Eagle Scout Award project finds local teen gathering the stories of war veterans

BETHLEHEM — To truly understand the experience of veterans: this is the goal of Nicholas Cathers' Eagle Award Project.

"People don't really know how war was and how war is. We watch the news and have our own commentary, but we don't really ever get to talk to soldiers. People don't know how things actually are on an actual human level, and I think it's something that should be available," said Cathers. Another inspiration behind the project is the fact that Cathers' own recently-passed grandfather was a veteran of the US Army, who fought in the Pacific during World War II.

For his final project as a Boy Scout, Cathers will interview about 50 veterans this month, to be entered into the Library of Congress' archive. The project is sponsored by the Nathanial Blanchard American Legion Post in Delmar and through the Veterans of Foreign War non-profit organization.



Not your property

American Legion seeks meeting with Albany County

BETHLEHEM — Members of the Nathaniel Adams Blanchard American Legion Post in 1040 Delmar are upset after trees were planted on what they claim is the legion's property in Albany County's ongoing project to make upgrades to the rail trail.

The trees and several bushes were planted two weeks ago near the back of the property parallel to the rail trail. The new plantings were placed there to act as a barrier and help shield the trail. However, members claim they were planted on Legion land.

Jeremy Martelle, a former commander of Post 1040 and current board member, said he went one Saturday morning and the trees had been planted without their knowledge.

"We're very upset this was done without us being notified," said Martelle.

The Legion has since begun researching their property lines, and Martelle does not believe the lines match where the trees were planted. The town has since helped members get in touch with the county, and a meeting is scheduled for this week.

Martelle said part of the major concern is there are a lot of kids who cut through the property as a shortcut to get to school. They want to make sure that it can still be used, but they haven't been told what the next plans are or if a fence will be installed.

The rail trail is the entire backside of the property. Members are also concerned if people will now be parking on the property to access the trail, and could there

be liability? Another perceived issue is maintenance of parking lot.

"Where the trees were placed is where we typically push the snow when we plow," said Martelle. "Will we now have to pay for snow removal? If not, the trees could potentially be ruined."

Mary Rozak, director of communications for the office of the Albany County Executive, said the trees were not placed on American Legion property, but on rail trail property. A meeting is scheduled this week with County Attorney Tom Marcel and the county's operations director.

"Having an open dialog from the beginning would have been nice," said Martelle. "They've been very responsive since we contacted them, but all of these issues could have been brought up before the trees were installed."

Solar garden delayed

River Road location no longer an option

— Monolith Solar has withdrawn its use variance application with the town's Zoning Board of Appeals for a new solar field on River Road, following variance recommendations from Albany County.

The solar company, which will soon be building its new headquarters in the Slingerlands Vista Technology Park, had proposed building a new solar field on land purchased at 746 River Road in Glenmont. However before the application could go to the town, the Albany County Board of Appeals said the applicant had not met use variance criteria required from the town. Monolith has since pulled its application.

"Monolith will continue solar development

project activities to foster locally-based, hightech job creation and to support New York State's commitment to renewable energy deployment goals," wrote Monolith's attorney James Villanueva to the Town Board.

The project called for a 200 KW solar panel system to be placed in an area of about one acre of the parcel's 19 acres. It would consist of 673 groundmount solar panels in seven rows. The property is in a rural, riverfront zoning district. Although the property was labeled by the town as use for a "public utility" the company would have been private for those who purchased the panels.

The project was originally proposed on Sept. 2 by Monolith Solar's acting manager, Tim Carr. He said the property was chosen because the price was decent, and the location could be interconnected with National Grid.

Nearly a half-dozen people spoke in opposition

of the project, with the board also receiving two letters. Residents were concerned about noise, tree removal and the effect on property values. Others wanted to know if the solar field would ever be expanded or impact the view from the nearby Mo-He-Con-Nuck trail.

The company now plans to look for another area to install its proposed solar garden.

Last month, the town's Zoning Board of Appeals approved the area variance for Monolith Solar's sign at Vista.

The variance was approved 3-1. Only board member George Harder voted against the proposal, believing it would set a precedent for other businesses to want their signs located on top of their building.

