Up in the air

All but a few races settled by last week, but question still remains on next Bethlehem Town Supervisor

BETHLEHEM — Although the Democrats swept the town elections, the winner in the race for supervisor is not yet in as the results were too close to call.

Currently, incumbent Democratic Supervisor John Clarkson is beating challenger Jim Foster by just 41 votes. Absentee ballots are set to be opened this Tuesday. According to the Board of Elections last week, 360 absentee ballots had been returned with 163 from Democrats and 88 from Republicans. More could have been received since that time.

"Obviously it's a closer race than one would want, but I'd rather be in the lead than not at this point," said Clarkson. "There's a process to go through. In the meantime, there's lots of work going on at the Town Hall. There's a budget to pass and many year-end projects going on within the departments.

Foster said he knew going in the race would be tight, and would most likely be waiting for the absentee count.

"The Odds are not in our favor right now, but we're optimistic we will overcome," said Foster. "Win or lose, we felt good about the campaigns. Important issues we brought to the fore and I liked talking about issues. I just hope whoever wins, those issues are addressed. We ran a campaign we can be proud of, regardless of the outcome."

Foster, 32, was raised in Bethlehem, but left for a time to attend college and gain experience in Washington, D.C.

County Democrats maintain majority

Democratic Reform Coalition vows changes, leadership upset.

ALBANY COUNTY

- Although Democrats will continue with the majority in the County Legislature, its leadership could face challenges from within the party.

Some new faces were elected last week, but the Democrats held strong and will remain with a 29-10 majority in the legislature. However, a number of those elected are a part of what is being called the Democratic Reform Coalition, which could be a problem for Majority Leader Frank Commisso going forward.

The coalition was formed in mid-October, and included incumbent County Legislators Christopher T. Higgins, Bryan Clenahan, Raymond Joyce, Noelle Kinsch, Charlie Dawson, and Gary Domalewicz, along with a number of candidates. Their platform includes term limits for leadership, an independent redistricting committee, ethics reform, broadcast and live streaming of county meetings and codifying legislature rules and regulations.

All five reform incumbents won their elections. And, of the six new candidates who pledged their support to the reform movement, Sam Fein, Lynne Lekakis and Andrew Joyce of Albany, and Bill Reinhardt and Joanne Cunningham of Bethlehem all won.

Those in the coalition also opposed the changes proposed to the Albany County Charter, which were on the ballot last week as a public referendum. The proposition included a provision to change the way districts are drawn. It also included a controversial provision that would allow legislators to choose the size of the legislature every 10 years sans voter approval. The measure was voted down by more than 59 percent of the vote.

"I couldn't be happier because my whole campaign was to beat the charter," said Dawson. "I just hope now that that's happened we can fix it, and do it the right way with an independent commission."

Commisso said he was unsure what the vote meant. Although members of the party still appear to want change, maybe the people have spoken and Albany County residents want the charter to stay the

"The question I do have is does that mean they are satisfied the way it is? I think that's a valid

question," said Commisso. "Maybe happy with the way it was. I understand there was a few items that had to be changed and we've already addressed those issues.

Although some incumbents signed-on to the reform movement, Commisso took umbrage to the new candidates who took apart, but never served in the public body and "painted the measures with a broad brush."

"With new membership coming in, we need to address these problems once they are seated," said Commisso. "Come and sit down, and see what took place with the review before they start to say what they allegedly stand

However, those in the reform commission may not have the numbers to move forward with their efforts to remove the leadership as few Republicans won to join their ranks.

Most newly elected Republicans won in Colonie, where incumbent County Legislator Tim Nichols, D- District 19, likely lost to Republican Todd Drake in a close race. Nichols has served on Albany County Legislature since 2004. The race was decided by 75 votes, with absentee ballots not yet in. In the Village of Colonie's Legislative District 23, Republican Paul Bergdorf won over Democratic opponent Benjamin Snyden. The Republican will replace Democratic incumbent Richard Jacobson in the seat. Jacobson is currently

After losing the Democratic primaries to Paul Miller, Connelly again lost to Miller in Tuesday's election for legislator of District 32 in Guilderland. Connelly ran under the Independence and Conservative lines, and lost with 479 votes,

or 34 percent to Miller's 920 votes, or 65 percent. Connelly served as legislator for over 30 years.

