Transportation leader honored

Bethlehem Central's Karim Johnson named Bus Fleet Administrator of the Year

DELMAR – Bethlehem Central School District has faced head-on many challenges with student transportation in recent years, and the person leading the team has been awarded one of the highest honors in student transportation. Karim Johnson, director of student transportation for BCSD, was honored last month by the School Bus Fleet magazine as it named him National School Bus Fleet Administrator of the Year.

Johnson's push to modernize GPS, telematics and tablets for route navigation are some things that edged him over the competition. Although Johnson was the one being honored, he shined the entire spotlight on his team.

POLICE, FIRE and EMERGENCY CALLS Woman nabbed for Glenmont theft

At JFK gate returning from trip

QUEENS - US Customs and Border Patrol at JFK airport agents detained a East Northport woman returning from a trip overseas on Monday, April 3 who was wanted by Bethlehem police for stealing over \$12,000 from a Glenmont bank account.

According to reports, Sydney Renkewitz, 27, arrived at Terminal 4 at the NYC airport and agents found she had an outstanding warrant stemming from an April 2022 investigation.

On April 20, 2022, a Glenmont rigging and construction company staff member reported to Bethlehem police that the company had paid a fraudulent invoice to a Penn. repair company after the repair company had fixed a piece of equipment. The fake invoice for \$12,872.96 came via email. The invoice had what appeared to be correct details and the correct name of the repair company. The Glenmont company paid the invoice with a check, but the repair company had no record of receiving the payment. The check was cashed and money stolen.

The Glenmont company received a second fake email on April 26, 2022 and contacted police to add that information to the case.

Bethlehem detectives linked the fraud to Renkewitz and issued an arrest warrant, but she was not apprehended until last week.

Bethlehem detectives traveled to JFK and took her into custody.

Renkewitz was charged with grand larceny, a felony, and criminal impersonation, a misdemeanor. She was arraigned by Bethlehem Town Judge Ryan Donovan and released on her own recognizance. Renkewitz is scheduled to return to court on Tuesday, May 2.

Man arrested on warrant for 2020 Walmart robbery and assault

GLENMONT - A man who is accused of and arrested for robbery and assault three years ago was arrested on a bench warrant for not showing up for court to face the charges.

According to reports, In February 2020, Brian Ramsey, 55, of Albany, entered the bathroom at Walmart on Route 9W and allegedly removed merchandise from its packages and walked out of the store. When a loss control employee confronted Ramsey outside he punched the employee causing injury. He then





accomplishment to be recognized for this prestigious honor," Johnson said. "The biggest honor goes to the professional drivers, attendants, mechanics and office staff of Bethlehem, without whom this achievement would not be possible."

Johnson has spent the last three years at Bethlehem and dove into being a leader. He said

it was his 27-year career driving buses that helped facilitate his leadership role.

Johnson started driving a school bus when he was 18 as a way to pay for college. There have been challenges, like any career, but it was those challenges that molded Johnson into the leader he is today.

On March 13, 2020, Johnson drove his students home in a previous district

and then the pandemic lockdown began. The following Wednesday, he quickly transitioned to a meal transporter for

> transportation industry. He has leveraged these connections to leave no stone unturned when it comes to driver recruitment and training," Bethlehem Superintendent Jody Monroe said.

"Karim has worked with officials at the Department of Motor Vehicles to provide onsite testing and certification of drivers that is intended to create a more straightforward path for drivers to become licensed, and he has worked with our communications department to create a dedicated space on the website for interested driver candidates."


In 2021, Johnson proposed and was granted authority to purchase a \$1.8 million zero-emission bus fleet for the district 12 months before Gov. Kathy Hochul called for clean bus fleets by 2035.

Along with the electric fleet, Johnson has deployed advanced transportation technology to increase efficiency and battle the driver shortage. Upgrades to GPS and telematics, the implementation of driver tablets, and the use of student RFID cards to scan on and off the bus allow the district to better manage routes and staff.

Johnson takes great pride in being honored as the National Administrator of the Year. With that pride, he is thankful for those in his life who have shown him what a great leader can be and two stand out. Johnson credits retired Lt. Col. George Lee and former Chief Business and Financial Officer Judith Kehoe.

"I had the pleasure to work for [Lee] when I transitioned from a school bus driver to my first position in leadership with a school district. Sadly he passed away in 2006, but what I learned through our time together still follows me today," Johnson said. "In the short time I had the pleasure of working under [Kehoe's] leadership, I have learned so much. I can say without a shadow of a doubt that I am a better leader from her brief influence on my career."

