Plug Power opens new manufacturing plant at Slingerlands'Vista Tech Park

SLINGERLANDS — Roughly 10 months after it broke ground, Plug Power opened the doors to its 350,000-square-foot facility to politicians and community leaders - including U.S. Sen. Charles Schumer and Gov. Kathy Hochul - in a ribbon-cutting ceremony on Thursday, Jan. 12.

Plug Power's newest manufacturing facility, located at the Vista Technology Campus in Slingerlands, is already operational and producing the company's line of GenDrive fuel cell systems. Since the company first announced its interest in building the facility at the park in November 2021, it has carried the promise of creating more than 1,600 new green jobs.

One-man crime spree in Albany, Saratoga Counties

COLONIE — A

Schenectady man arrested for stealing a vehicle, then crashing it into a Colonie police patrol car on December 19, is the suspect in a weeks-long crime spree in the Capital

Sylvester Flora, 26, of Schenectady, allegedly smashed windows on vehicles to access credit cards and cash, then quickly purchased gift cards and merchandise with the cards at local businesses.

"In at least one instance, he stole the actual vehicle because the keys were left inside," Colonie police Lt Dan Belles said. "When we located that stolen vehicle in Niskayuna, Mr. Flora purposely struck one of our police vehicles attempting to flee the scene."

Flora was apprehended after a brief foot chase in that incident.

Colonie police arrested and charged him with criminal possession of stolen property over

\$3,000, grand larceny, identity theft, burglary, conspiracy - credit card, grand larceny 4 and Identity theft, all felonies.

He was arraigned and sent to the Albany County Iail, where the State Police found him.

• Credit card thefts in Rensselaer and Albany counties

On December 28, State Police investigators charged him with two additional counts of identity theft in the second degree, grand larceny in the fourth degree, identity theft in the third degree and petit larceny.

These charges stemmed from an investigation that started on December 13, at about 7:04 a.m. when troopers received the report that a purse had been stolen the previous evening in Rensselaer. The investigation determined Flora used a bank card that was in the purse when it was stolen at multiple locations in the

Albany area, incurring approximately \$2,000 worth of unauthorized charges.He was processed on those charges at the Albany County Jail where he remained until Saratoga County found him.

· More charges out of Saratoga County

On January 5, State Police of Clifton Park charged Flora with additional charges after they investigated another series of thefts.

He was charged with identity theft in the first degree, identity theft in the second degree, grand larceny and four counts of criminal possession of stolen property, all felonies, and scheme to defraud, a misdemeanor.

Multiple ongoing investigations determined Flora stole other credit and bank cards from October 2022 through December 2022. He used those stolen cards to make unauthorized purchases in the Clifton Park and Halfmoon area.

Flora was produced by the Albany County Correctional Facility and processed at State Police Clifton Park. He was arraigned at the Clifton Park Town Court and the Halfmoon Town Court and returned to the Albany County Jail.

In addition, according to Colonie police, there are more charges pending from the December 19 incident.

Other local police agencies are expected to file charges as well.

Fake plates, suspended license

DELMAR — Bethlehem police observed a silver Toyota Rav 4 traveling eastbound on Delaware Avenue with a potentially fraudulent temporary Texas registration on Friday, Jan. 6 at approximately 6:59

p.m. The officer performed a traffic stop and found that the driver, a 30-yearold Corona man, had a suspended license with 5 suspensions.

An investigation determined the plate was real, the car was not registered, insured or inspected.

The man said he bought the car in Florida and the plate was attached then, but he was from New York City and drove the car to Bethlehem.

He was taken into custody and charged with possession of a forged instrument and aggravated unlicensed operation, both misdemeanors, and operating an unregistered motor vehicle, operation by an unlicensed driver, operating an uninsured vehicle and operating an uninspected vehicle, all violations.

The man was given an appearance ticket and released. He is scheduled back in Bethlehem Town Court on Tuesday, Feb. 7.

Two warrants and fake plates on Route 85

SLINGERLANDS

– A Saratoga Springs woman was driving a blue Hyundai Elantra on Route 85 towards Albany with a dark-tinted license plate cover over a temporary Vermont plate on Thursday, Jan. 5.

Bethlehem police stopped the car and found, after a DMV check, that the plate was not valid and the driver, Stephine Schleimer, 33, had a suspended license with 11 suspensions. She also had two outstanding warrants from Saratoga Springs police and Columbia County Sheriff's office.

