Casting out a medical safety net

Albany Med opens its 11th EmUrgentCare facility in Guilderland

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GUILDERLAND — Albany Med continues to expand its footprint within town, and the Capital District as a whole, with the opening of its 11th EmUrgentCare facility.

The new 5,185 square-foot facility is expected to operate in similar fashion to the hospital's other satellite locations. The building is equipped to treat patients within a half-hour. In addition to helping patients with sprains and fractures, or ear, nose and throat ailments, the facility will provide occupational health evaluation services, too.

The Karner Corners Plaza location officially opened for business on Saturday, Sept. 1. It will be open everyday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. The facility will staff 11 full-time and six per-diem employees.

"Albany Med EmUrgentCare continues to be the preferred choice for Capital Region residents who are in need of care urgently, and don't want or need to spend hours at the emergency room," said Dr. Michael Gruenthal, senior associate dean

for clinical affairs and president of the faculty group practice at Albany Med. "We're proud to offer the right level of care, in the right setting, at the right time."

When opening its EmUrgentCare facility in Glenmont last August, Gruenthal described the network as a "strategically" placed web of care centers. Like the hospital's 10 other urgent care

facilities, the medical staff is trained in several industry requirements to complete physicals. The location also aides in addressing emergency medicine deserts prevalent in rural America.


"We strategically place our emurgent care facilities mostly for patient convenience," said Gruenthal. "We tend to look at areas like this. Not necessarily densely populated, but heavily trafficked areas that are close to residential communities."

The Guilderland facility, just north of where routes 155 and 20 intersect, will be in the heart of Guilderland.

It will be a matter of convenience for patients who would have otherwise visited a congested emergency room in downtown Albany. Such a trip may not be so difficult for residents within Guilderland. Neighboring residents, however, in more rural communities will welcome such a care center closer to home. For example, residents of Coxsackie where Albany Med opened an urgent care, the nearest hospital is 27 miles away.

The Guilderland EmUrgentCare will be Albany Med's second practice in town. Great Oaks Pediatric Group joined Albany Med in 2015.

"We are extremely pleased to once again welcome Albany Med and their expert services to the Town of Guilderland," said Supervisor Peter Barber. "We look forward to continuing our partnership with the medical center and bringing more soughtafter health care services closer to our residents."

BPD explores links between fraudulent check cases

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BETHLEHEM — Bethlehem police are actively investigating a possible connection between three arrests in early August, in which three different men had individually cashed fraudulent checks at the Hannaford Supermarket in Delaware Plaza.

On Friday, Aug. 3, Rijon Jerode Thompson, 20, who had cashed a fraudulent check for \$967.86 back on Jan. 24, and took \$200 from it, was arrested.

James A. Willard, 21, who had cashed a fraudulent check for \$940.85 at Hannaford, also on Jan. 24, and took \$200 from it, was arrested on Tuesday, Aug. 14.

The following day, Aug. 15, Craig Barry Kalfin, 21, who had cashed a fraudulent check of \$848.12 back on April 21, and took \$200 from it, was arrested.

The actions of all three were initially reported to Bethlehem police on Thursday, Aug. 2, by a Hannaford loss prevention officer.

The three suspects have since been released from custody, pending further investigation.

"At this point, we definitely know there is some type of connection

between them just because of the similarities and information we've received," said Cmdr. Adam Hornick. "We're examining the options with other agencies, in the county and around the county, to see if there's a single nexus to the source of all these checks and locations."

He did not divulge the agencies' names though.

Hornick also said that there's a possibility the crimes are part of "something larger" as he recalled there were more similar arrests beyond the outlined three regarding fraudulent checks. In addition, police believe there may be a "mastermind or nexus" behind them all who possibly traveled away from the state.

Cashing fraudulent checks is common in Delmar, "as people can easily go to Target or Walmart or Staples, and buy check paper that has security features and everything," he said. "And unfortunately, it's easy to steal routing numbers and check numbers that are on checks, and people then just recreate the check with that information."

"With that information on the check, if you go to any location and cash the check, it will cash as a certified check and it takes two

to three business days before it's determined, 'Yes, that information on the check is valid.' However, that check was fraudulent."

This hurts companies — whose name is on the check, and routing and account numbers were stolen — and institutions, where the check was cashed. Hornick said that some people may assume a few fraudulent checks would not negatively affect a company as much, but "when you look at like the three checks and their dollar amounts, obviously it would add up to a pretty substantial amount of money."

Furthermore, "it creates more internal issues for" the affected companies which would also have to consider changing their checks, routing numbers and accounts to avoid being wrongfully used for future fraudulent checks. According to Hornick, such sensitive information sometimes can be simply Googled online where company checks may be shown in the results. Checks have been also stolen from people's mail, which relate more to personal identity theft.

