# About life and lemons

Area six-year-old aces life lessons on charity and community

**BETHLEHEM** — Six-year-old Caidyn Mahan, of Delmar, is tiny, blonde and already a philanthropist. At a lemonade stand she held recently, the first grader raised over \$4,000 for a police office recently diagnosed with stage four Hodgkins Lymphoma — a rare form of cancer.

"I just made a post on Facebook earlier in the day and then all of a sudden there were all these people," said Caidyn's mother Kristi Mahan.

By the end of the day the photo had been shared over 400 times, and hundreds of people had visited the lemonade stand held Wednesday, Sept. 2. Some had travelled as much as 35 minutes for a taste of her delicious and charitable drink.

All proceeds benefitted Hoosick Falls Police Officer Nick Colaneri, 25. Colaneri will soon be paying all his chemotherapy treatments and travel expenses out of pocket.

As Colaneri is about to turn 26, he will no longer be carried by his parents'

# POLITICS McCoy takes party bid

Egan upset by loss, vocal against traditional party politics

ALBANY COUNTY — Albany County Executive Daniel McCoy earned the Democratic primary seat against challenger Dan Egan Thursday, Sept. 10. In a county with an overwhelming population of Democrats, this win likely means McCoy will go on to win a second term in office.

Albany County voters gave McCoy 9,815 of their votes — a 59 percent majority — in last week's Democratic primary elections. The victory is a clear one amidst a weak voter turnout, as Dan Egan received 37 percent of votes, or 6,118 ballots. McCoy said the win reflects his work decreasing costs in the county's budget, increasing reserves and expanding youth projects, while not increasing taxes.

"We kept our promises. We turned around our budget and we did that by working together," said McCoy during his victory speech at Martel's Restaurant in Albany. "The other side was throwing bricks at us," said McCoy, in reference to Egan. "This campaign was challenging. It was a long summer and I apologized to my kids for that... but we kept our chins up."

Egan was vocal about his dissent for McCoy throughout his push for the Democrat's bid, alleging McCoy of improprieties associated with campaign contributors, and accusing the incumbent of failing senior citizens for trying to privatize the Albany County Nursing Home. This objection to McCoy had even attracted a few legislators in office. Six of the 29 sitting Albany County Legislatures voiced their support for Egan's campaign. These included Legislators Tim Nichols of Latham and Doug Bullock of Albany – both very vocal dissenters of McCoy – as well as an additional three County Legislators from Albany, and Dave Mayo of Latham.

Also, two new Democratic primary winners, Paul Miller of Guilderland and likely Democratic primary winner Sean Raleigh of Bethlehem, endorsed Egan against McCoy.

Egan's platform included ambitious plans to raise the minimum wage, eliminate tax breaks for large corporations, ban oil trains from entering the county, reduce property taxes, ensure all counties have access to broadband internet and enroll more eligible seniors in supplemental nutrition assistance programs. "We're stuck with another four years of corruption and incompetence," said Egan. He went on to call

McCoy's administration the "angry remnants of an old machine," but added that he respects the verdict of the voters. McCoy, on the other hand, had the support of bigger names in this primary election: U.S. Senators Charles Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, and U.S. Representative Paul Tonko. He also counts Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan and Colonie Town Supervisor Paula Mahan as two of his closest supporters, and all

fellow Democrats. Before introducing McCoy at his victory celebration, Sheehan said, "Dan and I figured out pretty early on we can build a better community when we work together, and that benefits everyone." During his victory

## Bethlehem races too close to call

Meredith, Reinhardt win races; others to be determined Friday

#### BETHLEHEM —

Following a series of close races, a few of the town's primary elections will be determined after a count of absentee ballots later in the week.

According to the Albany County Board of elections, absentee ballots are set to be counted on Friday, Sept. 18. The two winners of the Democratic primary race for Town Board are still undetermined, as is the winner of the seat for County Legislative District 35.

## **Town Board**

On primary night, newcomer David VanLuven came out on top after garnering 1,211 votes among the three candidates. Joyce Becker followed with 1,191 votes, with incumbent Joann Dawson coming in third with 1,176 votes.

However, the Board of Elections said 191 absentee ballots were issued in Bethlehem. By Friday, they had received back 115 ballots, and more could arrive as long as they were postmarked before the primary date.

