BETHLEHEM — At 1:05 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 23, two vehicles crashed

23, two vehicles crashed head-on on the Delmar Bypass west of Kenwood Avenue, and both drivers were seriously injured and

hospitalized, according to Bethlehem police.

An 83-year-old Selkirk woman named Margaret Joslin had been driving her eastbound 2014 Kia on the westbound lane of the highway, and struck a westbound 2015 Kia, which was driven by an

18-year-old Delmar man named Ethan Kurlander.

Both drivers were the only occupants in each vehicle.

Cmdr. Adam Hornick of the Bethlehem Police Department confirmed that their injuries were not life-threatening though.

Joslin had to be extricated from her vehicle afterwards, which took half an hour, according to the police's news release.

Then, Delmar-Bethlehem EMS and Albany County Paramedics transported the two drivers to Albany Medical Center Hospital.

The accident resulted in the overall bypass

being closed for over an hour, resulting in major traffic on southbound Route 9W. Bethlehem police, the Slingerlands Fire Department and Elsmere Fire Department investigated the crash site and gathered debris.



Be vigilant of enterovirus EV-D68

Common symptoms not life-threatening

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ALBANY — The state Department of Health has warned people to be aware of the symptoms of enterovirus EV-D68, after 39 children statewide have been confirmed to have it.

Its Wadsworth Laboratory, located in Albany, is the only laboratory in the state that can confirm EV-D68, the results of which are being shared with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to assist in monitoring the circulation of the virus nationally.

NYSDOH recently issued a press release which reported that EV-D68 can cause either mild to severe respiratory illness or no symptoms at all. EV-D68 infection most commonly results in mild symptoms such as runny nose, sneezing, coughing, body aches and muscle aches. Severe symptoms may include wheezing and difficulty breathing.

In rare instances, the virus can cause acute flaccid myelitis (AFM), a serious condition that causes weakness in the arms or legs. However, there are other causes of AFM besides EV-D68; With this virus, severe respiratory illness is a greater concern.

NYSDOH reports suspect cases of AFM due to EV-D68 to CDC for further investigation. To date, no cases have been confirmed in the state this year.

Infants, children and teenagers are most likely to get infected with EV-D68 and become ill because they do not yet have immunity from previous exposures to enteroviruses. Children with asthma may have a higher risk for severe respiratory illness caused by EV-D68 infection. While adults can get infected with enteroviruses too, they are more likely to have no symptoms or mild symptoms.

"All parents must take simple steps to protect their children, especially those who are immune-compromised or have respiratory problems, to avoid becoming infected," said state Health Commissioner Dr. Howard

Zucker. "We will continue to work with our partners at the CDC and local health departments to make sure that all New York families have the information they need to prevent their children and others from getting the virus."

Small numbers of EV-D68 have been reported regularly in the U.S. since 1987. Individuals are more likely to get infected with enteroviruses in the summer and fall. Because a mix of enteroviruses circulates every year, different types of enteroviruses can be common in different years.

Back in summer and fall 2014, New York and other states witnessed an outbreak of EV-D68 associated with severe respiratory illness. From mid-August 2014 to Jan. 15, 2015, the CDC or state public health laboratories confirmed a total of 1,153 people in 49 states and the District of Columbia with respiratory illness caused by EV-D68.

Almost all of the confirmed cases were among children, many of whom had asthma or a history of wheezing. Additionally, there were likely many thousands of

mild EV-D68 infections for which people neither seeked medical treatment nor got tested. This was the first documented nationwide outbreak of EV-D68.

Recent cases in New York state though have been confirmed among individuals who reside in Western and Central New York, the Capital District and Long Island, and specimens have been received from other regions for specialized testing at Wadsworth.

Enteroviruses are transmitted through close contact with an infected person, or by touching objects or surfaces contaminated with the virus and then touching the mouth, nose or eyes. There is no specific treatment for EV-D68 infections other than management of symptoms, and no specific antiviral medications are currently available for this purpose. It is important to take steps to protect yourself and others from all respiratory infections, including:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for 20 seconds.
- Avoid touching your

eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.

- Avoid kissing, hugging and sharing cups or eating utensils with people who are sick.
- Disinfect frequently touched surfaces, such as toys and doorknobs, especially if someone is sick.
- Use the same precautions you would use to prevent the spread of influenza.

These prevention steps are especially important for individuals or persons with family members who are infants, or who have chronic health conditions or compromised immune systems.

DOH will continue to work closely with the CDC, local health departments and healthcare providers to monitor the circulation of the virus both state- and nationwide. Carriero wants common sense solutions

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BETHLEHEM — Republican Town Board candidate Jim Carriero wants this town's government to use more common sense to help address the community's concerns, as he does not like how Bethlehem feels so divided due to political parties not finding a compromise to do so.

Born and raised in a small Italian-American community in Stamford, Connecticut, Carriero said he grew up poor and lived in a government-housing project until he was 10. He added that he has come to appreciate the government and people who personally helped him past those struggles during his early years.

Since graduating from Southern Connecticut State University with a degree in secondary education in 1976, he served on the school board in Grafton, Massachusetts, where he said he learned how to run the school system.

He was also drafted to serve as the treasurer of the Grafton Water District, taking the water system over from a private company he found "inefficient" to improve it for the local community.

He is also now a member of the board of directors for the St. Peter's Hospital Foundation, Senior Hope Counseling, and the Northeastern Association of the Blind at Albany.

Carriero said that he learned a lot and gained valuable experience after he joined a bank management training program with National Commercial Bank which became KeyBank by 1978. He worked for KeyBank for nearly 34 years as it expanded throughout the state, and he moved to Bethlehem in 1991.

He began working closely with the community as part of his responsibilities with KeyBank to support non-profit organizations and schools. He recalled while on assignment with public schools in downtown Rochester, he interviewed high school students to prepare them for college and job interviews, and he was shocked by the poverty he encountered there.

"There was one day where this young man finished his interview with us and we had shown him what to do in an interview and told what kinds of questions are typically asked," he said. "Well, the next student was then supposed to come in and we noticed there was a delay. While I was asking a teacher where that student was, he walked into the room and he had the same clothing as the previous kid."

Realizing that the student did not own any of his own presentable clothes for the interview, it personally struck Carriero as he said he'd grown up poor himself. He also learned that numerous children in other schools in the area also lacked adequate clothing. KeyBank began collecting jeans to donate to the students in need.

"This wasn't about reforming education, it was about just asking, 'What do you need? How can we help?" Carriero said. "We forget the fact that there are people who need help and we have an obligation to that."

Such encounters fed into his innate desire to help the community more, a theme which has continued in his campaign for Town Board. "We're always about finding solutions and using them to try to help people in need. We don't encourage the negative naysayers on our teams who say that the world is bleak," he said. "I would say that my mantra has been

about taking problems from corporate or the community and as a team of people, we will come to conclusions, though sometimes those solutions weren't the best but we executed them so well that we became better."

