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Hudson speed change OK'd

Bethlehem Town Board votes to lower limit from 35 to 30 mph

Bethlehem town officials have reduced the speed limit of a unique road amid concerns of pedestrian safety.

Highway Superintendent Brent Meredith recommended in July the speed limit on Hudson Avenue be reduced from 35 mph to 30. The road is different in that it is the only town road with a speed limit of 35 mph. Other roads with similar speed limits are owned by the state.

"Were the road to be built today, it would never have been built with a speed limit that high," said Supervisor John Clarkson.

A public hearing was held on Wednesday, Aug. 13, with just one person speaking against the proposal. The North Street resident said he was against the plan because he did not believe the

District officials cite Bethlehem's reassessment as the reason

Bethlehem residents are set to see a lower school tax rate following the reassessment project that occurred earlier in the year.

At the Wednesday, Aug. 13, meeting of the Bethlehem Central School Board, district

Chief Business and Financial Officer Judi Kehoe said the rate is below projections from earlier in the year. Last year's tax rate was at \$21.59 per \$1,000. The estimated tax rate for 2014 was at \$20.82, however, the actual rate ended up being about \$20.77 per \$1,000. The rates are the same for both Bethlehem and New Scotland since properties in both towns are assessed and 100



percent of market value. "With commercial properties taking on a greater share of the tax burden, that caused our tax rates to, in fact, be lower," said Kehoe.

Property owners whose assessments staved the same or increased only slightly should be seeing a lower tax bill this year, according to Kehoe.

Voters in the Bethlehem Central School District approved

a 2014-15 school year budget on May 20 by a margin of 2,496 votes to 1,140 votes. The \$92.627.000 spending plan carries a 2.99 percent increase to the property tax levy, with spending increased by more than \$2.2 million for the coming year.

To balance the budget, the district used about \$1.4 million from its fund balance. Bethlehem schools also received some restoration of state aid to close the \$4.8 million budget

Warford said a lot of the credit goes to the market's manager, Paul Tick, who "works so hard to coordinate things and keep the market running smoothly."

Tick credited the community with making the market successful.

"We're grateful to the whole community for the support it's given for the farms and the farmers, for healthy food and for the environment," said Tick.

The market is open every Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. through December at the Bethlehem Middle School. — Marcy Velte

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County set to limit tobacco

Legislature passes ban on sales at pharmacies; McCoy to hold public hearing

R e filling your prescription medication and stocking up on cigarettes could require two separate stops a year from now.

The Albany County Legislature narrowly passed a resolution Monday, Aug. 11, banning the sale of any tobacco products in a retail store containing a licensed pharmacy. The 21-17 vote is the first step to make the county the first in New York to implement such legislation. County Executive Dan McCoy must sign off on the ban, and he has scheduled a public hearing on it Wednesday, Sept. 3, at 5 p.m., in the Cahill Room at the County Office Building.

The law, if signed by McCoy, would be effective March 1 of next year.

Bill sponsor Tim Nichols, D-Latham, said there two things every tobacco control initiative has in common — at first, it's ridiculed and opposed, but eventually it passes.

Nichols previously served as director of Government Affairs for the American Lung Association of New York State for almost

eight years.

State government tends to follow the lead from local governments on such initiatives, too, said Nichols.

"State governments do not have the same degree of flexibility ... the tobacco industry is very powerful at the statehouse," Nichols said. "It isn't until local governments take action that the state follows suit."

Jessica Ramich, a pharmacist from Slingerlands, said she is currently "mandated" to sell tobacco products, despite the negative health effects. Ramich also said people looking to purchase tobacco cessation products are forced to see the marketing promoting cigarettes.

"If you're teasing these patients with nicotine replacement therapies that cost actually more money than pack of cigarettes, it's a lot easier for them to make the decision to buy cigarettes rather than

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Bethlehem looks to the sun

Town works on power purchase agreement for solar energy

The Town of Bethlehem is continuing to work toward a power purchase agreement that would save on energy costs through the use of solar panels.

Erik Deyoe, the town's director of public works, gave an update presentation at the Wednesday, Aug. 13, Town Board meeting. The project has been in the works since 2013, after the New York State Energy Research and **Development Authority** sought applications to find more open sites to install solar panels through the New York Sun Program grant.

The town had previously pledged to become one of 136 "Climate Smart Communities" throughout the state.