"It's that simple to make a fake check that will pass muster at a cashing institution," he said.

Man turns himself into BPD

DELMAR — A 31-year-old Albany man turned himself in at the Bethlehem Police Department on Saturday, Aug. 25 as a result of an arrest warrant that was signed by Judge Andrew Kirby the day prior. He was charged with criminal possession of a weapon felony and menacing.

Joshua Robert Board was processed and arraigned before Judge Kirby before not only being issued a full stay away order of protection but also remanded to Albany County jail in lieu of a \$3,000 cash bond. He is scheduled to reappear in court on Tuesday, Sept. 18 at 4 p.m.

Traffic stop leads to DWI arrest

DELMAR — Bethlehem police stopped a Dodge Ram pick-up truck when its license plate was visibly obstructed by a tinted plate cover. Scott Joseph Moore, age 27, of Ravena, had three other passengers — Michael Snyder, Samuel Domery and Alecia Estrada — with him, who were all intoxicated.

As police spoke to Moore, they noted his glassy bloodshot eyes, slurred speech and breath having a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage. When asked if he'd drank, Moore denied it and was then asked to exit the vehicle to be tested for sobriety, which he failed and even refused a breath test. He later refused a chemical test to check his blood's alcohol or drug content.

After being taken into custody, he was sent to Bethlehem PD. There, he even said, "No," as the police read through his previous DWI charge: it was discovered that Moore had been previously convicted of a DWI in Albany on July 24, 2013, making this latest DWI arrest a felony count. Moore was given a return court date of Sept. 18.

Annual look at municipal salaries

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he Empire Center for Public Policy non-partisan conservative fiscal thinktank recently released its annual "What They Make" report which ranked municipal salaries across the state.

Town of Colonie "general employees" make, on average, the second highest salaries in the Capital District, according to the analysis.

The town's 538 "general employees" average \$45,502, second only to Glenville's 60 employees who average \$46,860. Clifton Park is third with its 145 employees averaging \$44,410. "General employees" are those who are not police or fire fighters.

Other Capital District towns include fifth place Bethlehem and its 281 employees who average \$39,009; eighth place Guilderland where the 246 employees average \$38,004; and New Scotland where the 46 employees average \$33,189, good enough for No. 25 on the list in this area.

In the Capital District — which the Empire Center defines as the counties of Albany, Columbia, Greene, Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady, Warren and Washington for the purpose of this analysis - the 2,459 employees of Albany County averaging \$47,432 a year ranks third



behind the 1,446 employees working in Schenectady County who average \$48,634 and the 1,107 employees in Saratoga County who average \$51,904.

The highest paid employee in Albany County is District Attorney David Soares with a \$184,650 salary slightly less than his counterparts in Rensselaer County, Joel Abelove with a \$184,984 salary, Paul Czajka in Columbia County with a \$185,000 salary, Tony Jordan in Washington County with a \$185,150 salary and Joseph Stanzione in Greene County with a \$185,158 salary.

The DAs rank six through 10, respectively, in the top paid municipal employees in the Capital District.

Schenectady County DA Robert Carney's salary of \$195,720 ranks fourth in the Capital District.

Health Department at Rensselaer County makes the most of any municipal employee in the Capital District with a \$230,020 salary.

But that doesn't place him in the top 50-paid municipal employees in the state and far behind the state's top salary of \$323,562 gotten by Ramapo Police Capt. Thomas Cokeley. He is followed by fellow Rockland County cop, Romapo Police Chief Brad Weidel and his salary of \$317,795.

Relative to the rest of the state, though, the \$38,009 average salary of employees working in one of the 10 cities in Albany County is lower than any other region and about \$10,000 below the statewide average of \$48,302.

The highest, by far, is in the Mid-Hudson Valley area where city employees average \$65,419 followed by the Finger Lakes where employees in cities there make an average of \$52,054.

Locally, Troy employees make the most with an average salary of \$43,427 while Schenectady is second with employees there making \$43,394 and Saratoga Springs third with an average salary of \$42,566.

The Village of Colonie has the most employees, 57, of any designated village in the state. The average salary, though, ranks

Timothy Landis, the head of the Mental ninth at \$32,653. The Village of Altamont has 22 employees who average \$18,627 a year for a rank of 31 while Menands and its 49 employees average \$21,275 and Ravena's 24 employees average \$31,869 for ranks of 26 and 11, respectively.

Police and Fire

Police departments have, by far, the highest wage earners in any municipality.

According to the Empire Center, the statewide average for town police departments is \$95,154. Salaries for Police in Capital District towns are substantially less, averaging about \$70,000 a year.

The Guilderland Police Department's 36 uniformed officers average salary of \$100,518 is the highest around and the only one of the 19 towns in the Capital district with its own force to break the sixfigure mark.