He added that it was easy to work at KeyBank, explaining that he and fellow colleagues were all taught not to be political, adding that they were a mix of Democrats, Republicans, Independents and Conservatives.

He said, "The view was that we serve the community. People's political positions were not the primary driver; it was a great lesson in humanity. It was a phenomenal experience to work with people who were socially conscious."

This informed his current outlook on the town election as he said he feels that it is unfortunate that Bethlehem feels divided because of people's opposing views.

Living near Wemple Road for over two decades with his fiancee, Theresa, and with two adult children, Carriero said he questions the value of political parties in town.

"It's time to bring us back to the table, and challenge us to stop using our political parties as our sounding board but to use common sense in how we manage government," he said. "Stop arguing about

Coffey concerned about town's trajectory

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BETHLEHEM — Dan Coffey, the Democratic Town Board candidate, said that he would want to look closely into revising the town's comprehensive plan and address the rise in development issue.

Born and raised in Plattsburgh, he earned his bachelor's degree in Political Science at Union College in Schenectady in 1984, then a master's in Public Administration from Columbia University and a Juris Doctor degree in Georgetown University.

Then living in Washington DC for six years, he was an intern on Capitol Hill with Congressman Gillis Long (D-Louisiana), and worked for the federal Congressional Budget Office and General Accounting Office.

He was also on an environmental law firm there for two years and finally moved back to the Capital District to start working for various law firms since 1992.

He married his wife, Eileen, whom he'd originally met at Union, in 1995, and moved from Cohoes to Delmar with their then-2-year-old eldest daughter, Sarah, in 1999. They would have another daughter, Kaitlyn a few years later.

Coffey first got involved in local law and government back in 2009, when he was appointed to the town's Planning

Board in 2009. The following year, he started a seven-year term as Chair of the Zoning Board.

He also served as president of the Albany County Bar Association in 2016, an officer for the Bethlehem Democratic Committee from 2012 to earlier this year, and has been on the town's Comprehensive Plan Assessment Committee.

He is currently serving on the Third Judicial District's Committee on Character and Fitness. He co-founded Bowitch & Coffey, an Albany law firm, in June 2012 where he is a trial attorney.

Coffey explained that he is running for a position on the Town Board for four

main reasons:

- addressing the town's rise in development issue
- continue revising the comprehensive plan
- encouraging locals to vote and stay engaged in what he sees now as a divisive political landscape nationwide
- wanting to get it right this time as a lawsuit prevented him from running on his party line last year.

"I care a lot about our community and the challenges that we're facing, the biggest one being a lot of development going around in town," he said. "I go around door-to-door and the numberone thing I hear is neighbors saying that developers are trying to cram as many developments into every nook and cranny as they can find."

He does not want the town to lose its community character which is being threatened by the rise in developments. In turn, he said he plans to address this issue by assessing which goals from the 2005 comprehensive plan have and have not been met, as a starting point to work on updating that plan. He said that the new plan should look ahead with goals set through 2035 or 2040.

Regarding development, "We've got to tighten up the Zoning Law; there's some provisions in there that need to be changed and it has to reflect the character of the neighborhood," he said. "And if some places may have been appropriate for some mixed-use hamlet style 13 years ago, maybe it's not appropriate today, as you might want to make it just a Core Residential area."

Believing that Bethlehem does not have a balanced tax base which the 2005 plan aimed for and that it relies too much on property taxes, he also brought up how he appreciated the recent presentation of the town's tentative 2019 budget at recent Town Board meetings, and liked that Bethlehem has "consistently stayed under the tax cap."

However, he said he would like to work more on expanding current businesses and bringing in new ones to try to fill areas that are zoned for businesses such as the Vista Technology Campus.

Unlike the towns of Guilderland and Colonie, he said, "Unfortunately, we do not have a Crossgates Mall or a Colonie Center, so we are lacking a lot in sales tax revenue and encouraging more businesses."

However, while he acknowledged that people do not like many large-scale stores, he still believes places like the aforementioned Vista Technology Campus could use more businesses as it looks "mostly empty." He even suggested downplaying the word, "Technology," and

Donovan pushes for a more understanding court

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BETHLEHEM — Incumbent Town Justice Ryan T. Donovan, who is running unopposed and seeking re-election, said that he sees himself as a judge who is compassionate yet firm when hearing cases that come across his court and making decisions.

"I believe that life is hard for people and that people are trying to get through various life experiences, so it's important for me to remember where they come from and what situation brought them to court," Donovan said. "I'm not insensitive to their socioeconomic or family situation too. But I will also be firm when I have to be because I took an oath to enforce the

Born and raised in Bethlehem, Donovan acknowledged how other people may not be as fortunate as he is, since he said he grew up in a supportive family in a great town, and was able to gain sheer experience in law and politics — which all complemented his humble nature.

He graduated from Bethlehem High School in 1994, having since been inducted in its Hall of Fame recently, and went off to SUNY Oswego to be a history teacher. Around that time, he began getting involved with several political campaigns. In 1996, he traveled to London to be an intern at the House of Commons, then returned that fall to work on the Clinton-Gore campaign, and ended up as a White House intern in the West Wing in 1997.

He said this period was when he began looking towards law, and applied and enrolled at Albany Law School in fall 1998. He added that he returned to Bethlehem then because he enjoyed studying there and that "because my

parents, who live right around the corner, gave me a free place to stay." He has since become an adjunct professor of law there

He has also made partner at the Albany law firm, Harris, Conway & Donovan, PLLC, where he specializes in commercial litigation, personal injury, alcohol beverage litigation, civil litigation, and trial practice. Now living in Delmar with his wife and three children, he said he enjoys juggling all those responsibilities.

He said that he feels honored to run unopposed and he has appreciated the support from across party lines throughout Bethlehem. Having assumed office since June 2006, he added that he wanted to run again because he feels there is still a lot of

"It is a challenging job and I deal with all walks of life, and have a chance to make an impact on their lives, and I enjoy that part of law," he said. "And I'm not tired of it yet."

When asked if certain types of cases specifically affected him, he said, "The heroin cases have hit me personally, it's so sad. I've seen addiction rip families apart and kill people and damage property. I've seen horrible things happen.

Feeling that the town court should do more to address heroin addiction, Donovan developed a treatment court, which serves as a "special probation program," over a year ago that is held in the town court.

"Every month, a defendant, their attorney and a probation officer come here to court and meet with me, so I know what they're doing for treatment, if they've tested positive, to keep them on task and hold them accountable," he said. Such a program does not exist in any other town court in the whole state and holding the addicts accountable shows that he and the town court care about their well-being, according to him.

