Illegal guns and magazines

State Police find weapons in Kenwood residence investigating other crimes

DELMAR - On Thursday, March 2, State Police BCI searched a residence on Kenwood Avenue investigating other felony crimes when they discovered three handguns and two high-capacity firearm magazines, all illegally possessed, in the home.

Troopers arrested Grant M. Ostrander, 34, of Delmar, and charged him with two counts of criminal possession of a weaponammunition feeding device and three counts of criminal possession of a firearm, all felonies.

Ostrander was arrested at his home and transported to the Latham barracks for processing. He was arraigned in Bethlehem Town Court and remanded to the Albany County jail in lieu

of \$5,000 cash, \$10,000 bond, or a \$10,000 partially secured bond.

The investigation continues into the other crimes and police would not comment further.

Off the road and DWI

NEW SCOTLAND -On Friday, Feb. 24 at about 11:06 p.m. State Police in New Scotland located a vehicle off the roadway in the area of Clarksville Road while on patrol.

The crash appeared to have just occurred, but the vehicle was unoccupied. A short time after the trooper's arrival, a 29-year-old Westerlo man, came out of the wooded area near the crash and advised the trooper that he had been operating the vehicle and fled after the cash.

The man was arrested for DWI and other vehicle and traffic law violations.

He was transported to the New Scotland barracks, where he provided a breath sample that returned a 0.12 percent BAC.

The man was issued tickets returnable to the New Scotland Town Court on April 6 and released to a sober third party.

Siena Poll: Hochul losing favor

Crime, cost of living remain voters' top two priorities for Albany

LOUDONVILLE — Gov. Kathy Hochul's favorability and job approval ratings both ticked down this month, while President Joe Biden's ratings both edged higher. Hochul has a 46-43 percent favorability rating, from 48-42 percent last month, and her job approval rating stands at 56-40 percent, from 56-36 percent.

"Both Hochul's favorability and job approval ratings dipped a little this month, but her favorability remains slightly positive and her overall job approval rating remains strong, particularly with – and only with –Democrats," said Siena College pollster Steven Greenberg. "On specific aspects of the job she's doing, voters give Hochul a mixed report card.

Crime should be Albany's top priority, say 36 percent of voters, followed by cost of living, 27 percent, and affordable housing, 13 percent, with public health, environment and racial justice in single digits. When combining voters' top two priorities, cost of living (62 percent) tops the list, followed by crime (55 percent), and the other issues far behind. Ninety-two percent of New Yorkers say crime continues to be a serious problem across the state and two-thirds continue to

say it's a serious problem in their community.

"A majority approve of the job she's doing to encourage businesses to locate in New York and a small plurality approve of the job she's doing to increase availability of affordable housing. At the same time, a plurality disapproves of the job she's doing to address crime, and a majority disapproves of her efforts to make New York more affordable," Greenberg said. "Democrats approve of the job she's doing in all four areas while Republicans and independents disapprove in all four areas."

Biden has best-ever job approval

Biden's favorability rating is up to 54-43 percent, from 49-47 percent last month, his best since October 2021, and his job approval rating hit a new high, 55-42 percent, up from 51-47 percent in January, according to a Siena College poll of registered New York State voters released today.

"Overall, New Yorkers are giving Biden his best ratings since 2021. Ironically, the upward swing is not because of Democrats – at least three-quarters of Democrats both view him favorably now and last month, and approve of the job he's doing, both now and last month – but rather Republicans and independents. And to be

clear, Republicans and, to a lesser degree, independents continue to view Biden unfavorably and disapprove of the job he's doing – but he's doing significantly less poorly with both this month," Greenberg said.

The poll showed that both Biden and Hochul have earned mixed grades specific aspects. Greenberg added that double-digit majorities approve with the president is doing to protect American democracy and to keep America safe. But slightly smaller majorities disapprove of the way he's addressing both immigration and inflation, he said.

Crime, cost of living remain voters' priorities for Albany

Crime continues to be a top concern among state residents, as is the rising cost of living amidst inflation.

"For more than a year, more than nine in 10 voters have said crime is a serious problem -60

percent very serious - and more than six in 10 have said that crime in their community is a serious problem -34 percent now say very serious," Greenberg said. "At least 55 percent of voters from every party, region and race, think crime in the state is a very serious problem. When it comes to crime in their community, voters of color and those from New York City are significantly more concerned than are white, downstate suburban and upstate voters, who also remain concerned."