Work on Monolith Solar headquarters was previously set to begin by the end of summer, but was delayed until the sign variance was approved. www.spotlightnews.com October 14, 2015 | **THE SPOTLIGHT** 3

New Scotland discusses water providers

Following complaints, town could buy water from Guilderland

NEW SCOTLAND

— Amidst growing complaints of high water taxes, Town Supervisor Thomas Dolin announced the town is in talks to source water from Guilderland instead of Bethlehem.

Since 1965 the Town of New Scotland has been dependent on Bethlehem for parts of its water supply, and since that time the rate has been set at a maximum of twice the

rate paid by Bethlehem residents. According to Dolin, the rate has been an ear-constant source of resident complaints, and the town has attempted to get out of this contract numerous times. With no other water sources of their own, the conflict has stood at a standstill.

New Scotland has no water source of its own and is currently under water agreements with both the Town of Bethlehem and the Village of Voorheesville. An emergency water agreement is in place between Voorheesville and the Town of Guilderland. The proposed water agreement between New Scotland and Guilderland would use this emergency connection between Guilderland and Voorheesville.

Dolin has met with Guilderland Town Supervisor Kenneth Runion and the Guilderland water supervisor three times to discuss the possible connection. He has also met with leaders from the Town of Bethlehem to discuss changing the rates, and said they "know we're unhappy" yet still refuse to change the rate.

After August's meeting on the water fees in New Salem and Heldervale Water districts became a public forum for resident complaints on water taxes, a recent Town Board meeting ended on the same discussion.

"This is a simple dollars and cents issue. They are not a charity," said Dolin of Bethlehem to meeting attendees.

Of the eight water districts in New Scotland, four districts source water from Bethlehem, and of those four, two are sourced from Albany through Bethlehem, and thus receive City of Albany Rates. Swift and Feura Bush water districts receive these City of Albany rates through Bethlehem, which are also twice the rate of water in Albany. Font Grove and newly created Heldervale water disticts are the remaining two districts sourcing their water from Bethlehem. A little less than 100 residents combined live in these two districts.

The New Salem district alone receives a lower

rate from Bethlehem, as a result of a year's worth of negotiations, resulting in a contract wherein New Scotland took responsibility for several Bethlehem dwellings on environmentally unstable land.

Resident John Hotaling of the Heldervale water district said he and many of his neighbors in the districts sourcing from Bethlehem pay a steep price of \$2,000 combined in water and sewer yearly. The average family uses about 65,000 gallons of water per year. To Hotaling, the rate and the town's inability to change the contract or find a new source has been a large source of frustration. Hotaling has emerged as the leader in the outcry against the steep rate.

"They can explore other options, that's fine." said Bethlehem Town Supervisor John Clarkson. "We don't rely on their purchasing. It's fairly insignificant in the overall budget picture, but we're glad to help out when it works for both parties. It depends on where (they) can connect and other things involved."

While Clarkson didn't seem phased by New Scotland's threat to switch water providers, board members in New Scotland believe legal action could be necessary.

"I think there is a legal rational that one has to justify certain costs," said Councilperson William Hennesey in reference to the rate. Dolin agreed that he would not be opposed to taking legal action. No action will be taken, however, until a meeting with residents is held in early December.

Town installs first little leauge field

Field part of town improvement plan

— The town's first little league field will be open as early this April at the Stephen P. Wallace Town Park, taking the place of one of the town's two softball fields.

By converting the existing softball field at the Stephen P. Wallace Town Park on Swift Road into a regulation baseball-sized field with adjustable bases and pitcher's mound for conversion to little league dimensions, the field will service the growing teen baseball interest in town. A second town softball field remains at the Feura Bush Park on Mathias Place.

Spearheaded by Councilman Bill Hennessey, in coordination with the recently created Voorheesville Baseball Club, the field conversion was approved at the most recent town board meeting Wednesday, Sept. 23. Until the Voorheesville Baseball Club was created three years ago, no league existed in town for children older than ten years old, after they aged out of Kiwanis Youth Baseball little league play.

Costs for the conversion will be less than \$5,000, according to Hennessey. An undetermined portion of the cost will be paid for by the club, with the remaining cost sourced from the 2014 Town Improvement Plan fund through the Parks and Recreation Department. These expenditures will not have implications on the town's general fund, and thus made for a "nice private-public partnership," said Hennessey.

"It really provides for so many opportunities for kids to pursue an interest in playing baseball at higher level and staying together as a team," said General Manager of the Voorheesville Baseball Club, James Conway. Prior to the club's creation, New Scotland players were forced to separate to teams in either Guilderland or Berne-Knox-Westerlo once reaching 11 years old.