When contacted, Saratoga Springs police had the officer advise Schleimer to turn herself in and Columbia County agreed to take her.

She was charged with Aggravated unlicensed operation, a misdemeanor, and a registration plate display violation by Bethlehem. Schleimer was issued appearance tickets for Bethlehem Town Court for Tuesday, Jan. 24 and transported to Schodack where she was picked up by Columbia County Sheriff's office.

Historian leaves post, will still sleuth

Susan Leath steps down as Bethlehem's historian, author will continue working on local history

DELMAR — Susan Leath's last report as Bethlehem Town Historian was submitted to public record before the start of last week's Town Board meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 11. She prefaced it with words she's often repeated since her appointment in 2007, "It has been my pleasure to serve."

Leath leaves her part-time position, which included a corner desk just outside of Town Supervisor David VanLuven's office in Town Hall, after 16 years and three published books.

Her first book,

"Bethlehem (Images of America)," was published in 2011 by Arcadia Publishing. It featured photographs and postcards from the town's archive, the Bethlehem Historical Association collection and from town residents. Four years later, she followed that effort with another book titled "Historic Tales of Bethlehem, New York (American Chronicles)."

Her tenure as town historian is best defined by the words she dedicated to story. Throughout her time, she maintained an online blog that later translated to a monthly column in Our Towne: Bethlehem. In it, she shared information learned through the numerous queries she'd receive from residents and relatives investigating family ancestry.

The number of articles and books she published was reminiscent of a distant predecessor or hers, "While I am planning time to focus on other writing projects, I look forward to continued work on the Slingerland Vault and Selkirk memoir projects. And to continue partnerships with the Bethlehem Historical Association."

Allison Bennett, who held the position from 1966 to 1974. Bennett published at least four books, including "Times Remembers," which hit the stands well after her service to the town. She, too, wrote articles that appeared in both The Spotlight and Altamont Enterprise.

Leath has been a history sleuth. She did graduate work in museum studies while attending Brown University, and before that, served as director of the Florence Museum of Art, Science and History in South Carolina. She moved to Bethlehem more

than 20 years ago. She attended her first meeting of the Bethlehem Historial Association in 1995, starting a relationship that continues today.

Leath released a third book in 2019 titled "Bethlehem People and Places." It won't be her last. Towards the end of her annual report, she reveals that she's working on publishing the Revolutionary War-era memoirs of James Selkirk. She said she was pleased to share the handwritten documents to family members at a recent reunion. She also revealed

that she's received the help of a period scholar who will set it all into historical context.

"I continue to reach out to Selkirk family members to see what other documents might be buried in their family papers," she shared with the Town Board. "While I am planning time to focus on other writing projects, I look forward to continued work on the Slingerland Vault and Selkirk memoir projects. And to continue partnerships with the Bethlehem Historical Association."

The Town Board held a proclamation celebration to commemorate her time, the second longest term since the position was created a century ago.

Delmar resident Bill Ketzer was named the town's 13th town historian during the Town Board's organizational meeting. An active member of the community, for seven years he has served on the Saturday Delmar Farmers Market Board of Directors.

McCoy officially launches re-election campaign

ALBANY — County Executive Daniel P. McCoy formally launched his re-election campaign at the Carpenters Union Local #291 Training Center two weeks ago, highlighting his recent accomplishments, including the county's response to the COVID pandemic.

The County Executive announced his campaign in tandem with Albany County Sheriff Craig D. Apple, Sr. and Albany County Comptroller Susan A. Rizzo, who are both running for additional four-year terms as well.

"It has been the honor of a lifetime to serve as County Executive over the last nearly twelve years, and together we've overcome some of the toughest challenges imaginable and transformed Albany County for the better in the process," McCoy said. "We dug ourselves out of the Great Recession and built up our reserves to put us on the right footing to respond to COVID, without cuts to services or layoffs."

McCoy cited his cuts in taxes and the county's investments in economic development.

McCoy, who was in attendance during Plug Power's ribboncutting ceremony last Thursday, also highlighted the county's support for renewable energy industries and electric vehicle infrastructure. The establishment of the Advance Albany County Alliance economic development organization, he said, played a key role in keeping Plug Power and an associated 1,600 jobs in Albany County.