Strong support for budget proposals

"Similar to last month, basing minimum wage increases on the inflation rate has strong bipartisan support, as does lowering the BAC for DWI to 0.05 percent," Greenberg said. "Democrats, overwhelmingly, and independents, strongly, support both increasing the tax on cigarettes by a buck and banning flavored tobacco products.

Republicans are more closely divided, opposing the tax by six points, and supporting the flavor ban by three points.

Odds & ends

Voters say that the National Republican Party has become too extreme, 57-30 percent. By a smaller 51-38 percent margin, they say the National Democratic Party has become too extreme. Not surprisingly, nearly three-quarters of Democrats think Republicans are too extreme and a similar number of Republicans say the same about Democrats. Independents think they're both too extreme, Democrats (61 percent) more than Republicans (54 percent).

Voters are a little less downbeat about the direction of the state and the country. They say the state is headed in the wrong direction 49-41 percent (49-39 percent in January) and the country is headed in the wrong direction 56-35 percent, down from 63-28 percent last month.

Recently declared presidential candidate Nikki Haley debuts in the Siena College Poll with a 30-39 percent favorability rating, with 31 percent either never having heard of her or not knowing enough to have an opinion. Republicans view her slightly favorably, 32-29 percent. Democrats are negative, 26-46 percent.

Safety audit at VCSD

NEW SCOTLAND

— As a continuation of Voorheesville Central School District's on-going commitment to protecting all students, faculty and staff, a safety audit was recently conducted by members of the Albany County Sheriff's Office.

The audit was entirely voluntary, and the results are not required to be filed with any state agency. The sheriff's office expects to present the results to Superintendent Frank Macri in the coming weeks. School leadership will then analyze the results and use them to re-enforce current safety procedures, evaluate existing security infrastructure and plan for future needs.

"The district is thankful to the Albany County Sheriff's Office for once again conducting a safety vulnerability audit of our buildings," Macri said. "These types of audits allow us to identify areas

of strength and potential growth while continually increasing the safety of our staff and student population."

The safety audit also serves to strengthen the relationship between the district and the sheriff's office. Commander Brain Wood noted the importance of having deputies become familiar with the layout of the schools. This will help response time should they ever be called in for an emergency. Whether it's responding to a child with an urgent health issue or a district-wide lock-down, he said his team will be prepared.

The first audit was conducted in 2020, and Wood said he observed incredible progress in many safety areas during this most recent walkthrough.

"We enter the buildings with the mindset of a 'bad guy,' with the mindset of a paramedic or with the mindset of a cop, just to see where there are opportunities that we could make a change that may prevent an injury, prevent an accident, prevent a crime. We basically break into the school. From 2020 to 2023, there was a drastic improvement in the number of places that we couldn't get into," Wood


The unannounced audit began on a Sunday when Wood and other members of the sheriff's office entered Voorheesville's school buildings during sporting events. This gave them the opportunity to observe safety systems outside of normal school hours. While they were there, they set the stage to test the school community's situational awareness. For example, notes were left on buses stating, "This is a

Bus drivers were instructed to call the

sheriff's office to report their discovery. Each and every driver encountered the notes and reported on them as they performed their systems checks on Monday morning.

Before they exited the elementary school building on Sunday, deputies left an unattended backpack in the school. Early Monday morning, a student alerted a teacher about the aberrant backpack, and the teacher brought it to the attention of the main office. The safety audit team said this kind of situational awareness is critical to any school district's safety plan.

Wood, who arrived for the audit wearing street clothes, said he was pleased to report that he was "challenged" by a teacher, a substitute teacher and a student. Each noticed a stranger was in the building and asked for identification or alerted school personnel, he said.





Bethlehem fell 4-0 in a tough match at the Bethlehem YMCA.


Local Gymnasts at section and state meets






Bethlehem Softball League

His comprehensive narrative recalls that the first game was played on July 5th, 1972. However, before the first pitch was thrown, meticulous planning and discussions were part of a long process to make the league possible.

Original softball player Tracy Cunha, née Castiglione, brought home a school flyer that promoted the idea of forming a girls' softball league. Her parents, John and Sally Castiglione, decided to go. She describes her mother as the "first feminist I knew," who saw a need for girls to be included in sports the way that boys were.