Construction began early this week, and will include grass being

planted, the pitching mound removed in favor of an adjustable pitcher's plate, and the addition of adjustable bases.

Currently, the All-American Sports
Recreation Adult Softball
League, run out of Albany,
is the only league utilizing
the softball fields. As two
softball fields and no little
league fields exist in town,
the conversion seemed to
make sense for Hennessey,
amidst the Voorheesville
Baseball Club's growth.

The club began with one team in 2012, grew to three teams in 2014, and will have five teams this upcoming April. Last year all of the club's games were played on the road, with teams paying around \$50 to rent fields for each of the 20 games in their spring and fall seasons. The Swift Road field will now be the home field for the team's games and practices.

"When you go to school with a kid, it's nice to play with that neighbor or buddy," said Conway. "With so many things focused on the individual these day, its good to see kids staying together, developing a team mentality."

Guilderland homicides one year later

Police investigators give update; seeks help from public

GUILDERLAND —

One year after the brutal quadruple homicide of a family in a quiet Albany suburb, police are no closer to finding the culprit or culprits of the crime. Police are again asking for information from the public, and offering protection for those who come forward.

When Jin Chen, 39, his wife Hai Yan Li, 38, and their sons, Anthony 10; and Eddy, 7, were killed in their small home at 1846 Western Ave. last October, the news shocked the Capital District. Rumors that seemed the stuff of fiction, such as possible

connections to illegal Chinese gang and mafia organizations "cannot be dismissed as mere speculation," said Albany County District Attorney David Soares.

New York State Police and Guilderland Police have investigated more than 600 leads with the help of the FBI and New York Police Department; none of which have progressed the investigation, announced officials at a press conference held Tuesday, Oct. 6 at the Guilderland Police Department.

"For a crime of this magnitude, that's kind of a low number," said State Police Captain Scott Coburn.

Investigations have led police outside the Capital District. In New York City's Chinatown, pamphlets in both English and Chinese dialects were distributed asking for

public assistance. Leads have been followed locally, in the New York City area and abroad to China. A number of subpoenas are still out, and some leads are still withstanding.

Chen allegedly served as banker and manger of a network of undocumented, indentured servitude Chinese immigrants, brought to the states in exchange for work. Police investigators said they also found gambling tables -16, in all - in the basement of the home. Family members of the victims told police they were only used for small-stakes games with friends.

Chen worked part time at King's Wok, a Chinese takeout restaurant on Western Avenue. The restaurant was owned by his wife's family and located less than a mile from the family home. Hai Yan Li was a homemaker, while the sons attended

Guilderland Elementary School.

Family members dismissed reports in Chinese-language newspapers that Chen was murdered after a highstakes gambling party and that the killer left and returned to murder the family and steal a large amount of cash. The family had offered a \$5,000 reward for information leading to an arrest, which has not proved effective thus far.

Fear of deportation and involvement in illegal crime groups are both acknowledged as possible obstacles in gaining information from the public. Officials are offering protection to such individuals with case-related information. Jail time could also be reduced for inmates with information.

Gaining phone records from Apple telecommunications has, "set investigations back considerably," said Soares. Soares would not comment on how dealings with the Chinese government have gone so far, but the "bureaucratic red tape" involved with an investigation of this magnitude, involving so many agencies, has "created issues.

"You have to remember that this is not an open government," said Soares. The Chinese culture is inherently distrustful of law enforcement." According to Soares it is an "absolute possibility" that the criminal or criminals involved have fled the country to China.

Police confirmed reports from those close to the family that a knife and object similar to a hammer were used in the killings. These objects have not been recovered. Without any leads in the investigation, DNA

evidence has not been useful, nor has surveillance camera footage from Wolf Road, nor the limited information police received from neighbors. As the suburban home is set on a busy street, with neighbors set a distance away, lack of information from neighbors is not unusual.

Investigators also cannot dismiss possible connections to a similar homicide last February, when an immigrant Chinese family of four were killed at gunpoint in their Houston, TX home. With no known witnesses or suspects in that case either, rumors of a targeted killing continues to fly in Houston's Chinese community.

"I can't imagine looking across at two children and deciding to take their lives," said Soares. For him, the investigation has been "one of the most frustrating," but he is sure, "someone has the answers and someone hasn't come forward yet."