Second are the 40 officers in the Bethlehem PD with an average salary of \$96,658 and the 115 officers with the Colonie department place third with an average of \$92,319.

Police departments in towns on Long Island are, by far, the most expensive with an average salary of more than \$120,000.

Towns in the area have volunteer fire departments and its members do not get salaries.

Stewart's issues new milk card

Chain also introduces new ice cream rewards program

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SARATOGA SPRINGS — Stewart's Shops' Milk Club has gone universal.

Last Monday, Aug. 27, Stewart's Shops announced it was issuing a new club card that would be accepted in all of its 335 stores throughout upstate New York and southern Vermont.

For years, local consumers who have taken advantage of the convenience store chain's discount club, utilizing nothing more than a business card and a stamp.

Once 10 stamps were collected, the customer had the choice of receiving a full gallon of milk for half price, or a half gallon for free.

Perhaps the only inconvenient feature of the milk card was that it could only be used in the shop from which it was issued. That has now changed.

According to Stewart's Shops, the Milk Club program has provided more than 900,000 free half-gallon cartons of milk, juice and tea each year. Loyal customers earn a stamp for their respective card with each purchase of a half gallon carton of Stewart's branded milk, juice or tea. Two stamps are earned for each full gallon.

Stewart's Shops' milk is produced by 30 dairy farms from Saratoga, Rensselaer and Washington counties, and is bottled at the Stewart's dairy in Greenfield. Stewart's trucks deliver that milk to shops within 48 hours of leaving the farm.

The universal cards are in use now. Those who still have their old cards can trade them in and transfer their stamps onto a new card.

Stewart's has also been known for its ice cream, but no discount program similar to the Milk Club was ever developed. Within the same announcement, the store chain announced a new "Scoop Club!"

The new card allows customers to earn stamps with each ice cream purchase single scoop cones, hand-packed pints, milkshakes, hot fudge sundaes. Once ten stamps are collected, the 11th one is free.

Bethlehem to craft new comprehensive plan

Town to ponder its future through the coming decades

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BETHLEHEM — The town's last comprehensive plan, compiled back in 2005, focused on goals, recommendations and visions for how the town should evolve

As that year continues to creep closer, town government members have discussed the creation of an updated plan that would provide direction for how Bethlehem and its hamlets should move forward, possibly as far ahead as 2050.

The executive summary of the 2005 document defines this comprehensive plan as follows: "helps to provide a context for the many decisions that the community will make now and in the future. It helps guide and prioritize the investments that must be made to enhance the Town's future."

Issues likely to be addressed in the upcoming plan include concerns about increased traffic, zoning, the economy, land conservation, continued developments, being more environmentally-forward or business-minded, improvements in the town's aesthetics, and local infrastructure.

The 2005 plan focused on over a dozen

goals, including achieving a balanced tax base, supporting more local businesses, regulating a dependable high-quality water supply, making improvements in local transport and mobility, conserving open spaces with willing landowners, and fostering compact, mixed-use commercial and residential development.

Bethlehem Town Supervisor David VanLuven is particularly concerned with the trajectory of growth in Bethlehem and what it should look like in 50 years.

Hoping that it will not become just another Capital District community with homes sprawled everywhere and not have a unique character, he said he wants to receive honest feedback from local residents about how they think the town should evolve

"I want to have a series of neighborhood forums where people come together and we talk about their vision for places like Slingerlands, North Bethlehem, Old Delmar, Elsmere, Glenmont, Selkirk and more," he said. "Those places come with different challenges and different community character. We need to think together about how we can address that and to keep the near future in mind."

Town Board Member Maureen Cunningham, who believed that Bethlehem "is a very engaged community with a lot of ideas and assumptions," echoed VanLuven's sentiments by also encouraging the use of public forums.

She added that the comprehensive plan is planned as an agenda item for the two upcoming Town Board meetings on Sept. 12 and Sept. 26, "to begin the discussion on the town board level."

However, VanLuven expressed that Town Board meetings are not necessarily the best way to engage the locals.

He believed that having the conversation there with residents could potentially devolve into hours of passionate arguments and screaming, "like in the town of Knox, where their Town Board Meetings are just people yelling at each other, until as late as 11 at night.'

"Usually, the screaming and bickering about the issues at hand are rooted in people jumping into conclusions, before we've actually come to an agreement on what the issue is in the first place," he continued.

Same goes for online forums. "People speak anonymously online

and it gets nasty," he added. "People say horrible things when they're in the privacy of their own homes and aren't being held accountable."

VanLuven did note that actively engaging the locals with public forums would give the town government a chance to also correct any misconceptions and misinformation on the public's part.

Examples he gave included how people may assume the town is actively developing land or that it has the authority to stop a development, both of which are not the

Something residents may not realize is that the 2005 comprehensive plan remains available to them to review on the town's website for free.