"It's easy to say go to jail but if you roll your sleeves up and dig in and show them ways to be successful, and have them follow that path and reach success, that's the reason I'm still here," he added. "Our justice system should be like this and not so punitive. A good court needs to have a soul that really wants to help."

While he said that there are around seven or eight defendants enrolled in his treatment court, about the same number of enrolled defendants have died from overdoses since it began, "and that struck me. How can we fix this problem if we're doing the same thing like before this treatment court started? We have to approach it from a different angle."

He hopes to expand it by having more defendants enrolled into the treatment court. He said that if a defendant actively discusses their progress, set monthly goals, and stays clean after a whole year, "their charges get vacated and they have a chance and have a non-criminal

disposition and take a positive step in their life. That's the best part of this job.'

He said that the road to recovery is not easy though and that relapse is part of that. "You can't expect people to say, 'Ok, I'm better.' That's just not how it works. Rehabilitation is a big part of the criminal justice system and I try to use it whenever possible. It's my belief that we're here to help fix it and not let it go by. Otherwise, it's like why am I here?"

This connects back to how he's said that as a judge, he wants to understand what each defendant's situation and background are, which led them to becoming addicted. "I didn't have the challenges that a lot of people before me face," he said, bringing up his loving, supportive family and successful professional background. "I want to be sensitive to that and I think it's important for a judge to not say, 'If I wouldn't do that, you shouldn't do that.' That's not a healthy attitude for a judge — they should enforce the law and understand their audience, where they came from and take that into account. Because life is is really hard for people and I've been really fortunate, of which I'm very aware and grateful."

Moving forward, Donovan said he wants to continue making the town court more efficient and recognizes that the justice system is a process, although acknowledging that many people are intimidated by it.

"The court isn't here to ruin people's lives, we're hopefully here to get them back on track in life," he concluded. "And you can't be an arrogant judge. If you always think you're right, you won't learn and grow. I always strive to do my best to apply logic, reason and compassion into the law. I'm always wanting to get better."

New substation to open next spring

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GLENMONT — Construction on Elsmere Fire District's new 4,608 square-foot South Substation, located at the corner of Feura Bush and Wemple roads, is expected to be complete and officially open late next spring according to Jack Brennan, the chairman of the district's Board of Fire Commissioners.

Brennan explained that the substation would not only improve response times to emergencies in the district's southern half, but also "bring our services closer to the people, lands and residents of that

Contractors began clearing out the site, originally a vacant lot, for the \$1.4 million project about four weeks ago.

"People had to come in back then to start preliminary work like getting soil and ground samples. We had to do fencing and bring in the needed equipment so that we could start doing a lot of work on the foundations," Brennan explained. "It all began in minor steps at the end of September, and we've been progressing to a point where I think there will be some cement in already for the foundations."

Brennan said that the substation's general architect is C.T. Male Associates, a Latham-based company specializing

architectural engineering, and energy and environmental services.

The process to gain both Zoning and Planning Board approvals for the substation project was lengthy, beginning on Dec. 6, 2017. The district's application to build the new substation was reviewed by The Zoning Board of Appeals, before voters in the fire district approved it on Dec. 12, passing with 272 supportive votes and 180 opposing ones.

The town's planning board began overseeing the project on Feb. 20, and the matter continued to appear on its agenda through the middle of the summer.

Several concerns about the project were raised during Planning Board meetings.

One resident disliked proposed exterior color for the substation, the Planning Board staffers wondered if the facility will be used to host community events and how it lacks a sidewalk

stormwater management plan did not address pretreatment requirements that would affect the substation's proposed stormwater management areas. The town's designated engineering Firm, MJ Engineering, did not initially respond to requests for comment about this issue.

Brennan addressed the above concerns during a recent phone interview last week. While the building's exterior will be an "off-white, beige-like color," there would still not be a sidewalk directly in front of the substation instead, there's one across the street. Regarding the stormwater management plan issues, he said that "we provided everything that the town required and eventually, it was approved after a lengthy review on behalf of the town."

He added that "in essence, no, there won't be many community events here, due to the restrictions placed on the substation from the Planning Board, as it would be used for as originally

The project was finally approved during the July 3 Planning Board meeting.

Brennan said that he hoped the substation would be erected by December and that once the winter weather clears, outside work can continue before its slated spring opening.

Guilderland races

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GUILDERLAND — While there are no positions to be filled in the Town of New Scotland, the Town of Guilderland has two openings: Town Justice and Highway Superintendent.

There are three candidates running for a four-year term as Town Justice.

Albany County Legislator Bryan M. Clenahan, D-30, who represents the Guilderland area, is running on the Democratic, Working Families, Independence and Women's Equality lines.

Attorney Stephen R. Chelsey — a Guilderland lawyer who made partner at Albany firm Sullivan, Keenan, Oliver and Violando, LLP, who specializes in areas like workers' compensation law, civil litigation, commercial contracts, appellate practice, personal injury and subrogation, and criminal defense including DWI and traffic offenses - is running on the Republican and Reform

Incumbent Town Justice Christine M. Napierski, who is seeking re-election, is running on the Conservative line.

The Highway Superintendent position, a one-year term to fill a vacancy, has only one candidate. The incumbent Highway Superintendent Gregory J. Wier is running on the Democratic, Conservative and Independence lines.

things that have nothing to do with us here, and start finding common ground."

Carriero said he has been walking door-to-door and meeting with neighbors to understand what their top concerns are. Issues brought up included rise in local traffic, aging infrastructure like the town's water and sewer systems, developments, and the previously-proposed real estate transfer tax to fund open space conservation.

"We are really headed for trouble, I don't know if we can keep up with all this at the rate we're going," he said.

Concerning aging infrastructure, he brought up how the town has had 75 water main breaks this year to date. Acknowledging that infrastructure naturally breaks down over time, he pondered, "But what does our town budget say? The budget plans for water main breaks but it doesn't plan to say, 'Let's go replace the underground water system."

Bringing up his past experiences as treasurer of the Grafton Water District, he said he would want Bethlehem to have a better purification plan where the water system is looped to prevent water from lying dormant within, where it could have had chemical reactions with chlorine and more. He connected this to how the federal Environmental Protection Agency, found that Bethlehem's water system was

deficient earlier this year, after finding high levels of trihalomethanes (TTHM) and haloacetic acids (HAA5), which are dangerous by-products of drinking water chlorination.

Moving forward, Carriero said he envisions Bethlehem's government to be much more engaging and cooperative in the near future and to work on finding compromises to keep the community together. "I'd want a more peaceful process of people trading each other's ideas and treating each other the way we should," he said.

While expressing that the current Town Board members and supervisor are "very good, honorable citizens," he said that their decisions don't necessarily take into account their long-term implications and that there are no business people involved in the decision-making process.