"One of the pledge elements is to increase the community's use of renewable energy," said Devoe. "And really, the intent is for us to take local actions to try to reduce our carbon footprint, greenhouse gas emissions and consider how to adapt to changing climate conditions.'

The site to be developed

is the former clay mine site on Bridge Street in Selkirk. The panels would be installed on nearly 20 acres of the 80-acre site owned by the town.

Deyoe said 44 percent of the town's greenhouse gas emissions are due to electricity consumption. The town's uses about 7.1 million kilowatt hours of electricity a year.

Installation of the solar panels would result in an estimated savings of between \$5 million to \$7 million over 20 years. The town could save up to \$220,000 in the first year.

The town already approved NextEra as the solar developer of the site in March of this year. Devoe said NextEra would own all the equipment, while the town would continue to maintain and own the site.

Deyoe said the area is mostly vacant, but there are a few neighbors who may have obstructed views once the panels are installed, and the town may need to reach out to them. As a comparison, Deyoe explained the site would look much like the one Owens Corning does now after the solar panels were set up by Constellation Solar Installation.

The project is estimated to cost \$8 million, but the town wouldn't pay any of it. Financing would come through the NYSERDA site through an easement grant, NextEra and their financing partner. The panels would generate about 4.6 million kilowatt hours of electricity a year, with the town benefiting through credits from National Grid.

The town and NextEra are now working to finalize the contract. Some of the terms include stipulations that if NextEra wants to terminate the agreement, it must give 180 days notice and restore the site. The company is also working on a fixed rate over the next 20 years.

Councilwoman Julie Sasso asked if the rate is fixed and the contract is for 20 years, could there ever be a situation where the town could be paying for extra energy it doesn't need. The question was in reference to the Albany water contract and the Selkirk-Cogen payment in lieu of taxes agreement.

Devoe said he does not believe the town would ever be generating more credits then they have capacity to recoup from National Grid. The town can make adjustments each year of the contract, so it doesn't pay for more than it can consume. They are also working on a adding a stipulation that would allow the town to end the contract, but NextEra could stay on the



choosing replacement therapy," said Ramich.

The law, which has been in the works for years, comes on the heels of CVS Caremark stopping the sale of tobacco at its stores nationwide on Oct. 1. CVS estimates it will lose \$2 billion annually from the move.

Many area supermarkets have taken steps to eliminate tobacco marketing, hiding such products in locked cabinets, but any one with a pharmacy would be included in the ban.

Michael Rosen, president of the Food Industry Alliance of New York State, said the ban unfairly targets supermarkets, which have taken a responsible approach to selling the product.

"Every one of those supermarkets have taken steps to minimize tobacco displays going beyond what the state law requires," Rosen said. "What are you hoping to accomplish by passing this bill?"

Mary Lou Connolly, D-Guilderland, said while she doesn't support smoking, she believes the ban is going too far.

"We are having a terrible impact on the business community in our county," Connolly said. "I just think we are becoming a police state."

Nichols said there are legal concerns if the county carved out an exemption for supermarkets with pharmacies to continue selling cigarettes.

"We cannot legally exempt the Price Choppers of the world because we will get sued," he said.

Republican legislator Deborah Busch, a registered nurse, said people should still be allowed to make their own choices, even if they are "poor choices," and the legislature was overstepping its reach.

More than 10,000 ticketed during 'Speed Week'

There were more speeding tickets issued during the recent "Speed Week" campaign compared to last year, but there were significantly fewer distracted driving tickets handed out.

New York State Police issued 22,176 tickets during the initiative from Wednesday, Aug. 6, to Tuesday, Aug. 12, which included 10.266 speeding tickets, 856 tickets for drivers texting or using their cellphones, 622 "Move Over Law" violations and 238 drivers charged with DWI. During the annual campaign, State Police target speeding and aggressive drivers. Additional marked and unmarked patrol cars are used during the initiative.

Last year, State Police issued nearly 25,000 traffic tickets, which included more than 9,000 speeding tickets and more than 2,300 distracted driving violations.

"The public can do their part to keep our streets safe simply by slowing down," State Police Superintendent Joseph D'Amico said in a statement before the initiative kicked off. "We want everyone to make it to their destination safely and increase their chances of doing so by following New York state laws. Buckle vour seatbelt, follow posted speed limits and put your electronic device down."

the campaign is to reduce speed related crashes and improve safety for all drivers and passengers.

