Update on marijuana possession policy

ALBANY — Albany County District Attorney P. David Soares announced last week that he will no longer prosecute simple marijuana possession cases.

However, since it is a state and federal crime, that doesn't mean if you have pot in your possession you won't get arrested — or have your stash confiscated by police.

"It is our job in law enforcement to enforce the laws that the legislature has adopted," said Cmdr. Adam Hornick of the Bethlehem Police Department. "Marijuana remains a Schedule I controlled substance and is still illegal federally. Our job is to work with the community and our law enforcement partners to discuss the potential regulation, not legalization of marijuana. We will continue to re-evaluate this policy and incorporate it into our work."

Colonie police feel the same, said Lt. Robert Winn, and will not take an official stand on the new policy. There will also not be a change in how the department polices marijuana crimes.

"The possession of marijuana is illegal, per the New York State Penal Law, and persons found in possession of marijuana will be subject to arrest by the Colonie PD," Winn said.

Soares' new policy will kick in on Dec. 1. Also, his office is accepting applications under a Clean Slate program to have past marijuana possession convictions expunged and is looking to have judges dismiss pending cases that fit a certain criteria.

He said his office will decline to prosecute cases that only involve individuals arrested with less than two ounces of marijuana and that do not have any aggravating factors, like other crimes associated with the arrest.

He said the policy was formulated after a series of public meetings — and solicited input on his website — on what the public thinks should happen as New York moves closer to following other states and legalizes marijuana for recreational use.

The "vast majority" of responses indicated a desire to see a shift in the legal status of recreational adult use marijuana and in the enforcement of existing laws.

The resources spent on prosecuting simple marijuana cases, he said, would be better spent on more serious drug offenses that involve cocaine and opioids like heroin and beefing up the prosecution of Driving While Ability Impaired by Drugs, including marijuana.

"As the war on marijuana comes to an end, the District Attorney's Office has an important role in play in the process. In order to ease the transition into market

regulated marijuana, we will be adopting a new policy on how to deal with low-level marijuana cases in courts throughout Albany County," commented DA David Soares. "We will also be strengthening our vehicular crimes DWI policies to include Driving While Ability Impaired by Drugs, to best serve the public safety needs of our county residents and the thousands of drivers who traverse the many thoroughfares in and out of our jurisdiction on a daily basis."

Driving under the influence marijuana is one of the aggravating factors mentioned above and if a person is charged with a marijuana offense in connection with a DWAI-drugs charge, the marijuana offense will stand and be prosecuted.

It also doesn't mean a person can walk down the street smoking a joint or smoke a joint while riding in a car. It too does not apply to smoking or consuming cannabis in the presence of children.

There are currently 10 states and the District of Columbia that allow recreational marijuana for people over 21 years old — Alaska, California, Colorado, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nevada, Oregon, Vermont and Washington. Several others, including New York state, have legalized marijuana for medicinal purposes. Just 16 states have not changed marijuana laws or regulations.

Possession of marijuana, though, remains a federal crime and individually states cannot technically legalize it even for medicinal purposes. While states can, though, make it legal under state statutes, it would take an act of Congress to make it not a crime at all.

How Soares new policy will be accepted by the courts is an open question. In New Jersey, the attorney general said the individual district attorneys cannot unilaterally dismiss laws still on the books.

Rather, New Jersey Attorney General Gurbir Grewal, recommends the DAs consider the "collateral damage" a conviction could mean to each individual, according to a story on the "Governing website, a publication that caters to state and local municipalities. Such damage could mean a defendant's ability to find a job, get into school or even get a loan.

"The goal should be to achieve individual justice in individual cases," Grewal said in a nine-page memo addressed to all of New Jersey's county and municipal prosecutors that "Governing cited.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo has held a series of informational meetings mostly in New York City to gauge public sentiment on the idea of legalizing marijuana statewide and

\$16.8M to improve water plant

BETHLEHEM — The Town Board voted unanimously to award the construction contracts for the Clapper Road Water Treatment Plant improvement project during its Nov. 14 meeting.

The town received bids for the project, which was broken into three separate contracts, back on Sept. 28. and ultimately selected the lowest bidder for each one.

For general construction under Contract 1A, the Waterford-based Jensen Construction Group, LLC submitted a bid of \$15.1 million. For mechanical construction under Contract 1B, H.T. Lyons, Inc., from Allentown, Pennsylvania, bid \$795,400. For electrical construction under Contract 1C, Stilsing Electric, Inc. of Rensselaer won the contract with a bid of \$870,000.

Overall, the total low bid would be around \$16.8 million. George Kansas, the town's Commissioner of Public Works, noted that the town had been awarded a \$3 million grant from the state to help offset some of the project's costs.

When asked by Town Supervisor David VanLuven why the bid numbers have come out much higher than what the town had expected when the project was put out for bid, Kansas said, "The belief is that we're facing a really uncertain construction market right now. Material costs have gone up drastically, especially when it comes to things like structural steel and this project has a lot of steel in it, and concrete, and other pieces of equipment used during construction. I think that's a part of it.