Newly made signs featuring photos of the family are being distributed throughout Guilderland, again asking for public aid in gaining information.

Drug sale charges for BCHS student

A Bethlehem High School student was arrested last week for allegedly possessing a large amount of drugs on school property.

Bethlehem Police Sunderhaft arrested Nathan Sunderhaft, 17 of Gladwish Road in Delmar, Thursday, Oct. 8.

About 25 grams of MDMA otherwise known as "molly," 225 Xanax pills, a bottle of Hydrocodone syrup, \$1,796.00 in US currency and a fraudulent New Jersey driver's license were reportedly found to be in his possession. School administrators and a school resource officer

first reported the incident to police. Sunderhaft

was charged with criminal possession of a controlled substance hallucinogenic substance in the second degree, criminal possession

of a controlled substance in the third degree with intent to sell, criminal possession of a controlled substance in the fifth degree, criminal possession of a forged instrument in the second degree, felonies, and criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree, a misdemeanor.

Sunderhaft was

arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court and remanded to Albany County Jail with no bail. He made bail at a later hearing on Friday.

"This is a very serious matter," said Interim Superintendent Jody Monroe. "Right now it is in the hands of the police department. The school district will cooperate with the Bethlehem Police Department as it moves forward with its investigation."

Sunderhaft is currently suspended, according to Monroe, as "All student matters, including the one in question, are handled according to the district's Code of Conduct."

"Bethlehem has zero

tolerance for illegal substances on school grounds. That said, this incident presents an opportunity for the community to have a frank and open discussion about the dangers of drug use and how we can work together to empower our students to make good decisions," said Monroe.

"In the coming days and weeks, the district will be engaged with students and parents K-12 in conversations on how to keep our school environment one that is conducive to learning, personal growth and wellness.

Brooklyn man nabbed for identity theft

Bethlehem Police said a Brooklyn man was arrested after they received a report of a person attempting to withdraw a large sum of money from Citizen's Bank in Slingerlands on Wednesday, Oct. 7,

Shaun G. Williams, 34, of Brooklyn was charged with two counts of identity theft in the first degree, forgery in the second degree, attempted grand larceny, all felonies, and unlawful possession of personal identification in the third degree, a misdemeanor.

Employees of the bank reportedly identified William as the person attempting to make the withdrawal after police located him.

Williams allegedly used a fraudulent Ohio State driver's license to assume the identity of another, and was reportedly found to be in possession of a withdrawal slip in the amount of \$10,000 in the name of a different person.

Williams was released from prison and was on parole for similar charges. His parole has since been revoked. Williams was arraigned at Albany County Jail with no bail and is scheduled to return to court Wednesday, Sept. 13.

Officer pleads guilty to sexual offense of minor

Joshua Spratt, 26, of New Scotland Road in Slingerlands, a Watervliet Police Officer, plead guilty to one count of criminal sexual act in the third degree, a felony, Thursday, Oct. 8, announced District Attorney David Soares.

Between the approximated dates of Feb. 14 and April 10, 2015, Spratt engaged in four separate sexual acts with a 16 year old female at locations in the City of Watervliet and the Village of Menands. The acts are official misconducts for a police officer.

Spratt, a married father of three and former Watervliet school officer, faces six months in Albany County Jail, to be followed by 10 years of felony probation. He will be required to register as a sex offender, and abide by a no contact order of protection when he is sentenced Jan. 7, 2016.

An ode to Mom

First studio album for local favorite is a special tribute

Music is cathartic.

Whether you sling a guitar strap over your shoulder and strum a few chords, or lie on your bed and listen to someone else, the melodies and choruses strings you along on a journey.

It takes you away.

No one appreciates that more than Tom Lindsay, who can recall sitting down to read the liner notes inside his records to learn more about the songs and the people who wrote them. Aside from the fantasy worlds the songs would lead him to, the precious information behind the song would lead him to other artists, especially when the

This natural curiosity and appreciation for music is shared with his friend Michael Eck, who, together, represent the complimentary halves of the duo Lost Radio Rounders.

Through the course of nine years, Lost Radio Rounders has developed a local following for fans of classic folk music. "We don't play anything that's less than 50 years old," said Lindsay. With that said, being a nose beyond 50 years old themselves, it means they spend time playing someone else's music.