"I do feel like a lot of people talk about that comprehensive plan but I wonder how many people actually read it," Cunningham pondered. "It's a good read. From what I know, it took a lot of work for the town to complete and there was a lot of community input. There were many public meetings

Information in the 2005 plan support Cunningham's statement, as there were 12 public workshops, 14 Bethlehem Planning Advisory Committee meetings and two written surveys to highly foster public

Cunningham reflected that despite its age, the 2005 plan already placed Bethlehem ahead of other towns and

She remembered that while undergoing Land Use Training in May with Pace University in a separate line of work, she worked with many municipalities from Orange County and "a lot of them don't even have comprehensive plans or they have plans from the 1990s.'

Cunningham said that while the 2005 comprehensive plan is somewhat outdated now, it should not be tossed out carelessly because its themes of ensuring the town character's growth and attaining residents' perspectives still matter.

The 2005 plan had actually been assessed twice to check if it was working and reaching its outlined goals.

The Comprehensive Plan Oversight Committee was created in April 2007 to help guide the plan's implementation. The Comprehensive Plan Assessment Committee was assigned to once again evaluate its progress, developing a final report in June 2013.

These findings and reports are also available for the public to peruse online.

The 2005 plan did set numerous goals that the town has since either achieved or is actively pursuing. Some proposed programs at the time have also been either successful or have been in development since then — some of their foundations had been laid out in that plan.

Examples include the establishment of the Conservation Easement program, the development of the Open Space program, the introduction of the Waterfront Revitalization plan, and a pair

Five Rivers finally acquires 35-acre plot

Recent grassroots movement helps complete decade-long process

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SLINGERLANDS — A joint effort between Mohawk Hudson Land Conservancy and the New York State Department of Conservation helped preserve 35 acres of open space.

Bethlehem Town Supervisor David VanLuven said it was one of the last remaining pockets of open land remaining in a hamlet bustling with housing developments all around it. Now, he could assure those who gathered at last week's press conference, this patch of green won't "grow houses."

VanLuven, who has voiced his support for finding ways to preserve open space throughout town, spoke before roughly 40 people on a patch of tall grass along Fisher Boulevard in Slingerlands. The grass was patted down to accommodate the meeting. It was still in stark

contrast to the well manicured lawns of the residential homes that surrounded them. With a thick patch of forest behind him, he asked those in attendance to look around.

"Look at the open space around town," said VanLuven. "It may not happen this year, or in five years. Maybe not in fifty years, but it will be developed if it is not protected."

The newly acquired land, donated by an anonymous land owner, is located on the corner of Fisher Boulevard and Route 85. The 35 acres span across the border of Bethlehem and New Scotland and abut the property occupied by the Five Rivers Environmental Education Center.

The process to obtain the land

took more than a decade, said Mark King, executive director of MHLC. It was once slated for a 35-home development. Ultimately, the property owner offered to donate the land in the interest of preserving the open space. Even with such intentions, it took several entities to secure it. At one time, King said there were six lawyers on task. Earlier this year, MHLC reached out to the community to raise \$20,000 to cover cost of resources.

"The overwhelming response of our community to the Fisher Boulevard project has been inspiring," said King. "Starting with a significant leading contribution from the board of directors of the Friends of Five Rivers citizens' support group, we quickly met and surpassed our fundraising goal through a rush of support from the community. The grassroots movement of our neighbors has been heartening, and we are grateful for their dedication to preserving this idyllic property."

In the midst of a developed landscape, these 35 acres are a refuge for wildlife living on the suburban fringe.


The vernal pools provide an important habitat for amphibians in the area, and the open fields are critical nesting and hunting grounds for birds and many other species of wildlife.

Small, seasonal streams on the property form the headwaters of the Phillipin Kill; by saving the land, water quality has also been protected.

"This land will add to protected open space in a rapidly developing area," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "This acquisition is consistent with our State Open Space Conservation Plan, and a great partnership project between the generous landowner, the Mohawk-Hudson Land Conservancy and DEC that will immensely benefit the public."

The newly acquired land will be added to the 450-acre footprint of the Five Rivers Environmental Education Center.

Plans to plot a new trail that links to existing maze of trails in the center of the property have been discussed. However, that will have to wait until a bridge is installed.

of completed initiatives, namely the Delaware Avenue Hamlet Streetscape Enhancement and Route 9W Corridor projects.

Robert Leslie, director of the town's Economic Development and Planning Department, was highlighted by both VanLuven and Cunningham as being essential to the comprehensive plan's process and completion.

According to Leslie, the Planning Department both leads and is "integrally involved in the comprehensive plan" since it reviews all of the town's development proposals which must conform to the

Numerous departments he would actively work with include the Department of Public Works, Engineering Division, the Parks & Recreation Department, Highway Department, Senior Services Department, and even local school districts.