"Albany County is now more innovative, more collaborative and more responsive to the people than ever before. But our work isn't done yet, and there is still more we need to do," McCoy said. The County Executive listed issues mental health and opioid epidemic among his targets for the upcoming term, as well as global warming, workforce shortages, inflation, a looming economic downturn, and historic economic and social inequities. "And we will answer that call as we have before, in a partnership as one community. I hope the people of Albany County continue to put their trust and their faith in me to lead for another four years," he continued.

McCoy has already accepted endorsements from several highest-ranking Democratic officials in the state, including DiNapoli, Congressman Paul Tonko, State Sen. Neil Breslin, Assemblymembers Patricia Fahy and John McDonald III, Albany County Democratic Party Chairman Jake Crawford, and Albany Mayor Kathy Sheehan.

Porco moves to vacate 2006 murder conviction

ALBANY — Christopher Porco, now under new representation, filed a motion to vacate judgement of conviction with Albany County Court, attempting to overturn the court's decision that sent him to prison after a jury found him guilty of killing his father, and the attempted murder of his mother, in 2004.

"I am — as I have always emphatically maintained — completely innocent," states in an affidavit submitted as part of the 233-page motion submitted on Thursday, Jan. 12 by his new attorney, Danielle Muscatello.

Porco claimed he was not in Delmar when the attack occurred and that he was "present continuously on or within a mile or two of the campus of the University of Rochester."

The motion also includes an affidavit from his mother, Joan, who survived the attack but was maimed by injuries sustained by an ax to her face. In it, she proclaims her son's innocence and discounts claims of an altercation between Christopher and his brother, and those that suggested she and her husband were planning to sever finances from him.

Christopher, now 39, is serving 46 years to life at Clinton Correctional Facility in Dannemora.

All plugged in

"New York's investment in Plug is an investment in the state's sustainable future," said Hochul. "This new manufacturing facility is creating good, green jobs in the Capital Region and beyond - helping communities around the world break their dependence on fossil fuels by replacing them with cuttingedge green hydrogen technology. Earlier this week I laid out bold initiatives to drive down polluting emissions across the board, and Plug's expansion will help complement our efforts to create a greener, healthier New York for future generations."

The \$125 million plant will be used for expanding production, warehousing, and servicing of the GenDrive fuel cell product line, which offers drop-in fuel cell solutions for existing electric truck fleets.

In addition to creating more than 1,600 new, green jobs and retaining another 701 jobs in Albany County. Empire State Development (ESD) has agreed to provide up to \$45 million in performance-based Green Excelsior Jobs Tax Credits to encourage the creation and retention of these green jobs.

"Almost exactly seven years ago, I stood on the factory floor of Plug Power's Latham facility, and CEO Andy Marsh promised me that if I could deliver the incentives they needed like the Investment Tax Credit, that we would be cutting ribbons for New York jobs in the decade — and today a promise made becomes a promise kept," said Schumer. "Today's new manufacturing facility comes at the perfect time to power America's fight against climate change and new federal incentives position Plug to create even more New York jobs for years to come building the 21st-century green hydrogen economy."

Plug Power cleared its first hurdle towards establishing its facility at Vista Technology Park after the Bethlehem Zoning Board of Appeals unanimously approved its application for an area variance that December. The decision swiftly pushed the issue through the channels. Because the structure stretches across the townline into New Scotland, the project had to go through two different sets of review boards before shovels hit the ground.

Bethlehem Town Supervisor David VanLuven praised his New Scotland counterpart, Doug LaGrange, as he described a unique collaboration with "no inter-municipal jockeying or fighting."

"The other thing that I think was key to this moving forward so quickly is that Plug and Columbia Development, and their construction teams, they took the local, state and federal requirements seriously. And when something was required, they did it and if something slid off a little bit, they corrected it," he said.

"We compressed the time that would normally take — possibly a year or plus — and we compressed it into more like four months from application to approval," said LaGrange. "But you know, they would listen, and that's the thing."

Founded in 1997 in Albany County, Plug Power created the first commercially viable market for hydrogen fuel cell technology, and as a result, has deployed over 38,000 fuel cell systems for e-mobility – more than any company in the world – and has become the largest buyer of liquid hydrogen, having built and operated a hydrogen highway across North America.

