# Court strikes cyberbullying law

Judges say statute unconstitutional, McCoy seeking new bill

Being a cyberbully in Albany County is no longer a crime, at least for now.

The state Court of Appeals struck down the county's cyberbullying law in a 5-2 decision Monday, July 1, with the majority ruling the statute as written was overbroad and violated the Free Speech Clause of the First Amendment. The legal challenge stemmed from the arrest of a 15-year-old Cohoes High School student on cyberbullying charges in June 2011.

The court's decision describes how a more focused statute applying only to minors would stand. Albany County Executive Dan McCoy vowed to work with legislators to draft a new law.

"Cyberbullying is a serious concern that all communities must confront, but there are better and more constructive ways to address the problem than giving children criminal records," Corey Stoughton, an attorney for the New York Civil Liberties Union Foundation representing the teenager, said in a prepared statement.

The teenage boy pleaded guilty to cyberbullying, with the understanding it did not preclude him

# **Compactor out of commission**

Bethlehem's unit fails inspection as town seeks replacement; garbage service undisrupted

Bethlehem residents are still able to drop off garbage at the town's transfer station on Rupert Road, but wait times may be longer than usual.

Highway Superintendent

Brent Meredith said the trash compacting trailer at the transfer station failed to pass inspection recently. An alternative collection process has since been put into place, so residents can still drop off their garbage.

"We knew the trailer wasn't in good condition, and it was scheduled to be replaced next year," said Meredith. "It reached the end of its life a bit early, so we're going to be seeking funds to replace it now."

The inspection on the trailer

expired on June 30. When members of the highway maintenance crew went to reinspect the trailer, they found the condition of the equipment to be deteriorating further than expected, and it was taken office.

Procedures at the transfer station have now changed until a new trailer can be purchased. Meredith said he plans to go before the Town Board to ask for

# Fowl are fair game in G'land

Zoning board precedent allows pet chickens, Town Board to weigh zoning revisions

Seeking to keep chickens on residential property in Guilderland will typically be much less of a public appeal — at least until any changes are made to the town code.

The Guilderland Zoning Board of Appeals granted two requests for interruptions on keeping six laying hens Wednesday, July 2, after determining past decisions on similar requests have set a precedent allowing such

usage. Board members had claimed prior decisions did not set precedents and each case would be evaluated individually. Only a building



permit for the required coop is needed.

Laura and Dan Spanbauer, of Morgan Court, and Lisa Alonzi, of New Williamsburg Drive, were requesting to keep up to six chickens outdoors on their property. Both live within a singlefamily zone.

"Residents are submitting plans and supporting narratives that are consistent with the

# Local funnyman joins elite club

Loudonville man jokes his way to New York's Friars Club

After being in the business just over 12 years, a born and raised Loudonville man was inducted into an elite club of comedians, actors and others in the entertainment business.

Joining the ranks of comedians from Billy Crystal to Jerry Seinfeld, on June 18, comedian and business owner Greg Aidala, 40, was inducted into the Friars Club in New York City. As the owner of Radial Gage Entertainment, Aidala has entrepreneurship in his blood. In 1943, his grandfather opened Quail Auto in Albany, and his family still owns and operates the business. He also hosts and produces the Brew Ha-Ha Comedy Showcase, a touring showcase that has entertained over 10,000 people.

Despite all his accomplishments, Aidala says his induction into the Friars Club is one of the biggest highlights of his career.

"It was pretty sweet. What was cool is I got to bring my dad. There were 12 inductees and a ceremony," said Aidala. "I am so honored to be part of that. It was something I've always wanted to be a part of, and to have that happen is a definite highlight of my career. It really is the Mecca of the entertainment."

Not just anyone can get into the club. To be considered, a member has to be sponsored by two current members. There is also a walkthrough and an interview.

Aidala got into the business 12-and-a-half years ago when he saw an advertisement looking for comics to perform with Colin Quinn from Saturday Night Live. "There was a show happening over in Troy, and I pestered the guy for three-and-a-half weeks and they finally let me on. I'd never done standup, only in college I did improv and acting. I played music my whole life and hosted a few events in high school," said Aidala.