Miller, who also held the Working Party line, has worked under Albany County legislators for decades now, most notably under Legislative Majority Leader Frank Commisso. Republicans sent forth no candidate for the seat.

His campaign capitalized on mistakes in Connelly's campaign finances wherein two past campaigns yielded negative balances. Connelly ran on her experience and the fact that she is in the "boy's club" of the legislature.

With Democrat Lee Carman leaving the legislature for his bid at town board, Republican Mark Grimm will replace him in Guilderland's District 29, where Grimm received 65 percent of the votes to Democrat challenger David Cardona's 34 percent.

Absentee ballots are set to be counted Tuesday, Nov.

McCoy and Apple get second term

McCoy wins with large lead

ALBANY COUNTY

— County Executive Dan McCoy and County Sheriff Craig Apple will both see a second term.

The Democratic sheriff was re-elected in

an unopposed race while the county Democratic executive won with an overwhelming majority over two challengers. As well, Democratic County Comptroller Michael Conners easily won a sixth term against Republican Cornelius W. Donovan with 75 percent of votes.

Albany County Executive Dan McCoy defeated Republic Francis J. "Call me Joe" Vitollo and Green Party candidate Dan Plaat in a landslide, receiving more than 68 percent of votes.

McCoy, 46, had spent most of his over \$500,000 in campaign finances in a primary against fellow Democrat Dan Egan. Vitollo reportedly spent less than \$4,00 for his campain. A former firefighter, McCoy easily defeated opponent Egan as well, receiving 59 percent of votes.

Incumbent Democrat Timothy Cavanaugh and Republican David Carhart won the county's two coroner seats.



New fast-casual eyes Albany

ALBANY — Potbelly Sandwich Shop has its eyes on opening a franchise in Albany.

The regional fast-casual restaurant chain out of Chicago has established itself in markets that include New York City, Boston, Chicago and Omaha. The focus for the chain's franchise growth is on small- to medium-sized markets, said Rick Fossali, senior director of domestic franchising of Potbelly Sandwich Shop.

"We really want a presence up there," said Fossali. "It's a great market. Albany is a good-sized market for us." He cited the Capital District's strong mix of attractive residential and business communities, where

a potential storefront will serve as a mealtime hangout for food, eclectic décor and live music.

Potbelly currently owns and operates more than 300 shops across the United States and has 20-plus franchise shops domestically, the Middle East and the United Kingdom.

The Capital District has seen several new fast-casual chains open in the area, bolstering the competition for high-quality fast food. Local consumers have been introduced to Chipotle, Moe's, Blaze Pizza, BurgerFi, Burger 21 and Sonic in just a few short years.

Potbelly's business model focuses on adapting to the local neighborhood for décor, and offering live music to entertain customers; two factors



that should help the franchise stand out from the competition. That, and the food.

"One of the coolest things that I found when I joined the company is we hand slice everything, from the meat to the cheese," said Fossali.

The potential Albany location is still in the preliminary stages, said Fossali, adding that interest has also been expressed by other area investors, but he was unable to share how many.

Walgreens buys Rite Aid

ALBANY COUNTY — The largest drugstore chain in the United States is getting bigger.

Walgreens, owner of 8,200 stores in all 50 states, agreed to buy all outstanding shares of Rite Aid Pharmacy at an aggregate value of approximately \$17.2 billion. Each company's respective board of directors agreed upon the transaction. Now, the decision is subject to approval by Rite Aid shareholders.

Rite Aid shareholders have to agree with a transaction that calls for them to receive 48 cents to the dollar on each share owned as of close of business October 26, or \$9 a share.

Rite Aid's website immediately posted a message to customers on its Corporate Info page about the Walgreen's acquisition.

"We're dedicated to providing value to both our customers and our investors," states a graphic posted above Rite Aid's phone numbers for corporate communications department, along with a press release on the news.

There are approximately 20 Rite Aid storefronts throughout the Capital District.



According to the reported agreement, Rite Aid will be a wholly owned subsidiary of Walgreens Boots Alliance, Inc. and, at least initially, continue to conduct business under its current name.

Walgreens expects to finance the transaction through a combination of existing case, assumption of existing Rite Aid debt and issuance of new debt. Walgreens has storefronts in all 50 states, including the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. It reported fiscal sales of more than \$76 billion in 2014.

The transaction is expected to conclude in the second quarter of 2016.