"I've been talking to other engineering firms, not just our current ones, and say, 'Hey, by the way, what have you seen lately with some projects that have gone out to bid?' And they've seen the same type of uncertainty and higher numbers than they'd anticipated. So, I think the market is kind of in this really weird point where the costs are being driven up."

The reason the plant required improvements was because one of its four sampling sites—at Wemple Road—had been found to violate the Environmental Protection Agency's Stage 2 Disinfectants/Disinfection Byproducts Rule.

This rule monitors the levels of trihalomethanes (TTHM) which is a by-product of drinking water chlorination—Bethlehem's drinking water is disinfected with chlorine to eliminate bacteria and prevent waterborne diseases like typhoid and cholera.

Over 80 parts per billion of TTHM is deemed unsafe by the EPA. TTHM is a chemical compound that gets dangerous when there's chlorine in a water supply which could lead to risks of cancer and reproductive issues. As the Public Works department found out in its "Annual Drinking Water Quality Report for 2017" that there are 92.3 parts per billion of TTHM at the Wemple Road sampling site, the EPA has issued an Administrative Order to the town to solve this.

Kansas emphasized before the Town Board and public attendees that Bethlehem's water issues are not the same as the crises of Flint, Michigan and Hoosick Falls. Residents need not seek alternative sources of water like bottled water as this is not an emergency, since Kansas said that long-term exposure to TTHM over many years is dangerous, but not in the short term.

The plant's improvements would consist of a new pretreatment building and upgrades to the current Clapper Road facility system, including a new dissolved air floatation facility, and upgrades to the current basin pumps at the plant's Filter Building for raw water transmission. The EPA has mandated that the plant's improvements be completed before Nov. 2019.

2019 town budget approved

BETHLEHEM — The Town Board approved the town's proposed 2019 budget during its Nov. 14 meeting.

The 2019 \$43.1 million budget is roughly a 3.1 percent, or \$1.3 million, increase from 2018's \$41.7 million. Using a home valued at \$260,000, town residents will pay on average \$8,890.07 in property taxes, \$993.91 or 11 percent of which on average is earmarked to pay for town services, such as maintaining parks, roads and sidewalks; providing water service; collecting sewage; and covering the costs of programs available to its senior citizen residents.

The \$993.91 amount for 2019 is \$15.51 more than 2018's \$978.40. It will be prorated across the General Fund (\$227.93), Highway Fund (\$444.59), Water Fund (\$136.97), Sewer Fund (\$101.82), and EMS (\$82.60).

The 2019 tax rate is 3.82 percent, which is a 1.58 percent increase from 2018's 3.76 percent tax rate. The tax levy is \$14.5 million, \$400,000 more than 2018's \$14.1 million. The tax cap, originally developed in 2012, is at 2 percent in 2019 for the first time since 2013, marking a rise from 2018's 1.84 percent.

Overall, the final budget was largely similar to the original proposal Town Comptroller Michael Cohen presented to the Town Board on Sept. 26. Both versions end with the same \$43.1 million figure although the amounts of certain line items were adjusted so as to not increase or decrease the overall budget. The original and final figures for the wages and overtime expenses and fringe benefits lines are the only amounts that differ between the two versions of the budget.

First, the two Town Justice salaries were amended to compensate for the positions' requirement of being on-call 24-hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Second, a provision was made to allow a specific parttime employee who works all year long for more than 20 hours a week to receive full-time benefits.

Following the budget's adoption, Town Supervisor David VanLuven thanked Cohen, chief accountants Cherie Gitto and Theresa Amodeo, and all relevant staff members. "Well done, everyone for putting together this careful, responsible budget," he said.

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

BPD now equipped with EMS kits

BETHLEHEM — The Bethlehem Police Department and Delmar-Bethlehem EMS have once again joined forces, this time to provide each police vehicle with a kit containing first aid and other emergency supplies, to better equip police officers to save lives and improve emergency response time.

During a press event held on Tuesday, Nov. 13 at the Delmar-Bethlehem EMS Selkirk station at 1121 U.S. Route 9W, Bethlehem Police Chief Louis G. Corsi and Delmar-Bethlehem EMS Chief and Chief Operating Officer Steven Kroll presented three of the 25 kits, further reinforcing the two departments' strong partnership.

"We have great cooperation with Bethlehem EMS," said Corsi. "I can't speak enough about their generosity. These kits are phenomenal and I certainly hope they make great use of them."

Each kit contains a variety of supplies including a pair of trauma shears, a CPR mask with wipe, four tourniquets, a rescue blanket, and tape. "Small cuts can happen too," said Kroll, gesturing at the box of Band-Aids which would remedy that.

Having these kits in police vehicles ultimately benefits the victims, as Kroll noted that police often arrive at the scene two to three minutes before emergency medical and fire department personnel do, because they may have already been patrolling nearby.

He added that all town police officers are trained in first aid and can therefore provide the victim with the medical attention he or she needs that much

sooner, leading to the overall improvement of emergency response times.

