The call came in around 8 a.m.

With New York in a state of emergency, any willing emergency personnel who could be spared were asked to respond to the suburbs of Buffalo to help residents as the dug out their homes following a snowstorm that left the region buried under feet of snow. By about 1 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 22, units from Albany County had met at Crossgates Mall before heading west.

"As a firefighter, it's part of the job," said Bill Asprion, Selkirk Fire Chief. "It's exciting and challenging because we're not in our own neighborhood anymore. It can also be dangerous because we don't know the towns or streets.

Many of the area's fire departments sent crews and

Siena survey finds fewer looking forward to holidays statewide

according to a recent survey, but a majority of shoppers are eyeing more practical gifts.

Siena Research Institute released its annual Statewide Poll of Holiday Spending on Monday, Nov. 24, which was conducted from Nov. 3 to 17 through random calls to landline or cell phones of 809 residents. Approximately 59 percent of the shoppers surveyed are planning to spend about the same as last year, and nearly two-thirds are planning to buy gifts for the same number of people.

"Despite increasing overall consumer sentiment, holiday spending appears likely to be similar to last year," SRI Director Don Levy said in a statement. "Every indicator — intended spending target, number of people on your list and actual dollars budgeted — looks nearly identical to last year's plans."

While a majority of people are excited about this holiday season, with 58 percent "very" or "somewhat" excited, spirits apparently dampened from last year. This year, 41 percent of people are "not very" or "not at all" excited about the holidays, but last year it was only 27 percent.

There was a similar response regarding how many people are looking forward to the winter, which was at 60 percent. Many people apparently do not look forward to seeing a lot of snow piled up outside their windows.

"A strong majority is excited about winter's arrival but sentiment flips when the topic is snow," Levy said in a statement. "A majority, when thinking about the white stuff, describe themselves as someone that figures out how to endure it and as one that wouldn't be upset if we had very little of it."

As people unwrap their gifts, they are more likely to see a practical gift than something they want more than they really need. Overall, 65 percent of people opted to purchase practical gifts as

Holiday cheer in full bloom

Guilderland Garden Club to hold annual Greens Show at Mynderse-Fredrick House

GUILDERLAND — Snow might cover the ground outside, with plants nipped by the season's first frost, but a festive atmosphere of greenery arrangements could provide some warmth and merriment.

The annual Open House and Greens Show at the historic Mynderse-Fredrick House, located at 451 Main St. in Guilderland Center, will kick off on Friday, Dec. 5, from 4 to 8 p.m. The show continues through the weekend and is open from 1 to 5 p.m. on Dec. 6 and 7. This year's theme, "Memories of Christmas Past," will pay homage to the 50th anniversary of the Guilderland Garden Club through creating decorations highlighting themes from prior years. The Garden Club and Guilderland Historical Society sponsor the free event.

Maureen McNamara, a past president of the Garden Club, said

she enjoys getting to meet people and showcasing the house to the community.

"It is just really enjoyable to get people's response when they come in and see the home if they had never been there," said McNamara. "Every year it is a little something different, with always having the fresh greenery or dried arraignments."

There will be musical entertainment and performances throughout the weekend. Helene Runion, a soloist, will be accompanied by Jean LaCrosse on Friday starting at 4:30 p.m. Tom Thorpe, a folk and bluegrass performer, will perform on Saturday at 3 p.m. Children and adults can listen to stories told by Karl Felsen as Sinterklaas on Sunday at 2 p.m.

"We have complimentary refreshments made by the members — cookies and cakes. We also will have a warm spice tea and cold punch," said McNamara. "There will be ornaments wreaths and flower arraignments made by members for purchase."

Since 1975, the Garden Club has decorated the house for its annual show with the Historical Society. This is the first time the event will showcase themes from prior years, which include "Ice and Snow" and "Victorian Christmas."

"Every year, we try to think of a different theme, so that takes a lot of time until we really nail something down that everybody agrees with," she said.

The event provides an opportunity for the public to see the inside of the Mynderse-Fredrick House, which was built by the first supervisor of the Town of Guilderland.

"It is not open that often. There are special tours conducted by the Guilderland Historical Society," said McNamara. "This is one of the few times it is open, and here it is opened three days in a row.... That is what I think it makes it so special, too, for the community."

There will be historical society



members available to give tours of the house during the event.

A portion of the proceeds from the event will go to the Pine Bush Discovery Center. There will also be a collection for non-perishables to be donated to a local food bank.