Overall, this gives a sense of how collaborative

the process will be and what additional issues the plan is expected to address, including sewer and water systems, senior needs and housing, recreational needs and potential roadwork.

"I'm also looking to speak with various generations here, as younger kids may have different goals, others may want to raise families, while some people want to retire," Leslie said. "This is especially key since this new plan is looking to what Bethlehem should be like in decades to come."

VanLuven, Cunningham and Leslie touched on how the comprehensive plan hopes to address the land conservation versus development debate in town. Leslie specifically emphasized that the comprehensive plan is not meant to support only one side of that argument.

"It will not be about just allowing more development, for example. Each piece of land does come with certain development rights," Leslie said. "It's not so much the town can say they can just stop development. Growth is always expected but at the same time, we're looking to seek partnerships in land conservancy."

Cunningham, who has a background in conservancy and being environmentalminded, said, "I just want to be clear that I do support property rights, that's not something we can change. It's embedded in our culture. We just want to

look into having a balance between development growth — which some people are upset about — and open space and farmland protection. It's not easy, there's no right answers.

VanLuven himself accompanied Open Space Coordinator Karen Shaw on Saturday, Aug. 25, at the Delmar Farmers Market. They distributed paper surveys — the "Bethlehem Open Space and Farmland Conservation Opinion Survey" which asks for residents' opinions on topics such as land conservation, nature, development, scenic views and water resources to people there and answered questions.

Physical copies are also available at the Town Hall's main hallway and at the Bethlehem Public Library's September hallway display; the online version is still available at https://www.surveymonkey. com/r/openspacesurvey. Bethlehem locals are highly encouraged to take it. The final day to take the survey is Sunday, Sept. 16.

According to Shaw, 1,025 people have taken the survey as of Aug. 29, an increase from 900 back in the week of Aug. 19.

VanLuven and Shaw have said that this survey is one way to start encouraging community input on the land conservation versus development debate, which the upcoming plan is expected to address.

While it's unknown how long the process of getting started and finalizing the upcoming comprehensive plan would take, Cunningham said

the process alone could take at least a year, "but there's no right or wrong or conclusive answer to that."

As the 2005 plan envisioned what Bethlehem would hopefully be like by 2020, this newer plan is set to concern through as far as maybe 2050, as mentioned before.

"2030 seems too close though. Believe it or not, 2030 is only 12 years from now," she said. "By the time we finish the comprehensive plan, it may be 2020 then, and 2030 would be just 10 years away. I don't think it would be a bad idea to have a vision for both 2030 and 2050 though."

VanLuven, Cunningham and Leslie collectively believed that it is paramount to strongly balance the town's development growth and land conservancy. They individually said they would want the town to continue maintaining its aesthetically-attractive character, protect open space and farmlands, and be more proactive in decisionmaking for the future.

"The town is going to continue to grow because it's a desirable place to be in. I mean, we have great schools, a fantastic library, the Four Corners, Delaware Avenue, and it's a town with so much soul that has a sense of place," VanLuven concluded. "And people want to come and live here. The challenge for us is guiding that growth that will allow us to maintain that soul, and continue to be Bethlehem and not devolve into a soulless sprawl."

What kids can do in the face of bullying

may recall being bullied or witnessing bullying when they were in school. Despite that, it's important that adults, including parents and educators, not see bullying as an inevitable part of growing up. The effects of bullying can be severe, affecting those involved - including the bullied, the bullies and those who merely witness bullying long after their school days have ende.

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, bullying has been linked to various negative outcomes, mental health issues, substance abuse and suicide.

When taking steps to combat bullying, parents and educators should not overlook the benefits of enlisting children in their efforts. Kids can be great allies in the fight against bullying, and the following are some ways adults can



work with youngsters who want to stop bullying.

Teaching kids to respect others

StopBullying.gov, the DHHS' website devoted to stopping bullying once and for all, notes the importance of teaching kids to treat everyone, including other children, with respect. Parents can teach kids to pause before saying or doing something that can be harmful to someone else. Bullying inflicts physical

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and emotional pain on its victims, so teaching kids to recognize that words can be just as harmful as fists may encourage them to think twice before saying something mean to a classmate.

The DHHS also recommends advising children to do something else if they feel an urge to say or do something mean. Walk away from a situation to watch television, play a video game or engage in another activity rather than saying or doing something hurtful.

What kids being bullied can do


Kids being bullied also can employ certain strategies to overcome bullying. The DHHS recommends teaching children to look at bullies and telling them to stop in a calm, clear voice. Laughing it off might also work for kids who find joking comes naturally to them. The DHHS advises against fighting back, instead suggesting kids walk away and stay away before finding an adult who can stop the bullying on the


Encouraging students to confide in adults they trust also can help them overcome bullying and the feelings of loneliness that bullying can elicit. Trusted adults can help children devise a plan to stop the bullying. The DHHS notes that most bullying happens when adults are not around, so staying near adults and other children can help kids avoid situations where they might be vulnerable to bullies.