Plug Power announced a partnership earlier this year with SK Group, one of the leading South Korean business groups, to accelerate hydrogen as an alternative energy source in Asian markets. Through this partnership, both companies intend to provide hydrogen fuel cell systems, hydrogen fueling

stations, and electrolyzers to the Korean and broader Asian markets. Plug Power is also partnering with Europe's secondlargest automaker Renault Group of France to produce fuel cellpowered commercial trucks.

Marsh credited the company's success on the support it received from Schumer's office in Washington, specifically the Inflation Reduction Act and Investment Tax Credit. Locally, Plug received a \$5 million grant from Albany County, a \$500,000 infrastructure grant from National Grid and \$45 million in Green Excelsior Jobs Tax Credits from Empire State Development.

There has been a considerable push towards green energy initiatives in New York state since the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (Climate Act) was passed into law. The state has committed itself to reach economy-wide carbon neutrality, including a zero-emission electricity sector by 2040, with 70 percent renewable energy generation by 2030. Since then, Albany has promised more than \$21 billion in 91 largescale renewable projects across the state, \$6.8 billion to reduce buildings emissions, \$1.8 billion to scale up solar, more than \$1 billion for clean transportation initiatives, and more than \$1.2 billion in NY Green Bank commitments.



BC entertains tax exemptions

Emergency volunteers could get up to 10% off property's assessed value

DELMAR — The Bethlehem Central School District will host a public hearing, allowing residents to share input on a possible tax exemption emergency management service volunteers.

Gov. Kathy Hochul recently signed legislation that allows local governments an opt-in for all to provide a partial property tax exemption to volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers. The school board will host the hearing from its meeting room in Room D-122 at the high school at 7 p.m., and livestream the event from its BCSD Events YoutTube channel.

The law, Chapter 670 of the Laws of 2022, allows municipalities to offer an exemption of up to 10 percent of the assessed value of the primary

firefighters and/or volunteer ambulance workers. The measure was signed into law to help communities attract and retain volunteer firefighters and ambulance workers.

If approved by the Board of Education, qualified volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers in the district would be required to apply for the exemption.

The exemption would only be granted for property owned and used as the primary residence of the volunteer firefighter or volunteer ambulance worker. The property must be located within the district and within the jurisdiction served by the fire company, fire department, or ambulance entity to which the volunteer belongs. If a portion of a volunteer's property is used for other purposes, the exemption

would be prorated and only apply to the portion of the property used exclusively for residential purposes.

As part of its consideration, the Board would also set a minimum service requirement of between two and five years for volunteers to become eligible for the exemption. Additionally, a lifetime exemption may be provided by the Board to volunteers with at least 20 years of service as long as they maintain their primary residence in the community they served. The lifetime exemption could also be extended to unmarried surviving spouses of deceased volunteers who maintain an eligible primary residence.

The Jan. 18 public hearing on the partial property tax exemption will take place at the beginning of the meeting.

Young pilot takes flight

ALBANY - Kevin Tully of Niskayuna turned 16 years old on

Sunday, Jan. 15, and unlike most kids that age you will not see him driving around his neighborhood but flying a plane over it. He is receiving his pilot's license days before his driver's license. Tully who has had a Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) student pilots license since he was 14 years old is unable to get a driving permit till Tuesday when the DMV opens after the long holiday weekend.

Tully has been flying glider planes out of the Saratoga County Airport since he was 12 years old thanks to the Adirondack Soaring Club, which has a low-cost pilot training program for kids under the age of 18 years old. At 14 years old, Tully was issued his FAA student pilots license and has piloted a glider plane as high as 10,000 feet over Saratoga County all by himself. Tully

started to fly a powered plane at 15 years old with an instructor and accomplished

all the tasks necessary to fly a plane without an instructor (called a "solo") upon reaching the FAA minimum age of 16 which is Sunday.

Because you must be 16 years old to legally pilot a powered plane (14 to pilot an unpowered glider) without anybody else in the plane, that means Tully will be the youngest legal pilot in the air for that day. In addition to being one of the youngest legal pilots in recent United States history, Tully is also an

Eagle Scout, and holds a black belt in Taekwondo having practiced since he was six years old at Pai's Taekwondo in Schenectady where he credits its Master with teaching him the skills of planning and determination that he needed to become the youngest Pilot in America

Economy has a wait-and-see future



NY consumer sentiment steady; but 20 points below pre-pandemic level

— When it comes to the future of the economy, New Yorkers are teetering between optimism and pessimism according to the latest poll from the Siena College Research Institute.

