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GCSD sets aside building study

District looks at fresh start to discussions about unused space within its schools

Before a crowd of Altamont community members wearing bright red shirts with the words "It Takes a Village" on it, scenarios from Guilderland school district's recent building study were removed.

Several Altamont Elementary School parents have rallied against the school's potential closure since consultant Paul Seversky's building capacity study was released in the spring. Four out of the five scenarios to use space more

effectively would shutter the village school. Some school board members contend the only focus of the study among district residents has been the scenarios, but primarily against Altamont closing.

Guilderland Board of Education members unexpectedly voted 7-2 at the Tuesday, Aug. 19, meeting to set aside scenarios presented in the building capacity study in favor of community members and the board developing their own options. Board members Colleen O'Connell and Judy Slack voted in opposition.

"We are all in this together," said Barbara Fraterrigo, president of the Guilderland school board. "It gives us

Mood lightens at annual walk

New research in pancreatic cancer is fueling hope

Two years after his brother's death in 2002, Neil Piper and his wife decided they wanted to find a way to raise money for pancreatic cancer research.

Piper had lost four family members to the disease and was at risk himself — as are his niece and children. Awareness of pancreatic cancer was low, along with survival rates since there are no warning signs until the disease's final stages.

The couple began working with the Lustgarten Foundation to support its mission in finding treatment and early detection methods for pancreatic cancer. Through that group's partnership with Cablevision, 100 percent of all donated funds go directly to cancer research.

To help raise more money, Neil and Shari Piper decided on a walk they dubbed the "Walk for Hope," held each year in Bethlehem's Elm Avenue Park.

"When we first started, we didn't know it would be such a big thing," said Piper. "We started it for my family members and had just 15 people come, but it's grown since."

The walk started out more solemn as a way for walkers to mourn the people they'd lost to pancreatic cancer. It stayed that way for the first three years when the event's committee, many of whom had lost someone to the disease, decided it was time for a change.

"It was in the fifth year we decided the event was too quiet, and it wasn't doing anything to attract more people," said Piper. "We decided to turn it into a celebration of the lives of those we'd lost and have it be a happy occasion."

Now in its 11th year, the event has since been renamed the Albany-Capital District Pancreatic Cancer Research Walk, and about 400 people are expected to be in attendance. Participants have raised nearly \$750,000 for the Lustgarten Foundation since the event's 2004 beginning.

Shari Piper said some families use the event as a type of reunion, and oftentimes people from

throughout the country fly in to Albany County to walk with family members.

This year, a DJ will play music during the walk. There will also be a silent auction, a 50/50 raffle, a visit from the characters of Star Wars, face painting and a show by The Puppet People for the children. Complimentary coffee, apple cider and doughnuts will be provided for breakfast, while the Four Corners Luncheonette food truck will be selling sandwiches for lunch.

New this year, the organizers have added a pet parade and costume contest with prizes. Purple hair extensions will also be on sale through Shear Simplicity of Delmar.

Shari said the change in atmosphere has helped greatly increase attendance. She is now working with several

It was found as part of an early detection study at John Hopkins University that is partially funded by Lustgarten. Piper recovered and retained 40 percent of his pancreas. which allows him to live healthy and drug-free. His niece is also involved in the study.

Early detection blood tests were introduced last year and are now in clinical trials worldwide. A new drug is in the clinical stages, as well. The drug works to break down the membrane that can form around the pancreas, allowing chemotherapy to penetrate the tumor.

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Number of bids sparse for New Salem water project

New Scotland fails to draw bids for one contract, evaluating options

Little interest was drawn for contracts to construct the New Salem Water District, with one of the three contracts not receiving a single bidder.

Three bids for two contracts were opened at New Scotland Town Hall Thursday afternoon, Aug. 21, after the deadline was extended one week for contracts tied to the New Salem Water District Water Distribution and Storage Project. The first contract, covering the most extensive work, garnered two bids and the third contract only attracted one bid. The second contract had no bidders, and town officials are determining how to proceed.

"At this point, we'll look into our options on how to proceed with that," said David Hansen of Stantec Consulting Services, who works for the town. "We have to look at our options with the funding mechanism and review with the town."

Work included in the second contract generally consists of plumbing improvements to allow installation of a booster pump system in an existing town-owned building.

Hansen said the town could potentially rebid the second contract, but if it fails to garner any bids again, then another avenue would be pursued. Hansen said the town might purchase materials directly and bid out the labor or use town employees.