The host of the show was a radio personality that encouraged Aidala to pursue a career in comedy. After that, he got involved in a competition that he ended up winning. From there, he went on to book performances in Albany and began hosting five shows a week over a sixweek period.

The knowledge and experience helped him to make his own show that would sell out to 50 or 60 people at a time, however many people the bar or club could hold. After being invited on an AM radio talk show, a representative from Budweiser called Adaila and offered to sponsor him.

"He liked my concept, and they wound up going on to sponsor me for four-and-a-half years. They paid for ads, all my flyers, two by three waterproof flyers — I could've never afforded all that stuff, no way," said Aidala.

In 2004, Aidala was on the west coast and decided it was time for a change of pace. Growing up in a family business, he had always wanted to start his own business and wanted

to come back to Albany and bring some laughs to the area. In April 2005, he had his first show at the Egg. Aidala had also known Tess Collins of Tess' Lark Tavern since he was 25, and she wanted him to put on a show at her tavern.

Aidala had been performing in New York City for some time and acquired a big circle of friends in the business when his plan came to him.

"The idea hit me, so I came back and sat down with Tess and Budweiser and said I want to do a showcase. We'll call it the Brew Ha-Ha Comedy Showcase. We'll mix the beer and the comedy. We

kicked it off in January of 2006, and it took off," said Aidala.

Coming from a family of eight brothers and sisters, family plays a big role in Aidala's routine. It was also elemental in the development of his love of comedy. When Aidala was a child, his mother died. Instead of staying sad, he looked for the humor in things.

"My mother died when I was seven. She died of breast cancer in 1981. So, my father said when we were kids that we were going to work through this with teamwork and humor. So, humor was a big part of my life and a healing power," said Aidala.

He also got a great deal of enjoyment out of comedy shows and movies from "The Little Rascals" to the Dean Martin roast, which was one of his favorites. "Roasts" have been conducted at the Friars Club since 1949.

"That's when the roast got into my head because I saw these guys sitting around making fun of each other, and I was like 'what the hell is this?' Low and behold, doesn't it work out that I'm in the club?" said Aidala.

# The stage is set

#### **Cue Theatre** makes its move to a permanent space in Delmar

Unfortunate circumstances sometimes afford new opportunities.

After learning Community United Methodist Church in Slingerlands was closing its doors, the operators of The Cue Theatre didn't know what was next. Once they took some time to think of their future prospects, they opted to take a leap of faith and rent their own space.

"We didn't think we would have the ability to go out on our own so soon," said Executive Director Elana Kaminer.

Artistic Director SuzAnne Dunn said she had been a director of productions for kids and teens throughout the Capital District, but decided to take a break after her program became too big and an excess of kids joined. She decided to take a step back and begin Cue the Classroom, a new outreach program where Dunn visits area schools to enhance instruction of the performing arts.

"Kids kept coming up to me and saying 'This can't be your last show.' and didn't really give me an option," said Dunn. "So I talked with Elana about instead of just doing the classroom program, actually starting up an educational theater.

The Cue Theatre began in April 2013 through a space-share agreement with the church. The program offers afternoon and summer classes to students in kindergarten through college, and puts on about five productions per year for the community. Shows in the fall and spring have open auditions for people throughout the Capital District.

Dunn has an extensive background in theater, while Kaminer previously worked with nonprofits and was brought on to help market Cue the Classroom. She then decided to take on a larger role when the educational theater program began.

Kaminer said they toyed with the idea of doing another space-share, but ultimately decided to rent their own space and make it their own.

"Although we are a relatively new business, there is a great need for these types of educational opportunities," Kaminer said. "Having the space means we can expand our programming to meet the needs of students here in town and the entire Capital Region."

Renovations to the new space on Becker Terrace in Delmar are nearly complete. A new, permanent stage has been built, and the space is now undergoing a paint job. Summer classes began at the new location as soon as the move happened.

Dunn said having their own space provides the company more freedom, and they no longer have to worry about being in the way of others.

Both women said program is beneficial to kids of all personality types, with those who are a bit shy to athletes and extroverts taking part.