The New York State Index of Consumer Sentiment now stands at 72.3, up 1.5 points from the third quarter of 2022. New York's overall Index of Consumer Sentiment is 12.6 points above the nation's Index of 59.7. The current index increased nearly 3 points to 66.7 and the future index increased nearly 1 point resulting in New York's measure of

future expectations moving from 75.2 last quarter to 75.9 today.

Both the New York and national indexes all increased between nearly 1 to just under 3 points. Overall confidence remains higher in New York than across the nation. Future confidence in New York is just above the breakeven

point of balanced optimism and pessimism and 16 points higher than national future confidence.

According to SCRI Director Don Levy, a political divide appears between optimistic Democratic voters and pessimistic Republican ones. Nonetheless, Republicans are looking up since last quarter, as sentiment rose nearly 8 points among them.

"Lingering inflation, food prices, and political uncertainty may explain New York's current sentiment measurement remaining over 20 points lower than the prepandemic level," Levy said. "Still, demand for major consumer goods is high most especially for cars/trucks at over 25 percent the highest since fall of "19"

In the fourth quarter of 2022, buying plans were up from the third quarter

of 2022 measurement for cars/trucks to 25.5 percent (from 21.7 percent). Buying plans were down this quarter for major home improvements to 26.1 percent (from 29 percent), furniture to 28.4 percent (from 29.4 percent), consumer electronics to 44.8 percent (from 47 percent) and homes at 11.5 percent (from 14 percent).

Sixty-six percent (down from 69 percent last quarter) of all New Yorkers say that current gasoline prices are having a very serious or somewhat serious impact on their financial condition. Seventy-nine percent (up slightly from 78 percent last quarter) of state residents indicate that the amount of money they spend on groceries is having either a very serious or somewhat serious impact on their finances.

St. Peter's Health **Partners opens baby** café in South End

ALBANY — A grand opening celebration and open house was held on Thursday, Jan. 5, for the newest Baby Café in the Capital Region at the Albany College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences' The Collaboratory, located in the Albany Housing Authority building at 200 South Pearl Street in Albany.

Open on Thursdays from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., the Baby Café is a space where pregnant and nursing parents can share tips and techniques, and socialize with other parents. Free, one-on-one feeding assistance is also available from certified lactation specialists and peer counselors.

"We are thrilled to launch this newest Baby Café, which will offer community support for breastfeeding/chestfeeding parents in Albany County, and enable them to feed their children longer," said Erin Sinisgalli, director of Community Health Programs for St. Peter's Health Partners. "Long-term studies of breastfeeding/chestfeeding show it contributes to a lifetime of good health for babies, especially when it comes to obesity prevention. These babies learn how to regulate their food intake and develop healthy eating patterns as they grow."

The Baby Café is one of five Baby Cafés supported by SPHP in the Capital Region. The other sites are located at the Mechanicville Public Library in Saratoga County; the Mont Pleasant Branch Library and Phyllis Bornt Branch Library and Literacy Center in Schenectady; and at Samaritan Hospital - St. Mary's Campus in Troy. There is also a sixth, virtual-only Baby Café based out of St. Peter's Hospital.

The establishment of the Baby Café network is part of an effort funded by a New York State Department of Health "Creating Breastfeeding Friendly Communities" grant. The aim of the project is to fund a coordinated community network to build and expand communitybased feeding partnerships, as well as to reduce the racial and ethnic community disparities in the prevalence of feeding.

"Due to the pandemic, the Baby Cafés were running virtually in 2020, 2021, and most of 2022," said Chloe Blaise, MPH, a breastfeeding peer counselor for St. Peter's Health Partners and project coordinator for the grant. "With the ability to return to safer in-person gatherings, the Albany Baby Café is reopening in this larger, recently renovated space that will allow us to reach parents in this growing part of Albany, which is a target area for the grant."

The effort is the latest investment in Albany's South End from SPHP's Community Health Programs, which was honored to support The South End Grocery during its recent Grand Opening Campaign. 



Blues' scene loses Thomasina Winslow

Eddie's nominated artist debuted as a toddler on her father's album, performed with Pete Seeger

homasina Winslow, a local legend within the area blues and Americana scene who followed in her father's footsteps by picking up the guitar, died on Friday, Jan. 13, at the age of 53.