"We have to get the work completed," he said. "There are lots of options, but we have to review what is allowed."

The state Environmental **Facilities Corporation** is providing funding to New Scotland through an interest-free loan, which will be paid back over 30 years. Only residents within the new district would be charged for construction expenses. Construction expenses are estimated to total around \$3 million. The low bidder for the first contract was Casale Construction, which totaled almost \$2.28 million. The other bid received was from Trinity Construction and totaled more than \$3.47 million. If no problems are found, the town will select Casale.

first contract, along with 42 items for the base bid. Hansen said a couple of contractors asked for the bid deadline to be extended from the original three-week time period.

"It was a short bid period originally, and it was aggressive to begin with. So, we didn't feel it was much of an impact to push it off one week and allow people to be more comprehensive in their bids," said Hansen.

The third contract included electrical work tied to the booster pump system, an emergency generator interconnection and equipment needed at the tank site. Stilsing Electric, the only bidder, would do the work for \$75,000.

In May of last year, the town board established the boundaries of the new water district, which generally encompasses the hamlet of New Salem. The district would serve about 170 customers, with around 75 residents the Town of Bethlehem serves John Purcell/Spotlight

included. The remaining customers would be new taps.

The cost of the project cannot exceed \$3.05 million, along with Bethlehem contributing an additional \$152,000 for constructing the district.

New Scotland and Bethlehem also reached a 30-year inter-municipal water supply agreement for the district last summer.

New Scotland can purchase up to 11 million gallons of water annually at the rate of \$2.27 per1,000 gallons under the agreement. The rate will also increase annually per the change in the consumer price index. Additional water up to 13 million gallons annually can be purchased at twice the normal rate.

The new district takes the maintenance burden off Bethlehem from the existing customers it serves from a pipeline that's around 90 year old. New Salem's district will connect to Bethlehem's pipeline along Route 85.

On Thursday, Aug. 20, repeat DWI offender Michael T. Salisbury, 33, of Rensselaer, was sentenced in Albany County Court to two years in custody and five years of felony probation.

On Feb. 12, Salisbury pleaded guilty to one count of DWI, a felony, for a July 22, 2013, incident in the Village of Menands. A citizen observed Salisbury



getting into his car and notified the Menands Police. Officers conducted a traffic stop, where Salisbury failed several field sobriety tests and registered a 0.17 blood alcohol content on a breath analysis test. The sentencing

included a disposition for a separate grand larceny offense committed by Salisbury. On Feb. 15, he illegally entered a closed business on Loudon Road in the Town of Colonie and stole plumbing and copper plumbing pipes. On May 21, Salisbury pleaded guilty to one count of grand larceny, a felony. Salisbury was also ordered to pay full restitution to the business.

Salisbury has a criminal history involving previous driving while intoxicated convictions in neighboring counties, including one arrest that took place in Rensselaer County during the pending prosecution in his Aug. 20 trial.

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Inaction irks developer

New Scotland Board mulls water lines for residential subdivision

Patience is running dry for a developer seeking a residential subdivision, with water infrastructure remaining a sticking point for town officials.

Bruce Boswell, vice president of Boswell Engineering, left visibly frustrated after giving a presentation on the subdivision to the New Scotland Town Board during its meeting Wednesday, Aug. 13. Board members declined to vote on the project's concept, which is required before the Town Planning Board hears the proposal. There could be more than 20 lots after the 30-acre property is divided.

At the end of the meeting, Town Supervisor Tom Dolin said there needed to be "further discussions" regarding the project.

"How many more years supervisor?" asked Boswell, who also a partial owner of the property.

Dolin answered, "I don't know," and said town officials would "think about it overnight."

Boswell replied, "Six years of thinking about it overnight. It's frustrating."

Boswell is looking to connect to the Heldervale Water District, with him to the existing line and taps

are taking that out of the denominator right now," Boswell said.

While the age of the lines is addressed, Deputy Supervisor Douglas LaGrange said there are still concerns over maintenance issues accessing piping through the ravine. A utility easement would likely be needed, too.

LaGrange said Planning Board members were not in favor of the ravine, but Boswell said that was not the case. He said town planners wanted him to come back with a water source and sewer source.

"I just don't remember that." Boswell.