The duo has spent nearly a decade playing exclusively to live crowds. Critically acclaimed for keeping a dynamic atmosphere on stage and maintaining a humorous report, all while demonstrating a sharp sense of musicianship.

The duo has a number of discs cataloging these performances, but, until recently, never a studio album.

About two years ago, Lindsay and Eck found themselves inside a recording studio. Hardly serendipitous, it was the only way the two could find time to play music together. Life was getting in the way. In particular, doctors diagnosed Lindsay's mother, Helene, with a terminal illness.

Lindsay needed something to take him


"The fact that my mom went slowly was difficult for my mom and difficult for all of us to watch," said Lindsay. "But, it allowed us to have those conversations and make things as right as they can be."

Eck was no stranger to a recording studio, which Lindsay admitted, made him anxious. His mind on his mother and his family had put his mind in a different place, and he was afraid the two friends were "going to butt heads." The nervousness went away when Eck suggested Lindsay take charge. "I was the one emotionally invested in it."

The end product is "Hard Trials," a collection of songs that help reveal "What's going on in the mind of someone who is dealing with a family member who is terminally ill," said Lindsay. "The topic may seem serious, but every song and every performance is built on joy. There is an arc here, and Hard Trials is, ultimately, an uplifting album dedicated to an incredible woman with a welcoming and generous heart."

The release will be celebrated with a free concert, Friday, Oct. 16, at 7 p.m. at Hamilton Union Presbyterian Church in Guilderland. For more lostradiorounders.com.

"We are a live act," said Eck, "but sitting down in the studio to make this disc not only brought us back to our own roots, but made us stronger as players and performers. We're very proud of this record."

¬ all is here, and it's time to dembrace the cool weather with some cozy meals. First on the agenda is a good ol' fashioned favorite, roast beef. The following recipe provides enough to serve six adults.

Ingredients: (Serves six)

One - 3 1/2 lb. beef tenderloin at room temperature, it cooks more evenly

Sea Salt Coarse ground black pepper Cloves of garlic Olive Oil

Instructions:

Start by preheating the oven at 375 degrees. While bringing the roast to room temperature, remove the wrap and season it with sea salt, then re-wrap the roast. When ready to put the roast in the oven, pat it dry. Take the tip of a knife and proceed to make small incisions around the roast. Follow this up by placing a piece of garlic in each incision. Rub the roast with olive oil and sprinkle it with salt and pepper. Once you're finished preparing the roast, place it on a rack in a roasting pan and place the pan on the middle rack in the oven.



Cook the roast at 375 degrees for half an hour, then lower the oven temperature to 225 degrees for one-and-a-half to two-and-a-half hours. It's best to use a meat thermometer. The recommended internal temperature should be 135 degrees. At this point, the juices should start dripping and the roast should be brown outside. Once finished, take the roast out of the oven and place make a foil tent to place over it for 15 to 30 minutes. Make sure you let the roast cool down, so you don't lose the juiciness of the roast once you slice into it.

Gravy

Instructions:

Add any of your left over red wine to the drippings and deglaze the pan. Add some flour and some beef stock and whisk quickly over a flame while it thickens to avoid lumping. Add salt and pepper to taste.

Suggested sides for this mean would include your favorite potatoes and vegetables. If you are serving mashed potatoes, try adding sour cream or cream cheese as well as some butter, milk or cream.

and people dressing up to pretend to be something they are not. Ghosts. Witches. Princesses.

Safe

The month of October is also set aside for Domestic Violence Awareness – a topic all too familiar with the National Football League, too. According to a database maintained by USA Today, there have been 97 domestic violence related arrests of professional football players since 2000.

Lightning stuck upon the subject in the months that followed a February 2014 incident involving Ray Rice and his thenfiancé Janay Palmer at an Atlantic City casino. First reports showed security camera footage of the two walking together into an elevator, followed by another shot with Rice dragging his unconscious fiancé out. A grand jury indicted Rice on a charge of third-degree aggravated assault, and the NFL would initially suspend him for two games.

Karen Ziegler, Director

of the Albany County Crime Victims and Sexual Violence Center, calls the subject of domestic violence a "closed-door" crime, as one doesn't often see it out in the open. According to Albany County statistics, 1909 domestic incidents were reported in 2014. That's an emphasis on the word reported.

"We could probably more than double that number," said Ziegler, who said many more cases go unreported. "In many cases, a family has a history of domestic violence. If the mother put up with it, the daughter is expected to put up with it, too."