There are also educational opportunities for those who may not want to act, but want to learn another aspect of theater production. Participants can learn how to build sets, paint scenery, design costumes, video edit, do audio or help with the orchestra. They can also learn the business aspects of theater by helping sell tickets, run concession or work as ushers. Dunn said the programs are supposed to be an allencompassing look into



the theater industry, and often work as an offshoot of school drama clubs.

"The area school districts have great theater programs, but a lot of times there are only so many parts to go around or a limited number of shows," said Dunn. "That isn't the same with us because we can provide more opportunities."

Along with the scheduled production of "Seussical" in August, The

Cue Theatre will soon be putting on a cabaret show of favorite showtunes to act as a fundraiser for the move. The show will be put on by the theater's older teens and college students as a way to give

The shows attract people of all ages, and not just the parents of students. Dunn said some are bringing their children to see shows for the first time, where others are

#### Two dead in Thruway crash

A multi-vehicle crash on the Thruway the night of Independence Day killed two people in their early 20s, according to police.

State Police received a report of a serious crash involving several vehicles just before midnight Friday, July 4,

An Altamont man near mile marker 151 on I-90 westbound, which is between exits 24 and 25.

> Preliminary investigation revealed Tyler S. Pascuzzi, 24, of Coxsackie, was allegedly driving a 2004 Volkswagen GLI with two passengers in the center lane at a high rate of speed. Pascuzzi then allegedly struck a 2003 Honda Civic driven by Brian T. Miller, 29, of Schenectady. Miller reportedly lost control of his car and hit the center guide rail and stopped.

Pascuzzi's vehicle then started spinning in a westerly direction and hit an Old Dominion Freight Lines tractor-trailer. Upon impact with the trailer, the Volkswagen separated into two pieces.

The two passengers of the Volkswagen -Cody J. Veverka, 23, of South Cairo, and Alicia M. Tamboia, 24, of Wingdale were ejected and pronounced dead at the scene, according to police.

Pascuzzi and Miller were transported to Albany Medical Center with non-life threatening injuries. The tractor-trailer driver was not injured.

Police said there was another car striking parts of the Volkswagen, which caused damage to the car, but the driver was not injured.

State Police Troop G Bureau of Criminal Investigation and Collision Reconstruction Units responded to the scene and are handling the investigation.

No charges have been filed yet, but police said the investigation is ongoing.

# Refine the focus of law

The state Court of Appeals' decision to strike down Albany County's cyberbullying law shouldn't deter county legislators from coming up with a new one. All they need to do is refine the focus of the law.

At its heart, the county's cyberbullying law had the right intent by addressing online bullying. The law was meant to put a stop to people using social media to make threats against or denigrate others and went so far as to make it a criminal offense.

The flaw that the Court of Appeals saw in the county's law was the broadness of the language. The law prohibited the bullying of "any minor or person," which the justices saw as restricting free speech. By definition, anyone could be called a cyberbully if he or she posted a statement online that others took offense to. For instance, if an adult posted a statement on Facebook that could be described as racist, that person could have been prosecuted as a criminal in Albany County and forced to pay a fine up to \$1,000 and serve up to one year in prison.

Now we may not agree with what

that person said, but in the United States we have an amendment to our Constitution protecting free speech. That means even though the statement would clearly go against popular opinion, it's still allowed to be said – even on the Internet. It's up to us how we react to it.

Allowing derogatory statements to be made against a child, though, is an entirely different matter. As a community, one of our prime directives is to provide a safe environment for our children to grow up in. That goal has become far more difficult in recent years, as children are increasingly finding themselves in dangerous situations. All anyone has to do is look at the number of violent attacks in schools since 1999 to see how quickly an institution we once thought of as a safe haven has been threatened.

Cyberbullying may not be violent in nature, but it is psychologically damaging to the children targeted by comments that are intimidating, threatening, humiliating or embarrassing. And since these comments are often made anonymously, it makes it harder for

children to feel safe when they walk through the halls of their schools or on the streets of their neighborhoods. If they don't know who made the comments, they can assume anyone

Some may see this as a double standard. Why should we stifle anybody's right to free speech, even if it's directed against a child? To this, we say think about if this happened to your child. How would you feel if your child was threatened or embarrassed by something posted on the Internet? Wouldn't you want those responsible for making the comments to be held

the legislature are going back to the drawing board to come up with a new cyberbullying law - one that focuses on protecting children.