Planning Board member Io Ann Davies said there was an extensive investigation on boring into the ravine on the property.

project previously, there was a lot of discussion regarding the pipe coming through the ravine,² Davies said. "Although a vote was never taken, and the Planning Board is differently constructed now ... with two different members, there was a lot of concern and a lot of discussion regarding that ravine."

Town Attorney Michael Naughton clarified any "real decision" from the Town Board would be pending the Planning Board reviewing the proposal and determining the environmental impact.

"What the developer is looking for is an indication from the (Town Board) as to whether or not this is something the board is opposed to, or something that would seriously be considered," said Naughton.

Highway Superintendent Kenneth Guyer said boring into the ravine could cause complications down the line.

"Some day, this will fail," Guyer said, "and it won't be us and it won't be me, but somebody will be in that ravine trying to fix that line, and it is very inaccessible."

The developer is also looking to get approval from the Town of Bethlehem to connect to its sewage line because there are

Area schools awarded grant to review assessments

BOCES-led consortium wins nearly \$440k for 12 districts

A dozen area school districts welcomed an infusion of state funding to help improve assessment practices.

The State Education Department awarded 31 grants Tuesday, Aug. 12, through the state's New "Teaching is the Core" initiative, which is funded through federal Race to the Top grants. Capital Region BOCES led a consortium of 12 school districts applying for the funding — including Guilderland, North Colonie, South Colonie and Voorheesville and was awarded nearly \$400,000.

The funds will be used to help school districts identify locally adopted tests not contributing to teaching or learning. Districts will also identify effective assessments, which could be improved upon, and share best practices with area schools.

"We are excited that these districts

will now have the resources to complete this important work," Lynne Wells, assistant district superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction at Capital Region BOCES, said in a prepared statement. "Reviewing assessment practices will help ensure they support student learning to the highest degree possible."

The grant will fund related activities for districts through the 2014-15 school year.

Last month, the State Education Department sent every school district and BOCES a Testing Transparency Report, which identified tests that could be eliminated or replaced with performance-based assessments.

State Education Commissioner John King Jr. said high quality assessments are a vital part of education and provide useful feedback to teachers, parents and students.

"At the state level, we haven't increased the number of tests we administer, and virtually all of the tests we give are required by federal law," King said in a

prepared statement. "Unfortunately, due to various pressures at the federal, state and local level, testing has increased in many districts in ways that do not always support good instruction and, sometimes, even crowd out time for student learning. Testing should be the minimum necessary to inform effective decision-making in classrooms, schools and districts."

Every district will create an assessment review team consisting of teachers and administrators. An education consultant will also provide extensive training to help facilitate the review process, what assessments to review and develop an action plan from findings.

Another focus of the grant is engaging parents on how assessments are used.

North Colonie Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction Kathy Skeals said the district was pleased to receive the grant and work with neighboring districts.

Why Change to 20? Scientists have assessed that the brain of an individual does not fully develop until a person reaches the age of 20 or older. It is called "Neuromaturation."

The organization's Mission Statement says it best: "We want to enact an amendment to the U.S. Constitution making 20 years old the age of majority."

Everyone born after Jan. 1, 2000, would be considered an adult or emancipated under Federal law on their 20th birthday. Everyone under 20 years old would be considered a child, minor or juvenile under this amendment.

'Once this constitutional amendment is passed, no one under

a wager at a casino or racino. They would not be able to place a bet at any OTB Parlor, OTB Kiosk or OTB Online, and they couldn't place a bet at any horse or dog racetrack," Carney stated. "This would also include all racetracks under the state-ownership of the New York Racing Association - Saratoga, Belmont and Aqueduct. Also, everyone under 20 would no longer be able to purchase any lottery tickets, scratch-offs, pull-tabs or play bingo.'

toward the care of the animals. The grant money will be used to restore funds that have already been paid toward their care.

Bethlehem police executed a search warrant at 80 Waldenmaier Road last November as a result of a multi-week investigation into complaints of animal cruelty and neglect of horses

Police said upon arrival, 33 horses were found on the property. After an investigation, some horses were allegedly found to be in various stages of neglect and malnourishment. Others were allegedly found to be without water. All of the horses were examined by licensed veterinarians, and as a result of the examinations eight horses were seized to undergo further evaluation, treatment and care.

Karen A. Burrows, 49, was arrested on Nov. 18. following the execution of the search warrant at her farm. She was charged with eight counts of failure to provide sustenance, a Class A misdemeanor under the New York State Agriculture

and Markets Law. Arrested on the same charges was William J. Trianni, 25, Burrows' employee.