According to Johnson, leadership is not always an inherent trait, but is often made from the moments that stick with that person. He proves this by continuing to honor and thank those who helped him along the way to this honor.

COMMUNITY BRIEFS St. Peter's Kicks Off 'Paint the Town Teal'

TROY – On Wednesday, March 29, St. Peter's Crime Victim Services, held a news conference to formally kick off its inaugural "Paint the Town Teal" campaign in the City of Troy.

As part of the monthlong effort, teal-colored flags and ribbons will be displayed throughout the city to show support for survivors of sexual violence and to raise awareness.

"Anyone can experience sexual violence, including children, teens, adults, and seniors," said Lindsey Crusan-Muse, director of St. Peter's Crime Victim Services. "Over half of women in the United States and almost one in three men have experienced sexual violence involving physical contact during their lifetimes. This is not ok. By painting the City of Troy teal, we hope to raise awareness of sexual assault, promote education and prevention, and let survivors know that we stand with them."

"Sexual violence is a pervasive problem that cuts across all sectors of our society. It is abhorrent and a blight on humanity," Troy Mayor Patrick Madden said.

Sexual violence is a broad term and includes rape, incest, child sexual abuse, intimate partner violence, sexual exploitation, human trafficking, unwanted sexual contact, sexual harassment, exposure, and voyeurism. The consequences can be long-lasting. Survivors can experience chronic health and behavioral problems and are more likely to abuse drugs and alcohol, and experience continued abuse later in life.

"Sexual violence leaves a lasting and complicated impact on victims. These victims are often left carrying a burden which becomes heavier as they navigate the criminal justice system." Rensselaer County District Attorney Mary Pat Donnelly said.







The CORRUPT Justice Center Must Not be Funded in the Budget – It Must be Shut Down

Everyone needs to know the truth about the State abuse hotline for people with disabilities located in Delmar. The wrongfully titled Justice Center, which is not a Justice Center, is located at 161 Delaware Avenue across from the Delaware Plaza. Close to 8,000 calls are reported from all over New York State to this abuse hotline every month and 11-13 deaths every day and almost every reported crime and death is kept from local police, county coroners, as well as from county elected DA's.

The top NY state court ruled in March of 2021 that the Justice Center is operating unconstitutionally by keeping reported crimes against the disabled from 62 county elected district attorneys. These are illegal practices that clearly obstruct



dropped the \$30.82 worth of goods and fled the scene.

On Wednesday, April 5, he was arrested on the warrant, arraigned by Bethlehem Town Judge Ryan Donovan. Ramsey was released into the custody of the Albany County Sheriff's office pending a further court date.

The restaurant was also closed at the time.

The man was given and failed field sobriety tests and refused a prescreening test by conduct, not blowing strong enough into the device after being told multiple times to do so. He was taken into custody and initially refused to provide a sample at the police station.

One hour and 38 minutes after the stop and on the third request, the man did provide a breath sample that returned a .06 BAC.

The man was charged with DWI, DWAI, refusal to take a breath test and ticketed for illegal lane change, speeding and moving unsafely from a lane. He was given an appearance ticket and released.

DWI on Herber

Stuck car leads to felony DWI

SELKIRK - Albany County Sheriff's deputies observed tire tracks from a parking lot to a 2012 Nissan Altima which was stuck in the mud on Wednesday, March 26 at approximately 3:35 a.m.

Upon interviewing the driver of the car, Erin McHugh, 48, while still sitting in the running car, observed a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage emanating from her breath, she had slurred speech and had the inability to articulate coherent sentences.

According to reports, McHugh said she had driven to the parking lot six hours earlier and did not consume any alcohol. The deputy observed an open 16 oz Bud Light in the cupholder and another empty outside the car along with an empty Four Loco can. She said they were there when she arrived.

When asked to exit the vehicle she could not put on her shoes without help from deputies.

McHugh refused field sobriety tests and did provide a roadside breath sample that returned a .271 percent BAC. She was taken into custody and, at the police station, refused to take a chemical breath test. A criminal history showed she had two prior DWI arrests in 2008 and 2009, which McHugh pleaded guilty to in 2016.

She was charged with felony DWI, misdemeanor operating a vehicle without an interlock device and violations of drinking alcohol in a motor vehicle and littering.

She was arraigned in Westerlo Town Court, released on her own recognizance and given courtesy transportation to Albany Medical Center Hospital. McHugh is scheduled to return to Coeymans Town Court on Thursday, April 20.