They went to the meeting, which was attended by representatives from Miss Softball America. The idea of the league met with a rousing response. Cunha's parents were one of the first couples to volunteer in a managerial capacity.

Alongside other dedicated individuals, they were determined to make softball accessible to the girls and young women in the area. Dr. Van Woert's original notes were quick to credit by name the hard work of the diligent parents and board members. He also specifically credited Lee Rhenish, a SUNY varsity softball coach and commissioner for Miss Softball America, for "bringing the sport into the

"Initially, the members of the board met every evening for long evenings that went late into the night," Cunha remembered. "I will never forget them; sitting around our dining room table and planning this. All kinds of emotions were palpable excitement, frustration, and determination."

Her father and mother became president and vice president as the league formed officially under Miss Softball America. Dr. Van Woert notes in his memoirs that the relationship grew "controversial" as they lacked proper funding and independence under the umbrella organization. They left Miss Softball America after the first

season, the initial step on an uncertain pathway to their independence.

"They scraped money together with car washes and bake sales, a generous local community, and many more meetings," Cunha said. She reminisced about how "dozens of businesses jumped in to sponsor the teams."

Some of the original sponsors were Toll Gate and Tri-Village Drugs. "It was an amazing group of people who jumped in during a time that was tough," she added.

"It's interesting to see how long it's lasted and how many people in the community, young girls and now women who are now mothers, have gone through this program," said Maggie Tromp, a senior at the Academy of the Holy Names.

As a player for BSL since Tromp was young, she has thrived in many roles, from shortstop to first base, even as an umpire for her younger sister's team. "I'm a student-athlete. That is the best way to describe me," she explained.

She remarked on "what a staple it is in the community for people." She added. "It has family connections for me because my mom played in the league. For others, I think it secures its foundation as such a strong, long-lasting league."

The league has evolved over the years, blossoming into separate recreational and travel teams. The renaming was another step in the development of the league. Branding has also developed, particularly under Mark Ciafardo's attentive eye.

League president Mark Ciafardo laughed about how he "wears many different hats." As manager, coach, and president for BSL, Ciafardo is also a father; encouraging his daughters in softball also continues to inspire him. He describes himself as dedicated to the "empowerment" of the young women in the league.

He reflected on how softball has taught the

girls and young women to learn life skills such as dealing with conflicts and teamwork. He also commented on how it raises their "independence and confidence" from day to day.

"They built an amazing program that helped young girls develop character and self-esteem, as well as other life-empowering skills," said Tracy Cunha. She now works for the New York State Senate and has worked in public service, organizing events that advocate for women's rights. "I feel I benefited from that."

Maggie Tromp is in her final season. Looking back at her years with BSL, she said, "There have been ups and downs always throughout my years of playing... It taught me to stick through a lot of things and the fact that I can really improve in anything with just repetition and practice."

"With friendships, it opened me up to many new people," she continued. "It's helped me improve my growth and connect with other people that I wouldn't have had the chance to."

Tracy Cunha agreed that softball and the friends she made remained a part of her life. "There are so many people who have made my life better, and I met them through softball."

There are many events planned to celebrate the historic season. All season, players will have shirts emblazoned with the 50th-anniversary design. On April 22, opening day, Town Supervisor David VanLuven and his wife will throw out the first pitch. On June 11th, there will be an anniversary celebration that invites all those who have played and supported the league to honor the season.

"When I step back and reflect on what the BSL means to me and what word(s) best describe what our organization is all about, I find myself at a loss for words," Mark Ciafardo wrote in his president's address to honor the anniversary season.

"How do you describe an organization that has touched so many lives over the last 50 wonderful years? I believe you do so with one word: excellence."

CDTA outlines vision for 2023

Transit company featured updates on major projects, plans for service expansion with a panel discussion focused on mobility in the region

ALBANY — The Capital District Transportation Authority (CDTA) showcased its achievements and detailed bold initiatives for better mobility in the Capital Region during its annual State of CDTA event on Thursday, March 2.

The event recognized how CDTA is entering 2023 from a position of strength, innovation, and confidence. CDTA ridership is rebounding quickly; for the past year, ridership is up 20 percent, fueled by Universal Access agreements with even more major employers, colleges and other partners. Total ridership for the first 10 months of the CDTA fiscal year is 11.4 million. This brings the CDTA ridership count to more than 90 percent of what it was before the pandemic began. "CDTA has a progressive vision for 2023 to introduce new services and projects to make the regions more connected than ever," CDTA Board Chairman Jayme Lahut said. "I am proud of the milestones recognized today and bold plans for the future as we work with community partners to support the region's economic development."