Turkey Breast

ow that it's only a few weeks away, we're going to countdown to Thanksgiving with one of the best recipes for turkey breast.

Ingredients:

1 small onion quartered

l organic lemon (if not using organic - scrub your lemon because you will be using the zest)

12 sage leaves

6 bay leaves

Fresh handful of flat leaf parsley

3 Tbs. of extra-virgin olive oil, and more for oiling

salt and fresh ground pepper to taste

4 Tbs. of butter

1 4-6 lb. bone in, skin on turkey breast

3 Tbs. unbleached flour 1/4 cup apple brandy (optional)

2-3 cups apple cider Salt and pepper (for gravy)

Instructions:

Preheat the oven at 450 degrees. Next, oil a roasting pan and set it aside for later. Add onion, lemon zest, parsley, sage, olive oil and salt into a food processor. Here, you will want to chop and pulse the mix until it forms a coarse paste. Put two of the bay leaves and butter in a pan and heat on low until it is melted before you set aside. Now, to the turkey breast. Put the turkey breast on a work surface. Carefully run your fingers between the skin and the flesh, carefully lifting the skin but not to the point you pull the skin all the way off the meat. Season the turkey breast generously with salt and

pepper and stuff half the herb paste under the skin, and spread it evenly.

Transfer the breast to a roasting pan and slide four bay leaves underneath - the heat will release the bay leaf oils and flavor the turkey in the process. Baste the turkey breast with the bay butter. Now, place the turkey in the oven and decrease the temperature to 400 degrees. After 20 minutes, baste the turkey breast with the remaining bay butter. Return the turkey to the oven and roast for an additional 25

If you are using a meat thermometer, insert it into the thickest part of the turkey breast. When it registers 170 degrees, you can take it out of the oven.

Once you remove the breast from the oven, transfer it to a platter and let it rest for about 10 to 15 minutes

We've going to use the juices collected in the roast pan for our gravy.

Put roast pan with juices over the burner on medium heat. Sprinkle the flour over the pan juices and stir as it cooks for a few minutes. Add brandy (if using it) and stir a couple more minutes to burn off the alcohol and scrape up the bits that are stuck to the bottom. Now, add the apple cider. If you are not adding the brandy, add the apple cider, scrape and simmer for a couple of minutes. Stir the gravy until thickened and season with salt and pepper.

Now, slice the turkey breast and serve with warm apple cider gravy.

Pairing:

Whichever you choose, white or red, it needs to be fruity. I'm going for red

La Crema Sonoma Coast Pinot Noir -Sonoma County, California - Lively pie cherry aromas which mingle with alluring cocoa, all spice, and black tea notes. There are flavors of pomegranate combined with red plum and orange zest. This wine has a lingering finish on the palate.

Is this the end for Bond?

Spectre leaves movie-goers wondering if Daniel Craig is done playing James Bond

s this the last James Bond?

Though it has not been confirmed, there is speculation "Spectre" will be Daniel Craig's last film portraying James Bond. The latest film is Craig's forth as the secret agent, since taking on the role in 2005 with "Casino Royale."The actor has been non-committal in recent interviews. The fact he is not under contract for a fifth movie adds some fuel to concerns. How things wrap up in this latest installment begs for the question to be asked as to whether we will see anyone step in

Let's put speculation aside for a moment and focus on the film alone.

What we have in "Spectre" is what one would expect from a story based upon Ian Fleming's ultimate Alpha male. Exotic landscapes, exotic cars and exotic women. These three factors are, of course, the foundation in which every James Bond action film is built upon. Critics learn to pull out reviews from previous years to repeat their dislikes, but devoted fans rush to the theatres expecting to see where he will be, in what and with whom.

The plot has us following Bond as he fulfills one last assignment from M, who died before the opening of the movie. With instructions to kill his mark and to follow through to the deceased's funeral, the trail leads Bond to Spectre, an underground criminal

network with global ties so extensive it looks like a nefarious United Nations. The man in charge of it all lurks in shadow, but ultimately reveals his knowledge of Bond's presence. See, usually the villain has to ask his henchmen to look into this Bond guy, who asks too many questions, leaving several minutes of the adversaries sizing each other up; trying to anticipate just how dangerous the other is. But, no. Franz Oberhauser (Christopher Waltz) is all over it. Crazy. Like the two know of one another from a distant past. Hmmm. Meanwhile, it appears there is still a lot of fallout to deal with from "Skyfall." The government is looking to "86" the "Double-O" spy program for something more modern – espionage dependent upon surveillance, phone taps and drones.