"If somebody's heart stops, all the police cars on the road have defibrillators and police officers can arrive early to give CPR and use them," said Kroll. "These kits are filled with trauma supplies, so if somebody has severe bleeding, the police now have the supplies they need to help and stop the bleeding."

He added that this effort is part of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Stop the Bleed campaign, a national initiative which seeks to "encourage bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives." Bystanders are considered to be the first on the scene before police or EMS arrive, and if they know how to properly tend to an injured victim, it could help save more lives.

The police's new emergency supply kits cost between \$2,000 to \$3,000 overall and were paid for by Delmar-Bethlehem EMS, according to Kroll. Whenever used, they will be replenished immediately.

When asked about the possibility of running out of supplies if reporting to a

Be wary of quick-change requests

Police issue warning as string of incidents affect local stores in recent months

BETHLEHEM — Bethlehem police have identified a 28-year-old man suspect of committing quick-change offenses not only throughout the Capital District, but elsewhere in the state, the commonwealth of Massachusetts, and even abroad in the United Kingdom.

Traian Sava, originating from the Woodside neighborhood in Queens, was arrested on Tuesday, Nov. 13 by Long Island Fugitive Operations from the Department of Homeland Security in Central Islip, a hamlet in Suffolk County.

In the press release issued by Bethlehem police the next day, Cmdr. Adam Hornick indicated that quick-change offenses occur when "a subject approaches a store clerk and hands them several bills, usually high

denominations of currency, and asks for change into smaller denominations of currency."

He also explained that once the clerk gives the smaller bill amounts to the subject, he or she conceals some of that money and either requests to negate the overall transaction, or conduct yet another exchange for another series of different denominations.

With each subsequent exchange, the subject conceals more money before he or she eventually exits the store.

Bethlehem police reported that such incidents, described by Hornick as "one of the oldest types of financial cons and swindles," have occurred across Delmar and Glenmont stores in the past few months.

Sava was identified as a suspect during a joint investigation between Bethlehem Police, State Police, the Department of Homeland Security, and even the Northumbria police in the United Kingdom. The latter patrol the Northumberland, and Tyne and Wear counties in the northeastern areas of England.

He was charged with a scheme to defraud in the first degree, a felony, and petit larceny, a misdemeanor.

He was processed at the Bethlehem Police Department, arraigned in Town Court before Judge Ryan T. Donovan, and remanded to the Albany County jail in lieu of \$30,000 bail.

He is scheduled to reappear in Town Court on Tuesday, Dec. 4, at 4 p.m.

Looking ahead to the busy holiday shopping season, the Bethlehem police has offered these six precautions in its press release to help businesses prevent such offenses from happening:

- Establish internal policies to address currency exchange requests without purchases
- Count money twice after each exchange to ensure the amount exchanged was equal
- Deny any second currency exchange unless the subject purchases something
- Ask for identification if the subject does not make a purchase but requests an exchange
- Instruct the subject to count out the money before the clerk
- Acknowledge that quick-change offenses do occur

Comprehensive plan forums' schedule set

BETHLEHEM — Planning Division Director Robert Leslie has released the schedule for the public forums regarding the development of the town's updated comprehensive plan.

Appearing at the Wednesday, Nov. 14, Town Board meeting, Leslie said that each forum, occurring in seven of the town's hamlets, will provide town residents with an opportunity to discuss the issues and concerns the plan should focus on.

These public forums have long been touted as part of the new comprehensive plan's development process so that residents can better inform town officials about what issues, highlights and goals each hamlet has, while also ensuring that the plan focuses on the town as a whole, not just the hamlet of Delmar.

Issues likely to be discussed during these forums include the rise in local traffic, zoning laws, infrastructure improvements, water and sewer maintenance, pedestrian

State senate goes blue by majority

Reflecting on the Election Day results

ALBANY COUNTY

— It's something Sen. Neil Breslin has been waiting for — his party has a solid majority in the state's upper chamber.

And this time it is a solid majority, unlike a decade ago when the Democrats took control by a two-seat majority. In 2009, Breslin's fellow party members — namely Sens Pedro Espada and Hiram Monserrate — were more concerned with their own agenda than that of the party and sided with the 30 Republican Senators to replace Democratic Majority Leader Malcolm Smith with Republican Dean Skelos.

In an ironic twist of fate, Espada, Monseratte, Smith and Skelos were

He said he will support Sen. Andrew Stewart Cousins, the current caucus leader from Yonkers.

"She is a good leader, she knows the state, upstate and down and she is ethical, honest and strong," he said. I can't ask for anything more and it's nice to break records and have the first woman majority leader and Day by beating Christopher the first African American woman majority leader."

Breslin is a senior member of the caucus and said he will stay on the Insurance Committee, where he has served for 18 years and has built a national reputation — he is the longest serving president of the National Conference of Insurance Legislators.

He will also likely play a role in the Finance and Rules committees where money is allocated and laws are drafted and re-drafted before ultimately getting forwarded for a vote on the

The chaos that engulfed the state Senate in 2009 continued for a decade, with no strong leader at the helm and the Republicans maintaining control only with the help of a rogue Brooklynn Democrat, Simcha Felder, and a group calling themselves the Independent Democratic Conference.