BUSINESS Consumer confidence, food concerns rise

Siena Poll: Upstate residents remain less optimistic than their Downstate counterparts

LOUDONVILLE – Fueled by Downstate optimism, overall consumer confidence remains higher in New York than across the nation, according to the latest poll by the Siena College Research Institute (SCRI), but worries remain about the high cost of food.

"Driven by increasing optimism among New York City residents, younger New Yorkers, Democrats and men, consumer sentiment was up this quarter reaching its highest level since June 2021," said Don Levy, SCRI's Director. "But many, including Upstaters, Republicans, those over 55 and women, saw little or no gain in confidence, and they continue to express far more pessimism than optimism. Overall, New York's index, both an assessment of current conditions and

most especially future expectations outpace national sentiment."

Future confidence in New York is now over three points above the breakeven point of balanced optimism

and pessimism and 18.9 points higher than national future confidence. The New York State Index of Consumer Sentiment now stands at

75.0 up 2.7 points from the last measurement in the fourth quarter of 2022, according to the latest poll by the Siena College Research Institute (SCRI). New York's overall Index of Consumer Sentiment is 13.0 points above the nation's Index of 62.0. The current index increased over 3 points to 70.1 and the future index increased just over 2 points resulting in New York's measure of future expectations moving from 75.9 last quarter to 78.1 today.

"Gasoline price worries have lessened but remain well above early pandemic lows while food price impact on budgets is now at 81 percent, the highest we have seen in 14 years of tracking this measurement," said Levy. "Still, expect spring spending to be strong as all buying plans are up with nearly 40 percent of residents expecting their financial condition to improve over the next year and nearly a third saying that now is a good time to purchase major consumer

goods."

In the first quarter of 2023, buying plans were up from the fourth quarter of 2022 measurement for homes at 17.1 percent (from 11.5 percent), for cars/trucks to 28.2 percent (from 25.5 percent), for furniture to 30.8 percent (from 28.4 percent), for major home improvements to 28.0 percent (from 26.1 percent), and for consumer electronics to 45.0 percent (from 44.8 percent).

Sixty-three percent (down from 66 percent last quarter) of all New Yorkers say that current gasoline prices are having a very serious or somewhat serious impact on their financial condition. Eightyone percent (up from 79 percent last quarter) of state residents indicate that the amount of money they spend on groceries is having either a very serious or somewhat serious impact on their finances. The previous all-time high for food concern was 80 percent in June 2022.



Spotlight nabs state press awards

The Spot 518 wins Best Front Page for second year in a row.

Spotlight also won two second-place awards, one for writing and the other for photography.

Jim Franco won for best picture story for a series of photos of insects featured in a Sept. 7 Colonie Spotlight photo Gallery.

Franco has won dozens of awards for photography, writing and design for Spotlight News over the past 20 years.

"Cool photos! We don't get to see much macro photography in newspapers. Good quality," the judges wrote.

Macro photography uses special lenses and tubes to pick up details you can't see without magnification.

McIntyre picked up a second place in the feature story category for his story about Delmar native Lt. Dean Allen. Allen was killed in Vietnam in 1969, but his local friends and even his wife didn't know what happened to him.

"This captured my attention," the judges wrote.

This was a two-month project for McIntyre and one he found rewarding.

"I have been writing for almost 40 years, and this story had to be told," McIntyre said. "Dean's wife, Joyce Hallenbeck, came up after we published it to meet me and see Dean's veteran banner that hangs by Town Hall. It was one of the most rewarding stories I ever wrote."

During the pandemic and subsequent lockdown the Spotlight team came up with an idea to honor high school graduates when they learned there would not be any inperson graduations. The staff created a section for each public high school in its coverage area and printed the picture of each member of the graduating class. Those sections won an honorable mention in the contest.

"Love highlighting all the graduates," the judges said.

The first year was so well received, Spotlight continued it each June. Art Director Dave Abbott and graphic designer Martha Eriksen led the production of the project, while Rachel Dottino, Frank Gillen and Susan O'Donnell organized the logistics.

"Everyone should be recognized at graduation," McIntyre said. "This is what community papers are supposed to do. They are all local and the graduates' pictures should be in the paper."

young actors perform.

Prior to the students' evening performance, the actors rehearsed a pivotal scene on stage from their adaptation of "The Prom" in front of Kinnunen and the theater coaches.

"That was so good!" Kinnunen shouted after the rehearsal concluded.

The cast then sat along the edge of the auditorium stage eager to engage in conversation with Kinnunen. Kneeling down on the floor, she spoke to them in a laid-back style, like that used in the TV show "Inside the Actor's Studio" and opened the floor for discussion.