Referring back to his decades-long portfolio of experiences as a banker, board member, water district treasurer and more, Carriero said that it is important to not only consider short-term but also long-term effects of an action taken by the town when addressing an issue. "I'm very analytical and I'm going to question the long-term decisions we make," he added. "My experience in running teams of people, meeting budgets, cutting expenses and building branches is extensive. But my more powerful capability is to lead people to make them and their values feel heard and [be] part of the solution."

If elected, Coffey said he believes his past experiences would help inform his actions and decisions regarding the comprehensive plan and town budget.

He also feels more emboldened as his party "was very supportive of [me] running again" this year and he has made sure all the appropriate paperwork have been filled out correctly. This was to avoid a similar "snafu" as last year's where he could not run on the Democratic ballot line, due to incorrectly-filled paperwork which resulted in a lawsuit filed by Dems. Dan Morin and George Harder. He then campaigned on

the Working Families Party line but lost.

Acknowledging that last year's events have been brought up by his opponent, James Carriero, Coffey said, "I'm asking people to not just judge me on that piece of paper but instead try to look at my entire background, experiences and lifetime of services in the private and public sectors."

He also said he wants to use this town election as an opportunity to motivate people to get out and vote, keeping the national political climate in mind too. "There's a lot going on nationally with the Trump administration and some of its policies which have just energized a lot of people and obviously, this is not a national election, it's a local one," he said. "But there's a strong sense, that many people in town I know here and I have, that we need to do something, and we need to be

engaged and we need to be active. So, if I can do something on the local level, I'd like to do something like that."

Asked what he envisions Bethlehem to be like in the near future, Coffey said he would like to maintain its community character and individual hamlets, and continue addressing the development growth issue. He believed that such growth is happening because Bethlehem "is an attractive community. We've got the best schools, a great library, a tremendous town park system, the Rail Trail — which is a huge asset — and the Farmers Market, the nearby Five Rivers [Environmental Education Center], and you're five or six miles from downtown Albany."

He said he wants the comprehensive plan to ensure Bethlehem retains its small-town feel. He added that within the town's park system, there's been talk about introducing a Pop Warner football and lacrosse field and he also wanted to see about having a pavilion for summer arts. "We have a lot of creative people and I know a lot of suburban communities have summer plays and musicals, so I'd like to see if that's feasible here," he said.

He said he also wants to better utilize the nine miles of Hudson River frontage as a resource for industrialization in the north and recreation in the south.

Coffey concluded that he has been walking around town "almost every single night" and meeting with residents to better understand what their concerns are. "Also, my adversary [Carriero] is a worthy one and he's been working hard. So, I'm just looking forward to meeting more people and hopefully prevailing on November 6."

Residents deserve the facts

To the Editor:

As a community, we are all made better when we are informed and engage in respectful and factual discussions with one another. Invariably, we will not always agree on the issues, but that isn't necessarily a bad thing. Expressing and exploring opposing viewpoints and challenging the status quo is often what makes for better policy and better communities.

Recognizing an opportunity to provide facts, dispel myths and rumors, answer questions, and educate the public, I accepted an invitation to be one of four panelists to publicly discuss the real estate transfer tax that was first proposed in 2017. Although Mr. Saunders has attempted to give me credit for organizing this important public forum, I am sorry to say that such credit is misplaced, as I neither proposed nor organized the informational meeting.

Mr. Saunders may have his facts wrong, however, we do agree on at least two points, namely that we should all educate ourselves on the issues and hold our elected officials accountable. That is why I make every effort to provide the public with as much information and facts as possible so that together we can listen to one another and

move the conversation forward in an informed, honest, and respectful way. Unfortunately, I have learned that some folks do not want the public to have all the facts. They do not welcome open discussion or honest debate of the issues on their merits. Instead, they attempt to stifle or marginalize contrary viewpoints or bury inconvenient truths.

There are also a handful of people on both sides that appear to want to hold their public officials accountable only when they are not from their own political party. For example, last week's letter to the editor ignores the troubling fact that Supervisor VanLuven has stated that he and then-Supervisor Clarkson privately discussed the real estate transfer tax in 2017, yet ultimately chose not to inform or seek input from the residents prior to the request that the bill be introduced in the Senate and Assembly. Would Mr. Saunders still be as unconcerned or forgiving on this point if it was me who had helped keep the

residents of Bethlehem in the dark regarding such an important issue?

In closing, sharing facts with the residents through public forums and the press is not a right reserved only for the party that currently holds the majority, rather, it is a duty shared equally by all public officials. I find that when we provide people with the facts, they tend to make better decisions, are less prone to fear and uncertainty, and have greater confidence in their government. Perhaps most importantly,

we must remember that disagreement is not a bad thing and it need not divide us. In fact, I humbly submit that disagreement is essential in a healthy democracy.

As one of your elected officials, I will continue to do my best to provide everyone with the facts, and trust you to form your own opinions.

I read your Oct. 3, 2018 article about the Altamont Orchards on its 50th year with interest. Your report had many historical facts. I would like to add a few more facts.

My grandfather, Dr. Daniel H. Cook, began planting his orchard in the 1880s, and at the time named his orchard Altamont Orchards, making it almost 140 years old.

There was a huge farmhouse with a wrap around porch. On Halloween night, 1944, the house burned on a cold, rainy night.

When my father, Daniel H. Cook, operated the farm, we had 8,000 fruit bearing trees. He grew Red and Gold Delicious, Cortland, Macs, Northern Spy, Quincy and a few other varieties. When harvest time arrived, all of our pickers and packers were local people, neighbors. The apples were sorted and packed in the barn that still stands proudly. Then the crates were trucked to the Central Warehouse in Albany. Since, at that time, colleges and the Boys Academy did not start classes until the end of September, many of the

boys picked our apples. I still remember any names as: Aronowitz, Steiner, Wincher, Karl and Don Slater. The Warners, Sonny Mock, Joe Grotto and so many others. Some of the old men of the mountains remember picking apples.

What a different world it was then when neighbors always helped neighbors.

P.S. In 1999, The *Altamont Enterprise* printed in its 100 years ago column that Dr. Daniel H. Cook planted another 3,000 apple trees on his farm outside of Altamont.

One year, when the apples were ready to pick during World War II, so many young men were at war, we had a serious problem. Who will pick the apples? My father solved it by asking the La Salle Seminarians (located on Altamont Hill, Route 156). They arrived every day until the job was done. Our heroes that year.



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

Young the Giant is coming

'Simplify' quintet to play Albany in January

ALBANY - Young the Giant recently announced dates, including a stop at The Palace Theatre, for its upcoming 2019 Mirror Master Tour.

Tickets are on sale now for Young the Giant's performance at The Palace Theatre, to be Wednesday, Jan. 30, at 8.p.m. For more information and tickets to all upcoming shows, visit youngthegiant.com.