"Sometimes you don't get it right out of the gate, but someone had to do it," McCoy said. And for that, we commend county lawmakers for making that effort. Hopefully, they'll draft a new law that is constitutional

# Brazilian trip an eye-opener

All my life, I have listened to amazing stories from people who have had amazing experiences. Now it has become my turn to tell an exuberant story.

In this past month of June, I have traveled to Rio de Janeiro to attend the 2014 FIFA World Cup and see major cultural aspects of the country of Brazil. I traveled with nine other students and two professors from Western New England University, where I am completing my under graduate degree in sport management.

As a delegation, within 10 days of traveling in Rio we happened to fit the following activities into our itinerary: three 2014 FIFA World Cup matches (Argentina vs. Bosnia Herzegovina, Spain vs. Chile, and Belgium vs. Russia), more than eight cite tours including Christ the Redeemer and the largest Favela village in Latin America.

My story starts with my first professional soccer game, let alone my first 2014 FIFA World Cup game. Argentina vs. Bosnia Herzegovina on June 15, the day we landed in Rio, was the breathtaking part of the trip. Sitting in Maracana Stadium with 74,738 people in attendance was incomparable to anything I had

experienced prior to this trip. Imagine standing in a concert venue listening to a crowd cheer on an encore, and multiply that sound and feeling by a factor of 40. That major sound and excitement was happening the entire game, whether or not there was a goal.

Watching the former 2010 FIFA World Cup champion, Spain, get eliminated in the group stage was unbelievable. The stadium was filled with primarily Chilean fans dressed in white, red and blue. They all whistled and yelled throughout the game. When the goal was scored, it was as if Chile had won the World Cup finals. Maracana erupted with cheers, whistles and fans embracing each other with congratulations. To give you a better idea of how wild and passionate the Chilean fans were, prior to the game 85 Chileans were deported after tearing down a small wall in Maracana Stadium because they were so excited.

Though the matches were a large part of the greatness of my trip, there were major cultural aspects that made a huge impact. I visited Corcovado Mountain where the globally esteemed Cristo Redentor, also known as "Christ the Redeemer," stands tall over the city of Rio de Janeiro. Standing at an elevation of more 2.000 ft., this statue is visited by millions of people across the globe. The most interesting part when I reached the top of the mountain at the statue was the amount of Americans that stood beside me carrying flags and other apparel representing our country.

There was one experience that outshined even the matches for me — touring the Favela village. A Favela is a slum in Brazil most often found in urban areas. This Favela was named "Rocinha" and was located in Rio de Janiero. Rocinha is the largest Favela in Latin America, taking over about 20 percent of Brazil's entire population. Rocinha holds a population to an estimated 200,000 people. Our delegation was able to gain the opportunity to tour this area. Not only was it one of the most eyeopening experiences of my entire life, but touring this Favela also made me appreciate the small things that can make someone happy.

We ended our tour at a day care named "Union of Women for the Betterment of Roupa Suja." This daycare was run by volunteer women and had three floors separated by age groups. We donated Western New England University T-shirts and soccer balls on our way out of the day care. I have never seen 4-year olds ever so happy in my entire life. Just by being given a soccer ball, these little children were so grateful for our small gift they couldn't stop smiling, laughing and saving thank you in

I have such a great appreciation for even being able to be a part of such a cultural experience through the Favela. It was the most influential part of the entire trip.



from challenging the law's constitutionality. He was sentenced as a youthful offender to probation for three years.

The teenager created the "Cohoes Flame" Facebook page, where he posted pictures of classmates and made mostly derogatory and sexually related comments.

"Although the First Amendment may not give the defendant the right to engage in these activities, the text of Albany County's law envelops far more than acts of cyberbullying against children by criminalizing a variety of constitutionally protected modes of expression," Associate Judge Victoria Graffeo said in the majority opinion.

Chief Judge Jonathan Lippman and judges Susan Phillips Read, Jenny Rivera and Sheila Abdus-Salaam joined Graffeo in striking down the law. The dissenting judges were Robert S. Smith and Eugene Pigott Jr.