The Garden Club, with help from the town Parks Department and a local master gardener, began developing a perennial garden at the historic home in the summer of 2009. The ongoing project received a Landscape Design Award at the Fall 2013 District Meeting of the Federated Garden Clubs of New York State, according to President Merril-Lee The annual Open House and Greens Show at the historic Mynderse-Fredrick House, in Guilderland Center will take place Dec. 5-7.

Back on track

Indoor kart racing facility that closed abruptly earlier this year reopens under new company

GUILDERLAND — Another California-based company has moved in to the former Fastrax Raceway and is offering a deal to those left with gift cards from the previous business.

K1 Speed opened its doors Friday, Nov. 21, at Crossgates Commons and has since rebranded the inside of the indoor kart racing facility, with plans to make changes to the track. The same general experience is offered at K1 Speed, which features highspeed electric go-karts, a snack bar and private rooms that can be reserved for parties. Anyone can walk in and hit the track, but race packages are also available.

Fastrax Raceway opened in the summer of 2013, but it abruptly closed in October due to a court-ordered eviction. The company also closed its facility in Poughkeepsie. Both locations were rented from Pyramid Management Group.

"We are a polished, professional national brand and we have centers all across the United States, and we are continuing to open new centers," said Mike Maguire, director of operations for K1 Speed. "We are on a nice growth pattern, so people can feel safe we are not going anywhere."

To help out former Fastrax customers left with gift cards, K1

Speed is offering anyone with a gift card one free race, no matter how much is left on it. Maguire said some people might have more or less than what a race costs, but the company wanted to do something to help out people.

"Anybody that was a previous racer at Fastrax, we are going to honor their license," Maguire said. "We think this is a good community, and we have some avid racers."

Some former Fastrax employees were interviewed to work at K1 Speed. The company will also bring in new staff members.

When K1 Speed opened, the facility closely resembled the previous occupant, but changes have already been made to the environment inside. All the signage has been changed and areas have been repainted. The outside sign still needs to be replaced.

"Every day we will just continue to make the cosmetic change," said Maguire. "We are going to change the track eventually. It will be a different design and system."

In about a month, the track layout will be redesigned, and there will be different barrier system installed, according to Maguire.

K1 Speed also opened at Fastrax's former site in Poughkeepsie Galleria. The company operates about two dozen facilities nationwide.

A single race is \$20, with a \$6 license fee if someone is a new racer. A package of three races can also be purchased for \$50.

People interested in a more competitive environment can test their skills in K1 Speed's Challenge GP. There are also race leagues and race package events, which offer two qualifying heats to determine starting positions before a standing-start race.

Sewer charge to end

A decades-old front footage fee will reduce over time

BETHLEHEM— Bethlehem residents will soon be billed differently for sewer usage as the town ends a decades-long charge that is no longer relevant.

According to Town Comptroller Mike Cohen, as new homes were built in the 1970s and '80s in underdeveloped parts of town, new sewer lines were also needed. Town officials needed to find a way to pay for this new infrastructure, and unlike today, the developers were not made to foot the bill.

The town decided to bond to pay for the projects, since at the time they could not get federal aid. It was decided the cost for the new sewer lines should be passed on to the homeowners.

Residents in those homes were billed with an extra charge on their taxes called a front footage charge. This was determined by measuring the curb of their property by feet and charging residents a certain amount per foot based on the measurement.

Cohen said not everyone is town will have this extra charge, and most that do, don't realize it. The bonds for the sewer work were paid off in the mid-2000s, but the charge has continued to be included in the tax bills of residents.

The number of parcels that currently are charged front footage taxes is 6,252. The number of parcels that are not charged a front footage tax is 4,575. Those who are not charged front footage simply pay their sewer taxes based on property value, along with a smaller usage fee. Front footage rates also vary among neighborhoods.

"The theory is everyone receives the same services, so they should be charged the same," said Cohen.

At the Town Board meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 25, Cohen said he and Supervisor John Clarkson proposed to end the extra charge within five years. The charge has already been slowly decreased over the past several years.

Homes built prior to and after that period in the 1970s and '80s were not charged front footage.

In recent years, the town has worked to eliminate inequities in taxes. This was done by eliminating multiple water rates in 2011, eliminating multiple rates for sewer districts in 2012 and merging ambulance districts in 2013.