Court documents indicated Burrows told police she was having trouble taking care of physical aspects of the farm due to an injury. In March 2013, she hired Trianni, who had experience with horses, to help care for the animals.

"When I started, the horses were in worse physical condition than now," Trianni told police, according to the court documents. "Over the last six months, I have made efforts to improve the horses' care.'

Trianni told police he had several veterinarians out to visit the property and provided a notebook with some medical records. He was then able to get a hold of a veterinarian who provided some receipts. Trianni also said he added a weight supplement to the horse's feed.

"I had been pushing Karen to get rid of as many of her horses and ponies as possible because the fewer we have on the property, the better care, attention and training we can provide," Trianni told police.

The police report indicated many of the horse's water buckets were dry, and there was limited hay on the property. Some horses allegedly had open wounds and scars, while others had lice, missing teeth and internal parasites.

Court documents indicate animal control was notified of the situation after two people visited the property to look at a horse Trianni was trying to sell.

Detective Sgt. Adam Hornick previously said police had received complaints about the farm in the past, but no arrests were made. For now the farm, which allows people to pay to go horseback riding, is still allowed to operate because no court order has been issued.

Corsi said any animals seized as part of an investigation ultimately become the obligation of the town until the case is resolved.

"They're in our care, so they're our responsibility," said Corsi.

The case against Burrows and Trianni is still pending. The horses continue to be cared for by volunteers.

time to work with our fellow citizens to perhaps come up with other scenarios, but I just want to caution everybody ... the day may come when some school in this district may have to close."

Slack said she "somewhat was uncomfortable" with the motion because it could seem the district is saying it will not close a school, which has yet to be determined.

Board Vice President Allan Simpson said he did not agree with the scenarios primarily focusing on only closing one school. The only other school included in a scenario for closure was Lynnwood Elementary School.

Altamont has the most building space not being used out of the elementary schools. The building with the most unused space districtwide though, falling around 30 percent, is the middle school.

"The point really should be it could be any one of the schools," said Simpson. "It shouldn't be just focused on one school or two schools. In my opinion, it should be taking the whole lot of all the buildings together, so we can analyze what is the best decision for the whole community."

Fellow member Gloria Towle-Hilt said ending the report right before the scenarios will allow

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Board members have purposefully not shared any opinions on scenarios presented in the study, or what direction the district should or shouldn't take to use space more effectively.

Altamont Mayor James Gaughan argued the lack of public communication about what the district has done with the study information has only fueled discontent among the residents.

"I appreciate your process and procedure. As you say, it's a matter of practice that you do not do anything but listen (during public comment at board meetings)," said Gaughan. "Here is a piece of advice ... this is different. ... To wait and listen for now two months and wait and listen for more months, and not respond in any way shape or form to some of the points that have been brought up, I think is a communication mistake."

The board moved to set the scenarios aside after hearing from several Altamont residents urging the board not to close Altamont.

April Alex, mother of an Altamont elementary student and middle school student, moved to the Guilderland school district particularly for the elementary school.

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the program," Alex said. "The reality is when people move to a community, they move for the elementary school. They don't just ignore the first five years of a child's education."

The Spotlight

Seversky previously said families move to a school district for the overall quality of education and not the reputation of an individual elementary school. Several speakers continued stressing property values would decrease in the village if the school closed, which contrasted with what Seversky claimed.

Eric Merrifield said his family moved from Seattle, Wash., about two years ago to Altamont, with the elementary school a key reason.

"The Altamont Elementary School has a remarkable community. ... It is an extraordinary place, and our son is thriving there," he said. "All of those intangibles of the benefits to the community are lost in a report like this. None of those appear in these metrics, but they all have value."

Merrifield went through a similar process in Seattle and ended up witnessing the closure of nine schools. Some schools were appropriately closed, he said, but many were "good schools with good performance." However, the data pointed to closing them.

"The metrics that you are looking at are not the only metrics out there,' Merrifield said. "Statistics require manipulation of numbers and a lot of assumptions, and unless you know what those assumptions are, you don't know whether the predictions are correct."

and won gold medals in forms and weapons, as well as a bronze in sparring, in his 7-year-old age group.

Tony said Pierce's first gold medal was a surprise to him and Judy.