Speed is a leading cause of roadway fatalities and is a factor in approximately one-third of all fatal crashes, according to police. More than 42,000 people die annually in traffic crashes on highways, with hundreds of thousands seriously injured, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

proposed lowering of the speed limit on Hudson Avenue, from 35 mph to 30 mph, Superintendent Meredith's July 17, 2014 memorandum in justification cites little compelling evidence for the speed limit reduction. I live on North Street and travel Hudson Avenue frequently.

doesn't really think about whether it's a town road, county road, or state road. It's the driver is concerned with. Hudson Avenue adjoins another two-lane road with a 40 mph speed limit (Delaware Avenue).

Editor, The Spotlight; The memorandum Regarding the doesn't mention this, since Delaware Avenue is a state road, but the result is that the memorandum's technically correct of Highways Brent assertion that "[a]ll town roads that connect to... Hudson Avenue...have speed limits of 30 mph" is misleading. One end of Hudson Avenue connects to a 40 mph road.

Secondly, I'm a big fan of the Albany County Rail Trail and would First of all, that like to see its usage most town roads are increase. However, the 30 mph — and Hudson Rail Trail runs parallel Avenue is 35 mph — to Hudson Avenue is meaningless to the (not perpendicular, as average driver, who described in some news when driving likely reports) and is separated by woods for much of the Hudson Avenue section and at least 50 feet from Hudson Avenue for the type of road and the full length of Hudson speed limit that the Avenue. It's not obvious to me that there would be many Rail Trail walkers leaving the trail to cross Hudson Avenue, except mostly those living on or near Hudson Avenue. Kenwood Avenue (a road in the town — that it's a state-maintained road is irrelevant) is 35 mph, bordered by two sets of sidewalks much closer to the road than

Hudson Avenue. And populated by far more commercial and driveway intersections than Hudson Avenue. Would that justify lowering Kenwood Avenue (or Elsmere Avenue, or New Scotland Road) to 30 mph? I don't think so.

Finally, Superintendent Meredith cites no empirical data (collisions, pedestrian injuries, etc.) that would suggest that a speed reduction should even be considered.

Hudson Avenue has been a bypass around the Four Corners for at least the past 60 years. If some drivers exceed the Hudson Avenue speed limit now, I suggest that as many or more will do so if the speed is lowered to 30 mph. That becomes an enforcement issue, not a speed limit issue. As a driver, I think the 35 mph limit is a good fit for Hudson Avenue. The few reasons cited by the Superintendent to lower the speed limit don't provide much of a case. Local drivers are used to the speed limit as it is, and I think the town should leave well enough alone. Merle Winn Delmar

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highway superintendent was specific enough on why the speed needed to be changed. He asked if speeding was common or if there were a large number of accidents.

Clarkson said although the turnout for the public meeting was low, residents who lived on Hudson Avenue have reached out to the town over the years with concerns about the speed.

"We did have a report from police," said Clarkson. 'We didn't have a huge number (of accidents), but we had enough that there was some concern."

The supervisor said since the speed limit change was proposed, three people had contacted the town. Two residents were for the change, and the third was the North Street resident who spoke against the plan.

Meredith had previously said the speed limit change was proposed for consistency reasons. The section runs from Delaware Avenue to the intersection of Adams and North streets, and town officials could not find the reason for why the road's speed limit was different than others in town.

In a letter to the Town Board, Meredith also said he was concerned about pedestrian safety.

Hudson Avenue runs parallel to the Helderburg-Hudson Rail Trail, with several access points to the trail along that road. The higher speeds can cause issues for those walking or biking the path.

Clarskon said more emphasis was being placed on traffic and pedestrian safety in town because it is a major concern of residents. He also said town officials would like to discourage drivers from using the road as a shortcut to bypass the Four Corners and reach Kenwood Avenue faster.

In order to change the speed limit, the town board needed to vote to change a local law that gives exception to the speed on

gap, with district officials implementing spending reductions and finding savings within district contracts.

"The district is still going to collect 2.99 percent more in the levy. It's just that it's spread among more parcels, or parcels with higher value in the community," said Kehoe.