CDTA announced electric bikes will be added to the CDPHP Cycle! fleet during season seven. This year, CDTA will also complete its third BRT Line, the Purple Line, which will operate along an eight-mile corridor through the City of Albany and into Guilderland. The company is also working on adding a sixth county to the authority and hoping to merge with the Greater

Glens Falls Transit system in 2023.

"It is amazing to witness the impact and growth we have had on the region during a pandemic," said CDTA Chief Executive Officer Carm Basile. "Our Bus Rapid Transit lines, the only BRT network in upstate New York, span nearly 40 miles; we have a network of electric vehicles, which now includes carshare, and electric bikes; and we are expanding our footprint to provide even more connections to the Capital Region. We have emerged from the pandemic with forward-thinking ideas that reimagine mobility and transportation, but none of them would be possible without our community partners. I am beyond appreciative to those who have helped us get to this

point and can't wait for all that's to come in 2023 and beyond."

The event also included a panel featuring City of Amsterdam Mayor Michael Cinquanti, Plug Power Workforce Development Manager Matt Grattan, and CDTA Customer Johonna Uber. The panel, moderated

by Melissa Mangini, Editor-in-Chief of the Albany Business Review, focused on how community leaders and customers have different needs for modern mobility solutions, public transit in the region, and their personal experiences.

Over the last 50 years, CDTA has grown into

an organization with 750 employees, a budget of \$115 million and served approximately 16 million customers annually, prepandemic. It has also grown its fleet to 330 buses and vehicles, which travel 10 million miles annually on more than 50 different routes.

The CDPHP Workforce Team Challenge is organized by and serves as a significant fundraiser for the HMRRC. In addition to raising funds for local charities, the race also helps to fund HMRRCs college scholarships, grants, and free race programs for local youth.

Registration at the \$30 entry fee will end on May 1. If the race hasn't reached its registration cap, registration may be extended at a higher rate.



More valuable than oil

Analyst warns businesses to remain vigilant when it comes to keeping our personal information safe - because what they hold is the next gold rush for hackers



n a world economy that witnessed fewer cyber attacks in 2022 than in years before, security analysts are quick to point out that there is more to be concerned with than to celebrate.

There is business to be had — and lost — when securing personal information within corporate databases, financial institutions and hospital networks. Names, addresses, and credit card information go a long way in stealing someone's identity.



More valuable than oil

According to a filing with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission, a "bad actor" stole personal information from approximately 37 million T-Mobile customers. The unidentified hacker, or hackers, started obtaining information last November through a single Application Programming Interface. It was the telecommunication company's second compromise in less than 16 months. In 2021, the personal information of more than 50 million customers — including their social security numbers — was exposed to a hacker.

"While no information was obtained for impacted customers that would compromise the safety of customer accounts or finances, we want to be transparent with our customers and ensure they are aware," the company shared in a statement released in January.

The data included

names, addresses, emails and dates of birth. It also included account numbers, service plan features, and the number of lines under each account. T-Mobile said it plugged the hole within 24 hours of its discovery — a little more than a month after the leak started.

"When there is a declaration of breach, there's a lot of additional impacts that organizations have to go through... including legal dealing with potential financial penalties, loss of business and an additional oversight needed," said Dean Maloney, Business Intelligence Manager at GreyCastle Security. According to a recent report from IBM Cybersecurity, the average cost of a data breach reached \$4.35 million last year, representing an alltime high.

GreyCastle Security is an industry leader in providing cybersecurity readiness solutions to its clients. The Troy-based company prepares and protects its customers from emerging cyber threats through the continuous availability of effective solutions. Last year was unique, Maloney and his colleagues said, in that the usual suspects within the hacking community were preoccupied with the war between Russia and Ukraine. The most noteworthy of events surrounded the first moments of the war, with Russian agents gaining control of the latter's electrical grid, water supply and various control systems. Countries that stood against Russia's invasion — such as the United States, the United Kingdom, and Canada witnessed similar attempts on their infrastructure. But, in terms of the volume of cyber attacks, foreign hackers were either active participants, or suffered from a lack of internet service as a result, of the

What has not changed is the means by which most hackers gain access to networks: phishing and technical vulnerabilities.