Come January, there will be 15 new members of the caucus. Six of the eight IDC members were defeated during this last election cycle and the Senate Democrats are united for the first time in recent memory.

"I will try to help them get off to a good start and help them get acclimated to Albany without any major flaws," Breslin said of the rookies in the chamber.

Asked what advice he will give a rookie looking to hit the ground running, Breslin said: "Be deliberate. Go slowly. We are not going to change the system in a day. Take a slow, gradual participation in the

process and by the end of the year we can accomplish more than has been accomplished in several decades."

The agenda

Of those accomplishments high on Breslin's list include bills to make voting easier and more accessible like giving voters the opportunity to vote early like other states and to vote by absentee without the strict regulations governing that practice now. And ending the infamous LLC loophole, a section of Election Law that allows special interest groups to circumvent contribution limits and disclosure requirement and funnel millions of dollars into campaign war chests.

Others include the Child Victim's Act, a bill that would extend the statute of limitations on certain crimes against children including sex abuse, and extending and protecting the Women's Health and Wellness Act, which would require his role on the Insurance Committee that perhaps puts New York's law at odds with that of D.C.

Also, he wants to play a role in redistricting, the redrawing of lines based on the once-a-decade Census. On the one hand, it is seen as crucial to giving people living in legislative districts equitable representation in Albany, and on the other making races easier for political parties depending on which voters are included in which districts.

Pay raises for legislators, he said, would likely get voted down by the electorate by a wide margin, but that decision is now up to an "independent" body appointed by the governor called the New York State Compensation Committee, which is expected to rule on Dec. 10.

"It's been 19 years and you don't want to get to the point of not attracting good people, number one, and two you want to make sure they are able to support their families and not be tempted to doing something they should not do," he said. "There shouldn't be a quid pro quo. The Legislature shouldn't have to do something to get a raise.

The last time legislators got a bump to their \$79,500 salary was in 1999. Two years ago it was in the works but Gov. Andrew Cuomo tried to add restrictions to outside income so it fell through.

Absolute power...

As the adage goes, "absolute power corrupts absolutely" but Breslin said he still expects there to be a two-party system in New York and expects there will be debates. But, he said, things should go smoother.

"There are still two parties and there will be debates but hopefully there will be things that couldn't be taken up because the Republicans would not bring them to a floor," he said. "And the thing is, once they do get to the floor they pass with near unanimous support and many Republicans vote for

Having a different party control one of the houses has served governors well over the years and allowed them an out, so to speak, when a controversial measure would mean upsetting certain parts of the state when they need to run state-wide. Gov. George Pataki often blamed the Democratically controlled Assembly for such things while Cuomo did the same with the Republicans in the Senate.

Now, though, it's all

(b) the payment of interest to be due and payable in such year. An appropriation annual shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. The annual installments shall payable over a period of twenty-five (25) years from the year of issuance of the bonds.

Are you there? Help!

"The infrastructure has not kept up with the technology," said Legislator Joe O'Brien, D-Colonie. "The use of the cell phone has changed. It is no longer just a phone. We use it with apps, social media, email, texting and all that has affected the infrastructure. Now the towers that were put up in the early 2000s are overwhelmed by this additional activity. As a result, many of our phones have been lost in space."

The purpose of the study is to identify weak coverage areas, collect and analyze call data, solicit public input and make recommendations on how to make cell coverage better.

Apple will hold public hearings, meet with cellular carriers and their respective regulatory agencies and talk to public and private entities which may have existing cellular infrastructure or technology to identity how to improve and enhance existing cellular service.

"Cellular service in much of Colonie is terrible, with dropped calls and poor reception a threat to public safety," said Legislator Paul Burgdorf, R-Colonie, "With many residents dropping land lines and relying exclusively on cell phones, we need reliable cell phone service to contact fire, police and emergency medical services."

The legislators said they had received inquiries from residents, emergency personnel and business owners in their districts of Latham, Loudonville and West Albany about how to improve cell service, especially along Old Niskayuna Road, Albany Shaker Road and Route 9. A map was displayed with an outline of where most cell service issues occur and it is dubbed the Bermuda Triangle — roughly an area between the Northway and Route

155 to the north, Shaker Road to the west and Route 9 to the east where there is a 50 percent chance of completing a call and if it is completed it is gargled and broken up.

The plan is to have the Sheriff's public outreach document other areas in the county where cell service must be improved.

Chairman of the Legislature Andrew Joyce, D-Bethlehem said cell service in his hometown needs improving also.

"To us, this is a huge public safety issue, especially if people are trying to contact 911," he said. "We are fortunate to have a strong partnership with the sheriff who can bring vital resources to address this

Apple said the county does have a \$20 million state-of-the-art interoperable radio system to connect police, fire and EMS.

"The other part of the puzzle — cell connection — is where our problems lie," he said. "So we need to figure out how to make that better. We know we have the right systems in place but we have to get the cell providers to be able to enhance their connectivity."