The tour is in support of the band's new full-length album of the same name, released last Friday through Elektra Records. Mirror Master includes recently released tracks "Simplify" and "Call Me Back," along with the musing single "Superposition", which recently hit No. 30 on Spotify's U.S. Viral Chart. In addition to the newly announced show dates, the band is currently touring this fall with Lights as main support.

"Within one single day, we're all so many different people," said vocalist Sameer Gadhia, describing the overall thesis for "Mirror Master." "Especially with the use of social media, we're not just living in the now—we're living on several different timelines simultaneously. A lot of the album came from thinking about how we have all these separations within ourselves that allow us to go about our day. At a time when everyone wants to put each other in a box—culturally, socially, musically—we wanted to show that there are a multitude of reflections inside everything. We don't have to be a certain thing; we can contradict ourselves and show all these different sides of who we are."

Since the band's 2010 inception, Young the Giant has made a name for itself in rock as the 'thinking man's band,'winning over fans, radio, and press with their incendiary live shows, strong musicianship, and poignant lyrics. Following 2016's critically-acclaimed Home of the Strange, Mirror Master promises to continue ascending into consciousness, though this time with a heavy focus on personal self-awareness and growth.

Mirror Master finds Young the Giant in a transitional period for America, not only as a culture (for their former album Home of the Strange, NPR's Alisa Chang



had an in-depth conversation with Gadhia about the 'modern immigration story', available to read here), but also technologically. The band members have become increasingly aware of society's attachment to social media, cellphones, and elevated, sometimes fabricated, selfportrayals on the internet.

With the new album, the band forgoes the technological obsession and, in an almost meditative way, examines one's relationship with the "self" to instead express a genuine identity.

"Something we want to get across with the album is the idea of taking authorship of your life," continues Gadhia. "Even though it may all be an illusion, there's solace in that illusion. Because if you have control of anything at all, it's your own reflection, how you treat people and how you walk through this life. So if you're an Indian kid and your parents want you to be a doctor or lawyer or engineer, and you just want to make music with your friends, then do that. Don't let people feed you what they want you to think. Do what makes you happy, and realize and that all is good and all is horrible, and everything else in between."

A new edition

Especially, DeVoe. Take a look at him. He still has that baby face. And, he's nearly 30 years removed from asking whether or not you "like what you see" in the sex-charged Bel Biv DeVoe anthem "Do Me." While my friends and I weren't quite sure what we were slappin' up and flippin' in high school, these four were taking the world by storm. And, now, they're looking good, and I look nothing like I did in 1990. DeVoe and Bell laugh when I start our conversation by sharing in jest that I hated them for looking so good.

"That's the most honest intro on the planet, man," said DeVoe. "We love it. If you're going to be hated for something, that's definitely what you want to be hated for."

The foursome is looking good as they set out to tour the country as RBRM, an acronym for Ronnie, Bobby, Ricky and Mike. See it as a joint show between Brown and Bel Biv DeVoe. Or, see it as a New Edition reunion, minus Johnny GIll and Ralph Tresvant. It doesn't matter what you like, you won't be wrong with either. Today's name is a play on New Edition's 1984 hit "Cool It Now."

There's no need to hate them for looking good today. It's a by-product of each living a healthier life. On the phone, DeVoe and Bell sound humbled and thankful for the opportunity to perform in front of fans again. The upcoming performance at The Palace on Friday, Nov. 2, is more than a year after a New Edition mini-series on BET Network premiered last January. More than 30 million viewers watched and listened to confessions of addiction and transgressions. Now, DeVoe said they're together and giving each other encouragement as they hit the gym and watch what they eat.

"When I see Rick coming upstairs from the gym, it makes me feel like I've got to get off my ass and make sure I'm doing what's necessary to look the best possible on stage, and give people the best show possible," said DeVoe.

They're candid about their ages. Brown is the youngest at 49. Bell just turned 51 in September. Considering how long they've all been in the limelight, you'd think they were older. But, they've been in the limelight since first breaking out as young teenagers.

The four, along with Tresvant, broke out as young teenagers in 1983 with "Candy Girl," "Cool It Now," and "Mr. Telephone Man." The group's management team supposedly named the group New Edition to declare them as the next rendition of the Jackson 5. But, behind the scenes, the kids out of Boston weren't treated like royalty. After their first tour, the members of New Edition were dropped back off at their homes in the projects. Each left with a check in hand for less than \$2. DeVoe said they didn't know enough to look at the financials. They were teenagers on allowances. The \$35 they received per diem each show was "like winning the lottery," he said. That experience, however, would carry over.

Brown left the group before 1986. Aside from reports that he felt he received less attention than others in the band, Brown has said he never felt the group was paid adequately for the band's success. He went on to a solo career under MCA, garnering a No. 1 standing on the R&B charts with "Girlfriend." His 1988 follow-up, "Don't Be Cruel," topped the Billboard Top 200 album chart. It earned five Top 10 tracks on the Billboard Top 100, including "Don't Be Cruel," "Roni," "Every Little Step," "Rock Wit'cha," and his No. 1 hit "My Prerogative." The album would go on to be the top-selling album of 1989 selling eight-times platinum. In 1990 Bobby was awarded a Grammy for Best Male Vocal Performance for "Every Little Step."

Bell, DeVoe and Bivins subsequent formed Bel Biv DeVoe in 1990. With a blend of hip-hop beats and R&B harmonies, the three helped usher in the burgeoning New Jack Swing sound with the trio's 1990 debut album, "Poison"

Selling more than four million copies worldwide, "Poison" generated two chart-topping singles, with

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





s warm weather slowly turns cold, certain dishes that don't make much sense serving during the summer start to sound more appealing. Potpie is one such dish. Cooks who want to try something new with potpie can try the following recipe for "Tortellini & Pancetta Potpie" from Elinor Klivans' "Potpies: Yumminess in a Dish" (Chronicle Books).

Tortellini & Pancetta Potpie

Ingredients: Makes 6 servings

- ounces pancetta, cut i nto 1/2-inch pieces
- tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon olive oil 1
- 1 cup finely chopped onion
- large cloves garlic, finely chopped
- cup lightly packed, coarsely 1/4 chopped fresh basil
- 3/4 cup chicken broth (low sodium, if canned)
- cup heavy whipping cream 1/3
- cup freshly grated Parmesan cheese 1/4
- teaspoon salt 1/8
- 1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 9 ounces cheese-filled egg tortellini
- ounces cheese-filled spinach tortellini 9

Instructions:

- 1. Position a rack in the middle of the oven. Preheat the oven to 400° F. Rub 1 teaspoon olive oil inside a baking dish with an 8-cup capacity.
- 2. In a medium skillet, cook the pancetta pieces over medium heat until the edges brown, about 10 minutes. Transfer the pancetta to a large bowl. In the same skillet, heat the 1 tablespoon olive oil over medium heat for 1 minute. Add the onion and cook until it softens, about 5 minutes. Add the garlic and basil and cook for 1 minute. Stir in the chicken broth and adjust the heat to cook it at a gentle boil until it is reduced to about 1/2 cup, about 5 minutes. Add the cream, bring to a boil, then immediately remove the pan from the

heat. Stir in the Parmesan cheese. Stir the sauce into the pancetta in the bowl. Add the salt and pepper and taste for seasoning.