No one ever said a

Bond screenplay would win an Academy Award, but that's okay.

Craig is Bond. Since first taking on the role, Craig has turned the licensed assassin into something much darker, less of a cartoon caricature depended upon gimmicks and charm. Oh, yes, the toys are there. But, the physicality that Craig takes to his version of Bond has you believing he's as deadly a man as the reputation has you think. Those who played Bond in the past looked good in the suit. Craig looks like he can hold his own in a fight when he's out of one. Those steely blue eyes of a marksman certainly help,

What is worthy of an accolade is the cinematography of Hoyte van Hoytema, coming just off the heels of the critically acclaimed film "Interstellar." Right from the opening sequence in Mexico City, there is a continuous roll that takes viewers through a teeming crowd of festival goers. The initial focus is on the villain, as he walks against the grain of the parade and proceeds into a building. In doing so, he walks past Bond, dressed inconspicuously in top hat and skull mask, among similar costumes for the Day of the Dead. The camera breaks away from the villain, to Bond as he escorts his female companion into a neighboring hotel. Up the stairs, up an elevator, to the bedroom, and then Bond heading out the

window to scope out his target; it's a scene that takes several minutes, but the lack of cutaways immediately rolls the viewer into a virtual first-person perspective of the action. The muted color pallet to each scene screams of 60s vintage. At times, one almost expects to see a young Sean Connery emerge from around the corner. Van Hoytema takes an artist's attention to detail with nearly every scene. After all, the aesthetics of each scene is every bit the star in Bond films as is the man who plays him.

The wonderful thing about franchises for those who partake in them is that they take comfort in knowing what to expect. Bond has tweaked the formula over the years, distancing itself from the cheekiness of double-entendres that made schoolboys giggle, into something that is more adult. If we allow ourselves to compare against the broad selection of films in this catalog, "Skyfall" was a far superior product than "Spectre." Nevertheless, you're going to get what you expect here.

Except, maybe, the answer to my first question.

Another thing worth mentioning to fans of Larry Hama's G.I. Joe storyline is the similarities between the adversarial relationship of Bond and Oberhauser, and two iconic figures from the Joe comics.





a MacBook containing a digital presentation that juxtaposed the wooden and plaster surroundings of an auditorium built when Ulysses S. Grant sat in the Oval Office.

Paul is the principal instructor for The School of Video Game Audio in Toronto and has been in the industry since 1994. He has worked on games you've likely played - award-winning titles such as "NBA Jam 2010,""NHL 11,""Need for Speed: Hot Pursuit 2," "NBA Live '95." He's been responsible for composing, sound design and audio coding on more than twenty major game titles that have sold in aggregate of 6.4 million units.

Paul is at arm's length from \$48,100 a year for an education, was whisked away when Paul revealed video gaming revenues rake in as many billions of dollars as that of Hollywood films — \$91.5 billion in revenue earned in gaming, to \$88.3 billion earned in film. Perhaps the knee jerk reaction towards gaming would be due to parents, who are unfamiliar with today's games, remembering the blips and whistles of old gaming consoles.

"In a somewhat odd way, you can see film as a subset of video games, where the visuals and the sound don't respond to the player," said Paul. "Many films have a lot of CGI in them and the real-time graphics possibilities for games is so high these days that they can be seen as merging on a technical level in terms of graphics. This is also true for audio

as well."

Paul's experience in gaming spans across a pioneering era within the industry. A child of the '80s, he started synthesizing music on his family's Commodore 64. "My love for music definitely came before coding," said Paul. "I remember being very young and enjoying making music for fun with my classmates in preschool. Coding was a great way for me to learn the details of how computers work and has given me a lot of confidence with having job security." Gaming audio hardly evolved beyond the 64 kilobytes of the Commodore by the time he started his career in 1994. At that point, Nintendo Entertainment's Super Nintendo (SNES) and SEGA's Genesis game consoles dominated retail sales. Both consoles still utilized cartridges with limited capacity for programming. The original 8-Bit Nintendo's hardware

from 1983 had less than a half dozen channels available for sound allowing little beyond blips, bass, treble and limited amounts of sampled sounds. Thirty years later, when SONY released its Playstation 4 console, utilizing software housed on Blu-Ray disc, it boasted more than 512 channels broadcast through HDMI 7.1 audio capabilities.