Local emergency personnel have also raised concerns, stating the Colonie area receives over 30,000 emergency calls each year, half of which are from cell phones.

"It is our responsibility to respond," said Shaker Road Loudonville Fire Department Chief Patrick O'Connor. "That is our job and that is what we do. Without good cell service we can't do that."

Their houses are conveniently located across the street from each other, making it a little easier to fit the 30 family members who are in for the holiday. As soon as my parents get out of work the day that school break starts we are on the road to Grandad's house and all the excitement begins.

Last year my immediate family was the last group of Vails to arrive. As soon as we got out of the car we were welcomed by my cousins Nathan and Aaron. Nathan and my brother Jamie are both two years older than me, and Aaron is two years older than the both of them, so naturally, he is the ringleader of our group. Thanksgiving wouldn't be the same without the four of us getting together and having crazy, fun, and mostly stupid ideas of the different ways we should amuse ourselves. One year

we decided it would be a great idea to have a Red Sox vs Yankees rival fight inside my great aunt's house. We jumped from bed to bed tackling each other and yelling insults, but Aaron had decided to take the fight to a whole new level.

As Jamie went to go tackle Nathan, Aaron whipped out a sandbag and hit Jamie as hard as he could with it. The sandbag exploded causing sand to go everywhere! We were all silent for a second, and then everyone burst into laughter for a solid five minutes. Pretty soon we realized that we should clean up the mess to avoid getting in trouble, but it was too late. Aaron and Nathan's dad had opened the door to check in on us, and we knew by his expression that it would be the last time we were allowed to play rough inside the house.

My dad grew up in Rochester, and he always loves to take my cousins and I out exploring on Pinnacle Hill. Pinnacle Hill is located on the north end of Hemingway Drive; my dad used to climb up while exploring or hanging out with his friends back when he was in high school. When we were younger my cousins and I used to pretend that we were adventurers searching a new land as we would climb up the hill,

which seemed as big as a mountain at the time. We would try to be stealthy as we climbed not knowing what we would encounter in the woods, and even the crackle of leaves under my feet could cause my cousins to shush me. brother tripped and fell into the mud, covering himself head to toe. For the rest of that game I ran my hardest to get away from his muddy hands. Around 6 o'clock we usually get dinner started, and with 30 family members, there is always a struggle to find enough places for everyone to sit. Usually, we have three tables; one for the older family members, and two for the middle-aged members. We don't have a kids table anymore because for most Thanksgivings I am the youngest one there, and I'm 17 years old now. All of the food is amazing but every year I'm looking forward to the mashed potatoes and gravy, and there is always more than enough for everyone to eat.

After everyone has had their fair share of food it's time for dessert. As the counter is cleared

the pies are brought out, and they are every flavor anyone could ever need, apple, pumpkin, raspberry, blueberry, banana, and grape. My personal favorite is a slice of pumpkin pie with one scoop of vanilla ice cream. As everyone eats their dessert, the focus of the family is shifted into the living room where Dad and Dove get out their guitars and the whole family sings songs for hours. As this is going on Nathan and I sneak off to the garage where my great aunt keeps her fireworks. At 92-yearsold her favorite thing to do is set off fireworks, so every year Nathan and I continue to create a firework show. After we finish the fireworks it is usually pretty late so most people head to sleep. The next few days are just as fun and packed as the first days of our vacation, but sure enough, the worst part of Thanksgiving always comes, saying goodbye. My family always leaves on the Sunday after Thanksgiving because I have school on Monday and my parents have work. As we drive out of Rochester I think about all the memories I had just made, and I start to get excited for the next Vail Family Thanksgiving.

Marijuana

now that the Democrats have the majority in the state Senate, it could happen here sooner rather than later.

For the past decade the chamber has been run by Republicans, who were cool to the idea.

With any sort of regulation that comes with a change in state law comes the government's ability to tax it.

"When you legalize it, you can regulate it. You can have revenue. You can dictate who sells it," Gov. Andrew Cuomo is quoted as saying in September.

The governor was also against using marijuana for medicinal purposes but signed a law permitting its use with a doctor's recommendation in 2014.

A poll by Quinnipiac University found some 63 percent of New Yorkers support allowing adults to possess small amounts of marijuana for personal use.

The state Department of Health also conducted a study that culminated with the recommendation of legalizing it in this state.

"The positive effects of regulating an adult (21 and over) marijuana market in NYS outweigh the potential negative impacts," according to the document released in July. "Harm reduction principles can and should be incorporated into a regulated marijuana program to help ensure consumer and industry safety.'

Typically the pros of legalization include the ability of government to control sale the product and raise million in tax revenue.

Cons include the belief marijuana is a gateway drug that will lead to heavier drugs like cocaine or heroin, driving or other activities become more dangerous after ingesting marijuana, and the fact smoking it, the most popular way of ingesting the drug, is not healthy.

The state Legislature will be back in session early in

major event that may have many fatalities, such as a school shooting or natural disaster, Bethlehem Police Cmdr. Adam Hornick said, "We'll always be prepared and we won't run out of them.'