VanLuven said he was excited to see the size of

the voter turnout considering primary day was switched to a Thursday, and many residents faced a change in their polling place. "I was not surprised to see how close the races were,"

VanLuven said. "I was the underdog, with Joann and Joyce being more well-known in the community. Now, we just have to wait and see."

Becker said she was thankful for the community support, but also knew the race would be close.

"I'm afraid to feel good about it, but I want to," said Becker. "Waiting will be hard."

Dawson said she was disappointed in the count, but she was waiting like everyone else.

"I don't know if anything will change on Friday," she said. "Either way, it's been a great privilege to serve the community for the past nine years. I had the pleasure of keeping the voters confidence and support, and I appreciate it."

### Highway

The one clear winner Thursday night was incumbent Highway Superintendent Brent Meredith, who won his race against Dan Morin 1,149 votes to 815.

"I was pleased with the results, but there's still work to do," said Meredith.



ent Meredith campaigns. But we're running a different type of race, since

this isn't really a policy job." Meredith will still face Morin in November, as Morin had the Independent line, along with John "Tiger" Anastasi on the Republican and Conservative lines. Morin said he wasn't giving up.

"I still took 40 percent of the votes, so I'm pretty proud of that," said Morin. "I haven't had a chance to sit down and digest everything yet. I'm hoping we can still pull this off in November. I've never done this before — ran for office — so I'm learning."

## County Legislature

Bill Reinhardt also won his race for Legislative District 33, following a close count. Although absentee ballots still need to be counted, Reinhardt is positive some will be in his favor.

Reinhardt beat incumbent Herb Reilly Jr. 267 to 244 votes, with 24 absentee ballots issued. Reilly has been an Albany County Legislator since 2000 and served as New

Scotland Town Supervisor for 12 years, and as a Town Councilman in New Scotland for 10 years prior to that. "It's sad. I would have liked to have won," said Reilly, conceding. "I did

Reilly, conceding. "I did very well in the Town of New Scotland (his home town), but not so well in Bethlehem," said Reilly in concerns to his loss. About twothirds of New Scotland voters chose Reilly over Reinhardt. Reilly said he "doesn't know much" about Reinhardt, but he had won a caucus debate against him. He will now run on the Independent line.

Reinhardt said he was finally starting to feel comfortable with his win, unlike Thursday night when he wasn't so sure what the results would be. He knew the votes were there in Bethlehem, but realized many in New Scotland didn't know him. He faces Bethlehem resident Andrew Holland in the general election. "I'm confident now," Reinhardt said. "I want to take a breather and then get back in the trenches for November. I think I need to get walking again and talk to more people. I'd like to get a better sense on how the community feels on certain issues, like the oil trains."

Absentee ballots also will need to be counted to determine the winner of the seat for Legislative District 35. Incumbent Charles Dawson lost to newcomer Sean Raleigh by just four votes. Raleigh won 300 to 296, but 45 absentee ballots were issued, with 29 received so far.

"Should I lose, I want everyone to know I've been honored to serve the town these past 16 years," said Dawson. "I hold my head high to have had the integrity to never take the easy way out on easy votes. Also, should my competitor prevail, I will suspend my campaign on the other lines I hold. However, I would ask voters to vote down the county charter reform on the ballot in November. I maintain it's a sham, and it would deprive voters the ability to determine the size of legislature themselves. It's not independent, and I would send it back to the drawing board."

Raleigh could not be reached for comment.

Bethlehem Democratic Chairman Jeffrey Kuhn said he felt everyone ran energetic campaigns, and he was not surprised with the results. He also said any Democratic candidates who win their primaries will have the backing of the party.

"They will have the full support of myself, and I believe the vast majority of the party, to help ensure a Democratic victory in the general election," he said.

# **Connolly loses primary to Miller**

GUILDERLAND — In District 32, Democrat Mary Lou Connolly will have to fight for her seventh term in office after losing the Democratic nomination to her opponent Paul Miller.

Connolly is a 23-year veteran of Albany County Legislature endorsed by County Executive Dan McCoy. The loss comes after a recent scandal wherein her personal finance report was filed over a month late, after two past campaigns in 2008 and 2012 had yielded negative balances. She filed her most recent report over 20 days late, only after Miller publicly pointed out her lateness.