What witnesses to bullying can do

Bullying can have a negative impact on children who witness bullying, even if they aren't the victims. Adults can encourage children to speak to trusted adults and to report instances of bullying. In addition, children should be encouraged to be kind to children who are being bullied, inviting them to sit with them on the bus or in the lunch room and engaging them in conversations about topics that interest them.

Bullying affects children whether they're being bullied, doing the bullying or witnessing it. But bullying can be overcome if adults and children work together and keep lines of communication open at all

An anxious kid needs an ear

chool days are upon us once again. The running joke among many parents is that there is this collective sense of rejoice. There are only so many hours of expressed boredom and Fortnite battles one can take. The quota was met back in June. Now, our kids can spend more time at school, pouring over books, learning something new and give Mom and Dad a break.

That, of course, is a joke. Kinda.

Some of our kids are crossing over a new threshold this coming school year. Kindergartners, first-year junior and senior high schoolers, college freshmen — new surroundings and expanded expectations are thrust upon these children

and young adults. It is akin to us adults to landing a new job, learning the office politics, growing into your role and satisfying your supervisor. Your failure to do any of those things can lead to problems. So, it should come as no surprise that our kids suffer a similar challenge once they move on to a new school environment.

These are the triggers mentioned by the experts we spoke with in this week's feature on anxiety. Place yourselves into the shoes of these kids, and it's easy to relate. You only have to apply their challenges with the ones you face on a daily basis. Attempt to remember how your days were in school, and you'll miss the point. You won't be able to relate. The social landscape you navigated, or conveniently forget stumbling, through

is not the same today. Here's one way we can all relate: there is no escape.

One social aspect that was not touched upon in our article is the topic of bullying. It's prevalence can not be overstated. Children as young as elementary school age are committing suicide. It used to be that if kids were having a bad day, they could hide in within the comfort of their room. There was no one walking through the front door. The house, the bedroom, was safety. Introducing your kids to social media channels breaks down that front door. Bullies have a means of getting to your kid, and have an infinite number of people to whom they can call upon as an audience, even elementary school kids.


Today, schools appear to be taking steps to

address bullying. It has serious consequences, and schools should hold themselves accountable for establishing a safe environment for all. It's not an easy task, but it involves getting to know each student, and paying close attention.

But, it's not all on the teachers. Parents need to be just as diligent, and that means paying attention to the uncomfortable realization that your child is the bully. Let us rephrase that, it should be uncomfortable. It should be alarming. It should force you to account for your actions and spring you into doing something about it. Your child, after all, is a direct reflection of you. Don't, for one second, relinquish yourself from the responsibility of raising your child because you think he or she is their

own person. If your child is under your roof, you're obligated to make sure he or she is becoming the person of which you can be proud. Actually, even if your child is 45 and has kids of his own, you can still smack him in the back of the head for speaking disrespectfully towards the mother of his children.

Once you're a parent, you are always a parent. Step in and speak to your child. Be that support system for him or her. We as adults have developed the self confidence and have learned the coping skills to survive the challenges of the day. Our kids are still just learning. Be respectful of their fears and concerns. They are very real, and they deserve your attention.

Kids should be seen and heard

It is normal for students to feel uncertain about the new school year. This applies for all from kindergarten through 12th grade, and even university. Switching gears into a different environment, where they face new classes, peers, teachers and school buildings, can be challenging for some.

Anxiety is defined by the American Psychological Association as "an emotion characterized by feelings of tension, worried thoughts and physical changes like increased blood pressure,' often when pondering over the future or an uncertain outcome. It also can comprise of numerous disorders that are more severe, which necessitates medical attention.

Dr. Dolores Cimini — Director for Behavioral Health Promotion and Applied Research, Director of the Middle Earth Peer Assistance Program, and an adjunct clinical professor at the University at Albany focused on college students and how "the transition to

college is very significant for most students."

She said that during their high school lives, it was structured with classes; parents and friends were more present; and students generally had daily emotional and financial support. But upon entering college, there is a higher expectation on independence and there's less structure, as students may move away from home and can select a flexible schedule of classes.

"Students are expected to handle schedules, finances, social lives, work lives in some cases, health issues and on top of that, demanding classes," Cimini said. "It can explain why anxiety is very common among college students. In fact, it's the number one mental health concern in college. For a number of years, it used to be depression."

She also cited higher pressure to succeed academically and land a paying job; balancing work and life effectively; increased competition to get accepted into a university; and even competition within college.


"It's really a tough balancing act," she summarized.

For university students, Dr. Cimini recommended that they practice time management well — create a schedule and plan to pace one's studying, study a bit daily, and not procrastinate.