"As his parents, watching him, we didn't even know he won. We had to ask Shihan Butler, 'Did he win? Did he win?'" said Tony.

Pierce had a bigger medal haul last year in Cincinnati, as he grabbed gold medals in forms, weapons and team forms with two of his AIJK classmates. He was also part of a silver medalwinning weapons team.

This year's competition in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., turned out to be Pierce's toughest competition to date. He picked up a gold medal in forms for the third consecutive year, but he finished second

in weapons and third in sparring in the 9-year-old age group.

There were definitely a lot of people, but it didn't feel harder," said Pierce. "It was just harder because there were a lot more people."

"As the years go on, (the level of) the belts gets higher, and as a result the competition gets tougher," said Tony.

Pierce's belt level may soon be going higher. A second-degree brown belt, Pierce is scheduled to test for black belt in the next three months, said Butler. And if Pierce earns a gold or silver medal in forms at the AAU Nationals next year, he will automatically qualify for the United States team that competes at the world karate championships.

The real karate kid

Lombardi has earned six national championships in three years

What began as a means to learn self defense has become much more to Pierce Lombardi.

The 9-year-old from Selkirk has turned into a national karate champion. Over the course of the last three years, Lombardi has earned six gold medals, two silver medals and two bronze medals at the AAU championships.

"It's rare that you find a student like Pierce," said Lombardi's teacher, Shihan Tony Butler of Albany's American Institute of Japanese Karate. "You don't find too many kids who have the maturity or the focus to do what he's done."

"He trained for two months with Shihan's help, and two months later he went to nationals for the first time and he won," said Tony Lombardi, Pierce's father.

Pierce said he didn't know what to think when his parents, Tony and Judy, started him in karate after he was bullied at the Parker School in Wynantskill.

"There was this one kid who kept hitting me. My parents said, 'That's it,' and they put me in karate," said Pierce. "I wasn't really sure about it, but once I got used to it, it became natural for me."

It didn't take long for Pierce to make an impression on the staff at AIJK. Judy said the beginner's group teacher came up to her and Tony after Pierce's first class and asked if he had taken karate before. Soon after, Pierce was taking classes with the more experienced students.

Butler said he realized he had a special student in Pierce, and he quickly trained him in the three facets of karate – forms, weapons and sparring – for his

first trip to nationals in 2012. "I knew the type of kids that were there, and I knew (Pierce) had a chance," said Butler.

 held during clan gatherings in the Highlands of Scotland.

"When we started in 1978, we were kind of expecting a crowd of what they got in 1967 — about 3,000 or 4,000 people," Munro said. "The first time we had 8,000 people, and now as many as 16,000, depending on the weather."

The games have grown to become an annual festival where people of Gaelic descent can proudly display their culture, traditions and talents. However, Munro lets it be known that "you don't have to be Scottish to come."

"My favorite part are the mass bands where all the pipers play together," Munro said. "About 500 pipers and drummers all play at the same time."

Munro is a piper in the Schenectady Pipe Band and will also perform in the mass band event.

"The pipe band is going to be 100 years old," he said.

Formed in 1917 with the support of Clan MacRae and General Electric, the 50-member Schenectady Pipe Band is one of the oldest bagpipe bands in the United States. The band has played for presidential inaugurations, performed in TV commercials and has competed in multiple world pipe band championships. The band consists of men and women that range from 13 to 75 years old.

"We are all from different professions and backgrounds all there for one purpose, which is to play the music we love," Munro said. "I happen to have two of my sons and grandson in the band and a brother with his family — we have quite a number of Munros."

But it's not just the mass bands that visitors find intriguing at the twoday event. The games also bring Highland dance competitions, athletic competitions, clan gatherings, Scottish foods, stage bands and animal exhibits.

"We have a Scottish dog exhibition with an obstacle course. Eleven breeds of Scottish dogs will go through tunnels and loops," Munro said.

However, Munro adds that probably the most unusual and sought after

event is the tossing of the caber, or tree trunk. The caber throw has athletes in kilts running across a field, cradling one end of a 20-foot long, 130-pound pole before coming to a dead stop and flipping the pole into the air. Munro said the idea is not distance, but to pitch the caber end over end so that it lands in a straight line from where it was thrown. The athletes compete in six events, all of which involved throwing some heavy object such as a stone, hammer or bundle of straw.