Miller won the Democratic nominee with 56 percent of the votes to Connolly's 41 percent. Miller is a committee member of legislature majority leader Frank Commisso in Albany's 15th Ward.

He contributes his win to the fact that he has been "working really hard, knocking on people's doors since June." Connolly, he said, "took a more electronic approach much later in the game, and it showed." "I'm confident about having the Democratic Party's backing. I have a good start. I feel like I'm going to serve the people and continue to reach out to community members," he said.

Connelly, on the other hand, sees the loss as the combined result of low voter turnout and Legislative Majority Leader Frank Commisso's campaign against her.

"It's primarily the good old boys club and they went against me," said Connelly. "It's horrible. When you don't agree with majority leader on one or two issues, they kick you out," she said. Her past support of the plan to privatize the Albany County Nursing home, in particular, had come under fire during the campaign. Mary Lou Connelly still has the support of the Independence and Conservative lines and will continue to campaign for the November elections. "I'm continuing my battle, not for me, but people of Guilderland who deserve someone with the experience."

## **Ravena man arrested for burgalries**

**Grant's final days** 

I n June 1885, a gravely ill Ulysses S. Grant arrived at a cottage atop Mt. McGregor in Wilton to spend his final weeks in a race to finish his memoirs before he lost his battle with throat cancer. The decorated Civil War general and 18th president of the United States died the following month, but his memoirs were at last complete.

Grant's twilight years leading up to and including those final weeks will be the topic of an upcoming talk at Bethlehem Public Library by Tom Smith, a speaker with the Ulysses S. Grant Cottage State Historical Site.

On Friday, Sept. 18, at 1 p.m., Smith's 50-minute presentation titled "Ulysses S. Grant: His Life, His Work, His Death" will cover Grant's life beginning in 1822 and focusing on his later years. It touches on themes such as his bankruptcy, the writing of his memoirs, his disease, and finally his death and funeral services at Grant Cottage. Accompanying his talk will be items from his personal collection, such as portraits and photos.

## Sorting through the scatter

Side effect of area school program: it helps one student cope with ADHD

ore than one in ten children have ADHD, according to the Center of Disease Control (CDC).

ADHD is the acronym for Attention-deficit/ hyperactivity disorder. The Mayo Clinic defines the disorder as a chronic condition diagnosed in school children who exhibit hyperactivity, a trait alluded by its name, and impulsive behavior. Often times, those afflicted by the condition have difficulty maintaining their attention on a single task, leading to problems with school lessons.

Last December, the CDC reported its findings after a study of data from the National Survey of Children's Health. The study reported 6.4 million children had been reported by parents received a diagnosis from a health care provider. The data suggests an increasing trend. In 2003, 7.8 percent of all children were reported with ADHD. In 2007, the figure jumped to 9.5 percent.

"I struggle with ADHD," said Olivia McLeron, an 8th grade student at Brown School in Schenectady. Though she's not quite a high school student, next year she will be among the one in 11 high school girls afflicted with the condition. "When I came to the Brown School, I needed help. I "There I was sitting at the round table as she conducted her interview and I felt like I was having an out-of-body experience."

was just diagnosed with ADHD. I was just scatterbrained."

The Mayo Clinic states that symptoms may subside over time, while others are faced to deal ADHD their whole lives. For these individuals, there are strategies they can learn to be successful.

Brown School facilitates a unique educational



program coined IGNITE, an acronym which stands for Individualized Goals Nurtured in a Team Environment. The program, which is offered to all Brown School students, focuses on helping each child reach their goals in areas that include academics and extracurricular activities.

IGNITE is not a franchise, it is a program unique to Brown School and developed by one of its own educators, Nina Benway. Benway, who is the director of the program, adopts aspects of different learning practices and applies it to the students at Brown. The focus of the program highlights the metacognitive awareness of each student. Metacognative awareness is defined as an individual's self knowledge of how he or she thinks. Benway said people commonly develop this form of self-awareness in their mid- to late-20s. "Here, we're going to give

you a little boost."

