New grass will

also be planted. The tennis courts and track will all be resurfaced, and lighting will be added to the stadium field.

With these upgrades, Director of Facilities and Operations Gregg Nolte said the public will not be able to access those areas, and use of district fields will not allowed this summer. Some woods will also be cleared near the middle school tennis courts.

“A lot of the trees are growing into the fences and causing debris, and the root system is causing some of the courts to heave,” said Nolte. “That’s part of the reason the courts have deteriorated so we’re creating a little bit of a buffer.”

Nolte said if anyone is looking for field use, the public should contact the district office for scheduling purposes.

Douglas said the main athletic field will not be ready by the fall, but the district has agreements with Union College and the University at Albany for home games to be played on their fields. The district will also make sure all senior nights continue to be special events for Bethlehem’s student athletes.

Members of the public will also not have access to Elsmere, Glenmont and Hamagrael Elementary because of asbestos abatements and playground installation. The playgrounds will be available for use until about mid-July, when the equipment is slated for installation.

Nolte said asbestos abatement will take place in part of Slingerlands Elementary. The town will be running its camp in part of the building and the playground, but the rest of the building will be closed off.

“We want to make sure the town talks to anyone involved in the program that we have work going on at the school, but it is safe to have their kids there,” said Nolte. “We would never put the safety of the kids at risk.”

The middle school will have restricted access as the bathrooms are being renovated. Summer enrichment programs will continue there as planned. The high school will also have restricted access as the water line is replaced and technology upgrades are made.

Douglas said district officials are working hard to make sure the projects come in on budget and on time.

“If any members of the public have questions, they should feel free to call our office or visit the website,” said Douglas. “We would ask that once construction is fully under way, please stay out of the construction areas so we can ensure safety and not hold up the project.”

Nolte said residents can expect updates from his office about the project over the next two years.

Pennsylvania that helps equip churches in Africa to meet the needs of children who have lost parents due to AIDS.

“Teens are really enthusiastic, and they have shown us that this is important to them and they want to make a difference in the world,” said Joe Vinette, Christ’s Church student ministry pastor. “We want to give them that opportunity.”

The event, which began in the church parking lot, has become one of the main events for teenagers in the Guilderland area every June.

“It’s grown into an event with hundreds of kids,” Vinette said, adding that they can usually expect close to 1,000 kids to attend.

More recently, the event has been held at the Guilderland Performing

Arts Center in Tawasentha Park in Guilderland. In May, 12 bands auditioned before judges for a place on Nervosity’s stage. At least half of the kids in the band are required to be in high school. The rest of the band members can be middle school or college students. No professional bands are allowed in the competition.

In addition to musicianship, stage presence and originality, the bands are judged on how well they interact with the crowd. The applause at the end of the final song will be recorded by a meter — the higher the volume of the applause, the higher the score.

T-shirts, raffles and food for sale with all proceeds benefiting the Forgotten Voices organization.

Vinette said that although the event has a “teen base friendliness” to it, everybody is welcome.


“If somebody’s grandmother wants to come, they can come,” he said.

Vinette said he believes that every teen desires a good purpose, they just need a place to begin. Nervosity is a way for teens to listen to music and enjoy time with friends while helping to change the world.

“We believe in the culture of tomorrow, and teens are the culture of today. We want a culture that gives and teaches giving and being generous,” he said.

way for people to donate that don't want to get dressed up. They can come with their kids, with or without their dogs, and raise money," said Nancy Laribee, the marketing and development director for the Hudson Mohawk Humane Society.

"It costs \$200 to \$250 to care for an animal for an average stay, including shots, food and care. We handle around 6,000 animals a year. It's a way for people to have fun and come together to support the animals by raising money with their friends or their company," said Laribee.

This is the first year that the event will have a canine grand marshal. Laribee said Hudson and his owner do a lot in the community, and if things go well, Hudson could be a repeat marshal.

"This is the first time we've had canine grand marshal ... so it should be fun," said Laribee.

Hudson is a blue-nosed pit bull with a prosthetic paw. Part of his leg had to be amputated after it became infected from injuries caused by his original owner abusing and neglecting him and two of his siblings. A railroad worker found the puppies on railroad tracks in Albany in 2012.

Hudson's owner Richard Nash said he and his wife, Rosemarie, were eager to help Hudson from the minute they heard about him. The Nash family also has

another rescued pit bull.

"We saw him (Hudson) on the news, and when Mohawk Hudson Humane Society announced they were doing the essay contest, we were one of many chosen to do a meet and greet with one of the dogs to see if we were compatible. So we brought in our dog, and they got along great, like siblings," said Nash.

The Humane Society and Nash work together on fundraising events, and Nash said he was honored Hudson was asked to be the grand marshal.

"We try to do a lot for the shelter with raising money, and they asked if we wanted Hudson to

be grand marshal. That's quite the honor, so we said yes."

Hudson and the Nashes do more than just raise money for the charity. Hudson is a registered therapy dog who brings joy to people all over the Capital District.

"Every Monday, we go to Saratoga Bridges, a place for the elderly and people with developmental disabilities. The people there love him, and he brightens their day," said Nash.

Paws in the Park is adding more activities for kids this year in the hope that people will make it a family event. New to this year are a Kids Zone with Balloon Gal Jenny,

There is also a Pet-Parent Look-A Like contest.

Even if you don't have a pet, you can come out donate to help a good cause.

"People don't have to have their dogs to come walk. The first year, the winning team walked for a woman who loved her cats, and their shirts were pictures of the woman's cats. It's not just to support dogs, it helps to support all the animals at the shelter," said Laribee.

Hudson has his own Facebook page with a link to help raise money for the walk. By Friday afternoon, June 13, \$2,115 had already been donated. 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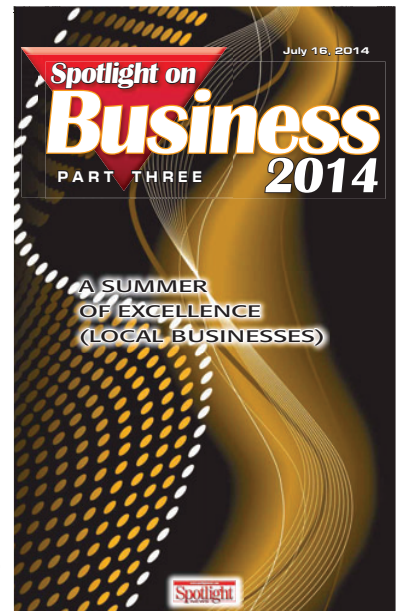

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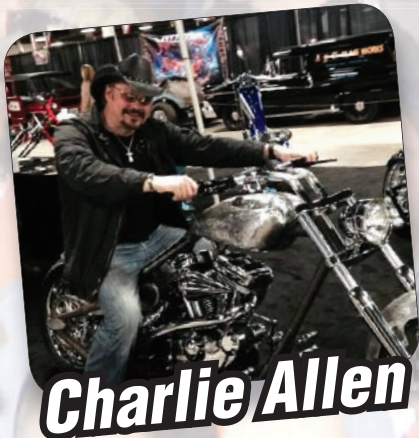


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