"When you think of game audio - the quaint audio back in the day - it's not so much that they were interested in producing something that was plain," said Paul. "They were really struggling to get something that sounded musical.'

Paul is as much a student of the industry as he is a teacher. He's currently involved with the production of a film documentary titled "Beep Music" (http:// BeepMovie.com) covering the history of the audio programming. He said he had the opportunity

of interviewing Japanese gaming composer Nobuo Uematsu (Final Fantasy series). Uematsu, as with Koji Kondo (Super Mario Bros), is revered as a pioneer composer. His orchestral pieces are no longer appreciated by teens sitting in front of televisions. The same keys he had programmed onto a cartridge have played in grand music halls upon the stings of seasoned orchestras. "For the songs that were really successful, they've withstood the test of time," said Paul.

Demand from gaming aficionados has created a market to address the need to hear the nostalgic sounds of Mario, Zelda and Final Fantasy from their childhood. Soundtracks and sheet music from Kondo's games, and more, can easily be found on Amazon. com and similar Internet storefronts. But, the demand is not limited to games of the past. Modern-day talents like

Trent Reznor of Nine Inch Nails and Paul McCartney of the Beatles, have lent their skills to games in recent years.

"I believe that music is a very powerful way to set the emotional context and overall vibe of a game," said Paul. "I believe music is most effective when it supports and adds to the overall design and experience of a game. Music has the capacity to reach our hearts in a way that is quite unique from other art forms. ... I think that each medium has their strengths but I feel that I'm personally able to express myself more creatively within games. With my school I want to help encourage a more diverse group of people to become involved in making games so that the game will continue to reflect a more diverse set of cultures and viewpoints. Similar to games of the past, I feel that the games of the future will help define what it is to be human."



Guitar hero to bring horror film to life



Lucas offers live soundtrack followed by solo concert to the GE Theatre at Proctors

SCHENECTADY

— Grammy-nominated guitarist Gary Lucas is swimming in accolades, and justly so.

Best known for his work with cult star Jeff Buckley and the legendary Captain Beefheart, Lucas (who has also worked with icons like Lou Reed, Iggy Pop, Nick Cave and Amanda Palmer) brings his original score for Carl Theodor Dreyer's horror classic "Vampyr" to the GE Theatre at Proctors, 7:30 p.m. Nov. 13.

Tickets are \$15 and are available at the Box Office at Proctors, 432 State Street, Schenectady; by phone at 346-6204; and online at proctors.org.

Premiering in 1932, 'Vampyr," which follows Allan Gray, a student of the occult, through the mysteries of a Parisian night, changed the rules of the horror film. Dreyer—a Dane whose 1928 masterpiece "The Passion of Joan of Arc" established an ethereal, poetic vision—applied a gauzy focus to shocking scenes in "Vampyr," creating a shadowy, mesmerizing netherworld. The result,

layered, unsettling and dreamlike, lasts long in the mind, and was listed by *The Guardian* as the ninth most important horror film of all time.

"I wanted to create a waking dream on screen and show that horror is not to be found in the things around us, but in our own subconscious," Dreyer said of his creation, which, while issued with a soundtrack, was initially conceived as a silent film, with title cards for the tale's brief, cryptic dialogue.

At Proctors, Lucas will perform his critically-hailed soundscape for Vampyr and follow the screening with a solo Cinefastique concert, featuring original themes from films by Federico Fellini, Alfred Hitchcock, Jacques Tati and others.



N.S. Democrats keep board majority

Guilderland Town Board race too close to call; Barber wins supervisor

NEW SCOTLAND

— Democrats Pat Snyder and Bill Hennessy have won reelection, as has recently appointed town Councilman Adam Greenberg.

Greenberg, the Democratic farmer and former Zoning Board member who took over for Daniel Mackay, beat Republican Craig Shufelt, a local businessman, in a tight race. Greenberg has served on the board for three months thus far.

Shufelt's father had served on the board for many years. His election would have marked the first time a Republican has served on the town board for many years. Republicans offered no candidates in the last election, and lost in the election prior.

The second Republican running, Christopher Freuh lost to Snyder and Hennessy. Freuh received 22 percent of votes to Snyder's 35 percent and Hennessey's 41 percent.