3. In a large pot of salted boiling water, cook the tortellini for 5 minutes. Drain the tortellini well and stir them into the pancetta and sauce to coat them with sauce. Transfer the pasta to the baking

Extremely Flaky Sour Cream Crust

Ingredients: Makes 6 servings

- cup unbleached all-purpose flour
- teaspoon baking soda 1/2
- teaspoon salt
- stick cold unsalted butter, cut into 16 pieces
- cup cold sour cream

Instructions:

1. To make the pastry in an electric mixer: Sift the flour, baking soda and salt into a large bowl. Add the butter pieces and mix them with an electric mixer on low speed until the largest of the butter pieces are the size of small lima beans, about 1 minute. The butter pieces will be different sizes and there will still be some loose flour. Add the sour cream and continue mixing until large clumps of smooth dough that pull away from the sides of the bowl form, about 30 seconds. Stop the mixer and scrape the beaters clean, if needed.

To make the pastry by hand: Sift the flour, baking soda and salt into a large bowl. Use a pastry blender, your fingertips or 2 dinner knives to combine the flour mixture and the butter until lima bean-size pieces form. Add the sour cream and stir with a large spoon for about 2 minutes until clumps of smooth dough form.

2. Form the dough into a smooth ball,

Keep in line

Simple ways to stay fit all year long

any people find it easier to maintain their beach bodies during summer than they do throughout the rest of the year. Summer weather encourages people to get off the couch and enjoy the great outdoors, and many people prefer to eat lighter meals during the summer to combat the heat and humidity.

But once the dog days of summer give way to autumn, the motivation to stay in beach shape tends to wane. Couple that dwindling motivation with the tendency to eat larger, heartier meals as the weather gets colder, and it's easy to see why so many people gain weight over the last several months of the year and into the new year. But maintaining a healthy weight year-round promotes long-term health and reduces a person's risk for various ailments and diseases, including heart disease and diabetes. The following are a handful of strategies men and women can employ as they try to turn their beach bodies into the bodies they see in the mirror all year long.

- Keep setting goals. As winter heads toward spring, many people set shortterm goals to motivate them to get back into beach shape. If you find your daily workouts taking a turn toward the mundane, switch up your routine by changing exercises or signing up for classes that interest you.

- Find healthy seasonal foods. Many people prefer to buy locally sourced and/ or in-season foods, recognizing the positive impact that such dietary habits can have on the environment. That commitment to buying healthy, locally grown foods can be tested as the seasons change and the offerings at your local market change along with them. Educate yourself about which foods are in-season in your area throughout the year, opting for the most nutritious foods you can find. Buying in-season foods saves you money, and you will also feel good about staying on a nutritious, eco-friendly track.
- Join an exercise group or sports league. The buddy system is an effective way to stay committed to a fitness regimen, but if you cannot find a friend or family member to brave cold winter treks to the gym with you, then consider joining an exercise group or competitive sports league. They get by with a little help

Aqueous' Dave, Evan and Rob discuss tour, new album and more

n day two of the second annual Cobblestone Live music festival, three-fourths of Buffalo's own grooverock powerhouse, Aqueous, joined me amidst the celebration of music and art. Dave Loss (guitar/vox), Evan McPhaden (Bass), and Rob Houk (Drums) sat down to discuss their incredibly busy summer thus far, coming home to Buffalo, their new studio album, Color Wheel, and their upcoming, and most extensive fall tour yet.

Andy Hogan: Cobblestone Live is obviously a homecoming for you guys, but you've had quite the summer away from Buffalo, so far. Between Summer Camp, Mountain Music Festival, Disc Jam, Electric Forest and Peach, what have been some major takeaways from the tour?

Dave Loss: One of the bigger highlights I think was being able to sell out The Bluebird Theater.

Rob Houk: That was a huge highlight of the summer. I think a good rule of thumb is never expected to sell out, and when you're not in a hometown scenario, you never know what's going to happen.

Andy Hogan: But in Denver, that's kind of just the scene, right? People just get out and go to see music.

Rob Houk: I feel like it's become a second home to us. The response to music out there is just something you don't see... like, every night there is just a banging show.

Andy Hogan: And you see those weird kind of pockets even locally, right? Ithaca, for example, has tons of people getting out to see music on a Friday or Saturday night. Where else do you guys see that?

Dave Loss: Burlington, VT for sure. Rob Houk: Omaha!

Dave Loss: Yeah! Omaha, Nebraska we've had three really good experiences. Once with Papadosio, and twice at the Reverb Lounge.

Rob Houk: People go nuts in Omaha... they throw down.

Andy Hogan: Coming back to Buffalo for Cobblestone must be a special occasion. Particularly for you, Dave and Evan, having grown up here. To see this area transform, could you have imagined this would be happening even a few years ago?

Dave Loss: No. Even the whole city in general from ten years ago has seen such

growth in a positive way. Like you said, this whole area was not a thing, the whole Canalside area was not a thing, so it's really nice to see all of this happening.

Andy Hogan: From what I read online, your first time ever playing down here was not too long after Iron Works opened in 2014...is it safe to say Iron Works is your favorite spot around town?

Dave Loss: It was definitely a huge place for us to continue to grow in the city. Josh [Holtzman] obviously runs it, and he's our homie so it's been really nice. Even more than that, it's helped bring a lot of great music into the city...a lot of other acts that hadn't really been coming to Buffalo prior to it being open.

Rob Houk: It's a good spot for a midlevel band...they treat you like a king. It's not just a great spot to play, they also understand what it's like to be on the road. At the end of the day, when you treat your musicians well, they're going to play better, your patrons are going to be happier...it works all around.

Evan McPhaden: It's definitely a music venue for musicians. Josh actually used to manage us and would come on the road with us. So he's seen all the venues we've been to and knows exactly what he wants for Iron Works.

Andy Hogan: Now, there's something new in your live set that I noticed last night. I saw that both you (Dave) and Mike [Gantzer] are now using PRS (Paul Reed Smith) guitars. How does this affect you sonically?

Dave Loss: Haha, he's finally seen the light! I love those guitars. What's cool about his, and mine does it too, but you can coil tap. So there are two humbuckers on the outside that can go between single and humbucker, then there is a single coil in the middle. Plus it's a bolt on neck, all that adds that like Fender Stratocaster snap that you can get. So he can still get that single coil, fatty-strat kind of sound with that guitar, but he can still get the rippin' leads with the humbuckers.