The reassessment project, which took place this spring, was controversial for some residents. A group of large landowners were unhappy with their reassessments because they did not feel the company overseeing the project was using comparable land to evaluate their properties. Others said some factors such as soil grade and/or utilities were overlooked. They have been a frequent presence at town meetings.

The district and BOCES are now putting together tax bills to send to residents.

In June, both Bethlehem Central and Ravena-Coeymans-Selkirk Central opted to start billing and collecting taxes themselves, rather than have the town do it on the districts' behalf. This means payments will no longer be accepted at the Bethlehem Town Hall.



Food services update

Also at the Aug. 13 meeting, Kehoe said the district's food services program lost more money than was originally projected.

The program lost about \$105,000 last year, and was expected to lose \$63,000



this year. Kehoe said the actual number was close to

\$87,000. In June, the district approved a \$60,000 transfer from the general fund to help with the projected loss. Kehoe said after going through the close-out process, which consists of counting inventory and obtaining sales data, the loss was larger than expected.

Revenues in some areas, such as the new coffee shop, increased. But so did salaries and employee benefits to help with the transition of finding a food services director. Kehoe

Hudson Avenue.

Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn was absent from the meeting, but all other board members were in agreement.

"I think it's important we set a townwide nature, if you will, for our travel," said Councilwoman Joann Dawson. "Although, it's inconvenient because (Hudson Avenue) is a great short cut. Board member Joanne Cunningham asked if anything could be done to help stop the waste. Kehoe said it had not been calculated before, but more will be done in the coming year.

New Food Services Director Allissa Eiser said that would be a part of her goal for the coming year, along with instituting unique ways to prevent waste from



said there would be about 140 students attending Tech Valley High School. Despite most area school districts struggling to trim down budgets, he said enrollment has not tapered off — actually, it's growing.

The school focuses on project-based learning and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics)

Similar to CNSE, it listens to what the business community is looking for in workers.

"The businesses on the campus keep saying, 'Yes, we need workers that need to know math and science, but in addition, they need to be able to communicate what they know.' ... They also need global understanding and awareness," said Liebert.

It also has stepped up its outreach efforts to school districts.

"This year, we are going to have two fulltime teachers that do nothing but professional development around project-based learning and STEM education,' said Liebert.

Alain Kaloyeros, senior vice president and CEO of CNSE, previously said the partnership is "timely and essential in helping to prepare our next generation of innovators.'

James N. Baldwin, district superintendent of Questar III BOCES. previously said the collaboration would produce new opportunities for students, while enhancing the school's unique educational approach.

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

proactive when it comes to unveiling new services and campaigns to better the lives of its residents. At times, it can seem a little too proactive, pushing issues like the e-cig ban and a major campaign to show people how babies *should* be sleeping. All of this can make the county feel like an overzealous nanny trying too hard to protect us from ourselves.

But at other times, those initiatives can provide a very real lifeline to those who desperately need it.

On Aug. 12, County Executive Dan McCoy announced that the county is going to debut a smart phone application that will provide people with information about suicide prevention so they can help those who are on the brink. The app arms people with resources to contact, who then can assist those whose depression has become too great for them to handle.

The announcement happened on the heels of Robin Williams' Aug. 11 suicide in his California home. Though you have

Albany County has always been to wonder if the announcement was in response to the famed comedic actor's death or merely a coincidence, the timing of the app couldn't have been better.

> No one – not even those closest to Williams – saw his death coming. That was made clear by the number of messages and Tweets from Hollywood celebrities who had worked with Williams, nearly all of which included terms like "shocked" and "deeply saddened." Many similar messages came from the legions of Williams' fans, who had a hard time believing someone so full of energy and quick wit could decide to end his life by his own hands.

Such deep depression isn't always easy to see, though. Some people are able to hide their sadness so well that you couldn't tell if someone was considering the possibility of taking his or her own life. Williams managed to mask his depression well, even as his later comedy routines included admissions that he was an alcoholic and, before that, a drug addict.

This is why Albany County's app could be a lifesaver. If someone sees or suspects that a person close to them is having a rough time, they can consult the app to look or listen for signs of depression and take action, if needed. And to have that information at their fingertips is a time saver, too.

Depression can make a person feel isolated from the world and make them believe that things would be better if they weren't around. It's that rationale that leads to suicide. What Albany County is doing will make it easier for its residents to recognize when depression has set in for someone and help them take action so that person doesn't become another statistic.