The town has three sewer districts, which were all charged different front footage rates in 2014. Some paid 44 cents per linear foot, some paid \$1.48 and some paid \$1.74.

Cohen said it is being recommended that all residents who are still charged the front footage tax see their rates drop to an even 34 cents per linear foot next year. Then, the charge will end within two to four years.

To make up the loss of revenue, residents who were previously not charged the front footage tax may see their sewer taxes slightly increase.

Cohen said since many residents saw a decrease in their taxes because of the property reassessment, town officials wanted to make sure the change

Report: Toxic toys sold locally

Advocates urge county legislators to OK 'Toxic-Free Toys Act'

ALBANY COUNTY — At least a dozen toys being sold in local stores had unsafe levels of chemicals, according to a recent study, and local lawmakers are looking to crack down on retailers selling such items.

The Albany County Legislature held a public hearing Tuesday, Nov. 25, on its proposed Toxic-Free Toys Act, which would allow the county health commissioner to inspect merchandise sold in stores and issue fines for toys found to have dangerous levels of, or banned, chemicals. Fines for each offense would range from \$500 to \$1,000. The public hearing was held about a week after a report claimed toys with hazardous levels of chemical were being sold locally.

Legislator Bryan Clenehan, D-Guilderland, said he introduced Local Law J because it's needed to protect families and children.

Clean and Healthy New York and the New York League of Conservation Voters Education Fund released its report, "Toxic Toys in Albany County, on Monday, Nov. 17, which found a dozen toxic toys for sale in the county. The report, which is not intended to be comprehensive of any product or brand, found at least one toxic toy sold at Ocean State Job Lot, Party City, Target, Wal-Mart and Ollie's Bargain Outlet.

"This is a common sense piece of legislation that will help to protect our families and our children," said Environmental Advocates of New York Policy Director Katherine Nadeau, of Delmar. "This type of legislation is very much needed."

Nadeau said the county needed to act since the state and federal

government are not taking any actions to band such items.

The state legislature has stalled for several years the "Child Safe Products Act," which would require manufacturers to reveal any dangerous chemicals used during production. The bill languished in the Senate this year after passing in the Assembly.

In Congress, legislation has been stalled for a decade to revise the 35year old Toxic Substances Control Act.

The products were purchased during October and November, but the overall amount of toys tested was not disclosed. Only a "tiny fraction" of products tested were found to be of concern.

Two items in the report were tied for the largest variety of toxic chemicals present, with both sold at Ocean State Job Lot. A Charms & Angels bracelet making kit was found to have arsenic, antimony, lead, mercury and cadmium. A D.I.Y. Beaded Sparkle Charm Jewelry was found to have Antimony, cobalt, lead, mercury and cadmium.

One of the toxic toys in the report was a Breast Cancer Awareness charm bracelet found to have arsenic and cobalt, a carcinogen.

Bobbi Chase Wilding, deputy director of Clean and Healthy New York, said finding toys with heavy metals still being sold in stores was troubling. Wilding is the mother of two children, whom she worries could be exposed to such chemicals.

"My 10-year-old, I have a conversation with her at least six times a day, 'Take that out of your mouth; it wasn't meant to go in your mouth," said Wilding. "Frankly, I wish I didn't have to be here today. ... Parents don't want toxic chemicals in children's products, period. Unfortunately that isn't that case."

Wilding said one of the charms included in a bracelet making kit was made of 25 percent cadmium, which is more than 250,000 parts per million.

"It's hard to believe that it's 2014 and parents still can't be sure the products that retailers are selling are only the toxic-free products," she said. "The good news is that I also tested a bunch of products that didn't contain chemicals of concern and heavy metals, so companies can do it. Store shelves are not going to be empty.

Products were tested an X-Ray Fluorescence Analyzer, which is a portable device that can detect levels of chemicals on the surface of nearly any object. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has used the device to screen packaging, the U.S. Food & Drug Administration to screen food, and many state and county health departments to screen for residential lead paint.

State Attorney General Eric Schneiderman on Tuesday, Nov. 25, issued a letter to retailers in the state reinforcing its legal obligation to ensure the safety of children's products before the holiday shopping season kicked off.

"As a retailer, you are in a position to safeguard children from toxic chemicals," Schneiderman said in his letter. "I urge you to implement measures to identify unsafe products and keep them off your shelves."

Height advantage

BC's guards will be taller than its forwards with Sica moving to the perimeter

BETHLEHEM-Will size matter in the Suburban Council this season?