The only other instance of cyberbullying charges was against four Guilderland teenagers in November of last year. The four boys allegedly were involved in posting an explicit rap song online, which detailed alleged sexual encounters of fellow students.

Andrew Safranko, an attorney representing one of the Guilderland court's ruling.

"We had thought all along the statute was constitutionally broad and violating of first amendment rights as it was written," said Safranko.

Safranko's client, along with the other three Guilderland teens, will have his case dismissed. The case was scheduled to be heard by the court in the

All four boys were suspended from Guilderland High School for a period of time.

NYCLU Executive Director Donna Lieberman said schools statewide already must follow the Dignity for All Students

Act and should "find other constructive ways" to address bullying.

"Arresting children for what they say or write won't create safe, nurturing schools," Lieberman said in a prepared statement. "It takes a positive educational approach, not jail or handcuffs, to teach children how to treat each other with decency and respect."

The Dignity for teenagers, agreed with the All Students Act was implemented in 2010 and addressed bullies' actions within the confines of school walls. Districts are required to train educators to identify and address bullying, along with providing programming teaching children to treat others respectfully.

> Amendments were made in 2012 to the state law to address forms of cyberbullying, but county lawmakers passed its cyberbullying law in 2010.

> Albany County's law expanded the focus to directly address online bullying, but in a way the court ruled as being too broad. A targeted approach toward youths would likely pass constitutional muster.

We are not looking to take away anyone's first amendment rights. What

we are trying to do is protect children," McCoy said. 'Sometimes you don't get it right out of the gate, but someone had to do it.

The county's law had defined cyberbullying as "a course of conduct or repeatedly committing acts of abusive behavior over a period of time by communicating" electronically or posting statements on the Internet.

Examples of abusive behavior included in the law were "taunting, threatening, intimidating, insulting, tormenting, humiliating; disseminating embarrassing or sexually explicit photographs; disseminating private, personal, false or sexual information; or sending hate mail."

The law prohibited anyone from cyberbullying "any minor or person," with the NYCLU contending the "or person" in court.

The misdemeanor charge carried a fine up to \$1,000 and up to one year in prison.

McCoy said some legislators have expressed interest in drafting a new cyberbullying law.

"I want to make sure that a kid can just be a kid," McCoy said. "They shouldn't have to worry about all this stuff. I am not trying to put laws on the books that make no sense."

capital reserve money to be used for the new trailer. Initial estimates are around \$85,000.

"I do think replacing it is the most costeffective option," said Meredith. "We've looked at alternatives, but they are more expensive and provide us with the same services."

Officials from the highway department have looked at using a packer truck to take in the garbage, but the trucks' hydraulics have to be on the whole time, and trips to unload the truck would need to be taken more often. They've also looked into using an outside company but found it to be too expensive.

Meredith said he even looked into finding a larger, used trailer but was unable to find one.

"We know it's a high dollar-value, but we think it's worth it," he

Having the compact trailer reduces the number of times garbage needs to be hauled away.

At this time, residents are being asked to place their garbage

in the town's packer truck. Anyone who has difficulties can ask the on-site attendant for help.

If the Town Board approves the funds at the next meeting, Meredith said, the order should be placed within the month. However, the trailers are out of stock, and the town will need to have a new one built for them.

"We're expecting a wait time of up to six months," said Meredith.

The town may have to continue using the packer truck until February 2015. Use of the truck could also mean longer lines for residents using the transfer station.

The Highway Department estimates 500 to 1,000 people use the transfer station to dispose of their garbage each week, but Meredith said it's hard to get a true number for regular usage. The disposal costs \$2 per bag. The majority of people in town contract with a private hauler.

"It's certainly convenient to use the transfer station if you live near it," said Meredith. "And there are various reasons why people may drive down themselves.

conditions imposed in those interpretations," said Peter Barber, chairman of the zoning board. "Now, everybody is doing the same thing.

The board most recently denied Dale Owen's request to keep chickens at his Mohawk Drive home, but approved two prior requests. Owen could now simply get a permit for the coop, which

he already had submitted a detailed description on in his request.