"I absolutely love coming and doing this. It's got that weird (vibe) of an oral history," Kinnunen continued. "You now have the experience of talking to the original Emma, and you will have stories to tell people that no one else has."

The students continued with their questions, which ranged from her beginnings in theater to her involvement in "The Prom" and why she decided to come to Cohoes to hang out with the cast and faculty.

"This show ('The Prom') means so much to me," Kinnunen said. "This is my life passion. This is what I've done since I was three-years-old."



Kinnunen grew up in Camano Island, Wash., and started performing theater at three years old. While being home-schooled, Kinnunen was involved in a children's theater company in her hometown and performed in plays at the local high school. She took on the lead role as Dorothy in "The Wizard of Oz" and also took part in "Peter Pan" and "Alice in Wonderland."

In 2014, Kinnunen originally auditioned for the role of Alyssa in "The Prom," but wound up cast as the lead character, Emma Nolan. She began performing the role in Atlanta in 2016 and The "Prom" made its way to Broadway in 2018.

In 2019, she was nominated for a Tony Award for Best Performance by a Leading Actress in a Musical. "The Prom" ended its run in August of that year after 309 regular performances and 23 previews.

"The Prom was an incredible experience." Kinnunen said. "The people in it were spectacular. Being surrounded by them everyday for almost five years, you

can't take that for granted or replace it with anything. I became the person that I am because of this show."

Kinnunen was asked why she traveled from New York City to the Spindle City.

"I love that kids across the country are able to do it now. To be able to share my journey with it is really awesome," Kinnunen said. "You are putting your heart and soul into it. I think that's so wonderful and such a thing to celebrate, encourage and foster. I want to be here and show up and do this."

Several students asked Kinnunen what steps an aspiring actor should take to get to Broadway and what pros and cons exist.

"There is no one way to do this. Give yourself to every single opportunity you can and say yes to everything," Kinnunen said. "Take all of the classes, do all of the coaching and be at every production that you could possibly get your hands on."

She said whether that means going to a conservatory or going to school for musical theater, students can always find an opportunity to make the art they wish to make.

"Learn how to create, learn how to be collaborative, and just keep showing up.," Kinnunen said.

Being employed on Broadway, however, is not an easy task and not for the faint at heart, she said.

"The hardest thing is that this industry will beat you up over and over. It will make you feel like a piece of garbage. It will make you feel untalented, unworthy and ugly," Kinnunen said.

But she quickly followed that with a message of positivity.

"We do it because we love it and we do it because it means something to us. If we keep showing up for both ourselves and for the art form, and if we still love it, this is worth everything that happens," Kinnunen said.

Despite all the ups and downs of her career, Kinnunen loves theater and continues to show up. She finds the wonderful moments make it worth it to be an actress.

"It's going to be hard and sometimes, you're going to be like, why am I still showing up? You're still going to show up and you're still going to make it happen. It's what you love to do so you do it," Kinnunen said. "All theater, even bad theater, all theater has something to say and you learn from it. You will think about that for the rest of your life."

Kinnunen thanked Cohoes HS Theater Director Rachel Marer the next day in an email for creating an opportunity for her visit.

"Being able to come and see these incredible students perform this show was truly magical!" she wrote. "This show has been a part of my life for so long, to see them up there making it their own is everything. The joy, the connection, the message. All of it made my heart incredibly happy."

Marer said that the interaction was important to the students.

"Caitlin was so down to earth and gave the kids some great stage and real life advice," Marer said. "The kids' energy was especially high that night, knowing she was in the audience. She seemed to really enjoy the show."



ingredient for short duration, high-intensity exercises, such as weight lifting. According to Kelly Pritchett, Ph.D., RDN, of Central Washington University, foods rich in protein from meat, poultry and fish can help optimize stores of creatine. Creatine also may be found in foods and beverages targeted to athletes, like protein shakes and snacks.

Pre-workout mixes

A snack or mini meal one to three hours before a workout is ideal so that digestive issues don't occur during a workout when the body directs more blood to muscles than

digestion. Food pairings that include a high quality carbohydrate, like whole grain bread or oatmeal, with a protein source, such as peanut butter or milk, can be key. Blood sugar will stay steady with whole grain carbs, and the protein will help you to feel full and avoid overeating after a workout.