Kroll said, "We are all—the PD, the Fire Department, the county sheriff, paramedics, and DelmarBethlehem EMS-engaged in preparation.

"We have the equipment to respond to incidents with major casualties and certainly in today's world, we're spending more time preparing for those things. I'm hoping it will never happen, but we're ready if they do."

Corsi also expressed his support of supplying each police vehicle with an emergency supplies kit.

"We're grateful for these supplies and if we can mitigate a crisis or

emergency until the EMS [arrives] on the scene, then we're going to do everything that we can so I hope this is a step forward for all of us.'

Kroll concluded by saying that the kits had already been distributed across all Bethlehem police vehicles as of that day.

"Our hope is that even if we save one life, that's a big accomplishment."

Breslin

Democrats.

"I think it will be OK," Breslin said of the new relationship parameters between his caucus and the governor.

"He has acted in a progressive way over the last year and I think if he continues in that vein he will be easier to get along with. He won't have to twist our arms because we want many of the same things as he wants. When we agree with him he will love us. When not, probably not so much."

Battle scars

As for the Rogue Democrats who helped keep the Republican in power for the last decade, Breslin

said he would welcome Felder back into the fold, but on par with one of the freshmen rather than four-term

And the IDC is non-existent, Breslin said with perhaps a bit of satisfaction.

They did spend hundreds of thousands of dollars in an effort to beat him by backing the now mayor of Cohoes, Shawn Morse in a 2012 primary. Breslin won with 70 percent of the vote.

It is not the first time people in high places have tried to take him

The Republicans, when Majority Leader Joe Bruno was running the Senates, convinced Albany County Comptroller Mike Conners to switch parties and run against him in 2004.

Breslin won with a 20-point margin.




of Cohoes on a number of fronts including allegations of domestic abuse and for questions regarding outside employment and Conners is retiring at the end of his term.



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

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

Back to the Bennets

Imagined sequel to 'Pride and Prejudice' takes to the Capital Repertory stage this week

irst printed in 1813, Jane Austen's "Pride and Prejudice" has since been dubbed the original romcom. Fitting to today's sensibility it is only appropriate that an imagined sequel should hit the stage.

This Friday, Nov. 23, Lauren Gunderson's "Miss Bennet: Christmas at Pemberley" opens a one-month run at the Capital Repertory Theatre. The play, written more than 200 years after Austen's original work, is a continuation of the story involving the beloved Bennet sisters — Jane, Elizabeth, Kitty, Lydia and Mary.

"It's very, very bright and witty and fun and charming. It totally has Jane Austen's voice in it even though it's not Jane Austen," said Caroline Whelehan, who stars as Jane Bingley. Gunderson reintroduces audiences to the Bennets, the Bingleys and the Darcys two years later.

Unlike with Pride, the focus of attention is now placed on middle sister Mary. Mary has grown tired of her role as the dutiful daughter and dreams of forging a new path. When the Bennets gather at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Darcy for the holidays, an unexpected encounter brings about the possibility of an intellectual match and maybe even love for her. "Everybody is a little more sophisticated now. They've grown into this new life."

For Whelehan, stepping into the role of an Austen

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period piece is a particular holiday treat. Spending the holidays in Albany is becoming a habit for the stage actress. First, there is the prospect of jumping onto a flight back home to California just before Christmas, which she has done twice before since her Capital Rep debut in "The Secret Garden" four years ago. It is also, however, her second role since appearing in "Sense and Sensibility."

"I love the writing," said Whelehan. "The characters are so loveable. I can absolutely identify with them." Though the characters live in the early 1800s, the familial bond between the sisters is "timeless." Whelehan has a younger brother as her only sibling, but she said she is still able to relate to the Bennets.

"I have a couple of friends who I've known since I was a young teen, and we're still really really close," she said. "I was just telling one of them on the phone the other day, since I don't have any sisters, I've been pulling from my relationships with them... They're so dear to me, I consider them my sisters."

Now, as the actress calls New York City her home, and has been for a little more than a year, she's able to draw from the experience of being away from her "sisters" to her performance on stage.

Life in New York City has called for its own need for adjustments in Whelehan's life. The hustle of living within a New York Minute while under constrained to public transportation "is definitely a beast of its own," she said.

"Luckily, I'm the type that likes a fast-paced environment like that," Whelehan said. "But, it's a huge adjustment from where I grew up. But, luckily I have friends from California in the city, so that helps, too. We're on the same wavelength. We sort of have that and connect in that way. That makes it easier."

In Albany, the California native has been able to find a slice of home.

"My favorite place — this is embarrassing — my favorite place to go is Honest Weight Food Co-op," said Whelehan. The cast has been rehearsing since October, and she said she's already shown the coop off to a few of her castmates. A self-professed "health freak," she said loves being able to find her favorite vegan snacks. "I love that they have kombucha on tap."

The cast recently got together for a movie night. The picture of choice, of course, was "Pride and Prejudice." "It invites you to be open and loving," said Whelehan. A common thread that has woven into many aspects of her present life spent in the Capital District. Working on a production that takes place during Christmas, and doing so since October, will do that. She admitted to running on the treadmill the other day while listening to Christmas music, "because I'm totally in the spirit.