Hennessy was very grateful to taxpayers

and planned to continue working on the Swift Road Park for baseball programs, and finish up the New Salem water project.

Snyder was happy to see the board's "strong, dedicated team" working together again. "I think by virtue of our very different professional backgrounds we make decisions not in lockstep but n experiences," she said.

Shufelt, however, was dismayed at the results. "I knew this was going to be an uphill battle, running a campaign against a single party," he said. As a businessman, Shufelt said he would have worked to attract greater business interest in town, and create greater political balance on the board.

"I don't think current board is asking what's possible. They're just reacting to things. We need to make plans for the future," he said. Shufelt also said he had difficulty gaining support from the Conservative line, due to a missing a deadline, and he was not interviewed for the Independence line.

The town's new supervisor will be Democrat Douglas LaGrange. LaGrange ran unopposed for the seat vacated by retiring supervisor Thomas Dolin.

The board seat
LaGrange vacates will
likely be filled by a
Democrat, as the board

is comprised solely of Democrats, yet Shufelt said he hoped he would be considered for the spot.

Town Clerk Diane Deschenes (D), Highway Superintendant Kenneth Guyer (D), Town Justices Margaret Adkins (R) and David Wukitsch (D) all won re-election in unopposed races.

Guilderland

Democrat Peter Barber will be the town's next supervisor while town board is still too close to call.

Barber won the race for town supervisor with 52 percent of votes, OR 4,050 votes total to Republican Brian Forte's 47 percent, OR 3,651 votes. A 399-vote separation decided the race.

Barber will succeed retiring supervisor Kenneth Runion after his 16 years in the role. Barber is "thrilled" to fill the roll and plans to go through with the zoning measures he has introduced, which streamline the zoning process to a single board's review.

Barber is a lawyer and served as the town's zoning board chairman for 15 years. There, he helped draft a revision of the town's zoning code that streamlines the approval process and implements more environmental protections. He is husband

of Catherine Barber, a Guilderland School Board member.

Forte received the Republican nomination after serving as a Democrat on the Town Board and interviewing for the Democratic nomination for supervisor. He was a police officer with the Town of Guilderland for over 30 years.

On Town Board, Republican Lee Carman, Albany County Legislator, District 29, and Democrat Rosemary Centi lead in a tight race for two Town Board seats.

Carman and Centi lead with 3,910 and 3,891 votes, respectively. Exactly 186 votes currently fall between Centi and the next closest challenger, Republican Michele Coons. She received 24.77 percent of votes.

Democrat incumbent Allen Maikels is trailing with 24.02 percent of votes. Absentee ballots are still being counted. Results will be known Tuesday, Nov. 10.

Republican Steven Oliver won re-election as superintendent of highways unopposed. Democrat Jean Cataldo won reelection as town clerk unopposed.

■ FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

A symbolic departure

here is a certain amount of symbolism associated with alternative weekly Metroland's demise last week, for it comes at a time when musicians who play original music are struggling to find an audience.

Metroland was the local musicians' best advocate during its 38-year run. From the late 1970s through the first 15 years of this millennium, it regularly featured area singersongwriters and bands on its cover and in its pages. One of the greatest thrills for a local musician was picking up a free copy on a Thursday and seeing his or her face staring back. We won't speak of the "Metroland cover jinx," where bands that were featured soon broke up. That only happened a few times, and we're certain it was all a coincidence.

Those cover stories weren't just an ego boost for the featured musicians. It was also great public relations because the people who routinely

picked up Metroland were the same ones who'd go out to Albany, Saratoga Springs, Schenectady or Troy on a Friday or Saturday night looking for a fresh, new artist to fall in love with — on a music fan level. It was a way for local musicians to cultivate a larger following.

And for a long time, this region had a number of original musicians in a variety of genres to fall in love with. From Fear of Strangers and Blotto to the Kamikaze Hearts and Sirsy, there always seemed to be a new group to capture our attention, and Metroland was the publication that introduced us to them.

But lately, the local music scene seems to have hit a wall. There are fewer music clubs for original artists to perform in than there were in the 1970s and 1980s, and many of the ones currently in existence do not pay their musicians enough to make it worthwhile for them to perform. Interest from the public has also

waned, as their interests have shifted from discovering homegrown talent to finding a place to hang out and maybe listen to someone singing covers — if they still go out at all, given how little disposable income is available to them these days.