"The value of IGNITE is in inclusively offering every student access to appropriate educational opportunities, such as best practices in gifted education, in a way that mindfully considers a student's strengths and areas for further development," said Benway. "IGNITE is particularly well suited for students simultaneously

Grilled Shrimp with Honey and Ginger

ho says you have to stop using the grill once Labor Day is over with? Here is a recipe that begs for the backyard grill, but you can just as easily use the skillet on the stove top in your kitchen. It's fast. It's easy. And, still gives you that taste of summer fun.

#### **Ingredients:**

1 tsp. chopped fresh garlic 1/2 tsp. fresh grated or chopped ginger 4 Tbs. honey

2 Tbs. soy sauce (I use Tamari which is soy sauce without all the additives)

#### Instructions:

Combine all your ingredients for the sauce and divide it in half. Marinate one-pound of large shrimp in one half of the sauce for at least 15 minutes, but no more than 30 minutes. Afterwards, you will discard the sauce.

Grill the shrimp on skewers, if you are using an outdoor grill, placing three to four on each skewer. If you are using a skillet, pan sear in two batches until browned, about one to two minutes on each side. Once off the heat, rub the shrimp through the brown bits that will be in the r



brown bits that will be in the pan. Plate, and drizzle with remaining sauce you set aside initially.

Serve with your favorite side dishes, or rice.

scene for 25 years, and through the course of time they recognize particular venues they enjoy playing. Irish 2000 Fest is one of them. So, when the show's promoter approached him more than a year ago, he accepted the invitation. No sooner did Roberts hang up the phone did his agent ask, "Do you know what you just did?" pointing to a hole in the band's tour schedule.

That hole was Sept. 19, and he had just filled it.

"Irish 2000 has been a favorite of ours," said Roberts, who shared the band still encounters venues that don't appreciate the amplification equipment

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the band uses to support its rock sound. "[Irish 2000 Fest] really supports rock music."

The Saratoga County Fairgrounds hosts the 19th Annual Irish 2000 Music and Arts Festival, Friday Sept. 18 through Saturday, Sept. 19.

"We're hoping for blue skies, good weather and a good crowd to go with the good times of the festival," said festival executive director Matthew Nelligan.

The festival promises non-stop music with more than 20 performances scheduled over three different stages. There will also be Irish dance, a children's area, crafts, food

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and beverages.

"It's one of my favorite days of the year because all things Irish are celebrated," said Rick Bedrosian from Hair of the Dog. "Almost more than St. Patrick's

Day, because that's become more about drinking for some people. Here, I'll get to see people I rarely get to see. People either come to see Hair of the Dog 50 times a year, or five times a year, [but] they will be at this one."

To add to the excitement, Bedrosian said Hair of the Dog will be recording the show for an upcoming video.

Both nights feature music playing until 11 p.m. On Friday, the festival stage hosts music from Flashpoint, followed by The Fighting Jamesons, the Screaming Orphans and closing with the Glengarry Bhoys.

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Who's Your Paddy and The Brothers Flynn.

Traditional Irish folk music can be characterized by the use of a tin flute, drums, or bag pipes. The genre is not limited by these instruments, of course. There is, indeed, the harp, too.

There's something about a traditional band playing "hell for leather" in front of a live audience. Roberts appreciates the traditional music as much as the next paerson. But, the Young Dubliners' front man said he was drawn by a different sound when he was younger.

"First time listening to Big Country with the electric guitar. They were putting their own spin on traditional, though Scottish. But, when I heard those guitar riffs, I was like, holy ...," he said.

Big Country made a splash in the United States back in 1983 with a self-titled track that become popular on MTV. But, the group is known to incorporate more folk story lyric than the pop variety that was popular on American radio waves.

The clashing blend of contemporary rock with traditional Irish music has been popular for more than a decade, with the emergence of bands like Black 47 and Dropkick Murphys on the East Coast and the Young Dubliners out on the West Coast. The genre was thrust into mainstream interests thanks to Hollywood movies and the adoption of Murphy's "Tessie" during the Boston Red Sox championship run in 2004. (Actually, some of the players from the team can be heard lending their vocals on the track. Members of Dropkick Murphys are devoted Red Sox fans and deliberately paid homage to the show tune last popular when the Red Sox beat the Pirates in 1903.)