"But, you know, the spirit of Christmas doesn't always have to be trees and presents and crazy music," she said. "It can be this warmth. The warmth in a room, the willingness to be open and to love. I think that is the spirit that has been brought to our cast, too."



hanksgiving roast turkey may garner most of the attention this time of year, but turkey can be prepared in many different ways as well.

Turkey takes on the flavor of other ingredients in a recipe. As a result, turkey often can be substituted for chicken, pork and even beef in many meals.

This recipe for "Spicy Lime and Cilantro Turkey Fajitas," courtesy of The National Turkey Federation, makes for a flavorful dish that turkey lovers are sure to enjoy. Control the level of heat by adjusting the amount of cayenne pepper and green chilies to taste. This recipe calls for turkey tenderloin, but it can be equally delicious using leftover roasted turkey as well.

Spicy Lime and Cilantro Turkey Fajitas

Ingredients: Makes 4 servings

- tablespoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon onion salt
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon fennel seeds, crushed
- teaspoon dried thyme 1/2
- 1/4 teaspoon white pepper
- pound turkey tenderloin, butterflied 1
- lime, squeezed for juice
- cup nonfat sour cream 1
- cup thinly sliced green onions
- cup finely chopped fresh cilantro
- can (4 ounces) green chiles, drained
- plum tomato, seeded and finely chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- teaspoon cayenne pepper 1/4
- large pita rounds
- cup shredded lettuce 1/2

Instructions:

In a shallow flat dish, combine the paprika, onion salt, garlic powder, cayenne pepper, fennel, thyme, and white pepper. Rub mixture over the turkey; cover and refrigerate for one hour.

Prepare grill for direct-heat cooking. Grill the turkey, 4 inches from the heat, 5 to 6 minutes per side, turning the turkey tenderloin halfway through the grilling time. Cook until a food thermometer registers 165° F in the thickest part of the tenderloin.

Place on a clean serving plate and squeeze the lime juice over the tenderloin. Slice the turkey, crosswise, on the diagonal into 1/4-inch slices.

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine the sour cream, onions, cilantro, chilies, tomato, black pepper, and cayenne pepper.

Fill each pita half with the turkey and top with the cilantro sauce. Add shredded lettuce.



Neighborhood Of Make Believe's 'Two Nighttimes'

ake the attitude of Dr. Dog, the horn line spice of Cake, and the essentials for a modern folk group and you get Neighborhood of Make Believe. Okay, that's a very general statement but there's a lot of experimentation going on in NOMB's debut album, so it's hard to say what the band's sound is exactly flowing, warm and washy are definitely some constants. That being said, listeners will have to cull through the 12-track collection to find something they like, but it's still worth giving a listen to from beginning to end. The band dropped songs strategically throughout the album so it's a bit of a roller coaster which will hold the listener's interest. Maybe not one with corkscrews and loops, rather a traditional wooden one with some exciting drops and

Songs like "Track Name's," "Fairness" and "Thin Soup" are easy going, slow moving and have a great sense of peacefulness. The immediate emotion isn't sadness – it's only until listeners dive into the lyrics of the track do they then understand the direction and purpose of the song. I suppose that is true to most songs in this genre but they've found a well working formula and they stick to it, creating an engaging album when combined with the following contrary

We find more energetic and multilavered tracks like "When Willem's Wife Was Wet" that add some flavor to

the album. "Willem's Wife" has the most depth and direction in the collection and it's something this group should definitely try to reproduce incoming works. Instrumentation is crisper and clearer, movements are well defined - it's muchneeded separation as well as mood booster from the other, lower energy tracks.

"Faces" is worth dissecting as well. Some might say it's lacking in direction but it's just omnidirectional. It's ominous, then jovial, hopeful and open - it's just interesting. It's not necessarily catchy but is definitely fun to listen to. The chord progressions are bizarre and just blend into each other enough to create a unique atmosphere.

Things get more interesting as we're introduced to a western, backwoods feel in "Traveling Standing Still." Complex guitar work, odd time signatures, and a super catchy bridge/ chorus create another fantastic space with loads of potential and direction, although the song drops off without any sort of climax. Still one of the coolest works on the album.

The remainder of the tracks reflects the band's style at the beginning of the album which is a bit of a letdown, to be honest. The prior three tracks were highly engaging, unique and just plain fun to listen to. It would be music to our ears if we could hear these guys come back with another album following the abstract sounds found in "Standing Still", "Faces" and "Willems Wife." Die-hard indie/ folk lovers will enjoy this collection for sure. Give it a once over and you'll find several things to enjoy.



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

Goodnight, Sir

The legendary comic book writer, editor, publisher and cameo virtuoso died on Monday, Nov. 12, at the age of 95, after revealing he'd been battling pneumonia earlier this February.