Now that Robin Williams is gone, perhaps his legacy won't just be about the many laughs he generated and the numerous memorable roles he created in his career. Maybe it will also be about the lives he saved when he couldn't save his own.

It is often said there is always room for improvement. For more than 30 years, I have been living in the Capital District and always wondered why the Jewish community was not thriving more than it already does. I recently came to the conclusion that we do not promote ourselves as a culture and ethnicity to areas outside our small circle of comrades.

After the terrorist attacks on 9-11, many Jews were looking for more serene confines to relocate. For the most part, Jews went everywhere else but the Capital District. When more than 150 Israelis came to the Capital District to work at the NanoTech facility in East Greenbush, where was the welcoming committee by our local Jewish community? I realize that not all Israelis are Jewish, but I can only imagine that most of the ones coming to work at NanoTech are Jewish.

When I would go back to my hometown of Mill Basin, Brooklyn, my Rabbi and other friends would say to me, "We know why you went to Albany (to go to college at UAlbany), but why did you stay? Is there any sort of a Jewish community in Albany?" This area is viewed as a vast wasteland of Jewish life and culture from folks outside this region, and I have come to find out folks within the region believe the same.

Ultimately, I did not move to a more urban area because we have a welcoming, vital, vibrant Jewish community with untapped potential, and that story needed to be told. Last year, I began my mission and discovered there are more than 20,000 Jews within the 16-county greater Capital District encompassing 50 congregations, 30 Jewish-run organizations, more than

900 Jewish business owners and professionals as well as many Jewish education opportunities. I posted all that information on a website named JBizTechValley.com.

The website is designed to serve three purposes:

1. To inform prospective newcomers to this area that there is a Jewish community with a broad base;

2. To show folks outside the region that this area supports a vibrant and vital Jewish life and culture; and

3. To encourage people within the Albany-area Jewish community to support local Jewish businesses.

The website features a column entitled "News Jews Can Use." All the reporting is original content that pertains to the Jewish community in some fashion. One of my goals is to offer the Jewish community something unique — a new and different perspective not covered in existing local Jewish publications.

During this two-year process, it was recommended that I reach out to the publisher of The Jewish World newspaper, a bi-monthly, 49-year old publication. The prime focus of that publication is not original content news, which is what I wanted to produce. There is a custom in Judaism that two businesses should not compete where one business puts the other one out of business. As a way of complementing the content in *The* Jewish World, I feel comfortable that I am offering the Jewish community something different. To make the website content more dynamic than just existing in cyberspace as an online directory. I teamed up with Rabbi Nachman

Simon of the Chabad House of Delmar, who hosted a long-running program on Bethlehem cable called "The Jewish View." Once a month, we taped two half-hour programs featuring newsmakers from the town of Bethlehem. The tapings are during the week and during the day, so it was difficult to book guests.

While we still tape shows at the Bethlehem cable channel, the city of Albany, combined with other entities, began Channel Albany last year, located at the main branch of the Albany Public Library. The use of this additional facility allowed us the opportunity to attract more guests and tape additional shows. In one year, we taped more than 100 episodes from the Albany facility. Our guests have included elected officials on the federal, state and local level, government officials and leaders of the area arts and entertainment communities.

I love the concept of community, and I'm trying to work together with as many people as possible in this area. We have a marvelous Jewish community. Let's take a moment to celebrate all that our community has accomplished. We have been leaders in the arenas of academia, economics, entertainment, arts and politics. We have shown guidance as advocates, mentors and volunteers. We are a diverse, strong, lively and energetic community breaking new ground in everything from technology to medicine and innovative ways of doing business. By standing together, we have and will continue to empower Jewish men and women throughout New York state to build a better, more prosperous future for all.

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How to pay for your child's college education

hen we talk about the cost of college education and student loan debt, we often talk in terms of rising tuition rates and the total amount of money borrowed by recent graduates. We do this for good cause: the cost of college is becoming unaffordable for too many students, and the average amount of debt — \$29,400 per borrower, according to the Institute for College Access & Success — is a heavy burden for our youngest workers. Rarely do we talk about the student loan debt shared by parents, but we should because it's significant.

According to the Federal Reserve Bank, the average student loan related debt for borrowers older than age 50 is \$22,700. In addition, more and more parents are financing their children's education, from \$700,000 in 2005 to more than \$2 million in 2012.