"The funny thing about what we do. It would work in Ireland. We were putting in our Irish and European influences in [the music]. I knew that what we were doing. If I loved it, [people] would, too. ... When we play in - it goes down as well as would.'

The not-for-profit Irish Music and Arts Festival, Inc. organizes the annual festival. The goal of the organization is, "To preserve, protect and promote Irish history and culture in the 21st century."

In addition to producing the festival, Irish 2000 also supports other non-profit organizations. Since its inception, the festival has donated more than \$350,000 to a variety of charities. Past recipients include the Wounded Warrior Project, the

Double H Ranch and the Irish American Heritage Museum

The idea of an Irish Festival that would appeal to all lovers of Irish music and arts originated during conversations between Nelligan and fellow festival co-founder Jim Shaughnessy in 1996.

Both Nelligan and Shaughnessy had been involved in a number of efforts to increase awareness of the Albany branch of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and to raise funds to create a new Irish Cultural Center in Albany.

Since it started, the Irish 2000 Music and Arts Festival has grown in both attendance and in the number of entertainment attractions. In 2007, the festival launched a highly

successful two day format.

Today, Irish 2000 Music and Arts Festival is one of the top five Irish festivals in the United States. Its mission is "To preserve and protect Irish Culture in the 21st century."

During its inaugural year, Nelligan and Shaughnessy were joined by a small, dedicated committee of Hibernians and set out to plan the event without having a firm idea of how popular it might be. The first Irish 2000 Music and Arts Festival took place on Saturday, Sept. 20, 1997, at Heritage Park in Colonie. demonstrating both areas of strength and areas of need, but the inclusive nature of the program naturally benefits every student."

McLeron, feeling scatter-brained in her new surroundings, was one of those students in need. Though the program was not designed specifically for students with ADHD, the practices were not lost on the young student's plan.

"If you can, find a teacher or a parent to help you set goals," said McLeron. "Even if someone doesn't play a specific part in your goal, they help in the overall picture. They will be there to say, 'I know you don't feel like it right now, but I think you need to study.'

... When I don't get As, I get very disappointed, and sometimes I shut down and stop. But, with support, that person can say, 'you may not have received a good grade on this one, but let me help you get a better grade for next time.' ... Learn from your mistakes." the school year students, families and educators collaborate to document meaningful and obtainable individualized learning goals for each respective student. IGNITE started in part after the school's participation in the MindUP curriculum through The Hawn Foundation. Through that program students learned social and emotional learning skills. Now in its fourth year, IGNITE still places emphasis on the importance of establishing a social network for emotional support as students set goals for themselves. That social network helps with motivation to stay on task,

The program impressed upon McLeron the need to be mindful of her role in her own education, to set goals and establish plans to achieve. "Now, I get straight A's and I find it's easier to get things done."

Despite McLeron's role as a student, Benway said the teenager has developed into an expert on the program, mastering each step and utilizing the program to achieve her academic goals.

McLeron said she aspires to become a writer. She already identifies it as one of her passions. She has interviewed and published pieces in her local newspaper. So, when the opportunity presented itself for her to interview a guest speaker visiting the Brown School, she jumped. "She volunteered on her own; she wasn't asked," said Vitale. What happened next, the principal said, was a lasting experience for the career educator. "There I was sitting at the round table as she conducted her interview and I felt like I was having an out-of-body experience."

# No tax increase for county budget

## McCoy's proposed county budget reflects growth in Capital District

ALBANY COUNTY - County Executive Dan McCoy's 2016 budget will have no tax increase, the county will not borrow money and a projected increase in tax revenues will mean more money for residents.

McCoy released his 2016 Executive Budget on Wednesday, Sept. 2. Proposed is a \$610 million spending plan, which is a \$4 million increase from last year. Taxes will remain well under the tax cap for the third year in a row, out of four budgets proposed during his time in office.

The budget projects a tax revenue growth of 1.1 percent over 2015

four Local

estimates, which would provide an estimated \$104 million to municipalities in the county. Last year the counties received \$3.4 million.

"Other counties are projecting cautiously... but we've been growing here in the Capital District," said McCoy. Last year's tax revenues were much larger than the county expected, and municipalities have benefitted from this.