If so, then the Bethlehem boys basketball team will have a distinct advantage in that department. The Eagles' roster features six players 6 feet, 4 inches tall or taller.

"I think our guards will be taller than our forwards because we're moving (6-foot, 7-inch) John Sica to the perimeter, and we're probably moving (6-4) Kevin Weber to the 2-guard," said Bethlehem coach A.G. Irons. "That gives us five senior starters with a bunch of juniors who have lots of playing experience behind them.'

Moving Sica to a guard

position isn't as far-fetched as some would think. The Columbia Universitybound senior is a good shooter away from the foul lane, and he's being groomed to play guard at the collegiate level.

"John's growing. He's becoming a more well-rounded player," said Irons.

Still, the idea of moving someone as tall as Sica away from the low post might seem unusual. That is, until you note the list of other talented forwards on Bethlehem's roster, including seniors Ben Zonca, Justin LaClair and Kyle Morelli.

"He's not a real tall kid, but he's strong," Irons said of Zonca, who is one of the shortest players on the roster at 5 feet, 11 inches. "We had him playing (small forward) last year

because we liked his aggressiveness down low."

in sewer taxes did not negatively affect the tax bills of residents. That is why it was decided to phase out the charge, with the largest amount absorbed this year.

The average homeowner should continue to see an overall tax reduction for 2015. This change will only be averaged out through the sewer fund, so properties without sewer will not be impacted.

"The importance here is we are treating everyone the same, which will always have some ups and downs," said Clarkson. "One year may accrue the benefit more for one geography more than others,

but if we are going to a fairer distribution of taxes, that's the most important thing.'

A list of property owners who are billed the extra charge was provided by the town and included in the agenda packet on the town's website.

Only one resident spoke at the public hearing for a clarification. The town board passed the measure unanimously.

"Please note that we are not looking at this as 'winners' and 'losers," said Cohen in a later interview. "Residents of the community receive one service, and the service received in one part of the community is no different than in any other. We believe that similar services should be charged fairly and evenly."

Traffic study finds visibility low at intersection with Darroch Road

BETHLEHEM - New stops signs will be installed at an intersection of Murray Avenue after residents requested measures be taken to help curb traffic violations.

A traffic study was performed in October by Creighton Manning to determine what could be done to help reduce speeding in the area. For several years, residents had been asking for stop signs.

Highway Superintendent Brent Meredith presented the findings from the study to the Town Board on Wednesday, Nov. 12. One of the main issues was the fact stop signs are not recommended for speed control.

From the study, typical volumes of traffic were found for a residential area. The speed was found to be higher than normal, with two accidents in the past five years having to do with speed. The speed limit on both roads is 30 mph, with 85 percent of vehicles traveling at 36.2 mph or lower.

The thing about Murray Avenue though, is it does get a lot of traffic because it is the way to the bypass from those neighborhoods," said Meredith.

The highway superintendent said the most interesting thing from the study is there was still found to be line-of-sight issues, even with the buses trimmed. The study found sight distance was limited as drivers approached Darroch Road from the west and the east. There are also trees in the way.

"We've trimmed back what we can trim back, so unfortunately what we have there is all we can do unless the residents decide to remove some trees and the shrubs they have," said Meredith.

The study recommended an all-way stop for the intersection because of the visibility issues on the Darroch Road approach.

Councilman Jeffrey Kuhn said he drives the intersection every day and agreed with the assessment. He said it was hard to see oncoming traffic from the east because of visibility also from the roads close proximity to the woods.

Town Attorney Jim Potter, who also uses the road frequently, asked if the low visibility with the bend in the road will cause drivers to screech to a halt when they see the new stop signs. Meredith said additional signs will be installed before the intersection to let drivers know a stop sign is coming.

Councilwoman Joann Dawson asked about changing the geometry of Murray Avenue so it wasn't so curved. Meredith said it would be a larger undertaking than adding the signs.

Supervisor John Clarkson responded by adding "sometimes a perceived solution can make matters worse." He felt widening Murray Avenue would lead more people to speed down the road.

Meredith said he is looking into some future projects in the area. He actually may look to narrow a portion of Murray Avenue. He said this might make the road more "communityfriendly."

"When I first got on the board and we started seeing traffic control studies, and I learned a little about sort of the way it works and basically that it's about sight-line more than speed, this intersection immediately occurred to me," said Kuhn.