The fact that parents want to help their children is a good thing. A college education is important to creating opportunities for a fulfilling career and financial independence. However, it is vitally important that parents balance their desire to fund their child's education with their you prepay tuition expenses savings goals for retirement. The best way to do this is to plan and to start saving early.

Education savings strategies

When planning to fund your child's college education, several plans can help you achieve your

goals. Two of the more popular and Coverdell Education Savings.

529 Plans come in two types: College Savings Plans and Prepaid Tuition Plans. These plans are state run and each state has its own version. While 529 plans are included on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), they have relatively little impact on financial

aid eligibility because they are the parent's asset.

College savings plans let you save money for college in an individual investment account. When you contribute to the account, you typically choose one or more portfolios offered by the plan. The underlying investments of these portfolios are exclusively chosen and managed by the plan's professional money manager. But keep in mind that college savings plans don't guarantee a return. If the portfolio doesn't perform as well as you expected, you may lose money.

A prepaid tuition plan lets now for use in the future. The plan's money manager pools your contributions with those of other investors into one general fund. The fund assets are then invested to meet the plan's future obligations (some plans may guarantee you a minimum rate of return).

Six things to know about the FAFSA

he Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is used to apply for Federal Financial Aid and helps financial aid offices determine if a student is eligible for grants, federal work study programs or loans. Every family, regardless of income level, should complete it to ensure they can take full advantage of all potential college funding opportunities.

Here are six things to know about the FAFSA that will help you complete it on time and maximize the amount of aid that is available to your student.

1.

can file earlier, which increases the chance of receiving funds.

4 Consider which assets should be included on the FAFSA. Common assets to be counted on the FAFSA are savings accounts and investment accounts, including 529 plans. However, retirement plans such as 401(k) plans, pensions or IRAs, as well as the cash value of life insurance should not be included on the FAFSA. The value of a primary residence is also excluded, but rental real estate should be included.

5. The calculation generated It needs to be completed from the completed FAFSA is the Expected Family Contribution (EFC) or what the government thinks the family can contribute to the cost of the student's education. This is not the amount you will have to pay for college, but the amount used to calculate how much financial aid the student can receive. 6. The FAFSA generates a report called the Student Aid Report (SAR), which is sent to each college or university selected by the student to formulate a financial need for them. Financial need is defined as the difference between the cost of attendance (COA) and the EFC.

deferred growth and federal taxfree earnings if the money is used for college. States can also add their own tax advantages to 529 plans. For example, some states exempt qualified withdrawals from income tax or offer an annual tax deduction for your contributions. In the state of New York, the deduction

for state income tax with a 529 plan is \$10,000. The total amount you can contribute to a 529 plan is generally high. Most plans have limits of \$300,000 and up.

The Coverdell Education Savings Account (ESA) is an account where up to \$2,000 per year per beneficiary can be saved. Amounts contributed to the ESA grow tax deferred and are tax-free distributions if used for qualified education expenses for both K-12 education and college education. Contributions

529 plans — both versions — must be made by April 15 • Monitor your investments are 529 College Savings Plans offer federal and state tax- following the contribution and try to minimize gains from year. However, the ability to contribute is phased out for joint filers (single filers too) with modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) between \$190,000 and \$220,000.

Tips for maximizing financial aid

All families, regardless of income, should complete the FAFSA, which is the form that determines college students' eligibility for financial aid, including loans, work study, grants and scholarships.

You can employ several other tactics that may help you meet the challenge of funding your child's education. For example, since permanent life insurance with cash value is not included as an asset on the FAFSA, some families use this as a way to decrease "included" assets. The cash value can also provide a means of tax-free distributions for education costs.

Other tips include:

• Keeping account ownership in parents' names, rather than the student's.

the sale of assets during the tax year before the award year.

• Accelerate or decelerate income, if possible, prior to reporting FAFSA or after the last FAFSA is filed.

• Maximize retirement contributions, which will remove income and assets from the FAFSA.

The important thing to remember is that the best way to pay for your child's college education is to plan to pay it as early as possible. It is also important to remember that as much as you may want to help your child out now, you will be doing them a major disservice later if you do not take care of your own financial needs. A banker or financial advisor can help you find the balance between helping your child and meeting your retirement savings goals.