"Phishing attacks still reign supreme," Maloney said. "They're still the leader and they have been for a long time." He added that other observers have seen intrusive email attacks go down. His analysts disagree. There's a growing number of cases in which hackers are finding kinks in the armor. "Really, the thing that I want to focus on is that growth and the exploited vulnerability."

Breaches such as the one inflicted upon T-Mobile in January continue to grab headlines and alert companies that they need to remain vigilant with their respective security measures. However, GreyCastle Vice President Michael Stamas said, those holes continue to grow. Though the total cybersecurity workforce has grown over 11 percent in the past year, there's a 26 percent increase in workforce gap. The gap is growing more than twice as fast as the size of the workforce, he said.

"So what this means

is that there is still a significant risk," Stamas said. "Talent is scarce. We've seen organizations generally lacking a roadmap to build resilient cybersecurity teams; instead focusing a lot of time, energy and money competing for a few, select cybersecurity all-stars."

Information Technology stewards are faced with increasing occurrences of ransomware, to the point that the work has turned into a nefarious service industry. Hacking groups place an initial stranglehold on their victims, then proceed to ask for additional money by offering protection plans, all while maintaining a crippling hold on them.

A malware incident with Baptist Medical Center, a Texas-based healthcare provider, affected more than 1.24 million patients from two hospitals. When it was reported last June, it was the fourth largest breach posted on the Department of Health and Human Services' HIPAA Breach Reporting Tool reporting website.

It's now the ninth.
"It's been said that

More legislative bodies are passing laws adding stringent regulations in attempts to protect personal data. Virginia, Colorado, California, Utah and Connecticut have all issued mandates that are to go into effect by the start of next year. As more states follow suit, Maloney said he expects Washington to establish more rules on the federal level.

In the coming months, GreyCastle predicts there will be more attacks on exploited vulnerabilities and more incidents of ransomware as a service. Attackers will get better at bypassing multifactor authentication, and opensource software repositories will continue to plague organizations.

"There's no shortage of things to worry about from the cybersecurity perspective," said Stamas. "We can make much better decisions... If we can truly align and understand what our top risks are."



May we have another second of your time?

Researchers' model for tv ad scheduling reaps revenue increase for networks

TROY — Whether it's Flo from Progressive or the Geico gecko, the average TV viewer may not give much thought to commercials outside of whether they're entertaining or not. However, there is a rather complex science behind what commercials you see and when you see them.

Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute's Sebastian Souyris, an assistant professor of supply chain and analytics who holds the Dean R. Wellington '83 Teaching Professorship in Management at the Lally School of Management, along with his partners, has combined mathematical programming and machine learning to optimize ad schedules. Souyris was joined in research by Sridhar Seshadri, Alan J. and Joyce D. Baltz Professor in the Gies College of Business and Health Innovation Professor in the Carle Illinois College of Medicine at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, and Sriram Subramanian, now the head of Data Science at Pinterest.

The team's work resulted in a model that delivers



a 3-5% revenue increase for TV networks, which translated into \$60 million annually for one prominent user. This business impact won recognition with the prestigious INFORMS Revenue Management & Pricing Section Practice Award in 2022.

"Ad scheduling is a challenging multiperiod, mixed-integer programming problem," Souyris said. "Networks must meet advertisers' campaign goals and maximize revenues. Ads must reach specific target groups within a unique set of constraints, and the number of viewers is uncertain. However, successfully optimizing the schedules reaps great rewards for networks."

Advertising is the

primary revenue source for TV networks. In 2022, U.S. advertisers spent over \$68 billion on TV ads, which equates to 30% of all advertising.

The team's decision support system synthesizes many complex considerations. Contracts between advertisers and networks specify a certain number of views or impressions by their target demographics within a certain time frame, as well as a certain number of ads to deliver to the target viewership even if the number of impressions has already been accomplished. The pace of the ads is also outlined, or number of ads per day. Sometimes the time of day, the position of the commercial during the commercial break, and the

program during which the ad airs is also specified. On top of that, advertisers don't want their commercials aired next to competitors.

Networks must estimate

the number of ads needed to achieve the specified impressions based on past data and how successful the programming is expected to be. They tend to overestimate, too, with the goal of avoiding giving airtime away for free if they are delivering more impressions than promised.