Janet Thayer, attorney for the ZBA, said the state Court of Appeals determined zoning boards must adhere to its prior interpretations unless there is a "substantial difference" for ruling differently.

The zoning administrator is charged with issuing building permits for chicken coops in singlefamily residential districts, if conditions the board imposed are met. Some of the conditions are no more than six chickens, no roosters, keeping chickens in an enclosure at all times and having no adverse impact on neighbors.

"Somebody could challenge what we did tonight legally," said Barber.

Town Board members, though, could clear up the fowl issue through town code revisions, which would override the zoning board's interpretation of the code.

Town Supervisor Ken Runion said board members recently received the Zoning Review Committee's proposed revisions, which includes allowing up to six hens within residential districts if several conditions are met. A fee would likely be included similar to dogs.

Runion projected the Town Board would take up proposed town code revisions in September. The process would probably take a few months before any changes were adopted.

"Normally, we have the board go through it and review it, and if they have anything they would like to change or modify, that would be discussed before we have the public hearing," said Runion.

Runion received one email regarding the ZBA's decision to broadly allow chickens on residential properties, but he assumes more people share their opinion. He said he does not have an opinion on the proposal yet.

"I would like to hear from more of the general public as well, and I know the board members would like to," said Runion. "We looked at it as a board several years ago and there weren't any board members that made any motion to allow chickens, but it was a different board at that time."



# **USS Slater returns to Albany**

#### **Iconic destroyer** underwent \$1.2M in renovations

After undergoing 12 weeks of repairs in Staten Island, the USS Slater, one of the last remaining ships of its kind, made it back to Albany in time for the Fourth of July weekend.

The Slater, a destroyer escort ship that played a valuable role in the Pacific Theater during WWII and now serves as a floating museum, arrived in Albany, Tuesday morning, July 1.

The ship had been dry docked so workers could make repairs to its hull and add protection from the elements. The repairs were made with money that came from donations.

"They repaired the bottom of the hull. They also put a double plate of steel all around the ship in order to prevent any damage from the ice on the Hudson River," said BJ Costello, chairman of the board of trustees. "We did it all with private money. There is no government money involved, and we raised about \$1.2 million to do it. It comes from people all over the country providing us with small donations."

The ship's paint job is called dazzle camouflage and replicates the paint

scheme of the ship during WWII. The name "dazzle" refers to an intentionally confusing paint scheme consisting of bright colors, sharp lines and jagged geometric shapes. The patterns made it difficult to accurately gauge the size and distance of the ship, which caused the enemy to take more time aiming torpedoes at it.

"When you're looking at in on the horizon, when an enemy is looking at it, you can't tell really, with the confusing colors, exactly what part of the ship you are looking at,' said Costello.

The ship has become a key tourist attraction in Albany because it is the only ship of its kind still floating. People travel from all over the country to visit it.

"We are the only city in the world to have a ship like this, and it has been a place that is really beloved by the people that work on it. To see



the community support for this ship is really a wonderful thing," said Albany Mayor, Kathy Sheehan. "It's really just a phenomenal regional asset that we have, and it's part of our cultural heritage. It really is a wonderful tourist attraction in our capital city.'

The volunteers have a distinct loyalty to the ship and its preservation, spending countless hours on maintenance. Many of the workers spent the entire 12 weeks with the


on. Every week, they come and volunteer their time, Monday through Saturday," said President of the Board of Trustees Anthony Esposito.





# G'land keeps reduced sub rate at schools

Administrators urge pay restoration after trouble attracting substitute teachers

Substitute teachers at Guilderland schools will continue receiving less money than they have in past years following a contentious debate over costs of the savings.

Guilderland Board of Education members Tuesday, July 1, voted 5-4 to maintain daily rates for substitute teachers during the 2014-15 school year. District administrators recommended restoring some substitute teacher daily pay rates to \$95 for middle and elementary schools, and \$100 for the high school. Last year, the board reduced each rate by \$5 in an attempt to save money.

A month after the reduced rates were adopted last July, four board members voted to rescind the decrease, but five voted to maintain it.