Lee was a visionary who saw the benefits of establishing partnerships between the comic book and various entertainment industries, including television, film, gaming and merchandise during his eight-decade career. He notably collaborated with fellow co-writers and artists Jack Kirby and Steve Ditko, both of whom have also died, and led to the birth of many landmark characters in Marvel Comics' ever-growing pantheon.

This has caused popular characters including Spider-Man, Iron Man, Thor,





"I can't relate much to Superman or Batman since one's an alien and the other's a billionaire, but you can relate to Spidey more because he has to pay rent, has girlfriend problems and has to take care of Aunt May. From the '70s to now, we can still relate to those issues. It's like Stan Lee and Jack Kirby were in their New York City offices and looked out and imagined Spider-Man swinging by can go to Hell's Kitchen and Manhattan, and it's like you could see Spider-Man swinging across the skyline."

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

Ayers revealed that Death Wish Coffee's new Ballston Spa studio includes a decorated wall filled with past guests and framed signed comic books. One of those comic books is 1963's *The Amazing Spider-Man* #93 issue which Lee himself signed, "but I never met him," he noted.

Death Wish Coffee has also entered the comic book market with its own "Odinforce" comic, a fantastical story about a crew of Vikings searching for the mythical Odinforce, hence the name, which debuted in April 2016. Ayers indicates that the series' third issue will come out by the end of this year.

Ayers said that the public now lives in a "Geek Renaissance" because reading comic books and enjoying comic book-inspired properties are more socially accepted as compared to past decades. This was aided by the immense success of the films and TV series both within and before the Marvel Cinematic Universe, and its related marketing and gaming.

"When I was a kid, I was beaten up and ridiculed for reading comic books," he recalled. "But now it's the opposite. If you're not into comic books or Marvel stuff, you're the nerd."

Elsewhere, Herb "DW" Cloutier—the Glens Falls-based owner, program

director, producer and co-host of several podcasts on the Earplug Podcast Network and Fanboys, Inc. which have focused on subjects such as comic books, entertainment and pop culture—admitted that Lee's passing was "bound to happen, as sad as that's to say, and we all thought he could outlive all of us and live forever."

He recalled that he did meet Lee in person at a comic convention several years ago. While he wasn't exactly sure what the event was or when it took place, he did remember that "he was very nice and genuine."

He similarly echoed Ayers' "Geek Renaissance" statement by saying that Lee was like the ambassador for comic books, its pop culture movement and "the geeks and nerds" who rallied by it. "He stood up for us when it wasn't cool back in the day," he said. "Now, it's accepted and mainstream. Before, it was just a segmented small part of society."

While both enjoy DC Comics too, Ayers and Cloutier individually agreed that Marvel succeeded more because its characters, location settings and storylines were more relatable and accessible to the public.

"I can't relate much to Superman or Batman since one's an alien and the other's a billionaire, but you can relate to Spidey more because he has to pay rent, has girlfriend problems and has to take care of Aunt May. From the '70s to now, we can still relate to those issues," Cloutier explained. "It's like Stan Lee and Jack Kirby were in their New York City offices and looked out and imagined Spider-Man swinging by

or Daredevil in Hell's Kitchen. And vou can go to Hell's Kitchen and Manhattan, and it's like you could see Spider-Man swinging across the skyline.

He added that while fighting supervillains is fun, what makes the heroes such accessible characters is how they go through hard times like raising a family, facing marriage troubles, and addressing social issues such as racism, sexism and acceptance.

Meanwhile, Ayers said, "I gravitated more to Marvel as a kid because Marvel seemed like the reality as it was set in reality. Heroes were all swinging across actual places in New York City that I can go and see. I had to suspend that disbelief in DC Comics as they were set in fictional places like Metropolis and Gotham. But Marvel is like, '34th Street is where Spider-Man fought the Hulk,' and you can go there and check it out yourself and imagine it."

When asked about their favorite Stan Lee cameo on any Marvel property which Lee is famous for, Ayers first brought up his comical appearance as a FedEx delivery man in 2016's "Captain America: Civil War" where he mispronounced Iron Man/ Tony Stark's name as "Tony Stank." He also enjoyed Lee's cameo in the original 2002 "Spider-Man" film in which he pulled villain for everybody."

a little girl away from a falling piece of debris while the titular hero and the Green Goblin were battling above.

Cloutier said he had many favorites himself but specifically recalled Lee as a mail carrier named Willie Lumpkin in the 2005 "Fantastic Four" movie "because it was one of his first real cameos."

Before his passing, Lee had filmed and recorded cameos in a few upcoming projects indluding "Ralph Breaks the Internet," "Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse," "Captain Marvel" and aptly, the fourth Avengers film, which would be a bittersweet send-off for audiences.

Cloutier believes that while Lee may be gone, "he'll always be with us no matter where we are, whether it's reading comics, watching the movies or traveling through Manhattan."

Ayers said that he hopes more people would read comic books because all the Marvel films, TV series and gaming stemmed from them and it's one way to celebrate Lee's role as a champion for the comic book industry. "Support your local comic book stores like Saratoga's Comic Depot. That's where I get my comics."

He concluded, "There's a hero and