The decision support system has three stages. In the first stage, weights are assigned to ads based on how many impressions still need to be attained. A greater number equals a higher weight. In the second stage, the optimization model assigns the ads to the breaks. In the third stage, a model determines in which position ads will air during the breaks. The system devises the schedule on a daily basis, allowing the integration of the most updated data, such as the Nielsen ratings.

"The three-stage scheduling approach arranges the ads at the level of positions inside the

breaks, which is as detailed as possible," Souyris said. "Using our system allows the development of a close-to-optimal ad schedule in a few minutes!"


"This is yet another successful application of our faculty's research combining data analytics with mathematical modeling to achieve optimized scheduling and increased profitability," said Chanaka Edirisinghe, acting dean of Rensselaer's Lally School of Management. "Dr. Souyris' three-stage approach pushes the boundary of current state-of-the-art practice in ad scheduling by incorporating multiperiod views and constraints in a mixed-integer data-driven optimization decision model."

In eighteenth-century France, people produced and collected drawings at a startling new pace. Speaking to members of the Royal Academy of Painting and Sculpture in 1732, the comte de Caylus (1692-1765), an antiquarian and art patron, lamented that artists were drawing too much and too often. A vast trove of drawings housed at the Bibliothèque nationale de France (BnF) in Paris suggests that this diagnosis of drawing's popularity was well founded. Thomas Hart Benton

n 1956 Thomas Hart Benton was commissioned by Robert Moses, chairman of the New York Power Authority, to create two murals for the powerhouse building of the state's first hydropower facility in Massena. They feature Jacques Cartier's explorations of the St. Lawrence River and the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Alternately titled The Seneca Discover the French and Jacques Cartier Discovers the Indians, the murals depict the 16th-century encounters from two points of view. Benton took liberties with the timing of two actual events in his representation, however, combining them into a single scene for, he noted, "the sake of historical meaning." In spite of the inaccuracy, Benton had thoroughly researched the subject, studying Cartier's accounts and working with prints made shortly thereafter, as well as a model of the ship. In addition, Benton noted, the "Indian costumes, war clubs, head dresses etc. are for the most part based upon exhibits of Iriquois [sic] life in the State Museum at Albany, N.Y."These life groups were on view at the Museum when it was at the State Education Building. 



at Oliveri invented the cheesesteak in the 1930s. Oliveri was a hot dog vendor who decided to grill beef from the butcher and put it on an Italian roll. A cab driver smelled the creation and asked for the sandwich. Word spread about this new concoction, and soon lots of customers were coming by for their own. Oliveri opened up Pat's King of Steaks on 9th Street soon after. Cheese was added later to the sandwiches in the 1940s after a suggestion from manager Joe Lorenza.

Cheesesteaks have become synonymous with Philadelphia. In fact, there is a fierce rivalry between Pat's and Geno's, which is another cheesesteak restaurant that opened across the street from Pat's in 1966 and claims they were the first to add cheese to the steak. Fierce loyalties to both of these restaurants stand today in Philadelphia. However, a person doesn't have to take sides when he or she makes cheesesteak at home. This recipe, courtesy of chef Robert Irvine and the Food Network, is easy and quick.

Cheesesteak

INGREDIENTS: Makes 4 sandwiches

- 2 tablespoons grapeseed oil
- cups thinly sliced yellow onions
 Salt and freshly ground black pepper

- tablespoons unsalted butter, softened
- 4 9-inch sub rolls
- 2 pounds shaved beef, such as ribe eye or sirloin
- thin slices provolone

INSTRUCTIONS

In a large saute pan or griddle, heat the oil over medium-high heat for 1 minute, and then add the onions, 1 tablespoon salt and 1 teaspoon pepper. Cook the onions until caramelized, stirring throughout the process, 5 to 6 minutes. Remove and keep warm.

Spread the softened butter on the interiors of the rolls and cook, butter-side down, on a griddle until browned, 1 to 2 minutes. Remove the rolls, add the raw steak to the griddle and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cook briefly, shedding the meat into small pieces with two metal spatulas. Add the onions and cook for 2 minutes.

Portion the meat into 4 piles, and top each pile with 3 slices of the provolone. Continue to cook until the cheese melts (putting the lid and adding a little water to the pan can help with this step). Cover each pile with a browned roll, and slice a spatula under the meat to pick it up with the roll.