School board member Christine Hayes said she had not seen enough "compelling information" to restore the substitutes teacher rates.

"We had several hundred more absences this year than last year, however the district ended up saving over \$68,000," said Hayes. "We had one teacher come here at the very beginning of the year and talk about it; that is the only person who works in the schools on a daily basis that would have been directly impacted that I head from."

Demian Singleton, assistant superintendent for instruction, later said getting substitute teachers was "hugely problematic" this school year.

"Whether it's attributed to the rates or not, it was noticeably different this year than it was from last year," Singleton said.

Board member Judy Slack was "very upset" about how many hours a substitute did not cover. There were 287 uncovered absences during the 2013-14 school year.

"To me, \$68,000 is not worth it," said Slack.

Slack, who retired from the district after working 24 years an elementary teaching assistant, said several substitute teachers have told her they were "very disappointed" over the reduced rate. Substitutes are often retired teachers from Guilderland.

"They have come, but may not continue coming," she said. "They feel it is a slap in the face to what they do. ... People come to me and say, 'What do you think that you're doing? You realize how this has bothered people."

Board member Catherine Barber added the vote to reduce rates was based "on nothing," but to save money.

"There was no evidence that it wouldn't impact kids negatively," said Barber.

Board President Barbara Fraterrigo argued seeking the savings is justified because of cuts the board has made to programming as revenue has declined.

"We scrimp and we scrape and do everything we can to maintain programs, and I just see this as sort of shared sacrifice that [if] everybody pitches in a little tiny bit you help out the whole student body," Fraterrigo said. "I just wish some of these people wouldn't be so hardcore ... it's not that we don't value their services; we're just trying to stretch every single dollar to keep the quality of regular teachers as well as our other teachers.'

Board Vice President Allan Simpson pointed to the debate around cutting 0.3 full-time equivalent teaching positions from the music department, which music teachers unsuccessfully petitioned to restore 0.25 from the reduction. This represented a savings of \$20,000, which was three times less than what the district saved in substitute expenses this year.

Board member Colleen O'Connell said some elementary school principals have expressed concern over the quality of substitutes being hired at the reduced rate. She also said some of the longtime substitutes for certain schools were not willing to work at the reduced rate.

"I understand we save \$68,000, but from what I'm hearing from three elementary school principals, it was at quite a cost," said O'Connell.

Superintendent of Schools Marie Wiles said the difficulty obtaining substitutes led to middle school physical education being doubled up "many days," reading instruction at Lynnwood sometimes not occurring and principals "scrambling" to find someone to simply supervise a classroom.

"All of that adds up, and it's hard to find the data and numbers to capture the impact, but it absolutely had an impact," said Wiles. "Every morning in one of our schools, there was the sense of unsettledness of who is going to watch these youngsters while we don't have an adult here. That over a cumulative of time does have an impact on the quality of instruction."

"I'm more than willing to give it another year because once people are adjusted and the time is adjusted, I would like to see if we get some of these people back," Fraterrigo said.

O'Connell said maintaining the reduced rate would make it difficult to attract substitutes.

"If, two years in a row, we have said this is what it is, people are going to shut us out," said O'Connell. "This is our opportunity to try to get subs back into the building."

sports to be competitive wherever they go, but they really don't have to join a league. They can remain independent and craft the type of schedules that would offer them the level of competition they seek. For example, CBA's basketball team could have its pick of top-notch opponents from across the state based on its string of Section 2 titles from 2002 through 2012, and LaSalle's baseball team has a strong statewide reputation.

But, what about Bishop Maginn, Catholic Central and Notre Dame-Bishop Gibbons? Maginn is shrinking in student population, and that is being reflected in the decreased competitiveness of its teams. Gibbons was rarely competitive in the Big 10 in any team sports, save for the occasional strong showing in boys basketball. Catholic Central's athletic program has become more successful of late, but the Troy school is not far removed from its own on-field struggles. It certainly doesn't have the statewide reputation of athletic excellence that CBA and LaSalle possess.