Shortly after this interview, Aqueous announced both Mike and Dave are now officially endorsed by PRS guitars.

Andy Hogan: Evan, while we're on the topic of gear, what can you tell me about your bass?

Evan McPhaden: It's made by a Polish company called Mayones. Our friend Ryan has one, and I got to play it for a weekend and I fell in love with it. It's deep, but still bright at the same time. I run it through a TC Electronic Blacksmith...I think it's 1600 watts, which is, a lot. I also have a 6×10 Ampeg Cabinet.

Andy Hogan: Rob, I don't know anything about drums, but I am curious what kind of kit you play; what are your



On the right foot

Phish breaks a record and kicks off fall tour in Albany

wo nights into Fall Tour and Phish is already breaking records to make up for their harsh Curveball fallout. Ousting Billy Joel with all-time attendance at Times Union Center, a brand-new, celebratory banner welcomed the deep grooves and thoughtfully selected set lists to come from the Albany double-header.

Moma Dancin' their way back into the NY state capital after nine lingering years, a delicious take on The Story of the Ghost tune got the packed party underway as Kuroda quickly proved his light show came to steal part of the opening show. "Tube" followed next as phans waited to see what territories the experimental track would wander into. Its foundation was uprooted in its entirety and before you could predict it, the quartet threw you

right back into familiar grounds. While all four members rode the high-energy wave of the tour opener, Page kicked it into high gear, grabbing the reigns throughout the course of the jam and foreshadowing his exuberant and demanding presence throughout the night.

"Theme From the Bottom" emerged to ignite smiles as the crowd recited lyrics near and dear to their hearts. "Keep what's important and know who's your friend," chimed throughout the TU Center and hit home for many of the North Easterners who suppressed low spirits following the demise of Curveball. At its pinnacle of a capella entertainment, a quick segue picked the crowd up and placed them a the light-hearted "Free." Kuroda offered up some tricks and treats with new patterns and Pac-Man looking motion lights. The rigs swirled above like rolling waves, at times mesmerizing the sold-out dance party over the action on stage.

Short and to the point, "Halley's Comet" made a fleeting appearance before finding its way into summer tour favorite "Everything's Right." Gordon took the opportunity to bask in the glory

of psychedelia among his moments in the spotlight, bold slaps and bassy vocals. An appropriate rendition of the Talking Heads' "Cities" rang through the pulsating downtown venue, making locals pretty happy that Albany's the city they've found themselves living in. A heavy hitting "Walls of the Cave" closed out an exemplary start to fall tour to an approving arena.

Appealing to the October chill in the air and Halloween peaking around the corner, "Ghost" corralled the crowd for set two before leading into pleasantly welcomed Big Boat number, "No Man in No Man's Land." The duo opened up the set with high energy that continued with "Piper." Wandering down an evil tunnel, a gritty "Twenty Years Later" welcomed three rounds of raging applause and earnest praise. The metal leaning performance conjured devil horns proudly raised in the stagnant, smoky air. After a brief "Show of Life" interlude, Phish came out guns blazin' again with a classic "2001" -> "Character Zero" close to the set, the latter a frequent set closer in Albany going back to 1997. A favored "Harry Hood" encore sealed the deal on a wild fall tour opener, notching a high-bar for Wednesday night's gig to follow.

Night two offered up a second helping of Phish, with fans filling into the arena earlier this evening due to the on and off wind and rain that peppered downtown Albany. The first set opened with "Crowd Control," which was hardly an issue at the Times Union Center this run, as compared to past Phish shows were maneuvering around the sold-out crowd can be harrowing.

The first set was the highlight of the night, with a 16-minute version of "Chalkdust Torture" leading the way for Jam of the Run honors in the same spot where "Tube" shone the night before. "Wolfman's Brother," "Steam," and a setclosing "Bathtub Gin" each took a lengthy spin, with energetic numbers found in between with "Scent of a Mule," "NICU," and "Gumbo." Throw in a few minutes of Jon Fishman on the Electrolux vacuum for "I Didn't Know" and you have a throwback to the "Bathtub Gin" jam on 9/8/00 where Fishman led us in an ambient vacuumladen jam.

Set 2 kicked off with the new "Set Your Soul Free," which has already found its place as a set opening jam vehicle in only five appearances. A rusty "Birds of a Feather" followed, along with the misplaced "Mercury," which has its moments in the middle improv section but otherwise fell flat as the set tried to pick up steam. It did just that with an 11-minute "Light" but "The Wedge" failed to capitalize on that energy, and by the time "Wading in the Velvet Sea" started, not even "Wilson"->"Slave to the Traffic Light" could find the initial energy from the set's beginning.

As always, "Julius" got the crowd up and dancing for the encore, and then Trey took a moment to remark that these shows in Albany were like hometown shows, and with that, the band threw in "Rocky Top," a song of home-sweet-home, to close it out.

Phish heads to Hampton, Nashville, Chicago and Las Vegas for the rest of their tour. Stay tuned to NYSMusic for updates.

No apologies

Caroline Jones is here to shine

emember this name: Caroline Jones. The 28-year-old country singer and songwriter released her first album, Bare Feet, in March 2018, and has had an outstandingly remarkable concert season opening for country successes Tim McGraw, Jimmy Buffett, and Zac Brown.

NYS Music caught up with Caroline Jones after she opened for the Zac Brown Band at Saratoga Springs September 29, 2018. Jones' performance demonstrated great versatility in her 20 minutes on stage. Mashing up John Denver's melodies with her own, covering Coldplay's "Fix You," and even singing her original songs "Bare Feet" and "Tough Guys," Jones sounded a lot like a female Zac Brown. She even pulled out the harmonica on the last song, unapologetic of her flexibility. She can sing, play guitar and harp, and even writes music.

Jones was unassuming as she sang on a stage washed in blue-violet light. Her petite frame was relaxed as her arched her voice over two octaves. She walked around the stage, dancing and singing about wanting a man to call her baby, and alternatively, telling people it's tough if they don't accept her as she is. Her voice training in opera shone through as she managed challenging transitions with ease.

After the performance, she graciously met fans at a meet and greet where she authentically appeared both relaxed and interested in each fan's words. Smiling for

the camera and chatting about fans' love of her music, Jones was right at home during the meet and greet.

During the interview, Jones revealed her interest in country and pop music started young, at age nine, when she began vocal lessons with a teacher who specialized in jazz and opera. The teacher was her primary coach for many years, eventually guiding her to NYU to study opera. But her love of country was organic to her; she never lost it, and has found her way back to writing her popular tunes.