Tom Winslow's daughter was destined to be a musician. She was just a toddler when she made an appearance on his eponymous debut release in 1969. Where her father's legacy would intertwine with Pete Seeger and his endeavor to advocate for the Hudson River's health, she would later be a regular performer at the Great Hudson Revival festival and share time with Seeger, too.

"She was not only an incredible singer, guitar player and band leader, but she was also one of the world's best people," wrote WEXT Program Director Chris Winke. "Her spirit and enthusiasm were infectious. Her creativity knew no bounds. We could all learn something from her, even if we didn't know how to hold a guitar."

In 2019, Thomasina earned an Eddies' Music Award nomination for that year's Blues Artist of the Year. Her fusion of acoustic guitar-driven blues and pop captivated audiences across the globe, including Germany, England and Australia. The

Capital District native was just as likely to hit area stages from Hudson Valley Community College to the venerable Caffé Lena, especially while with her band, Nite Train. Ken and Maria Briggs wrote a eulogy for her on the band's website.

"It is with heavy hearts that we announce the passing of our dear friend and bandmate, Thomasina Winslow," they wrote. "She was a brilliant light in this world, and now we will continue shining her light by carrying it within us in our own lives."

Thomasina was in the studio, recording her latest release "Return," when she was nominated for an Eddie in 2019. She had told WVCR's Darrin Kibbey that the accolade, which placed her among the best blues artists in the region, reenergized

her.

"It galvanized my efforts," she said in the 2019 interview. "I put the pedal to the metal even

She had been active within her community, organizing a music festival and performing on local stages.

Nite Train has scheduled a tribute show at Caffé Lena on Saturday, Feb. 4. It had been preparing to celebrate 20 years together in 2023. According to the band's statement, it will continue to perform so the band can "remember and honor Thomasina at each and every performance we have."

Details of a future memorial service were not immediately available, though one is expected to be held within the next few weeks.

Consisting of Chris Jordan, Jason Bonafide, Bob

Watson and Mark McKenna, timing is a marriage of two popular area bands, Public Access and The Slaughterhouse Chorus. The side project geminated from what they call "the winds of most uncertain times" in the summer of 2020. With the doors wide open and plenty of room to breathe, they dragged some instruments into an old horse barn in rural Rensselaer County to start again.

Inspired by Radiohead's approach to "Kid A", the band forced itself to embrace the uncertainty of the times by substantiating those early demos with unusual instrumentations, unconventional songwriting, and unfamiliar production techniques. Live recordings from the barn were brought back to Bonafide's basement studio, unraveled, ripped apart, and reassembled, with the traditional sounds forming the dirt floor for an off-kilter skyscraper of strings, synthesizers, drones, and impressionistic lyrics delivered in rich harmonies. Built up brick by brick over the course of the next two years into a multifarious musical collage, the EP attempts to interface Nine Inch Nails' industrial dread with the organic warmth of Crosby, Stills, & Nash without losing







Local eye on the world

Growing up in Scarsdale, watching and playing sports was one of Nadler's favorite pastimes. Nadler played soccer in recreational leagues until college while battling injuries in his hips and knees. It was at Union College that his passion for sports began to flourish in another area, one where he began to "express" himself.

"During the fall of my sophomore year, I took a film photography class with Professor Martin Benjamin and enjoyed the start-to-finish process of black-and-white film photography," he said. "The class revolutionized the way I perceive the art form and introduced new concepts of composition and lighting."

The following year, he began to pursue sports photography at Union College by photographing the men's and women's basketball teams, as well as the club basketball team. When he wasn't photographing basketball, he started photographing the football teams. Professor Martin Benjamin

Growing up in Scarsdale, describes Nadler as totally tching and playing "self-motivated".

"Sports are unique to photograph because the action moves at a fast pace," Nadler mused. "You have to be incredibly focused on the action while also looking for other moments that are a bit more unexpected."

Nadler quickly "got engaged with photography" after joining Professor Martin Benjamin's class. As a retired professor for both the College of Saint Rose and Union College, he added, "I have a lot of standout students that I can recall over the years. 50 years of students, and Stephen ranks right up there at the top with my best ones."

"I remember his Photography 1 final project about expression being portraits of international students," he recalled.

Nadler's project reflected his deep interest in sports, focusing on the connection between soccer teams and their fans. Many of his subjects were photographed in a jersey, a t-shirt from

the team, or with a soccer ball.