The most logical

landing spot for Gibbons would be the Western Athletic Conference, which has a couple of smaller private schools in Saratoga Catholic and Mekeel Christian Academy. Whether the WAC would expand to include Gibbons is another matter. It already has 12 schools, so adding another might mean having to accept another member to even its two divisions out. And with a limited number of games teams can play in a regular season, it might preclude WAC schools from playing nonleague contests. That's still a big deal to athletic directors, even several years removed from when the New York State Public High School Athletic Association trimmed schedules statewide in a

cost-cutting measure. One possibility I thought of was having all of the private schools join forces to form a super league. The largest of the private schools – CBA, LaSalle, Catholic Central, Albany Academy and Bishop Maginn - would form one division, while the smaller ones would form the other. On paper, it all makes sense.

But after talking with CBA athletic director Blaine Drescher, I doubt that will ever take place. According to Drescher, CBA seems committed to

exploring the benefits of being independent, and as long as that's the case, I don't think LaSalle or Catholic Central will be rushing to form an allprivate school league. I also doubt smaller schools such as Loudonville Christian, Mekeel Christian and Saratoga Catholic will want to be in a league with the larger private schools. They saw what happened to Gibbons in the Big 10, and they don't want their teams to have the same issue.

So, where will all the remnants of the Big 10 wind up? I suspect Albany and Schenectady will join the Suburban Council, if that's what they want. Troy will likely seek entry in a smaller school league such as the Patroon Conference. CBA will be independent for the foreseeable future. LaSalle, Catholic Central, Gibbons and Maginn will have to decide if the independent life suits them, but I can see them seeking entry with established leagues — probably not the Suburban Council, though. I don't think the Suburban Council has any desire to bring in private schools at this time.

One thing is clear: the Big 10's demise means the other Section 2 leagues will have some serious decisions to make in the next couple of years.



# Dutch woes continue

One big inning helps Elmira knock off Albany in PGCBL game

Things have fallen apart for the Albany Dutchmen since their 8-1 start.

With their 10-8 loss to Elmira Saturday, July 5, the Dutchmen now sit in third place in the Perfect Game Collegiate Baseball League's East Division with a 12-12 record.

The issue has been Albany's pitching. The Dutchmen have allowed nine or more runs seven times in the last 15 games.

"We just haven't pitched very well," said Albany coach Nick Davey. "We've given up the big inning, and we haven't been able to respond."

Against Elmira, that big inning

# The league shuffle begins in 2015

Some Suburban Council athletic directors told me as far back as a couple of years ago that the Big 10 was on its last legs. All it needed was one school to defect in order to bring the whole league down.

So, it came as no surprise to me when the Big 10 called it quits after Amsterdam bolted for the Foothills Council and Troy said it was leaving. There was no way the mostly urban high school conference could keep going with six or seven schools, two of which – Christian Brothers Academy and LaSalle Institute – offer only boys sports.

You could hardly blame Amsterdam for leaving the Big 10. It was the outlier of the league, located 30 minutes west of the



nearest opponent (Schenectady). The travel was brutal, and some of its teams were overmatched by their rivals (i.e. soccer and lacrosse). By moving to the Foothills, Amsterdam can form new rivalries with neighbors such as Broadalbin-Perth, Johnstown, Gloversville and Scotia-Glenville; and its teams should do better against schools of a similar size to it.

The immediate impact to the rest of Section 2 is minimal. The

schools left unaffiliated in the wake of the Big 10's demise will be independent for the 2014-15 scholastic sports season, and many of them will wind up playing against each other as if the Big 10 was still in existence.

Things could get interesting once we get beyond 2014-15. Some of the former Big 10 schools will likely look to join other leagues in order to make it easier for them to get seeded for Sectional playoffs, since it's a fair bet they will have to argue their way into good seeds this upcoming season because they will be playing strictly non-league schedules. For the largest of the now-independent public schools – Albany and Schenectady – the only logical

league to turn to is the Suburban Council because of the level of competition it offers and the size of its member schools.

For its part, the Suburban Council will — if asked — vet Albany and Schenectady to see if they would be good fits for the league. As one Suburban Council athletic director told me, it's not just about being the right-sized school in a geographically good location. The teams would have to be competitive, and the coaches would need the correct certification, among other things.

The private schools are another matter. CBA and LaSalle are strong enough in most