Jones offered that her parents, featured in the autobiographical song "County Girl," were from different backgrounds. Jones shared her father is southern, and wanted her to stay connected to her southern values, including humility and a love of nature. She excitedly shared she enjoyed walking the grounds of SPAC earlier in the day and had found a babbling brook and the sunlight filtering through the trees. She admitted she often writes her best music in nature.

When asked about her future, Jones confidently sees herself still writing music in ten years and growing as an artist and woman. She hopes to continue to put out the type of music that communicates her values and connection to nature and womanhood, as she has done so well this year.

Jones had a sea of plaid flannel fans swaying and singing with her during her versatile twenty minutes on stage. Later in the night, she got the nod of approval from Zac himself as they played guitar together.

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Remember the name, Caroline Jones. She is quite possibly the biggest name about to burst onto the country scene this year.

Sister Sparrow's 'Gold'

s an artist, we have to evolve. If we stay the same, then we're going backwards.' It came straight from the 'bird's' mouth bands need to evolve to stay on top, and that's what Sister Sparrow and the Dirty Birds have done in their latest album, Gold. It's their first studio album since 2015 and it's a smash hit.

Long time fans and new ones alike will find something to enjoy, which is no easy feat. Arleigh Kincheloe disclosed in an interview with NYS Music that she and producer Carter Matschullat worked together to create a collection of songs that shed some light into Kincheloe's life experiences and creative thought process. The result is

something spectacular and different from the group's three experimentation that may not hit home with long time prior studio albums.

Each track has been placed carefully within the album in an obvious effort to ease people into Sparrow's new direction. Gold kicks off with the 'Birds' immaculate horn line and Kincheloe's blissful, soulful powerhouse pipes. It's classic Sparrow but with hints of contemporary beats and hooks. Kincheloe speaks about her love life and how she's a woman with "gold" love. The track is digestible and an earworm listeners will happily have stuck in their heads

"Leave Here With Me" gets a bit more experimental. The production value is phenomenal thanks to Matschullat. It breathes a new life into the group that will absolutely help propel them into a new genre. Listeners get hints of that hard-hitting horn line and Kincheloe's soulful voice but all with a very mid-70s soul, love song vibe. It's a pretty gutsy move considering they've rooted themselves in a very jam-ish genre, but they nailed the

"Ghost" is the most poppy song on the album which Kincheloe confirmed in our interview with her. It consists of a four on the floor beat, prominent bass and lyrics about tough times with unstable men. It's hit or miss for long time fans but it shows how versatile the group and Kincheloe can be. Over all, it's a dancey, radio ready hit with great production value and a wide range of

fans but will definitely rake in some new ones.

The album is tied up in a bow with a dance ready, four on the floor track called "You're My Party". Listeners can analyze each layer and find something delicious to soak up. There is a lack of power and edge that would have been the icing on the cake, asserting that Sister Sparrow hasn't completely lost their roots. The only trace of their distinctive horn line is on the final arc of the track which leaves a good taste in the mouth but definitely doesn't feel like dessert, but more like an after dinner salad.

After looking at social media responses to the album, it's fair to say that it was a polarizing move but fans still presented a monumental amount of support for the group. Long time fans should consider this: there's a time and a place for all music. Sister Sparrow has simply created a different sound for a different environment. The group was thoughtful enough to remember their loyal fans and put in a tremendous amount of effort to find a middle ground. Give each song a few listens instead of a one and done. This was an unexpected move for us as well, but after analyzing the songs and speaking with Arleigh Kincheloe, their intentions became clear. And that's something worth supporting them over.

flatten it into a 6-inch disk, wrap it in plastic wrap, and refrigerate for 30 to 60 minutes. You will see small pieces of butter in the dough. This is good and contributes to the flaky texture. The dough is now ready to roll and use in the recipe.

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The tortellini and spinach lends our pairing to this chardonnay from Kendall Jackson.

preferences?

Rob Houk: My kit is a Gretsch Renown Maple with a Pork Pie Lil' Squealer Snare, which is also kind of weird because I play a 12-inch snare as my primary. Cymbals, I break them so often that I just try to find something that sounds good, usually used.

Andy Hogan: It's funny, most drummers will tell you they prefer used cymbals. Like in the Phish documentary, Bittersweet Motel, Jon Fishman has a room just filled with old, somewhat beat up cymbals.

Dave Loss: I randomly watched that clip the other day for some odd reason!

Rob Houk: Yeah, some of that stuff really builds character. Like having dirt, and just the grit and oil that gets on them. Some drummers like to clean them until their just shiny all the time...I don't know, I think that might do them a disservice — that metal is there to develop, it's part of your sound, part of your tone

Andy Hogan: Now the new album [Color Wheel] will be your first studio album since the Best in Show EP. You guys recorded at GCR again, right?

Dave Loss: Yep, with Justin Rose.

Andy Hogan: When I had Mike on the podcast, he had said that you guys studied a lot of musicians and artists, not only their music but also the way they actually recorded. Who were some of those artists?

Dave Loss: Steely Dan was always a huge influence.

Rob Houk: I think we were also looking at some late 90s hard rock albums...some Incubus type stuff.

Evan McPhaden: Even pop material, as well. I feel like in albums in the past, the way we mixed background vocals were kind of loud. I feel like on this one we had more of a lead singer kind of sound. The Beatles, for example, do a lot of very full harmonies that are always upfront.

Dave Loss: Yes! I always love listening to The Beatles before we go into recording...there's so many interesting mix choices, tones, etc.

Andy Hogan: Well in addition to the new album, your fall tour is coming in quick. Is this the biggest headlining tour to date?

Dave Loss: Yes — we're really excited. We have a lot of great support on it too; Mungion, Heavy Pets, Goose, and Elm

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

"Poison" and "B.B.D. (I Thought It Was Me)?" reaching No. 1 on the U.S. Hot/R&B. The three followed with the Platinum-selling 1991 remix "WBBD-Bootcity," and 1993's Gold-Certified "Hootie Mack."

Though the original intent was to have all six members of New Edition perform as a whole on this tour, crowds are still treated to what is essentially Bel Biv DeVoe and Bobby Brown. Bivins reported in May that a trademark issue prevented the group from performing together. Gill and Tresvant, who are not a part of this tour, own the rights to the New Edition name. On his Instagram account, he did not disclose the details, only to state, "We all felt like the victim at times in our long career and sometimes, it rears its head at the wrong time and last year was God's time for us to smell our roses and to do what we do best — Entertain."

Despite the division, the remaining four are looking up. Next year Bel Biv DeVoe start laying down plans to celebrate the 30th anniversary of "Poison," said Bell.

"For us, the magic has never left, it's always been there," said DeVoe, who added that each member of the original New Edition remained in touch through their respective projects and solo careers. "This, right here, feels good. God is amazing, in the way that He puts you with the people who you need to be around for a specific time. You really couldn't dream some of these things up."



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