Glucose, glycogen for running

Distance running or other exercises that require endurance, such as skating or biking, require ample energy stores. Although low-carbohydrate diets are popular for people looking to lose weight, they're not ideal for people who

engage in endurance sports and need carbohydrates for energy, states Johns Hopkins Medicine. Endurance athletes need more carbs than those who aren't training. These activities use both glucose in the blood and glycogen, which is sugar stored in the liver and muscles. Eating plenty of healthy carbs helps bolster energy stores. Whole fruits and grains are good sources of carbohydrates.

Benefits of bananas

For those with limited time to grab a bite before a workout, bananas might be the perfect option. According to WebMD,

bananas have easily digestible carbs that will not weigh you down. The potassium in bananas also may help prevent muscle cramps during and after workouts.

Power up with potatoes

Potatoes are whole foods, meaning they contain a balance of all the essential amino acids, despite being low in whole protein. They're also rich in vitamin B6, which is critical to protein metabolism, says Mark Anthony, Ph.D., adjunct professor of science and nutrition at St. Edwards University, Austin. Potatoes also contain the

right mix of sodium and potassium to maintain an electrolyte balance in the body.

Recover right

A mix of carbohydrates and lean proteins also is ideal for exercise recovery. Mix in good fats like avocado and olive oil. Carbs will help replenish depleted levels of glycogen and high-quality protein will help build and repair muscle. Don't forget to drink plenty of fluids to replace what was lost while working out.



pril presents an opportunity to shower loved ones with special gifts, including treats. Dessert is a significant component of Valentine's Day, as chocolates and cakes are given and consumed in abundance.

French macarons are a great sweet for amateur bakers to add to their baking repertoire. Making macarons often is a labor of love, so offering a sweetheart a plate of these chewy, meringue-based cookies really shows you care. Vary the filling of choice depending on your beloved's favorite flavors.

Enjoy this recipe for "French Macarons," which utilizes the Swiss meringue method, courtesy of Karli Bitner and her "Cooking with Karli" blog. Weighing the ingredients produces more reliable results.

French Macarons

Make 20 macarons

- grams powdered sugar 100 grams superfine almond flour
- 100 grams egg whites
- 100 100

grams granulated sugar Food coloring, if desired

Vanilla buttercream filling

- tablespoons butter, at room temperature 4
- 11/2 cups powdered sugar teaspoon vanilla extract Up to 2 tablespoons heavy cream
- Food coloring, if desired 1. Measure out all ingredients.

2. Sift together the powdered sugar and almond flour. Set aside.

3. Add 1 cup of water to your sauce pan or to the liner of your Instant Pot.

4. Heat the water over medium heat until steaming.

5. While the water is heating, add the egg and 3 tablespoons of the measured out sugar to the bowl you'll be using for the double boiler.

6. Once the water is steaming, place the bowl over the steaming water and whisk until the egg whites are foamy and white. When they are foamy and white, remove the bowl from the pan or Instant Pot and set on a hot pad on the counter. Turn off the burner or Instant Pot.

7. Add the remaining sugar to the egg whites and mix using an electric hand mixture until the egg whites are white, glossy and can form stiff peaks.

8. Add the food coloring now if you'd like to color your

macarons. Mix until combined.

9. Add the powdered sugar and almond flour to the bowl and mix with your mixer for 8 seconds. After the 8 seconds is up, use a silicone spatula to stir and smear the batter from the outside of the bowl towards the center. Turn the bowl as you do this to make sure all of the batter gets stirred equally.

10. Do this until your batter thins and is able to drizzle a ribbon of batter for a few seconds without it breaking.

11. Transfer the batter to a piping bag equipped with a round piping tip.

12. Pipe equal circles onto a silicone or parchment-lined cookie sheet. Make sure that your piping bag is straight up and down. Apply equal pressure and release pulling straight back up. Repeat with the remaining batter.

13. Bang the pan gently but firmly onto the counter a few times to remove any air bubbles.

14. Preheat oven to 300 F.

15. Allow the macarons to dry out as the oven preheats, for about 20 to 30 minutes. Your macarons should be dry to the touch before going into the oven.

16. Bake for 11 to 13 minutes at 300 F. The macarons should not turn brown.

17. Allow the macarons to cool completely on the pan. 18. When the macarons are completely cool, make your filling

19. Make your filling by combining all ingredients using either a stand mixer or your electric hand mixer. Slowly add in the heavy cream (you can substitute milk if you'd like) because you want a thick buttercream so it doesn't squirt out while eating the macaron.

20. Once the buttercream is mixed together and your desired consistency, gently pipe some frosting onto the bottom side of one cookie and then sandwich the frosting with the bottom side of a second cookie to create your macaron.

21. Repeat with remaining cookies.