Each day, a different stage band will perform in the beer tent. New this year is a folk group described as a combination of the Waterboys, the Chieftains, Wolfstone and the Dave Matthews Band, with

Also slated for downtown Albany on Sept. 28, is the Live Life Local event expected to bring a crowd of 2,500-plus to the Times Union Center. A historical celebration surrounding the Half Moon ship in conjunction with the City of Albany is also planned for the waterfront.

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EMPAC announces its fall program lineup

Performing arts venue also celebrating its 10th year

In a lecture later this fall entitled "Speaking So to Speak" (Wednesday, Oct. 15 at 7 p.m.), EMPAC director Johannes Goebel talks of art and language.

According to Goebel, "Art, any kind of art, was only possible once we had language and were wondering about the meaning of life... Art can let us experience that there is something beyond language, beyond right and wrong, on this side of yesterday and tomorrow."

So it can be seen in pioneering avant-garde filmmaker Ken Jacobs' "Blankets for Indians," the first event to kick off the fall season at the Experimental Media and Performing Arts Center (EMPAC) at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute on Thursday, Aug. 28, at 7:30 p.m.

While in the process of shooting the New York City Hall fountain in 2012, Jacobs serendipitously turned his camera toward a large protest marching to Zuccotti Park in support of Occupy Wall Street.

"Time Squared," part of Ken Jacobs' "Nervous Magic Lantern" series of performances, uses projected light, the most basic ingredient of cinema, to create hallucinatory optical effects. Colored slides, a lens, and a spinning shutter are hand manipulated by the artist to animate the patterns reflected onto the screen, creating stereoscopic effects without celluloid or video. Jacobs will perform Time Squared, assisted by Florence Jacobs, in the Concert Hall at EMPAC on Friday, Aug. 29, at 8 p.m.

New film series "Surface Tension" begins with a screening of Joseph H. Lewis' "The Big Combo" on Thursday, Sept. 4, at 7:30 p.m., a classic film noir credited with ushering in a new era of cinematic violence in which the villain is often more interesting than the hero.

of East London and will present a talk on Tuesday, Sept. 9, at 6 p.m. entitled "Sonic Warfare," based on his book of the same name. Topics range from "psychoacoustic correction" aimed at Panama strongman Manuel Noriega by the U.S. Army, to sonic booms (or "sound bombs") over the Gaza Strip, to highfrequency rat repellents used against teenagers in malls. Kode9 will then give a rare US performance as part of the Hyperdub record label 10th anniversary tour (Tuesday, Sept. 9, at 9 p.m.).

From one sonic boom to the next comes electronic musician Laurel Halo,

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performing new work on Friday, Sept. 12, at 8 p.m. Halo's brand of electronic music fuses techno and dance-driven sounds with a heavy dose of synths and samples.

On Saturday, Oct. 4, EMPAC will present a day of contemporary art spanning disciplines. At 4 p.m., Temporary Distortion begins a sixhour performance of "My Voice Has An Echo In It," combining live music, text, and video in a fully enclosed 24-by-6-foot capsule made of two-way mirrors. All performers are completely confined within this freestanding, soundproof box; the audience watches and listens from outside.

At 4:30 and 7:30 p.m., artist Anthony Marcellini performs "Obsolescere: The Thing is Falling." Drawn from the Latin obsolescere-"falling into disuse," the idea that an object falls out of use over the course of time reveals that obsolescence is not a fixed point, but an active and fluctuating state. Over the course of 25 minutes, a house cat, a Ford Taurus, seven fluorescent light bulbs, a goldfish, several cornstalks, the Encyclopedia Britannica, and a rusted portrait bust will speak about their conditions, narrating perspectives on utility, breakdown, and contradiction. This series of conversations

addresses the condition of all objects, humans included, when they outlive their usefulness.

At 6:30 and 8 p.m, audience members will board a bus to experience an immersive and participatory performance riding through the postindustrial landscape surrounding Troy. Created by Aaron Landsman in collaboration with visual artist and filmmaker Brent Green and performed by Jim Findlay, Empathy School combines theater, travel, and audio in a confined space where listening to a stranger's story is the only possible act of togetherness.

Finally, at 9 p.m. Mick Barr presents a solo performance of his electric guitar works. A guitarist of the highest technical caliber, Barr makes music that exists somewhere between progressive black metal, hardcore, and avant-jazz. Alternating between witheringly complex and gutturally primal, Barr is at the center of the extreme sound scene with works of unrivaled experimental improvisation.