For the stops signs to be installed, a new local traffic law needed to be passed.

No one spoke at the public hearing held on Tuesday, Nov. 25, but the law was unanimously passed by the Town Board.

equipment. This included departments from North Bethlehem, Elsmere, Delmar, Guilderland Center and Coeymans, among others. Firefighters from Slingerlands Fire Department also responded, but under other capacities.

Some areas of the Buffalo region saw up to 8 feet of snow after a lake-effect storm struck. The roofs of some homes and businesses collapsed under the weight of all that snow, and there was a fear that flooding could occur as temperatures rose later that week.

After responding to Buffalo, firefighters were stationed at fire departments throughout the region in order to provide a break for those who worked there.

"What happens is the local fire department gets overwhelmed," said Asprion. "That's where we come in to pick up the pieces. We help keep them safe and alive."

Selkirk's team of team of seven men was stationed at Big Tree Fire Department near Hamburg, the heart of the storm. They stayed for 72 hours before another crew was brought in.

Mostly the crew responded to help pump out basements as temperatures rose.

According to the Selkirk fire chief, the snow was very deep but melted quickly. Sometimes the crew was called to check on carbon monoxide levels or for a gas main break. At one point, the unit had to rescue a man off the roof of a Home Depot who had injured his leg while dealing with the snow.

During down times, the Selkirk crew cleaned the fire station and its equipment. Asprion said they wanted to make sure the local firefighters were in good shape when they returned to their station, "For us, it was amazing to see that much snow. and they seemed very grateful.

Delmar Fire Chief Dan Ryan said his department also sent seven firefighters and some equipment. They worked at a total of three stations while there and also responded to pump out basements and deal with downed wires.

"For us, it was amazing to see that much snow," said Ryan. "I had never seen anything like in that short amount of time. You'd be driving along fine, and then all of a sudden be in 7 feet of snow."

Ryan said members of his department responded

"Hopefully if we ever have the same situation, there is the same amount of people that would help us," he said.

The Elsmere Fire Department sent six firefighters and an engine. They first reported to a station in Hamburg, before splitting up to Lakeside Fire Department where they helped assist with sandbags and pumping. Sometimes they were called to car accidents.

"It's really a sacrifice on everyone's part, including the families," said Elsmere Fire Chief Jim Reagan, who was unable to respond with members of his department. "I know they were well taken care of... but they're glad to be back. Just a little tired."

Asprion said the experience was bittersweet. "It was overwhelming,

much as they possible, but the more income someone has, the more likely they will purchase less practical gifts.

"Perhaps as part of the new economic normal, by 2-to-1, New Yorkers say that, as much as they can, they will buy practical gifts more than splurging on impractical items. While we won't be wrapping up coal, it is more likely we'll see needs, rather than wants, under the tree," Levy said in a statement.

Compared to last year, a similar percentage of people are planning to spend about the same amount on gifts (59 percent) and for about the same about of people (63 percent). There are 31 percent planning to spend up to \$299 on gifts, with a similar total looking to spend from \$300 to \$599 at 33 percent. On the opposite end, 23 percent are planning to spend more than \$1,000.

Despite a somewhat frugal approach to gift giving for many residents, the vast majority, at 75 percent, are planning to donate money, food or gifts to charitable organizations.

"The warmth of New Yorkers is evident in this survey as even in the face of a sluggish economy, across every demographic group, overwhelming majorities plan to give to help others enjoy this season," Levy said in a statement.

The amount drops off however with those looking to donate their time falling at 36 percent.

The poll has a margin of error of +/- 3.4 percentage points. Approximately 39 percent of the sample is from Upstate, 43 percent are New York City, and 21 percent is from "suburbs."

The little things can get you

is the season for carefully examining the toys we buy for our children.

On Nov. 17, Clean and Healthy New York and the New York League of Conservation Voters released a list of nearly two dozen toys that allegedly contained unsafe levels of chemicals or metals currently stocked in stores.

Clean and Healthy New York's list contained items that, on the surface, seem innocuous - key chains, charms, beads, hair clips, a luggage tag and jewelry. However, when the organization tested these items, they found chemicals such as arsenic, cobalt, mercury or lead. And yet, these items were found in stores such as Target, Party City and Ocean State Job Lots.