2. State deadlines are usually earlier and the student's desired college may have an application deadline as well (often by February 15). File early to ensure schools still have funding available.

3. Filing the FAFSA online at www.fafsa.gov is free and the easiest method of filing (www.fafsa.com charges a fee). You may want to file even if your prior tax returns are not complete. By using estimates of income and assets (and later revising them if needed), you



They moved to Delmar, NY in 1975 and set down roots to raise their family, which in 1977 included son Matthew. Priscilla was a volunteer in the Bethlehem Central School District until Matthew graduated from BCHS in 1995. She was active in both the PTA and the Bethlehem Music Association. After that she turned her attention to community organizations, especially Equinox in Albany.

Priscilla is survived by her loving husband, Paul Wing of Delmar, , and her sons Daniel of Delmar, and Matthew of Pittsfield, Vt. She is also survived by her sister- and brother-in-law, Anne and John Decker, of Chestnut Hill, Mass., and several cousins on the South Shore in Massachusetts. In the years after the stroke, a team of family members, home health aides, therapists, and friends made it possible for Priscilla to live her life to the fullest. Special thanks are due to Latoka Alford, Chasity Toro, Alexis Annahij, Kayla Feliciano, Cathy Dubois, Linda Bernhard, Suzy Arenos, Marion Harwick, and Mary & David Shaffer. Priscilla will be remembered by everyone who knew her for her good humor and positive outlook in the face of the significant limitations she faced.

"Everything we do is based on personal goals," said Weiskopf, a Latham native. "Some people want to do this for flexibility. Some of them want to do it for strength training. Sometimes, it's a little bit of both. So, we start very conservatively with their training until they become comfortable."

Goldman said she decided to take Weiskopf's class based on what one of her two daughters – both World Class students - told her and her huband about him.

"When one of my daughters had to take a make-up class, she had coach Eric," said Goldman. "She had such a wonderful time, we told him about it and that's when he told us about this adult class.

"We joined at the same time to do something together. We were both new at it, so it was kind of cool," she added.

Amy Sadlon of Guilderland said she wanted to take the class so she could continue a gymnastics career that started when she was very young.

"I started when I was 4, so I've been doing this for almost 40 years now," said Sadlon. "I competed until I was 9, which was when I got injured. I'd been searching for an opportunity to get back into it ever since. Almost three years ago, I started back with an adult class here, and I've been a faithful student ever since."

Weiskopf said whatever the students' experience level is coming into his adult class, the common goal is the same.

"It's not what you can do, but how you progress. It's the journey," said Weiskopf.

Each student has his or her own memory of the moment they discovered they can perform gymnastics routines.

"For me, it was finally doing a roundoff back handspring," said Mickel. "Once I did that, everything started falling into place.'

"I have two favorite moments," added Goldman. "One was jumping on the vault. I was scared to even run up to the vault because you have to know where to land (on the trampoline) and where to put your hands and where to hit. When I did it, it was amazing.

"The other was when I tried my first handstand. Coach Eric did a very good job of spotting me so I didn't land on my head."







said Zawacki. "It's unique because it's at the historic property. The demonstrations are more historically based, and all the vendors are from the area."

Mike and Lynn Smith have been bringing their handmade candles and jewelry to craft fairs around the region since 1978 and have made it a point to attend the Mabee Farm event since its inception.

"It's one of the nicest handmade shows that we go to," said Mike Smith.

The couple makes non-toxic jewelry and more than 96 varieties of candles, including one made of garlic, which they claim keeps mosquitoes away.

"We make a garlic candle. We make it with real garlic in our wax," Smith said. "It keeps the mosquitos away. You know, in Italy they don't have screens — they keep the mosquitos out with garlic."

The event takes place in and around Mabee Farm's historic Dutch barn and in the new Franchere Education Center, which was added to the site in 2011.

The Mabee Farm Historic site is the oldest standing home in the Mohawk Valley and acts as a museum and educational center with tours, exhibits, events and programs, including the popular Howlin' at the Moon summer concerts. Visitors to the site can learn first-hand about the life of one of Schenectady

County's early families.

Zawacki said the event is more than a craft fair. Its historical nature tends to draw people of all ages.

"People love the sheepto-shawl demonstration," she said. "And visitors can tour the museum exhibits

All Berne Summerfest festivities will take place from noon until dark at the Berne Town Park, 1883 Helderberg Trail.







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