Critics of the football league's two-game suspension thought the punishment was too lenient. That criticism only grew louder after security footage from the casino leaked to the press, revealing what happened behind the elevator's closed doors: Rice, a 206-pound professional athlete, landing a left hook on an unsuspecting woman,

her head bouncing off the elevator car's hand railing before she hit the floor.

"It absolutely walks across all walks of life and socio-economic classes," said Ziegler. "No one wants to think of the judge, the fire chief, the CEO, because they are all nice guys."

The public outcry that followed would prompt Rice's employer, the Baltimore Ravens, of which he was a running back, to cut him. He has yet to play since. Rice and Palmer married six weeks after the February 2014 incident.

Palmer's decision to stay with Rice sparked criticism of its own, many of whom could not understand why she'd choose to stay with an abusive partner. Though Ziegler was not commenting about the Rice incident in particular, she said people have to be careful about making such judgements.

"The women love their men," she said. "They want the violence to stop. They may have children together. But, they want the violence to stop." She said victims of domestic violence know the situation best and are sometimes attempting to

ward off a more violent exchange from occurring.

In other cases, it could also be a matter of faith.

Mother Anne Curtin of Healing a Woman's Soul (HAWS) in Albany, works with Albany County's abuse shelters to "provide a spiritual presence."

"We do a lot for women, but we don't do enough because we don't have the resources," she said.

HAWS encourages people to start the conversation about domestic violence. Those familiar with the program wear buttons that read "Who is YOUR 1 in 4?" The one in four figure is an estimated statistic that figures one in every four women are victims of domestic abuse. The abuse can range from financial, to psychological, as well as to physical and violent.

Curtin often sees women conflicted with a faith that obligates them to stay committed to marriage. Curtin, an Episcopal priest in the Albany Dioceses, reminds them, "Jesus walked away from an abusive situation. They wanted to push Him off a cliff and He walked away from it."

HAWS started as a program six years ago to help those within the parish, but it has since grown to address the needs of the Capital District, and one that has been recognized by the American Institute for Public Service.

"This is supposed to be my retirement," said Curtin. When offered a word of condolence, she responds: "Oh, no. Watching God's work is a wonderful thing."

The Albany County Crime Victims and Sexual Violence Center operates a 24-hour assault hotline for crisis counseling and advocacy at local hospitals and police stations for victims of sexual assault. Free, confidential therapy for victims is available Monday through Friday by appointment. Friends and family members of crime victims can also schedule therapy.

In addition to self-referral, clients are referred through court advocates, Albany County courts, the District Attorney, County departments, medical and mental health providers, social workers, child abuse workers, schools, colleges and universities,

law enforcement and the multiple community agencies that partner with and support the Center. The Center maintains an extensive network of referral resources for its clients. This network can help crime victims locate immediate and long-term services such as counseling, crisis intervention, social services agencies, shelter and housing, medical assistance, legal services, domestic violence specialists, food pantries, substance abuse treatment and more.

Healing a Woman's Soul hosts its 7th annual Journey of Hope fund raising event on Saturday, Oct. 17, from 6 to 8:30 p.m., at the St. Paul's Episcopal Church at 21 Hackett Boulevard in Albany. A silent auction will be on hand, as well as a hot and cold buffet and beverages. For more information, call 439-8574.



A gateway to violence

he picture of today's drug problem with high school kids is shifting. Perhaps many of us still carried with us the image of Jeff Spicoli emerging from a cloud of marijuana smoke as he fell out of his van in the 1980s film "Fast Times at Ridgemont High." It made us laugh. Maybe some could relate.

Smoking a little "smoke" is a culture even popular in the traditionally conservative country music industry, nowadays. States across the Union are legalizing the use of marijuana. So, where's the harm, right?

Last week police arrested a teenager at a local high school in an affluent suburb of Albany County. This wasn't your father's drug bust — a fraudulent driver's license, 225 Xanax pills, a bottle of Hydrocodone syrup, 25 grams of MDMA (or Molly) and nearly \$2,000 worth of US currency.

At 17 years old, the young man is contemplating a future much different than that of his peers at school. In a time when his peers are planning college visits and plotting out a future beyond

high school, he's forced to have a candid conversation with his family and his lawyer about an uncertain, immediate future.