Naturally, we are very concerned about this because we thought in this day and age, it was understood by manufacturers that they shouldn't use any toxic materials to make things for children. Then again, many of the items on Clean and Healthy New York's list are made in China, which has different manufacturing standards than the United States. So unless China adopts the same standards as the U.S., we will continue to see these tainted items reach our store shelves

It's not as if the companies selling these goods on our shores care about what goes into them. Until Clean and Healthy New York's study came out, consumers were probably none the wiser about what went into the hair

clips they bought their young daughters or the key chains they gave to their young sons. They just saw them as interesting trinkets that their kids wanted. And as long as the companies made a profit on each sale, they weren't going to demand a change in how the items were made.

At least, something may be done locally. Albany County has proposed a law that would fine stores for selling tainted items, but it has yet to pass it. If approved, the county would fine any store selling such items \$500 for the first offense and \$1,000 for each subsequent offense. It's unlikely to be a deterrent for major stores such as Target and Party City, but it's at least a step in the direction of holding store owners accountable for the

goods they sell. Unfortunately, it does nothing to hold the manufacturers accountable.

So, be aware of what you're buying your children for the holidays. Use Clean and Healthy New York's list as a guide to steer clear of items that contain hazardous material, and let's hope for the day when we won't need this list.

Timeless voices

Cathedral Choir of Men and Boys to perform Handel's 'Messiah'

ALBANY-An exhibition of nearly 350 years of musical experience will take place at the Cathedral of All Saints in Albany on Tuesday, Dec. 9.

The Cathedral Choir of Men and Boys will perform George Frederic Handel's "Messiah" with the support of a baroque instrument orchestra

Under the direction of Cathedral Director of Music Woodrow Bynum, this performance of Messiah will feature guest soloists, soprano Ava Pine, alto Emily Marvosh, tenor Jack Swanson, and baritone Sumner Thompson.

Violinist Aysslinn Nosky, of the noted chamber ensemble "Tafelmusik" and concert master of Boston's Handel & Haydn Society, will serve as concert master of the period instrument orchestra.

This marks the fifth year of the renowned choir's performance of Messiah at the South Swan Street cathedral, and Bynum said the surroundings provide concert-goers with a "feast for the eyes, as well as the ears.

The Albany performers hold the distinction

of being the longest, continuously singing choir in the United States. Established in 1872 by Bishop William Croswell Doane, it predates the erection of the cathedral itself by 16 years. Doane had dreamt of a grand cathedral to mirror those found in England, and Bynum said, he wanted to have a choir prepared once it was completed.

In association with Boston's Handel & Haydn Society, who recently celebrated their 200th anniversary, the concert promises an authentic sound that remains true to the 1700s. Replicating that sound, said Bynum, involves attention to detail.

"The Messiah is similar to performances that commonly happen this time of year," said Bynum. "And, you can do a marvelous job by using modern instruments."

There was a collective movement in the 1960s to perform baroque pieces with instruments that have not changed. For example, harpsichords – a cousin of the modern piano are characteristic to such period orchestras. And, though music enthusiasts will easily recognize stringed instruments such as violins and cellos, the difference lies in the strings. "The violins use gut stings instead of steal," he said, providing a "softer" sound opposed to modern strings.

"And it matches beautifully with the boys' voices," said Bynum.

In addition to its annual Messiah performance, the

In just one week. It's a goal WMHT Executive Vice President Scott Sauer is confident they can achieve, thanks to the loyalty listeners have shown before.

"During this past year,

the WMHT audience has accomplished more than at any time in our history," said Sauer. "Listener contributions made it possible to deliver more music to more listeners in more ways than ever before."

Sauer said contributions have enabled the station to broadcast programing by means outside of traditional radio. Now, listeners can enjoy broadcasts through digital radio, streamed media on personal computers and though smart phone applications. The new tools spread the avenues for which patrons can enjoy local broadcasts, but it also provides the non-for-profit radio station a fighting chance against other means of entertainment computers, satellite radio, phone app games - that

compete for listener's attention.

"After 42-years of providing our region with daily access to Mozart, Bach, Copland, Beethoven and all of the great masters, there is always concern that listeners will take the service for granted," said Sauer. "That is not something that can happen, as listeners provide the majority of WMHT's support. The WMHT-FM Winter Fundraising Campaign will provide a direct opportunity for listeners to make the music accessible to everyone in our community."

Funding has also allowed programs featured through podcasts, and has sponsored live performances. In turn, up to 100 of such live concerts, recorded in the Capital District, were broadcast on WMHT-FM, said Sauer.