After being awarded the esteemed Watson Fellowship, Nadler connected with US Soccer and International Sports Images (ISI) to expand on his study of the sport and seize the opportunity to photograph one of the biggest sporting events of 2022.

John Todd, who is the founder and content director of ISI, was personally familiar with the fellowship program and was impressed by Nadler's passion for the sport. Nadler joined a team of five other photographers and three editors.

Todd believes that it was Nadler's previous experience as a soccer player that gave him a strong sense of teamwork. "He was willing to do whatever was needed to help our photo agency cover the USA team to the best of our abilities," commented Todd.

Nadler's daily routine at the World Cup was "intense," with him always working to find and photograph the best shots as he attended multiple games and press conferences a day. "There were some days where I would attend the 1 p.m. kickoff and then the 10 p.m. later that evening," he remarked.


"The emotion that players express is unlike any other sporting event on earth," he said. Capturing the passion of soccer fans and players is a technique he brought with him from his college projects to photographing the World Cup. "From the tears to the massive celebrations, the raw passion that players have for their countries is special and makes for terrific photos."

"Photographing the World Cup has been an unbelievable and surreal experience," Nadler said, remarking that he was "fortunate to be here and take part in the tournament."

"It was fascinating and rewarding watching him grow from a rookie with no World Cup soccer experience to a seasoned veteran," said John Todd.

In the future, Nadler hopes to continue pursuing his passion for sports photography. "Besides soccer photography, I also love football and basketball. I am always open to exploring other sports as well to see how they compare and contrast to those I have experience with "



Enjoy Irish coffee at home

eather-related flight delays or cancellations are often the cause of much frustration. However, one timely storm nearly 80 years might just have paved the way for a beloved beverage.

In 1943, Joe Sheridan was working as a chef at the Shannon Airport in Ireland. According to the Foynes Flying Boat and Maritime Museum, on one fateful night, a flight bound for Newfoundland was forced to return to the airport in Foynes due to inclement weather. Sheridan was called back to work that night and asked to create a warm beverage for the suddenly stranded passengers. Quick on his feet, Sheridan brewed some coffee but decided to add a little whiskey. Asked if the beverage was Brazilian coffee, Sheridan shook his head before indicating his newly minted creation was "Irish coffee." And thus a legendary beverage was born.

This recipe, courtesy of the Foynes Flying Boat and Maritime Museum, can be great for anyone who wants warm up with their own batch of Irish coffee at



On the Horizon

On the Horizon: Art and Atmosphere in the Nineteenth Century examines how artists and image makers incorporated new scientific and technological understandings of the atmosphere into their works and creative practices. Ideas about the airspace, both as a realm and as a physical frontier, signaled novel artistic possibilities. Suddenly, the atmosphere had a visual role to play in artworks--the aerial dimension came to be recognized as an essential and active pictorial element. To nineteenthcentury artists, air offered a major representational challenge: How is it possible to portray something typically characterized by its transparency? Promenades on Paper

In eighteenth-century France, people produced and collected drawings at a startling new pace. 

with the timing of two actual events in his representation, however, combining them into a single scene for, he noted, "the sake of historical meaning." 

Ray Vega / Keith Pray Quintet at Alias Coffee By RUDY LU

TROY – The rear of Alias Coffee, at 219 4th Street, is a different space than the front of this wonderful artisan coffee shop. The rear has been transformed into an alternative New York City nightclub, a combination of the aesthetics of the loft scene of the 60s and 70s, with the sounds that could possibly have emanated from a 52nd Street nightclub back in the 50s. Sounds, on Friday at Saturday night, of the live

recording of a performance of a quintet fronted by local saxophone great Keith Pray and Vermonter Nuyorican trumpet/ flugelhorn player Ray Vega. It also featured New York City pianist extraordinaire Ian MacDonald, with Jason Emmond on bass, and producer/musical director/everything Joe Barna on drums. All of this was completed with a grand piano, a true rarity these days for a club/ coffeehouse performance in Nippertown, especially one rented on a one-time basis!

In spite of the obvious visual and aural nods to the days of yore, all tunes were composed by the members of the band.

"Dis is Dat Blues" is a Pray composition. It was reminiscent of Nick Brignola calling out the tune "It's Just a Blues," and then proceeding to play a blues at breakneck speed.