McCoy credited this proposed sales tax revenue growth in the county budget to growth at the State University of New York Polytechnic Institute in Albany and the county's low unemployment rate, at 4.8 percent. More budget cuts came from the reduced cost of health insurance and staffing changes at the Albany County Nursing Home.

The budget includes the 50 percent subsidy McCoy cut from the nursing home budget by reducing hours and rearranging employee

shifts. The Albany County Nursing Home's deficit is now cut in half. This resulted in an estimated \$5 million saved.

County legislatures and McCoy had clashed over McCoy's proposal to privatize the nursing home when it was in financial straights, but since the plan was nixed, McCoy has since worked toward diminishing the deficit.

Also included in the plan was the \$500,000 in funding planned for the Albany County Land Bank, and the first half of the \$250,000 in funding to the Department of Aging for programs that help seniors afford home repairs. This aids seniors who choose to live in their homes afford to live there.

The county will also not pass down the \$10.5 million it pays for residents to have reduced costs for community college to towns. Since the state law requiring partial sponsorship of community

college courses was created in 1973, McCoy claimed the state has not paid their fair share of those costs. Instead, the needed funding is passed down to the counties to provide.

"If I were to pass down that \$10.5 million (to towns), I probably wouldn't have to raise taxes for the next ten years," said McCoy. "But it would crush their budgets."

During his predecessor's time in office, McCoy said the county budget

had overestimated tax revenues to disastrous results, forcing the county to borrow \$15 million.

'Our reserves were at all time low. We had 15 bargaining units, 20 million state workers that hadn't had a raise in six years and we had a nursing home that was losing a \$1 million a month," said McCoy of the challenges he faced when he first entered the office.

Now, reserves have doubled in the last three years and all state workers received a wage increase this year and "on top of all of this, I didn't raise taxes, and that's the most important thing," said McCoy.

insurance. Because he just began a new career in law enforcement, he does not receive benefits from his work at the police station, as he is a part-time employee.

"Nick is of wonderful character and humility and would never ask for this financial help," said Marty Furch, a friend of Colaneri's and the creator of an online gofundme campaign, which benefits his treatments.

By the time Caidyn heard of the fund, the campaign had reached over \$30,000 in less than two months. It is now less than \$20,000 away from its \$50,000 goal.

Colaneri himself had planned to visit the lemonade stand, but fell ill and was admitted to the hospital earlier that day. On Friday, Sept. 4, the Mahans met Colaneri for the first time and presented him with a large \$4,038.00 check, donated by Delmar Printers. That total sum includes a matched donation of \$2,000 from Caidyn's grandfather, himself a retired police officer.

In exchange for her efforts, Nick Colaneri gave the six-year-old a few small gifts related to with her favorite movie "Frozen." Caidyn wore her new "Frozen" watch, from Colaneri on her first day of first grade on Tuesday, and "hasn't let go" of her Elsa doll and "Frozen" sunglasses, said Kristi Mahan.

"This really hit home with us," said Mahan. "Nick is around the same age as my husband, so our hearts went out to him. It's hard to imagine." At 26, Kristi's husband Bryan Mahan has worked at the Bethlehem Police Department for over two years now.

Caidyn understands somewhat the gravity of the situation. When her uncle was diagnosed and died from cancer, her parents explained to her what the disease was. Even if she doesn't understand completely the effect that cancer can have, she does understand a need for help. "We really believe that kids need to know importance of giving back to others," said Mahan of her and her husband's parenting philosophy. The pair helped with Caidyn's first lemonade stand last year. The \$400 she made then was donated to the non-profit organization Alex's Lemonade Stand, which benefits patients of childhood cancer.

Since she was three years old, Caidyn has been giving back to others with the help of her mother and father. Kristi Mahan said that she and Bryan help guide Caidyn whenever she becomes interested in giving back, with past projects including making blankets for babies in the neonatal intensive care unit and making valentines for patients in the children's care unit.

The online fund for Colaneri, alongside offering him financial support has also been a place for others to offer moral support. Many community members, especially those with ties to the police departments, have made efforts to support him.

Retired NYPD office Tom Kartelias gave his advice on the site. Diagnosed with stage four Hodgkins Lymphoma and kidney cancer five years ago, Kartelias told Colaneri to "keep your chin up, stay positive, listen to the doctors and hopefully you will be in remission in no



time."