The problem with our perception to drugs in high school is that it's not marijuana kids are smoking today. Look at the laundry list above. Mind altering drugs as easy to obtain as raiding your own medicine cabinet. And, if that's not scary enough, there is the ever-present issue with heroin use. Heroin addiction is so prevalent in our area, Albany County Jail has launched a treatment unit to address inmates who have the problem. In neighboring Vermont, addiction is at such an epidemic height, users looking to rehabilitate sit on waiting lists to detox.

Not New York City.

Not Chicago.

Vermont.

Though a weapon was not found, the amount of money allegedly found is alarming. It speaks of an operation that could easily lead to a dangerous situation. And, as much as we feel sheltered in our bedroom communities with garden clubs and nationally ranked high schools, the potential drug element that revealed itself last week will ultimately lead to unthinkable violence.

Parents of elementary and middle school students need to have these conversations now: Be aware of the company you keep, and stay away from drugs. Thinking your child isn't going to be approached to use drugs plays into an environment that makes him or her easy prey. School is stressful and the allure of finding an escape can be strong. It's your job to help him or her find that escape through family time, and not in the back of a van.

Or, in a cell.

The problem with our perception to drugs in high school is that it's not marijuana kids are smoking today. Look at the *laundry list above. Mind altering drugs* as easy to obtain as raiding your own medicine cabinet. And, if that's not scary enough, there is the ever-present issue with heroin use. Heroin addiction is so prevalent in our area, Albany County Jail has launched a treatment unit to address inmates who have the problem. Harrington: Proud of police service

Editor, *The Spotlight*; I was disappointed to see that in last week's *Spotlight* Jeff Kuhn attempted to distract the voters from the important issues by resorting to petty personal attacks and bullying. I would not typically dignify such statements with a response, however, I felt it important to set the record straight on a few of Mr. Kuhn's assertions.

As an attorney, I would have expected Mr. Kuhn to have done his research and checked his facts, because this assertion is again simply not accurate. platforms. None of those platforms mention a K9 unit for Bethlehem.

Although I still feel strongly that the Town should have a K9 unit to protect our community and assist in locating children and vulnerable adults who wander off during cold winter months when minutes can literally mean the difference between life and death, this is not the only issue that is important to me. However, rather than engage in constructive

discussion of my many other platforms and ideas, Mr. Kuhn chooses to attack me on this narrow issue of public safety.

Mr. Kuhn along with Supervisor Clarkson and his fellow Town Board members must truly be desperate if this is how they hope to save the election after their administration has been plagued by repeated instances of mismanagement

Capturing the story

As many veterans find it difficult to open up about their experiences, and only find the courage to do so after years of silence, the interviews Cathers holds have an open-ended format, allowing veterans to tell their war stories in their time, in their own voice.

Questions include when and where the veteran served, what they did, what kind of the people they met, what kind of operations they were apart of and how they ended up getting home.

The interviews Cathers holds will be available at the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C., at the Nathanial Blanchard American Legion Post and at the Bethlehem Public Library.

Interviews are held in private rooms at the Nathanial Blanchard American Legion Post in front of an American flag background. Cathers' troop-mates help him record the interviews, while another writes down their responses for the Library of Congress' archive. Boy Scouts of all ages have been helping, as well as other Eagle Scouts, who each have their own Eagle Award Project to work on.

Through either personal connections or through the Nathanial Blanchard American Legion Post in Delmar, Cathers plans to get in contact with veterans in the coming month to hold videorecorded interviews with these veterans.

One such interview has already been held with Wayne P. Jackson, the Sergeant at Arms for the New York State Assembly. Jackson is a close friend of the Cathers family, and was thus an easy first choice for the Boy Scout.

Jackson is a US Army veteran, who fought during the War in Vietnam. After being injured in combat by a land mine, Jackson returned home to an entirely different culture than the one he left. "He had some unfortunate stories about how

veterans were perceived after coming back from Vietnam," said Cathers. "They were called baby killers, all sort of really awful things. What the American public did to those veterans is really awful."

Though Jackson's family was supportive of him upon his return, the majority of Americans at that time were not. As such, he had a difficult time reintegrating into life outside of the army. On top of the pain he was still feeling from his

war injuries, according to Cathers, Jackson was under a lot of torment from a society that did not support him.

Cather's interview with Jackson is the first of many he hopes to have this month. Cathers is still looking for interviewees. Interested veterans should contact him through the American Legion Post.