"There are many smartphone apps out there to help students with stress management or support relaxation and mindfulness," she said. "There are even apps for meditation."

9th graders are most likely to have anxiety about entering a new school and building, since they were the oldest in middle school as 8th graders, hence they would "have to start over as being the youngest in high school."

"Anxiety is part of being a teenage high school student," she said. "But when it manifests into something more extreme, that's when you may have a student who either has stomach aches, headaches, or maybe tell their parents they don't feel well. If there's a repeat of that, it can be an indicator of anxiety. In severe anxiety



Two highlyrecommended resources are a university's counseling center and academic advising office. Family, friends and professors could help point out other resources for help too.

Cimini also brought up how therapy dogs are brought onto campus before midterms and finals, "because people can have a connection with animals. It can help ease their day a little better."

Kimberly Leva, the Department Coordinator for School Counseling at Colonie Central High School, spoke mainly about the high school student's experience.

She pointed out that

bouts, students may cry or literally shake in the classroom."

Leva added that anxious high school students typically confide in friends first before their families, while some "shut themselves off and don't tell anyone."

While this anxiety discussion may focus on just students at first glance, parents and adults should be involved too to help.

As "students pick up cues from their parents," she suggested that parents can help prepare them for the new year by projecting a positive attitude about school, before school starts. Teachers, staff, other adults and counselors should

continue that mindset by being positive, supportive and educational in letting students know where both at and beyond school they can get help.

According to her, 9th graders and newcomers have an orientation program the day before school starts. "They spend 10 minutes in each classroom, meeting teachers and it goes a long way in settling their nerves."

The subject of orientation programs was echoed by Delmar's Hamagrael Elementary School Principal Dave Ksanznak who said it would have a new student orientation on Thursday, Aug. 30. Students would meet with him "in the auditorium and talk programs, tour, lunch, gym, recess, class subjects and general day-to-day operations."

In addition, incoming kindergarteners have a onehour orientation where they see their classrooms, meet teachers and see their desks; parents came and learned about the kindergarten program the spring prior. He said, "Once students see that everyone else is in the same boat, they get through their initial jitters and into routines eventually."

Heidi Andrade, Associate Professor in Educational Psychology and Methodology at the University at Albany, also agreed that touring a campus helps children tremendously, and parents should take anxiety as a concept seriously. "It's a downward spiral if not addressed," she added.

She brought up how students are rarely taught explicitly how to manage their learning and motivation, and selfregulate their emotions.

A "learning context" is

also paramount, in how students think and study differently in relation to where they physically are. For example, people are more focused in a library as opposed to studying in front of a TV screen. "It sounds straightforward but many don't know how to best stay motivated and develop strategies for learning," she said.

Students may develop a negative habit where if they tend to fail academically, they assume teachers will not help them because they think they are unintelligent. Lack of sleep, having nightmares, hiding and saying, "I don't want go to school!" are other signs of worsening anxiety.

"There's things they may fear too like bullying, drug abuse, sexual abuse, peer pressure and good grief, school shootings," she said.

As touched on before, Cimini, Leva, Ksanznak and Andrade all suggested taking advantage of orientation programs, being open with peers and family, staying informed of the seriousness of anxiety, and perhaps seeking professional help.

"This might sound ridiculous but breathe," added Andrade. "When anxiety happens, they start breathing shallowly which physically tells their body they're panicked."

"Anxiety is a very important topic and we want kids to feel comfortable and confident to be successful," Ksanznak offered a universal message. "We want to work with them and their families. If they're happy and comfortable, they're going to learn."

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


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

After more than 15 years of working in college admissions, this chair best suits her. Her father passed on his love for cars. When introducing her husband to her father, she said he immediately became a "favorite son." He owns a auto dealership. This is a family trade.

There are more than 263 million registered cars in the United States. Nearly 85 percent of people drive a car to work. Those numbers suggest that nearly everyone has the shared experience of driving one. It's a bond that welds us all together.

Conners admits to having a love affair with fast Europeans — Audi and Porsche, to be specific. "I have a new love with a little Aston Martin," she said. "So, that's kind of fun, right now." It's not at all scandalous. The people who walk through the museum's doors understand the passion behind her feelings with such cars. She said everyone has a story to share. ith football season upon us, we thought we'd revisit pairing food with beer for another week. After all, you're more likely to be bombarded with beer commercials instead of wine advertisements over the next few weeks. You may as well give it a try.

For many amateur cooks, the joy of cooking lies in trying new things. But trying new things need not be limited to ingredients or exotic dishes. Sometimes unique food and beverage pairings can be just as eye-opening as the cuisine itself.

While wine is often associated with food, beer also can be enjoyed with many a meal, including certain foods that few would think to enjoy with a cold beer. The pairing of beer with food is a big part of writer and author John Holl's book, "The American Craft Beer Cookbook" (Storey), which shares recipes from brewpub chefs across the country.