"Luciano and Gustavo" is a Barna composition inspired by his time working on a cruise ship. It honored the couple that

taught him the subtleties and intricacies of the Brazilian samba, and clearly displayed those rhythms.

"Two years of the Lotus Blossom" is a Pray composition, inspired by the Billy Strayhorn original, "Lotus Blossom."

"Freedom" is a Ray Vega composition. Hard driving/ swinging hard bop at its finest.

"Ivory Romance" is a tender ballad by Barna dedicated to jazz legend Lee Shaw. Ian MacDonald's sensitive playing was featured.

Finally, "The Calling," a Barna original, is a classic upbeat hard bop swinging end to the set.

Although the recording was done on both days, the final product will be based on the two sets of these pieces played on the second day.

That classic horn front end of alto/tenor sax and trumpet playing in unison by Vega and Pray marked many of the songs, with both having room for mind-blowing solos.

Ian MacDonald's hands running and tickling the piano were there always with the right notes and feeling, whether accompanying or solo.

Jason Emmond provided a strong foundation, giving the band cohesion with a phat bass. Incidentally, this was Jason's last gig in the area for a while. He will be working on a cruise ship based in Hawaii for the next four months.

Joe Barna was the heart and soul of this project, lending more than his drums/compositions to the project. It was a family effort; Joe's mother Pam prepared the food for the audience.

This performance was a strong reminder of the talent pool we have in the Nippertown area, and the strength of our scene to attract musicians from the outside. It is important to support these efforts in addition to the large national acts of all genres that visit our area.

This local venue hosted about 150 people prepared to make their first grand memory of the new year. Once I settled in, it was only minutes until that first guitar strike prepared us for the energetic night to

Gozer took the stage

and set the tone for the night. Opening with "The Fury," the drummer relentlessly attacked the drums while the guitarist shredded to open. The volume was unexpected to me, and I quickly realized the night I would be in for. This darker, high-energy song was aided by the lead singer, Mykah Dillenger, head banging.

His powerful voice mixed with the intense drums, guitar, and bass

made many members of the audience make their way to the dance floor. Each song they performed was like this, as Gozer loved to use loud, intense instrumentals to get the crowd into the performance. There was no sitting back during this performance. They opened the show and nearly tore the roof off with their energy. Their darkest songs, "Zeke" and "The Beast That Lies," could start

a riot. Behind the stage, a large screen displayed the band's logo of a skull with the left side broken into pieces, which fit the mood of the songs. Concert Reviews

Keeping the energy alive, Seize Atlantis conquered their first performance of the year. Energetic from the downbeat, lead vocalist James Mullen covered every square inch of the stage. Not just a carefree and wild dancer, James dominated with his vocals. His wide range makes me jealous, and his vocal control seamlessly switching genres from pop to heavy rock is inspiring.

This man was born to rock, and it was a privilege to witness him perform live. The drummer, Cody Platt, convinced me he put a hole in the drum set. Luc Bourgault on guitar, and Mike Dardas laying

down the low end, joined in on James' infectious and animated stage antics. Their first original song, "Paradise Lost," put this on full display. Seize Atlantis is a must-watch live band as recorded music doesn't do them justice. Opening with "Hold On," their latest released song, the slow, quiet opening leads the audience into a false sense of calmness. 45 seconds later, Madison finishes the build-up with her unbelievable voice. Madison has remarkable control and power. Only seeing Under The Den live will allow you to understand the phenomenon of her singing. She is incredibly talented and when she released her full power, the room lit up as everyone's eyes widened. However, this is not a one-woman show. Ultra-talented guitarist

Benjamin "Ideas" Zoleski shreds on the guitar and has underrated vocals as the group's backup singer. Twins John and James Nowak equally destroy on drums and bass respectively. All four members are talented and have a unique connection that makes them fun to watch.

Often, the most entertaining aspect of their performance was how they interacted with each other, as during instrumental breaks Madison would air guitar with Benjiman, headbang with John, and vibe with James as they played their hearts out. The song that displays this total package is "Let's Go To Paris."The intro hooks the audience with a catchy guitar drift, and the opening vocals lure you into peace until the buildup, which had the majority of

the audience out of their seats and on the dance floor. During the middle of the song, Madison went to each member of the band and displayed the band's chemistry as they totally owned the stage. Benjamin displayed his underrated vocals in the final chorus.