Still, Metroland did what it could to promote the local music scene within its pages with artist profiles and local album reviews. Even if it couldn't stem the tide of growing indifference, it could at least continue to give musicians that ego boost of having their stories told in print.

The fate of Albany's alternative weekly newspaper has yet to be determined, but what has been shared leaves us to speculate what steps need to be taken to shine the spotlight on our local music scene. The Capital District has too much musical talent to be left behind in the dark, and we're of the opinion that the torch needs to be picked up.

Last year, the Colonial Acres Homeowners Association received and now maintains - ISC Audubon Certification as a bird and wildlife sanctuary. This was based on overall community practices and the individual efforts of many of the households (birdhouses, feeders, water sources, plant and tree growth, etc.). The Colonial Acres Golf Course is also ISC Audubon Certified for their course management practices, one of the few such recognized courses in

the nation.

The walking trail development was a two-year project that builds off of the ISC Audubon certifications and the focus on nature-based activities. The project involved many volunteers, but two must be called out for their support in driving this effort forward:

- Frank Slingerland project leader: his time, knowledge and leadership are the reason this trail is now in place.
- Glenmont Job Corps: students from the Job Corps helped in the summers of 2014 and 2015 with trail clearing, side trail work and wood chip placement. This gave us the day-to-day resources needed.

The trail is an ongoing project. Final bridge work remains to be completed, and we will require ongoing maintenance support work. Please leave your name and contact information at the pro shop, and we will contact you for working sessions we will have in the months ahead.

There are now signs in place to identify the entry points of the trail, so come and enjoy.


Methodist church Mission Bazaar

Up in the air

He was later an attorney with Milbank, Tweed, Hadley & McCloy, LLP, an international law firm based in New York City. He and his family moved back to the area last year.

The Republican party's main platform in the election was the erosion of services. From the perceived poor handling of negotiations with the town's police force to complaints of snow and leaf removal, the candidates felt a lack of leadership caused those issues to snowball. All those running for town positions with the GOP were newcomers. The hope was younger, freshfaced candidates could help revive the party in town.

The Democrats for the most part ran on their previous record, with Clarkson touting the creation of a capital spending plan, citizen involvement on newly created committees and some consolidation efforts which led to state grant awards.

Clarkson was joined by newcomer David VanLuven, whose platform was focused on managing residential growth, protecting open space, delivering great town services in a fiscally responsible way, keeping government transparent and improving the water infrastructure. Former Director of Senior Services Joyce Becker also joined the ticket following the primary. One of her major goals was updating the town's I.T. Department, although some efforts already began last year.

Except for the supervisor's race, all of the town's Democratic candidates won.

VanLuven said he was pleased with the results, and felt it was a positive for the town overall, given the good direction the town has been moving within the last few years.

"There's a lot of work to go," said VanLuven.
"We need to work with police union to heal the rift, get a contract signed and resolve acrimony that has occurred in political process. It's unfortunate, but this can resolved. We also need to put emphasis on all the great things the

town has done over the past few years that got lost in the process. Maintain and move forward so it continues to thrive."

Becker, who garnered the most votes from residents last week in the race for town board, echoed some of those feelings. However, as she was not chosen initially by the Democratic party to run on the ticket, she said more work needs to be done to bring everyone into the fold.

"It's hard to have a congenial working environment," said Becker. "But we're going to work together to mend those fences. Hopefully we can fix the relationship between the town, community and the police.

Dave Harrington, a former police officer who ran on the Republican ticket, said he feels the community now has to repair itself following the election.

"There's a long road ahead," said Harrington. "This follows a national trend where the police become the enemy in a lot of ways. It's sad in a community like ours. Congrats for everyone that won. They accomplished their goals, let's put it that way."

Republican Bridget Zigorsser also lost her bid for Town Board. "Of course I was disappointed but, I think the other candidates were fine choices as well. I have no plans to run again. This was my one time. It was a great experience. I'm going to stay active in the town and take on volunteer roles. I won't be going away."

In last place was incumbent Joann Dawson, who remained on the ballot on the Conservative line after losing in the primary as a Democrat. Although it is not yet known if she will put her name forward, a Town Board member will need to be appointed to the board next year after Councilman Bill Reinhardt won his bid for county legislature.