Sage Veal Medallions

Ingredients: Serves six

- 3 tablespoons all–purpose flour Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 21/2 pounds veal medallions, pounded thin
- 3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice
- 4 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1/2 cup pine nuts, toasted
- 6 whole sage leaves plus 1 tablespoon thinly sliced fresh sage leaves
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 11/2 pounds dried spinach fettucine
- 12 fresh chives, thinly sliced

Instructions

- 1. Combine the flour with salt and pepper to taste in a medium bowl. Dredge the veal in the seasoned flour, shaking off any excess, and set aside.
- 2. Warm the olive oil in a large skillet. Add the veal and pan-sear for 11/2 minutes; flip and cook for 1 minute longer. Transfer the veal to a plate to rest.
- 3. Return the skillet to the heat, add the lemon juice, and cook, stirring up the browned bits in the pan. Add the butter and stir into the lemon juice; allow the butter to melt and thicken slightly. Add the pine nuts, the tablespoon of sliced sage, the garlic, and salt and pepper to
- 4. Meanwhile, bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Cook the fettucine to desired doneness according to the package instructions. Drain the pasta, and then spin the fettucine into the sauce with tongs.
- 5. Transfer the pasta to a large round plate and top with the veal medallions. Garnish with the whole sage leaves and chives and serve immediately.

Pairing

Those who want to pair beer with the following recipe for "Sage Veal Medallions" can consider the Willimantic Brewing Company's Willimantic Flowers Infusion, which includes many botanical notes perfect for bringing out the flavors of the dish. Willimantic Brewing Company is housed inside a decommissioned post office in Willimantic, Connecticut.

A Grateful time capsule

Dark Star Orchestra is not a cover band

"Dark Star" was first performed, without lyrics, by the Grateful Dead in September 1967. The first version with lyrics was heard three months later. The tunes' sole focus was improvisation. "Dark Star" was played regularly through the 1960's, but seldom-heard after 1974. It only appeared on odd occasions in '78, '79, '81 and '84 and was last performed in March of 1994 – (deaddisc.com)

Unbox, Dark Star Orchestra; a continuation of spirit,

improvisation and the greatest acid-trip, that ever was, the Grateful Dead. In the midst of digging, we teleport back to the sounds we fell in love with in 1965, obsessed over by '69, and post '96, we're left, only aching for more. Dark Star is NOT a cover band. It gives birth to all that is Dead, then reinterprets it into modern day. Dark Star Orchestra is a time capsule – like the vivid memories, postcards and totems we buried long ago.

"I view it as performance art," said Dark Star Orchestra drummer Rob Koritz. "We are blessed to play music that is 95 percent improvisation and when we're firing on all cylinders, I can play how I want."



A Grateful time capsule

Dark Star Orchestra is the idiom of self-expression. In true honor of the Grateful Dead, the band has made this genre all-inclusive – pulling from rock, jazz, country, The Beatles, Chuck Berry, psychedelia and blues. For Koritz, the list goes on.

Their testimony goes out to Deadheads and non-cult listeners alike. There is a common thread that weaves through our mind and ears. It's music. "They hear it and say WOW" added Koritz. "Pretty much everybody will find something." And when you get confused, just listen to the music play.

Koritz did everything music. He was in opera, theatre,

college marching band and even studied as a classical percussionist. From a music major state-side to traveling overseas, and experiencing the Grateful Dead, Rob is an encyclopedic anchor to Dark Star Orchestra in his own regard. A band members' father is a profound jazz musician, while another roots himself in progressive rock. A melting-pot would be far to mundane to describe this stew.

Dark Star Orchestra is prepared in the framework of the Grateful Dead's catalog. Whether they are playing on a beach or filling massive arenas across the world, familiar tunes will be heard. On the bands' fourth annual return to Frontier Field, earlier this month, they performed two sets with an encore of "Mr. Charlie" and "C'est La Vie (You Never Can Tell)."

"We may go way further out than the Dead would have one night," said Koritz. "Others we may not be as

far out [more structured musically], it all depends." For the lay-listener Dark Star Orchestra is explained as a group playing Jazz, i.e. improvisational music, in a Rock idiom. The experience becomes trance-like at each venue; in the ear of each listener a different note is digested. It is synonymous with the individual experience. It is unique. Memories of the Dead are relieved through this music, we deem our own.

Like Frontier Field, Dark Star Orchestra continues to recur at venues around the world. This past May marked the 7th annual Dark Star Jubilee in Ohio and the band has already announced its 7th annual return to Jamaican Jam In The Sand at Jewel Paradise Cove Resort for January 2019.

Dark Star Orchestra will play the Palace Theatre in Albany on Saturday, Nov. 17.

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




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
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
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
